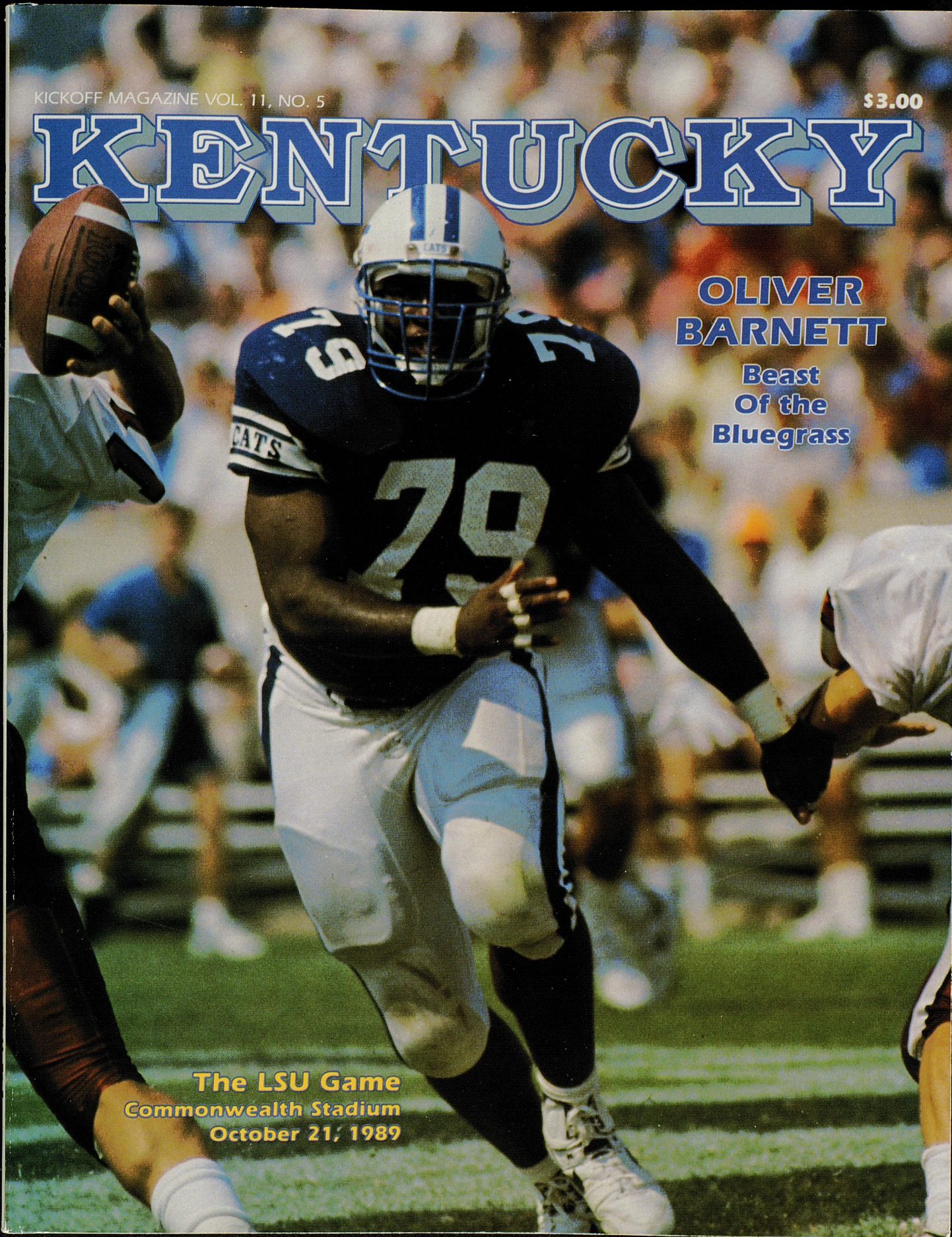

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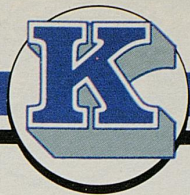

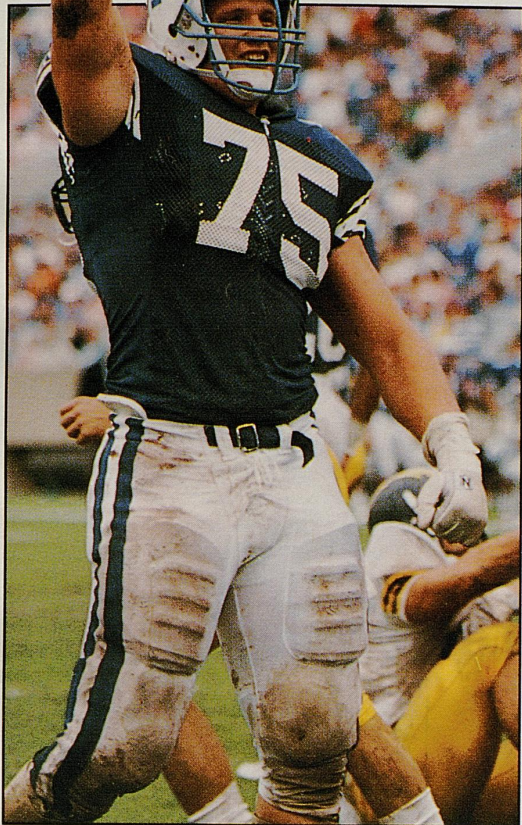

A Tradition of Value

From its modest beginnings in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nation's most outstanding institutions of higher learning.

As a comprehensive land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the Commonwealth. In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that await students at UK.

Enrollment on the University's campus in Lexington is more than 23,000, while about 33,000 attend UK's 14 community colleges throughout the Commonwealth. That represents one-third of all students attending public or private colleges, business schools and universities in the state.

Average scores on the ACT (the entrance exam for all UK freshmen) have been increasing every year, and now at 22+ are higher than those for any public university

in the state and three points higher than the national average. The result is a better quality student body each year.

The number of students wanting to attend UK has also been increasing each year with applications for admission this fall at the 11,000 mark.

The University's academic scholarship program — scholarships awarded on merit alone — has grown from \$70,000 a year in 1983 to more than \$1 million in 1988. Tops among these awards are the Singletary Scholarships, which this year honored 13 students with four expense-paid years at UK.

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has classified UK as a "Research University of the First Class," the only such institution in Kentucky and one of only 45 in the nation.

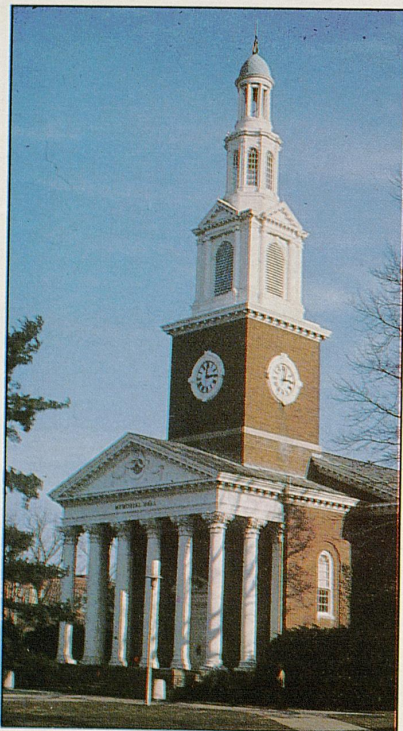
The University is now one of only a small number of universities in the nation to acquire a "supercomputer." UK's IBM 300E, with three "vectors," will attract more research funding and grants, and it will be made available to undergraduate students.

UK faculty brought more than \$50 million in research grants and sponsored programs to the University and the state last year — a valuable resource to the economic development of the Commonwealth. UK ranks among the Top 100 research universities in federal research funding, the only one so ranked in the state.

A university's list of alumni indicates the quality of that school's service to the campus and community. Included in the University's list of more than 100,000 alumni are seven governors, two Nobel Prize winners, an astronaut, and several chief executive officers of national corporations.

The university's fine faculty includes Anthony DeMarie, president of the American College of Cardiology, and R. David Cobb, chairman-elect of the American Pharmaceutical Association's board of trustees.

David Kao, civil engineering, was named one of the nation's top 100 researchers by Science Digest Magazine. And Virgil Hayes, animal sciences, has been elected president of the Council for Agricultural Science and Technology in the United States.

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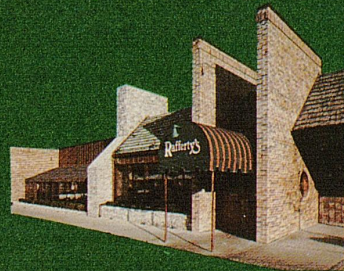

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Wildcats Head Back Into SEC Fire

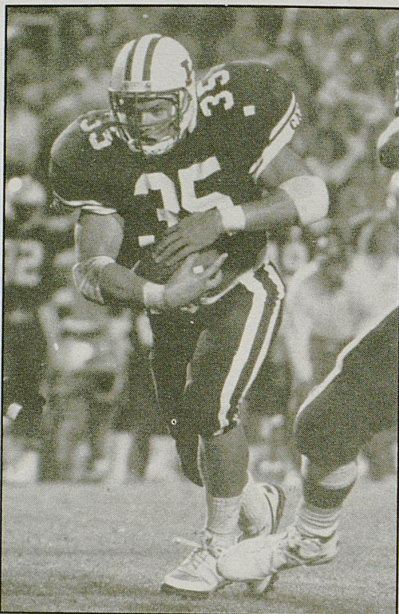
It looked like the deal was settled. With just over three minutes to play in the Kentucky-Rutgers game last Saturday night, the Wildcats were in control, 26-10. Or so it seemed.

A funny thing happened on the way to the lockerroom. Rutgers launched a caution-to-the-wind comeback in front of the handful of fans left from the 54,771 attendance.

Maybe it was Kentucky's penchant for athletic drama that let the Scarlet Knights back in the door. "We sure made it hard," said coach Jerry Claiborne afterward.

Rutgers pulled within eight at 3:15 to go with a 37-yard Scott Erney touchdown pass followed by a two-point conversion. After smothering the onside kickoff, Kentucky struck back. Alfred Rawls broke free for an untouched 69-yard touchdown ramble.

But the scoring still wasn't finished. A few plays later, Erney unleashed a 69-yard pass on the Kentucky defense to counter Rawls' heroics. A two-point conversion lat-

er, Rutgers was within seven. "We had been playing excellent defense, containing (Erney), keeping him in the pocket," said the Wildcat chief. "I don't know what happened."

The Cats pounced on another onside boot and this time, the game was over.

The drama, however, was not exclusive of the final five minutes. Kentucky squandered some opportunities inside the 20-yard line. A steady performance from Kentucky placekicker Ken Willis helped the Kentucky victory. His four field goals tied a UK record held by Joe Worley and 15 points kicking stands alone in the school record book.

The LSU Tigers have seen plenty of drama this year as well. But it has been disastrous for them. In front of a hostile Auburn crowd last week, the Bayou Bengals came up short in their bid to pocket a conference victory. A late Auburn punt return followed by a one-yard touchdown run spoiled the LSU's fun, 10-6.

So the Tigers are 1-4 on the year and winless in the SEC. No reason to be fooled, though. LSU is certainly the best 1-4 team

Today's Game Notes

THE SERIES — Kentucky and LSU have met 39 times, the first contest being in 1949. LSU leads the series 29-9-1. Of games played in Lexington, the Tigers are 12-6-0. The Tigers also lead the series in Baton Rouge, 16-3-1.

THE LAST MEETING — Oct. 15, 1988: "There's really not much to say," Kentucky coach Jerry Claiborne said after his team dropped its third SEC match in a row to LSU. "We had a breakdown in our kicking game."

A blocked punt and two botched snaps led to all three Tiger scores as LSU knocked off the Wildcats 15-12. The knockout blow came in the fourth quarter, with the Cats up 12-7. A botched Kentucky quick-kick on third down, followed by a blocked punt cleared the way for a 10-yard Tom Hodson touchdown pass.

THE COACHES — Kentucky's Jerry Claiborne is in his eighth year

with the Wildcats working on a 38-43-3 record. His career record is 176-119-8 spanning 28 years. Claiborne is 1-6 against the Tigers.

LSU head coach Mike Archer is in his third year with the Tigers, with a 19-9-1 record. LSU is his first head coaching position. Archer is 2-0-0 against the Wildcats.

THE STORYLINE — Both teams are vying for their first win in the SEC. LSU (1-4) is fighting to keep bowl hopes alive. Kentucky (3-2) must win some conference games to be considered in postseason selections.

PLAYERS TO WATCH — The Wildcat defense features senior tackle Oliver Barnett and Ron Robinson at free safety. Barnett (6-4, 279) has 20 career sacks. Robinson (6-1, 185) has 248 career tackles. Linebacker Craig Benzinger has been a tackling terror in 1989, with 70 hits. Defensive tackle Donnie Gardner has made an inden-

tion in enemy lines all season.

The cornerstone of the Wildcat offensive line is tackle Mike Pfeifer (6-7, 305). Pfeifer and company had their best blocking effort against Rutgers last week. Alfred Rawls (5-11, 200) can explode for big yardage at any time, like the 69-yard touchdown burst against the Scarlet Knights.

Sophomore quarterback Freddie Maggard has thrown for 723 yards and two touchdowns in 1989.

The Tigers think pass first, as the statistics reveal. Quarterback Tom Hodson has entrenched himself at the top of most LSU record lists and is rapidly approaching the pinnacle of SEC passing stats.

Tony Moss has caught the most passes on the team and in the SEC with a total of 454 yards.

The defense is anchored by tackles Karl Dunbar (6-4, 274) and Clint James (6-6, 269).

in the country, with losses coming at the hands of nationally-ranked Florida State, Florida and Auburn.

This is a good team. "They'll be coming in here trying to get back that winning edge," said Claiborne.

Kentucky will have to clean up its act to bring the Tigers' record down to 1-5.

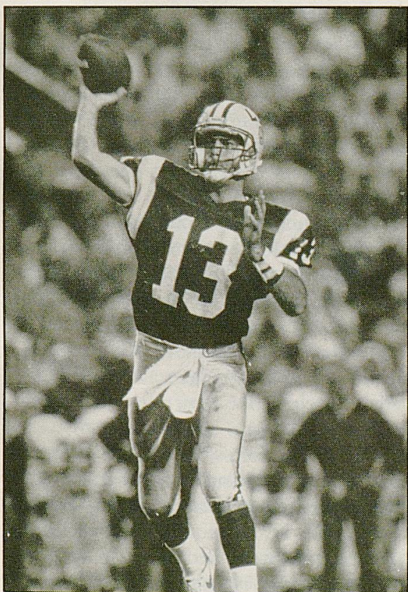
It did plenty of good things against Rutgers, though. The Wildcat defense had a better night than the statistics suggest. Though it gave up 363 yards of offense to Rutgers, a large chunk got through, as it were, in the final five minutes of the game.

"We made some mistakes," said tackle Donnie Gardner, the raspy voice of reason. "If we continue to make them we aren't going to beat LSU."

The offense appears to have gotten on track, posting an impressive 464-yard, 33-point performance in the Rutgers win. The option, featuring fullback Andy Murray for 80 yards rushing, finally worked behind the Cats' best blocking effort to date.

That line will have its work cut out when it tries to stop the Tom Hodson to Tony Moss air attack of LSU. Hodson has passed for 896 yards and Moss leads the SEC with 34 receptions for 454 yards. The Tiger defense, led by tackles Karl Dunbar and Clint James, was unyielding to the powerful Auburn attack last week.

So the Wildcats leap back into the SEC wars. And LSU is out to take no prisoners.



LSU quarterback Tom Hodson is on the verge of breaking SEC records for total passing yardage and career touchdowns.

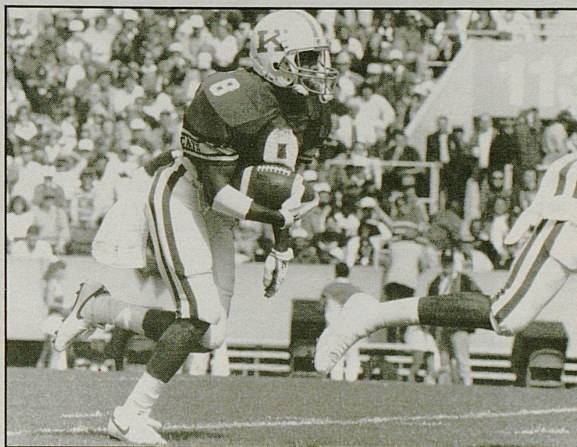

Kentucky's most exciting player is also one of its smallest. At just 5-7, 150, Kurt Johnson should be getting manhandled by college football's giants. Plus he is a freshman, — a true freshman, as in "just out of high school."

But Johnson has already made his mark on the Wildcat squad and in the SEC. With pure speed and what could be called nothing less than fortitude, Johnson has been consistently returning punts and kickoffs for big yardage in breakneck fashion.

Head coach Jerry Claiborne has been convinced of his returner's value. "I think Kurt Johnson did an excellent job giving us good field position," said the

Against Rutgers, Johnson scooted for 120 yards on all returns, 95 from kickoffs and 30 from punts. He can find a hole and pierce it or make his own hole with a deceptively powerful steam-roll technique.

"I thought I played pretty good," said Johnson after the game. "I should have scored on a couple of returns but I made some wrong fakes."

It seems inevitable that one of those explosive returns takes Johnson into the end zone. And being a frosh, he's got a bright future ahead of him.

Jerry Claiborne knows the true meaning of college athletics.

Kentucky's head football coach, who turned 61 August 26, has long been an advocate of the proper mix between academics and athletics. His record bears witness to his integrity and an ideal turned reality.

In 27 years as a collegiate head coach, Claiborne has had four players named Academic All-American and 87 players chosen Academic All-Conference. On the field, Claiborne has had one player earn the Outland Trophy, one earn the Lombardi Trophy, 13 named All-American and 53 named All-Conference.

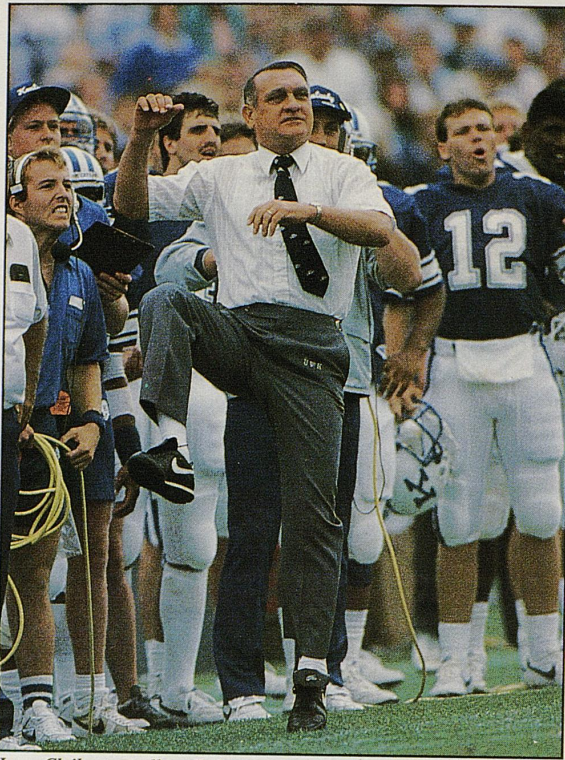
Claiborne's charges won the 1989 College Football Association Academic Achievement Award for highest graduation rate (90 percent). And since he became head coach at Kentucky in 1982, the Wildcats have led the Southeastern Conference in Academic Honor Roll selections with 51.

But while Claiborne's teams have hit the books, they have administered the same treatment to their opponents, appearing in 11 bowl games and winning four conference championships (one Southern, three Atlantic Coast).

Claiborne begins his 28th season with a career record of 173-117-8 (.594). He ranks fourth among active NCAA I-A coaches in career victories, behind Bo Schembechler of Michigan (224), Joe Paterno of Penn State (212) and Bobby Bowden of Florida State (185). Claiborne's .594 winning percentage ranks 16th among active coaches.

The Hopkinsville native is one of only a handful of coaches to be named Coach of the Year in three different conferences: Southern (1963), Atlantic Coast (1973, 1975, 1976) and Southeastern (1983).

In December 1981, the University of Kentucky beckoned for one of its own to return; Claiborne accepted and became UK's 31st head football coach. In seven years, Claiborne has guided Wildcat teams to a 35-41-3 record and two bowls. Take away a transitional 0-10-1 record during his first campaign at UK in 1982, and Claiborne has compiled a 35-31-3 ledger.

Only two Kentucky coaches have had six consecutive seasons with at least five victories and appeared in at least two bowl games — Claiborne and his mentor, Paul "Bear" Bryant.

But athletic statistics aside, Claiborne's greatest accomplishment has been to help place so many of his student-athletes into society. The UK football graduation rate, based on the 1982 and 1983 freshman signees, is 90.2 percent. Kentucky broke the stronghold of Notre Dame, Duke and Virginia this past year by winning the Academic Achievement Award, the first time another school has broken the triumvirate since the award's induction in 1981.

While earning three football letters at Kentucky, Claiborne accumulated a 2.7 GPA on the old 3.0 scale and graduated in 1950 with "high distinction" in mathematics and physical education. He was named Outstanding Senior in the College of Education.

Claiborne began coaching football and basketball at Augusta Military Academy in

Ft. Defiance, Va. In two years, he established himself as an up-and-coming young coach with a state championship in both sports.

But a call from Bear Bryant brought a quick end to his high school coaching. Claiborne returned to his alma mater as an assistant coach on Bryant's 1952 staff.

In 1954, Claiborne followed Bryant to Texas A&M and became defensive coordinator. After a 1-9 record in '54, the Aggies took off and claimed the Southwest Conference title with a 9-0-1 record in 1956.

Claiborne's stock rose dramatically. Frank Broyles, then head coach at Missouri, hired Claiborne away from Bryant in time for the 1957 season. As defensive coordinator at Missouri, Claiborne helped the Tigers post a 5-4-1 record, their first winning campaign in four years.

Bryant called on Claiborne again, this time to join his staff at Alabama as defensive coordinator, and Claiborne again answered. He helped the Crimson Tide earn a three-year mark of 20-7-5 and appear in the Liberty and Bluebonnet Bowls.

His immediate success as a prep head coach and collegiate assistant prompted Virginia Tech to make Claiborne its head football coach in 1961. Little did the folks at Blacksburg know that Claiborne, then 33, would take the Hokies to unprecedented heights for the next 10 seasons.

Claiborne guided the Hokies to a 61-39-2 record and appearances in the 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowls. His 1963 squad, which finished 8-2, captured Tech's only Southern Conference championship. Claiborne was named the 1963 Southern Conference Coach of the Year and later the 1966 District III Coach of the Year after Tech finished 8-2-1.

But in 1970, following a 5-6 record, Claiborne left Virginia Tech to become an assistant coach at Colorado under Eddie Crowder. The 1971 Colorado football team ended the season ranked third nationally (10-2) and defeated Houston in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

The University of Maryland, which had suffered through five head coaches in 16

years and a dismal 60-100-1 record, looked to Claiborne for help. After a one-year absence from head-coaching, Claiborne took over the Terrapin football program in 1972, then at age 44.

Claiborne quickly built Maryland into the model football program of the Atlantic Coast Conference. After a mediocre first year, the program took off. Maryland won no fewer than seven games the next eight years, claimed three ACC championships and appeared in seven bowl games.

Claiborne was named ACC Coach of the Year three times, NCAA District III Coach of the Year (1973, 1975, 1976) and *Sporting News* National Coach of the Year (1974). He also tutored All-American defensive player Randy White, the 1974 Outland Trophy and Lombardi Trophy winner.

From those Maryland squads came 36 Academic All-ACC selections and four Academic All-Americans. One of the four was Claiborne's son, Jonathan.

In 1982 Kentucky called on Claiborne to replace Fran Curci, who had been the UK head coach for nine seasons.

Optimism was high as Claiborne entered his first season at UK. But the nation's second-toughest schedule faced Claiborne and his new Wildcat squad. The 11 opponents went on to compile an impressive 63-34-5 record. Kentucky was not so fortunate; it could only muster an 0-10-1 record.

Claiborne was quick to return to his winning ways. UK roared to a 5-1 start in 1983 and tied Memphis State for the nation's Most Improved squad with a 6-4-1 regular-season record. The turnaround earned the Wildcats the right to play in the Hall of Fame bowl, Kentucky's first postseason appearance since 1976. Though UK lost to West Virginia, 20-16, in the Bowl, Claiborne was voted SEC Co-Coach of the Year by the Associated Press.

In 1984, the magic continued. This time, Kentucky ended the regular season with an 8-3 record, capped by a thrilling 17-12 road victory over Tennessee to assure itself a return to the Hall of Fame Bowl. A 52-yard field goal by Joey Worley gave the Wildcats a 20-19 victory over Wisconsin in the bowl game and a fitting end to a 9-3 season.

Since then, Claiborne and his Kentucky squads have played the bridesmaid, waiting for their chance to work back into the happy marriage of postseason play. The Cats have strung together consecutive seasons of 5-6, 5-5-1, 5-6 and 5-6.

Claiborne is married to the former Faye Hooks of Hopkinsville, also a University of Kentucky graduate. They have four children: David, Jonathan, Mrs. Katie Newell and Eileen.

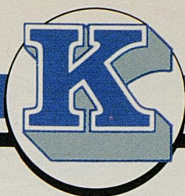
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Time For A Change

Oliver Barnett calls for an end to big-game losses

Change, for the most part, is good. Most people revel in the change of seasons, forcing a revision in their wardrobe or outdoor activities. Sports fans love to see Joe Underdog supplant Billy Bad Boy as the league's head honcho.

A switch in political office does wonders for the morale of a disgruntled constituency. Let's face it, people just like to discover spare change in their pockets.

Oliver Barnett is another person who enjoys change.

Kentucky's all-star defensive lineman is trying his best to erase the perception about the Wildcats' penchant for losing "The Big Game."

Over the past couple of seasons, UK has lost closely-contested games to Auburn (twice), Alabama (twice), LSU and Florida. All four of those teams are perennially among the Southeastern Conference's elite, where no Kentucky squad has ventured since 1977.

The Wildcats get another crack at LSU tonight after falling to Alabama (15-13) and Auburn (24-12) earlier this year.

It's been the same old story-line: play a good, fundamentally-sound game for about three quarters, then watch the game slip away because of a critical mistake like a missed tackle, missed block, dropped pass or blown coverage assignment.

Entering this season, the UK hopes were high. All the preseason talk centered around the Wildcats being a darkhorse candidate for league supremacy now that they've gained conference-wide respect.

After wins over Indiana and North Carolina, things looked rosy. Then the rosy color turned crimson, as in Tide. Kentucky was beaten on the road against Alabama and at home against Auburn. Both victors

were highly-ranked and both games were on national television.

The defeats were missed opportunities to prove, once and for all, that UK can beat the SEC's top-notch squads and not just play with them, putting on a good show. It didn't happen.

Barnett says enough is enough. He and the team can't take it any longer.

Aside from just playing, Barnett and his teammates figured something else may assist their quest for respect, and more importantly, a few wins.

"We had a team meeting the other day," said Barnett, "and we cleared up a lot of things. We all came together and said that we need to go on from here.

"The team has a very positive attitude right now," he said. "We have to believe in each other and just relax when we go out to play. If we keep believing in ourselves, we'll get better. We don't have a lot of built-up tension now. We've got to get back to winning.

"We can't have it like it's been in the past. We've got to change."

One thing Barnett altered was his approach to the game following the first two wins. Even though UK was victorious, he wasn't impressed with his own performance.

"The first couple of games I just put a lot of pressure on myself," he admitted. "The coaches told me not to worry and just go out there and play football. They said it looked like I wasn't having any fun. I should play hard and not force anything just to get a sack."

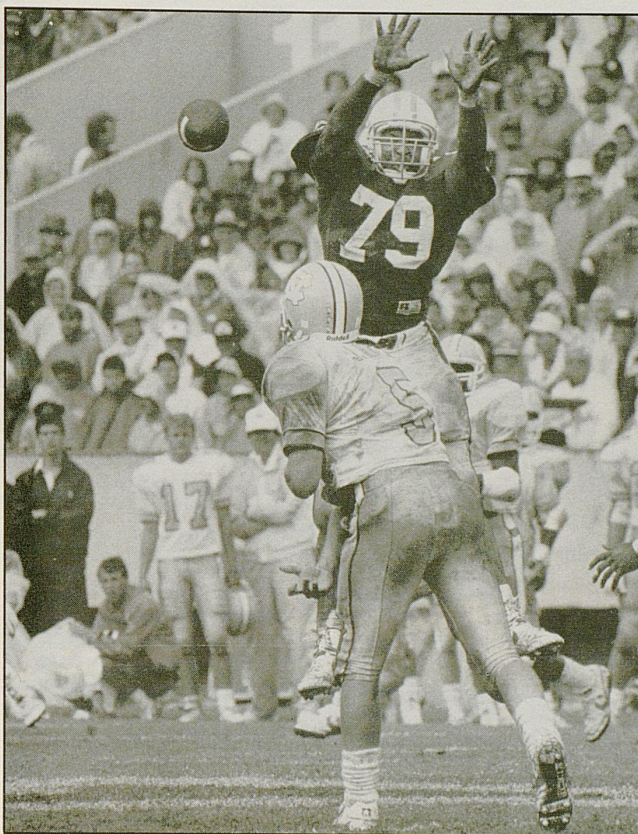
Kentucky's all-time sack leader with 19 entering the 1989 campaign, Barnett is a little behind schedule to make a substantial addition to his record. But he appears to be back on track.

He had his first sack of the year against Alabama, then came back with his most consistent

performance this season against Auburn. The 6-3, 285-pound, three-year letterman from Louisville recorded nine tackles (eight solo), one tackle for a loss of two yards and graded 84 percent on 57 plays.

Barnett's rock 'em, sock 'em style of play results from a long and laborious rendezvous in the Wildcat weightroom. He holds

"We're not going to say 'here we go again' anymore," said Barnett. "In the past, we'd make some sort of fundamental mistake to lose the game. We had a good game plan against Alabama and Auburn, but just had too many mistakes.

"We need to get away from that old Kentucky habit of playing in a big game and losing. We have to look forward to the next game, then just play," he said.

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Commonwealth Stadium

When it comes to football, Kentucky-style, there is certainly no better place than home — Commonwealth Stadium.

Built in 1973, Commonwealth is one of the nation's best showcases for collegiate football. The stadium is located on the southwest corner of the University of Kentucky campus, convenient to both Cooper and Alumni Drives.

Commonwealth Stadium was built at a cost of \$12 million by the firm of Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc. The stadium, including parking areas, rests on an 86-acre plot of what was once the UK Experimental Station Farm grounds.

The stadium was officially opened September 15, 1973. The Wildcats moved into their new home after spending 48 years at Stoll Field/McLean Stadium across from Memorial Coliseum. Kentucky defeated Virginia Tech in the stadium-opener, 31-26, behind three touchdowns by quarterback Ernie Lewis.

Since its opening, Kentucky has played 100 games within the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium. And indeed, the 56-41-3 record and .575 winning percentage is proof positive of the Wildcats' home-field advantage.

Kentucky has been particularly successful at home in recent years. The Wildcats have posted a 27-17-3 record (.606 pct.) at Commonwealth since Claiborne took over, winning 12 of their last 15 games. Included is Kentucky's 16-10 upset of 11th-ranked Georgia last October.

Large crowds have followed Kentucky football at Commonwealth Stadium. The Wildcats have averaged 55,325 spectators for contests at Commonwealth since its inception. In total, 5,532,451 spectators have witnessed Kentucky football at Commonwealth Stadium — that's about 1.4 times the population of Kentucky.

Commonwealth Stadium can officially seat 57,800, though standing-room only crowds exceed that figure. Most sat but many of the stadium-record 58,345 spectators stood to watch the Wildcats defeat Mississippi State 33-19 October 12, 1985. The second-largest crowd, 58,230, gathered a week earlier to watch Kentucky defeat Clemson 26-7.

An enclosed press box, which comfortably seats 120 members of the media, is located underneath the upper deck on the stadium's west side. The press box area has

eight private booths (four VIPs), a photography deck and two dining areas. Two elevators link the box to the stadium ground.

The University of Kentucky plans to eventually enclose the south end (Tates Creek Road) of Commonwealth Stadium to bring its capacity to 72,000. The addition of luxury suites and boxes is also in the plans.

The University of Kentucky provides first aid stations on the ground level on both

sides of the stadium - **on the west side in room 156 and on the east side in room 172.**

Persons in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to the nearest Boy Scout or usher.

Persons with any type of chronic problem should leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at either first aid station.

Tonight the Kentucky Wildcats wrap up a three-game homestand by hosting the LSU Tigers at Commonwealth Stadium.

Festivities will again be rampant in both the pregame and halftime segments of tonight's Southeastern Conference clash. The University of Kentucky Marching Band will perform in pregame and at halftime, Dave's Fireworks Display Company will light the sky when the Wildcats score, the SEC will make a special presentation to four of its game officials and UK will honor its 1949 Wildcats squad.

For starters, the SEC will recognize four game officials during pregame ceremonies for 15 years of service in the league. The four officials to be honored tonight are A.C. "Butch" Lambert, Jr., of Jackson, Miss., Robert Caldwell of Columbus, Miss., Charley Horton of Morganton, N.C., and Bill Stanton of Dunwoody, Ga.

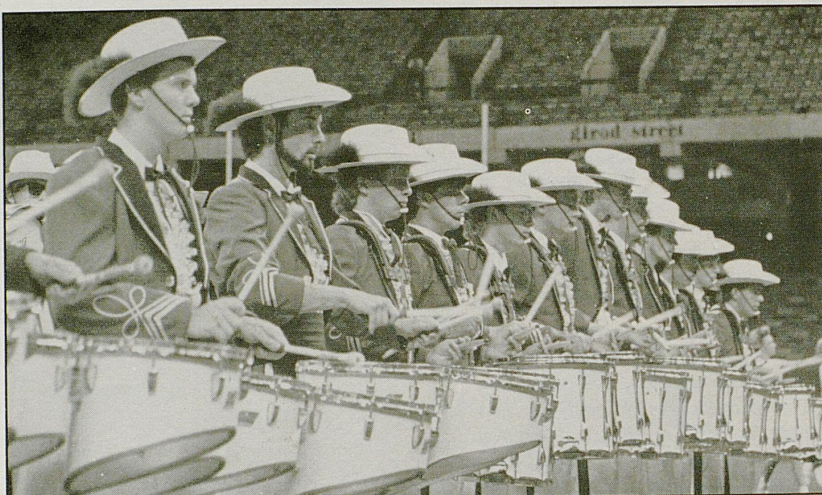
At halftime, the 1949 Wildcats will be honored with an on-field salute. The '49 UK squad, under the direction of Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant, finished with a 9-3 record overall and earned a berth in the Orange Bowl Jan. 1, 1950. The Orange Bowl berth was the first of three consecutive trips UK made to the Orange, Sugar and Cotton Bowls (1950-52).

Bill Leskovar led UK in 1949 with 722 yards rushing. Quarterback Babe Parilli darted on the scene to throw for 1,209 yards and nine touchdowns. Ends Al Bruno and Nick Odlivak led the Cats with 12 receptions. Jerry Claiborne, the current UK head coach, set an existing school record with nine interceptions.

The '49 squad toured the E.J. Nutter Football Training Facility on Friday. Last night, the team was treated to a reception and dance at the Lexington French Quarter Suites Hotel. Today the squad began with a brunch at the French Quarter Suites and then spent the traditional October afternoon in Lexington at the Keeneland Race Course.

The '49 Wildcats did tangle with LSU 40 years ago. Kentucky traveled to Baton Rouge Sept. 24 and came away with a 19-0 blanking of the Tigers.

As always, the UK Marching Band has another tremendous pregame and halftime show lined up for tonight's Commonwealth

Stadium crowd. During pregame, the traditional spelling of CATS as well as the playing of "My Old Kentucky Home" are featured.

The UK Marching Band, which includes 280 members, will perform a "Patriotic Show" at halftime. The halftime show includes musical numbers such as "Liberty Fanfare," "Stars and Stripes," "American Salute," "America the Beautiful" and will conclude with a "Patriotic Medley."

show contains over 130,000 different positions or "moving sets" which are also coordinated with approximately 180,000 musical notes simultaneously. The UK Band was one of the first in the country to use computers exclusively for drill writing. It is not too surprising that one of the best drill-writing software packages available today was written by a UK professor.

The UK Marching Band is directed by W. Dale Warren. His assistants are John Vallentine and David Henderson. The band has three drum majors — Chandra Holloway, Leo Labrillazo, and Jim Vowels.

Kentucky and LSU have met every year since 1952, but this is the first meeting in Lexington in three seasons. Kentucky visited Baton Rouge in both 1987 and 1988 as the Tigers claimed respective, 34-9 and 15-12, decisions.

The reason UK traveled to Baton Rouge on consecutive years was to break up a scheduling "glitch" for the Wildcats. Previous to 1988, Kentucky had either traveled to face LSU and Georgia, then Vanderbilt and Florida or hosted the four league teams in a five-week span beginning in mid-October. Either UK had four SEC games at home in that five-week period or four SEC games on the road, and both had occurred for 14 consecutive seasons.

UK took a step to help offset facing both LSU and Georgia on the road in consecutive weekends by playing in Baton Rouge in 1987 and 1988. This season, UK hosts LSU and travels to Georgia Oct. 28. Of course in 1990, the roles reverse as UK travels to Baton Rouge and Georgia heads to Lexington.

The Changing Face of UK Athletics

When UK President Dr. David Roselle decided to make a change in the athletics department, he looked to a familiar face.

C.M. Newton, a long-time basketball coach of impeccable reputation, got the call to be director this past summer. He saw the need to establish a new branch in the department to ensure the program's compliance of NCAA regulations, headed by an assistant athletics director.

"For that spot," Newton said, "I wanted someone who had coached, who was involved in recruiting, who understood it from a competitive standpoint. But also someone who possessed great integrity."

He needed to look no further than his own basketball staff. John Bostick, who earned 11 varsity letters while studying at Florence State, had been an assistant coach with Newton for 20 years.

The two all but laid the bricks and mixed the mortar to rebuild first the Alabama and then the Vanderbilt basketball programs. Newton and Bostick were known as much for their integrity as for their competitiveness and miracle working.

When Newton returned to his alma mater, Kentucky, as director of athletics, he knew the best person to monitor UK's compliance program.

"My feeling was if (Bostick) would take the job there wasn't anyone else I would ever consider," said Newton.

Bostick had reached an impass in his coaching career. "My goal had always been to be a head coach," Bostick said. "If I could not, I really didn't want to be an assistant coach for anyone else. So I think it was a good time for me to make a move and to make a career change."

What a change. Bostick is now in position to answer the questions that he might have had as an athlete, coach or booster. His compliance office monitors the eligibility of new and returning players, recruiting practices, financial aid distribution and education of staff, players and alumni.

Bostick's job is to keep these practices within the regulations of the NCAA. And

program and then go to Vanderbilt and try to restructure and recreate a basketball program, I don't know that you could have a bigger challenge," said Newton. "I think this is a different challenge because it's not just a sport, but a total program."

Bostick is giving Kentucky athletics a more modern look. "For the first time we're keeping more and more of our records in computers," he said. "We're able to monitor financial aid much better than in the past. Eventually, we'll have recruiting records in a computer also."

He has also set out to open up communication. A recruiting panel representing all sports meets once a month. Letters to boosters explain recruiting regulations and limits of contact. More communication with the financial aid office will help keep closer tabs on the players' benefits.

"One of the good things is (Bostick's) being creative, checking with other people," said Newton. "We're trying to put together a whole new concept in this area."

Newton hopes a new department structure will be more accessible to people's needs. "We created two positions of associate athletic directors," he said. "Larry Ivy deals with all affairs internal to our organization — accounting procedures, budgeting."

"Gene DeFilippo deals with external — public relations, fundraising. The thought was that we needed the type of structure that people know where to go when they need help."

At the base of the department's pyramid are three assistant athletics directors, each in charge of an area that needs special attention. Bostick is the assistant athletics director for compliance, Bob Bradley for student services and Kathy DeBoer for women's and non-revenue sports.

"The key, though, is not organization. The key is people," said Newton. "Just like in John's job, you can have all the job description you want, but you better have a person of integrity, experience, a person who really understands, in order to make that thing work. And that's what we've got."

Dr. David P. Roselle President

Dr. David P. Roselle became the ninth president of the University of Kentucky July 1, 1987.

Roselle came to UK from Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, where he served as provost for four years.

He has been one of the main participants in the university's efforts to attract adequate public funding of the university, and his leadership was recognized when he received a top national award from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

Roselle believes that the new technology in computation and communications is important not only to academia, but also to business, government and industry. Consistent with that belief, he helped design and implement a strategy at UK to provide wider access to the new technology. As a result, computing and communications have become an increasingly important part of the university, both in the academic programs and in service programs that support all the citizens of the Commonwealth.

Because of Roselle's efforts, UK is one of a small number of universities in the country to have a "supercomputer" operating for the benefit of faculty and students.

Dr. Roselle's announced goal is to make the University of Kentucky recognized nationally for the quality of its scholarship, research, and graduates.

A native of Pennsylvania, Dr. Roselle earned a Ph.D. in mathematics from Duke University. He was a mathematics professor and researcher at the University of Maryland and Louisiana State University before going to Virginia Tech, where he moved up through the administrative ranks.

He is a nationally-known mathematics scholar and editor of two books, and was on the editorial board of a third.

He and his wife, Louise, have two children — a son, Arthur, 18 and a daughter Cynthia, 17. The Roselles live at the traditional home of UK Presidents on the UK campus, Maxwell Place.

Dr. Robert Hemenway Lexington Campus

Dr. Robert Hemenway begins his first year as chancellor of the Lexington Campus in 1989.

Hemenway began teaching English at UK in 1966 and moved on to the University of Wyoming in 1969. He returned to Kentucky in 1973 as an associate professor of English and was later instated as a full professor.

From 1981 to 1986, Hemenway chaired UK's department of English before serving as Dean of Arts and Sciences at the University of Oklahoma. The widely published author was named chancellor this year.

Dr. Charles Wethington Community College System

Dr. Charles Wethington became chancellor of the Community College System in 1982. In 1988 his responsibilities were widened to include University Relations.

Wethington began his professional career at UK in 1965 as an instructor in educational psychology. He was acting director of UK's Lexington Technical Institute in 1966-67 and was named the first director of Mayville Community College in 1967.

He became assistant vice president of the Community College System in 1971 and was promoted to vice president in 1980, before he was named chancellor in 1982.

Dr. Peter Bosomworth A.B. Chandler Medical Center

Dr. Peter Bosomworth enters his 27th year with the University of Kentucky, having served as chancellor since 1982.

Bosomworth came to UK in 1962, just weeks before University Hospital opened. At age 32, he became the youngest chairman of a department of anesthesiology in the country. Bosomworth held that post until 1970, when he was named vice president of the UK Medical Center.

Under his leadership, the UK Medical Center has experienced a high patient occupancy rate and significant increases in outside research funding. In 1969, Bosomworth received the faculty scientific achievement award of the Kentucky Medical Association.



Director of Athletics C.M. Newton

Calling it "a new day for Kentucky athletics," University of Kentucky President Dr. David Roselle named Charles Martin (C.M.) Newton UK's seventh director of athletics, effective April 1, 1989.

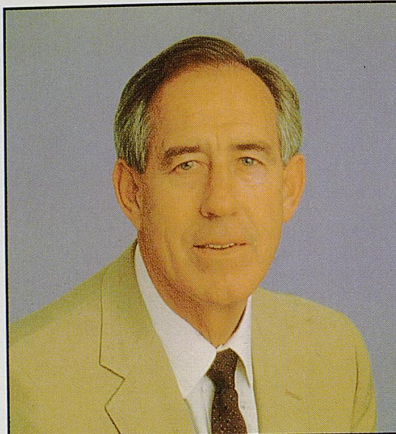
In addition to a lengthy, impressive list of credentials, Newton brings to Kentucky a reputation of integrity at a crucial time in the history of UK athletics. In accepting the position at his alma mater, Newton summarized his goals and objectives by saying, "I have a resolve to try very hard to continue that great tradition and, at the same time, to totally do it within the NCAA and Southeastern Conference rules and not sacrifice the academic integrity of this University."

Newton capped an illustrious basketball coaching career by leading his 1988-89 Vanderbilt University to a 19-14 record, a second-place SEC finish and its second consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. He was named SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and received the Kodak NABC District IV Coach of the Year award.

Newton served as head basketball coach and associate athletics director at Vanderbilt after 1982, compiling a 129-115 hoops record. In 32 years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama and Vanderbilt, Newton compiled a 509-375 record overall, ranking him among the top 10 active coaches in the game in terms of total victories at the close of the '88-89 season. Newton's Alabama teams won three consecutive Southeastern Conference championships and he won more games than any other coach in Crimson Tide history. He ranks second in career victories in Southeastern Conference games behind his mentor, Adolph Rupp.

Perhaps more impressive, however, was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team — over 50 percent more than any other league school. And including this spring's graduating class, all 21 of his seniors will have received their diplomas.

Newton is highly regarded at the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chairman for five years. Newton has also served as vice-president of ABAUSA,

the nation's governing body for international amateur basketball.

Newton has literally circled the globe to promote basketball. He served as team manager — a combination coaching and administrative position — on the gold medal 1984 U.S. Olympic team. Indiana coach Bob Knight, who picked Newton for the Olympic staff, called him "the finest gentleman in our business."

In 1983 and 1987, Newton took his Vanderbilt squads to the Republic of China (Taiwan) to represent the United States in the R. William Jones Cup International

Tournament, winning the gold medal in 1983 and the silver in 1987. He has conducted coaching clinics in many countries of the world.

After playing on the 1951 national champion Kentucky Wildcat squad and pitching in the New York Yankees' minor league system, Newton began coaching at then Transylvania College in Lexington. Recommended for the job by Rupp, Newton guided Transy to a 169-137 record in 12 years at the helm despite a limited scholarship program.

In 1969, once again with the backing of Rupp, Newton answered a call from Paul "Bear" Bryant to take on the challenge of building the downtrodden Alabama basketball program. During his 12-year tenure, Newton orchestrated a turnaround in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortunes, compiling a 211-123 record.

In addition to the three SEC championships, Newton guided the Tide to two trips to the NCAA Tournament and four berths in the NIT. "C.M. Newton is a winner, and that's important," remarked a satisfied Bryant, "but more than anything else he wins or loses with class, and that's more important."

With few horizons left to conquer at Alabama, Newton resigned at the end of the 1980 season to accept a job as assistant commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. A year later, he took over the Vanderbilt basketball program.

JERRY EISAMAN Offensive Coordinator

Jerry Eisaman enters his eighth season at Kentucky and 24th year as a collegiate assistant coach.

Eisaman, 52, came to Kentucky in 1982 when head coach Jerry Claiborne took over. Returning to UK, his alma mater, Eisaman was Claiborne's quarterback coach at Maryland for 10 years.

As the Wildcats' offensive coordinator, Eisaman is responsible for coaching the Kentucky quarterbacks. In addition, he calls the plays from the pressbox on game-day.

A native of Bethel Park, Pa., Eisaman is a 1961 graduate of the University of Kentucky. He lettered three years (1958-60) under coach Blanton Collier as a quarterback. During his career, he completed 94 of 191 passes for 1,308 yards and 13 touchdowns.

He was a Kentucky co-captain during the 1960 season and played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game. Eisaman was awarded the Sam Huey Award, an honor which went to the UK football player who maintained the highest academic average for four years.

TERRY STROCK Defensive Coordinator

Terry Strock begins his eighth season at the University of Kentucky and his 23rd year as a collegiate coach.

As defensive coordinator for the Wildcats, Strock coaches the Kentucky linebackers and calls the alignments from the pressbox on gameday.

A native of Hagerstown, Md., he earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Virginia Tech in 1962. He lettered three years in football and four years in baseball for the Hokies. During his senior grid season, he was chosen as a permanent game captain and was an All-Big 5 (Virginia) selection as well. A recipient of the Williams Award, he played under Claiborne at VPI his senior year.

Strock began his coaching career as an assistant at Colonial Heights (Va.) High School in 1963. In 1964, he became head football coach at Culpepper (Va.) High School. Prior to the 1966 season, he returned to Virginia Tech to serve as an assistant under Claiborne.

CHIP GARBER Defensive Backs

Chip Garber moves into his eighth season as a University of Kentucky assistant football coach. Overall, he is in his 10th year as a collegiate assistant.

Garber, 34, arrived at Kentucky in 1982 with current Wildcat coach Jerry Claiborne. He had previously worked at Southern Methodist University for two seasons.

The defensive backs coach, Garber earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Maryland in 1978. While at Maryland, he lettered three years as a defensive end and one year as a Terrapin pole vaulter in track. As a freshman, he placed third in the pole vault during the Atlantic Coast Conference Track and Field Championships.

BILL GLASER Defensive Guards

Bill Glaser begins his 13th year as an assistant coach at the University of Kentucky. Overall, he has been a collegiate assistant coach for 14 seasons.

Glaser, 46, arrived at Kentucky in 1977 from Morehead State University. He was the only full-time assistant retained by Claiborne from the Fran Curci staff in 1982.

Coaching the Wildcat defensive guards this year, the Louisville native graduated in 1965 from Bellarmine College where he lettered in baseball.

Glaser began his coaching career at his alma mater, St. Xavier High School in 1965 as an assistant football and assistant baseball coach. In 1970, he was named head baseball coach and led St. Xavier to an overall record of 112-48. Four years later, Glaser was named head football coach and paced his teams to consecutive state high school championships and a two-year record of 25-0.

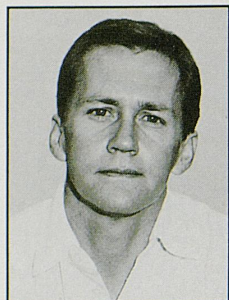
JAKE HALLUM Offensive Line

Entering his eighth season at Kentucky, Jake Hallum is a 22-year veteran on the collegiate level.

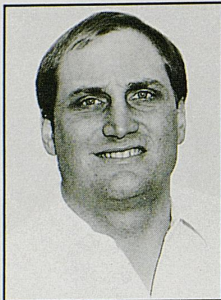
Hallum, 50, came to Kentucky in 1982 with coach Jerry Claiborne from the University of Maryland staff where he served as offensive line coach.

His responsibility in 1988 is coaching Wildcat offensive guards.

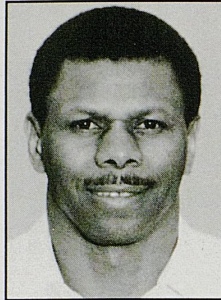

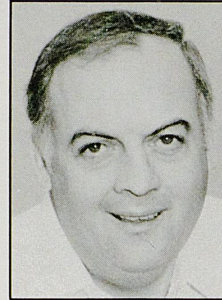

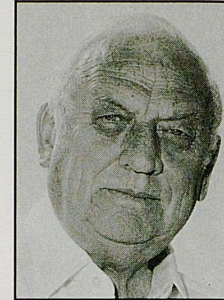

DAVID LIKINS Outside Linebackers

Dave Likins begins his eighth season as an assistant coach at the University of Kentucky. Overall, it is the ninth season Likins has been associated with the UK in a coaching capacity.

Likins, 33, was elevated to full-time assistant coach when head coach Jerry Claiborne arrived at Kentucky in 1982. Likins had spent one season as a part-time coach under Fran Curci during the 1981 campaign.

This year, his main responsibility is coaching Wildcat outside linebackers.

GREG NORD Running Backs

Greg Nord begins his eighth season as a Kentucky assistant coach. Overall, this is the 11th year Nord has been working with the Wildcat football program.

Nord, 33, was elevated to a full-time position when Jerry Claiborne became UK head coach in 1982. Previously, Nord had served as a graduate assistant and part-time coach under Fran Curci since 1979.

This season, he will handle Wildcat running backs.

A native of Louisville, Nord is a 1980 graduate of the University of Kentucky. He lettered three years with the Wildcats (1975, 1977-78) as a center-tight end. During his career, he caught four passes for 80 yards and two touchdowns. His first collegiate reception was a 43-yard touchdown catch versus Mississippi State in 1977.

ROD SHARPLESS Defensive Tackles

Rod Sharpless begins his eighth season as an assistant coach at the University of Kentucky and is in his 13th year as a collegiate assistant.

His main responsibility in 1988 is coaching the Wildcat defensive tackles.

Sharpless, a native of Jacksonville, N.C., earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Maryland in health and physical education in 1975. At Maryland, he lettered two years as a defensive end. He also owns a master's degree from Bowie State (Md.) College.

He began his coaching career at Wilkesboro (N.J.) High School as an assistant football coach and head track coach. He led one of his track squads to a state runner-up spot while his team claimed regional and sectional titles.

FARRELL SHERIDAN Offensive Tackles

Entering his eighth season as assistant coach at the University of Kentucky, Farrell

Sheridan enters his 11th year as a collegiate coach.

Sheridan, 39, arrived at Kentucky in 1982 when head coach Jerry Claiborne took over. Previously, Sheridan had worked three seasons at Maryland before joining the Wildcat staff.

His responsibilities in 1989 include coaching the offensive tackles and place-kickers and coordinating the film exchange with UK opponents.

Sheridan, a native of Rutherford, N.J., earned his bachelor's degree in history from the University of Minnesota in 1973. He lettered two seasons as a Golden Gopher defensive back.

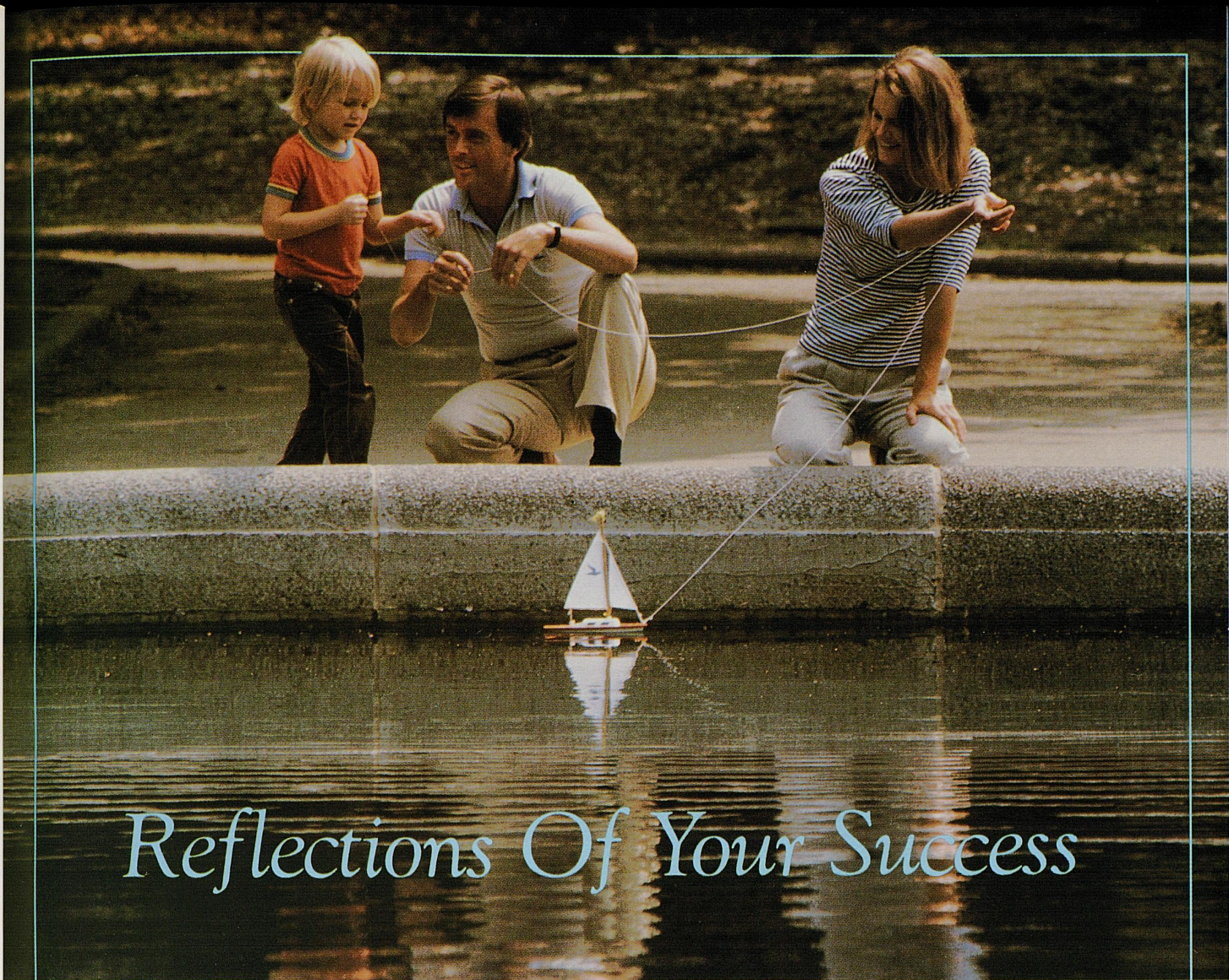
DICK REDDING Administrative Assistant

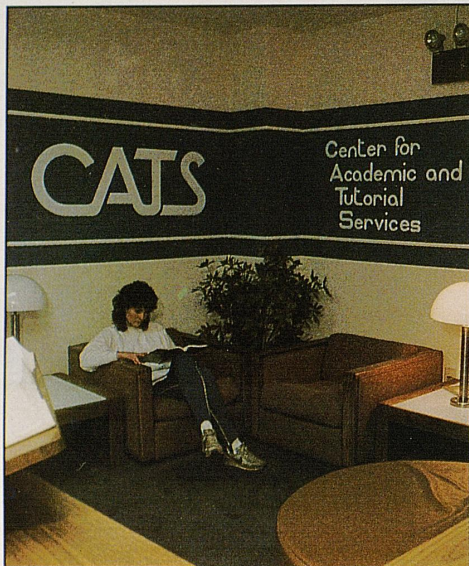


CATS Center

The University of Kentucky keeps the term "student-athlete" in the proper perspective — student first, athlete second.

For that reason, the University of Kentucky Athletics Association opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is simply known as CATS — Center for Academic & Tutorial Services.

The CATS Center is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a

large general study area, along with several smaller rooms used for tutoring, computer assistance and small group sessions.

Plans are on the drawing board for expansion of the CATS Center. The expansion would add a language laboratory, additional tutoring rooms, a more comprehensive computer facility and a media center.

The UKAA appropriates nearly \$500,000 per year for the CATS Center.

"There's no question, the CATS Center is a very important part of not only our football program, but our entire athletics program here at Kentucky," said head UK football coach Jerry Claiborne. "Academics comes first in our program."

The combination of the CATS Center and Claiborne has produced some impressive

results. Since 1982, Kentucky has placed 51 players on the Southeastern Conference Football Academic Honor Roll, the highest number among league schools. Graduation rate among scholarship football players is 90.2 percent.

The UK Football program was awarded the 1989 College Football Association Academic Achievement Award for the nation's highest graduation rate for its 1983 freshman class.

"The award certainly lets everyone know we are serious in making sure our players receive their degree," Claiborne said. "A lot of the credit in winning the award, though, goes to our CATS Center staff. They do an excellent job in monitoring our student-athletes' academic progress from day one."

Bob Bradley, assistant athletic director for academics, supervises the CATS Center. Barbara Deniston, director of student development, and Mike Jenkins, academic counselor, assist Bradley. The CATS Center also employs four graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the university and the surrounding community.

Not only has the football program flourished, but so has the entire UK Athletics program. During the 1988-89 academic year, Kentucky again placed more athletes on the Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll than any other league school.

"The CATS Center is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete over another without an academic center," Bradley said. "This is a medium which the student-athlete can get any question about his or her academic endeavors answered."

Having a head coach who places such an emphasis on academics is also an advantage, according to Bradley. "Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job at helping their student-athletes," he said. "I am blessed at Kentucky in having Jerry Claiborne. He really believes in the student-athlete concept. We are totally in sync."

The University of Kentucky believes it is obligated to give the student-athlete every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well. Judging by recent statistics in academic honor roll selections

and graduation rates, Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

The CATS Center plays an instrumental part in keeping academics and athletics in near perfect harmony.

CATS Center Programs

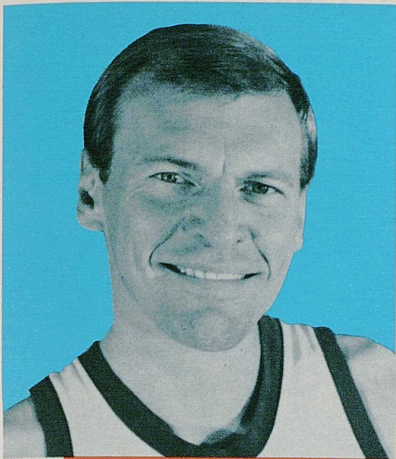
1. **ADVISING** — Confusion about courses, campus or academic procedures is common to most freshman. In addition to the study center, the CATS facility also contains the offices of its entire staff — the assistant athletic director for academics, the director of student development, the academic counselor and four graduate assistants. These trained staff members are at CATS for one purpose — to assist the student-athlete in being successful outside the field of play.

2. **STUDY SKILLS** — The CATS Center staff conducts organized study skills classes each week to complement in-house publications given to each incoming freshman. The CATS Center publications — a Freshman Orientation Handbook and a Study Skills Workbook — help the student-athlete learn and use proven classroom study skills and university resources.

3. **STUDY HALL** — Research has shown the best time to study is immediately after class. The CATS Center provides study hall areas anytime during hours of operation. The center offers flexible hours and is designed primarily for afternoon study, an advantage over the evening study halls at many schools.

4. **TUTORING** — The CATS Center staff includes tutors from the university and community available to help in any subject. The center thoroughly screens its tutors to find which ones are most effective with student-athletes. CATS provides students the proper atmosphere for working with tutors. Sound-proof rooms are available for the student-athlete and tutor to meet and discuss concepts without either being disturbed or disturbing others.

5. **READING PROGRAM** — Each freshman student-athlete is given a reading test which measures his/her strengths and weaknesses. The CATS Center staff evaluates the results and determines which student-athletes may be encouraged to participate in the reading program. The CATS reading program provides individual and small-group tutoring in a variety of areas such as reading improvement and advanced vocabulary development.

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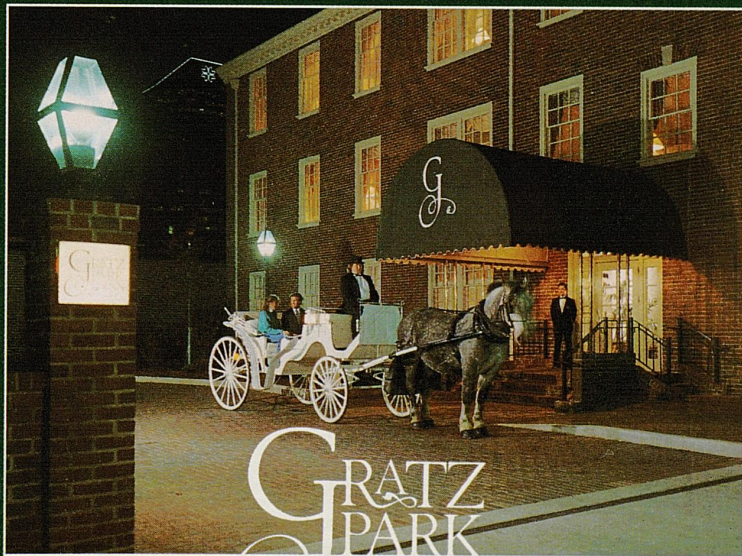
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The 1989 LSU Tigers

Third-year Head Coach Mike Archer had to cope not only with the loss of seven starters from last year's defense that ranked number three in the SEC and 13th in the nation against the rush, but also with a treacherous opening schedule.

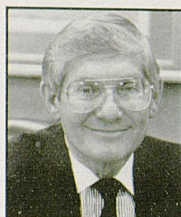
LSU opened with losses at Texas A&M and against Florida State, two teams few schools would love to play on their non-conference schedule, let alone back-to-back. The schedule eased with a visit from Ohio, but the heat increased with a visit from Florida and a trip to Auburn.

But quarterback Tommy Hodson (6-3, 201) has remained cool under his opponents' fire. The senior Heisman Trophy candidate has completed over 55 percent of his passes, averaging more than 200 yards passing a game in the Tigers' multiple-sets offense.

A two-pronged tailback attack spearheads the LSU rushing game. Senior Eddie Fuller (5-10, 199) has emerged as the squad's top rusher, getting ample support from junior Calvin Windom (5-11, 202). Fuller also rates as one of the clubs' top receivers, hauling in over two catches each game. Senior fullback Jay Egloff (6-0, 221) brings blocking prowess to the backfield.



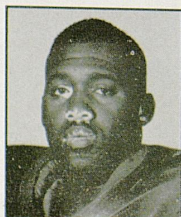

A solid line buoys the Tiger offense. Guards Ruffin Rodrigue (6-1, 262) and Jim Hubicz (6-5, 268), and tackle Robert Packnett (6-5, 278), all seniors, provide experience and shored up the development of sophomore tackle Roger Hutchinson (6-7, 296). Junior Blake Miller (6-2, 267) centers the line.

The LSU wideouts form an electrifying combination. Senior flanker Tony Moss (5-8, 172), the top returning receiver in the SEC, paces Tiger pass catchers with more than six grabs per game. Senior split end Alvin Lee (5-10, 188) also rates as a receiving threat. Senior Ronnie Haliburton (6-5, 227) provides speed and agility at tight end.

The strength of the Bayou Bengals' defense starts at the line of scrimmage. The Tigers return a good nucleus on the front line in senior defensive ends Karl Dunbar (6-4, 274) and Clint James (6-6, 269). Dunbar, a big-play All-America candidate, ranks among the team's tackle and sack leaders. Sophomore Marc Boutte (6-4, 260) has made a successful transition from defensive end to nose guard in LSU's 3-4 alignment.

Senior Verge Ausberry (6-0, 229) is the lone veteran in the linebacking corps. The inside backer rests among the team leaders in stops. Redshirt-freshman David Walkup joins Ausberry in the middle.

Outside linebackers Oliver Lawrence (6-2, 242) and Nigel Ventrees (6-1, 223)

were forced to replace departed all-stars Eric Hill and Ron Sancho. Ventress, a red-shirt freshman, has excelled, ranking as one of the club's top hitmen. Lawrence, a senior, has provided steady play.

Senior cornerback Jimmy Young (5-10, 180) is the lone returning starter in the secondary and one of the team's top ball hawks. Sophomore Wayne Williams (5-8, 173) plays opposite Young after switching to cornerback from flanker last year.

Sophomore strong safety Corey Raymond (5-11, 185), one of the unit's top tacklers, saw plenty of action as a backup last year. Junior Tommy Fabacher (5-7, 180) patrols the weak safety slot.

The kicking duties rest with the capable feet of senior David Browndyke (6-2, 185), LSU's all-time kick-scoring leader. Senior punter Rene' Bourgeois (6-1, 172), a former walk-on, also ranks among the SEC's best, averaging over 40 yards a boot.

The tough early-season schedule proved to be a thorn in the Tiger's paw, but now the Bayou Bengals are prepared to be a thorn in opponents' sides.

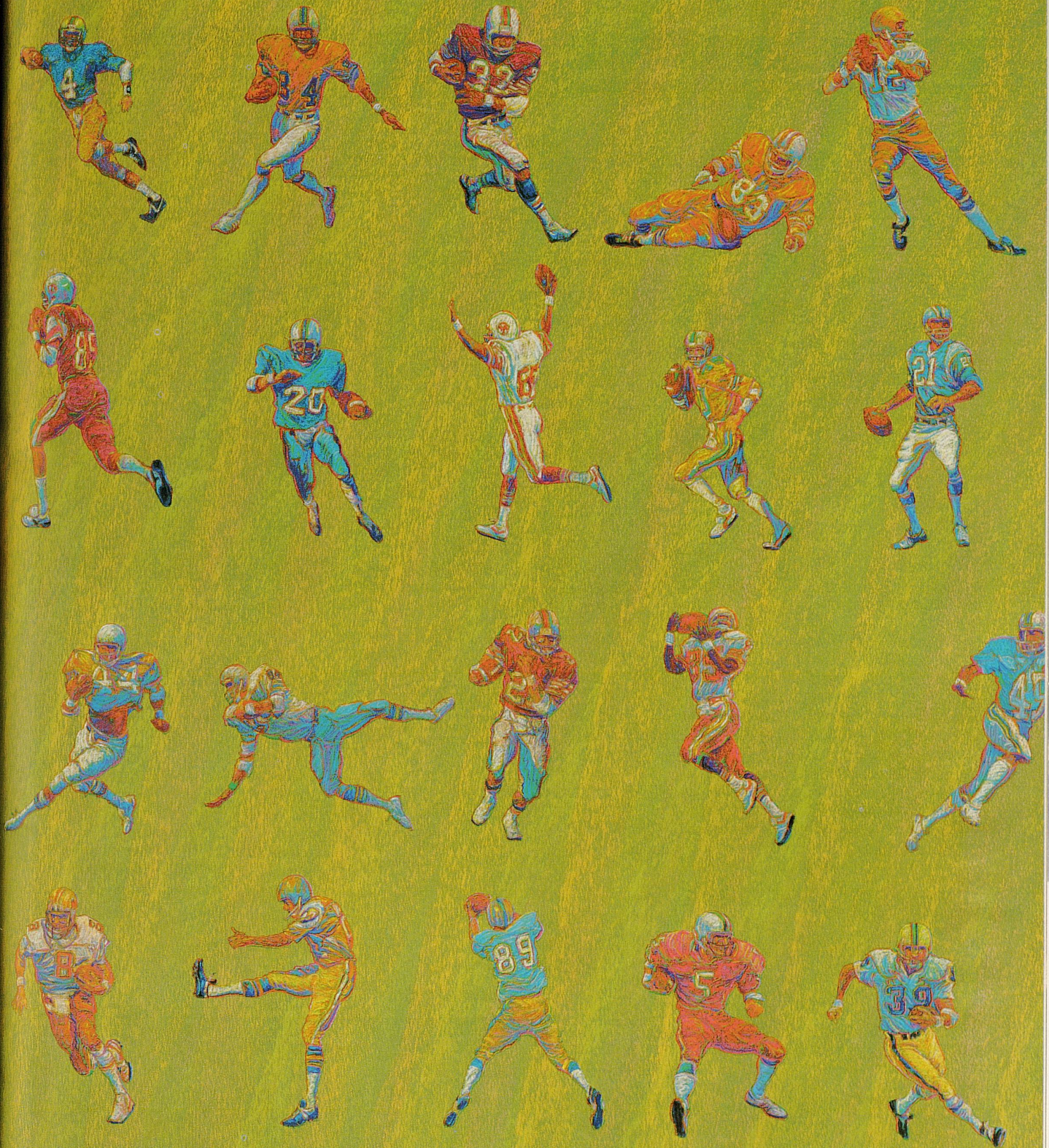

Schiller Resigns SEC Post

The former SEC chief resigned to pursue "a special challenge, an opportunity to make a significant contribution" to the USOC.

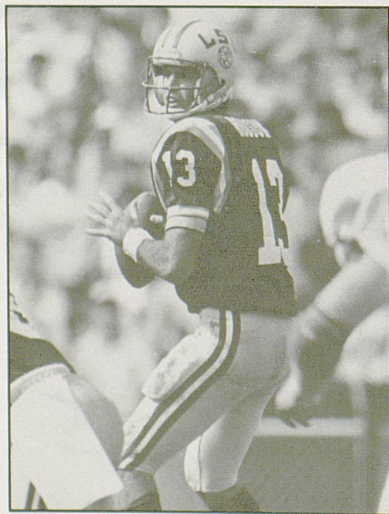
He served as USOC director for three weeks in January 1988 but returned to the SEC after personal problems.

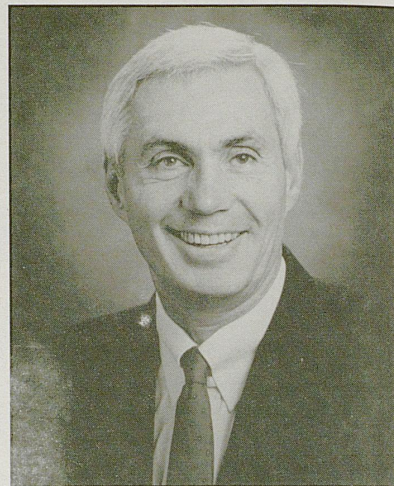
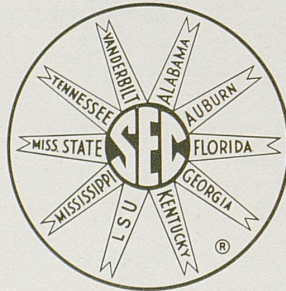
Wins this year have come against some mighty foes. UCLA was ranked sixth and Auburn was fourth before Tennessee did its spoiling.

Willis' four field goals also tied the UK record held by Joe Worley. Kentucky's kicker rebounded off a nightmarish game against Auburn, when he missed two field-goal attempts and had an extra point blocked.

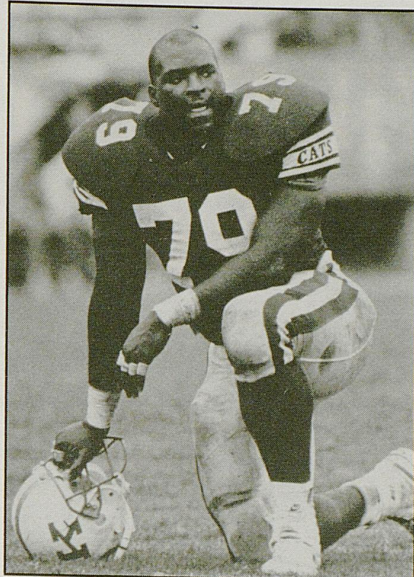
the record for most pounds lifted by a UK griddier after hoisting a total of 1,655 pounds in three different lifts this past winter at UK's Pro Day.

He bench-pressed 420 pounds (seventh-best on the team), squatted 850 pounds (first) and cleaned 385 pounds (first). His 850-pound squat performance shattered Dermontti Dawson's record by 100 pounds.

"It (weight-lifting) makes you more confident in your abilities," he said. "When I line up against the guy in front of me, I want to beat the lineman and then go after the ball. I want to dominate the guy. Anytime you're on the line of scrimmage, you do whatever it takes to beat him."

Barnett, by his own admission, is better at defending the run than the pass. And it is no surprise that he prefers this aspect of the defense.

"I like to play (the run) better," he said. "It's more physical and I like to go head-to-

head against the tackle. I'm better against the run because of my leg strength and speed." He has a best time of 4.81 in the 40-yard dash.

And now that the dash is on to finish his UK career in style, Barnett's reflections on his career indicate a sense of accomplishment mixed with a missing ingredient.

"I've had no regrets being here at Kentucky," he said. "I've had a chance to play against some of the best teams in the country."

"The high point of my career was being named to the different all-star teams." He was selected to the *College and Pro Football Newsweekly* and *Lindy's* preseason All-America teams this summer and was tabbed for Associated Press honorable mention All-America honors after the 1988 season.

"The low point has been not going to any bowl games with the teams we've had here during my career," admitted Barnett.

Sounds like a chance for another change.

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A "Bear" Of A Team

The 1949 Wildcats are in town for their 40th reunion

When the fall of 1949 rolled around, a preview of the football season warranted little optimism in the Bluegrass. The Kentucky Wildcats had posted a solid, but unspectacular, 5-3-2 mark the previous season.

The '49 edition was young and less-than-imposing in stature. The UK media guide admitted "the squad will be generally small in regard to weight and height."

Kentucky's goliath, Bob Gain, weighed 235 pounds, small by comparison to today's massive wrecking machines.

But the 1949 squad, like all Wildcat teams of this era, had one wild card at its disposal — Paul "Bear" Bryant. Bryant coached the Cats with the stern voice of a demanding father. The Bear expected the most and his Wildcats delivered.

"Kentucky will field an improved, 'spectacular' gridiron aggregation for the 1949 season," Bryant promised before the season. "We may not win a lot of games, but we'll look good even in those we lose."

Bryant was proven both wrong and right. His charges *did* win a lot of games, eight of 10 in the regular season to be exact plus a trip to the Orange Bowl, Kentucky's first major bowl invitation.

And they *did* look — and sound — like a football team should. A coach named Bear and a quarterback named Babe. A roster replete with Ignarskis, Leskovars, McClendons, Ulinskis, Fuccis Wannamakers, Yowarskys and Zarankas — names that gave fits to the men across the line of scrimmage and the men up in the press box.

Thirty-three of 39 surviving members of the '49 team are in Lexington today for its 40th anniversary.

"It's always enjoyable to see the old-timers and see how they look," said former tackle Gain, one of three Kentucky repre-

sentatives in the College Football Hall of Fame. "I haven't seen some of them for 30 or 40 years."

Gain's former teammates hold a special spot in Kentucky gridiron annals. The 1949 squad launched an upsurge in Big Blue football, a period that included three consecutive major bowl appearances and a three-year 28-8-0 record.

The team was stacked with young talent. Kentucky gridders appeared on every all-

304-point performance. Only the 1950 team scored more.

Parilli was quick, strong and devious. One of the day's newspapermen credited the Kentucky signalcaller with the ability to "take an elephant out on the field and, told that it was a football, hide it."

During his career, Parilli was chosen consensus all-American and all-SEC, and twice figured in the top five in Heisman Trophy voting.

"It was a big deal with Babe coming through at such a young age," said defenseman Gain. "All the pieces came together."

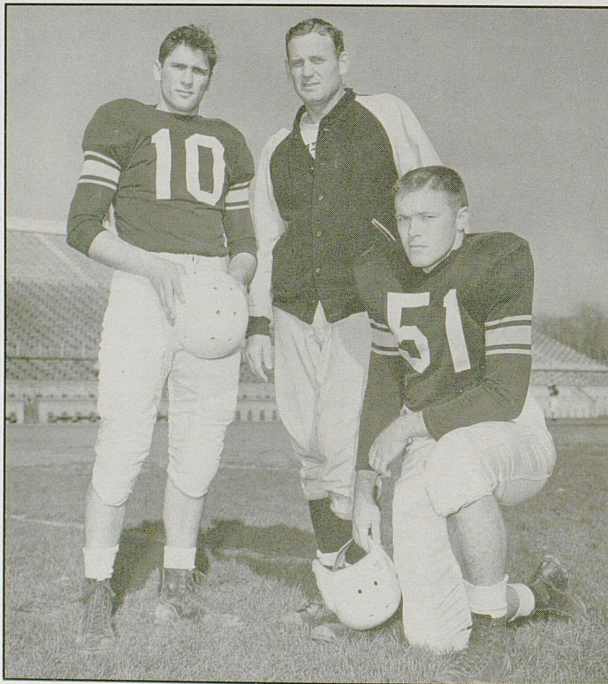
Perhaps the biggest piece was the defense. The Wildcats were the stingiest in the land, allowing just 71.6 yards rushing and 153.8 yards of total offense a game. They turned foes away empty-handed on five occasions. "We felt like we could stop anybody," said Doug Moseley, a center and line-backer on the squad.

After surrendering a touchdown to Mississippi Southern in UK's 71-7 shellacking, Kentucky plowed through LSU, Mississippi, Georgia and The Citadel, outscoring its unlucky opponents 135-0. A loss at SMU stunned the Cats, who rebounded for victories over Cincinnati, Xavier (Ohio) and Florida.

Then came perennial nemesis Tennessee, which gave the Wildcats a taste of the dirt they had been kicking in foes' faces. The Vols blanketed Kentucky, 6-0. A clutch win over the Hurricanes of Miami ensured the Wildcats' invitation to the Orange Bowl.

"It was a good season," remembers Gain, speaking as if Jan. 1, 1950, was just yesterday. "It was quite thrilling to be in a bowl game. At the time the Orange, Cotton and Rose Bowls were the three biggest bowls."

But the Orange Bowl proved hot and disappointing. After leading in the first half, an exhausted Wildcat corps lost to Santa

star list. Four Wildcats were third-team all-SEC performers, three were second-team all-conference stars and four were first-teamers. Gain, Babe Parilli and center Doug Moseley became first-team all-Americans during their collegiate careers.

But according to the trademark of Bryant-coached squads, Kentucky was very much a team.

Kentucky scored nearly at will throughout the 11-game season. Parilli hinted at his future greatness by guiding the Cats to a

Clara, 21-13.

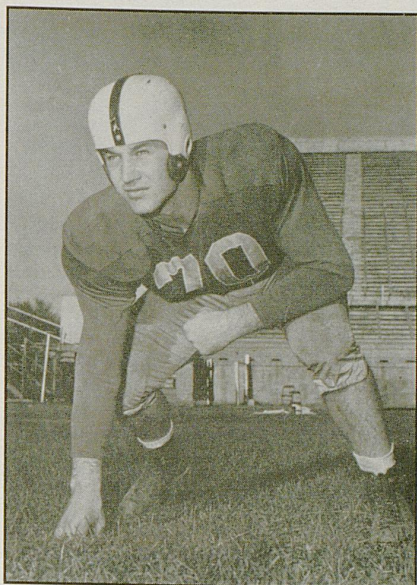
"Getting beat by Tennessee didn't help any," says Moseley. "But the worst feeling was losing to Santa Clara in the Orange Bowl because we felt like we were much better than Santa Clara. We were maybe a little overtrained."

To say the least. Bryant took his team into the relative fire of south Florida, and worked it into the sandy ground. The fatigued Cats simply died in the second half.

"Bear sort of took too much out of us,"

says Gain. "It wasn't because we were out of shape. We were overworked. I finished the season at 235 pounds, but after the game I weighed 211. I never weighed that low."

Surviving the tribulations of an 11-game season under the Bear had some positive effects. "We were a close-knit group. We stuck up for each other," says Gain. "It was a good bunch of guys."

Everyone went his own way after playing at Kentucky. Dom Fucci, Lloyd McDermott, Don Phelps, Walt Yowarski, team captain Harry Ulinski, Gain and Parilli went on to professional football careers.

Now with collegiate football some 40 years behind them, the vintage Kentucky gridders will watch their teammate, a defensive back named Claiborne, lead today's Wildcats against the LSU Tigers.

"We're all pulling for him," says Moseley, who spent 20 years being an impartial official in the SEC.

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The K-Men's Association

The K-Men's Association has been helping the University of Kentucky athletics department for a quarter-century with moral and financial support.

Originally started to keep former athletes involved with the University, the Association's goals are to: promote and develop fellowship among UK varsity lettermen; aid and assist UK in its athletics programs in ways that are consistent with SEC and NCAA regulations; equip, furnish and maintain the K-Men's House on the UK campus; award scholarships to deserving UK athletes; and feature an annual "K-Day" at a varsity event.

The idea for organizing a K-Men's Association originated in a May 1961 conversation between Frank Seale and Robert Montgomery, two teammates on the UK football team in the early 1930's. Their main idea was to establish an organization that would promote fellowship among UK varsity lettermen, while still helping UK athletics.

UK athletics director Bernie A. Shively welcomed the idea and organizational plans were discussed by a small group of UK lettermen in June 1961. Shively sent a letter to all K-Men announcing that the Kentucky-Florida football game on Nov. 4, 1961, had been designated the first "K-Day".

From those early beginnings, the association grew steadily, now boasting more than 600 dues-paying members. The constitution was drafted so that lettermen from all varsity sports could become members.

From its early days, the K-Men's Association established traditions including the K-Man of the Year award, K-Day at varsity events, and K-Day at Paintsville. The latter is a two-day golf outing at the Paintsville Country Club that was originally conceived by Dr. Paul B. Hall, a Wildcat baseball letterman in the 1920's.

However, the K-Men not only supply moral support for UK, but they also make financial contributions, including athletic scholarships. The scholarships are financed by private donations from K-members.

The K-Men's Association also acknowledges outstanding academic achievements by athletes. The K-Men sponsor awards for academic excellence in a number of UK sports. In football, tackle Bo Smith was awarded the 1988 K-Men Senior Scholastic Award for maintaining the highest GPA during his final year.


The pride of the association is the K-House, located on a plot near Commonwealth Stadium. Land was obtained from the University and a concerted drive raised over \$100,000 from K-members and friends. Ground was broken on Nov. 12, 1976 and the house was in use the following autumn.

Ground was broken in May 1988 for the remodeling of the K-House. The K-House will be expanded to almost double its current size.

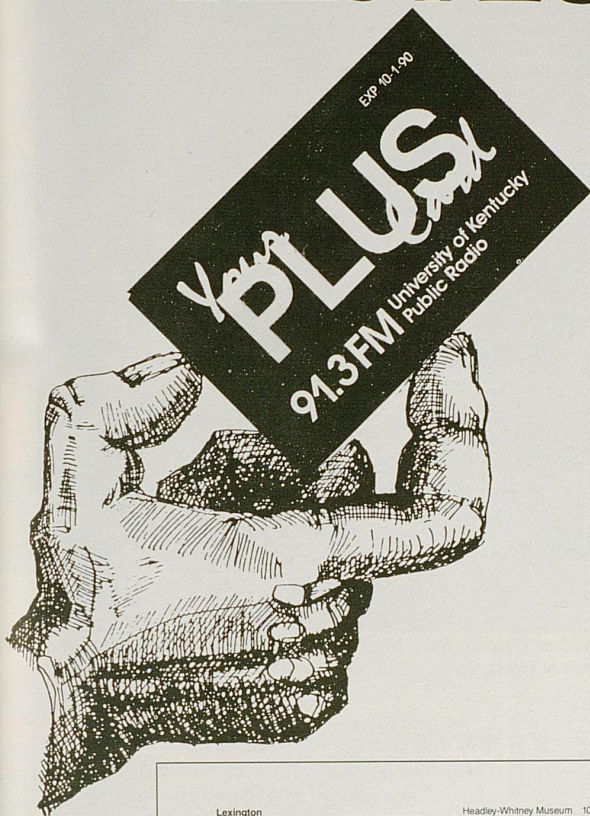

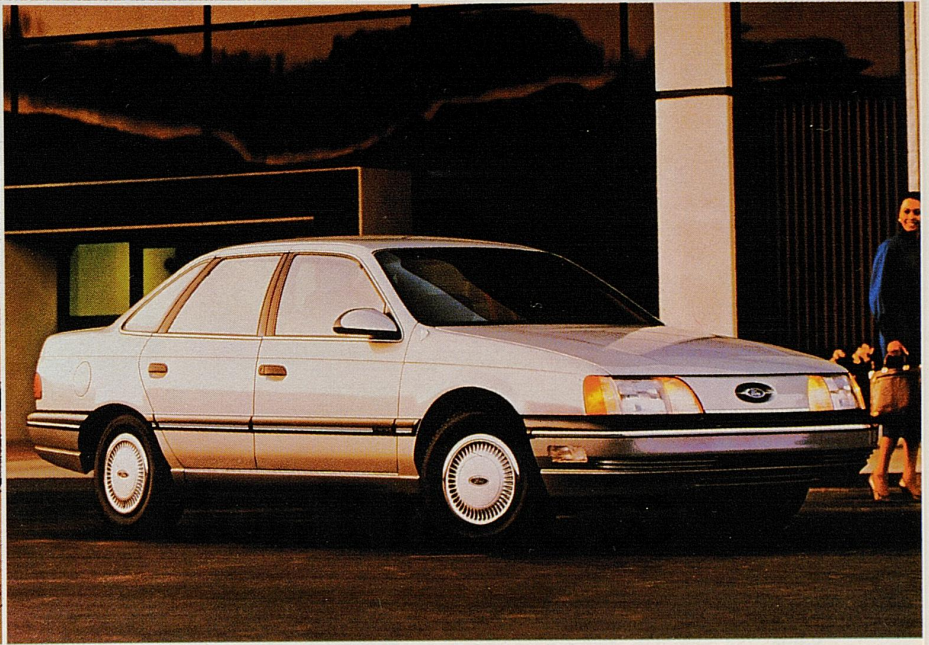

Under the direction of Harry Clarke, the UK Marching Band was one of the first in the nation to use computers exclusively for drill writing. An average halftime show will contain around 130,000 different positions or moving sets for all members of the band, coordinated simultaneously with approximately 180,000 notes.

The UK Marching Band numbers 280, with members representing 17 different states. The band includes 24 flags, 30 percussionists, 12 majorettes and two feature twirlers.

(1882), Gillis was the original UK Agriculture Experiment Station.

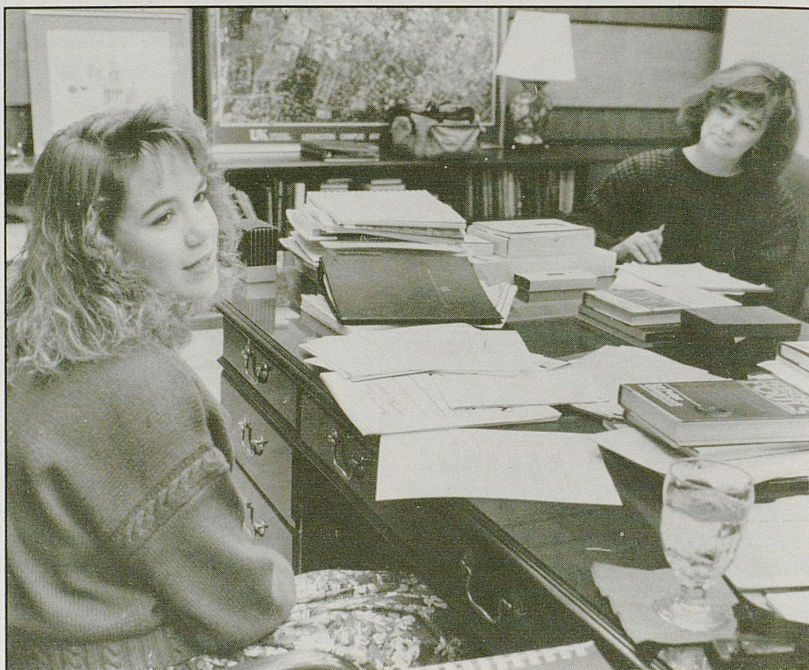
Witt says he has the nicest office in town. His is the window-covered room in Gillis that was used as a photography studio, according to early documents.

The "Alumni as Artists" centennial exhibit opened on the eve of Founder's Day and ran through March 13, giving talented alumni the opportunity to again show off their works.

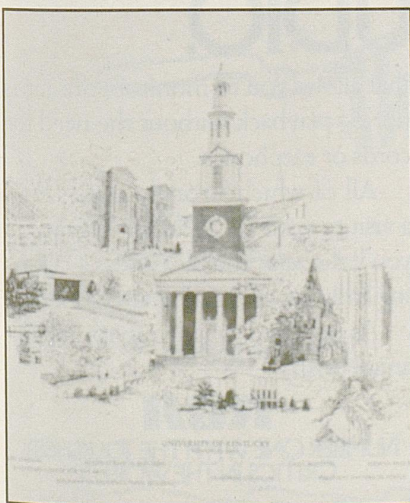
The first "Alumni as Artists" exhibits were started in 1968 to give graduates and former students some recognition for their talents.

To compete in the Southeastern Conference, a team must have three things — strength, speed and size.

The 1989 Kentucky roster reveals ample amounts of all three.

In two years, Kentucky has made good use of its new E.J. Nutter Training Center. The constant cycle of workouts in the center appears to be paying dividends already.

The statistics prove it. Last March, when the Wildcats conducted Pro Day, team strength and speed averages were at an all-time high. In total lifts (bench press, clean and squat), the Wildcats' average jumped 78.9 pounds. That beats any improvement in previous years; it's never been more than 10 pounds.

This year's 'Cats are far quicker than their predecessors, shaving off better than a second in the 40-yard dash to average 4.83.

UK head coach Jerry Claiborne gives credit to strength coach Mike Florence and the Nutter Center for his team's improvements.

"A player can get as strong as he wants here," says Claiborne. "We have the most modern equipment available in our weight room for our athletes. Coach Florence and his staff do an excellent job. They have an excellent rapport with our players. We have an ideal situation if a youngster wants to improve his strength, size and speed through hard work." It has been easy for the players to take their coach's words to heart,

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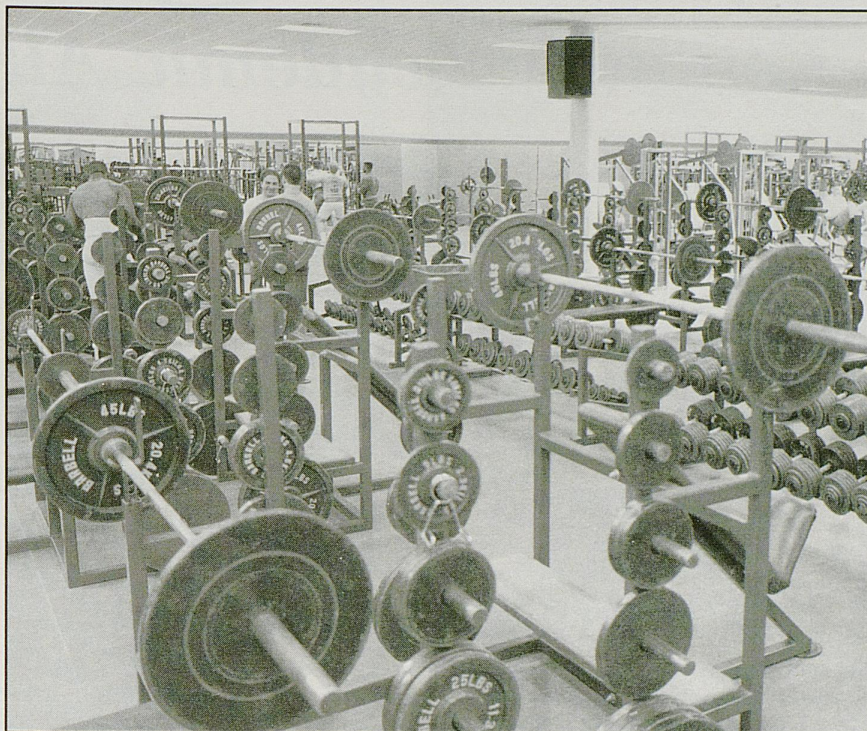
considering the facility. The Nutter Center has 100,000 pounds of equipment housed in 9,000 square feet of weight room. Throw in Nautilus machines, stationary bikes and jogging treadmills and this weight room is as good as any in the country.

"Our weight room facility gives our players a feeling of pride, a feeling of success," Claiborne says. "You can actually see the accomplishments in this room."

At the 1989 Pro Day, the Wildcats averaged 557.25 pounds in the squat, 291.85 pounds in the clean and 323.60 pounds in the bench press. The year before, the 'Cats could only squat 496 pounds, clean 284 pounds and bench press 312 pounds. The total improvement in only one year is more than 78 pounds.

Defensive tackle Oliver Barnett was this year's standout in the strength tests. The Louisville senior shattered the school record for squats by 100 pounds. His 850 pound lift bettered the old school mark set by all-SEC guard Dermontti Dawson.

Barnett also set a new record for total weight lifted, this time by a mere 85 pounds. His 1,655 pounds beat Dawson's mark of 1,570.

The success of the Wildcat's strength program may have a lot to do with the positive atmosphere the new facility creates. The Nutter Center makes the long hours of lifting a little more pleasant and the player may work just a little harder, according to the coach.

"It's still up to the athletes, though," says Claiborne. "Our players have responded well since our move from the Shively Center to here. It's all been very positive. But the old saying, 'You can lead a horse to water,' still applies."

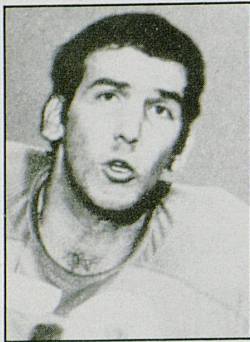

1989-90 Kentucky Basketball

Despite suffering through the first losing season since 1927 and looking into a dark crystal ball, University of Kentucky basketball fans have found cause for optimism.

Why are they so sure that happy days are on the way for their beloved program? The answer is simple — two words. Rick Pitino.

Pitino has made a career of overcoming challenges similar to the ones facing him at Kentucky. When he went to Boston University in 1978, the school had won only 17 games the previous two years. Know what he did? He won.

When Pitino went to Providence College in 1985, he inherited a team that had gone 11-20 the year before. What did he do? He won.

And while Pitino was coaching Providence to the NCAA's Final Four, the New York Knickerbockers were stumbling to a 71-175 two-year mark. Pitino took over as coach of the Knicks in 1987, and guess what he did. That's right, he won.

Ironically, as Pitino takes over the program that has won more basketball games than any other, winning is not just enough anymore. Pitino's charge is still to win, but to win with class, with integrity, with dignity, with a model program, with the student-athlete coming first.

Pitino's reputation in these key areas is what led Athletics Director C.M. Newton to bring Pitino to Lexington in the first place. Now, as he attempts to leave Kentucky's problems in the past, he must rebuild using the nucleus of a team hit hard by last year's controversy.

Pitino's bench will be missing last year's leading scorer, LeRon Ellis (16.0 ppg), who transferred to Syracuse this past summer. Chris Mills, UK's leading rebounder (8.7 rpg) and second leading scorer (14.3 ppg), transferred to Arizona. Point guard Sean Sutton, UK's assists leader (4.7 apg), transferred to Purdue. Combine these losses with the graduation of UK's two tallest players, Mike Scott and Jeff Ginan, and you have a small, inexperienced group.

Still, excitement is high in the Bluegrass. Pitino's hiring signaled the end of an unpleasant chapter in the Kentucky basketball history books, and the beginning of what Wildcat faithful envision as brighter days ahead. While the 1989-90 Kentucky roster may seem lean by Kentucky standards, Pitino's record indicates he is up for the challenge.

Although it is not deep, the Wildcat roster is not altogether void of talent, especially in the backcourt. There the Wildcats will be led by senior Derrick Miller, a 6-5 guard who averaged 13.9 points and 3.3 rebounds per game last season. Miller, who showed promise as a freshman but suffered through a nightmarish sophomore season, came into his own as a junior and became an offensive threat.

Richie Farmer, a 6-0 sophomore who was a Kentucky Mr. Basketball, joins Miller in the backcourt. Farmer battled injury and illness through a disappointing fresh-

man campaign, averaging 3.1 points in 27 games.

A trio of newcomers, including sophomore Sean Woods and freshmen Jeff Brassow and Henry Thomas, will vie for playing time in the backcourt.

Up front, the Cats will be led by junior forward Reggie Hanson. The 6-7 Somerset native averaged 9.8 points and 4.5 rebounds per game last season and is consistently recognized for his defensive skills. Hanson is joined by three sophomores, 6-7 Deron Feldhaus, 6-7 John Pelphrey and 6-6 Johnathon Davis. Feldhaus may have the early lead on a starting spot following several strong performances last season; he averaged 3.7 points and 3.3 rebounds per game.

Although doomsayers predict a second-straight losing season for the Wildcats, Kentucky has not softened its schedule. The 1989-90 Kentucky slate includes Indiana, Louisville, Kansas, North Carolina and Notre Dame, in addition to the 18-game SEC rotation.

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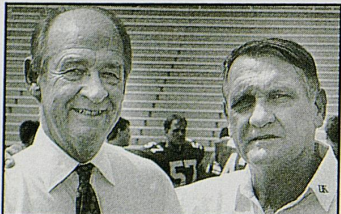

University of Kentucky football is brought to the Bluegrass by a veteran Wildcat television and radio network crew.

Sports Communication's home-game television coverage, featuring long-time UK analyst Ralph Hacker (play-by-play), former UK linebacker Joe Federspiel (color), and WKYT-TV anchor Rob Bromley (sidelines), is broadcast on a tape-delayed basis beginning at 11:30 p.m.(ET).

Calling the play-by-play for the Wildcats on radio is Cawood Ledford. Ledford, in his 37th year behind the microphone, has been honored 18 times as Kentucky's "Sportscaster of the Year." When Kentucky plays at home, he is joined by WKYT-TV sportscaster Dave Baker. Hacker calls the color when the 'Cats are away. WKYT-TV's Dick Gabriel reports from the sidelines.

The radio broadcast lineup:

"Cat Calls" — A 30-minute call-in show hosted by Ledford and Hacker which airs an hour and a half before kickoff.

"A Look at Football" — Ledford's 15-minute preview of the day's game with interviews of coaches and players.

"University of Kentucky Football" — Live coverage of Wildcat football.

"Wildcat Wrap up" — A 10-minute statistical review of game results.

"Wildcat Scoreboard" — WVLK AM/FM sports director Tom Leach provides UK listeners recaps of games played around the country for 10 minutes.

"The Jerry Claiborne Show" — Ledford spends 15 minutes recapping game highlights and key plays with Kentucky's coach.

"The Big Blue Line" — A weekly call-in show (Thursdays 7-8 p.m.ET) that gives fans a chance to talk with Claiborne and Ledford.

"Bench Talk" — A daily five-minute show featuring Claiborne.

Blue and White

The University of Kentucky adopted Blue and White as its official colors in 1892. UK students had first decided on blue and light yellow before the Kentucky-Centre football game on December 19, 1891. The yellow was soon dropped from the combination and replaced by white.

The particular Kentucky shade of blue, close to royal blue, was determined without ceremony. After settling on the base colors, a student posed the logical question, "what color blue?" Letterman Richard Stoll looked down at his necktie and raised it to the air. The vote was unanimous.

And so Kentucky Blue is really Stoll necktie blue.

Nickname

The official nickname of University of Kentucky athletic teams is "Wildcats."

The name became synonymous with UK shortly after a 6-2 victory over Illinois on October 9, 1909. Commandant Carbusier, then head of the military department of old State University, told a group of students in a chapel service following the game that the Kentucky football team had "fought like wildcats."

The name "Wildcats" became increasingly popular among UK followers and the media. It has since been adopted by the university.

Wildcat Mascot

The Wildcat mascot originated during the 1976-77 academic year at the University of Kentucky. Gary Tanner was the first Wildcat to dance and entertain crowds at Commonwealth Stadium and Rupp Arena during athletic events. Today the Wildcat mascot also attends academic functions and serves as a friendly ambassador for the university.

In the early 1980s, Wildcat mascot Terry Barney began the tradition of doing a one-armed pushup for each of Kentucky's points in front of the student section after every Wildcat score. The fans at Commonwealth Stadium still count out every pushup on football Saturdays.

Battle for the Beer Barrel

The beer barrel, painted blue, orange and white, is the prize awarded each year to the winner of the Kentucky-Tennessee football game. The first barrel was awarded in 1925. Two Wildcat supporters, Guy Hugel and

Rollie M. Guthrie, wanted to produce something to symbolize the fierce rivalry between the two schools.

A whiskey barrel was to be the original trophy, until the Women's Christian Temperance Union ruled it out. A beer barrel was more acceptable to the ladies.

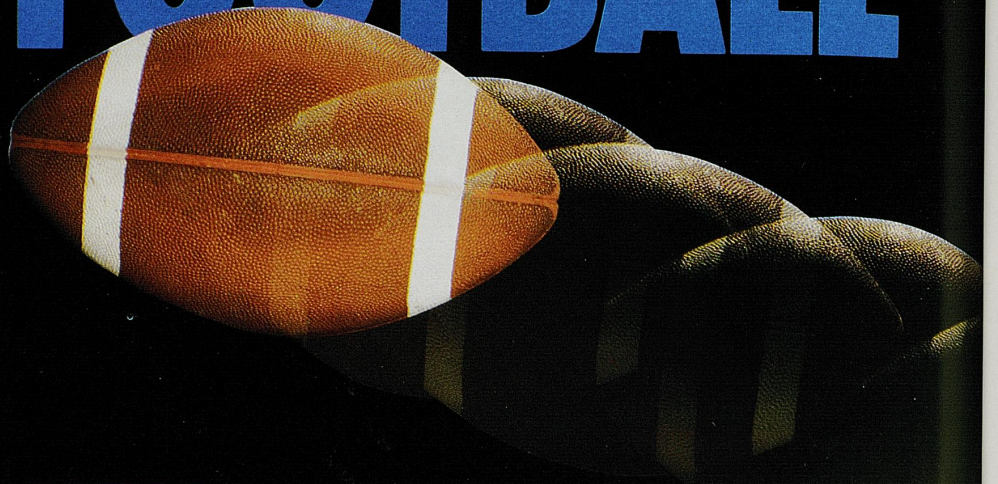
But there was still the problem of Prohibition and the Anti-saloon League, which voiced displeasure at such a trophy. But the resourceful Hugel and Guthrie appeased all parties by painting "ice water" on the barrel.

Tennessee has won the barrel 52 times in the 84-game series.

Battle for the Bourbon Barrel

The Bourbon Barrel is awarded to the winner of the Kentucky-Indiana football game. The series, which was renewed in 1967 after a 40-year break, began in 1893. No one is certain of the origin of this unusual trophy. Some think that the blue and red-striped barrel represents the distillery industry in Kentucky and southern Indiana. Indiana leads the series 12-6-1, but Kentucky has won three of the last four outings. Both schools have signed a contract to meet every year through 2000.

The "Officially Licensed Collegiate Products" label should appear on all licensed merchandise. With the label, the alumnus, student, and fan know that they are buying a product of quality and authenticity that represents the goodwill of the university. It is our way of identifying merchandise that has been approved by the University.

THE LABEL TELLS YOU IT IS AUTHORIZED

Unfortunately, there is still some merchandise being sold that is not authorized by the University. That is where we would appreciate your assistance. Look for the official label before you buy. It is your assurance that the merchandise you receive has been authorized and approved by the University.

We are launching an awareness campaign to our alumni, students, and supporters telling them how to make sure they are getting officially licensed merchandise. The sale of unlicensed merchandise (1) takes revenues away from the university, (2) increases the likelihood of inferior quality and offensive artwork, and (3) increases the risk of product liability problems. 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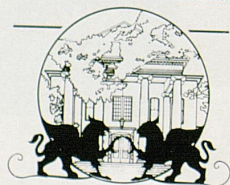
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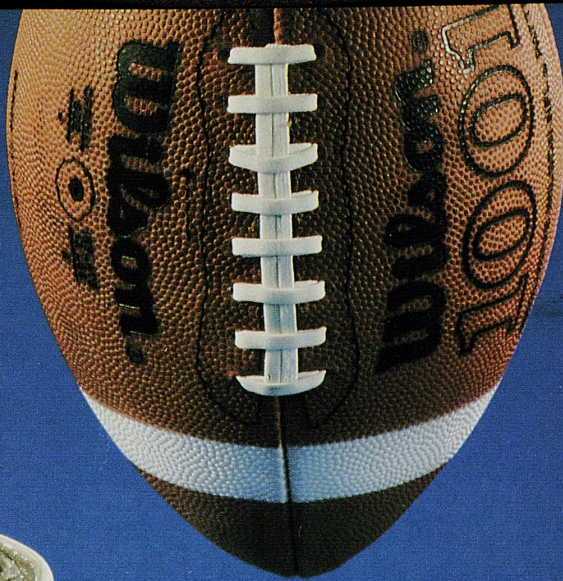
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
