Dear Sir:

I herewith hand you Mr. Donohue's letter to me of the 29th ult., his file 87943, transmitting the papers relating to this claim. I note Mr. Donohue says a judgment went against the Company in the magistrate's court. I did not know about this, but presume he means the Police Court. If this be a fact, please prosecute an appeal to your Quarterly Court. I do not know whether it will be worth while to have all of the Company's witnesses present in the Quarterly Court or not. If you think there is a chance to win the case there, you might have them, otherwise, I suggest you try out the case in the Quarterly Court on plaintiff's testimony and, if there is another judgment against the Company, take an appeal to the Circuit Court, and then have present on the trial there the witnesses referred to in the enclosed papers.
