Iran-Iraq war cause for international concern

As fighting between Iran and Iraq intensifies, Carter administration officials are becoming increasingly concerned. And rightly so. Three national issues of paramount importance are being affected by the all-out war being waged over the control of the Shatt al-Arab, the 125-mile-

Our country imports no oil from Iran and little from Iraq, but these two countries' continued fight-ing could cause shipping from other oil-producing nations to be delayed or discontinued by closing the Strait of Hormuz, the small southern entrance to the Persian Gulf.

• First, the 52 Americans awaiting a decision from the Iranian Parliament concerning their fate will have to linger who knows how much longer because the Parliament said Tuesday it had "decided to freeze the hostage issue."

This is rurely a depressed period for the hostages and their families because recent communications between officials in the United States and Iran had given some indication of a softened attitude in the demands and pleas from both sides.

Already the Soviets supply initiary equipment to Iraq. And although they are pressed with problems from their invasion of Afghanistan, the opportun-ity to enhance their influence in the critical region would be enough reason for Soviet leaders to begin

contemplating a move.

United Nations Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim said the widened fighting posed a "graw threat" to world peace and he called for urgent consultations by the Security Council Tuesday. This initial peacekeeping move is a logical and positive step and should be quickly supported by all U.N. member nations — especially the United States. President Carter has urged all nations, particularly the Soviet Union, to remain neutral in the Iran-Iraq war. This is a necessary first step in this delicate situation because the United States, no matter how weakened in stature, is still a forceful leader in international issues.

Carter and other officials must remember to keep statements addressing this issue clear and pointed. Any signs of indecision should be eliminated, which Any signs of indecision should be eliminated, which Carter failed to do in the Afghanistan invasion, and details of United States and U.N. Security Council reaction to Soviet intervention in the dispute should be plainly stated.

If careful judgement is demonstrated by all parties affected by the Iran-Iraq war, the most serious outcome of this affair could be the tragedy of human lives already lost in combat and a few barrels of oil destroyed.

All we can do is wait.

And hope.

land and France for allies. Frus-trated by their refusal, and ill-prepared for a singlehanded confrontation with Germany, Stalin signed a non-aggression pact with Hitler in 1939, which divided Eastern Europe between Germany and Russia. In 1941, Hitler invaded all of East Europe and drove deep into

East Europe and Soviet territory.

For Russia, the cost of defeating this third major invasion in 150 years proved enormous. Of the 22 million Allied lives lost in World War II, an estimated 20 million were lost by the

estimated 20 million were too to you continued. The U.S., though a crucial contributor to the war effort, lost 300,000, and suffered no damage to its home territory; whereas over 1100. Russian villages were destroyed, plundered and sometimes razed to the ground.

But the Russians emerged from the war in possession of East Europe, a condition, as always, unacceptable to the West. The United States, which had stayed out of the war as long as possible, found itself, preferring to let Russian lives substitute for American ones, found itself at war's end in a position of unparallelled power, controlling of exerting strong influence in four of the five major

Prior the World War II, as the threat of Hitler's fascism grew in

But Stalin maintained his firm hold on East Europe, insisting that the the area was vital to Soviet security. Not even the omnipresent threat of the bomb swayed this resolve. When Russia asked the U.S. for a billion-dollar reconstruction loan in 1945, the U.S. agreed on the condition that Russia allow American goods and investment into the Soviets and announced a new five-year plan to rebuild at its own expense— and

sphere of influence. Russia refused and announced a new five-year plan to rebuild at its own expense — and by stripping East Europe of anything that wasn't nailed down.

Stalin's refusal to budge and his brutal suppression of democracy in occupied East Europe outraged Americans, who somehow fail to take note of the American hegemony over Central and South America, enforced in most cases through military dictatorships.

This concentration on Soviet authoritarianism to the complete exclusion of its American equivalent has been a central feature of the Cold War metallity ever since.

can concern over control of the area was shaped by three forces:

1. The need to expand foreign markets to ward off a widely-feared postwar depression. In Western Europe, this eventually took the form of economic hegemony under the Manshall Plan and military hegemony under the North American Treaty Organization (which has continued to provide American corporations with lucrative arms contracts).

2. Official ant-Communism, the perception of Stalin as another Hiller bent on world-wide domina-tion, and an overemphasis on the importance of Communist interna-tionalism as the ideological determi-nant of Soviet foreign policy, All these contributed to the conspiracy heory of foreign policy, whereby nationalist liberation movements all over the world were perceived as Soviet plots, and every Soviet move could be seen as part of a calculated strategy for global subversion.

3. Racism, the view of America as the chief defender of Western civili-zation, against the barbarian hordes. (This same conviction, which facili-tated the nuclear obliteration of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, also sur-faced in the Korean and Vietnam Wars, and is an obvious factor in contemporary attitudes toward Iran.)

On March 12, 1947, President Harry Truman addressed a joint session of Congress to announce the unprecendented giving of peacetime military aid to Greece, whose corrupt, right-wing monarchy seems on the verge of yielding to a Communist regime, and Turkey, presumably the "next to fall" after Greece.

Speaking in terms of a universal battle between freedom and totalitarianism, he enunciated the Truman Doctrine, the foundation of the Cold War policy of containment which was given a new lease on life in Jimmy Carter's latest State of the

Union address.

The aid to Greece set a precedent of propping up any government which declared itself anti-communist, no matter how corrupt or oppressive. The aid to Turkey resulted from the Under Secretary of State Dean Acheson's formulation of what was later to be called the "Domino Theory."

The whole containment doctrine sought to encircle the Soviet Union with countries friendly to the U.S., and was given intellectual legitimacy by an enormously influential article in Foreign Affairs, entitled "The Sources of Soviet Conduct." It was published under the pseudonym of "Mr. X." and its author. George Kennan, later expressed dismay at the militaristic interpretation of con-

the militaristic interpretation of con-tainment by Truman.

In 1946, the Communist coup in Czechoslovakia led to the Marshall If has waged costly, needless wars in Trackoslovakia led to the Marshall plan of West European containment, and the creation of the CIA, the organization which, more than any other, has helped transform America cal andesient, undemocratic and altogether paranoid national Security State.

In January, 1950, President Trans authorized the State and Defense Departments to draft an overarching foreign policy paper to deal with such developments as the Communist victory in China. ...The state Energy Regulatory Commission has granted the Louisville Gas & Electric Co. a rate hike which will generate additional annual revenues of some \$47.7 million.

The commission's decision came yesterday on a March request by LG&E for a \$55 million revenue increase.

As a result of the rate hike, an archours of electricity monthly from October through May will see a 16 percent increase in his or her bill.

According to commission figures, the current bill for such an average customer is \$24.92 per month. That will increase to \$28.93.

Higher seasonal rates are charged for the June through September period, when consumption is greater. An average customer using \$90 kwh per seriom \$35.95 to \$45.64, commission figures showed.

LG&E gas customers, using an average of 12,000 cubic feet per month, will pay about 2.4 percent, or 83 cents, more.

Anderson, who has sharpened his attacks on both his major rivals in recent days, told the Council on Foreign Relations in New York that both Reagan and Carter favor targeting nuclear weapons toward military command centers in the Soviet Union in addition to Russian missile sites.

"Obviously, neither Mr. Carter nor Mr. Reagan is advocating nuclear war," Anderson said. "But I consider both of them to be seriously misguided in their endorsement of the so—called nuclear warfighting thesis."

A new test shows that between 5 percent and 10 percent of infertile adults are barren because chemicals in their bodies kill sperm, but they may be able to produce babies if they take commonly available medication.

Between 10 percent and 15 percent of Americans of childbearing age are unable to produce children. Researchers had suspected that a malfunction of the body's disease-fighting system sometimes plays a role in sterility, but they were unsure how common this is. ...Spot market prices for gasoline and home heating oil jumped as much as three cents a gallon yesterday because of worries that fighting between Iran and Iraq might impede oil shipments from Saudi Arabia and other Persian Gulf nations.

The third straight day of gains left spot market gasoline and heating oil prices about eight cents a gallon higher than sources said, however, the increases reflected buying by speculators and were not likely to affect retail prices because oil inventories are high and oil demand is weak.

Trading was said to be nearly nonexistent, meanwhile, in the spot crude oil market, the scene of feverish bidding for supplies following the Iranian revolution in late 1978 and early 1979.






