interviews

Media wanting to interview players or coaches are asked to make arrangements through the UK Athletics Media Relations Office at least 24 hours in advance. The best time to interview players is generally following practice (3-3:30 p.m.) Special arrangements may have to be made due to changing practice

schedules. The best time to interview coaches is in the morning.

practice

The last 30 minutes of practice will be open to media members. Player interviews can be conducted after each practice. Practice usually runs from 1-3 p.m. Media should call in advance due to changing practice schedules during the season.

media pass list

Requests for home game credentials should be directed to Gail Dent, preferably in writing at least one week in advance. A media list will be located at the pass gate, which is located at the Upper Administration entrance off Lexington Avenue.

photographers credentials

Credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers or those on special assignment. Photographers are asked to stay behind the baseline on each end of the court.

parking

Parking is available in front of and behind the Coliseum. There is also a lot adjacent to the Coliseum. Parking passes are not required.

telephones

Long distance telephone lines are available in the Athletics Media Relations Office in the Coliseum. Fax machine service is also available. There will be one telephone line available for visiting radio on the press row side of the Coliseum. Telephone lines can be activated by contacting Charlotte Kollros at UK Communication Systems (606) 323-7000 ext. 244. Radio personnel are also asked to submit a request on company letterhead to Gail Dent at least two weeks in advance of the game.

postgame interviews

Selected players and both head coaches will be available to the media following the 10-minute cooling off period at the end of each game in the UK Press Conference Room, located in the hallway on the scorer's table side of the Coliseum.

The visiting coach and requested players will precede the home coach and players, unless otherwise specified. Each press conference will last no longer than 20 minutes. SIDs from each school should be asked to coordinate any other interview requests.

pregame information

Pregame information, including a program, roster and notes on both teams will be available in the UK Press Conference Room, located in the hallway on the scorer's table side. The press conference room is down the hall to the left. Media guides will be available upon request.







worked closely with powerhouses in both men's and women's college basketball, Mattox brings a unique feature to the UK program and to basketball in the Bluegrass State. Before she was named head coach of the UK women's basketball program in the spring of 1995, she earned national recognition as one of the first female assistant coaches on a Division I men's

basketball staff when Coach Rick Pitino added her to the Wildcats program in 1990. She gained valuable experience working daily with the Wildcats players in individual instruction sessions and supervising their academic affairs, while also fulfilling her game assignments.

Mattox is also highly regarded in women's basketball circles. She was a top recruiter as an assistant to Coach Andy Landers at her alma mater, national power Georgia. During her five seasons with the Lady Bulldogs, Mattox helped guide the program to national rankings, NCAA Tournament berths and many SEC honors. She also helped recruit two of the best female basketball players to play the game, Olympians Teresa Edwards and Katrina McClain.

Mattox's journey to success actually began as a collegiate player. She led Georgia in scoring as it won the 1981 Nation-

al Women's Invitational Tournament title and was the first female athlete to earn All-America status at the University.

A native of Philadelphia, Tenn., Mattox played basketball for Loudon County High. She then attended Roane State Community College, playing two seasons there under Landers. She then enrolled at Georgia, where she earned her degree in 1981 in education. Mattox remained there three seasons as a graduate assistant under Landers until leaving the coaching ranks for one year, only to return to her alma mater in 1985 as an assistant coach for the Lady Bulldogs. She remained at Georgia until joining Pitino's staff five years later.

The Mattox Family: Bernadette, Vince and one-year old Vincent

In 1994 she accepted the position of Assistant Athletics Director and Senior Women's Administrator at UK. On March 14, 1995 she was named head coach of the UK women's basketball team. Mattox continues to receive national attention since becoming head coach of the UK women's program.


She has been featured on Wide World of Sports as well as in numerous national media outlets, and is a frequent interviewee for postgraduate students doing reports on women who have coached men's sports.

A frequently requested speaker at various business, community and sports-related functions, Mattox has also received numerous awards and volunteers her time to local organizations. Mattox has also worked in television broadcasting, and has served as television color commentator for UK men's basketball and women's SEC basketball games.



assistant coaches

KEN BYRD

(Tennessee, 1972)

Byrd begins his second season with the University of Kentucky women's basketball program following 14 successful years in girls' high school basketball.

Byrd brings a wealth of administrative and coaching experience to the Wildcats program. A native of Friendsville, Tenn., Byrd has coached high school basketball in Tennessee and Georgia. He coached Bainbridge (Ga.) High's girls team for seven years, leading the squad to two sub-region championships and one regional championship. While at Bainbridge he served as the Director of In-School Suspension programs and was an assistant football coach. He also served as an Assistant to the County Athletics Director, coordinating two middle school athletics programs and high school basketball programs.

Prior to his stint at Bainbridge High, Byrd was the head girls' basketball coach at Greenback High School in Greenback, Tenn., from 1981-1986. Under his guidance, Greenback High won three district championships, two regional championships, three substate Tournament championships and was a runner-up in the state championship. His accomplishments earned him three District

addition to teaching math, science and physical education at Greenback, he also coached girls' softball.

From 1979-81 he was an assistant girls' coach and head football coach at William Blount High School in Maryville, Tenn. He began his high school coaching career at his alma mater, Friendsville High School, as the assistant boys' basketball coach from 1974-79.

Byrd earned his bachelor's degree in Education from the University of Tennessee in 1972. He earned his master's degree in Administration from Nova University in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. Byrd and his wife Chris have two children--daughter Kamie (15) and son Kolby (10).



LESLIE NICHOLS (Kentucky, 1986)

Regarded by many as one of the best players in the history of UK women's basketball, Nichols begins her first season as an assistant coach

and recruiting coordinator for the UK women's basketball team.

Nichols was a starter for Kentucky from 1982-86 under Coach Terry Hall. She averaged 11.4 points and seven rebounds per game as a freshman.

Nichols' freshman year was also the same season in which UK was ranked 5th nationally during the season by the Associated Press en route to a 23-5 record and an NCAA Tournament berth.

From her sophomore season to her senior year, Nichols led UK in scoring with 18.4 points per game as a sophomore, 18.4 points per game as a junior and 16.7 points as a senior. She was also ranked in the top 10 in several statistical categories in the SEC. She is the only UK women's basketball player to be named to the All-SEC team three consecutive

team as a junior and senior. Nichols left her mark in the UK record book. She is second on UK's all-time scoring list with 1,798 points, seventh in all-time assists (323) and second in all-time rebounding (877). She held the title of all-time steals leader with a career 278 steals for almost 10 years until the mark was surpassed in 1995.

Nichols, a product of Henry Clay High School in Lexington, was a twotime all-state player and a fourth-team Parade All-American as a senior.

Nichols received her bachelor's degree from UK in agricultural economics in 1986. She and her husband, former UK football player, Al Carter, reside in Lexington.



MOLLY McClure

(Richmond, 1996)

McClure comes to the University of Kentucky women's program after completing her collegiate career last season at

the University of Richmond in Virginia.

Her responsibilities will include coordinating travel plans for the team and supervising the team's academic progress. McClure, who played forward and center for the Spiders, began her collegiate career as a walk-on before earning a scholarship her junior and senior seasons. As a senior, she saw action in 16 games, averaging seven points and leading the team in rebounding with an average of 5.8 boards per game. She was one of three team captains her senior year.

McClure earned her bachelor's degree in art history at Richmond. She plans to pursue a master's degree while at UK.

teamwork will be the key to the cats' success in '86-87

a season of adjustments, including a new coach, a new style of play and new philosophies, the UK women's basketball team is ready to use last year's experience to its benefit.

Although five newcomers figure into the mix, the team returns its top two scorers from last season and three other veterans who are familiar with Coach Bernadette Mattox's fast-paced motion style of play. The returning starters are junior forward Shaunda Roberts (17.8 ppg, 7.1 rpg) and junior center Kim Denkins (15.4 ppg, 9.0 rpg). Either Roberts or Denkins led the team in scoring in 25 of 27 games last season. Roberts scored in double figures in every game but two, including a career-high 32 points

against Syracuse and a 31-point performance against intrastate rival Louisville, Denkins, a second-team All-

SEC selection last year, scored in double figures in 21 games, including a career-high 31 points against nationally-ranked N.C. State. She also posted double-figure rebounding in 11



games, including a career-high 17 boards against Marshall.

Also returning is sophomore forward Shawn Manning (6.3 ppg, 4.0 rpg). Manning stepped in last season and

gave the Wildcats help at power forward, playing in 26 games, while starting in 14, and scoring in double figures nine times. She scored a seasonhigh 14 points against Mississippi State, Miami University and Arkansas and grabbed nine rebounds against nationally-ranked Vanderbilt.

Junior forward Vonda Jackson (3.8 ppg, 2.9 rpg) and sophomore guard Tiffany Wait (11.7 ppg, 1.7 rpg) return ready to contribute this season after being sidelined by injuries. Jackson missed the first 10 games of the season due to

surgery to her right thumb, which she fractured during preseason practice. She returned at midseason to score in 14 of UK's remaining 17 games.

Wait began her collegiate career last year in the starting


lineup, scoring in double figures in four of six games, including a 17-point performance in the UK Invitational and a 15-point performance against Western Kentucky. But bilateral stress fractures in her feet put her on the bench for the remainder of her freshman season. After undergoing surgery in the offseason, Wait expects to return to the lineup this season and give UK a boost at the twoguard position. UK wel-

comes five new faces to the program this season. The Wildcats should get immediate help from 5-7 guard Nikki Hay (12 ppg, 4.9 rpg). Hay, a JUCO

transfer from Northeastern Oklahoma Junior College, was a second-team All-American, an All-Region II first-team and All-Bi-State Athletic Conference Eastern Division first-team

selection last season. She led her 25-7 team to a 15th-place national JUCO ranking.

She had a career-high 39-point performance against Connors State College as a sophomore.

Another addition at guard is 5-8 freshman Natalie Martinez (13.2 ppg, 5.3 rpg, 8.7 apg) Martinez is a threetime All-State product from Albuquerque, N.M. She led her state in assists for three consecutive seasons and helped her team to a 44-8 record during her junior and senior seasons.

She was the Albuquerque Coaches MVP and the 1995 New Mexico 4A Player of the Year as a junior.

Also joining the Wildcats at guard is freshman Robyn Embry (17.2 ppg, 8.6 rpg). Embry will get action at the 2-guard and 3-forward positions. She was team MVP at Madison Central in Richmond and all-state honorable mention as a senior.

UK also welcomes freshman forward Patrice Boyd (16 ppg, 9.4 rpg). Boyd hails from the same high school (Haywood) in Brownsville, Tenn., that produced Wildcats guard and men's 1996 NCAA Final Four Most Outstanding Player Tony Delk. Boyd, an all-state product in Tennessee, was named All-Tennessee and to the All-Region tournament team as a senior. She led Haywood High to a 25-7 record as a senior and earned MVP honors on her team for the second consecutive season. She had led her team in rebounding since her sophomore season with a career average of 10.8 boards per game.

The Wildcats will get assistance at the post from freshman center Katie Vieth (13.5 ppg, 8.5 rpg). Vieth, a Street & Smith honorable mention pick as a senior, was also an All A Region MVP and an All A State selection last season.



Playing as a unit will keep the Cats competitive this season.

Talk about the contributions of Kim Denkins and Shaunda Roberts last season and how you see them fitting into the team's plans this season.

I'm pleased with the progression that both Kim and Shaunda made last year. Both of them improved and took their game to another level. Hopefully they will carry that maturity over to this season. Kim and Shaunda know what it will take to be competitive in the SEC. I'm looking for them to lead the team to a successful season.

Who might be other impact players this season?

We are excited about Tiffany being back in the picture this year. Her shooting will be a valuable asset to this squad. Nikki Hay, a second-team All-American from Northeast Oklahoma Junior College, will make an immediate impact with her experience and quickness on the perimeter. Shawn Manning, who was selected Most Improved Player of the Year last season, has worked intensely over the summer in the weight room. She is in the best shape of her career and we are expecting instant results on the floor. We'll have a few newcomers who will make immediate impacts this season too. Natalie Martinez will be key at the point position. Her leadership, shooting and up tempo playing are what we need for the running, pressing style that we want. At 6-3 Katie Vieth's size and versatility in the paint will help expand our game. And then add Patrice Boyd's rebounding tenacity and athleticism, which will give the team added strength inside.

You added two to the staff this season -- Leslie Nichols and Mollie McClure. What will they bring to the program?


In addition to the up-tempo play and motion, what else can fans expect to see?

memorial coliseum (cap. 8,700) "home sweet home"

Situate along Euclid Avenue on the University of Kentucky campus, Memorial Coliseum is the home of one of the richest basketball traditions in the nation. It is also home to the University of Kentucky women's basketball team, a team determined to return glory and excitement to a facility that has known a wealth of both.

For 24 years, the historic coliseum housed the renowned Kentucky Wildcats men's team which won two national championships and 24 Southeastern Conference titles while playing in the facility under the direction of legendary coaches Adolph Rupp and Joe B. Hall. When the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976, the then-11,500 seat Coliseum became the exclusive basketball home for the women's team.


The women's team has carved a 231-85 homecourt record into the history of the now 8,700-seat coliseum. To fans' delight, UK and its opponents have played several exciting and close games in the facility.

The highlight of the Memorial Coliseum era for the women's basketball team came on a cold winter night in 1983. The date was February 5 and the opponent was No. 5 powerhouse Old Dominion, with 6-foot-8 All-American center Anne Donovan. A record crowd of 10,622 fired-up fans packed the Coliseum that Saturday evening and roared hysterically as the sixth-ranked Lady Kats came from 10 points down in the second half for an 80-66 upset win. After the victory, the team, which was led by All-American Valerie Still, climbed to No. 4 in the national poll. In their three remaining games, they averaged 7,600 fans and easily led the nation in attendance that year.

OTHER EXCITING AND NOTABLE GAMES PLAYED IN THE COLISEUM WERE:

February 20, 1994 - Considered a huge underdog, UK's women's team managed to take then top-ranked Tennessee into overtime before losing 95-89 in front of an estimated crowd of 5,727 fans.

January 19, 1993 - Sophomore Stacey Reed drove to the Coliseum's midcourt and made a three-point desperation shot as the final horn sounded to push UK to a 62-60 win over nationally-ranked intrastate rival Western Kentucky. Reed was mobbed by her teammates and the coaching staff at midcourt, but managed to crawl out of the pile while they were still celebrating.

December 5, 1992 - This was the date when Kentucky beat nationally-ranked Connecticut 75-54 to win its 13th UK Invitational
Tournament. It was not an easy feat for UK, which had lost the title the previous year to nationally-ranked Houston. Also, UK had to face a sizable young sophomore — Rebecca Lobo — who would later become one of the most heralded female players ever, leading her team to an undefeated season and a national title in 1995.

Ohio State series - UK's series with Ohio State has been a nail-biter for both teams. The teams took games into overtime in 1989 and 1991. UK beat Ohio State in regulation in Memorial Coliseum on November 28, 1990, 107-73.

1980-82 - These years represent the seasons when the women's team posted its record 31 consecutive homecourt victories in Memorial Coliseum. The streak was broken on January 31, 1982, with a 70-69 loss to Memphis State.

Although the Coliseum is nicknamed "the house that Rupp built", University President H.L. Donovan is credited with beginning the plans for the Coliseum's construction in 1941 when he recommended a building that would "properly take care of our athletics, our health services, our physical education and our recreation".

Memorial Coliseum was completed in 1950 at a cost of \$3,995,000. The huge building was dedicated to serve as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict. The Coliseum covers an entire city block and has as much space as a seven-story office building.

The facility underwent renovations in 1990 to include a state-of-the-art weight room, basketball and administrative offices, a team meeting room and first-class dressing and lockerrooms. The Coliseum is used primarily for women's basketball games, volleyball matches, gymnastics meets and is the site for UK's annual Midnight Madness Basketball Practice. It has also served as the site of other sporting events, including tennis exhibitions and high school tournaments, and has served as a site for lectures and concerts.

center for academic and tutorial services)

The University of Kentucky opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is known as the Ohio Casualty Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS).

CATS, located inside Memorial Coliseum, will undergo a major expansion -- thanks to a \$1 million donation from Ohio Casualty -- that will double academic service space from 6,000 to 12,000 square feet. Renovations should be completed in 1997. The center, specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind, presently contains a large general study area along with numerous smaller rooms used for tutoring. A language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility were added in 1994.


The facility provides an uninterrupted study environment for student-athletes to successfully complete their undergraduate degrees. Bob Bradley, Assistant AD for Academics, supervises CATS and is assisted by Barbara Deniston,

Director of Student-Athlete Development, and Mike Haley and

"CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete," Bradley says. "We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic arena. The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our

Center (CATS) provides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions. Our goal is to show that we care about the student as well as the athlete. Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics. "Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job in helping their student-athletes. I have been blessed at Kentucky," Bradley said.

CATS is also instrumental in preparing student-athletes for future careers. The Career Development Program helps student-athletes look at the future through a step-by-step process which includes:

- •mentoring and internships, which help determine career interests;
- ·career counseling;
- •resume writing; and
- ·forming a career plan.

The Wildcat Career Development Program also works closely with the University's Career Planning and Placement Center in order to provide additional assistance when needed. CATS also prepares a resume resource book for various companies each year that contains the resumes of graduating UK student-athletes.

CONGRATULATIONS SENIORS

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to provide the student-athlete with every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well. Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, it is clear that Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.




Bernadette Mattox summer camps are designed to provide players with an environment in which they can improve their basketball fundamentals, develop new techniques and most of all... have FUN!

Charles T. Wethington Jr., was elected the 10th president of the University of Kentucky September 18, 1990.

Wethington began his career in higher education in 1965 as a faculty member on the Lexington campus of the University and two years later was named chief administrator of Maysville Community

College. In 1971 he moved to Lexington as assistant vice-president, becoming vice president of the Community College System in 1981.

In the University reorganization of 1982, he was named chancellor of the UK Community College System, one of the three major sectors of UK. In 1987 he was given university-wide responsibilities for public and governmental relations in addition to his community college role, and his title was changed to Chancellor for the Community College System and University Relations.

Wethington earned his master's and doctoral degrees at the University of Kentucky.

The Kentucky native has been active on the national higher education scene. He serves as chair of the Southeastern Universities Research Association's Council of Presidents and served as president of the Southeastern conference, 1993-95.

He has been a member of the Executive Council of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and served as its vice-chairman. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools from 1986-1989.

Wethington is a member of the Southern Regional Education Board and the Southern Growth Policies Board.

During 1957-61 he served in the U.S. Air Force Security Service. He studied Russian at Syracuse University, 1958-59.

Wethington is married to Judy Woodrow Wethington, from Danville, Kentucky. They have a son, Kennan, and a daughter, Lisa.

c.m. newton

University of Kentucky alumnus C. M. Newton enters a new chapter in his role as Director of Athletics at his alma mater.

Having planned to retire in the summer of 1996, Newton had a change of heart and has announced that he will stay on the job four more years.

Therefore, the University will continue to benefit from Newton's brand of steady leadership and foresight during an era of significant change and growth in collegiate athletics.

Hired on April 1, 1989, Newton had a lengthy, impressive list of credentials and brought a sparkling reputation for integrity at a crucial time in the history of UK athletics.

In accepting the position, Newton outlined his goals by saying, "I have a resolve to try very hard to

continue that great tradition, and at the same time, to do it totally within the NCAA and SEC rules and not sacrifice the academic integrity of this University."

Newton's term of service has been marked by athletic and academic achievement, dedication to rules compliance, the addition of three sports, expansion of facilities, and growth in revenues in response to the increasing financial pressures of collegiate athletics.


Newton came to UK after an illustrious basketball coaching career. In his last two seasons (1988 and 1989), he was named SEC Coach of the Year while leading Vanderbilt to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances. He was also chosen the Kodak NABC District IV Coach of the Year in 1989. Newton was the head basketball coach and associate athletics director at Vanderbilt from 1982-89, compiling a 129-115 record. In 32 years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama, and Vanderbilt, Newton compiled a 509-375 record. His Alabama teams won three consecutive Southeastern Conference championships.

Just as impressive was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team, over 50 percent more than any other league school. In addition, all 21 of his seniors earned their diplomas.

Newton is highly regarded on the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chair of that elite group for five of those years. He currently serves as president of USA Basketball, the nation's governing body for all international basketball. He is also a member of the prestigious NCAA Division I Basketball Committee and will become chair of that group in 1997-98. He is a member (and former chair) of the NCAA Committee on Basketball Issues.

Newton is prominent in international basketball circles as well. Currently, he represents North America on the 14-member FIBA Central Board. FIBA is the governing body for international basketball. He is a member of the COPABA Executive Board, which oversees international basketball in North, Central, and South America.

Newton also has international coaching accomplishments. He served as team manager, a combination coaching and administrative position, on the 1984 U.S. Olympic team that won the gold medal. Indiana coach Bob Knight, who tabbed Newton for the Olympic staff, called him "the finest gentleman in our business." In 1983 and 1987, Newton took his Vanderbilt squads to the Republic of China (Taiwan) to represent the United States in the R. William Jones Cup International Tournament,



winning the gold medal in 1983 and the silver in 1987. He has also conducted coaching clinics in numerous countries.

Newton began his coaching career at Transylvania College (now Transylvania University) in Lexington. Recommended for the job by Coach Rupp, Newton guided Transy to a 169-137 record in his 12 years at the helm despite the handicap of a limited scholarship program.

In 1969, once again with the backing of Rupp, Newton answered a call from Paul "Bear" Bryant to take on the challenge of building the downtrodden Alabama basketball program. During his 12-year tenure, Newton orchestrated a complete turnaround in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortunes, compiling a sparkling 211-123 record. In addition to the three SEC championships, Newton guided the Tide to two trips to the NCAA Tournament and four berths in the NIT. A satisfied Bryant once remarked "C. M. Newton is a winner, and that's important, but more than anything else, he wins or loses with class, and that's more important."

With few horizons left to conquer at Alabama, Newton resigned at the end of the 1980 season to accept a job as assistant commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. A year later, when Vanderbilt athletics director Roy Kramer was searching for a coach of national stature to head the Commodore basketball program, Newton was the obvious man for the job.

Newton was born Feb. 2, 1930, in Rockwood, Tenn. He grew up in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., where he was eventually named a charter member of that city's Sports Hall of Fame, along with Chris Evert, Julius Boros, and the late Brian Piccolo. After high school, Newton enrolled at UK on a basketball scholarship. He was a letterman on the Wildcats' 1951 national championship team. Also a standout baseball pitcher, Newton hurled in the New York Yankees minor league system before entering college coaching.

Newton and his wife, Evelyn, have three grown children — son Martin, and daughters Deborah and Tracy — and four grandchildren.

the university

the university of kentucky was founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and the present name dates to 1916.

The campus in Lexington has 673 acres and is located just south of downtown. It consists of a graduate school, the University hospital and 16 colleges. The colleges are: allied health professions, architecture, arts and sciences, agriculture, business and economics, communications and information studies, dentistry, engineering, education, fine arts, human environmental sciences, law, medicine, nursing, pharmacy and social work. The graduate school offers 97 master's degree programs and 60 doctoral programs.

Enrollment on the campus in Lexington is more than 24,000 and includes students from every Kentucky county, every state, and more than 100 foreign countries. Full-time faculty numbers 1,700. Approximately 98 percent of the full-time faculty hold the highest possible degrees in their field. UK's faculty and staff attract more than \$100 million in grants, gifts and contracts; and the University has been designated a Research University of the First Class by the Carnegie Foundation — one of just 59 public universities in the country.

The University attracts excellent students. The number of National Merit Scholars entering UK consistently ranks among the top 10 public universities in the country. The average ACT score for first-year students is four points above the national average.

The University of Kentucky Community College System is made up of 14 colleges throughout Kentucky. Enrollment numbers over 44,000. The colleges offer associate degrees in technical subjects, two-year programs toward a bachelor's degree, and a wide variety of continuing education, community service and business liaison programs. UK now educates 38 percent of all students going to private and public colleges in Kentucky.


The number of UK alumni is more than 145,000. Private supports from alumni and friends of the University exceeds \$30 million annually.

The University of Kentucky Library maintains more than 2.5 million volumes, the 51st largest collection in the country. Work is underway on a new \$58

million library that will serve the entire state thanks to the wonders of computers and technology. The six-floor facility will encompass more than 350,000 square feet and have seating for 4,000 people.

In addition, UK maintains 23 research centers which conduct applied research in areas as diverse as tobacco and health, aging, cancer, toxicology, equine health, mineral production, manufacturing systems, and public policy. Several excel in the services offered to the public. The Center for Manufacturing Systems has assisted more than 500 small and mid-sized industrial firms in Kentucky. The Gluck Equine Research Center is recognized as one of only two of its kind in the world, offering continuing research into diseases of the horse.

The UK College of Medicine is ranked third in the country in the quality of primary care training. The UK Hospital is ranked among the top 100 U.S. hospitals in the country by HCIA Inc. and Mercer Management Consultants. The UK College of Pharmacy consistently is ranked third in the country by U.S. News and World Report and is one of the few pharmacy schools in the country with the capability of developing a drug "from bench to bedside" due to its drug product evaluation unit.

The University is in the process of developing the Coldstream Research Campus, a 750-acre complex designed to attract high-tech companies desiring ties to the University.

Negotiations are under way to execute leases with developers to construct several new commercial facilities on the research campus.

This is Lexington, home of the University of Kentucky. Lexington is a beautiful city. John O. The city offers UK students much in the way of entertainment: a philharmonic orchestra, Chamber Music Society, the Lexington Singers, a Council of the Arts, and a local ballet company. Movie theaters,

international restaurants, coffee houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, Thoroughbred and harness racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds and streams, and the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park, all in easy distance of the UK campus, are just a few attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.

A recent statewide poll indicated that the Lexington area is the most popular place to live, work and play in Kentucky. "If these United States can be called a body... then Kentucky can be called its heart."



Kentucky is also a land steeped in the rich history of our nation. Legendary pioneer Daniel Boone laid out Kentucky's second settlement at Fort Boonesborough, and nearby, a hundred years later, the Shaker religious sect prospered at picturesque Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill. Abraham Lincoln was born in Hodgenville (the one-cabin is part of a National Historic Site). The plantation home that inspired Stephen Foster to write "My Old Kentucky Home" still stands at a state park of the same name. And the region that 200 years ago gave birth to one of Kentucky's most famous exports — bourbon whiskey — is dotted with worldfamous distilleries.
