Minutes of Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, November 22, 1941. The following members were present: Judge Richard C. Stoll, James Park, H. S. Cleveland and Dr. Lee Kirkpatrick. President H. L. Donovan, Comptroller Frank D. Peterson, Dean James H. Graham and Secretary W. Gayle Starnes were also present.

A. Approval of Minutes.

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1. The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of November 11 were examined, and on motion, duly seconded and passed, were approved.

B. Comptroller's Quarterly Report.

President Donovan presented the following report submitted by Comptroller Frank D. Peterson:

November 19, 1941

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

I submit herewith a Quarterly Report of the financial operations as revealed by the records in the Office of the Comptroller.

INCOME

The realized income for July, August, and September, 1941, for (1) University operating funds; (2) Experiment Station funds; and (3) Agricultural Extension funds is shown in detail. The realized income from State appropriations for the University operating funds is received by allotments made by the Director of the State Budget and represents slightly more than one-fourth of the appropriation for the current fiscal year.

The Federal funds, in the main, have been received in total.

Student fees show a marked decrease under anticipated receipts. However, this unrealized income is partially due to deferred student fees and it is believed that collections during the second quarter will more nearly approximate the estimate. At the present time, I see no serious reason to be alarmed concerning income. However, it is evident that the practice of economy must be continued throughout the semester. It is definitely believed that the income will not exceed budgeted estimates.

The income for the Experiment Station seems to have approximated the estimate. The same is true for Agricultural Extension funds. The Federal funds for Agricultural Extension were estimated at \$665,118.33 for the year. One-half of this amount has been received and credited to this Extension Account.

EXPENDITURES

The statement for Departmental Appropriations lists expenditures and encumbrances of the (1) University operating funds, (2) Experiment Station funds, and (3) Agricultural Extension funds. These departments and divisions have operated according to previous estimates and at this time it appears that the appropriations made to the various departments will be sufficient to take care of their needs, operating on an economical basis. It is impossible, however, to predict the next nine months operations, using the figures for the past quarter as a basis. The second quarter's report will be more revealing.

Approximately one-fourth of the estimated budget expenditures for the Experiment Station was spent, or encumbered during the first quarter. This, however, does not necessarily reflect an accurate picture. We do not have at hand comparative figures for the same period for past years on a comparable break-down. Further, the Posting Division, of this office, has not been able to clear all postings monthly due to not having received accounting machines.

The analysis of Agricultural Extension accounts is similar to that given above for the Experiment Station funds. Approximately one-fourth of the budget has been spent.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

I am also reporting a statement of Restricted Funds which are used to supplement University funds in carrying out the various activities and related activities of the University in general. Restricted Funds are accounted for separately and are restricted in use for the purpose for which funds are received or allocated. The statement shows the balances as of July 1, 1941, also receipts and expenditures for each account for the past quarter.

No report is made on Agency Funds, which have heretofore been termed Organization Accounts.

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2. On motion, duly seconded and passed, the report was ordered received and a record made in these minutes.

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C. Report of Committee on Proposed Office Building for A.A.A.

The following report was submitted by President Donovan:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ON THE PROPOSED AGRICULTURAL ADJUSTMENT ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky on July 25, 1941, the President reported that he had been in correspondence and conference with the officials of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration with regard to the University's erecting a suitable office building for rental to that organization. The AAA formally requested the University to build an office building on or near the campus of the University for their use. It was stated by the officials of the AAA that the rental would be sufficient to amortize the cost of the construction over a period of ten or twelve years if they continued to occupy the building.

There has been no question in the mind of those who represent the administration of the University of Kentucky regarding the desirability of having the AAA, the Experiment Station, the College of Agriculture and other University agencies, housed in close proximity to each other. It has been recognized by all these agencies that it is highly desirable for them to work together and to cooperate in the administration of their several programs.

At the meeting of the Executive Committee in July the Chairman authorized the appointment of a committee to study the question of the erection and rental of a building for use as an office building by the AAA. President Donovan, Dean Cooper, Dean Graham and Comptroller Peterson were named on this committee.

The committee has continued to study this problem. Since that date it has held a number of conferences with officials of the AAA, and has carried on considerable correspondence with these officers. It has investigated the possibilities of being able to erect a building, and at the same time, secure funds with which such a structure might be built.

The committee has reluctantly concluded that it is compelled to turn in a negative report on this desirable project. It is its opinion that it would be hazardous to the University to undertake such an ambitious building program under present conditions for the following reasons:

- We believe that it is unwise for the University of Kentucky to go farther in debt. The present unstable conditions in the world compel us to take the position that it is not good business to borrow another large sum of money with which to construct a building. Such a debt might prove very embarrassing for our institution during the period of readjustment that is certain to follow the war.
- 2. At the present moment materials for the construction of such a building can be secured, provided many substitutes are used, some of which are not very satisfactory. But the beginning of any new structure of this kind has already met with disapproval on the part of the OPM. It is urging individuals and private concerns not to construct new buildings until the crisis comes to an end. We are not at all certain that even if we started a building of this type we would be able to complete it. The government may prohibit the erection of all buildings except those which contribute to national defense.
- 3. There is a further reason why we feel we should not recommend this project to the Executive Committee, even though we were able to secure funds and materials to carry on the project. The AAA cannot rent a building for a term longer than a year. If at the end of any year this organization should decide of its own accord not to rent the building, or if it should be terminated by an act of Congress, the University would have on its hands a building that it could not well adapt to its own use without additional expense, and it would face the hazard of financing the bonded indebtedness from its own current income. We recognize that the AAA has given us as broad a statement of its intention as it can possibly give under its authority.

The AAA has submitted its requirements of 20,000 square feet of usable floor space and has offered an annual rental therefor of \$14,000, or 70¢ per square foot. This \$14,000 annual rental includes \$4,000 per year as payment for the services (light, heat, etc.), leaving only \$10,000 per year applicable to interest and amortization of building

costs. A modern office building of this floor space and under existing conditions, can be constructed at a cost of anywhere from \$100,000 to \$160,000, depending upon the type of materials and structure used. At the minimum building cost of \$100,000 it would require twelve years, at \$10,000 per year, to amortize the debt or more than sixteen years to amortize at the higher cost figure. Therefore, should we undertake to erect such a structure, we should still be compelled to negotiate for higher rental than has been offered by the AAA. The rent suggested by the AAA is not in line with the standard rental for office buildings in this section.

4. The University of Kentucky is extremely anxious to have the AAA maintain its offices on or near the campus of our institution. We believe it possible to secure additional space in the vicinity of the Experiment Station which would enable the organization to maintain their contact with the Experiment Station. If this were done, the committee recommends that the University provide additional space on a rental basis within existing buildings.

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3. On motion, duly seconded and passed, the above report was received and the recommendation approved.

D. Tultion Scholarships for Latin-American Students.

President Donovan discussed with the Executive Committee the matter of cooperation with the United States Government in promoting cultural relations with the Latin-American countries. He indicated that a number of universities are offering scholarships and fellowships to students in these countries, and recommended that the University of Kentucky make available to Latin-American students ten tuition scholarships.

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4. On motion, duly seconded and passed, this recommendation was approved.

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E. Report of the United States Treasury Tax Administration Project.

A project, "Suitability of Taxes for Federal and State Administration", is being conducted under the direction of Professor James W. Martin, Director of the Bureau of Business Research, College of Commerce. This project is being financed by the United States Treasury Department. The study will attempt to ascertain state and federal administrative costs of particular kinds of taxes as well as costs to the taxpayer incident to complying with the payment of the various taxes. The persons now employed, with their rates of pay, are listed as follows:

Other appointments will be made when necessary. These appointments, together with any changes in personnel, will be reported as they occur.

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5. On recommendation of President Donovan, a motion was made, seconded and passed that the report be received, that the personnel of the project and their rates of pay be approved, and that the funds received by the Bureau of Business Research for the conduct of this project be deposited with the Comptroller and, after the necessary expenses are paid, the balance be credited to the account numbered as the "Business Research Revolving Account."

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F. Purchase of Woolley Property.

For some time, the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee have been giving consideration to the purchase of the Woolley property. This property is located at 342 South Limestone and consists of a house and lot which adjoins Patterson Hall. It was thought that it would be to the best interest of the University of Kentucky to acquire this property, if possible, for future use as a site for a women's residence hall. The Comptroller reported that, in accordance with authorization of the Executive Committee (July 25, 1941), he had made further investigation concerning purchase of this property. He said that the property had been offered to the University for \$25,000 and that the University had proposed an offer of \$16,000. A second offer of \$20,000 was made to the University. Finally, an option had been obtained for \$17,000.

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6. On motion, duly seconded and passed, the President and Comptroller were authorized to purchase the Woolley property at a cost of \$17,000, and make arrangements for the payment for this property.

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G. Report of Inauguration Committee.

Colonel James H. Graham, chairman of the sub-committee on finance, appeared before the Executive Committee and reported that the inauguration committee requested him to report that it now needed approximately \$500.00 to carry out its plans.

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7. On motion, duly seconded and passed, an appropriation of \$500.00 was approved and the Comptroller was asked to report at the next meeting the fund or funds from which this amount might be taken.

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H. A Mechanical Check-writer for Comptroller's Office.

The matter of securing a mechanical check-writer for use by the Comptroller's Office was discussed. It was reported by Comptroller Peterson that, in view of the large number of checks now being issued by his office, the use of a mechanical check-writer would effect a considerable saving of time.

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8. Motion was made, duly seconded and passed that the Comptroller of the University of Kentucky is authorized to affix his signature to checks written against funds of the University of Kentucky mechanically as well as manually, a copy of which process is given below.

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I. Air Conditioning the Student Union Building.

President Donovan read the following report:

November 18, 1941

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

The Board of Trustees in the minutes of September 16, 1941, appointed the Committee, signed below, to investigate the cost of air conditioning the Student Union Building and report to the Executive Committee, this Committee being given power to act.

The Committee has investigated the question of air conditioning the Student Union Building and find that there is a decided need that this building be conditioned in some way so that it will make it attractive during the summer months. It is our judgment that the most feasible move is to air condition the Ballroom, Cafeteria, and the first floor of the Student Union Building by installing two condensing units with forty-five (45) ton capacity each, whereby the two units can be utilized to take care of the Ballroom or the first floor, or the Cafeteria since all three places will not require air conditioning at the same time. It is believed such units will take care of the existing needs in the building.

Printed specifications for air conditioning of the Student Union Building on the campus of the University of Kentucky were mailed out and two or more bids were received. The Combs Lumber Company has, in our judgment, submitted not only the lowest bid, but the best bid in which they agree to furnish and install air condition units according to specifications for the sum of \$15,800.00. The Division of Maintenance and Operation estimates that the plumbing and control piping, duct work, electric wiring, machine foundations, cutting and patching, hangers and steel work in the Attic can be done for \$3,600.00 by this Division, the specifications provided for this work to be done by the Division of Maintenance and Operation. estimates make the complete job cost the University These figures represent a 40 per cent discount \$19,400.00. from the list price, and in view of the fact that air conditioning materials have slightly advanced, we believe that the University can do the job at this time as cheaply as it will be able to do so within the next three years, or more, and in view of the fact that there is such a great need for making the building more attractive, we recommend that the Board of Trustees authorize the Comptroller of the University, with the approval of the President, to expend such balance as now may exist to the credit of the Student Union Building and make any necessary further arrangements for the financing of this work.

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9. On recommendation of President Donovan, a motion was made, seconded and passed that the report be received, the recommendations be approved, that the contract be awarded to the Combs Lumber Company in accordance with its bid of \$15,800.00 for the installation of air conditioning units according to specifications, and that the Committee be authorized to take all further actions incident to the air conditioning of the Student Union Building.

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J. Property Deeded for Highway Purposes.

The Comptroller submitted a deed which was to be made to the State Department of Highways in accordance with the authorization included in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Trustees on September 16, 1941, for a strip of land along the Lexington-Nicholas-ville road, to be used for highway purposes.

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10. On motion, duly seconded and passed, approval was granted for the execution of this deed.

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K. Appointment of Counsel to Represent University in Salary Suit.

Judge Stoll reported that, in accordance with the motion recorded in the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee on October 11, 1941, Governor Johnson had by executive order appointed J. Donald Dinning to represent the University in this suit. A copy of the executive order follows:

EXECUTIVE ORDER

WHEREAS, there exists a controversy between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and the Honorable J. Dan Talbott, Commissioner of Finance of the Department of Finance of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as to the right of the said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to employ Dr. H. L. Donovan as President and Jesse E. Adams, Paul P. Boyd, J. S. Chambers, A. E. Evans, W. D. Funkhouser, Robert D. Haun, T. T. Jones, James W. Martin, William S. Taylor and Edward Wiest as professors at the University of Kentucky, and to pay them as compensation for their services a sum in excess of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) annually under the terms of an agreement or contract now existing between said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and the above listed President and professors; and

WHEREAS, it is to the public interest to have said controversy terminated as soon as possible; and

WHEREAS, said controversy can only be terminated by a judicial determination of the rights of said trustees of the University of Kentucky and of said Commissioner of Finance; and

WHEREAS, the Attorney General of Kentucky cannot represent both the Trustees of the University of Kentucky and the Commissioner of Finance at said litigation; and

WHEREAS, under said circumstances it is deemed necessary, expedient, and proper to obtain special counsel to represent the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky in conducting said litigation,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Keen Johnson, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, by virtue of the authority granted to me by Chapter 91 of the 1940 Acts of the Legislature, do hereby employ J. Donald Dinning, Attorney of Louisville, Kentucky, to file suit on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky against the said Commissioner of Finance for a declaration of rights by the said Board of Trustees and the said Commissioner of Finance with respect to the right of said Board of Trustees to employ the said Dr. H. L. Donovan, Jesse E. Adams, Paul P. Boyd, J. S. Chambers, A. E. Evans, W. D. Funkhouser, Robert D. Haun, T. T. Jones, James W. Martin, William S. Taylor and Edward Wiest, under the terms and conditions of the contract or agreement now existing between the said Board of Trustees and the said Dr. H. L. Donovan, Jesse E. Adams, Paul P. Boyd, J. S. Chambers, A. E. Evans, W. D. Funkhouser, Robert D. Haun, T. T. Jones, James W. Martin, William S. Taylor, and Edward Wiest, and to render any legal service necessary on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to a final determination and adjudication of said controversy.

Upon final determination of this matter by the courts, reasonable and proper compensation will then be fixed by me. to be paid to the said Dinning; and as his services are to be rendered on behalf of said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, the amount of his compensation fixed by me shall be charged to, and paid out of, the appropriation of the University of Kentucky.

Signed by me as Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky at Frankfort, Kentucky, this the fifteenth day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and forty-one and in the one hundred fiftieth year of the Commonwealth.

Judge Stell reported further that the case had been tried in Circuit Court at Frankfort, Ky., and that this Court had decided in favor of the University.

L. Suit of Charles Lamont Eubanks.

Judge Stoll reported that Charles Lamont Eubanks, Negro, had now brought suit in Federal Court against the University and that summonses had been served on Governor Keen Johnson, President H. L. Donovan, and Registrar Leo M. Chamberlain. The University will be represented in this suit by the Office of the Attorney General of Kentucky.

M. Appointments and Other Staff Changes.

President Donovan presented staff appointments, reappointments, salary adjustments and other changes requested by Deans and Heads of Departments.

Joe Rupert, Assistant Football Coach, to teach Physical Education 36, at a stipend of \$35.00 a month for November and December, 1941, and January, 1942.

This will change Mr. Rouse's salary from \$70.00 a month to \$90 a month for the above period.

This will change Mr. Montondo's salary from \$20.00 to \$40.00 a month for the above period.
