I ppreciate your consulting me about copies. I see no reason why the Notre Dame people should not have copies if they want them. It sounds perfectly all right. Talking about ms material I am sending you rough drafts of a letter I wrote to the head of the Union of Soviet Writers about the Pasternak affair. I thought I might was well register a good protest, but as the draft shows I toned it down in the hope of getting it across more effectively. I just hope that in some way the younger generation of writers in the USSR may be influenced by this, and I am sure the affair has a great meaning to them. That is why Pasternak had to refuse the Nobel Prize. Pasternak's address is Perdelkino, through Bakovka, Moacow. But I have ceased to sommunicate with him for the time being because I feel that too many letters from the west might cause his situation to become more embarassing. Perhaps it would be a good idea to wait a little. My last letter to him was October 23rd and I am not expecting a reply. I will let you know if I think the coast is clearing a little. The ms material from Ulan Baator sounds magnificent. It would be wonderful to know the language they were war written in and to study the monastic books you have. I am afraid that is too far afield for me, but I hope some day I may have an opportunity to see them somehow. I had heard about the interesting new article on the Bering sea that so suddenly appeared in the Great Soviet Encyclopedia. How like Orwell, isn't it? To the letter!
