As the investigation widened, some 20,000 people overflowed the state fairgrounds, where President Clinton and the Rev. Billy Graham joined in a memorial service on what the president declared a national day of mourning, Church bells tolled across the nation in memory of the victims.

Survey: Economic recovery likely

Survey: Economic Pecovery likely

WASHINGTON — The global economy should enjoy its strongest growth in seven years in 1995, but that bright prospect is threatened by the recent weakness of the dollar and the turmoil in the Mexican economy, the International Monetary Fund said yesterday. In its latest survey of global economic conditions, the IMF predicted that the economic recovery would gather steam in most of the world, although it forecast a significant slowdown in the United States this year and next.

The IMF outlook projected the U.S. economy, as measured by the gross domestic product, would rise by only 3.2 percent this year and drop to even slower growth of 19 percent in 1996. While such a slow pace would normally raise recession worries, IMF chief economist Michael Mussa put the chances of a U.S. downturn only in the "modest" range, at around 22 percent.

WORLD Thousands flee Rwanda

GIKONGORO, Rwanda — Tens of thousands of people, most wounded or sick, fled along muddy roads yesterday from the refugee camp where at least 2,000 people were killed by Rwandan soldiers or trampled in stampedes a day earlier. Soldiers to studied the bodies in shallow graves and pit latrines at the Kibeho camp, about 12 miles south of Gikongror and 55 miles southwest of the capital, Kigali. Hillsides that had been strewn with corpses were cleared by the end of the day, aid workers said. A 10-mile line of panicked refugees streamed out of Kibeho toward the provincial capital of Butare, 20 miles east, or the border with Burundi, which lies beyond. Most were sick or wounded, according to a team from the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees that visited the camp.

Law class marks lost graduation

The song "The Age of Aquarius" flowed from the Memorial Hall organ as law school graduates from the class of 1970 filed out of the building following their 25-year-late commencement ceremo-

year-late commencement ceremony.

The original commencement was canceled by authorities in 1970 due to campus unrest. Four student Vietnam protesters at Kent State University had just been shot by National Guardsmen, prompting hundreds of UK students to protest. An arsonist set fire to the ROTC building on campus. The National Guard was called to UK, and a 5 p.m. curfew was established for students.

Former UK President Oris A. Singletary, who was in his first year as president in 1970, and former governor Louie Nunn spoke to graduates and their families who returned to UK for the celebration.

More than 100 graduates' names were read at the end of the

If you reside off-campus in an apartment, there are some security measures that Stephanie Bastin, UK Crime Prevention coordinator, suggests you should take to protect yourself and your

longings. ▼Don't hide keys outside the door, under mats, etc.

▼Get new locks or have tumblers reset when you move into a previously occupied dwelling.

▼Have safe locks on all doors. If the property management will not provide a good dead-bolt, install one yourself.
▼Lock your door even if

you'll only be gone a minute.

▼Use a peephole. Don't let strangers into your home. Don't be afraid to ask for identification

▼Don't give information to strangers on the telephone. On a wrong-number call, don't tell the caller your name or phone number.

▼Secure patio doors with a lock on the inside, as well as a strip of wood in the lower track protruding screws in the

upper track.

▼Single women should never place their full name on the mailbox. Use your first and middle initial followed by your last name. If you live alone, add a fake name to the box.

▼Supplemental locks should
be placed on windows and
doors, especially those that open
to fire escapes, terraces and balconies

▼Keep mailboxes empty. If you are away, arrange with a neighbor or building manager to circulars, etc. removed from the boxes.

VLeave a light on and a TV

or radio playing quietly when you go out in the evening, to give the impression that somene is home.

VDon't close blinds or pull

shades or do other things that may advertise your apartment is

empty.

▼Any phone near a window or door should be turned to low ring, turned off or unplugged in

Don't leave notes that could tell a burglar no one's home. Ask friends who leave under the door.

▼Don't leave cash or valuable items in plain view of win-

dows or doors.

▼Develop a buddy system with your neighbors. Be alert for suspicious looking strangers, sounds or actions in and around

your building or complex. ▼Report broken and burnedout lights to the management right away. Well-lit areas discourage burglars.

▼Park only in well-lit areas when leaving your car for the

If you should return to discover your apartment has been entered here are a few things you should do:

▼Don't go in. Go to a neigh-

bor's apartment and call the police immediately.

▼Don't touch anything or clean up. Leave everything as it is until the police can inspect for evidence.

If you are asleep, and a burglar has entered your apartment:

▼Don't get up, pretend you're asleep. Stay where you are, unless your life is in danger.

If you ever feel endangered or threatened call 911.

Utility bills can really add up

One of the hassles of renting an apartment is paying the bills. For many students, setting up utilities in their first apartments can be a headache.

Kentucky Utilities represen-tative Tom Harris said all students have to do is sign for service to get their electricity turned on.

"Students never have to pay a service charge," Harris said.

service charge," Harris said.

The average electric bill varies between apartments, depending on the window units and whether it has electric or gas

"If the apartment is all electric, meaning it is heated with electricity, (the bill) will be more in the winter, if the apartment has gas heat it will go down in the winter," Harris said.

has gas hear it will be winter," Harris said.

"Whatever you are doing to the air is the most expensive."

"If you were going to another school, say Boston University, you would pay \$120 for the same service," he said. "We really

have a pretty good bargain."

Many apartments have natural gas heat, water heaters and

appliances. When students move into an apartment they have to get the gas connected.
Columbia Gas costumer ser-

vice specialist Gloria Right said students have to pay a security deposit if they do not have someone co-sign for them. There is no set flat rate for a deposit, Right said. It varies from apartment to apartment based on the previous year's vice specialist Gloria Right said

"If you go 12 months with out receiving a non-payment notice you get back your deposit plus 6 percent interest," she said.

She added that each apart-ment uses gas differently and the rates are based on the previous year's usage. All costumers can choose budget billing. The budget rate is based on

how much gas the apartment uses. The bills can vary depending on the number of gas appli-ances and whether it is summer

Another utility that is essential is water. A costumer service representative for Kentucky American Water Company said the average bill is about \$45 for one person every three months. The amount increases with the

amount of people living in the apartment. The monthly service charge is \$17.50.

One utility that some students also can't live without is a telephone. GTE charges \$63.45 for phone installation if it has to send a service person to the apartment and \$49.70 if it

doesn't.

The basic rate for phone service per month is \$22, before taxes and long distance.

Tenant Services provides legal help

Leasing an apartment can be a civics lesson — if studied prop-

erly. Kentucky law clearly defines a system of checks and balances intended to protect both tenants and landlords from disputes in

the leasing process.

The General Assembly rati-

The General Assembly ratified the aptly named Landlord-Tenant Act to go into effect Aug. 1, 1974, in response to growing citizen outcry.

However, many people — students in particular — fail to make themselves aware of the law, said Linda Black, director of Tenants Services, a non-profit Tenants Services, a non-profit organization based in the Lex-ington-Fayette County's Gov-

ernment Center's basement. Even landlords sometimes call the tenant hotline to learn the rights accorded them in both federal and state statutes.

"There are always two sides to a story," Black said. "We try to be as open-minded as possi-

Black said that the single-

students seem to have when leasing an apartment is not being inquisitive enough. She said many students don't check the apartment before they sign a lease, or get legal advice to read between the lines on such an agreement.

Many times when leasers fail

Many times when leasers fail to look at the precise apartment they agree to lease, they wind up disappointed with the result.
"They might look at a model, or they might look at the apartment they're getting," Black said. "When you ask to see your apartment, I would urge you to he warv."

apartment, I would urge you to be wary."

Most students have never attempted to lease, and their inexperience can be a major problem, Black said, particularly when it comes to choosing roommates.

The second-largest problem students often face is choosing the "wrong" roommate, or one who fails to meet their share of the lease payment.
Only the landlord has final

say on lease disputes between roommates, Black said.

"It's like a husband and wife breaking up," Black said, and it can get legally messy.

In addition, if a new room-mate moves in, Black said that person usually must be approved by the landlord. She said the landlord is ultimately responsi-ble for the condition of the apartment.

Most of all, Black advises all her clients that they need to always get a promise from a landlord officially documented. From a lease agreement to a pledge to fix a leaky roof, Black said that one step is vital.

"When they don't get those

things in writing, there is some confusion that could be avoid-

ed," Black said.
Tenants Services provides three legal counselors on staff to help all citizens of the community, including UK students, Black

However, she said most cases can be resolved in small claims court, which is designed for people with grievances to settle small disputes at very little

Dishion said.
Of the 454 room changes that occurred last semester, only 32 were because of roommate con-

"It really does not matter how much you try to make the perfect matches," Dishion said. "You give people exactly what they want, then they try to switch."

She said the most roommate complaints are because applicants were not truthful on their

applications.
"Believe it or not, we have parents filling out applications for their kids," Dishion said. "There are a lot of times when parents don't know their kids smoke and they apply for a non-smoking room and stuff like

Dishion said there are also calls from concerned students about the ethnic origin of their future roommate.

Self-storage and U-Hauls make moving easy for students

You can save mom and dad the trouble of hauling station wagon loads of luggage home from school this year by storing it in one of Lexington's storage facilities or by renting a truck or trailer to take belongings home. But no matter what students choose to do, several local com-panies will be able to assist them

panies will be able to assist them.

Safe Storage, a local company, will rent a 5 foot by 10 foot

cubicle to students for \$25 per month. In order to rent at Safe Storage, a student must sign a month-to-month lease.

For just \$16 more, students can get a protection package, insuring their belong-ings up to \$10,000. This package also covers any damage to the rented trailer or truck and limited medical care resulting from any accidents.

U-Haul officials said May is one of the companies busiest months, and vehicles and trailers will be snapped up by students and other travelers looking to get settled for the summer.

"You would definitely want to make a reservation," said Jenny McCarty, an employee with U-Haul of Lexington. "With everybody going home, it gets kind of crazy around here.


