45-37 Loss To Ohio Buckeyes, Consolation Win Over Tufts, End Erratic Wildcat Season

Wildcats Dropped In Opening Game Of NCAA Tourney

The Kentucky Wildcats finished the season with a 66-56 record over Tufts college of New England to wind up a two-game series at Madison Square Garden. The first game of the tournament was a defeat at the hands of the Ohio State Buckeyes, 45-37, and the second game was a consolation contest with the quitters from Tufts which had suffered a defeat in a game with N.Y.U. As a result of the victory over Tufts the Wildcats ranked position number three in the eastern NCAA tournament.

15,584 Fans Witness Game
There were 15,584 fans at the Garden to witness the first game which proved to be an exciting game and seemed to be a losing battle for the Wildcats although they never quit trying. Dutch Campbell had four fouls early in the game and Jack Tingle was hurt at the peak of Kentucky's come-back that threatened to duplicate the earlier game between the two teams played in Lexington in December.

Ohio State's victory may be attributed to the fact that the Buckeyes stuck to the Cats, and controlled both bank boards most of the time.

Grate Top Scorer
Don Grate was sensational and the high scorer of the game, totaling 15 points while substitute Rodney Caudill who also played great ball closely followed Grate with 14 points. Tingle scored 11 points with one-handed-clip in shots that paced the Big Blue, while Schu added eight and Parkinson dropped in seven. Arnold (Stillo) Eisen was responsible for nine latibles and helped the Buckeyes run up a 21-15 score at half time. Kentucky pulled to make the score 37-31 in 10 minutes of the game left.

Kentucky went ahead once at 4-3 on a set-up shot by Tingle and tied the score at 10-10, 12-12, and 13-13.

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
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COLONEL Of The Week
