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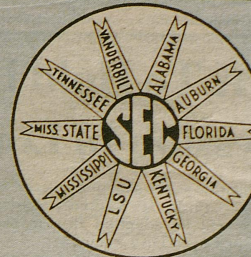

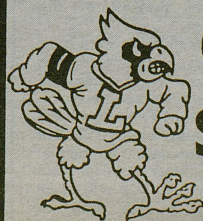
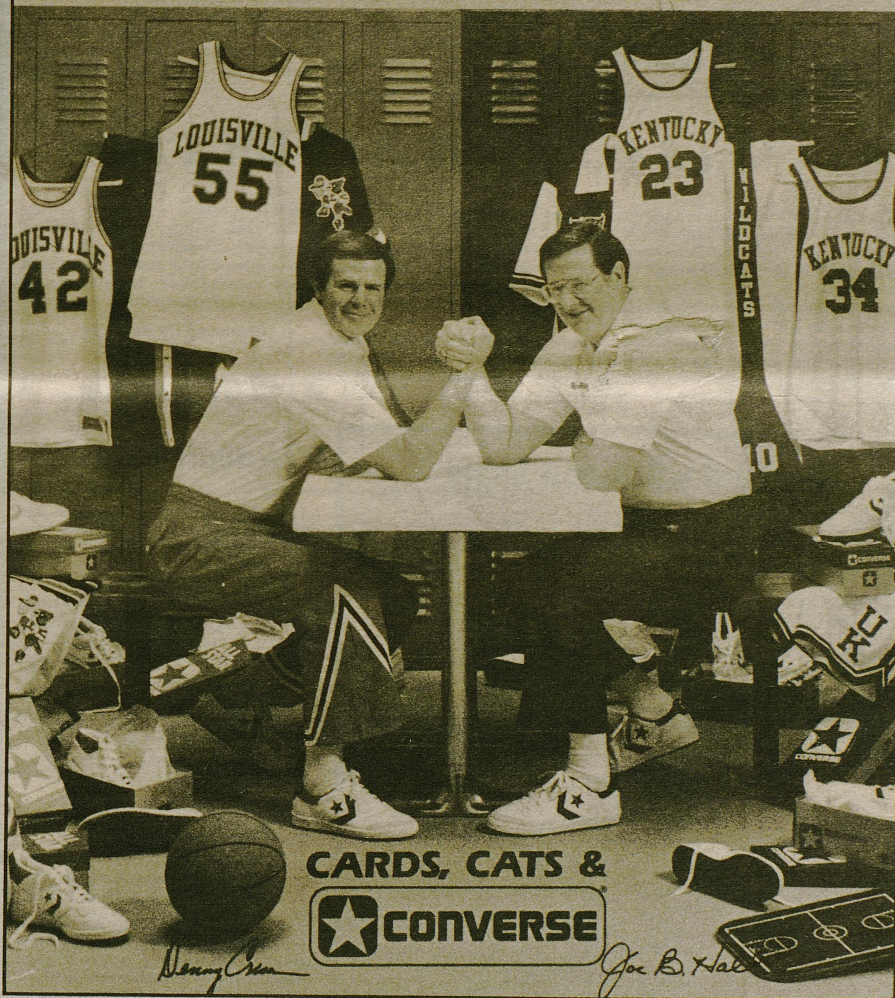

## UK To Hold Public Session In Louisville

A gigantic public shooting practice session will be held at Freedom Hall at 10 a.m. Saturday for Kentucky Wildcat fans.

Fans will be admitted free to the shooting practice which is being sponsored by WHAS Radio.

Such open practices have become customary in Louisville for the Wildcats on the morning of a UK game in Freedom Hall.

After the practice session, Coach Joe B. Hall and his players will sign autographs for fans.

In the past, anywhere from 8,000 to 12,000 fans have attended the practice sessions, but a new record could be on tap for Saturday.

Because Kentucky's official allotment of tickets for the game is just 100, fans who normally saw UK games in Freedom Hall won't have that opportunity this time around. Instead, they're expected to attend the practice session.

Also included at the 10 a.m. practice will be a short pep rally for the Wildcats. It probably will be the largest shift of support in the history of an arena.

At 10 a.m., Freedom Hall will be rocking with UK fans, only to witness the opposite at 8 p.m. that evening when the Cardinal fans take over.

Reportedly, free Wildcat shakers will be given to fans attending the practice session.

## Wildcats Cardinals At 8:50 PM

The Kentucky-Louisville clash on Saturday from Freedom Hall will tip-off at 8:50 p.m.

The game will be televised by Sports Productions, Inc., shown over a network of stations around the country. However, the game will not be shown on Atlanta Superstation WTBS.

In Kentucky, the game will be televised by WKYT-TV, Channel 27, in Lexington and WAVE-TV, Channel 3 in Louisville. Fans living in other sections of the country should consult their local stations to see if it is being televised in their area.

The game will also be broadcasted over the Kentucky Radio Network, including WHAS, 840 on the dial out of Louisville and WVLK Radio in Lexington.

### It's Just Not In The Cards For UK

It was to be a "Dream Game." But here we are, saddled with a combined 4-4 won-loss mark and the television people who put this particular package together must be taking a bath.

Sure, we're talking about Kentucky-Louisville, but outside the Commonwealth of Kentucky, fans could care less? Louisville, which zoomed high into the top ten a couple of weeks ago, came tumbling down with an exhibition loss to the Athletics In Action and were upset by Louisiana Tech in the Wendy's Classic.

Those weren't the big losses for Coach Denny Crum, however. His chief loss was Milt Wagner being sidelined for six to eight weeks with a bad foot. Still worse could be an entire year without Wagner.

And then there is Joe B. Hall. For the first time in his career at the University of Kentucky, a Joe Hall-coached team could be hit with a four-game losing streak. If Louisville wins Saturday, Hall has such a problem.

Kentucky has been hit with all kinds of injuries. Winston Bennett, Richard Madison, Kenny Walker, James Blackmon and even Leroy Byrd have all had the injury bug at one time or another since practice started October 15.

And the Wildcats are playing like they have some kind of a bug. If it's not one problem it's another. There have been some encouraging signs from time to time, but just when Hall believed the Cats were ready to play a full forty minutes, a breakdown would develop, either injuries to key inside people, lack of defense, lack of rebounding, or lack of offensive execution.

After UK's 13-point thrashing at the hands of IU last Saturday, Hall and his charges are back to the basics before they go before the most hostile crowd of the season.

If the young Cats think Purdue or IU fans were tough, well, they haven't seen anything yet.

It's been said that IU coach Bobby Knight would trade three Big 10 wins for just a single victory over Kentucky. Louisville fans would trade an entire month of wins for a victory over the Wildcats. And, perhaps, vice-versa.

But, outside the state, who cares? That, in effect, is what CBS-TV analyst Billy Packer told reporters in Bowling Green last weekend.

Asked to pick the outcome of the shootout, Packer responded, "it's impossible to predict and it doesn't mean anything. Now, if it was late January or February, that would be something else. It's just a nice regional game, but outside of Kentucky, who cares?"

Billy, try selling that to the 19,000 or so Big Red fans in Freedom Hall Saturday night, or try marketing that across the air waves to the thousands of UK fans who will be glued to a television set.

In Kentucky, it just ain't so.

When the two hit the floor, the outcome could very well depend on the play of the two teams' guards. Ironically, last year's two matches boiled down to a similar challenge.

In the first game, Kentucky's Jim Master, Roger Harden, James Blackmon and Dicky Beal outclassed the trio of Lancaster Gordon, Milt Wagner and Jeff Hall. In the second confrontation, UL's guards won the battle, but in both instances, the Wildcats came out winners.

A lot has changed in a few short months.

Beal and Master are no longer around, just as Gordon has departed the Louisville scene and Wagner is out with an injury.

Kentucky would appear to have an edge, at least on paper. But Ken-

tucky's guards have been a very, very major disappointment for the Big Blue this season. And their worst play of the young season came in Bloomington where the Hoosiers exposed the Cats' weakness.

Yet, the Cardinals have not exactly been world-beaters from a position which has been so valuable to past Louisville teams, teams which stress quickness out front and the ability to press teams, defensively.

With the sudden loss of Wagner, Crum has frantically been testing all kinds of new schemes to compensate for the loss of his star guard. He even tried forward Billy Thompson out front and "that really didn't work too well" Crum said earlier this week.

Yet, Crum isn't writing the game off as just another practice session.

"It ought to be an interesting game," observed Crum, "we both (UL and UK) have had early season problems. Kentucky is getting back from its injuries and ours have just started."

Crum said his biggest challenge is

creating new identities and roles for players as a result of Wagner's loss.

"We've not really had any time to adjust (to Wagner's loss) because of games last week," said Crum, "but we'll see what we can do this week. We just have to go out and play with what we've got."

Hall is also playing with what he's got, but he's not been impressed with his club's execution. Attitude? Yes, but not execution.

One of Hall's big problems has been adjusting his line-up because of key injuries to Bennett, Blackmon and to lesser degrees, Walker and Madison.

Bennett is believed to be at about sixty percent after missing several weeks of practice after knee surgery. In the two most recent games, Bennett appeared to be trying to hard to make up for lost time.

Madison wasn't expected to be a key contributor early because of his freshman status, but he was one of the few bright spots at Indiana and could be on the verge of acquiring a great deal more playing time.

Kentucky's inside game of Kenny Walker, Bret Bearup, Winston Bennett, Richard Madison and Robert Lock could have a slight edge over Billy Thompson, Manuel Forest, Mark McSwain and Barry Sumpter. The difference could be at the guard.

If Louisville had Milt Wagner in the line-up, this game could have had the looks for a blow-out of major league proportions, perhaps 20 to 25 points.

But Wagner is not in the line-up and for that reason, the game will be more of a game. Were the game played in Rupp Arena, Kentucky would stand a shot at playing a close game. But it isn't.

After all those decades of trying, Louisville finally has Kentucky where the Cards and their fans want them - in their own backyard at Freedom Hall.

Never mind that UK usually plays well at Freedom Hall. The Cats aren't playing Digger Phelps and Notre Dame this weekend. It'll be Louisville by 10 or so.

If predictions by the media are any indication, Louisville is the overwhelming favorite, but not by a huge margin. For instance, writers who regularly cover the two schools voted by better than a 3-1 margin in favor of UL.

Of the state's largest newspaper, there are split decisions. Louisville Courier-Journal sports editor Billy Reed says Louisville will win by a single point. Mike Sullivan who has

## Freedom Hall Will Not Lose Its Mystique

Just mentioning the name of Freedom Hall brings back many fond University of Kentucky basketball memories. Memories not only of the Wildcats, but other college, high school and pro hoop games as well. When Kentucky faces in-state rival Louisville Saturday in the remodeled home of the Cards, the arena may look different, but the unforgettable events will still be embedded on the red and gold Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center floor.

Even with the structural changes inside, additional seating, installation of the enclosed suits, and the new lighting, the ghost of basketball past, present, and future still remains at Freedom Hall.

Overall six NCAA championships have been played in the arena. The coveted college crown was awarded in Louisville during the years of 1958 (Kentucky), 1959 (California), 1962 (Cincinnati), 1963 (Loyola, Ill.), 1967 (UCLA), and 1969 (UCLA).

Here are just a few legendary Wildcat performances played at Freedom Hall.

### The Final Four in 1958

Kentucky, coached by Adolph Rupp, entered the Final Four with a 21-6 record. The other three teams in the field were: Temple, Kansas State, and Seattle.

UK was matched up against Temple in the semifinals. Temple came into the contest with a 26-2 slate, with one of those two losses coming early in the season against the Wildcats, 85-83 in triple-overtime. Led by the "Fiddlin' Five" -- Vern Hatton, Ed Beck, John Cox, Adrian Smith, and John Crigler -- Kentucky defeated Temple 61-60 to advance to the finals against Elgin Baylor and Seattle. Baylor won the outstanding player award, in the tournament, but UK won the overall battle 84-72. It was Rupp's fourth NCAA title in 11 years.

### Indiana-Kentucky December 11, 1971

At the time, I was only 11, but I do remember the performance of IU's 6-foot-8 center Steve Downing. I recall Downing scoring 47 points against the Wildcats' Jim Andrews as Indiana won the game in double-overtime 90-89. The Hoosiers were coached by a first-year instructor of the name of Bobby Knight. Kentucky entered the game ranked sixth in the nation. Andrews paced UK with 22 points followed by 5-9 guard Ronnie Lyons with 19.

### Indiana-Kentucky December, 15, 1975

No. 1 ranked Indiana came into Freedom Hall as a big favorite over the Wildcats. With All-America Kent Benson and Scott May, everyone in the state figured that the game was a mismatch. However UK, 2-2, gave Indiana its closest scare of their championship season.

The year before Kentucky had knocked off top-ranked Indiana 92-90 in the finals of the Midwest Regionals, so the Hoosiers were looking for revenge.

In the closing seconds Benson's uncanny tip-in tied the score at 64 and sent the game into overtime. IU outscored the upset-minded Cats 13-4 in the extra period to pull out the win 77-68. Lexington Bryan Station product Jack Givens led the Wildcats with 20 points.

Indiana finished the season with a perfect 32-0 record and the NCAA championship.

### Notre Dame-Kentucky December 30, 1978

Led by Truman Claytor and freshman sensation Dwight Anderson, Kentucky defeated the then undefeated and Top Ten ranked Irish 81-76.

With Kentucky trailing 65-53 midway through the second half, the Cats fought back to tie the score 70-70. Anderson poured in six of UK's proceeding eight points to secure the Kentucky victory. Claytor led the Wildcats in scoring with 18 points while Anderson finished with 17.

Other eye-catching events have been paraded in front of large Freedom Hall crowds.

Events such as Paul Hogue leading the Cincinnati Bearcats to their second straight NCAA championship. Twice UC upset Ohio State with All-American Jerry Lucas and John Havlicek. Cincinnati won the '62 championship game over the Buckeyes 71-59.

In 1967 the River City crowd was treated to the talents of UCLA's Lew Alcindor (Kareem Abdul-Jabbar), Houston's Elvin Hayes, and North Carolina's Don Chaney. The Bruins defeated Dayton in that tourney 79-64.

Two years later Coach John Wooden's squad again won the title in Louisville, this time beating Purdue, led by sharpshooter Rick Mount 92-72. For the third year in a row Alcindor was chosen the Final Four's MVP.

The Sweet 16 high school tourney also had some outstanding year's in Freedom Hall.

In 1963, Louisville Seneca with Mike Redd, Kentucky's Mr. Basketball, and with Wes Unseld won this particular "showcase of talent" event. Including Redd (Kentucky Wesleyan) and Unseld (University of Louisville and Washington Bullets) the tournament featured Taylor County's Clem Haskins (Western Kentucky and Washington Bullets), Princeton Dotson's brothers Greg Smith (WKU and the Milwaukee Bucks) and the late Dwight Smith (WKU), and Owensboro's Charles Taylor (Kentucky Wesleyan).

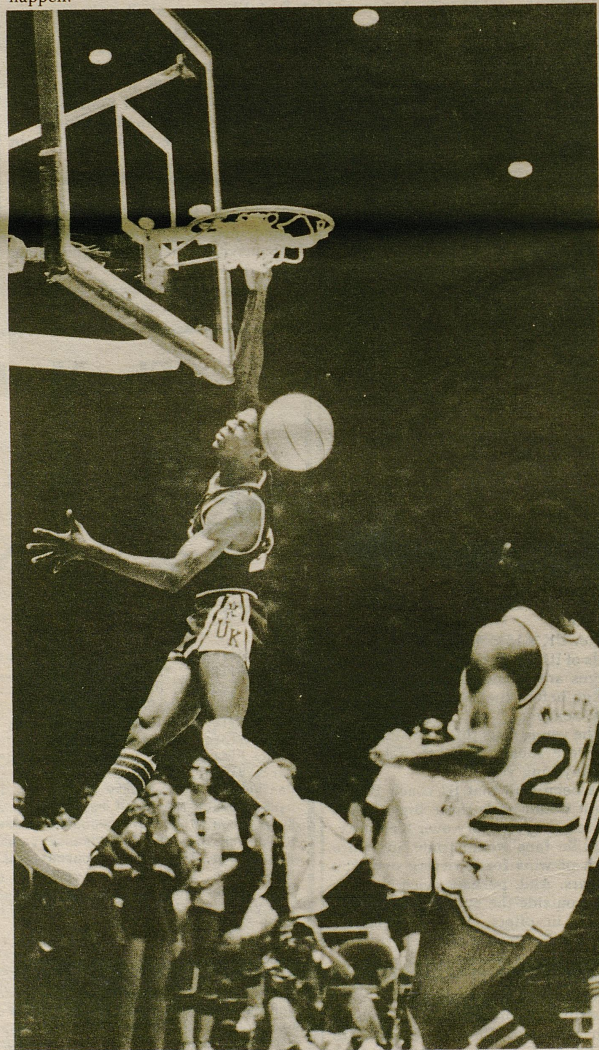
In 1965 Breckenridge County, with an enrollment of less than 300, won the elite Kentucky title. The team from western Kentucky was paced by former Louisville great and NBA star Butch Beard. Breckenridge County is best remembered for beating Jimmy Rose (Western) and Hazard in the semi-finals.

Bruin seniors Jeff Lamp and Lee Raker were instrumental in helping Ballard win the state championship in 1977. The two players went on to have fine careers at the University of Virginia.

Pro basketball in Louisville during the early 70's was just as exciting. Watching Gilmore, Dan Issel, the late Wendall Ladner, Cincy Powell, Ron Thomas, and other Kentucky Colonels was just plain fun. It was a shame that this team never got to show off their talents in the more publicized NBA.

Even though the Colonels only won one ABA title, they may have been the best team that league has ever produced.

With Dream Game IV less than 24 hours away, a certain beautified arena will be the host of another basketball confrontation. Yes, no matter how you look at it, Freedom Hall was, and still is a place for exciting things to happen.

The following are Joe B. Hall's postgame comments following Kentucky's 81-68 setback to Indiana Saturday.

Coach Hall: I would like to compliment Indiana, I thought they really played very sound, enthusiastic, and a aggressive ballclub. I was very impressed with Uwe Blab. He really got into the tempo of the game both offensively and defensively. (Steve) Alford was as good as I've seen him. He's a great player, and he certainly plays with coolness. He picks his shots very well and plays good defense. (Mike) Gioni is certainly an outstanding player, he owned the base line. He did a fine job taking the ball to the basket on the base line and hitting the jumper when he was open. DelRay Brooks with 10 assists had an outstanding game. For a freshman I thought (Brooks) played very, very well.

What about getting outrebounded 17-11 in the second half?

Coach Hall: I thought we got tired. We just weren't going to the boards. I thought Indiana picked up their block out assignments a little better in the second half.

## From The Locker Room

KENNY WALKER

(About the shooting of UK Guards)

The guards had a bad shooting day. We didn't get into our offensive patterns, and every time we did, someone busted the play. We just have to get better shot selection. We've got to choose better shots and get those shots to drop.

JAMES BLACKMON

(About his performance)

I was scoreless several times last year, but I didn't think I would be this year. Indiana played aggressive defense, but we weren't executing.

BRET BEARUP

(About Indiana)

They are a great-shooting ballclub, but maybe our defense had something to do with that. I know that when I tried to defense (Uwe) Blab, somehow, I'd wind up under the basket watching the ball come through the net.

(About IU's picks on offense)

You never play a team like Indiana

Did you plan to play Winston Bennett as much as you did?

Coach Hall: Yes, I thought we played Bennett a little too long, I thought he got tired. I thought when he fumbled the ball a couple of times he was getting tired. We didn't leave him in too long as far as I was concerned, but as far as he was concerned he needed the rest.

Coach, your team seemed to be forcing a lot of shots, was that the case?

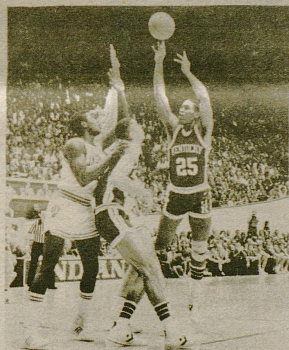
Coach Hall: I think we've very impatiently offensively. We're not executing our offense.

What about the play of your guards?

Coach Hall: We're not getting good guard play, and we're not getting the leadership. Every time we run a play somebody breaks down. This has been the case in every game we've played.

What about IU's last four points in the first half that gave them a 43-36 lead at intermission?

Coach Hall: We gave them two baskets at half. We had a rebound shook loose and they scored underneath. Then we had a player over-dribble and they got a fast break. Both of those hurt.

They shot, well, it was unbelievable. It seemed like every time I had Blab blocked out perfectly, the ball would go through the net.

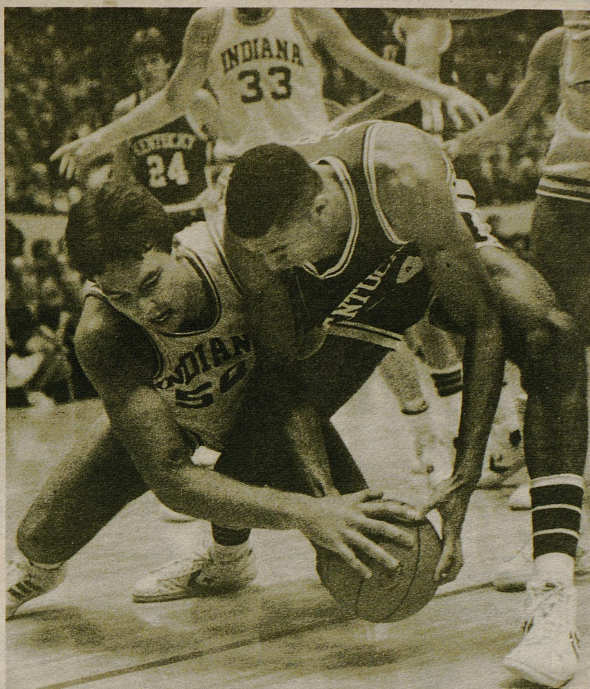
RICHARD MADISON

### Walker Taking Control Of The Ball

## Coach Bobby Knight's Comments

The following are Coach Bobby Knight's postgame comments following IU's victory over the Kentucky Wildcats in Bloomington Saturday.

Coach Knight: I thought the thing that was the big difference for us today, over other games that we've played this year, when things got away from us we were able to get back into the flow of the game. I don't think there was ever a point in the game when we lost control of the game. We went from a 10-point lead to a five-point lead in the second half. Any good team is going to make a couple of baskets or is going to make a little dent in what we do. We were able in the second half against Louisville and Notre Dame to make a dent in the play, but that was it. Those teams were able to shut us off and then do things that they had to. We were able to do that today throughout the course of the game. We came back and made some really good plays. We made more good plays today, when we had to, by far than in either of the other two games. I was really pleased with (DelRay) Brooks. Brooks is a very competitive kid and plays competitively. I think that spills over a little bit into what our other players are doing. I think this was his first game, as a starter, that he really handled himself well and handled what his responsibilities were.

What about the performance of your center Uwe Blab?

Coach Knight: I mentioned to him that he has sometimes not a completely clear idea of what good play is for him and what good play is not. I told him last year that when we played

Kentucky down there (Lexington) it was a game we could have very easily won. He didn't play particularly well, but he just played hard as he could. He rebounded well, he outrebounded (Melvin) Turpin and (Sam) Bowie together. That's what we were after from him. I thought he really played hard today. He dropped some passes and missed a couple of shots, but he made a lot of good plays. It wasn't like he played a perfect basketball game, but he did play very hard. ## Behind Every Successful Man Is A Woman

Among the near-24,000 spectators at every University of Kentucky home basketball game in Lexington's Rupp Arena sits the wife of probably the most famous coach in the world; Mrs. Joe B. Hall.

Nearly every fan in attendance knows where she sits, only a few rows back behind the Wildcat bench. And, like her husband, Katharine Hall is scrutinized as much, or even more, by the general public present at the games. Her reactions to what happens on the court are just as important to some people as the way Coach Hall responds to the ongoing scene.

Take, for example, the reports on last year's Mid-east Regional Championship game between UK and the University of Louisville in Knoxville, Tenn., that featured her now-famous confrontation with Courier-Journal Sports Editor Billy Reed. It was the first and only time I've ever read a negative report about a coaches' wife in a column by a sports writer. If it had been any other wife of nearly any other coach, the incident probably wouldn't have even been mentioned by the national media. But because she was Coach Hall's wife, and because of what she allegedly said to Reed, it was.

So Mrs. Hall, who doesn't describe herself as a "basketball wife," has to be careful about what she does every moment she is in the public eye. It's not always a pleasant way to live one's life, especially when one considers it's only a game and she's the wife of a basketball coach and not the coach himself. But at UK, basketball is a religion. To some people, Hall is like a God. And his wife and family had better live up to their expectations.

But for Katharine Hall, always the subject of people's curiosity, it's not a problem.

"I do not have an inferiority complex," she said. "I have an ego that's up. But I've never been a snob. Hey, we're all the same."

If being married to Joe Hall was such a pain, the former Katharine Dennis probably wouldn't have stayed around for 33 years, which was the wedding anniversary the Halls celebrated last Oct. 27. That's incredible because the Halls had what seemed to be a rather inauspicious beginning.

They eloped after dating for only one month.

"Joe was a super salesman," she said of Hall, who at the time was a representative for H.J. Heinz Products. "He was fun. He was sincere. And he was persistent. I've never changed that first impression of him."

"We got married in Lexington," she continued. "A friend asked the county clerk to open the courthouse in the middle of the night for us. We were married by the minister of a church I attended, the Rev. O. Ray Weeks, who was the minister at Porter Memorial Baptist. The only people present were Joe's brother, Bill, and his wife and child, my best friend and another couple we knew. Our parents found out

the next day, but not from us."

The Halls were accompanied by the couple present at their wedding to a brief honeymoon in Tennessee. After all, there wasn't much they could do with the \$220 the Halls had between them. Upon their return home, the newlyweds received a mixed reaction from their parents.

"Joe's mother and daddy were wonderful," she said. "My mother was wonderful in about a week."

Hall and Dennis had known each other for years when they married. They're both from the town of Cynthiana in Harrison County. Hall was three years older than Dennis and attended another high school, but she knew of him.

"I wasn't a sports fan, but I had heard of Joe Hall," she said. "He was Mr. Basketball and Mr. Football. He was team captain. He was president of his class all four years. He was president of the honor society."

Hall went on to graduate from Cynthiana High and later played basketball at the University of Kentucky during the "Fabulous Five" era before transferring to the University of the South at Seawane, Tenn. Meanwhile, Dennis went on to graduate from the now-defunct Berry High. The school was so small there were only 12 students in her graduating class. They eventually met at UK and Hall courted her

while she was teaching school in Pendleton County.

"He made it a point to come by and see me at the school," she said.

But Hall wasn't content working in the industrial field and decided to enter the coaching profession. He applied through the UK Placement Service and began his coaching career at Shepherdsville (Ky.) High School. From there the Halls went to Regis College in Denver, Colorado and Central Missouri State College in Warrensburg, Mo., before returning to UK in 1965, where Hall was hired as an assistant coach by the late Adolph Rupp.

"We did not want an 8-5 job," said Mrs. Hall. "We needed total involvement in something. It's been so interesting. It's been a great life."

The first years of marriage were tough for Mrs. Hall.

"Everybody responds to everything differently," she explained. "It isn't always easy to compromise. One person has to be dominant, with input from the other one. Joe is the dominant partner in our relationship but, believe me, he gets my input."

As time passed, she found marriage was very much to her liking.

"When I had been married for 17 years, I said, 'Gosh, marriage is fun,'" she said. "A lot of people don't work through difficult times. But, for me, it's fun, great, fantastic."

While Mrs. Hall was delighted to return home in 1965, she's never forgotten the good times the Halls spent in Colorado and Missouri.

"Colorado was marvelous," she said. "The weather, the people, everything was great. Joe and I both like new adventures."

But in the early years, Joe Hall and his family really had to work hard.

The Halls have three children — Mrs. Mike (Kathy) Summers of College Station, Texas; Mrs. Rick (Judy) Derrickson and Steve of Lexington. Mike Summers is on Jackie Sherrill's football staff at Texas A&M. Steve recently graduated from college. There are two grandchildren — Jeffrey Hall Derrickson, 2, and Katharine Amy Summers, 1.

"Our family and friends are the glue that holds everything together," Mrs. Hall

said. "The children are all avid followers of UK sports. I think that if a family allowed, the father's work position could become an all-consuming experience. But Joe never wanted basketball to dominate our family. We have shelves of trophies and plaques down in the family room in the basement. That's the only place we have them. As Joe always said, it's our home, not his. It's for our family and friends."

Mrs. Hall says her husband is a realist, while she is an idealist.

"I want a different relationship with the players," she explained. "I want the kind of relationship that made Kyle Macy (a former UK All-American) come up to our door at 10 p.m. one evening and ask to spend the night because he had a terrible cold. I am very tenderhearted and warm. I've been known to pace the floor when I knew Joe was making a player run the wall. I have expressed sympathy for them."

But Mrs. Hall doesn't let herself become too involved with her husband's job. She doesn't attend too many away games, for example.

"I'm more like (St. John's head coach) Lou Carnesecca's wife," she said. "She said she wouldn't be in the courtroom while he was defending a client. I'm more that way. I know nothing about the sport. When Joe first started coaching in high school, I told one of the players they had played a good game. Joe said later that player had played a terrible game. And I've never cried about a basketball game."

Mrs. Hall believes her husband is right about 99 percent of the time, especially when it comes to referees.

"I think it's (the coaches' box) a little ridiculous," she said. "I think they should have a box for all the sports, not just basketball. Joe's got to watch 10 people going in all directions."

Many people have said Joe's got big, broad shoulders," she continued. "Well, you need it to be a coach. There are a lot of things you don't have any control over." Like reporters.

"I think one thing that's very unfortunate is that most people believe what they read is true," Mrs. Hall said. "In truth, no one can report anything accurately. A reporter is influenced by so many factors; like past experience, other writers and his or her respective background. Some reporters may have ulterior motives for what they write. I think anybody in the public eye is seldom what they are reported to be."

Some reporters have spread the image of Joe Hall as an uptight, intense man who doesn't let his players have any fun and therefore limits the expressive talents of the individuals donning the blue and white each season.

For example, at the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Basketball Championship in 1978 at St. Louis, the media's main focus was not Kentucky versus Duke University, but on an uptight (UK) team playing a free-wheeling (Duke), young squad that had nothing to lose against Kentucky and was having all the fun.

But Mrs. Hall says her husband is not like that at all.

"He's not uptight," she said. "He's the least uptight person I've ever known in my life. He's so logical and rational in pressure situations and not at all affected by outside influences. He's very much in control. Joe doesn't have ulcers, gray hair or high blood pressure."

Mrs. Hall compares coaching to politics, only that in coaching you have an election at every game while in the political arena it's once every three or four years.

So Mrs. Hall and her famous husband begin their 20th season at Kentucky, with much hope and many expectations for the future. And she doesn't seem to mind it one bit.

"I think having an ego definitely helps," she said. "I don't need anything outside of myself. I enjoy my family and friends. Life is wonderful."

## But Stars Walker, Thompson Know Their Roles

Kenny Walker of Kentucky and Billy Thompson of Louisville will be on opposite sides tonight when the Cats take on the Cardinals in Freedom Hall. However, the two junior forwards have the same pressure-packed responsibility — trying to lead their team while living up to huge expectations.

Many college recruiters considered Thompson, a product of Camden, N.J., the best high school prospect in the country in 1982. Walker was second on some lists and high on every recruiting poll. They were tagged as future superstars.

"That's an awful big price to put on any kid," says Walker, who lives in Roberta, Ga. "For the media or recruiters to tab a kid as the best in the country is tough to live up to. And if the kid starts believing that stuff he can get soft."

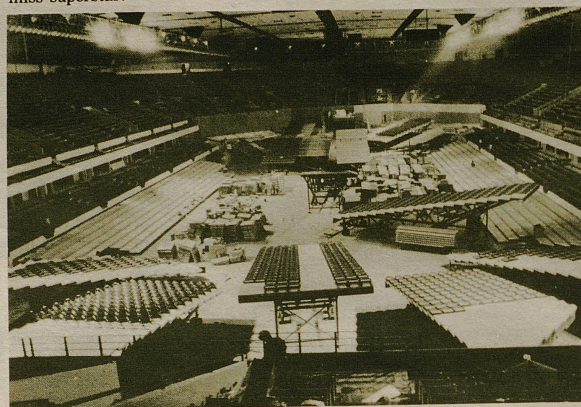
"All my life I've have to claw and scratch for everything I've got. That's why I'm going to keep on doing even though people are saying I have to be the star on this team. But no matter what people say Kenny Walker will always play hard."

Louisville assistant coach Jerry Jones knows Walker means exactly what he says. Jones has seen how pressure has haunted Thompson since his arrival in Louisville.

"We've tried to tell Billy that he doesn't have to please anybody but the team," says Jones. "And he doesn't have to score points to be valuable to

our team. He's just a good overall player.

"Walker and Thompson are both great players who do a lot of jobs for their teams. I know we would be lost without Billy and I don't imagine Kentucky would want to give up Walker. You just can't measure the true value of a player like Billy Thompson or Kenny Walker to a team."

This season, though, both Walker and Thompson must produce big numbers for their teams to win. Kentucky lost four starters off last year's 29-5 Final Four team. The departure of 7-4 Gunther Behnke and a knee injury to rugged Winston Bennett have put even more scoring and rebounding pressure on Walker's shoulders.

But Thompson can sympathize with that situation. Louisville lost two starters off last year's team and two weeks ago senior guard Milt Wagner, the team's top scorer, broke a bone in his foot. He will be out six weeks. To

make matters worse, senior forward Manuel Forrest has been hampered by an ankle injury.

"We can't win if Thompson isn't in there playing his game," says Jones. "He can make every other player on the floor a better player the same way Walker can at Kentucky. They can draw defensive pressure but still score and rebound. And when defenses concentrate on one player it leaves other things open."

"When you take a Thompson or Walker out of a game it makes a coach

"It took me to the end of my freshman year to start feeling comfortable," says Walker, the prep player of the year in Georgia three seasons ago. "Thank goodness I was lucky enough to play behind (Derrick) Hord and (Charles) Hurt so I didn't have to be pushed."

But Jones says athletes have feelings, too, and those feelings can be bruised as easily as their bodies. He says, "Expectations are too high for most kids when they come out of high school. It's natural for a kid to read how good he is supposed to be and how he isn't living up to that. It hurts because athletes are human beings, too."

It's even tougher when injuries complicate matters. Walker played more than any other Wildcat last year despite frequent muscle spasms in his back. A sprained Achilles tendon also hobbled him at the Final Four and Olympic tryouts.

Thompson missed one game last year with a back injury. He missed three contests with a knee injury and played the last month of the season at less than full speed because of the knee sprain.

But both players still produced. Walker was the number two scorer (12.4 points) and number three rebounder (5.9) for the Cats last year. He scored at least 10 points in all but eight games last campaign and his last-second hoop beat Auburn for the championship of the Southeastern Conference Tournament.

Last season Thompson ranked among the top three Cardinals in assists, rebounds, blocked shots and dunks while averaging 9.2 points per game. He scored in double figures 13 times and Louisville was 12-1 in those games.

Thompson, an excellent passer, also had five or more assists in 12 games. Both Walker and Thompson, though, have had "off" games when Kentucky and Louisville have met three times during the past two seasons. Thompson scored only four points in each game and grabbed only 13 rebounds total. Walker has 23 points and 10 rebounds in the three previous meetings.

Look for both to have much better games tonight.

UK FANS lucky enough to have tickets to the Louisville game will get their first look at renovated Freedom Hall.

The facility now seats 19,000 after a \$13.3 million renovation after the end of the 1983-84 basketball season. Over 2,000 seats were added along with a \$1 million scoreboard that can flash pictures of the Cardinals, \$750,000 lighting system, sound system, and a heating and air conditioning system.

Thirty-six midlevel luxury boxes have also been added. Of the 36 boxes 24 have sightlines to the floor for basketball. New dressing rooms for the Cardinals and their visitors have been added along with a new press room and interview room.

Thanks to the renovation Freedom Hall again has to rank among the finest basketball facilities in the country.

## Cats Take It on The Chin For The Third Time

Maybe the SEC sportswriters will now listen to Coach Joe Hall. Preseason predictions pointed toward UK battling it out with LSU for the SEC title in 1985. But after the Indiana contest Saturday, the Wildcats are far from challenging Dale Brown's Tigers for conference supremacy.

Before a national televised audience Indiana handed Kentucky its third straight defeat 81-68 before 17,214 Hoosier fans. the play of UK's guards was a major disappointment. Starters Roger Harden and James Blackmon failed to score. The other UK guards -- Paul Andrews (2), Troy McKinley (0), and Ed Davender (6) -- combined for eight points.

Not since 1976 has UK lost three straight regular season games. Kentucky, which won the NIT in '76, lost three games on the road: Tennessee 92-85, Georgia 86-81, and Vanderbilt 69-65. UK now 1-3, will take on Louisville minus star guard Milt Wagner today at Freedom Hall (8:10 p.m. CDT).

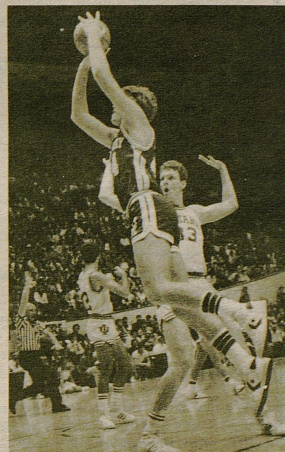
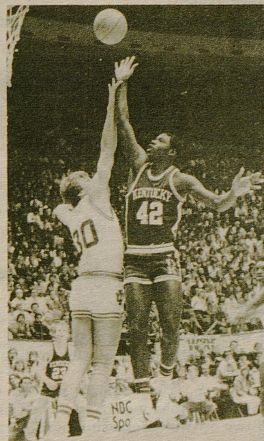
## The Win Marks Knight's Ninth Against The Wildcats

Since taking over the IU coaching duties in 1971 the victory was the ninth for Bobby Knight against the Wildcats. The win also earned the 1984 Olympic coach his 400th overall. Knight's record against Kentucky is 9-8 while Hall is 8-8.

## First Half Collapse Propells Hoosiers

Kentucky started off well at Assembly Hall. The Wildcats had leads of 4-0 and 7-4 before the Hoosiers took over.

Uwe Blab, Mike Giomi, and Steve Alford added the spark to the Hoosier's first-half surge. With the Hoosiers trailing 7-6 Blab went to work. After IU easily handled UK's semi-press, freshman Delray Brooks twice spotted Blab underneath. Both times Blab connected as the home team went out in front 10-7.

Bret Bearup's contribution in the first half kept Kentucky in the contest. The 6-foot-9 senior scored 12 points on four field goals and was four of four from the charity stripe. He also pulled down seven rebounds, handed out two assists, and had a vicious rejection of a Giomi shot during the first 20 minutes. Bearup's play was the bright spot in the first half, but UK's last 26 seconds were a nightmare.

Freshman Richard Madison's three-point play cut IU's lead to 39-36 with 52 seconds left in the half. After a rebound Alford, due to a UK collapse, found an open Giomi for a layup to widen the margin to five. Kentucky tried to set up a last second shot, however Madison lost control of the ball as Brooks took the pass from Giomi and laid the ball in while the buzzer sounded. First half score: **Indiana 43, Kentucky 36.**

Giomi led the Hoosiers in scoring during the first half with 13 points followed by Blab with 10. Brooks, who played the entire contest, had six first-half assists.

Walker was whistled for his third foul with 11:06 remaining in the first stanza and sat on the bench until the end of the half. While being double and tripled teamed at times, the 6-8 junior forward tossed in seven first-period points. Madson, Walker's replacement, hit on two of two field goals and three free throws for seven first half points. Indiana outshot the visitors from the field 64 percent to 35 percent. Meanwhile on the boards, Kentucky outrebounded the Hoosiers 21 to 13.

## Alford Shows Off His Olympic Talents

Alford, a hustling, sharpshooter in the mold of Coach Knight's guards in past seasons, tooled on the Kentucky 2-3 zone. Time after time in the second half the IU offense would set picks on the Wildcat players freeing Alford for the baseline jumper. The '84 Olympic player took advantage of the situation and burned the nets for four field goals during the opening six minutes of the second half. With 14:47 left IU had opened the margin to nine, 51-42.

The 6-2 sophomore guard hit an unbelievable eight of nine field goals in the second half to aid in the Hoosier runaway. In 39 minutes of action Alford scored 24 points, grabbed six rebounds, and dished out seven assists.

## Kentucky Gets No Closer Than Five

The quick start by Indiana in the second half initiated the Red and Cream support. Kentucky got within five, 59-54, when Harden, a former Indiana prep phenom, passed to an open Madison who connected from 20 feet. But the Hoosiers outscored the Cats 18-6 in taking a 77-60 advantage with only 3:12 to play. From a Kentucky point of view, the game was out of control.

During a television timeout the IU cheerleaders took their red IU flag and paraded around the court while the jazzed up Hoosier band played the theme from the Lone Ranger. Hoosier backers were loving every bit of the route.

Kentucky was led in scoring by Walker and Madison with 16 points apiece. Bearup was held to one point in the second half, giving him a total of 13. He also pulled down 11 boards for the game.

Indiana finished the contest with a hot 66 percent from the field. UK shot 41 percent. After being outrebounded in the first half, IU went to the boards strong and finished the contest with 30 rebounds compared to the Wildcats 32.

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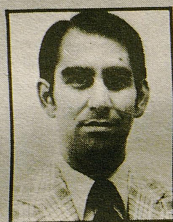
# A Defensive Struggle: 191 Points

"That turned it into a transitional game. You couldn't pattern your offense. We'd have to send players long for the inbounds pass. Once you got it in, there would be a lot of three-on-two or two-on-one situations because they were moving on the break."

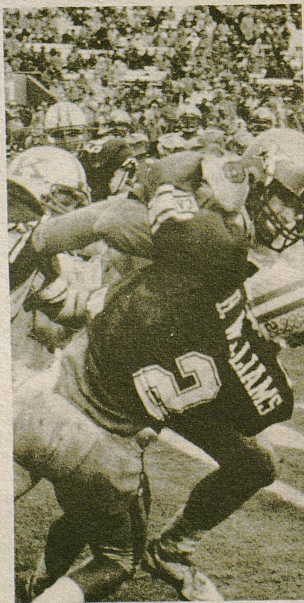

\*Georgia's **Kevin Butler** closed out his career with 353 points, the all-time SEC record and third best in NCAA history. Butler also finished first all-time in conference history and second best in NCAA annals with 77 career field goals. Tennessee senior **Fuad Reveiz**, the SEC single-season record holder with 27 field goals in 1982, finished with 71 field goals, second best in SEC history. His 314 career points tie him with **Herschel Walker** for second place in SEC scoring. Prior to 1982, no SEC kicker ever made 20 field goals in a season, but three '84 seniors, Butler and Reveiz, along with Florida's **Bobby Raymond**, did it a combined total of five times. Reveiz twice hit the 20-mark with 27 in 1982 and 20 in 1984. Raymond had successive 20 field goal seasons with 20 in '83 and 23 in '84. Butler never hit the 20 figure until this season, one in which he was successful 23 times. Raymond, who twice in his career had six field goal games (ties the NCAA record), set the SEC career record for field goal efficiency, connecting on 43 of 49 for an 87.8 accuracy ration. The previous conference mark had been 80.5 percent by **Berj Yepremian** of Florida (29 of 35) in 1976-78.



## Central Off To Quick Start

Last season, the boys' basketball team at Muhlenberg Central High School learned how much fun winning can be. It posted a 25-9 record, only its second winning season in the previous 10.

This year, the fun has continued. Muhlenberg Central won its first eight games, exciting its fans while creating pressure it's not used to feeling.

"Everybody's really getting caught up in it here," Muhlenberg Central coach Dale Todd said. "Our crowds have more than doubled from two years ago. We pack our gym every game now (capacity 2,500). But they're not coming to see us lose. They're expecting great things from us."

Muhlenberg Central's charmed life ended last Friday, in its ninth game of the year. It lost to a Second Region contender, Hopkinsville.

"That was our first really big test," Todd said. "They're a good, experienced club. It gave us a chance to see how good we were."

Regardless, Todd said that, for now, his team is quite good enough. And, he expected it to be, since the team had four starters returning. "Somehow, we've never been able to have a really experienced club," Todd said. "That really helps in basketball. Experience has helped us get off the start we've had."

The one starting spot Todd had to fill caused him much concern -- center. Todd's worry turned to delight, however, when his center designate, Joey Wells, plugged the gap with more-than adequate potency.

Wells, a 6-foot-6 junior, averaged 13.5 points a game through Muhlenberg Central's first seven contests. He boosted that average during that stretch by scoring 20 points in his team's 70-58 win over Central City, and in a 73-44 rout of Greenville.

"Joey has really been surprising the way he's scored and helped us," Todd said. "We knew he had the size to play the position, but we didn't know how quickly he'd come around in game situations. But he hasn't seemed to have any real problem."

Wells' play also allayed Todd's greatest fear -- that the cohesiveness of the team might suffer until Wells came around.

"Joey worked hard enough on weights and at camps over the summer that we felt sure he could play," Todd said. "But I wondered how well he'd fit in with the other players. You always have to wonder about your

they've been out there."

Heading the talented group of returnees is guard Gary Lile. The 5-11, 165-pound Lile averaged 22 points a game through the first seven games, and hit 56 percent from the field and 80 percent from the free-throw line. Lile scored 26 points in Muhlenberg Central's 74-68 win over Drakesboro.

Todd likened Lile to another Kentuckian, 5-11 Vanderbilt senior Phil Cox from Harlan County. "They're both pure shooters," Todd said. "Gary can move well to the ball, but he probably needs to become stronger in his ability to handle the ball. He's never played

player. Darren is the better defensive player," Todd said. "But they both make the team a lot stronger."

Duane Harvey contributed strong offense on a night when both Lile and brother Darren were sidelined with the flu. Duane hit 13 of 16 shots from the field and scored 29 points to lead Muhlenberg Central to a 72-68 decision over Dawson Springs. That score was a bit deceiving; Muhlenberg Central held an 18-point fourth-quarter lead.

The bench has helped Muhlenberg Central to its fast start, too. Bobby Tarrant, a 6-6 forward, has given the team strong rebounding. John Smith, a 5-10 guard, has contributed quickness and sound defensive skills.

"John's stronger than he looks," Todd said. "He weighs 190, and he's very valuable to us as an inside guard. He can jump well and he doesn't mind mixing it up."

Still, the question might persist for a while: How good is Muhlenberg Central? Todd said the answer may come during the Christmas holidays. That's when his team will participate in the annual Owensboro Invitational Tournament, scheduled for Dec. 26-29 at the Owensboro Sportscenter.

Included in the field for the tournament are the two teams generally regarded as the favorites in the Third Region -- Owensboro and Apollo.

"Either of those two are hard to beat at the Sportscenter," Todd said. "It's like their home floor. But we'll play our best and see what happens. We hope we get to play them."

Should Muhlenberg Central play, and defeat, either Owensboro or Apollo, fans in Muhlenberg County will have even more reason to be excited.

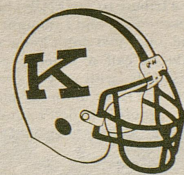
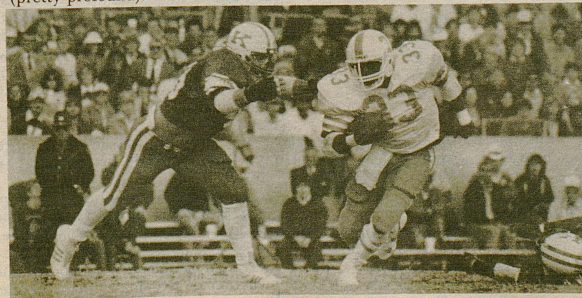

## Coach Joe B. Hall's Postgame Comments

The following are Coach Joe B. Hall's postgame comments following Kentucky's 56-54 loss to SMU last Tuesday night.

Coach Hall: SMU was a very poised ballclub. They did what they had to do in the last few minutes, the last half minute, and the last 10 seconds. They did exactly what we thought they'd do. (Assistant) Jim Hatfield scouted them. He told the team during the timeout that (Butch) Moore would collapse. What I really couldn't understand is why we couldn't get the timeout. I really cannot understand why we didn't get the timeout. Is there anybody in here (pressroom) who didn't see players all over the floor signal "T's" or calling time? (Could) three referees who could expect such a thing in such a game, not see it? I don't understand it. I did not understand why we could not get a timeout. I know (Bret) Bearup signaled just as soon as the ball went through the basket. Somebody put a "T" right in the official's face coming up the floor. That is just hard for me to swallow. Not that we would have won the ballgame, I take nothing away from SMU they're a fine ballclub. (Jon) Koncak is an excellent rebounder and is a strong force inside. (Carl) Wright had a tremendous first half. Their press upset us tremendously early. However, SMU made more turnovers than we did for the night, so I guess we evened that up with hustle. I'm really proud of our players the way they played and how hard they worked. To shoot 37 percent from the field and have a chance to win was quite a tribute to their (UK) hustle and aggressiveness and I thought they did a good job. I just don't know what you can do to call a timeout any more aggressively with any more compliance to the rules, than our players did to be ignore. I don't understand.

Maybe we ought to go back to two officials. Being ignored by three is a bigger insult than being ignored by two.

**Did you ask the referees at the end of the contest why there was no timeout?**

Coach Hall: Well, it's a bad time to ask them when they're going off the floor. They're never going to come back out and say, 'hey, he's right, that guy did signal a timeout.' That was the most obvious no-call I've ever seen.

**Did you stick to your game play?**

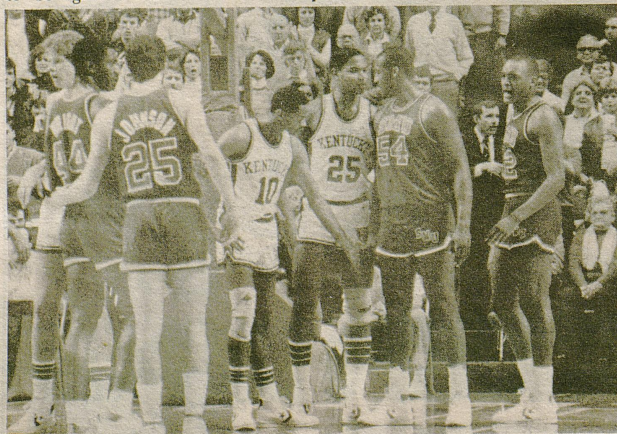
Coach Hall: I thought we played about as well as we could play. We didn't shoot as well as we could shoot. I hope we can get over the jitters to where we can shoot the ball. I thought their press upset us early, we didn't respond well to it. That (the press) got us off to a bad start.

**How did Moore get open for the winning shot?**

Coach Hall: He (Moore) kept the ball alive on his dribble. He went over to the left side, as I looked down the floor, and beat Blackmon and took it to the middle. At least one player or maybe more could have dropped off and stopped the penetration. It was a time situation, with the score tied and seven seconds to go it wasn't a time to collapse defensively. I don't want to bring it down to one play. We made a lot of mistakes. I give the credit to SMU. They did what they intended to do and did it very well.

**How much time will it take to go over the mistakes you made tonight?**

Coach Hall: I just don't know how much time it's going to take. We didn't play the 2-3 zone properly tonight. I hate to go back and have to reteach the 2-3 zone. That bothers me. We're just making youthful mistakes. They're just coming in so many ways, and there are so many of them that we don't know where to start.

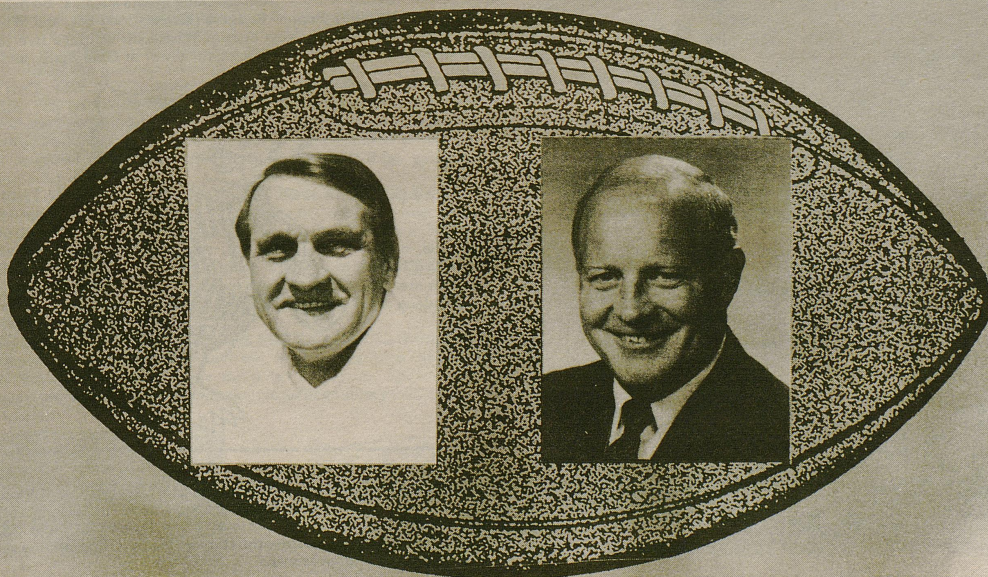

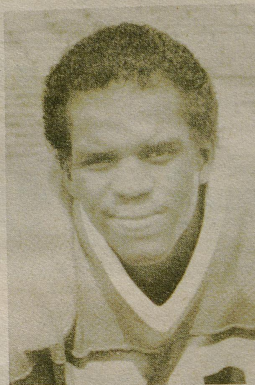

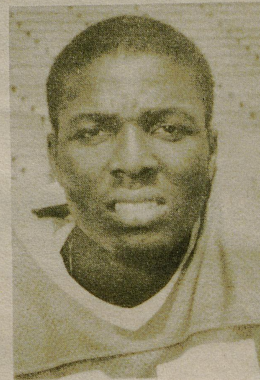

Coach Jerry Claiborne's Kentucky Wildcats will face Dave McClain's Wisconsin Badgers December 29 in the eighth annual Hall of Fame Bowl. The site of the first meeting between these two teams will be played at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. Kickoff time is 7 p.m. CST.

Here are some interesting notes about the Wildcats' Big Ten opponent. Wisconsin, 7-3-1, finished the season with a bang. In their last five contests the Badgers battled four '84-85 bowl teams. They defeated Indiana 20-16, upset visiting Ohio State 16-14 (Rose Bowl-bound), tied host Iowa 10-10 (Freedom Bowl), drilled Purdue 30-13 in Madison (Peach Bowl), and knocked off Michigan State in East Lansing 20-10 . . . The Badgers completed their nine-game conference slate with a 5-3-1 record which tied them with Iowa for fourth place in the Big Ten . . . This season their overall record was second only to Ohio State's (In relation to other Big Ten teams), a team Wisconsin beat in '84 . . . Only the 8-2 Badger squad coached by Milt Bruhn in 1962 had a better overall record than the 1984 team . . . During their 11-game schedule Wisconsin averaged 20.3 points a game while giving up only 16.9 tallies. . . In Big Ten statistics the '84 Badgers are ranked first in passing defense (164.27 yards per game), second in total defense (294.90 ypg.), third in rushing defense (130.63 ypg.), fourth in scoring defense (16.90 points per game), third in rushing offense (188.36 ypg.), sixth in passing offense (174.91 ypg.), and fifth in total offense (363.27 ypg.) and scoring offense (20.27 ypg.) . . . Nationally Wisconsin ranks 18th in total defense 19th in rushing defense . . . Wisconsin's most publicized player, Al Toon, is worthy of all the talk created by the media. The 6-foot-4, 195-pound split end was named to the 1984 Playboy America team, selected to first-team All-Big Ten status in '83, and was picked as the Badgers' Most Valuable Player for the past two seasons. During his three years as a Wisconsin football player Toon caught a school record 127 passes for 2,055 yards and 19 touchdowns. He earned the Midwest Player of the Week honors against Purdue last season as he was on the receiving end of eight receptions for 252 yards (NCAA Division I high high for the 1983 season). Toon also earned All-America honors in track in 1983 and 1984. His specialty is the triple jump. Toon won the Big Ten Outdoor triple jump title in 1983 and the Big Ten Indoor and Outdoor triple jump event in 1984. The senior from Newport News, Va., attended last June's U.S. Olympic Trials in Los

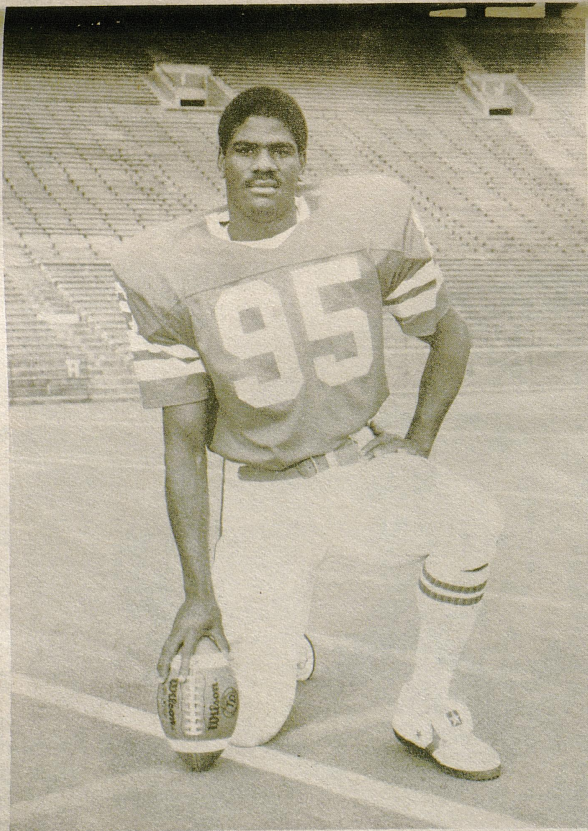

Angeles . . . Wide receiver and punt return specialist Thad McFadden will be looking to give the Cats' secondary fits. The 6-2 190 pound receiver has a career total of 2,246 all-purpose yards, which 829 is related to receiving duties, 656 on punt returns, 518 on kickoff returns, and 243 rushing. McFadden is a four-year letterman for the Badgers . . . Anchoring the defense is inside linebacker Jim Melka. The 6-2, 230-pound product of West Allis, Wis., led the team in tackles with 113 (54 solo, and 59 assists). Last year Melka had 111 tackles to his credit. He was named to the '83 UPI (Coaches) All-Big Ten team and was the Badgers' 1983 defensive player of the year . . . Two sophomore linebackers Rick Graf (nicknamed Thunder) and Tim Jordan (Lightning) -- could give Bill Ransdell and troops trouble. Graf, a 6-5 230 pound defender, was credited with 67 tackles ranking him third on this year's squad. Jordan, a 6-3 216 pound linebacker, had 64 total tackles including a team leading statistic of 12 behind-the-line hits that resulted in losses of 78 yards . . . Two top-quality Badgers that will miss the bowl game due to injuries sustained during the season are tailback Larry Emery and inside linebacker Michael Reid. Emery was the team's leading rusher with 675 yards before being hurt in Wisconsin's seventh game (Indiana). Reid led the team in tackles with 79 until the sophomore broke his thumb . . . The Big Ten team is 1-4 in postseason play. However, Wisconsin has participated in bowl games two of the last four years: beating Kansas State 14-3 in the Independence Bowl (1982), and losing to Tennessee in the Garden State Bowl 28-21 (1981) . . . Coach McLain's overall head coaching record is 87-60-6. He held the coaching job at Ball State starting in 1971 before leaving in 1978 to take over the head position at Wisconsin. While as an assistant McLain learned from coaching greats such as: Bo Schembechler (Miami, OH 1963-66), Pepper Rodgers (Kansas 1967-68), and Woody Hayes (Ohio State 1969-70) . . . Next season Wisconsin will face five '84-85 bowl teams (Nevada-Las Vegas, at Michigan, Iowa, at Ohio State, and Michigan State).

Here's an outlook of all the bowl games which will get under way in this week.

**CALIFORNIA BOWL** - Not much information to go on these two teams. Central Michigan was the Mid-American Conference champion while Nevada-Las Vegas took the Pacific Coast Conference crown. UNLV has one of the top quarterbacks in the nation in Randall Cunningham. Behind Cunningham's passing arm, let's make it **UNLV by 6**.

**INDEPENDENCE BOWL** - Despite playing a rather weak schedule the past two years, Bill Dooley's Virginia Tech's squad finished the season with wins over Tulane and Vanderbilt and a near upset of Clemson. 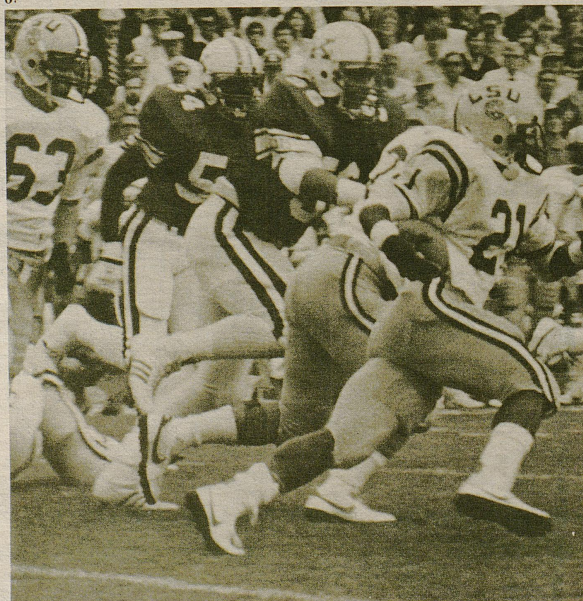

# CFA Notes Attendance Rising

College football

Attendance figures were released last week by the College Football Association and the 63 member institution said that average attendance "increased by more than 500 fans per game in 1984."

CFA teams averaged 44,673, up from 44,138 last year. CFA officials were crowing, "This, despite the proliferation of television games that many thought would have a negative impact on attendance."

Twenty-five CFA teams increased attendance significantly while 15 dropped substantially, and the other 23 stayed about the same, the report said.

Tennessee was "attendance champion" averaging 93,000 for seven home games. Penn State was next, 85,000 and Georgia third, 82,000.

Officially, the University of Kentucky reported an average of 55,423 for seven home dates.

In 1983 UK reported an average of 54,242.

Louisville? Coach Howard Schnellenberger no doubt commented "there's no where to go but up," when he saw that the 1984 Cardinals attracted an average 24,145. But that's up from 1983's average, 23,468.

Incidentally, in ball park numbers Schnellenberger's reported base salary of \$90,000 per year from the University of Louisville is estimated to be about \$30,000 more than UK's Jerry Claiborne. Of course, radio and television considerations for both coaches increases their total income numbers to well into six figures.

About Schnellenberger's hiring, I'm inclined to agree with Roger Gruneisen, football coach at Trinity High School, when he said if Schnellenberger does not produce a winner in five years then fans will be howling for his hide just the way they did for Bob Weber's.

### Rivalries

What are the top college football rivalries in America? According to a poll by the Dallas Morning News the top four are Alabama-Auburn, Oklahoma-Texas, Michigan-Ohio State and Oklahoma-Nebraska.

■ About the Alabama-Auburn series Auburn sports information director David Housel says, "It's like the Civil War. It pits family against family. Believe me, it's as vicious as that."

■ About the Oklahoma-Nebraska series — The winner of the game usually gets to spend Christmas vacation in Miami. When you live in Nebraska, that's enough to hate anybody for.

The next six best rivalries are Georgia-Florida, Southern Cal-UCLA, Army-Navy, Pitt-West Virginia, Southern Cal-Notre Dame and Clemson-South Carolina.

The Florida-Georgia game is called the world's largest outdoor cocktail party. The USC-UCLA game, according to commentator Beano Cook, rates "way up there as far as animosity goes. It's the private school (USC) versus the state university. It's the middle class against the elitists among the fans. It's awfully bitter."

### Dale Brown

One of the most candid interviews in college basketball is one with LSU's basketball coach, but I don't always understand what Dale Brown is really saying. Consider these two items in a recent edition of Tiger Rag.

■ "I really don't give a damn what anybody writes because it really doesn't mean anything. If I could choose, I'd like nice things. I don't care who you are—if you're the most cantankerous old man in the world; if you're Atilla the Hun, you have some sensitivities. But I really don't care."

Comment: Huh?

■ On comments by Hugh Durham about his (Brown's) good coaching. "I thought I was going to try to coach my way into a world championship but you can't do it. Bobby Knight and Dean Smith are great coaches but Bob Boyd (Mississippi State) is as good or better. Anyone ultra successful needs good players. The game is not hieroglyphics; I think we try and complicate it out of our insecurities."

Comment: Really? Anything to that, Joe?

### UK basketball

When SMU's 5-10 Butch Moore popped a 5-footer in the lane at :04 to beat Kentucky last week, Mustang coach Dave Bliss explained it this way: "It was kind of a squirrely shot, wasn't it? Moore's shot is like the one we all take in the Baptist Church League. Then we all go have a Coke and talk about it."

Moore: "I was surprised that the big men stayed back in there. I couldn't believe it, but nobody came to get me so I just took a five footer. It sure felt good when I let it go."

Moore beamed, and why not. A 5-foot jump shot in the lane by a 5-10 guard with :04 left in a tie game at Rupp Arena is the sort of thing kids from Phelps to Fancy Farm dream about.

### UK timeout

Kentucky coach Joe B. Hall zapped the officials for allegedly ignoring frantic

calls for a timeout by his players.

"What I really didn't understand, *really* didn't understand," Hall said. "is why we didn't get a timeout. I don't understand it. Did anybody in this (interview) room not see us signal for a timeout? That's just hard for me to swallow. I don't see how we could have called for a timeout any more aggressively."

Hall had one more volley, "Maybe we need to go back to two officials. It would be better to be insulted by two instead of three."

From where I sat, part of UK's entourage did signal for a timeout, but some of the players were headed down court including Blackmon who almost banked in a shot from near midcourt.

It seemed to me Hall should have called a timeout at :31, the last dead ball situation, when Troy McKinley committed UK's sixth team foul. Then he could have instructed the officials and his players more clearly about his options and intentions.

Said Bliss: "Frankly I was concerned about what kind of officiating we'd get coming in here, but I thought it was excellent. And I'm not just saying that because we won either."

### Jon Koncak

SMU's center was impressed with Kentucky. "They played great defense, really great" he said. "It's the best I've encountered. They must have been watching game films since 1981."

Koncak said UK was good at "nudging me a little down low on the post up. Then, when I got the ball I was too far down on the baseline and couldn't reach back to the basket. Smart. Kentucky's is the best defense I've ever played against."

### Summary

As Joe Hall said summing up, the UKs "played about as well as we can play. We had great effort and great hustle. On Moore's basket he just beat Blackmon to the middle. We had one, maybe two players in there who could have dropped off, but they just didn't."

"We're just making so many youthful mistakes right now..."

But Kentucky is going to get better. Against SMU the Wildcats showed flashes of what is to come when Richard Madison, Ed Davender and the others grow up some.

### Sam Bowie

Former University of Kentucky basketball star Sam Bowie says he's getting tired of hearing himself compared to Michael Jordan.

"Everywhere I go, all people ask about is the draft, me and Michael Jordan," Bowie told a wire service writer last week. "But anyone who has a chance to see our team should know you can't fairly compare our play."

Jordan is scoring 25½ points per game for the Chicago Bulls these days while Bowie is averaging six points and 6½ rebounds and has already missed four games with an ankle injury.

"I only play about 20-25 minutes, and for Chicago to be effective, he has to play 35-40," Bowie said. "My job isn't scoring, it's rebounding, passing and blocking shots. I only practice my jumper when we're ahead by 20 points."

### Freedom Hall

Dave McClain enters his seventh season at Wisconsin after being named Wisconsin's 24th head coach on December 16, 1977.

The 46-year-old McClain, a native of Upper Sandusky, Ohio, and a 1960 graduate of Bowling Green State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, came to Wisconsin from a highly successful coaching stint at Ball State, where he posted an overall 46-25-3 record in seven seasons.

His overall 80-57-3 record for thirteen seasons as a head coach ranks him among the nation's Top Twenty coaches entering 1984. That's a winning percentage of .581.

McClain played football at Upper

Sandusky High School and Bowling Green University, where his team went 45-5-4. He played both quarterback and safety at Bowling Green.

He started his coaching career at Crestline, Ohio High School with an 8-1 record and then returned to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant in 1961, where he served as freshmen offensive coach and earned his Master's Degree in Education.

He then served as an assistant coach at Cornell University under Tom Harp in 1962; at Miami (Ohio) University under Glenn E. "Bo" Schembechler, 1963-66; at Kansas under Pepper Rodgers, 1967-68; and at Ohio State under W.W. "Woody" Hayes in 1969 and 1970 before accepting the head coaching job at Ball State.

He coached seven seasons at Ball State, with only his first a loser at 4-5-1. He was named Mid-American Conference "Coach of the Year" in 1975 after a 9-2 season. His three year MAC record of 13-4 included the 1976 conference title.

In his first season with the Badgers, he became the first coach since Ivan Williamson in 1949 to post a winning mark as a first year coach. Those 1978 Badgers opened with four straight wins and finished at 5-4-2; the first winning season since 1974. The next two seasons proved to be a little tougher as his 1979 and 1980 squads posted identical 4-7-0 marks.

The next season started the turnaround. In 1981 the Badgers went

7-5-0 including the first Bowl appearance for a Wisconsin team since the 1962 season. Their 6-3-0 Big Ten record was good for a third place tie, and included wins over national powers Michigan and Ohio State. The Badgers lost to Tennessee 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

In 1982, Dave became the first coach in Wisconsin history to guide the Badgers to back-to-back Bowl games and accomplished what no other Wisconsin coach was able to do - win a post-season Bowl game. The Badgers won a 14-3 decision from Kansas State in the 1982 Independence Bowl to cap a second consecutive 7-5 season, which included the first victory over Ohio State in Columbus since 1918.

And in 1983, the Badgers posted their third consecutive seven-win season under McClain with a final mark of 7-4. Wisconsin also turned in its third straight winning Big Ten campaign at 5-4.

Dave has also served as an assistant coach in the Hula (1982) and Japan (1983) Bowl games, and was an assistant coach in the Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, AL in 1983.

Dave and his wife, the former Judy Perry, have three children - son Tom 18, and daughters Mindy 16 and Marcy 13.

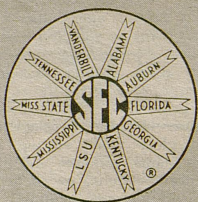

football coach Jerry Claiborne. And if you don't believe me, let Danville-Boyle County Recreation Director Richard Glasscock convince you.

"I've been to four Kentucky-Tennessee football games in Knoxville," says Glasscock. "It was great to be there this year when UK finally won, too. But the Tennessee fans didn't like it.

"As we were leaving the stadium they were really getting on us. But I couldn't believe what one fan said. He yelled, 'Wait until basketball. We will get you then.'

"That's what UK fans have always said in the past. I knew right then that Kentucky had really accomplished something special by winning at Knoxville."

TOO BAD Kentucky will be without Brian Williams, Tony Mayes and Russell Hairston for its Hall of Fame Bowl appearance against Wisconsin Dec. 29. All three defensive starters have been suspended until after the spring semester by Coach Jerry Claiborne for disciplinary reasons.

Bowl games are a reward for a year of hard work by both players and coaches. Williams, Mayes and Hairston paid their dues during 1984 and worked hard enough to deserve a reward.

However, Claiborne did exactly the right thing by sticking to his rules and suspending all three. The players agreed and had the courage to admit that their suspensions were justified.

Like Mother Nature, it's not nice to fool Coach Claiborne. You go by his rules or go home. It's old-fashioned but effective.

All three players could be reinstated for the 1985 season. And I hope they are.

I've grown extremely fond of Williams over the last three years. He's a winner on and off the field. He made the All-SEC Academic Team and is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. But he's also human and now he's paying a stiff price for his mistake.

ANOTHER WILDCAT going through a difficult time is UK junior guard Roger Harden, who was benched for the SMU game for disciplinary reasons by Coach Joe Hall.

Harden missed practice the day after UK's loss at Purdue and was considering leaving the team. Now it seems he will remain at UK.

Harden is another class youngster. It's impossible not to like him and admire the role he plays at UK. He didn't complain last year when he was benched in favor of Dicky Beal just before tournament time.

He can take criticism and come back for more. He's a fighter. But he also has his pride and it was wounded at Purdue when he was benched several times during the contest.

UK needs Harden's experience and spirit. The Cats don't need to lose a fighter like Harden.

SMU COACH Dave Bliss left Lexington last week impressed with Kentucky's program after his eighth-ranked Mustangs escaped with a 56-54 win.

"If this is a rebuilding year for Kentucky, I'll take some of those young players," says Bliss. "For us just to play in Rupp Arena was a real experience. There are more fans in the lobby here than what we have at our games."

## College grid attendance figures

The 63 member institutions of the College Football Association posted an average attendance increase of more than 500 fans per game in 1984.

CFA teams averaged 44,673 per game in 1984, up from 44,138 a year earlier. This, despite the proliferation of television games that many thought would have an immediate negative impact on attendance.

Twenty-five CFA teams increased attendance significantly, while 15 dropped substantially below last season's figures. The remaining 23 stayed at about the same level.

Tennessee was the attendance champion, averaging more than 83,000 fans for seven home games. Penn State averaged more than 83,000 and Georgia more than 82,000.

# MAJORS MEMO

As a person who has followed the Tennessee-Kentucky rivalry since boyhood, I consider our game with the Wildcats last Saturday as one that was cast in the classic mold. That is to say, it was decided up front with vicious hitting rather than by razzle-dazzle or fancy plays.

Neither team gave an inch. I couldn't have asked for a better effort from our players, and I am sure Jerry Claiborne feels the same way about his team. We went down fighting as indicated by our last ditch bid that carried from our three to Kentucky's 13 in the final seconds of the game. Time ran out as Tony Robinson tried to stop the clock and get up one last play.

I think the Kentucky game was the most hard-hitting contest of the year. It usually is. But to me the difference in the game was the turnovers. They killed us. The first play from scrimmage was a big factor, giving Kentucky the ball on our 30 yard line. As best as I can recall, I believe we had four turnovers and they had one. It was a heartbreaker to lose. Our team is very disappointed, but I am sure we will bounce back this week.

Kentucky's defense played a big part in their win. They were tough to move the ball on last year, and they have been stingy at times with other teams this season. A few teams have broken loose on them but for the most part, they have played good, solid defense. They had Tony Robinson scrambling for his life several times. They were twisting and stunting up front and they gave our offensive line a lot of problems. Add to this the fact that their defensive backs frequently redirected our receivers and made them run different routes by doing a lot of good double covering and hitting and holding them up, too.

The roughing-the-kicker penalty was very damaging, possibly costing us the game. We had them stopped at the moment, and we had a chance at that stage of the game to at least kick a field goal and win. I thought we had a chance to block the punter. I didn't get a good look at the play, but one like that that is always risky. But at the time, we wanted to make something happen.

Just before Tony returned to the game prior to our last drive, I reminded him that Doug Flutie of Boston College had pulled a game with Miami out of the fire with a last-second touchdown pass. I told Tony he had a chance to do the same thing in this one. He almost did it by using every second we could and every time-out available. We tried to stop the clock with three seconds to go but it ran out on us.

Let me add that it was a disheartening loss. Both teams played with a lot of emotion and both wanted the game awfully badly. Because of the fact that Kentucky did an outstanding job of holding on to the football and their defense played very tough in throwing us out of our offensive rhythm, we had to work very hard for everything we got. I did not feel we were as sharp on execution as we were in the two previous games.

Certainly it will take a terrific bounce-back to win against Vanderbilt at Nashville. But we hope to do just that this week.

GAME NOTES: The turnovers we gave on the first play of the game was as big a factor as there was in the game. Kentucky has made its opponents earn things all season long. This is Kentucky's best personnel since 1977. After two comeback victories and two extremely good performances, last week might have been ripe for a letdown...But we practiced well all week and worked hard in the game.



## National Leaders From The SEC

Two Southeastern Conference players have won individual national championships, according to the final statistics released by the NCAA office. Vanderbilt punter Ricky Anderson, who set an SEC record in the process with an average of 48.2 per punt, won the national punting championship. Ironically, the other SEC player to reap an individual title is a punt returner, Florida's Ricky Nattiel, who averaged 15.7 yards per return.

Anderson is the eighth SEC player to win the punting championship, the first since Ole Miss' Jim Miller was the NCAA's best in 1977. In winning the punt return championship, Nattiel becomes the eighth SEC player to win the title and the fourth in the past five years. Previous punting champions are Bobby Cifers, Tennessee, 1942; Zeke Bratkowski, Georgia, 1953; Don Chandler, Florida, 1955; Bobby Walden, Georgia, 1958; Frank Lambert, Ole Miss, 1964; Ron Widby, Tennessee, 1967; and Miller, Ole Miss, 1977.

Nattiel joins the following conference players to win the punt return title: Junie Hovious, Ole Miss, 1940; Harry Gilmer, Alabama, 1946; Lee Nalley, Vanderbilt, 1948 and 1949; Bill Stacy, Mississippi State, 1956; Scott Woerner, Georgia, 1980; Glen Young, Miss. State, 1981; and Lionel James, Auburn, 1982.

the Kentucky beat for the same paper, predicts that UK will win by three, but qualified his prediction by adding, "you know, I have to spend some time in Fayette County this season."

Russ Brown, who covers UL for the same Louisville newspaper, picks Louisville by two. Dave Koerner of the Louisville Times takes the Cardinals by five.

In Lexington, both D.G. Fitzmaurice and Jerry Tipton of the Herald-Leader say Kentucky will win, by five and eight points respectively. Ironically, they are the only two Lexington media reporters who pick the Wildcats.

Kentucky's radio announcers both pick Louisville. Cawood Ledford has Louisville by three and Ralph Hacker picks the Cards by five. Rob Bromley, the UK play-by-play man on television, picks the Cards by four.

Jock Sutherland, the color analyst for the Louisville Radio Network, says the Cards will win by five. Sutherland believes the difference in the game will come down to the homecourt advantage. Said Sutherland, "this is the Kentucky Shootout with cap pistols, just two mediocre teams."

**HITS AND MISSES** . . . Already, the Kentucky-Louisville clash, thought to be a financial bonanza by some during the time when Kentucky was being pressured to play the game, has come on hard times. The best television proposal to make an offer was Sports Productions Inc. (Now Lorimar Sports) and it is syndicating the game with no national station or network involved. It was reported that the game will reach more than 65 percent of the nation's markets, but that could be considerably high . . . WHAS' sponsorship of Saturday morning's Wildcat public practice almost didn't come off. Reportedly, Cardinal officials were

upset at WHAS for sponsoring the event for UK because the Cardinals are the home team Saturday. WHAS had sponsored a similar practice for Louisville last month when Freedom Hall was first opened to the public as a renovated basketball facility. . . A Big Four basketball doubleheader each year involving Kentucky, Indiana, Louisville and Notre Dame could become a certainty next season. According to reports, the event will probably be a one-night affair alternating among the cities of Indianapolis, Lexington, and Louisville. Reportedly, UK will alternate playing Indiana and Notre Dame while Louisville will alternate playing Indiana and Notre Dame. That also means that UK will play Indiana twice every other year instead of once. The doubleheader could get started as early as next year with the first event being staged at the Hoosier Dome . . . Denny Crum likes the idea of the one-night affair but believes the game should be the

annual kick-off to the season and not later in December. On the other hand, Bobby Knight would like to see a two-night tournament affair and to eliminate all regular season games involving the four schools. Crum doesn't like the tourney part, citing that one outstanding team each year will have to go home with an 0-2 mark . . . Elsewhere in this edition, you'll read how Joe B. Hall and Denny Crum joined together to do a promotional poster for Converse Rubber Company (the basketball shoe manufacturer). The colorful poster shows the two coaches arm-wrestling with the caption that "either way, you can't lose" referring that it's great to be a fan of either school. Well, it's not the first time the two have gotten together on the same side of the fence. A few months ago the two combined to help promote a statewide amendment to allow sheriffs to succeed themselves. But this was still different, I mean, Joe B. Hall and Denny Crum arm-

wrestling? Now, c'mon, fellas? Of course, we shouldn't forget that both are paid ambassadors to Converse's board of advisors. There have been published reports in the past that each coach earns six figures a year from Converse. For that kind of a deal, fellas, I'd arm wrestle John Thompson and take a chance of losing an arm. In all honesty, the idea was a good one and it's good to see their iceberg melting, even if the adverse image was due mainly to outsiders. . . UK athletic ticket manager Alice Woods reports that tickets are still available for the UKIT December 21-22, and the Kentucky-Purdue game in Louisville on December 31. UKIT tickets are \$10 per set (good for both nights) and the Purdue tickets are \$7 each. A postage and handling fee of \$2 per order must be included. Only certified checks and money orders will be honored. Orders should be mailed to: UK Ticket Office, Memorial Coliseum, Lexington, Kentucky. Tickets are on sale at the ticket office for those not choosing the mail order route. . . The latest ticket sales report on the Hall of Fame Bowl has more than 11,000 sold through UK. That's almost double of the ticket sales for the same bowl last year. Anyone wanting to purchase Hall of Fame Bowl tickets now must do so by contacting the bowl office in Birmingham.

## ONE YEAR AGO

\*Kentucky rolled to a convincing 72-50 win over Kansas in Lawrence, as Melvin Turpin and Jim Master combined for 48 points and Kenny Walker hauled down a game-high 8 rebounds.

Kentucky, with Master red hot on 10-13 field goal shooting and Turpin scoring at will inside, raced out to a 35-20 intermission lead and never looked back.

\*Kentucky punter Paul Calhoun was selected second team All-American by The Sporting News, thus becoming UK's first All-American since Art Still back in 1977.

\*Sophomore kicking specialist Chris Caudell was suspended from the UK football team for disciplinary reasons and not permitted to play in the Hall of Fame Bowl game. Caudell later

withdrew from school.

\*Kentucky placed three players on the Academic All-SEC football team. Selected for the honors were Ron Bojalad, Keith Martin and Scott Schroeder.

## FIVE YEARS AGO

\*Kentucky's football recruiting got off to a fast start when coach Fran Curci signed some of the state's finest prospects, including All-State Jeff Smith of Washington County to a SEC letter-of-intent. Other signees included James Hasty, William Burse, Ron Knott, Choo Choo Lee, Robert Mullins and Eddie Simmons. UK also signed Cam Jacobs of Miami, Florida, a brother of Chris Jacobs.

\*The basketball Wildcats raced off with an 80-46 win over outmanned Baylor and Kyle Macy paved the way

with 17 points. Derrick Hord and Jay Shidler chipped in with 11 and 10 points in that order. UK led by 40-17 at the halfway mark.

\*Kentucky routed South Carolina 126-81, breaking the Rupp Arena scoring mark of 121 set against West Virginia a year earlier. Kentucky built up a 61-39 halftime score and never looked back as five players scored in double figures. Macy, Sam Bowie, Dwight Anderson and Derrickd Hord scored 24, 23, 19 and 18 points respectively.

## TEN YEARS AGO

\*Fletcher Carr's UK wrestling team registered four pins, four decisions and a default as it overwhelmed Indiana 43-2, in Memorial Coliseum.

\*Indiana center Kent Benson scored 26 points and hauled in 12 rebounds as

he dominated UK freshman centers Rick Robey and Mike Phillips. Indiana blasted UK 98-74, handing the Cats their first loss of the season. The Hoosiers led 54-38 at the half and Kentucky never got close. The intense game had bitter ending in the closing minutes when IU coach Bobby Knight "tapped" Kentucky coach Joe Hall on the head as he walked away. Although UK assistant Lynne Nance was in a fighting stance ready to challenge Knight, the Hoosier coach said the tap was meant affectionately and that he had been doing the same thing to his players for years. Scott May had 25 points for Indiana and Kevin Grevey led UK with 22, in a game played in Bloomington.

\*Kentucky tight end Elmore Stephens was named to Time magazine's all-star college football team, selected by the professional football scouts.

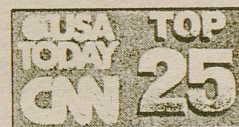
\*Senior guard Jimmy Dan Connor exploded for 35 points, as a rejuvenated Kentucky basketball team whipped ninth-ranked North Carolina 90-78 in Freedom Hall. The Tar Heels held a commanding 31-16 lead when UK scored a 23-3 comeback over the final eight minutes of the first half.

Connor hit 15 of 21 shots and was aided by 16 points by senior forward Kevin Grevey.

## FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

\*Just one week into the season, UK has taken over first place in the AP and UPI basketball polls. UCLA is second in both, with New Mexico State third.

\*Unbeaten and top-ranked Kentucky built up a 63-38 halftime lead in defeating Indiana 109-92. Kentucky hit 68.4 percent from the field the first half and outrebounded the Hoosiers 59-37 for the game. Dan Issel had 32 points and 19 rebounds. Sophomore Tom Parker came off the bench with 15 points.

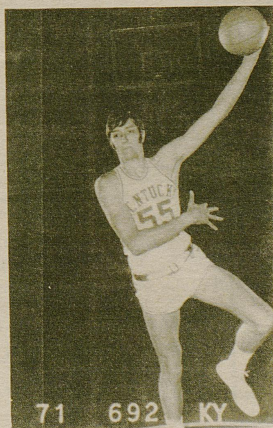
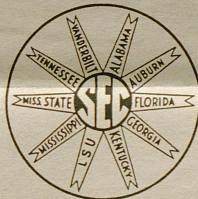

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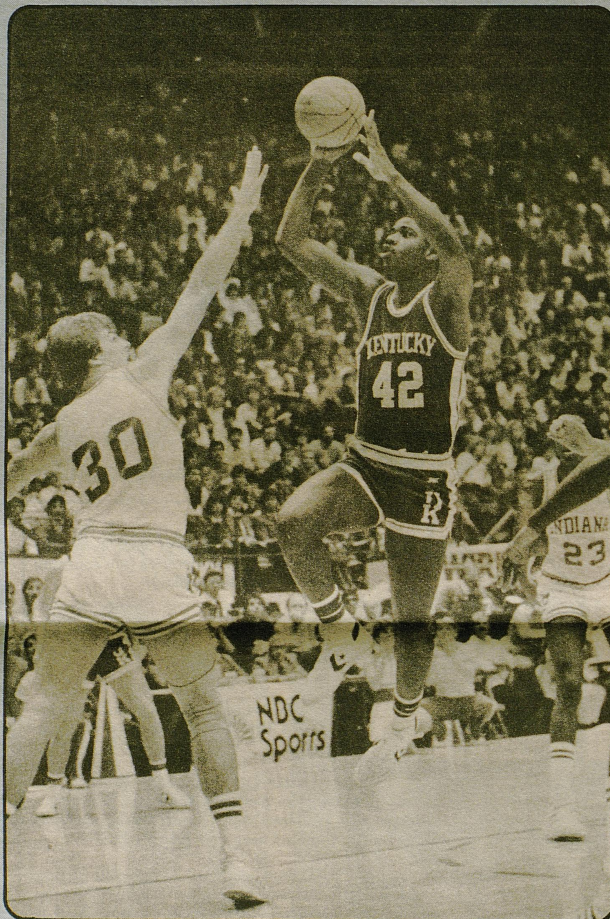
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
