Students' opinions vary on Ivy's fate

Next step: Director's future at UK uncertain pending investigation by five-member panel

Webster's dictionary defines ethical behavior as "conforming to professional standards of conduct."

Whether UK Athletics Director Larry Ivy adhered to ethical behavior is one of many questions facing the committee formed by UK President Lee

Todd to investigate the Athletics Department.

In an article in Tuesday's Lexington Herald-Leader Billy Joe Miles, chairman of the Board of Trustees, said Ivy should be replaced if the committee finds proof of unethical behavior.

Ivy's contract states that he is expected to run the Athletics Department and supervise its

employees with "reasonable care" to keep the program within NCAA and Southeastern Conference guidelines.

The contract also states that violation of these expectations would result in Ivy's termination.

Brooks Meriwether, a journalism junior, doesn't think Ivy



will be able to escape the committee's possible findings.

"I just don't think it's possible to run a department and not know what was going on," Meriwether said.

Last month's ruling from the NCAA revealed that UK had committed 37 infractions.

The infractions mostly occurred while Ivy was the associate athletics director to C.M. Newton, but some of them occurred under Ivy's watch as athletics director.

If the committee finds no evidence against Ivy, UK will

be obligated to pay him for the remainder of his contract if it chooses to remove him from the position. Such a move would cost UK \$577,500, to fulfill the \$192,500 a year owed to Ivy in the remaining three years of his contract.

Some students are willing to suspend judgment until the committee reports its findings.

"If they find that he knew, he should be gone, but if they find that he didn't know, then he should be allowed to stay," said Travis Pierce, a computer science freshman.

Ivy released a statement through UK Media Relations Director Brooks Downing saying that any comment made before the committee reveals the findings of its investigation would be premature.

One UK student said the findings of the committee could necessitate a complete overhaul of the Athletics Department.

"Things seem to be going wrong right now, and if Todd is serious about reforming the department, then he needs to clean house," said Casey Mobley, a geology senior.

UK prepares for president's inauguration

'Official hello': Todd first since '64 to have formal ceremony

Plans are being made, ribbons are being hung and the usual gowns and garb are being fitted for the first time in 38 years. President Lee Todd is having his inauguration and all are preparing for the big day. This Thursday and Friday, students, faculty, staff and community members are coming out for the big event.

"It is the official hello of a president to an institution," said T. Lynn Williamson, director of human resources and member of the inaugural committee.

The last formal inauguration of a UK president was John W. Oswald's in 1964.

Since then UK presidents have opted not to have inaugurations.

"The president has to weigh the consensus and atmosphere to decide if an inauguration is appropriate," Williamson said.

UK still striving for Top 20

Task force: Committee plans UK's strategy to become Top 20 research university

UK outlined Tuesday how it plans to become a nationally recognized Top 20 research university at a forum held for faculty and staff. Although planning has already taken place within President Lee Todd's appointed Top 20 Task Force, UK still has extensive work ahead in order to reach Top 20 by 2020, members said.

With UK's unique makeup, including a medical center,

land grant, research and community college, finding a true benchmark has been difficult, explained Phyllis Nash, co-chair of the task force.

"There are not many institutions to compare ourselves to," Nash said. "We have some unique challenges."

A benchmark of UK's is the University of Michigan, but because its size is nearly double UK's, comparisons get complicated, Nash said. Only a few other schools share similar characteristics with UK, she

added. They include Ohio State University and the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

Another hurdle to overcome is budget constraints.

"Unless the budget situation is improved, it will retard our progress toward our goal," said Mike Nietzel, acting provost and co-chair of the task force. "There simply isn't much we can do."

In addition to identifying some of its difficulties, the task force outlined ways for UK to measure its progress.

"We have been doing research of the dimensions in emerging universities," Nash said. "We also have to pub-

lize our own richness."

Nash said that after defining a system to measure advancement, the task force can begin to accurately compare UK to other public universities.

Identifying six characteristics of a Top 20 school, the task force defined what UK should focus on for achievement, Nash said.

The characteristics include comprehensive programming, attracting students and distinguished faculty, discovering new knowledge, diversifying the UK community and getting the community to contribute to improving the university.

House passes bill to 'clean up' state

FRANKFORT, Ky. — The House on Tuesday passed solid-waste legislation that supporters said would finally clean up Kentucky. Before it becomes law, with its levy on fast-food cups and drink containers to raise money for dump and litter cleanup, it must pass the Senate, which is an even more uncertain proposition. The House vote was 49-47. The proposal, sponsored by Rep. Greg Stumbo, D-Prestonsburg, places a one-half-cent levy on cups from fast-food restaurants, takeout cups from other retail establishments and virtually all beverage containers under 24 ounces.

Officer accused of rape commits suicide

NORFOLK, Va. — A Navy officer accused of raping a junior enlisted sailor shot himself to death Tuesday morning, when he was scheduled to appear at a military hearing on rape and other charges, the Navy and police said. Cmdr. William S. Petrie, 43, called a defense attorney on his cell phone at 7 a.m. to say that he would not be at the 9 a.m. hearing at the Norfolk Naval Station, James City County Deputy Police Chief Ken Middlebrook said. Maintenance workers found Petrie's body at about 9:30 a.m. on a beach near a parking lot on Colonial Parkway, near Jamestown Island, Middlebrook said.

Enron CEO says he's sorry, pleads 5th

WASHINGTON — Vilified by lawmakers as a con man who betrayed Americans' trust, former Enron chairman Kenneth Lay expressed "profound sadness" Tuesday about the impact of Enron's financial collapse on investors and employees but rejected pleas to testify about it. Lay told a packed Senate hearing that he was "deeply troubled" by asserting his constitutional right under the Fifth Amendment not to answer questions about the financial dealings that led to Enron's bankruptcy.

Attorney General warns of latest threat

WASHINGTON — Attorney General John Ashcroft urged America to adopt "the highest state of alert" in the search for 16 men possibly linked to Osama bin Laden's terrorist network and believed to have planned an attack against the United States or its people in Yemen. The FBI said Tuesday it based an unusually detailed public warning on information from interviews by U.S. officials with detainees in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and in Afghanistan. Three earlier alerts were vague as to the date of any potential attack.

dent from 1968 to 1987, cited unrest in the student population and financial problems as his reasons for not having an inauguration. During this period, the Civil Rights Movement and Vietnam War demonstrations were at their peak, pervading many college campuses. Williamson said that all official activities that year, including commencement, were canceled.

Charles Wethington, UK president from 1989 to 2001, also decided to forgo the pomp and circumstance associated with an inaugural ceremony. Williamson said this was because of budget constraints.

Considering the time that has elapsed between the start of Todd's employment on July 1, 2001, and now, it seemed he would also be refraining from this ceremonial statue.

"Timing is part of it," said Russ Williams, the staff representative on the Board of Trustees and senior training specialist for human resources. "But he pretty much hit the ground running and had a lot of issues to deal with first before he could think about an inauguration."

Williamson said in addition to the work that staff and faculty have done for the event, students and community members also helped.

Fifty students from the Office of the Registrar will usher the ceremony and 30 students from Residence Life will pass out programs, Williamson said. In addition, the UK Opera Theater and UK Symphony Orchestra are performing at Thursday's Inaugural Gala Concert.

"We haven't had (an inauguration) in a long time and that's why this is so accepted," Williamson said.

Private groups have contributed about \$100,000, Williamson estimated. Most of the money was funded by T.I.A.A., the investment company in charge of UK's retirement plans.

The Todd family is also taking an active part in the festivities. Todd's son, Troy, will present readings and his daughter, Kathryn, will sing.

"It's a family event. We do everything as a family," said wife, Patsy. "That's the way we've always lived our lives. Once you start to plan events as a family when you are young, it evolves into everything you do."

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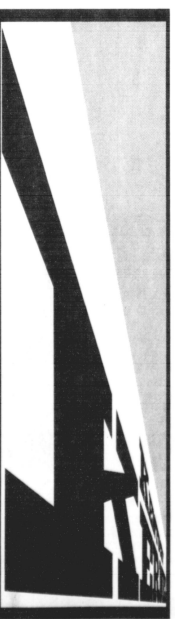

Sex, pies and videotape

XXX: Indiana woman shares her story about life in the porn industry

Roni Raye is not your average porn star.

Even though the 35-year-old Indiana woman has been in the sex industry for eight years, she hasn't slept with any man besides her husband.

"I can't tell you about a hundred guys I've been with," she said. "I'm a girl from the Midwest. I just want to show off my body, have fun with it and keep it lightweight."

Raye's industry experience began when her first husband suggested they take some pictures. Raye was working as a dental assistant and was bored with her job, she said.

"We took some pictures and they turned out fairly well. I was like 'Oh, OK. What the hell? I'm an exhibitionist. I like showing off,'" she said.

The couple sent the pictures to some amateur magazines, and then Raye began appearing in them. Then, the publisher of Velvet magazine called her.

"He starts having phone sex with me. I thought 'there's something wrong here.' Later I found out that that was his kink. He liked to get girls that hadn't been in the business to get them to engage in phone sex

with him. And if he was turned on enough, he'd get them to come out there."

Raye was invited to New York for a photo shoot, and even though she had some reservations about going, she took the offer.

"I told them, 'I'm not going to have sex with anybody just to get in a magazine, you can forget it,'" she said.

The publisher assured her that he just wanted to photograph her.

As for her parents, Raye told them what was going on. "My mom would of course rather be a dental assistant or a writer like a wanted to be, but she dealt with it because she loves me," she said.

But Raye's step-father was less than supportive. Raye was fired from the dental office soon after the photos were published.

To help compensate for her job loss, she began selling videos, both solo and with her husband. Afterwards, she started a phone sex line and selling products through a fan club she and a friend began.

"I was like, 'guys want to buy my panties?' I had never heard of such a thing," she said.

Soon, Raye left her husband.

"He wanted to do things

that I didn't really want to do," she said.

She moved to Indiana, where she met a man she married a year later, and who she is still married to today.

She said her new husband is supportive of her work, as long as she is happy with it.

"I want to do this but I want to do this on my own terms," she told him.

Raye continued to do solo videos. She began to receive flack from others in the industry, who said she wouldn't make money if she continued to only sell solo products.

"I kept saying that I can do anything I want. And that's about the time the Internet came about," she said.

Now, Raye publishes catalogs, customizes videos (starting at \$150 for 30 minutes), and operates a phone sex hotline and a Web site.

"There is a five minute minimum on the phone, but I had a guy that talked for only 20 seconds. I like those kind of guys because I can get back to putting my toast in the toaster or whatever," she said.

Raye said that the videos give her the most trouble. Men propose ideas for customized videos, and she prepares the video for them.

"There are times where I've faked orgasms, of course. You do it because you want to get it over with. It's just not interesting to you that day," she said.

Raye says she gets all sorts of strange video requests, such as the men who order videos of her getting hit in the face with pies.

"I had another guy who just wanted a video of my nose. There's nothing sexual about that."

She estimates callers are between the ages of 26 and 45 and that 75 percent of them are married or have girlfriends.

Some lesbians and couples call her, and some wives often call her looking for advice.

Although the business has been positive for her and her husband's sex life, Raye said she's still a normal person.

"When I got outside, I still go grocery shopping. I still go to movies. I cook and clean my house like anybody else. I don't walk around in sexy lingerie all the time."

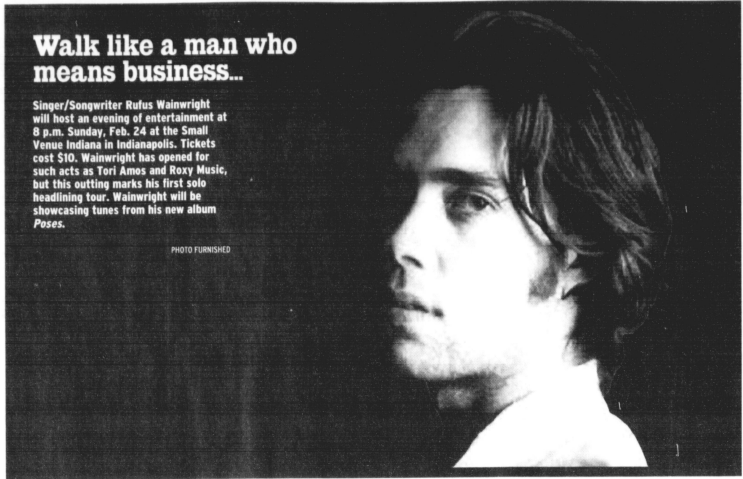

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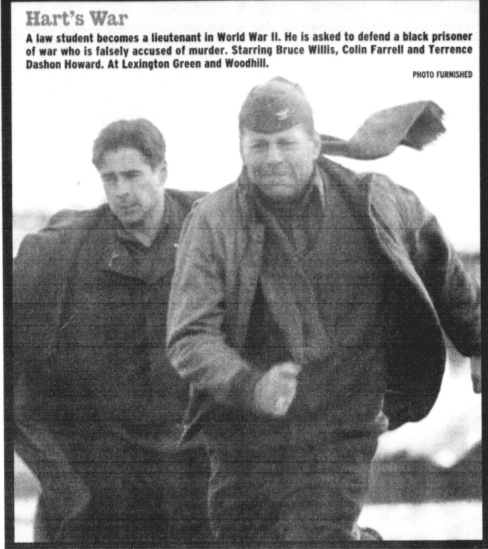

UK Athletics has some explaining to do

UK Athletics has disproven an age old proverb. Apparently, there is such a thing as a free ride.

The temptation is great for students to write off the tickets-for-cars exchange program going on in the Athletics Department as typical — something that takes place everywhere. After all, the exchange, which involved more than 40 employees in the department, has been going on for more than 20 years.

There is an even greater temptation to relax now that President Lee Todd has created a committee to review the entire department.

But students should be mad as hell. First of all, normal season tickets are obtained by donating to the Blue and White Fund, which in turn provides many of the athletics scholarships available through UK (although there will be fewer scholarships in coming years because of other shady actions going on within the department).

UK Athletics' own Web site boasts of the Blue and White Fund and how more than 80 percent of the money goes toward tuition, room and board and books for more than 320

athletes. The rest is used to build and upgrade athletics facilities.

So, tickets that would ordinarily raise thousands of dollars for UK students are essentially being thrown away. But, hey, it's been going on for years, right?

And just a few weeks ago the Kernel reported on ticket scalping in Lexington. Officer Bill Hayes, who is in charge of the UK Police Department's ticket scalping detail, said that when he busts the same seat number more than once, he informs UK. If the ticket was part of a season package, the holder could lose his or her season ticket privileges.

Well, Athletics Director Larry Ivy may not refer to the tickets-for-cars deal as scalping, but in this situation the difference between calling up the local car dealership and standing outside Rupp Arena with a piece of cardboard is miniscule. But, hey, it's been going on for years, right?

And only certain employees are allowed to participate in the trading program. That list must be approved annually by Ivy, who also participates in the deal.

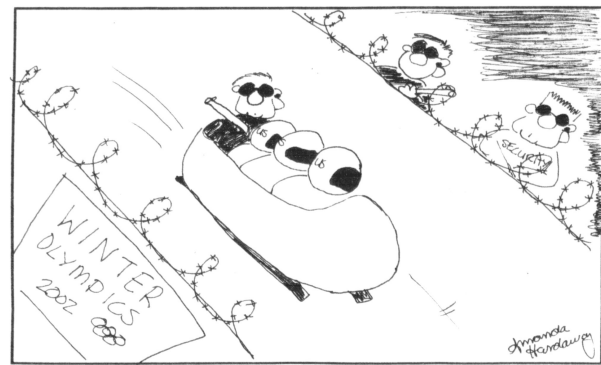
What exactly are the criteria for being on the list? Why does the soccer coach get free

season tickets for basketball, especially if he never intends to use them? Besides, a number of those employees who trade their tickets get passes from Media Relations anyway, meaning that they wouldn't use the tickets they traded to begin with.

Aside from the coaches who are showered with tickets, it's important to remember the students who have been known to wait in line at Memorial Coliseum until four o'clock in the morning just to buy a ticket for a seat from which they need binoculars to tell the players apart.

Why not just forego an entire season of Monday night headaches and have one lottery at which the first students called would win the use of a Cadillac for a year? I'm sure the local dealerships could make good use of those 700 or so seats.

Todd should state in his inaugural address Friday that "It's been going on for years" is no longer an excuse. The fact that employees receive the tickets in the first place, while questionable with respect to who is eligible, is not the real problem. It is the manner in which those tickets are used that should have students up in arms.

UK needs patience to slam 'Dore's backdoor attack

Long time no win: Vanderbilt tries for first win in Lexington since Memorial Coliseum era

UK's biggest challenge tonight against Vanderbilt will be patience.

"You've got to be on your toes," said freshman forward Chuck Hayes of defending Vandy's offense.

The Commodores (14-9, 4-6 Southeastern Conference) run an offense that features constant backdoor cuts to catch opponents off guard. The offense complements Vandy, a fundamentally sound team that lacks athleticism.

Still, Vandy, led by Matt Freije, an All-SEC Freshman selection last season, has the appropriate weapons to burn an impatient team.

"We've been trying to get our guys to do a better job on working together and communicating," UK Coach Tubby Smith said. "They do an excellent job of spreading (the defense) and they have excellent outside shooters."

If a team cheats inside to prevent the backdoor cuts, Vandy can break outside for the open 3-pointer. The 'Dores lead the SEC in 3-point shooting at 38.7 percent.

Four Vandy starters are capable behind the arc. Conversely, UK (16-6, 6-4 SEC) is ninth in the SEC in 3-point shooting and ranks fifth in 3-point defense.

"We can adapt to any type of game, really," Hayes said. "We've been in games where we picked up the tempo and won, but we've also slowed down and won games."

Vandy is tied for last in the SEC East at 4-6, but the importance of the game is magnified because the Cats must keep pace with Florida (18-4, 7-3 SEC) and Georgia (18-6, 7-4 SEC).

"We've been cutting back on turnovers, and it's just a matter if we can just maintain that consistency," Smith said. "Vanderbilt runs a lot of backdoor plays which can be very good and effective. We need to stay fundamentally sound against them."

That means limiting turnovers and rebounding better. Smith noted that UK (16-6, 6-4 SEC) had four turnovers in the first half at LSU Saturday but gave the ball away 11 times in the second half.

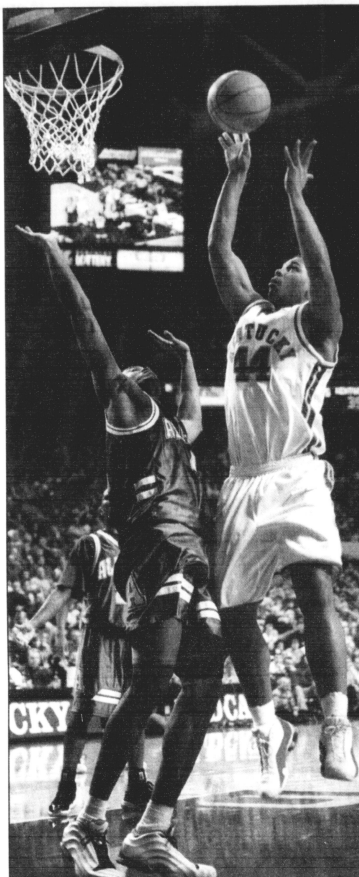
Late-game turnovers hurt the Cats' chances last week in an overtime loss to Tennessee.

"It's the mental mistakes," Smith said of the miscues. "Mishandling the ball because of a lack of concentration can be disturbing."

Smith also stressed the need for his offense to get the ball to its hottest shooters, senior Tayshaun Prince and sophomore Gerald Fitch.

UK has its personal worries, but Vandy Coach Kevin Stallings is candid about the obstacle his team faces coming to Lexington, where the 'Dores have not won since 1974.

"Kentucky is not a team we've had very much success with. At some point Vanderbilt will win there," Stallings said. "It might not be in my lifetime, or your lifetime, but it will happen."



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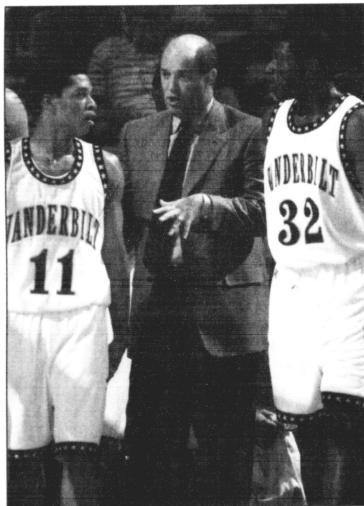


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Listen and learn
