Galbraith said too much emphasis has been taken off Kentucky's "greatest resource" — the land. He said he wants to protect farmers rights by making sure smokers' rights are protected.

Galbraith also said he wants to adde hew and supplementary crops," like hemp, to the traditional tobacco products. "Serendipitously, Gow. Breetton Jones has taken the lead in promoting the investigation of the hemp crop," Galbraith said, who supports the action. "And I'll certainly have something to say about that."

Jones formed a statewide task force, including UK's Dean of Agriculture Oran C. Little, last week to explore the viability of non-narcotic hemp.

WORLD Bosnia offered agreement for peace

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina — Mediators began a diplomatic blitz yesterday in hopes of persuading the Bosnian government to accept a peace plan that could include a federation between Bosnia's Serbs and Yugoslavia. U.S., Russian, British, French and German mediators from the so-called contact group met with government leaders in hopes of slavaging a negotiated end to the war, not an outright military victory for Serbs.

U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali is expected in Sarajevo today to discuss a possible cease-fire and an end to harassment of the 24,000 escekeepers, 400 of whom are detained by Bosnian Serbs as insurance against NATO air strikes.

NATION House passes GATT

WATION House passes GATT

WASHINGTON — The House, brushing off critics who protested the legitimacy of a vote by a lame-duck Congress, passed a sweeping world trade agreement vesterday. President Clinton hailed it as a "historic vote for American workers, farmers and families."

The House voted 288-146 for the rewrite of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, sending the measure to the Senate, where supporters were still searching for the votes needed for passage.

The four hours of debate were brought to a close by House Speaker Thomas Foley, who in his final speech in the chamber where he had served for 30 years urged his colleagues to pass the measure.

The GATT accord would cut tariffs by 38 percent worldwide, expand the rules of world trade to new areas such as agriculture and services and create a new, more powerful World Trade Organization to referee disputes.

The administration estimated that the reduced tariffs equate to a \$744 billion global tax cut over a decade.

decade. For Americans, it would represent a \$70 billion cut in border taxes on imported goods and services over 10 years.

The population of U.S. prisons is 45 percent black, far above the percentage of blacks in the general

population.

This is not because blacks are more prone to commit bad acts.

Rather, this is, to some extent, the effect of a system that allows the subconscious racial biases of police officers, lawyers, judges and juries to come into play in the apprehension and conviction of individuals; but it is predominantly the result of a system that defines crime along racial lines.

The most egregious example of this racism is the disparity between crack and cocaine sentences.

Worry over quotas hurts quality

After only two and a half months in my new position as NPHC advisor here at the University of Kentucky, I have been struck by several glaring differences in black and white greek letter organizations. I must admit that being a product of two undergraduate institutions where white greeks did not exist (the U.S. Naval Academy, which does not allow fraternities or sororities of any kind and all Black male Morehouse College), I started the school year rather uninformed. My very first expo-sure to white greeks, in earnest, was 1994 Sorority Fall Rush. I was amazed by the organization and sheer complexity of the endeavor. Fraternity Rush was not equally complex, but also quite interesting in the differences it brought to light concerning IFC, PHC, and NPHC orga-

Being a graduate student in Political Science, I am not naive enough to believe that black and white differences are restricted to greek life. No, this is far from true. In actuality, I have found that there are a plethora of racial differences brought from students' interpersonal environment which causes them to be prejudiced and discriminatory on the greek plane (this goes both ways from black to white, as well as, from white to black). So,
many of the problems that we encounter in Greekdom
are societal ones which are simply transferred into, not
created by, greek life. But some differences are not necessarily problems in and of themselves. I could write volumes on differences that are problematic, but will not in this article. The difference that Rush impressed upon

me was the issue of quantity.

White greek chapters are driven by the number of people they are able to pledge per year. The sorority notion of "quota" was totally foreign to me as it is many members of NPHC organizations. The reasoning behind the initiation and maintenance of this practice are actu-



ally quite logical (with finances being at the forefront). though some of the repercussions are almost hideous. Certainly the small chapters are the ones who are helped, but at the same time intensely threatened by the quota system. I have heard stories of national chapters of PHC, as well as IFC groups, threatening to close see of PHC, as well as IFC groups, threatening to close or actually closing chapters because they had a small number of members

This is a phenomenon which does not exist among NPHC groups. The only way one of our chapters dies, because of membership concerns is if there are NO members left on the campus. There are many instances of chapters functioning with three, two, or even one member in extreme cases. Only at large predominantly member in extreme cases. Only at large predominantly black institutions can one find chapters that exceed thirty or forty members at any given time. I would like to say that this is another example of quality over quantity, but I cannot. Unfortunately for NPHC groups, the small number of pledges does not always represent quality students and members. Neither does the presence of greater numbers among white groups denote superior quality (or inferior quality). The question of quality, however, is a problem. This problem is one that crosses racial and gender lines. es racial and gender lines.

Concluding with my humble opinion, I feel that the constant obsession with numbers by some groups damages their chances of maintaining quality pledge classes. This sentiment is one that has also been expressed by several concerned white greeks, both male and female. But, the eradication of the numbers game alone will not solve the quality problem, in and of itself (as black greeks can attest). Maybe both factions can come together at some point to address this question and help move each other forward into the 21st Century, without all of our organizations being destroyed. The help could certainly be used by both sides.

NOV - DEC Rush: new friends, new options

Rush is a two way process in which the fraternities and sororities select new members and the rushees select the groups they wish to join.

Although rush is really an ongoing process which lasts throughout the school year and into the summer, most rushing and pledging is done during the first two weeks of each semester.

Even though the rushing period is the same for both fraternities and sororities, there are great differences in fraternity rush and sorority rush.

Sororities hold a formal, structured rush which begins 10 days before the beginning of classwork. During sorority rush, all candidates are required to visit each sorority house in accordance with schedules drawn up by the UK Panhellenic Council, the governing body for all sororities.

Each girl is required to visit every house at least once. There she has an opportunity to watch skits and programs put on by the members of the sororities.

At the early visits, each girl will meet as many members as possible, and lasting friendships are formed whether or not the girl pledges that particular sorority.

As the week of sorority parties progresses, the sororities determine which girls they would like to extend membership invitations to, and the girls narrow their choices of possible sororities. "Preference night" is the final night when the girls visit only their top three choic-

Formal rush comes to a close with the prospective members' listing their top sorority choices, and the sororities listing their prime prospects.

The two lists are then compared by computer, each girl will then have the opportunity to pledge the sorority she will be most comfortable with.

Fraternity rush, in comparison with the rigid structure of formal sorority rush, often seems like mass confusion

Fraternity rush is held for approximately 10 days, beginning on the Sunday night, two days before classes open, when most freshmen are checking into dorms and getting adjusted to the campus.

Most fraternities post their rush schedules in the dorms, and unless a date is indicated "invitation only", it is fairly safe to assume that all of the parties listed are open to all comers.

For those wishing to get a "head start" on fraternity rush, the University of Kentucky Interfraternity Council mails out "rush interest" forms. Returning the forms places the

prospective fraternity man's name on a list which is circulated among the fraternities. Many of the fraternities hold summer functions and mail out invitations directly from the IFC rush interest list.

Once a rushee arrives on campus for "open rush", the choice of which and how many houses he visits is left up to him.

It is strongly recommended, however, that all rushees visit as many houses as possible during rush. This allows them to get a better feel for fraternity life and what it is all about.

Fraternity rush parties have many different themes. From Disco shows to casino nights to hayrides to "jungle juice nights", the underlying theme is always same: having fun while meeting the brothers of the fra-

As the often frantic fraternity rush week goes on, the fraternities extend bids (membership invitations) to any

prospect they desire to have as a new brother.

An important difference in fraternity and sorority rush lies in the fact that while a girl will generally receive only one bid from one sorority, a rushee may collect any number of bids from different fraternities

It is then left up the the rushee to decide which, if any fraternity he will pledge.

Greek life is not for everyone. But without going through rush it is impossible to know if being a Greek is worthwhile. Not going out for rush will not only be missing a great time, but it will also be missing a chance to make lifetime friendships, and most importantly, missing the opportunity to join a worthwhile group. Go through rush to be fair to yourself. With UK's strong Greek system the chances are good that there will be a fraternity or sorority to call home at the University of Kentucky

Leadership Opportunities through Greek System

A Greek organization is a group of individuals with similar interests and values, joined together by common goals and aspirations. These bonds are created through rituals to which all members pledge themselves

Common principles such as honor, friendship, truth, and knowledge form the basis for most Rituals. Each chapter works to instill these ideals in their members through a variety of activities

We refer to fraternities and sororities as Greek organizations because their names usually consist of Greek letters, which serve to remind members of the

rituals and values of the group. Each of the Greek Councils sponsors community service projects, holds workshops for leadership development, pre-sents scholarship improvement and scholastic achievement awards, and cooperates with the other Greek Councils in the sponsorship of fraternity-sorority programs. The Greek Activities Steering Committee (GASC) operates to promote unity among all Greeks by organizing interfraternal events and fund-raisers. These activities and other events strive to encourage scholastic achievements, develop healthy competition, create an enjoyable environment, and recognize outstanding individuals and chapters.

Membership requirements differ for each Greek organization. The Pan-Hellenic Council member groups each require second-semester student standing for consideration. All member organizations of the Interfraternity Council require members to be full-time students at the University of Kentucky; some open their membership to Lexington Community College students. The Panhellenic Council member groups all require that members be a full-time student at the Lexington campus of the University of Kentucky. Each chapter has a

GPA requirement which may be obtained by contacting the specific chapters or the Greek

The Interfraternity Council (IFC) serves as the governing body of the men's social frater-nities affiliated with the National Interfraternity Conference (NIC). Two representatives from each member organization serve on the IFC with eight additional men elected annually to serve as executive officers. The council meets bi-weekly to advise and aid the fraternities in their activities on the University campus. The IFC promotes scholarship, community service, social development, public relations, per-sonal development, intramurals, leadership development, risk management, and cooperation among the men's groups. Fraternities supplement the formal education process by providing opportunities for men to mature—mentally, physically, and emotionally. Recruitment of new members begins with "rush" during the first weeks of each semester. Chapters may still issue invitations to membership at anytime throughout the year. Interested men can contact individual chapters Interfraternity Council.

The Panhellenic Council (PC) is composed of representatives from each of the national sorori-ties affiliated with the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC). The Panhellenic Council helps to unify the individual chapters and make the Greek system stronger by active participation and cooperation among the var-

ious groups.

The best opportunity to join a NPC sorority is during Formal Rush which was held in late August. Although Formal Rush is over there are still opportunities to join a PC sorority. Women interested may return complete a form and return it to 575 Patterson Office Tower. Information from the completed form is sent to the sororities par-

ticipating in Open Rush. Soon after the sororities receive your name and registration informa-tion, they are free to contact you by phone, written invitation, or personal visit. Most groups will concentrate their membership drives in the first half of each You may not hear from all of the sororities; many fill their pledge quota in Formal Fall Rush or during the semester and are therefore not eligible to more members. Rush has no rules or schedules besides common courtesy and common sense. There is no cost to participate in open rush process. Questions or concerns about Open Rush in general about Open Rush in general may be answered by calling the Panhellenic Office at 575 Patterson Office Tower, 257-3151. N.U.B.I.A.N. (Naturally United By Intelligence and Necessity) Council, represents the fraternities and sororities at the University of Kentucky who are affiliated with the National are affiliated with the National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC). These organizations represent national Greek-lettered community service groups. NPHC-affiliorganizations embrace a "service for life" philosophy and aim to assure the continuance of social action, political involve-ment, and economic develop-

The groups represented on campus will announce their membership selection and intake process individually dur-ing the semester. Pledging is not a prerequisite for membership Each chapter will explain their membership process at each of their respective initial interest meetings. The chapters use the following steps as a guideline for each group's membership selection/intake process: 1) Observation; 2) Invitation; 3) Selection; 4)Membership Intake; 5)Instruction/Orientation/Educat ion; and 6) Embellishment. Which fraternity came first?

Quite often the question has been asked "Which fraternity was the first one on the first one on the University of Kentucky campus?" With the research and effort of a few members in the Dean of Students Office, we have been able to compile a fairly accurate account of who came first:

Kappa Alpha Order was the first fraternity to arrive at U.K. Theta Chapter was founded on February 21, 1893, when the college was still called the State University of Kentucky. Later in that same year, Sigma Chi established Lambda Lambda Chapter on March 21.

The first fraternities chartered at U.K. were also the first ones to have houses on campus. Kappa Alpha Order, with the coopera-tion of their Chapter at Transylvania University, took residence at 218 South Broadway in October 1991, while Sigma Chi and Sigma Nu established residences on East Maxwell Street. Other early houses included one for Kappa Alpha on Avlesford, but they shortly moved to 245 East High Street.

Since 1893, the fraternity system has grown and prospered at the University of Kentucky. The Chapters that have been here chapters that have been here have continued the goals of scholarship, brotherhood, service and social activities that their founders established. Hopefully, they will continue to remain here for another 102
