It's a filthy lie.
It's more like 10.
I park my car a quarter mile from campus, for Christ's sake, and walk to and from it every day. Don't even break a sweat.

verlooks New Lava-uarter mile. It's more like 50. Straight up. That's mainly what the gorge is, cres and acres of hills, valleys and pectacular rock formations.

A ctually, there's no such thing as the "Red River Gorge." That's a colloquial name that has no real official status.

Mike Anderson, district ranger for the Statnot Ranger District, said the region generally associated with the mane is the Clifty Wilderness Area, an 11,798-acret tract of the Daniel Bonoe National Forest that's been designated by Congress as a wilderness area.

designated by Congress as a wilderness are. There's also the Red River Gorge Geological Area, designated such for its unique rock formations, which takes up another 14,459 acres. The generic Red River Gorge extends from "West Liberty to Clay City and all points in between," Anderson said, and is primarily located in Wolfe and Menifee counties. It's open year-round. The land is anyway; sometimes roads and designated camprounds are closed. The whole region is managed by the Forest Service, a division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

#### Waldheim denies seeing killings

VIENNA, Austria - President Kurt Waldheim yester

VIENNA, Austria — President Kurt Waldheim yester-day said he did not fight Yugoslav partisans during a Nazi operation and denied he was approached after the war to work for Soviet intelligence, according to his spokesman.

Gerold Christian, the spokesman, made the comments after new allegations appeared in the U.S. media about Waldheim's activity in World War II.

The Washington Post reported yesterday that Waldheim acknowledged after months of denial that he had played a role in the brutal Nazi "pacification" operation that cost thousands of lives in Yugoslavia.

It said that in a 13-page memo sent to the Post in April, the former U.N. sceretary-general had denied he was involved in the 1942 operation to remove all 80,000 residents, including 3,500 armed partisans, from Kozara, a mountainous region in Yugoslavia.

The newspaper yesterday quoted Christian as saying "additional research" revealed the president's earlier statement was incorrect.

But in a telephone conversation with The Associated Press yesterday, Christian said the earlier statements by Waldheim that he was not involved in the Kozara operation "were not incorrect."


