

Dieky Appointed Dean of Education

32-Year-Old Dean To Succeed Taylor

Dr. Frank G. Dieky, 32-year-old acting dean of the UK College of Education, has been appointed dean of the College to become one of the youngest college deans in the United States.

His appointment by the UK Board of Trustees becomes effective Jan. 1 and will fill the vacancy created by the death of Dr. William S. Taylor in announcing the appointment.

Dr. Taylor, who had been acting dean since his death, had been acting dean for approximately one year.

Received UK Degree in '42

Dr. Dieky attended the Lexington public schools and was graduated from Henry Clay High School in 1917. After receiving his bachelor's degree in education from the University of Louisville in 1921, he entered the UK Graduate School and was awarded the degree of master of education in 1923.

Though his work toward a doctor's degree was interrupted by two and one-half years army service, he completed the academic requirements in 1927 and was awarded the degree of education by the University's 1927 summer commencement.

Positions Listed

Dr. Dieky has taught in both the Fayette County and Lexington city school systems, and has served as instructor, assistant professor and associate professor of education at the University. Last July he was appointed chairman of the department of Curriculum Development, National Association of Secondary School Principals, Phi Delta Kappa, and Kappa Delta Psi professional education societies. He also was chairman of the American Association of University Professors, and Kappa Alpha society fraternity. He is also chairman of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Just How Big?

The Orange Bowl has a reputation as one of the most colorful and festive of all the New Year's spectacles. Elaborate floats, including a masterpiece from Hialeah which was fully described in Ed Ashford's column this week, take part in the big parade.

The Orange Bowl queen is chosen after extensive eliminations; teams and fans pour into Miami and are entertained royally. Thousands of band members from high schools and colleges take part in the show.

There is little wonder that UK handmembers wanted to carry the Blue and White into the Orange Bowl stadium; to fill the space which was reportedly reserved for them, along with 2500 others. There is little wonder, also, that practically every student on campus, regardless of his opinion of the band's performances this year, wanted to see the band there or hear it over the radio.

Football at the University really hit the big time this year. When the announcement was made that the team would take part in the Orange Bowl game, students and fans gobbled up the tickets so fast the Athletic Association was stranded with hundreds of unfilled requests.

When the band was turned down, then given permission, then voted an appropriation, and finally gave up efforts to raise the money needed when permission was again refused them, the question naturally arose among students as to whether the University as a whole was big time or not.

The people of Lexington and other friends of the band and cheerleaders who donated money for the trip are to be heartily thanked. After the continuous solicitations and drives to which they have been subjected, their generosity was of the first calibre.

The regrettable part of the situation, however, was the manner in which the band was handled. Only the Athletic Board made a definite statement and maintained its stand. Others could not or would not take such a stand. Thus, the band members were left bewildered, wondering exactly what their position was.

Regardless of all these developments, many of us will watch or listen to the game with much less relish than we had hoped. Some of us will remember that Male High School sent its band to Miami for four days this fall for a regular-season game. We may wonder how we can have a greater University in the face of such treatment of our student pep organizations.

It takes students, too, for a greater state university.

Book Review

To those of us who were determined to read it through, it presented one of the best studies of the techniques of propaganda in actual use that we had seen.

"In closing, it is perhaps in order to call attention to the fact that the organization's powers include that of approval of the appointment of the editor of the Kentucky Kernel. Is a recall in order?"

SGA Announcement Lists New Parking Regulations

(The following statement was submitted to the Kernel.)

The Judiciary Committee of the Student Government Association, at their meeting on December 8, 1949, announced the following new regulations regarding traffic violations which will become effective on January 10, 1950.

When a student or a member of the Faculty or Staff receives a ticket for a traffic violation on the Campus, the ticket will cost \$1.00 if they bring the ticket to the Secretary

of the Student Government Association within one week from the date the ticket was given to them. After one week, if they do not appear with the ticket, they will be charged \$2.00 for the ticket. If six or more tickets are accumulated for a person and he makes no appearance to pay his fine or give an explanation, the sixth ticket and every ticket thereafter will be \$5.00 each.

Also, any person who has received a ticket from the beginning of this semester and has not paid his fine if he brings it to the Secretary of the Student Government Association before January 10, 1950, or within the weeks time limit after that date, notify the Secretary and she will acknowledge the call and not charge

the additional \$1.00 penalty for the late payment.

All fines are to be paid to the Secretary of the Student Government Association whose office is located in Room 203 of the Administration Building, phone number 2209.

The following is the procedure for students who wish to apply for parking permits on the Campus for next semester. When filling out your registration card, you will be asked if you want a parking permit. If you do want a parking permit, you will be given an application card to fill out. Your reason must be clearly stated on the card and also which area is your preference. Late applications will be taken by the Secretary of the Student Government Association and those with the best qualified reasons will be issued permits first. Priority will

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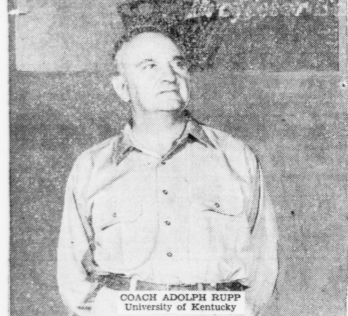

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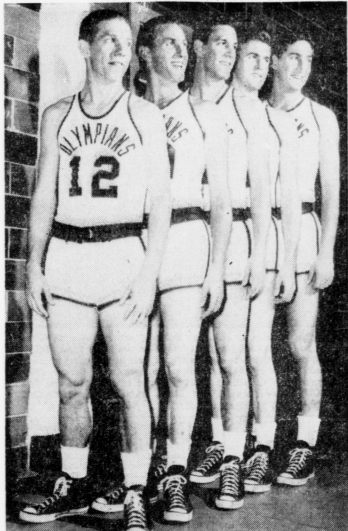

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Cats' Defensive Unit Rated No. 1 In Nation

Dick Martin, Lee Truman, Jerry Claiborne, Shorty Johnson, Charlie McClellan, Bob Goin, Bill Wynn, Harry Ulinski, Pat James, Lloyd McDermott, and Charlie Bentley.

Ever read about these boys' feats? They're the best in the nation. According to final figures released by the statistics bureau of the N.C.A.A., Kentucky was number one in total defense, limiting their opponents to an average of 154 yards per game, far ahead of Wyoming's 185, Maryland's 191, and Army's 195. The Cats' defensive platoon was also second to Oklahoma in rushing defense, just ahead of Minnesota, Notre Dame and LSU.

This team didn't get the glory of newspaper inches that their hard turning, high scoring mates did, but it was primarily their work that put the Cats into the Orange Bowl, and showed them up as a SEC height Kentucky hasn't looked down from in many decades.

Defensive football is a science, one that combines both brain and brawn, and the second platoon did a bang up job of combining the two all season. Only in one game did they allow an opponent to score more than one touchdown, and that was in their 20-7 defeat to S.M.U. Pony boy Kyle Rice scored two of these and keeping that bronze from enough rushing yards to make the smooth running Notre Dame machine splutter when it ran into both.

This team's success is without a doubt a prime example of the fine job Coach Bear Bryant is doing at UK. It was Bryant who picked out the high school offensive stars like Lee Truman, Jim Howe, Dick Martin, and Jerry Claiborne and worked them up to college caliber. Truman developed from only a mediocre defensive man in high school, who had trouble keeping down passes, to one of the best line backers in the business. He's in on almost every tackle, sometimes plugging dangerously for out of position to knock every pass or drag down a lonely receiver. Truman returned two pass interceptions to Miami for his only score of the season against Georgia. He's a graduating senior who'll claim four years of invaluable defensive play at Kentucky in the Orange Bowl.

Dick Martin is about as outstanding in play as Spivey would be in a freshman class. Twice this year on Sionil Field, Martin has been the lone man between a ball carrier and the Wildcats' goal. Both times he was the hero.

Captain Harry Ulinski, whose great play was formally recognized when he was awarded All Conference honors, worked well with Truman behind the line, called by Georgia Coach Wally Butts, "The best line backer we've played against."

Kentucky's tight defense ought to squeeze a lot of orange juice before the team finishes up its football tour for the season.

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Kentucky Basketeers: Dale Barnstable

Several weeks ago as the Kentucky Wildcats prepared to open the 1949-50 basketball schedule, fans were wondering if Mr. Rupp could do it again — could he build another team to challenge for the national basketball title?

Last Saturday night in Alumni Gym the Cats displayed a brand of ball which may well have been approaching the top of the national picture once again. And the boy who will lead them into battle is the likable captain of the Kentucky forces, Dale Barnstable.

A lot of weight rests on the shoulders of the Illinois lad, for the pressure on this sophomore leader club will be terrific all year long. Great things are always expected of Kentucky on the hardwood.

But against Western Ontario, blond headed "Barney" proved that Kentucky can do it. Barney scored his highest single game total since coming to Kentucky — a total of 18 points — all in the first half, and displayed a brilliant floor game against the Canadian club.

In Physical Education
Barney is in his senior year at Kentucky and is majoring in physical education. He expects to make a career of coaching after his graduation this June.

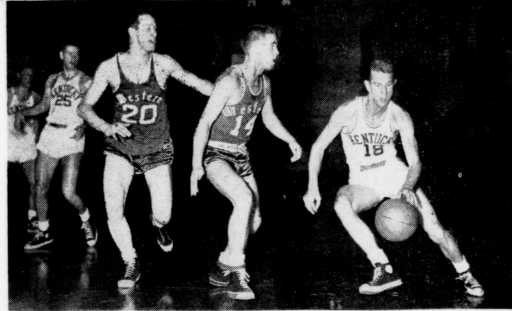
A long basketball stretch is behind the six foot, two inch Kentucky captain as he leads the Cats this season, his last year of collegiate ball.

Barney played his high school basketball for Antioch High, winning his high school by playing with an undefeated Antioch team in 1943, his year of graduation from high school. He received honorable mention as a forward on the All-Illinois team that season.

All-State In Football
However, he made All-State in the fall of 1942 in yet another sport — football. Barney played but one year of football — his senior year — at Antioch but gained the All-State honors with a reputation of quite a passer-catcher. In conference play that season he scored 78 points in six games.

Barney's division basketball team was runner-up for the TFO title for the Third Army in the next stage of his basketball career. Barney making the Third Army All-Star team.

Listed on the division club were Mill Tico, former Wildcat center; Carlisle "Blackie" Boyers, ex-Western Kentucky star; and Fred "The Whip" Blackwell, the present day Cincinnati Red pitcher. Mill Tico was the lad who persuaded Barney that basketball was the place for him to go to school.

Rough Road Ahead For UK Basketeers

The Kentucky Wildcats basketeers will play five important games during the forthcoming Christmas holidays. By the time school resumes, on Jan. 3, students here will have a definite idea as to whether the Cats have a possibility of retaining their NCAA championship.

On Dec. 21 (Wednesday) the Ruppets will take on a hot and cold DePaul five at the Louisville Army before a capacity crowd of some 7500 people. It will be the Wildcats' only appearance in the Falls City during the regular season. DePaul always has a good team. They have most of their players back from last season including Bots Godavartica, who broke the all-time scoring record for Lane Tech of Chicago, an institution of over 12,000 students. Early this season DePaul beat Ohio State, 79-68.

Two nights later, Kentucky faces a crucial game at W. Lafayette, Ind., where it meets the Purdue Boilermakers in the latter's fieldhouse. UK will be out to maintain their past superiority over the Big Ten team. Last March, in the NCAA, they walloped Illinois 76-47, as Groza scored 27 and Jim Line 15. Purdue opened this season with an easy 70-49 win over DePaul of Indiana.

Then comes the all-important Sugar Bowl, a tournament which seems to be a jinx to Kentucky. Last year, they murdered Tulane in the opening game, 78-47, doing little wrong and hitting 42 percent of their shots. The following night, St. Louis slipped up on them and won, 45-40. For UK's first loss of the season, Groza was high here for UK with 13. Barnstable had nine. Eddy Ed McCauley had 14 as did little Lou Lehman. The Cats fell to only 23 percent for the game.

This time they meet the tough Villanova College quintet in the opener. This foe will be remembered as having scored 72 points against Kentucky — the most ever against a Rupp-coached team here at UK — but the Big Blue came out on the long end, 87-72, in the NCAA semifinals at Madison Square Garden last March. Groza had 20 points, Line 21 and Barker 18. For Villanova Paul Arizin, who is now in his senior season, also got 20 points, while forward Ricca had 14.

The winner of this game will play the survivor of the Tulane-Bradley tilt, while the losers will meet for
