My dear Scollay,

I received
both of your letters in
regard to the Pension
Bill, and am much obliged
to you for writing
to your Member. I
cut the inclosed piece
out of our last Town
paper, and you will
notice the Pension
bill is one of the bills
mentioned as having
passed both Houses,
and become a law,
but it may not mean
the pension for the
Soldiers, and widows

of Soldiers of the Mexican war. I remember being struck with one thing when I read the Bill had passed the House i.e. a Southern Democratic Member proposed to pass it in favour of all, but a Republican objected because he said Jeff Davis would be a Pensioner of the United States Government, and the 5th section excludes those who have Political disabilities. I do not think I would be included for you know in 1872 there was a general amnesty. Proc-

lamation, for all except those who had taken a prominent part. I do hope it will pass the Senate, and become a Law. Mr. Page received his appointment in April 1847, and in August he was promoted, showing he was in the war four months, when the Bill only requires that they should have served 60 days; so his two commissions will be sufficient to prove he was in the required length of time. If it passes both Houses I suppose it will have to go to the President, and

instigation of my cousin, Mayna Moore Shutt,

If you can tell me something about his wife and family, and where to find the records, I shall greatly appreciate it.

I have often heard Myrna speak of "Cousin Scollay" and I shall count it a privilege when I can have the pleasure of meeting him myself. Though I do not know just the relationship, I think we are of the same family tree and I can sign myself.
