By this statement we did not mean that the Kernel would support the opinions of every student or segment of students at all times. The Students Speek column offers the student, or administration or faculty member, the opportunity to present his views to the campus, but the Kernel reserves the right to form and state its own opinions of these views.

important. The movement on the part of a few censors to decide what we will and will not read is nothing short of supression of this freedom. The individual has the right to choose for Jimself the literature he wishes to read, not the censor.

The Louisville Retail Drug Association, using a list of books and magazines compiled by the Na-tional Organization of Decent Literature, an off-shoot of the National Catholic Legion of Decency,

This censorship is equal to the threat of com-munism, which works in the same fashion—under-mining the rights and freedoms of the individual.

The idea that a board of censors, far removed from the public will, can decide which books are "obscene" and those which aren't is as repugaant as any attempt to stiffe freedom of the mind. Con-sidering that some books and magazines are ob-scene and detrimental, these censors should con-sider that public opinion, and only public opinion is the proper force to use in making decisions con-cerning what the American people will be allowed

to read.

There are many American novels, which, because of their realism, contain matter that might not be intended for the eyes of emotionally immature children. However, that gives the censors no reason to ban them. Many educational books have been put on the black list because of this.

Unfortunately, literature which is interesting and worthy of reading is not always "pure" and on the fifth grade level. Even in Shakespeare's times people recognized that people are people, and the popularity of Shakespeare's plays is due partly to the fact that they give an amazingly deep insight to human nature. Even the censors would be re-luctant to admit that we have remained socially and mentally stagnant since the reign of Victoria.

The American public is fully capable of showing which books they want to read and those which they consider "trash." Admittedly, many of the comic books on newstands are of a nature that will make the most callous gentleman shiver and look behind his shoulder. The same applies to so-called "sex" novels.

If the reader is emotionally well balanced, he will judge the material for its overall worth, and not on the individual passages. It would be much simpler and, we believe, much more justifiable to ask, odenand, that owners of bookstores refuse to sell books of that type to people under college age. Thomas Jefferson, in 1800, summed up the situation perfectly when he said, "I have sworn upon the altar of Cod, hostility against every form of tyranny over the mind of men."

While we rant and rave about the threats of communism to this country, people such as these all-knowing censors are in the act of undermining one of our greatest freedoms—freedom of choice.


