Jan 4, 1901

The Faculty met in regular monthly session in the President's room in the college building at 3:30 pm

Present: President Patterson, Prof. White Neville, Patterson, Kittle, Roark, Pryor Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pince, Brook, McKenzie, Carpenter,

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

Prof Kastle submitted the following:

Some time ago a committee of the faculty was appointed to define the relation which shall exist between any paper purporting to be a college paper and the College Authorities and that the conclusion of this Committee if adopted by the faculty be communicated to the Editor of the Kentuckian.

This committee would report as follows:

College papers.

That all college papers and student magazines be placed under the immediate supervision and control of the Department of English Literature. (That the matter and general make up of each issue of any paper purporting to be in any way representative of the College shall be submitted before publication to the Professor of English Literature for his revision and approval), and that a conference be held with Mr. McDaniel in order to determine if possible the exact status of the Kentuckian.

J. H. Kastle.

Prof. Kastle reported further as follows:

The Kentuckian.

A conference was held yesterday afternoon by the Chairman of this Committee with Mr McDaniel. According to Mr McDaniel the Kentuckian still retained its connection

with the College as a college magazine, both in its status towards the general public, and in the sense that the two associate editors, Mr. Bowling and Mr. Rice were both college students.

On motion of Prof. Mathews the report of the Committee was adopted.

C. Ware.

Cadet C. Ware was charged with getting help in the examination in Zoology on the 18th of December last.

After statements from both Prof. Miller and cadet Ware. It was moved by Prof. Kasete seconded by Dr. Pryor to dismiss the case on the ground of lack of evidence of premeditated intention to cheat.

Motion carried.

Prof. Mackenzie reported that Mr. Johnson who founded the "College Record" had left school and read a letter from Mr. C. H. Tandy who succeeded to the management of the "Record".

No action.

The Chairman read a recent order of the Board of Trustees with regard to modifications in connection with the Commencement exercises.

The Chairman also read an order of the Board regarding admission to the Freshman class of the college.

On motion of Prof. Kastle the matter of revising the standards of admission to the Freshman class, in Mathematics, English, Latin, and Greek, was in accordance with the order of the Board of Trustees referred to the present committee on affiliated schools.

Prof Anderson gave notice of the candidacy of the following for the Master's degree in Engineering in 1902, viz: A. J. Vance, W. L. Bronaugh, J. B. Smith, J. A. Nichols, W. J. Carpenter, and moved that they be accepted as candidates. Motion seconded by Prof. Kastle.

Carried as follows:

Aye. — Messrs. Kastle, Koark, Pryor, Anderson, Matthews, Miller, Brooks.

No — Messrs. White, Neville, Patterson, Peuce, Mackenzie.

(Note of Explanation offered by Prof. Peuce.)

The vote was not unanimous because the applications for these degrees were not made two years before the time the degrees are to be conferred, as required by the rules governing in such cases.

(Note of explanation offered by Prof. Anderson)

Those voting for the above young men being candidates for master's degree in 1902, did so because they felt that actual work for two years would by that time have been done although formal notice had not been given two years prior to that time.
