**WORKING TICKETS**—Address requests to Sports Publicity Office as far in advance as possible. Tickets will not be mailed unless requested and will be held at the Reservation Window at the main entrance of Memorial Coliseum for pickup on game night.

COMPS-No individual game allotment.

**WESTERN UNION**—Wire facilities are available at court side. Please advise if you will be filing from the Coliseum and also notify manager of Western Union in Lexington.

RADIO BROADCASTS—Applications must be directed at least one week in advance to Radio Director, University of Kentucky, Lexington. Tickets will be supplied by the Sports Publicity Office only upon receipt of approved permit from the Radio Director. Spotters are available if requested in advance. Line orders should be made to General Telephone Company, Lexington.

TV AND MOTION PICTURES—News clip film highlights will be furnished to TV stations or newsreel agencies at actual cost upon arrangement at least one week in advance. Stations or agencies desiring to shoot own film must make application to the University Radio Director at least one week in advance. Forms may be signed to cover the entire season. Tickets will be issued by the Sports Publicity Office only upon receipt of approved permit. A maximum of 200 feet of filmed highlights may be shown on a delayed basis. Live TV coverage prohibited except under arrangements made with UK Athletic Director.

## ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring inter-collegiate competition in nine different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

A Board of Directors, headed by UK President Frank Dickey, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program. Dr. Leo Chamberlain, vice-president of the University, has general supervision over the Department and serves as vice-chairman of the Board. Dr. A. D. Kirwan, one-time Wildcat coach and UK's faculty representative to the Southeastern Conference, serves the directors as secretary and Dr. Frank Peterson, UK vice-president for business administration, acts as treasurer in an ex-officio capacity.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is Bernie A. Shively, a former Illinois grid All-American and a veteran of nearly 25 years in the post of Director of Athletics.

## THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

. . . The State Is Our Campus

The present school, which last fall enrolled 11,300 students and population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution now in its 98th year.

The present school, which last fall enrolled 11,300 students and now offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School

and a division of Extended Programs, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706-acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

Dr. Frank G. Dickey currently serves as president of the University. The youthful, athletic-minded former dean of the UK College of Education succeeded venerable Dr. Herman L. Dono-

van in 1956 as the eighth chief administrative officer in the school's history. Dr. Dickey also is a former president of the Southeastern Conference.

The University is on the approved list of the Association of American Universities and is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

# DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS BERNIE A. SHIVELY

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is the Herculean task being carried out successfully by Bernie A. Shively.

Few who have observed the untiring efforts of the tall, silverhaired former All-America footballer in the service of the University of

Kentucky since 1927 and as Director of Athletics since 1938 will argue his fitness as an athletic Hercules. Not only has Shively guided the development of Kentucky as a nationally-respected power in major sports, but he has also gained personal prestige through a fair-minded approach to many problems.

During his tenure as Athletic Director, Shively has directly supervised major expansions in Kentucky's athletic plant resulting from the progression of the school's athletic teams to greater national prominence and increased patronage by the sports-minded public.

The seating capacity of Kentucky's football stadium

has been doubled to bring the current number of seats to approximately 37,500 and on par with most other schools located in heavier-populated areas. Powerful new lighting equipment has been installed to bring night football into new popularity. Partly to satisfy the over-whelming number of basketball devotees, who could not squeeze into the 2,800-seat Alumni Gymnasium, a long-planned Memorial Coliseum was completed in 1950. Seating 11,500 persons for cage contests, the

four-million dollar Coliseum also houses the Athletic Department and provided the first permanent home for the school's many minor sports teams. More recently, Shively directed the acquisition of a pair of modern, ranch-style living units which have served as the home of the football team since 1954.

A large dressing room building and football practice field, used since 1955, were abandoned in 1959 to make way for a huge new men's dorm. Under Shively's supervision, a spacious new Sports Center has been prepared a short distance away on the University farm to take even better care of the footballers and spring sports teams.

## All-America Guard At Illinois

A native of Paris, III., Shively attended the University of Illinois where he was an All-America guard in 1926 on the same grid team made famous by Red Grange. Demonstrating a claim to being one of the finest all-around athletes in Illinois' history, "Shive" also laid claim to the Big 10 heavyweight wrestling championship and annexed letters in track before graduating in 1927.

Shively came to Kentucky in 1927 as line coach of football under Harry Gamage. A shift in the coaching ranks in 1933 resulted in Shively's promotion to head of the UK Physical Education Department, a position he retained until he succeeded Chet Wynne as Athletic Director in 1938. During this period and the years following, he also served as track and baseball coach for several seasons and continued as a football assistant until 1944. The next year, 1945, he assumed full charge of the grid squad for one season before turning the job over to mentor Paul (Bear) Bryant in 1946.

The Kentucky athletic chief is nationally recognized for his outstanding contributions to basketball as chairman of the NCAA Tournament committee and, for a number of years served in the same capacity for the Southeastern Conference. He is a past chairman of the NCAA summer baseball group and has served as president of the SEC Coaches and Athletic Directors Association since 1954. In addition, he has been active in numerous state and civic organizations—including chairmanship of the Fayette County Recreation Board.

Shively and his wife, Ruth, have two children. Doug was cocaptain of the Wildcat grid team in 1958 and now is coaching at VPI while daughter Suzanne was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of UK in 1957.



## ADOLPH FREDERICK RUPP

"Nation's Winningest Basketball Coach"

32 Years - Won 668, Lost 125 - 84.2 %

For over three decades, the sports world has watched an amazing record being forged with near perfection out of meager raw material by a colorful figure in the Blue Grass country of Kentucky known familiarly to hundreds of thousands as the "Man in the Brown Suit."

He is Adolph Rupp of Kentucky and when the sport of basketball is mentioned today, a direct chain of thought brings out the name of this maker of champions who holds undisputed rank as the "Nation's Winningest Basketball Coach." The name of Rupp, feared and respected in opponents' hearts and beloved by the millions who have witnessed the remarkable success of his Wildcat cage teams, has become synonymous with the game of basketball.

Such unprecedented recognition for the fabulous mentor is only natural since his success in the past 32 years as head man of the fabled Kentucky cage thoroughbreds has been nothing short of phenomenal. It would take a book longer than his own technical best-seller, "Championship Basketball," to recite the record completely. Briefly, however, that record includes:

- —An amazing 668 victories out of 793 starts for an unparalleled winning percentage of better than 84 percent against major competition.
- —Certification by the NCAA Service Bureau as the nation's most successful collegiate basketball coach, both for the decade ending in 1961 and at the 20-year level.
- —One of only three still-active collegiate cage coaches with "membership" in the exclusive 600 club in which the dues are 600 victories.
- —Selection as the national "Coach of the Year" in 1959 for the second time in his career.
- —An unprecedented honor roll of four NCAA Tournament championships picked up by his Wildcats who hold the all-time record of 13 appearances in the national classic and can claim more victories in NCAA play (23) than any other team.
- —A nominal world's championship as co-coach of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games which included members of Kentucky's NCAA champions.

- —Producer of more Olympic gold medallion winners (7) than any other cage coach.
- —A total of 20 Southeastern Conference titles since the league was organized in 1933.
- —Election to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 and previous selection (in 1946) by Helms Athletic Foundation as a member of their exclusive cage Hall of Fame.
- —Recipient of the Governor's Medallion in 1959 for meritorious service to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and plaques of appreciation from the U.S. Air Force (1959) and Sugar Bowl committee (1951).
- —Election to the Kentucky Hall of Fame (1945), outstanding citizen of Lexington (1949) and twice honorary citizen of the City of New Orleans.
- —Coach of the winning East team in the Shrine East-West game 1959.
- —Development of more All-Americans (20 players honored 28 times) and more material for the pro ranks (21) than any other coach.
- —Four Sugar Bowl Tournament championships, a National Invitation Tournament title and five trophies from the first nine UK Invitational Tournaments.
- -Membership on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.

## Rupp's Teams Play In Most Tournaments

Tournament invitations in pre-Rupp years were almost unheard of—Kentucky played in only seven sectional eliminations. In contrast, the Rupp-led Wildcats have the distinction of playing in more tournaments of all types than any other team. All told, his Bluegrass five has achieved the unequalled feat of 137 victories against only 38 defeats, covering action in 37 national classics plus 29 conference meets and the '48 Olympics.

Although the competition was nowhere near as rugged as the schedules played by today's nationally-recognized Wildcat brigades, Rupp's very first team compiled a respectable 15-3 record and Kentucky basketball has been on a winning plane ever since. The most games lost in a single season since Rupp added his touch was nine in 1960-61 and the remarkably low average number of losses per season in the Rupp Era is three.

His teams have finished as national champion in the polls four times in the last 13 years. They were unranked in the top 20 only in the 1952-53 campaign, when they were idle. Possibly his greatest achievement came in the 1953-54 season when the Wildcats rolled unchecked through a 25-game schedule of top-flight opposition to become the biggest-winning, perfect-record unit in all basketball history up to that time.

Rivaling that achievement, in the opinion of the sportswriters and broadcasters, is the tremendous coaching jobs turned in by the basket-ball miracle man in more recent seasons. Five years ago, Rupp guided a moderately talented club to an 18th SEC title, third place in the polls and a ninth NCAA Tournament appearance while achieving a 23-5 record. The surprised experts, who had predicted UK would not win its own conference, voted Coach Rupp the runner-up spot as "Coach of the Year."

Even that effort went by the boards in 1958, however, as Kentucky's talentless wonders copped the NCAA title for an unprecedented fourth time. The Wildcats were unsung and almost unknown except by reputation and heritage. Not a single man had been honored on the All-Conference fives selected before tournament time and they had lost more games (6) in regular season play than any UK team in 17 years.

## Wins National 'Coach of Year' Honor

If the experts thought that was tops in miracles, they reckoned without the amazing drive of this man Rupp. With four-fifths of his starting lineup gone, he re-built shattered foundations in such an astonishing fashion that the Wildcats rolled through the 1959 season almost unchecked. Although they failed to win the title in their increasingly-tough Southeastern Conference for only the third time since 1943, UK was generally conceded to be the nation's top team. Most experts agreed that the Kentuckians, who finished with a 24-3 record and ranked second nationally, missed a golden opportunity to pick up a fifth NCAA crown as they were upset by Louisville in the tourney opener. This feeling was given meaning as Rupp was accorded "Coach of the Year" honor by United Press International.

The 1959-60 season admittedly was not a great one as the UKats chalked up only an 18-7 mark—second worst season of the Rupp Era. However, many experts considered the outcome to be a tribute to one of the greatest coaching efforts ever turned in. Plagued from the beginning of the season to the end by adversity (sickness, injuries, eligi-

bility difficulties and personnel problems, complete disaster was always imminent and avoided only by masterful juggling (16 different starting combos) and artful strategy moves.

It was a similar story of great coaching technique against the heavy odds of personnel and schedule in 1960-61. Although the final record read only 19-9 (worst ever for a Rupp team), a closer look reveals the touch of Rupp was there for the Wildcats were regrouped into a fearsome outfit after early troubles and rolled to 11 wins in their last 12 starts. Enroute they conquered eventual SEC champ Mississippi State on the road and demolished Vanderbilt in a SEC Playoff for an NCAA berth. They never ran out of gas until stopped by Ohio State in regional finals.

There was no way of anticipating the tremendous season that evolved in 1961-62 except to depend on the proven touch of master rebuilder Rupp. He had done it before, but losing four starters off the losing team of his career (19-9 in '61) presented a terrific challenge. Undaunted by odds, Coach Rupp guided his "Fearless Five" past challenge after challenge, copping the title in the UK Invitational and cornering a share of the SEC championship for the 20th time. Finally, critical lack of height and bench strength caught up with the 'Cats in the NCAA Regional finals and they put gear away until next year with an amazing, 23-3 record that even Rupp admitted was "one of the most surprising ever."

#### Rupp Credited For Increasing Interest

Rupp is recognized by sports authorities with doing more than any other modern tutor to make basketball a national spectator sport. From the very outset of his career at Kentucky, which began in 1930, he has introduced or popularized many new and revised trends in the game that have aided materially in making the country basketball-minded. One such innovation was the controlled fast break offensive pattern that has since become the crowd-pleasing trademark of Wildcat cage teams.

The outstanding success of this man as a basbetball coach is matched only by the personal fame he has attained off the court.

The masterful story-teller is equally renowned on the banquet and coaching clinic circuit and is in constant demand as a speaker in the off season. He annually appears in more than a dozen states to make speaking engagements and believes he has missed only Alaska in tours throughout the 50 states. Rupp undoubtedly has conducted more coaching clinics than any other tutor. Overseas assignments for

the Army and Air Force have taken him in recent years to Europe three times (last, Germany 1961) and twice to Hawaii and the Far East (last, summer 1962). Several foreign olympic coaches have studied

under Rupp at UK.

Internationally recognized for his avocation as a registered Hereford breeder-enthusiast, Rupp is currently in his ninth term as president of the Kentucky Hereford Assn. He owns and operates one of the largest farms in the Bluegrass area and serves as a director of the Central District Warehousing Corp., world's largest tobacco marketing orford breeder-enthusiast, Rupp is currently in his tenth term as presiganization. The coach recently was named to a five-year term on the Board of Governors of the Agricultural Hall of Fame and National Agricultural Center.

The coach is active in Shrine affairs, being chosen in 1950 as one of the 10 outstanding Shriners of the nation and holding honorary memberships in temples throughout the country. He is a Past Potentate of the Oleika (Lexington) Temple and serves as vice-chairman of the board for the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital in Lexington. Three years ago, he was nominated as one of five candidates for the Imperial Outer Guard of the Shrine. Rupp serves also as state chair-

man of the Cerebral alsy Association.

He has his own television and radio shows during the season, has produced two film shorts ("Basketball: Individual Offense" for Coca-Cola Co. and "Parade to National Championship") and written books on virtually every phase of the game. The Coach also is chairman of the board of the Leatherguard Corporation and a board member of American Central Life Insurance Company.

Born in Halstead, Kansas, Sept. 2, 1901, Rupp attended University of Kansas where he played guard under Phog Allen. Following graduation in 1923, he coached high school ball one year at Marshalltown, lowa, and then at Freeport, III., four seasons before coming to Kentucky in 1930. His fame as "The Man in the Brown Suit" stems from his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his gamenight wardrobe.

## HARRY LANCASTER

## Assistant Coach

When Harry Lancaster finds a spare moment to reflect on his days as an all-around star athlete at Georgetown (Ky.) College back in the early thirties, he can recall with a degree of dismay how close

he came to never pursuing the "round ball" sport that in the days since has earned him a highly respected position in the basketball world.

An All-Conference halfback for three straight years and captain during his last two seasons, Lancaster's football career almost overshadowed his play on the basketball court. In the cage sport, he was equally successful—with three All-Conference nominations and two team captaincies to his credit—but considered himself a better football player than cager. Experience, however, proved him a good student and teacher of the sport of basketball as he began his



coaching career and he now has no regrets over the choice he made.

Born in Paris, Ky., in 1911, Lancaster attended Paris High School where he played four years in all sports Following graduation in 1928, he continued his athletic career at Georgetown College and gained star recognition in football, basketball and baseball. After finishing at Georgetown in '32, Harry remained on for the next school year as an assistant coach in both the grid and cage sports before moving into the high school field. He coached several sports, mostly basketball, for nine years and was a high school principal for six years before coming to the University of Kentucky in 1942 as an instructor in physical education. Soon thereafter, the war intervened and Lancaster saw 26 months' Navy duty, rising from apprentice seaman to Lieutenant (Senior Grade).

Returning to UK in March, 1946, he became a part-time assistant to the Wildcats' famous cage mentor, Adolph Rupp, in addition to carrying on his teaching duties and gaining his master's degree. Two

years later, he became Coach Rupp's general right hand man in a full-time capacity. Lancaster also served as Kentucky's baseball coach in 1946-47 and picked up the assignment again starting with the 1951 campaign.

In addition to his coaching duties, Lancaster manages to sandwich in a large slice of traveling. Besides checking on the nation's best high school cagers as potential material for future Wildcat national champion crews, his travel stems from a plan to extensively scout upcoming opponents. Coach Rupp was one of the first in the country to inaugurate this wide-spread scouting system in basketball and believes it has contributed materially to Kentucky's past success in carrying off championships with almost reckless abandon.

Lancaster also traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U. S. State Department. The mission called for the Kentucky aide to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials on Olympic procedure and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics, coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport as played in the U.S.A.


During the summer of 1962, he helped Coach Rupp conduct clinics for Army personnel in the Far East Theatre.

Lancaster's coaching success with the freshman teams has been commendable. The yearlings have lost only 28 contests under his tutelage the past 12 seasons against formidable competition that included the more elite junior college clubs and top-notch service quintets. His record stands at 126 wins, 28 losses.

ence came in one year as a player in high school . . . He played four years of tennis with the Hilltoppers, who were twice Ohio Valley Conference champs during the period . . . He was runner-up for the OVC singles title in his senior year . . . Moore holds a master's degree from Kentucky, granted in 1959.



## **NEIL REED**

One of the newest aides on the cage staff of Coach Adolph Rupp, 30-year-old Neil Reed will serve in a part-time, graduate assistant's capacity this season while observing coaching methods and working toward an advance degree in athletic administration . . . KEN KUHN, Publicity Director—A veteran of 15 years in the job of publicizing Wildcat basketball teams and other sports activities of the University, Kuhn came to Lexington from Michigan State in 1946 . . . After two years as News Editor in UK's Public Relations Department, he moved over to the Athletic Department in 1948 . . . Kuhn, a past president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Publicity Association, was graduated from Michigan State in 1942 and later served as a public relations assistant for that school.

## KENTUCKY BASKETBALL OUTLOOK-1962-63

Boiled down to essentials, the outlook for Kentucky basketball in the coming season has to be classed as better than it was a year ago but it's going to take some doing for the '63 Wildcats to better the way that the '62 season turned out.

Last season's Kentuckians, minus four starters from the worst (19-9) team ever turned out by master tactician Adolph Rupp, were supposed to be in for a long winter. Instead, the Ruppmen came out of nowhere to post the biggest surprise in collegiate basketball—surging to third place in the national polls, an amazing 23-3 record and hard-fought elimination in their bid for an unprecedented fifth NCAA title.

That proud record will be hard to come by again, almost all the experts agree. But master-builder Rupp—for whom most schools would trade an eight-foot center—has some ingredients that make him confident about the '63 campaign without presuming to predict the won-lost mark.

In contrast to a year ago, the Baron will have a cross section of his power returning. Two starters—All-SEC guard Larry Pursiful and forward Carroll Burchett—will be missing along with five other lettermen, but three regulars (center Cotton Nash, forward Roy Roberts and guard Scotty Baesler) are returning. Also in the fold are letterman Ted Deeken, a reserve forward, and a host of sophs led by two top-flight prospects in 6-61/4 center John Adams and 6-61/2 center-forward Don Rolfes.

Possibly the biggest problem (if it is one) will be where to play Nash, the Bayou Bomber who was tapped for All-America honors as a sophomore last season and paced the Southeastern Conference in scoring with a 23.4 average. Coach Rupp would like nothing better than to move his versatile ace to guard in order to make the fullest possible deployment of height that has been a plaguing weakness for the last two seasons. Nash, who operated mostly at forward in a sensational 1961-62 campaign, is a dependable ball handler blessed with surprising speed and agility plus a variety of shots that would allow his placement at guard.

But pre-season practice just about ruled out such a switch and the 6-5 ace is more likely to continue at forward with additional fill-in duty at center. The Baron has come up with an innovation which he is counting on to make even better use of improved speed. Under this operation, Nash and sophomore Rolfes will alternate in the pivot—

the first one down floor going into the slot while the other goes for the rebound if he is in position and plays forward. In this way, the well-known Kentucky fast break will not have to wait on one special pivotman to get down the floor.

Rounding out this combination that Rupp is considering would be defensive ace Roy Roberts at the other forward, soph Sam Harper and Capt. Scotty Baesler or soph Terry Mobley at the back court posts. Or it could be 6-61/4 sophomore John Adams, second leading scorer as a freshman a year ago, in the pivot with Rolfes taking over Roberts' place at forward to provide a front line averaging 6-6.

If this starting combo with highly desirable overall height doesn't seem to work quite right, the nation's winningest cage mentor has a few other experiments in mind that would floor a unit generally following the pattern of traditional Rupp teams of the past with "little men" in the guard posts. Smallest of the "midgets" who might be tapped for action in such a situation is 5-10 soph Randy Embry. Although he posted only an 8.7 scoring average as a yearling, Embry saw action in only half the frosh games due to injury. He is regarded as a terrific outside shot and a great team man.

Not to be sold short in any juggling over a starting lineup and sure to see key action are juniors Deeken  $(6-3\frac{1}{2}$  forward) and Charles Ishmael  $(6-4\frac{1}{4}$  guard).

While there is some uncertainty over the actual starting unit, the Baron admits that this is due in part to better bench strength than was on hand a year back. There will be some improvement in overall speed and better ball handling but defense is something of an unknown factor going into the campaign. Outside shooting of the long-range variety has not developed and guard is bound to be a comparatively weak spot with the absence of All-SEC playmaker Larry Pursiful keenly felt.

Aside from the personnel switching that Rupp must accomplish to field another representative team, the Baron enters his 33rd year at the Kentucky helm with the prospect of possibly the greatest compeition in history from within the SEC bailiwick. Just about every one of the loop outfits are looking for good seasons and make no bones about their aims to knock off Kentucky and Rupp—who have occupied the throne room a disheartening 20 times since 1933. In addition, the Ruppmen will be called upon to cope with one of the strongest non-league lineups of foes in many a year. All told, the Wildcat card lists opposition representing seven major conferences and top indipendent teams from the South, Midwest and Northwest.

## KENTUCKY BASKETBALL REVIEW-1962-63

Kentucky's Wildcats turned in one of the nation's most outstanding—and surprising—records in 1961-62.

The charges of Baron Adolph Rupp, minus four starters from the "worst" (19-9) team of the Rupp Era in '61, were supposed to be floundering in the depths of their own conference during a re-building year. But master-builder Rupp moulded his unheralded crew into one of the winningest units in college basketball, posting a remarkably-successful record of 23 wins and only three defeats.

The Wildcats set the cage world on its ear early by copping the title in their own UK Invitational Tournament at the expense of nationally-ranked Kansas State and the Ruppmen also rated near the top (highest No. 2) in national polls all season long after being unranked in pre-season estimates. They won a share of the Southeastern Conference crown for the 20th time in 30 years and made a record 13th appearance in the NCAA Tournament—where they were eliminated by Ohio State.

Aside from Rupp, the man most responsible for the Wildcats' surprising showing was a sterling sophomore named Cotton Nash. Bidding to become one of Kentucky's all-time greats, 6-43/4 Nash attained first team All-America honors, unanimous All-Conference recognition, "SEC Player of the Year" designation and All-NCAA Tournament selection. Enroute to becoming the highest scoring soph in Kentucky's illustrious cage history and breaking no less than 18 records with 608 points and a 23.4 average, he captured the scoring championship of the conference—the first sophomore in 10 years to achieve the feat.

Also providing important leadership and scoring help in UK's amazing drive was senior guard Larry Pursiful, the lone starter that returned. Pursiful notched a 19.1 scoring average.

Kentucky's only losses in regular season play came in the second game at the hands of Southern California, 79-77, on a late cold streak and 17 games later when SEC arch-rival Mississippi State employed a stall offense to register a 49-44 upset over a cold-shooting band of 'Cats. Ohio State turned Kentucky back in the NCAA Mideast Regional finals, 74-64, with the help of a 33-point effort by All-Everything Jerry Lucas (6-9)—who couldn't be stopped by a 6-4 UK man assigned to guard him.

All in all, it was a record breaking, surprising, pleasing-yet-disappointing season for the record-busting band of Wildcats from the Blue Grass country who tallied the hottest hand in school history in firing from the field (43.4%) and free throw line (74.6%).

## KENTUCKY TO HOST ALL-AMERICA GAME IN MEMORIAL COLISEUM MARCH 30

Memorial Coliseum, home of the four-time national champion Kentucky Wildcats and showplace for numerous NCAA Tournament battles as well as the record-breaking UK Invitational Tournament, will serve as the stage for one of collegiate basketball's biggest shows next March 30.

At that time—on the Saturday following the national finals in nearby Louisville—University of Kentucky will play host to the first annual Hall of Fame East-West All-Star basketball game pairing the outstanding senior collegians from all over the nation. Proceeds of the attractive contest, being undertaken under the sponsorship of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, will go to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame—now under construction at the birthplace of modern basketball in Springfield, Mass., and honoring deceased founder James Naismith.

Coach Adolph Rupp, the nation's winningest cage mentor and Baron of Kentucky basketball for the past 32 years, will serve as game chairman for the event planned as an annual season-windup attraction.

The cream of a crop of outstanding senior players on leading teams throughout the country will be chosen by the coaches association as participants. Guiding the 10-man East and West All-Star squads as head coaches will be the tutors of the two teams who will have battled it out in the NCAA finals the week before the All-America game.

NABC President Harold Anderson, Bowling Green cage mentor, and Chairman Rupp have announced that the Lexington Junior Chamber of Commerce will co-operate in promotion and staging of the game.

A definite decision on the starting time of the game is being withheld pending negotiations with national television networks. If TV rights are not sold, the contest will be held at night.

Power-laden West Virginia and the host Kentucky Wildcats, a pair of tournament-wise basketball forces ranked among the nation's elite last winter, are slotted in opposite brackets against nationally-ranked Oregon State and the Big Ten's lowa in pairings for the 10th annual UK Invitational Tournament.

Kentucky Athletic Director Bernie Shively, who inaugurated the campus holiday classic in 1953, forecasts "one of the most interesting regular-season tournaments ever held anywhere" and predicts new records in attendance for the nation's richest holiday classic.

Dates of the 1962 renewal of the UKIT are Dec. 21-22 and it will be staged in Kentucky's magnificent, 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum. The winner takes home an imposing trophy (left) and an equal share of the net proceeds along with the other participants. This dividend has reached national-record-size proportions rang-

ing from approximately \$8,200 paid the first year to \$15,420 awarded each team in 1959. Last year, the payoff was \$9,903.57 as 16,013

fans witnessed the two nights of action despite a heavy snow storm the second evening.

While the most interesting aspect of the UKIT involves the possible re-match of old rivals Kentucky and West Virginia—who between them have accounted for seven UKIT championships—there is reason for spectator interest centering on their first-night foes.

Oregon State, due to face the Mountaineers in the opening game of the two-night double-header program, will make its first visit to Lexington with seven-footer Mel Counts—a junior pivotman called "potentially the best big man since Wilt Chamberlain. Iowa, also a newcomer to the intersectionally flavored UKIT, expects to make a strong bid for an improved season by becoming the first Big Ten team to cop the championship. The Hawkeyes, who return four starters, will be entering a holiday tournament for the sixth straight year and rate as a good "darkhorse" bet. They turned back UK in the 1956 NCAA in the only previous meeting of the two schools.

Crowd-pleasing West Virginia makes its fourth appearance in the UK classic in quest of a third title. The Mountaineers picked up top honors in 1957 and 1959—during the heyday of the great Jerry West—and dropped a decision to Kentucky in the championship game of 1958. A Kentucky-West Virginia wind-up would be a "natural," too, from the standpoint of stars. Just as the great Jerry West and Kentucky's All-America Johnny Cox dueled to the delight of fans, this year's game will pair All-Americans Cotton Nash of the Wildcats and Rod Thorn of the Mountaineers.

Nash, Baron Adolph Rupp's newest ace who busted records by the bucketful as a soph last season, will be the key to the youth-dominated Wildcats' hopes for a successful defense of the UKIT title they won for the fifth time last December.

In addition to laying claim to being the nation's richest cage extravaganza, the UKIT carries important national prestige as the winner annually makes a significant rise in the wire service polls. Twice in the past five years, the UKIT champion has vaulted to the top spot. Kentucky moved up to sixth last season on the strength of its stunning, 80-67, upset of previously unbeaten Kansas State.

University of Kentucky's spacious Memorial Coliseum, one of the largest and finest basketball arenas in the South, has been the site of portions of the NCAA Tournament six times since its completion in 1950. First round playoffs were staged in the UK Coliseum in 1955, 1959, 1960 and 1962 while regional tournaments were held in the building in both 1957 and 1958. The Wildcats played in the two-regional eliminations, being eliminated by Michigan State in '57 and defeating Miami (Ohio) and Notre Dame in '58 enroute to its fourth and last National Championship.

### KENTUCKY IN THE SEC

(Perhaps the greatest supremacy enjoyed by any team in any sport is reflected by Kentucky's basketball success in the Southeastern Conference since 1933. Against SEC teams, UK has annexed a record of 329 victories and lost only 43—a winning average of nearly 90 per cent. They have annexed 20 league championships and own over 60 team and individual records from regular season and tournament play. 

(Kentucky's home floor winning streak started against Ft. Knox on Jan. 4, 1943, following a loss to Ohio State two nights earlier. Before Ga. Tech snapped the string, the Wildcats had posted a national record 129 consecutive victories. All told, since the Ohio State loss, the Ruppmen have won 227 and lost only 13 at home. Since Memorial Coliseum became the home floor at the start of the 1950-51 season, the record is 143-13.)

# UK RECORD 20-GAME WINNERS

Kentucky lives up completely to its billing as the all-time champion of major college basketball with its run of 14 straight 20-victory seasons beginning in 1945, according to Boston sports authority Bill Mokray. The Wildcats were not permitted to field a team in 1953, but made up for it with a perfect record (25-0) the following season and continued their streak through 1959. Baron Adolph Rupp's warriors also achieved the magic circle with a 20-3 record in 1933 and posted a 24-3 mark in 1962. Only other major teams to boast of as many as ten straight 20-victory campaigns are North Carolina State and Western Kentucky—each showing 10-year runs. West Virginia, 24-6 last year to stretch its record to seven, is the only power currently close to threatening the cage elite.





# JOHN ADAMS (No. 45)

6-61/4 Soph. Center-Forward Rising Sun, Ind.

One of the top yearlings in the South a year ago, "Long John" Adams is sure to be equally at home as a first year varsity man this season . . . He's the tallest man on the Wildcat varsity at six-foot-six and one-quarter and Coach Rupp has pinpointed John as a distinct threat to break into the UK starting lineup . . . Utilizing Adams at the pivot in place of fellow soph standout Don Rolfes

(6-61/2), who would move over to play forward with 6-5 Cotton Nash, would give Kentucky a front line averaging a healthy 6-6-better height than any Rupp quintet has had in years. Adams looked great as a freshman, hustling to a 16.6 scoring mark and chalking up an average of 13.4 rebounds a game that stood second only to teammate Rolfe's contribution to a 13-5 Kitten cause . . . Adams, always aggressive, also posted the team high in personal fouls with 62 . . . But Coach Rupp declares: "I like the way this boy mixes it up under the boards. He's going to come up with the ball more often than not." . . . His freshman year rebounding high was 22 vs. Lindsey-Wilson JC . . . Adams' best shot is an easy hook from the circle area, but he has other shots . . . He staged a brilliant duel with teammate Don Rolfes for top freshman honors and should continue the battle as a sophomore . . . Blue Grass hardboots are predicting great things before long for this Hoosier hot shot . . . Adams hails from a small Indiana community (Rising Sun) 25 miles down river from his Cincinnati birthplace . . . He's one of two Indiana products on the team, joining guard Ron Kennett of Lawrenceburg . . . Mysteriously overlooked in All-State balloting while prepping at Rising Sun, John averaged 21 points and 22 rebounds a game in his final schoolboy campaign . . . He was closely watched by UK scouts for two years. Straight "A" student . . . Set conference high jump record of  $5-11\frac{1}{2}$  and was All-Conference pitcher-first baseman . . . 


## GEORGE ATKINS (No. 32)

6-5<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Senior Center-Forward Hopkinsville, Ky.

George Atkins never quite blossomed into the form predicted for him, but it is to his credit that he never quit battling in a sincere effort to do what was expected of him . . . This season, his final collegiate campaign, Atkins is not slated to see any basketball action while recuperating from a summer back operation on a non-basketball-connected injury . . . Last year, George saw

limited action in a reserve center capacity to score five points during short stints in seven of Kentucky's 26 contests . . . His total action time amounted to just 20 minutes, 52 seconds . . . Three points registered against arch-rival Tennessee represented his top point production effort . . . He was the biggest man, in terms of sheer height (nearly 6-6) on the height-poor Wildcat contingent of 1961-62 . . . As a Kentucky freshman in 1959-60, the former Hoptown All-Stater came along fast in his development in late season and wound up as the team's fourth best scorer with 159 points in 14 games. When further progress did not reach the desired peak his sophomore year, Atkins laid out of competition with the hope that added intensive practice and physical development would materially aid him in becoming a dependable performer . . . He gained some, but the competition was a little too stiff to handle and he had to settle for the less-glamour-filled job of reserve duty . . . In three years of schoolboy competition, Atkins tallied 1,621 points as a star center . . . His high point night was 40 and he went over 30 points a game 12 times . . . A good foul shooter, he hit 76.6 percent of his free throws as a UK freshman and was second in rebounds with 111 hauled down.



## SCOTTY BAESLER (No. 14)



5-11½ Senior Guard Lexington, Ky.

Diminutive Wildcat Captain Scotty Baesler, who typifies the "we ain't scared of nothing" attitude of last season's "Fearless Five," is the self-made-man type that sportswriters like to laud in success stories . . . The "Little Scotchman" last year fought his way up out of virtual obscurity to win a starting job on the Kentucky outfit that was to become

the nation's third-ranking cage power-and this season takes over as captain of the defending Southeastern Conference champions . . . A native Lexingtonian who attended a small county high school (Bryan Station), Baesler became the first athlete from his school ever to be awarded a major scholarship at Kentucky and one of the very few ever to play anywhere on a college team . . . The road to fame was a rocky one and his success has not come overnight . . . He shook off early season jitters as a freshman at UK to come off the bench and garner 170 points and a 12.1 average . . . The following campaign, his first as a varsity man, Baesler again ran into difficulties . . . He never started a game and saw only about 50 minutes of game action in half the schedule; was 10th in scoring with only 11 points and a meager average of .8 . . . But somewhere along the line in preseason practice last year, Scotty picked up that inimitable something that separates the stars from the "also rans" and the change turned him into a dependable performer who held down a starting guard job in every game . . . He posted a time in action of 935 minutes—second highest on the team—and contributed 283 points . . . Baesler, more valuable as a playmaker and "garbage collector" (grabbing loose balls) than a scorer, broke out with several strong scoring efforts topped by 26 points in the team's early-season setback at the hands of Southern California . . . He's typical of the "Little Men" who have been vital ingredients of almost all top Wildcat teams . . . He was the squad's smallest man last year and will be one of the smallest again this season . . . Baesler is not afraid to shoot and does well with a one-hand push, but prefers to feed the team's bigger men.

6-3 Junior Forward Bellbrook, Ohio

A virtual unknown hailing from the small Ohio community of Bellbrook (near Dayton), George Critz is a boy with potential ability who still has a lot to learn in the way of cage savvy . . . The road to regular duty with a team of Kentucky's calibre is a difficult one to traverse and Critz is finding the going rough . . . Nobody realizes better than Critz himself that he has a long way to go and he

is doing a good job of trying to prepare himself to be a dependable ball player . . . Kentucky coaches are hopeful that this learning process will begin to pay dividends this season with George making a much greater contribution than he did in his first varsity campaign last season . . . A year ago, he saw only the briefest of action—a little over six minutes in two games—and managed to pick up just two points and haul down an equal number of rebounds . . . He could help out at forward this year and see much more extensive duty with any degree of improvement in practice where basketball players are made . . . The name Critz, incidently, is pronounced CRY-ts and his father is a mechanical engineer in Bellbrook . . . George has ambitions to coach . . . He is not a bad shot, posting a 7.9 average in scoring for the frosh two years back while seeing action in all 18 games-14 of them as a starter . . . As a rebounder, he excelled with 131 grabs off the boards that ranked him third in this department of play with the freshmen . . . Critz has fair size (6-3 and 201 pounds) that helps him during the in-fighting and he has good moves . . . The main problem he has to lick is defensive play . . . His hustle as a prepster impressed Wildcat scouts as much as his scoring ability . . . Although the Ohioan achieved only honorable mention on the All-State list, his 1,600 points during four years at Sugar Creek High as a forward-center indicated a good chance for him in college ball . . . His high single game scoring mark in high school was 50 in his senior year and he was the school foul-shooting champ. Also took part in off-season sports of baseball and track.




## TED DEEKEN (No. 12)

6-3 Junior Forward Louisville, Ky.

One of four experienced hands returning to the stable of Kentucky's thoroughbreds, Ted Deeken definitely is being counted on by Coach Rupp to bolster a squad which lost seven lettermen . . . The Baron has indicated that much better things are expected of this former Louisville Flaget All-State star once the season gets underway . . . Deeken was one of the team's top reserves a year

ago and, from all indications, may be cast in this role again in 1962-63 . . . But he easily could surprise with any improvement at all . . . The talent is there and competition is the only obstacle standing in his path . . . To see regular duty at forward, he must move out All-America Cotton Nash or defensive specialist Roy Roberts . . . He is not on the No. 1 unit in pre-season speculation, but could well be the valuable No. 6 man . . . Rupp says Deeken is improving and should see nearly as much action as any starter . . . "Deek's" career at Kentucky the past two seasons pinpoints him as promising . . . As a freshman, he operated as the Kittens' starting forward and registered points at a 17.7 clip that was second only to forward running mate Nash . . . Ted's free throw proficiency and rebounding were instrumental in the UK yearling's feat of posting new school season records . . . He ranked as the most accurate frosh charity tosser with an 83.3 accuracy mark and his 188 rebounds were second only to Nash's total . . . Only the lack of rugged size (172 pounds distributed over a 6-3 frame) prevents him from being an exceptionally fine rebounder . . . Last season, Deeken played in 14 of the Wildcats' 26 games for a total of nearly 62 minutes and contributed 29 points . . . His high was six points against Miami (Ohio) . . . His floor play and steadying influence far surpassed his actual point production and earned him a letter . . . Deeken saw most of his schoolboy duty at center, but switched to forward as a Kentucky freshman . . . He led Flaget to the state schoolboy championship and was considered one of the top prospects of the state in 1960 . . . Named to the All-State unit, starred in Kentucky-Indiana All-Star series and served as co-captain of West in East-West All-Star Game in '60.




# PAT DOYLE (No. 33)

6-21/2 Senior Forward Calvert City, Ky.

Wildcat coaches would like nothing better than to be pleasantly surprised by this smiling Irishman . . . Pat Doyle came to Kentucky in 1959 with a tremendous high school reputation capped by an outstanding performance in leading his unheralded North Marshall five in its surprise bid for the Kentucky state schoolboy championship . . . Call it fate, competition, lack of game experience

or what have you, Pat has never quite attained the level of an outstanding collegiate cager and nobody is more puzzled and disappointed over the lack of expected improvement than Coach Rupp . . . There's little evidence to indicate his final season as a Wildcat this year could see him blossom into a high-calibre performer, but nobody is giving up on Pat and the boy himself is determined to bow out with a muchimproved season . . . As a freshman in 1959-60, Doyle saw action in only six games as academic troubles sidelined him for the second semester . . . He contributed just 47 points and 34 rebounds for the abbreviated campaign and the following season failed to see action at all due to slow development in the early stages resulting from lack of game experience . . . Although he showed better development last season, Doyle still was behind other more talented players in progress and managed to break into a game only six times for a total playing time of 13:06 . . . His point production came with two points scored in the Wildcats' rout of Notre Dame . . . Doyle has evidenced a willingness to mix it up with bigger men under both boards and this could aid him to seeing more action at forward this season . . . Lack of exceptional height (he's 6-21/2) will be some handicap . . . He could be a good bet for spot duty in several games this season . . . Doyle achieved All-State honor and All-America mention while playing at North Marshall . . . At UK last year, he also pitched (0-1) for the baseball team and was a .200 hitter.


## RANDY EMBRY (No. 10)

5-10 Sophomore Guard Owensboro, Ky.

Typical of the "Little Man" that has often been the key ingredient of some of Baron Adolph Rupp's finest teams, Randy Embry is a little long-range bomber with a deadly eye and speed afoot . . . He follows in the footsteps of (and hopes to emulate) his high school coach, Bobby Watson—captain of Kentucky's 1952 defending National Champions and twice (1951-52) honored on the

All-Southeastern Conference team at guard . . . Embry actually reminds long-time Wildcat fans of Watson, who also was small in stature and a terrific long shot . . . The little guy also has another idol, fellow Owensboro product Cliff Hagan who achieved All-America at UK in 1952 and '54 . . . Randy isn't pegged for a starting spot on Kentucky's varsity during his break-in season primarily because his development as a freshman last year was slowed as he missed a stretch of nine games in mid-season with a broken ankle . . . Evidence of his potential, however, is reflected by the fact that the Kittens lost only twice while he was in the lineup and seemingly picked up in tempo when he returned in late season . . . His contribution for the abbreviated season was an 8.7 scoring average on 79 points . . . This year, he is being counted on to perform mainly in a pinch-hitter role, probably called on most to fire his long aerial bombs over enemy zone defenses . . . The 5-10 pepperpot floor general has all the qualifications for eventual stardom . . . As an Owensboro Red Devil, he twice was named to the All-State team, attained All-America selection and was voted most valuable player of the region and "Mr. Basketball" of the Kentucky-Indiana series . . . His career scoring total of 1,617 points ranked second in the Western Kentucky region only to Hagan's mark and he actually bettered Hagan's average, 17.9 to 17.4 . . . Embry's final schoolboy campaign saw him credited with 777 points and a single game high of 50 . . . During his break-in season, the little guy's one-game high was 21 against Lindsey-Wilson Junior College . . . In the off season, Embry is quite a baseball player as a third baseman.

Pre-season practice has seen the "Pride of the Purchase" surge to the forefront among candidates seeking to take over

guard post vacated by All-Conference Larry Pursiful and he is tentatively ticketed for starting duty . . . Sam, who is no relation to another boy on the current Kentucky roster by the name of Tom Harper, was very impressive as a forward and guard last season while playing with the freshmen . . . He wound up as the team's No. 3 scorer behind Don Rolfes and John Adams with a respectable, 14.1 average on 254 points in 18 games . . . Proving that he has a good eye for the basket, Sam posted the second best accuracy mark from the field (51.1 percent), hit 72.2 percent of his free throws and hauled down 105 rebounds . . . Harper tied teammate Rolfes for the honor of registering the most field goals in a single game as he notched 12 against the Tennessee frosh . . . Many observers figured the former Hickman County High standout to be a better prospect at forward than guard while he alternated between the two positions both in schoolboy play and in his freshman collegiate season . . . Still he proved himself versatile enough to take over the weakened guard job and is expected to do well . . . Harper, who was born in Fulton, Ky., has very fine speed and agility built into his  $6-2\frac{1}{2}$ , 180-pound frame . . . He shows excellent spring in his legs to go after the ball on either board when the occasion demands and is a fine ball handler-passer who fits well as a cog in a fast break offensive pattern . . . Performances have also rated him a fine defensive operative . . . Posted a 20-point average in his final year of high school ball . . . His father cures and sells famous old Kentucky country hams back home.




# TOMMY HARPER (No. 31)

6-11/2 Junior Guard Winchester, Ky.

One of the best floor shots ever to play the cage sport in the state of Kentucky, Tommy Harper has found the collegiate game a little more complicated than just firing the ball toward the basket . . . He enters his second varsity season with a lesson well learned, but the road to regular duty still is likely to be a rocky one for Tommy . . . The former Clark County High star continues to have

defensive troubles and other finer difficulties that he must overcome this season in order to see considerably more game duty than he did a year ago . . . His coaches, however, anticipate improved play from Harper and he could be a top flight reserve if that improvement comes to the forefront early in the campaign when lineup plans are formulated . . . In sparse action last season, Tommy led the team in point proficiency (time required to score a point) with an 84-second average . . . He played in just four games for a total time of 8:26 and scored six points . . . His high came in the Baylor game when he had four points . . . Starting 17 of the freshman team's 18 games at guard, he posted a very respectable, 16.7 scoring average with 306 points . . . Tommy connected from the field at a 45.5 percent accuracy clip that was the best of any regular and had a high point effort of 32 . . . He showed steady development in his scoring from midseason on . . . He's a shade taller than the traditional UK guard, but has good speed and outside shooting ability . . . Averaged 25.7 points a game in his senior year while playing mostly at forward and won a spot on the first unit of the All-State team . . . His final year collection of 919 points represented a new school record . . . A 60foot shot by the sterling southpaw in the final four seconds avoided an upset of Clark County by Lexington Henry Clay in 1960 and was one of many such sensational fielders . . . He's no relation to teammate Sam Harper.




# CHARLES ISHMAEL (No. 22)

6-4½ Junior Guard Mt. Sterling, Ky.

Just like last year, Charles (Chili) Ishmael has to be given a "darkhorse" label in preseason figuring on the Wildcats' opening combination . . . One thing is more certain: Coach Rupp feels the sizeable Kentuckian will be an improved player this season and this could add up to considerably more game action time than the lanky youngster managed to amass in 1961-62 . . . For the past

season, Chili appeared in just eight games and totaled only 33:45 time in action . . . This did not speak well from the standpoint of a promising freshman campaign the year before, but his development had been curtailed by academic difficulties in the second semester of that opening collegiate year . . . This season could be different . . . He is expected to play much more, although it appears that his action will be limited again to a reserve role unless he generates a bit more steam in early games than he has developed in pre-season practice sessions . . . A word of caution is in order, however, against selling him out of the starting picture entirely—two sophs are scheduled now to open at the problem guard spots and if they falter there could be a spot for Ishmael . . . He is now in good grace with both the professors and Coach Rupp . . . Chili, who came to UK on a football scholarship but gave up the sport after playing end with the gridiron frosh in 1960, looked like a terrific prospect in his freshman cage year despite reporting late . . . He posted a 12.9 scoring average and recovered 74 rebounds in 11 games—10 of them as a starter—before becoming ineligible . . . Last year as a sophomore, he garnered only 16 points while playing only briefly in support of strong guard combination Larry Pursiful and Scotty Baesler . . . Ishmael, who was a two-sport standout at Mt. Sterling High, earned second team All-State honors in both basketball and football as well as most valuable player designations in those sports plus baseball during his final schoolboy season in 1959-60.

# RON KENNETT (No. 50)


5-11½ Sophomore Guard Lawrenceburg, Ind.

One of the smallest men on the Kentucky team for 1962-63, Ron Kennett makes up for his lack of size (5-11½ and 165 pounds) with hustle, determination, speed and shooting ability . . . Like teammates Randy Embry and Capt. Scotty Baesler, he is the "Little Man" variety that Coach Rupp has a fondness for since many of his best teams have had little guys as a vital cog . . . He

can pour 'em in from long range and holds his own in defense against people somewhere near his size . . . Kennett is exceptionally aggressive, a good ball handler and fine feeder in the best tradition of small Kentucky guards of the past . . . He is classed as being possessed with the blazing speed that makes a fast break, such as the Wildcats utilize, work to perfection . . . The speedy Hoosier, who joins with Rising Sun's John Adams in giving the 'Cats a rare Indiana flavor, is being counted on for considerable reserve duty at Kentucky's weakened guard posts this season . . . During his first collegiate campaign a year ago, Kennett stood fifth in freshman scoring with an 8.6 average on 155 points collected in 18 Kitten games . . . Although he started only seven contests, Ron saw a lot of action and posted a high single game total of 25 points in mid-season against Parkette-YMCA . . . As a schoolboy, he was classed as one of the outstanding playmakers in Indiana and gained selection on the All-Conference team after producing 400 points for Lawrenceburg . . . Coach Rupp, who personally signed the boy, says Kennett "should fit into the pattern of outstanding guards of his size and talent that we have had so much success with in the past." . . . In the off-season at Lawrenceburg, Ron took part in baseball as an infielder-pitcher and in track as a broad jumper . . . He had a terrific first season of baseball at UK last spring as a shortstop and hit a sensational .433 to stand second on the club that went through the season undefeated in eight games.

6-2 Sophomore Guard Harrodsburg, Ky.

A former All-State basketeer who led his Harrodsburg team to an undefeated regular season in his final schoolboy year, Terry Mobley figures prominently in Coach Rupp's jlans for another successful campaign . . . Pre-season consideration has him pegged for a starting job at guard in place of graduated All-Conference star Larry Pursiful . . . If this comes about as expected, it would be

quite a jump for the first Harrodsburg boy ever to play at UK and for one who saw action in just 13 games of his freshman season last year . . . Mobley ran into book trouble and had to lay out of competition during the second semester . . . However, he did give good indication of his potential in the games he played-hitting points at an 11.8 clip with a high of 28 against the college-star-studded Lexington YMCA . . . Through the part of the season he played, Mobley connected at a phenomenal, 82.6 percent on his free throw attempts to carry on a tremendous accuracy mark of 94 percent from high school play . . . The 6-2, 188 pounder played both guard and forward for the UK frosh . . . An ankle injury plagued Mobley some in mid-season but he came back strong to aid the cause of a team nicknamed "Century Express" for going over the 100-point mark six times during the campaign . . . A well-built boy, Terry does not hesitate to mix it up with anybody under the boards but rarely gets a chance to rebound . . . What has impressed UK coaches most is Mobley's desire to drive for the basket, a la ex-Wildcat All-America Frank Ramsey . . . His shortcomings are in the defensive department of his play, but this is improving . . . The widely-sought All-State star, who posted a 23-point average in his final year at Harrodsburg, reportedly turned down scholarships from 50 other schools to attend his homestate university . . . Coached at one time in high school by former UK All-American (1932-33) Forrest (Aggie) Sale . . . He's a good student and fine leader . . . Also starred as a catcher in high school baseball and took part in cross country running . . . He was a .362 hitter, but did not take part in the sport as a UK freshman last spring due to scholastic ineligibility.

# CHARLES (Cotton) NASH (No. 44) 6-5 Junior Forward-Center Leominster, Mass.

All-America . . . SEC Player of the Year . . . Conference scoring champion . . . First soph ever to win unanimous All-Conference . . . All-NCAA Regional . . . Record breaker deluxe! . . . That about sums up Cotton Nash—the nation's second best basketball player as a sensational sophomore last season . . . Ohio State's Lucas is gone from the college scene and Nash looms as the undisputed top

returning cager in America . . . Cotton, who got his nickname as a youngster when his blonde hair was almost white, flashed onto the scene last year as the most talked about sophomore in the land; he lived up to every inch of his reputation and the nation's basketball writers made him only the sixth soph in history to be honored on their first AA five . . . He was also named to numerous other teams, including the Helms Foundation team, and generally was the only non-senior on the first three teams of other recognized selections . . . AP, UPI, Sporting News and Converse were among those picking him on their second team . . . Nash, who became the first soph in 10 years to win the Southeastern Conference scoring title (23.8 average), eclipsed a whole bucketful of scoring records (18) set by numerous Wildcat All-America greats of the past—generally in their senior years . . . He missed only a couple of seasonal marks and will be after them this year along with some career standards set by the likes of Cliff Hagan, Frank Ramsey, Alex Groza, Johnny Cox, Vernon Hatton and Bill Spivey . . . Jumping center and playing forward, Cotton got most of his points from outside with a high-arching, jump shot that was almost unstoppable . . . He was an excellent ball handler and versatile enough to take the ball off the defensive board, bring it down floor single-handedly and score . . . Nash's final point accounting totaled 608 points and averaged 23.4 for 926:56 action time in all 26 games . . . He has the god-given ability to rebound with the big boys, run with the little ones, shoot with the best of both and handle himself with amazing efficiency at any spot on the floor . . . He was one of the nation's smallest centers last year, but was outjumped by only two (John Rudometkin of So. Calif. and Ohio State's Jerry Lucas) and was the SEC's No. 3 rebounder on a 13.6 average . . . Coach Rupp sums up his 22nd All-American by saying: "He's not as smooth as Cliff Hagan and not as fast as Ralph Beard or Frank Ramsey, but he has got the real goods and could well win me another NCAA championship like those fellows did. If he continues to develop, as we think he will, he could turn out to be the best." . . . Rupp cautions, however, that his star has to make improvement and pre-season practice has yet to bring that improvement . . . The coach toyed with the idea of switching his ace to guard this season, but has just about given up the thought . . . Instead, he plans to utilize him in an interchanging forward-pivot role with his newest "find"-soph Don Rolfes . . . The one who does not take the rebound will go down floor to play pivot while the other operates at forward . . . Coach Rupp's idea of a perfect game for Nash is for him to get 36 points, 18 rebounds, 10 assists and hold his man to four . . . Nearest Nash came to this last year was against Vanderbilt when he picked up 38 points (one of nine times he was 30 or over), 16 rebounds, four assists and his man got six . . . King Cotton is a threat anytime he crosses the center line, also hooks well and operates with deadly effectiveness in close . . . Also a most clever passer and unselfish in giving teammates opportunities . . . Born in Jersey City, N. J., he took his first two years of schooling in Jeffersonville, Ind., where he fas tutored in basketball by ex-Wildcat Cliff Barker. Moving to Lake Charles, La., Cotton proceeded to demolish Louisiana schoolboy records in basketball, football, track and baseball . . . He has been a standout at UK in everything except football . . . 
# DENNY RADABAUGH (No. 52)


6-31/2 Sophomore Forward Sayanna, III.

ened his pace of improvement and he likely will have to settle this season for reserve status while picking up the added cage savvy that should help him over the hump . . . Denny was the leading scorer in the State of Illinois in his final schoolboy season at Savanna High and came to UK with a reputation as one of the top basketeers producted in the midwest . . . The All-Tri-State (Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin league) choice posted a 30.5 scoring average at Savanna Community High in 1960-61 and had a single game high of 57 points . . . Denny led his team's scoring three straight years and showed an accumulation of 1,880 points for his schoolboy career in which he set new school records in every department of play except single game assists and season free throw percentage . . . Radabaugh is considered a fine rebounder (he had 140 in 18 games as a yearling last year) and a good shot at fairly close ranges . . . All-Southeastern Conference Scholastic team choice Roy Roberts, the Georgia peach who came north, is back for a final unselfish effort toward aiding the cause of the Kentucky Wildcats . . . Nobody could be happier about the decision to return than Roy—unless it is his coach . . . Adolph Rupp, who always figures the worth of his basketeers by scoring margin rather than just number of

points, thinks of Roberts as "one of the finest defensive men in the country today." . . . He assessses Roberts not as a great scorer but invaluable because he keeps a good working margin by stopping his opponent from getting his average number of points . . . Roy came out of nowhere (he had not scored a point the previous two years) last season to become a consistent starter for the "Fearless Five" . . . Roberts' consistently great defensive contributions could not be overlooked in analyzing the team's achievements . . . Also not to be forgotten was his rebounding total of 215—second best on the team . . . In the scoring department, he added a 7.0 average for 181 points in the Wildcats' 26 games . . . Only slow development and the lack. of exceptional size and ruggedness held him back prior to last season . . . Roberts has the speed and shooting ability to get the job done and will be given a nod to defend his starting job at the outset of the current year . . . He is only the third Georgian on the Kentucky cage squad in recent years . . . Previous Georgia natives were seven-foot Bill Spivey of Warner-Robbins, an All-America center here in 1951, and 6-7 pivotman Ed Beck of Ft. Roberts came to Kentucky the season after Beck graduated with perhaps even more impressive credentials than either of his predecessors . . . Regarded as one of the finest schoolboy prospects in the nation at the time of his enrollment at Kentucky, "Big Red" Rolfes lived up to every inch of his outstanding reputation during a terrific break-in season last winter and this year already is drawing rave notices from Coach Rupp . . . The Baron declares his newest "find"—who looms as Kentucky's 23rd All-America—is a much

improved ball player over his freshman campaign in which Rolfes paced the Kittens with a 21.1 average and rebounded at a team-leading 14.3 clip . . . Such talk from the man who already has All-America Cotton Nash as a steadying stable mate for the youthful Rolfes strikes fear in the hearts of opponents and brings joy to the already enthusiastic Wildcat fans . . . According to Coach Rupp, Rolfes "could easily be the best offensive center at Kentucky since All-America Cliff Hagan." . . . Rolfes is due to give UK much improved pivot play as well as welcome height on the front line, but what's more Rupp has a neat trick up his sleeve that should make Rolfes (and Nash) even more effective . . . He's planning an interchange system that will have the two aces alternating in the pivot— Rolfes in there if Nash is busy getting a rebound or vice versa, depending on who isn't busy and who gets down floor first . . . Such a maneuver will be of particular benefit to Rolfes who is not exceptionally fast and has real good moves for rebounds . . . The fast break attack will not want for a pivotman . . . The 6-61/2 red head from Harrison, Ohio, who was lured to Kentucky in lieu of Ohio State and a great number of other schools in every section of the country, played mostly at center as a UK freshman last season . . . Don, an All-America second team choice in 1960-61 at Harrison (Ohio) High, led all schoolboy scorers in Ohio with a 30.4 average and rebounded at a 21-per-game clip . . . He also was All-State and Player of the Year for Greater Cincinnati as he paced Harrison (25 miles northwest of his Cincinnati Birthplace near the Indiana line) to an undefeated regular season of 20 straight wins.

Coach Rupp says of Broderson: "He comes as near to looking like George Mikan as a freshman as anyone I know." . . . Dick came to Kentucky from the small Iowa farming community of Clinton and was personally scouted by Coach Rupp when Kentucky was visiting Iowa City last March for the NCAA Tournament . . . He is believed to be the first Iowa boy on the UK varsity . . . In his final schoolboy year at Clinton, Dick was named on the second All-State team and rated as high as third team All-America . . . Averaged 17 points and 12 rebounds a game . . . UK coaches are counting on him to develop in time into a sound cager.

LARRY CONLEY—6-3 Forward-Guard—Ashland, Ky.—This first team schoolboy All-America selection from Ashland was one of Kentucky's most widely-sought prepsters . . . Conley was a do-everything guy for his high school team, playing a major role in leading his surprising Tomcats into the state finals . . . The son of State Senator and SEC cage official George Conley, he is described as a coach's dream and ball player's ball player who does everything well . . . Conley is cited for leadership, quick hands, maneuverability and thinking ability . . . His 20.6 scoring average last season gave him a new school career scoring mark . . . A tremendous playmaker and rebounder (12 average), he played all positions for Ashland in basketball and was a first baseman in baseball during the off season . . . Displays terrific stamina despite "skinny" (6-3 and 165) appearance.

MICKEY GIBSON—6-2 Forward—Hazard, Ky.—Coach Rupp paid Mickey a terrific compliment in his final high school season when he declared upon signing Gibson that "this boy is as good as anybody I've seen." . . . Also a second team All-State quarterback in football and his team's most valuable player in both sports . . . He was a state finalist in high hurdles in track and leading hitter two years in baseball . . . Pre-season practice has stamped Kron, tallest UK guard in years, as most promising.

LARRY LENTZ—6-8 Center—Lakeview, Ohio—This youthful cage giant from the Buckeye State teams with 6-9 Dick Broderson to give the Wildcats the promise of better days from a height standpoint . . . He has the physical makeup and works hard enough to improve himself to become a fine collegiate cager in time . . . Lentz is being counted on to play vital roles in UK's basketball future . . . A big, strong individual, he operated as a pivotman in outstanding fashion for Indian Lake High in nearby Lewistown and averaged 22 points a game plus 14 rebounds last season in leading his club into tournament play . . . Blessed with great touch for a big man, he shot with amazing accuracy to hit 78 percent of his free tosses and 61 percent from the field . . . Has a variety of shots that lets him get baskets inside or out . . . Gained only honorable mention on All-State lists . . . President of his senior class and a fine student, he plans to study pharmacy at UK.

JIMMY ROSE—6-2 Guard—Wheelwright, Ky.—Better known to teammates as "Jim Bo" from High Hat, Rose is an All-State jumping jack who was the first of the current crop of yearlings to be signed last winter . . . 





# WHO WERE THE 'FABULOUS FIVE'?

The most frequently asked question tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), Wah Wah Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1948 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA tite and went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games—helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the '48 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 on a record of 36-2. Members of these two teams later gained fame in the pro ranks as they formed a unit known as the Indianapolis Olympians. And, along with contemporary Wildcats Adrian Smith and Billy Evans, they give UK and Coach Rupp a unique standing of seven Olympic gold medal winners.

### WILDCATS ARE POPULAR

At home or on the road, Baron Adolph Rupp and his colorful Kentucky Wildcats are one of college basketball's biggest drawing cards. The largest crowd ever to see the Kentuckians in action turned out last March to witness the opening night of the NCAA Mideast Regional at Freedom Hall in Louisville. A tournament-record crowd of 18,833 witnessed Kentucky whip Morehead and Ohio State top Louisville. Another banner crowd of 17,494 the following night broke all existing NCAA records for two-night play. Other top crowds to see the Wildcats were 18,493 in Madison Square Garden for a St. John's game Dec. 21, 1946; 18,803 who witnessed the Kentucky-Seattle national championship match at Louisville March 22, 1958; and 18,274 attending a regular season clash between Kentucky and Illinois at Freedom Hall in Louisville Dec. 30, 1958. At their own Memorial Coliseum in Lexington, the Ruppmen play to virtual capacity crowds every time out. The record one-night crowd was 12,268 who saw UK lose to Mississippi State Feb. 12, 1962. For the home season, the high total is 165,495 in 16 games of the 1961-62 campaign. Testifying to the popularity of the cage sport in Lexington is the unsurpassed Coliseum record of 12,734 fans who squeezed in for a high school doubleheader on Jan. 8, 1952.


## GREATEST TEAM, PLAYER, THRILL?

Adolph Rupp's illustrious career as headmaster at Kentucky for more than three decades is certainly filled with a lot of memories for him and he's willing to share many of them with anyone who'll listen. But there are lines he will not cross, such as:

Greatest team?—Rupp points to four national champion outfits and an undefeated team that probably could have taken the national title if it had tried. Listeners get the impression that he would narrow the choice down to two—the "Fabulous Five" Olympic champions of '48 and the possibly even greater 1954 crew that went undefeated in 25 games to become the best perfect-record unit up to that time.




HAGGIN HALL

# SUCCESSOR TO A 'WHITE ELEPHANT'

Only a little more than a quarter century ago, the University of Kentucky provided its basketball team with its second home—a magnificent new Alumni Gymnasium seating 2,800 spectators.

A great many persons freely suggested that the arena would prove to be a "white elephant" which would never be crowded to anywhere near capacity by the sport that then was considered little more than innocuous winter-months' pastime.

But the hardwood game blitzed the nation and Kentucky's teams forged to the national forefront in such a crowd-pleasing manner that the "huge" hall soon could not begin to accommodate the large number of fans seeking to whet their new-found interest. In fact, the situation soon developed to the point where only the student body and faculty were admitted and for several years about all that Kentuckians at large knew of their state university's famed cage teams consisted of information gleaned from the radio and newspapers.

In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health service, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentucky heroes who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along Avenue of Champions, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games but also serves as the site of a sellout community concert and lecture series as well as numerous physical education classes and conventions.

In sharp contrast to the early days in Alumni Gym, the present hall plays host to more than 150,000 Kentuckians annually for appearances of the famous Wildcat cage teams alone and interest is increasing with such strides that even this splendid arena may someday be outgrown.

# RUPP AND UK WINNINGEST IN 20 YEARS

Kentucky and Coach Adolph Rupp are collegiate basketball's most unbeatable combination any way you look at it.

This long-claimed fact has been verified by an authoritative survey completed by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau on the top team and coaching records of the last decade and also of the past 20 years ending in 1961.

The NCAA Service Bureau's figures show Kentucky's Wildcats, who have been under the tutelage of Baron Rupp exclusively since 1930, head the major colleges in winning percentage at both the 10-year and 20-year levels by outstanding margins.

Coach Rupp's personal record far exceeds those posted by his nearest rivals to firmly establish his right to the rank of college basketball's winningest tutor.

# T-VIEWING THE WILDCATS

Kentucky's Wildcats have winning ways that make them particularly tough when in focus of the television cameras. In seven appearances during the past 11 years before the national television audience, Coach Adolph Rupp's crew has come out victorious each time. Their first experience on television is believed to have been in the NCAA eastern finals at Madison Square Garden in 1951 when games with St. John's and Illinois were televised nationally. Portions of a game with Loyola in Chicago Stadium Feb. 15, 1957, were aired as part of a salute to Coach Rupp on the old "Tonight" show. NBC-TV's "Game of the Week" series in 1958-59 featured three UK wins at the expense of St. Louis, LSU and Tennessee and a similar series in 1960-61 carried by ABC-TV saw the Wildcats measure Georgia Tech in a Memorial Coliseum game. Several other Kentucky road games have been televised locally or regionally in recent years.

## 'BANNER' AND NO. 6

According to tradition, Kentucky's basketballing Wildcats have a pet pattern that they execute the first time they get the ball in a game. The nationally-famous saying attributed to UK Coach Adolph Rupp is "Star Spangled Banner and then No. 6." This stems from Rupp's strategy of running the strategic guard-around play of Kentucky's repetorire and the reason, Rupp explains, is simple: "It tells us immediately if the opposing team is playing a zone defense against us." The basic, guard-around pattern has been employed by Kentucky as it raced to four national championships and has produced eight All-America guards during the Rupp Era.
