But the rewards are sometimes small.


The two work long hours, earn little pay and drive daily from their homes in Lexington to Democratic Headquarters in Frankfort.

The reasons Freshman phenom Tim Couch remained the back up, not the starter. Someone even made a sign that read "Cut the deuce loose" and hung it in section 209.


"It's almost impossible for me to believe the way some people have responded to Billy Jack," Curry said at his weekly news conference yesterday. "We have some insecure people in our culture."



Since UK originally declared pedestrians when UK's administration decided to develop new bicycle policies over the summer and to establish a plan to enforce the new rules, it did so for the safety of pedestrians on campus.

Richmond votes on alcohol sales

RICHMOND, Ky. — Although most of Richmond allows liquor sales, Madison County is dry, and two ends of town bordered by Interstate 75 have always been of Flimits for alcoholic beverage sales.

But that may change after today, when residents of the west end of town vote on whether to let businesses serve alcohol.

Officials at hotels in the area say a change in the liquor law could make a difference at the bottom line.

"I wish it could change," said Peter Shah, general manager of the Holiday Inn on the Eastern Bypass, where a one-mile stretch is dry. "It will help us a lit-tle bit."

the bit."

He said his restaurant and hotel regularly lose business because of the west end's dry status.

This isn't the first time business leaders in the community have tried to allow liquor sales in that strip of the bypass, which is the road's only dry section.

strip of the bypass, which is the road's only dry section.

The south side of the road is in the 34th precinct;
the rest is in precinct 36, which is also dry.

Back in 1982, residents petitioned for a special
election to make that section wet.

A battle to thwart the change ensued, involving
everyone from downtown bar owners to religious
leaders.

Even elected officials weighed in on the issue, taking out ads in the local newspaper to urge residents
to vote against bringing alcohol to that part of town.
Residents voted 251-140 to keep liquor out. A few
months later, residents on the north side of town
near Exit 90 of 1-75 also opted to stay dry.

This time around, with the exception of a few ads placed by a downtown liquor store owner against the vote, there has been little public debate on the wet-dry question.

The Rev. William Young, who led the fight years ago against the sales, said many people are still opposed to having liquor that close to home.

Without a mixed-drink license, most restaurants will not move there, he said.
"This is a positive thing for Richmond," said Desloover, who doesn't live in the west Richmond precinct and so can't vote on the matter.

"We need nice places to eat here, so we don't have to go to Lexington. We can keep our money here."
