Groups ready to break silence

Rally moving from POT plaza

Plans for the Black Student Union rally being held tomorrow from noon to 1 p.m. are still in the works, but the location has been partially changed.

BSU President Wallis Malone said so far the rally called "Breaking the Silence," is set to begin in the plaza area in front of Patterson Office Tower, and then move to the Administration Lawn, where

sound equipment will be set up for speaking purposes.

The Student Code of Conduct prohibits using the POT plaza to hold a gathering of more than 20 people.

The Administration Lawn, however, can be utilized on a reservation-only basis since it is classified in the Code of Conduct as a "restricted area."

Administration officials, including UK Chancellor for the Lexington Campus Elisabeth

Zinser and Dean of Students David Stockham, offered the compromise to the BSU, which Malone said was unhappy with the idea of having the rally in the Free Speech Area by the Student Center.

"We want (the rally) to be in the central part of campus," Malone said. "It's a central idea — a central theme."

Malone said the BSU is starting the rally at the plaza area because "it's symbolic of our silent protest."

The silent protest has been taking place over the last several

weeks in the plaza by POT. Students from the BSU and other organizations stood in the plaza to make the UK administration aware of racial problems on campus.

Zinser said she understood the importance and symbolism of the POT plaza area for the students participating in the rally.

She said one of the problems with holding the rally would be a potential disturbance of classes in the nearby White Hall Classroom Building by microphones and amplification equipment.

The administration will be providing sound equipment on the Administration Lawn for the rally.

Zinser stressed the legal ramifications which would have affected the rally if it was held in an area on campus not sanctioned by the University.

She said if the rally was held in a sanctioned area such as the Administration Lawn, individual perpetrators, if there were any, would be apprehended with no liability toward the BSU.

But if the rally took place in a non-sanctioned area, direct responsibility

Weekend walk aims to benefit children

A young woman sits on a bench in the courtyard playground. She tickles a little boy and chases him to the sliding board, helping him up the stairs. She visits her son here under court-ordered supervision.

Two of her son's playmates were brought over from the Salvation Army where their parents are staying. They are homeless.

This is the Nest. It is a drop-in day care service provided by the Lexington Child Abuse Council. "A lot of people feel welcome here.

Parents don't feel threatened by us and the kids like to come here," said Katie Harmon, a staff member at the Nest. "Sometimes they're disappointed when they can't."

The center averages 35 children a day. Sometimes they must turn children away.

"We provide age appropriate activities for the kids," said Sarah McHaffie, a staff member and greeter who works under the council's director.

The council is non-profit and in constant need of volunteers and financial assistance.

The student associations of UK's College of Education have banded together to do just that.

A Walk for Abused Children will be held Saturday beginning at 10 a.m. on the front lawn of the Taylor Education Building. It is being organized by a consortium of student organizations affiliated with the college and is the first time they have banded together for such an event. Proceeds will benefit the Lexington Child Abuse Council, but other benefits are hoped for the college.

"We're hoping this will bring the College of Education students closer together and they will want to work on things together," said Wayne Harvey, director of educational services in the college.

"We're trying to raise our image in providing services to the community," he said. "There is not a better cause than this."

April is national Child Abuse Awareness Month.

The Lexington Child Abuse Council provides parent education, counseling services and self-help groups. It gives presentations to churches, schools and civic organizations on the topic

UK officials release preliminary plans for new bicycle paths around campus

In response to last week's discussion about the mostly ignored bicycle dismount zone, UK officials have proposed bicycle routes to be implemented next fall.

UK Vice President for University Relations Joe Burch said proposals are being prepared that call for the institution of bicycle lanes, consolidated areas of bike parking and regulations to help ensure safety.

This new model is based on comments given during the bike forums April 4 and 9. Burch said the forums were sparsely attended.

The bicycle lanes would add to the lane that already exists on Rose Street.

The lanes would extend to Limestone and Euclid Avenue, and other areas around campus.

Generally, the lanes will be on the streets, but on South Campus, two separate sidewalks will be needed for bike riders and pedestrians.

The sidewalks will be marked clearly so pedestrians would know which side to walk on.

"We wouldn't try to keep (the pedestrians) off of it, but to keep them aware that (one) sidewalk is for cyclists," Burch said.

Burch hopes that by providing these lanes, it will increase the safety of students on campus while decreasing the probability of an accident.

Local government is also interested in providing the bike lanes around the city of Lexington.

Burch added that there is potential for expanding bike lanes in the community beyond the campus area.

Existing bike racks would be moved into clusters away from congested areas to discourage bike riding on campus.

To accommodate this change, one plan is to transform the parking lot between the Business and Economics Building and the Gillis Building into an area of clustered bike racks.

Unlike the voluntary Dismount Zone, Burch said UK plans to enforce the new bike laws.

"We came to the conclusion that with this year's debacle, nothing is going to work unless we enforce it," Burch said.

One way he plans to do this is by enforcing a fine system. He said the fine would be reasonable, but enough to keep a person from violating policies.

Impounding a bike that was parked in an illegal spot was also another option, but since many bike riders have expensive locks that take an enormous amount of energy to break, immobilizing a bike seems more probable.

UK Police plan to do this by having UK place its own chain around the bike.

For those riding on campus, Burch planned on having a UK bike patrol. However, he was not clear on the details.

Cyclists around campus had mixed reactions about the proposal.

"It sounds alright ... I don't think it's a big problem," said business and economics junior Matt Stevens. "I haven't seen many people get hurt or anything."

Economics junior Jeff Townsend disagreed: "I don't think it's a good idea. ... People have to use their own discretion," he said. "They can't go flying through a large group of pedestrians."

NATION Senate honors UK's basketball champs

WASHINGTON — Kentucky's two senators, Democrat Wendell Ford and Republican Mitch McConnell, put partisanship aside to sponsor a resolution congratulating UK on its national basketball championship.

This week in Washington, the Senate approved the resolution proclaiming that Kentucky is "rightly known as the basketball capital of the world."

"Coach Rick Pitino, his staff, and his players displayed outstanding dedication, teamwork, unselfishness, and sportsmanship throughout the course of the season in achieving collegiate basketball's highest honor," the resolution approved Tuesday said.

Ford said during a speech on the Senate floor, "They rib us a bit about taking our basketball too seriously in Kentucky. And apocryphal stories about fans being buried in their Wildcat sweatshirts or calling on Coach Pitino to help settle their marital spats, sometimes makes it seem so."

CAMPUS Award given posthumously

UK will award a bachelor's degree with honors to Isaac "Henry" Hale, a student who died April 8, with the rest of the 1996 class at the May 5 commencement, the school announced yesterday.

Hale, of London, Ky., died just one day before his 22nd birthday at the Mayo Clinic, where he was undergoing treatment for a brain tumor.

Hale's degree will be awarded summa cum laude and with department honors from UK's Carol Martin Gatton College of Business and Economics.

His degree is a bachelor of business administration with a concentration in finance, according to Deborah M. Englert, director of undergraduate advising at the Gatton College.

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Moe not watching draft on television

Moe Williams won't be sitting in front of a television during Saturday's NFL Draft. The former UK tailback will be at an undisclosed rural location with his dog in tow and cellular phone in hand awaiting news of his draft position and new team.

Upon selection, Williams' agent and sister will contact the former UK star via three-way calling.

"My mom and my sister are more nervous than me," Williams said.

The word around the NFL is that Williams is anywhere from a late second-round pick to a fourth-round selection. Most publications list Williams as between the sixth and eighth best running back.

Williams said he could go as high as the late first round.

"I'm just going to try to get my foot in the door and make the best of the situation," said Williams, who doesn't prefer any particular team. However, Williams does "like warm weather."

UK head coach Bill Curry said Williams' stock has risen since the tailback declared for the draft shortly after the conclusion of the Cats' 4-7 1995 season.

"Maybe they're beginning to figure out how good he really is," Curry said.

Or maybe scouts are simply getting a look at a healthy Williams.

At the combines in February, Williams was slowed by a hamstring injury that limited his speed and mobility. His fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the annual per-

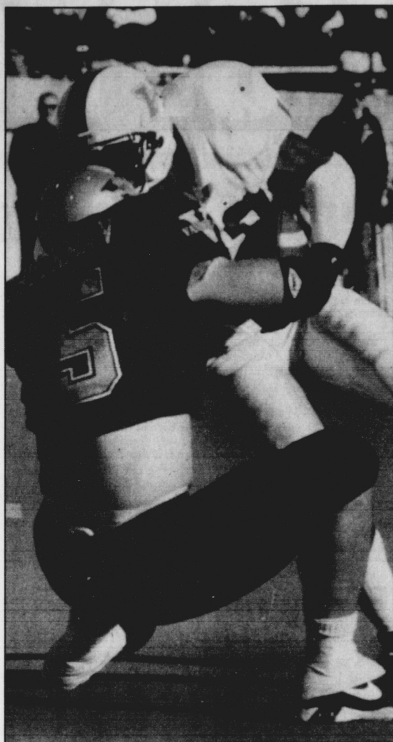

formance drills was a 4.7. Since recovering from the injury, Williams said his slowest time in the 40 has been a 4.66. Another reason for Williams' increased popularity may be his weight. With his punishing, upright running style, pro teams wanted Williams to add bulk to his sturdy 195-pound frame.

Williams now weighs 205 after working daily with weights.

"There's no question he's going to be a great pro," Curry said. "I don't care if he gains weight or not — he's going to play a long time. Moe would play if he was 185 pounds because he's a man. Anybody that watched last season knows that."

Editor's note: The NFL Draft is scheduled for this weekend in New York's Madison Square Garden. Assistant Sports Editor Chris Easterling and Kernel Columnist John Abbott share their views on how the draft will develop.

1. New York Jets — Keyshawn Johnson, wide receiver, Southern California — Johnson will give Jets a big target for newly-signed free agent quarterback Neil O'Donnell to throw to.

2. Jacksonville — Simeon Rice, defensive end, Illinois — Jaguars work on their defensive line by picking the pass-rushing specialist Rice.

3. Arizona — Jonathan Ogden, offensive tackle, UCLA — Cardinals shore up their offensive line with a powerful blocker.

4. Baltimore — Lawrence Phillips, running back, Nebraska — Phillips and Ravens (formerly the Cleveland Browns) owner Art Modell are a match made in heaven. Both seem to like to beat on innocent people. For Phillips, it's his former girlfriend whom he admitted to striking. For Modell, it's the people of Cleveland whom he stabbed in the back when he left town for Baltimore.

5. New York Giants — Kevin Hardy, linebacker, Illinois — The Giants pick up the second coming of Lawrence Taylor in Hardy. The former Illinois star made 105 tackles, 11 sacks, three interceptions and forced five fumbles in 1995.

9. Houston — Tony Brackens, defensive end, Texas — Oilers go with the home state pick (should they stay in Houston and not bolt to Nashville) to help with their defensive line.

10. Cincinnati — Willie Anderson, offensive tackle, Auburn — Bengals pick up needed blocking support for mending tailback Ki-Jana Carter and quarterback Jeff Blake, who spent a large portion of his time last season dodging charging defensive linemen.

11. New Orleans — Lawyer Malloy, safety, Washington — Saints help their sieve-like secondary with the highest rated defensive back available.

12. Tampa Bay — Regan Upshaw, defensive end, California — With former Minnesota Vikings' defensive coordinator Tony Dungy as the new head coach, look for the Bucs to go defense first.

14. Seattle — Daryl Gardener, defensive tackle, Baylor — Seahawks find partner on defensive line for Cortez Kennedy.

15. Denver — Leeland McElroy, running back, Texas A&M — Broncos pick up a replacement for Glyn Milburn, whom they traded to Detroit.

16. Minnesota — Alex Molden, cornerback, Oregon — Vikes pick up a corner to increase depth in the secondary.

17. Oakland — Duane Clemons, defensive end, California — Clemons stars in state to play for Al Davis.

18. Chicago — Eric Moulds, wide receiver, Mississippi State — He is a fast receiver to replace Jeff Graham.

19. Indianapolis — Amani Toomer, wide receiver, Michigan — The Colts get a legitimate deep threat for fellow ex-Wolverine Jim Harbaugh to throw to.

20. Miami — John Mobley, linebacker, Kutztown (Pa.) — The Dolphins need a linebacker, plus, it seemed time from a small school to be drafted.

21. Detroit — Marcus Jones, defensive tackle, North Carolina — The Lions are light up front and other teams run over them. Jones should give them some help on the defensive front.

22. Tampa Bay — Ray Mickens, cornerback, Texas A&M — The Bucs need some serious help in the secondary.

23. Detroit — Walt Harris, free safety, Mississippi State — The Lions secondary could use somebody at the corner opposite Benny Blades.

24. Buffalo — Marco Battaglia, tight end, Rutgers — The Bills have needed a strong tight end ever since Pete Metzelaars departed.

25. Philadelphia — Cedric Jones, defensive end, Oklahoma — He will help the Eagles' pass rush.

26. Baltimore — Christian Peter, defensive tackle, Nebraska — Peters is much like Phillips (Baltimore's projected pick at number four) because he had some off-the-field problems while he was at Nebraska.

As for UK's Moe Williams, don't expect him to last much past the middle of the third round. Williams probably will end up playing for a team like the Jets, Patriots or Packers, all which like to run the football.

But in the unlikely event that Williams is drafted by the Dallas Cowboys, he should, in our opinion, sit back and enjoy the Super Bowl rings.

Of all the remaining Wildcats eligible for the NFL Draft, look for outside linebacker **Donté Key** to have the best shot at getting drafted. He was the lone senior off last year's team to get invited to any of the post season all-star games.

UK preparing for No. 3 Gators

This weekend could make or break the UK baseball season as the third-ranked Florida Gators come to town.

The Gators (31-10, 12-6) have a two-game lead over South Carolina in the Southeastern Conference's Eastern Division. UK (23-17, 8-10) is four games behind Florida.

Until last weekend, the Gators were cruising through the SEC, but UF lost two out of three to Vanderbilt in Gainesville.

Since their problems against the Commodores, the Gators have had time to think about the Cats. Florida has not played since last weekend and should be well-rested and hungry for UK.

While Florida was strolling through the SEC until last weekend, the Cats were struggling.

But UK took two out of three games against Tennessee in Knoxville, giving Coach Keith Madison's squad some much-needed momentum against Florida. The series win against Tennessee was the Cats' first since their opening tilt with Ole Miss.

In contrast to Florida, UK had a busy week. The Cats were trounced Tuesday by Middle Tennessee State 11-2, but rebounded with a 7-6 win at Cincinnati on Wednesday.

The Gators come into Lexington with a solid team. No one player stands out.

"They have a lot of good players," Madison said. "You don't think about shutting down one player."

Three Gator players — Mark Ellis, David Eckstein and Chuck Hazzard — are batting over .350. Against Vanderbilt last weekend, Hazzard went 8-for-13 with three home runs and 10 RBI.

Last season the Gators swept the Cats in a three-game series. Florida also owns a dominant 92-44 all-time record versus UK. Even with the numbers against him, Madison likes UK's chances against Florida.

"We have to play good defense and pitch well," Madison said. "If we do those two things, we'll be right in the game."

One reason Madison likes his chances is because of UK's starting pitcher tonight. The Cats will throw Scott Downs against the Gators and, lately, Downs has been dominating.

Last Friday, the lefty hurled a complete-game seven-hitter against Tennessee in a 4-3 victory. Two weeks ago, he also went the distance in a 3-2 victory over Alabama. The win earned him SEC Pitcher of the Week honors.

"He's on a roll right now," Madison said. "He's pitching well so we hope he'll take us into the ninth."

Downs is currently third in the SEC with a 1.95 ERA. He averages 10.02 strikeouts per nine innings, and opponents are batting only .231 against him.

This was supposed to be a recovery year for Downs after the sophomore underwent off-season shoulder surgery in September. But since returning to the lineup, Downs has regained his form from last year.

Surprisingly, Downs is the only mainstay in the UK starting staff, which has been hurt by injury this season. No. 2 starter Curtis Whitney, who is out for the season after having elbow surgery, is the latest casualty.

Whitney's injury has left the staff in a state of confusion as Madison is still unsure as to what pitchers will start the final two games against the Gators.

MSU not concerned by NCAA probe

JACKSON, Miss. — Mississippi State officials don't appear concerned about NCAA questions surrounding the junior college graduate of Dontae' Jones, who helped lead the Bulldogs to the Final Four in his only season.

Jones' grades were apparently the center of discussion when a member of the NCAA enforcement staff met with Northeast Mississippi Community College officials for three days in March.

Joe Childers, president of Northeast, was quoted in yesterday's Clarion-Ledger that NCAA staff member Dale Smith asked

questions about Jones, who passed 36 credit hours last summer before transferring to MSU.

MSU officials confirmed this week that Jones, who has made himself eligible for the NBA draft, has withdrawn from classes.

Of the 36 hours he passed last summer, 23 were taken at Northeast and 13 came through correspondence courses at Southern Mississippi.

Morris pleads innocent to drug charges

ROCKWALL, Texas — Bam Morris of the Pittsburgh Steelers pleaded innocent yesterday to two drug possession charges stemming from his arrest last month during a traffic stop.

Morris, wearing a mustard-colored suit, entered a written plea during a brief hearing before state District Judge Bill Lofland. Trial was set for July 15.

"I can't talk about it now," the 24-year-old running back told reporters. "There will be a time."

Morris is one of two players from this year's Super Bowl to be charged in a drug case. Michael Irvin of the Dallas Cowboys was indicted April 1 on felony cocaine and misdemeanor marijuana possession charges.

Morris, the leading rusher in Pittsburgh's Super Bowl loss to Dallas, has been free on \$50,000 bond following his March 22 arrest.

He was stopped outside the Rockwall city limits for swerving

and not wearing a seat belt, officials said.

Morris was indicted March 26 on two felony drug possession charges, both of which are punishable by two to 10 years in prison and a maximum \$10,000 fine.

Reynolds, 26, pleaded innocent today to a charge of marijuana possession. A grand jury found no probable cause to link Reynolds to the cocaine, officials said.

Both men are eligible for probation if convicted since neither has any previous felony convictions, officials said.

No trial date has been set.

Long Beach hires coach

LONG BEACH, Calif. — Wayne Morgan, the lead recruiter on Jim Boeheim's coaching staff at Syracuse, was selected as the head basketball coach at Long Beach State.

Morgan, 45, succeeds Seth Greenberg, who left the 49ers to become head-coach at South Florida two weeks ago.

Morgan, an assistant at Syracuse the past 12 years, takes over a Long Beach program that won the Big West Conference regular-season title with a 12-6

record last season and had a 17-11 overall mark.

"I am overjoyed to have been chosen as the new head coach at Long Beach State," said Morgan, who was introduced Wednesday at a campus news conference.

"Basically, this is the fruition of my life's dreams. My immediate goal is to make sure all of the players are comfortable in the program and where they should be at academically."

As the lead recruiter on Boeheim's staff, Morgan helped bring in Sherman Douglas, Conrad McRae, Adrian Autry, Lawrence Moten, John Wallace and Otis Hill.

Morgan was part of a program that lost to UK in the NCAA championship game on April 1, and won five Big East Conference regular season titles and three conference tournament championships during the past 12 seasons.

Before being hired at Syracuse, Morgan was an assistant at Dartmouth from 1975-79 and at Xavier from 1979-84. His only previous head coaching experience was at Dutchess Community College in Poughkeepsie, N.Y., during the 1974-75 season.

From Memphis to Lexington

The summer before ninth grade, Robert Gordon went to see the Rolling Stones play in Memphis.

The Stones were running late and sent local Memphis blues man Furry Lewis to open the show. Lewis walked out before a crowd of 50,000 with a little wooden stool and guitar. His cool rhythms soon calmed the hot, impatient crowd.

"I'm sure I was not the only new fan he won," wrote Robert Gordon in his new book, *It Came From Memphis*.

Gordon, a blues lover, Memphis native and music journalist decided to take a serious look at the relationship between the blues, race and rock 'n' roll. For three years, he nurtured the idea of a book in his head, and for three years before, he began the interviews and research to put the story together.

That took another year and one half to complete.

"I imagine the germ for writing the book began back in the ninth grade," Gordon explained in a telephone interview.

Lewis' performance at the Rolling Stones concert inspired him to track down Lewis. After finding Lewis, he bribed the old blues man with a bottle of Ten High to come play at his school. These early influences anchored his interest in history of blues.

The book focuses on the little known blues men, who Sun and Stax Records should thank for establishing the rhythm and blues style that made men like Elvis the King — men like Furry Lewis.

Gordon often considers the sociological and socio-economical reasons for the rock 'n' roll music that became popular after the days

of Robert Johnson. Gordon reminds the reader that those early Southern blues men weren't extinct after the 1930s, but that the music industry stopped recording them.

Although the Memphis music scene could consume the attention of a book, Gordon decided to tie Memphis blues in with issues like race and economics.

"I know the music had to be placed in a somewhat broader since than the Memphis scene for people to relate," Gordon said.

Available with the book is the *It Came From Memphis* CD which gives sound to the music and people Gordon discusses.

On the CD, Gordon juxtaposed a one-man blues show to a rock 'n' roll band, Gordon makes clear his point — rock 'n' roll burgeoned from white kids playing the Delta blues with a country background.

"The positioning of the songs offers the listener the chance to hear the connection between the songs," Gordon said.

The CD, like the book, highlights the voices and musicians that have made rock what it is today.

Thus, to understand the dynamics of modern rock 'n' roll and the Delta blues, Gordon's book is a splendid resource.

The sound of *DirtyBird* is different from past efforts. Joe said the band took great pride in per-

fecting the album and making it great. The band also finds experimentation and diversity an aspiration in creating new songs and albums.

With a little help from the group's friends, The Meices added new dimensions to *DirtyBird*. Apollo 9 and JC 2000 of Rocket from the Crypt collaborated with The Meices on track one to add a powerful horn section to WOW. A 12-piece string section also appears on the album.

The Meices toured Europe with the Offspring and have played with Green Day on a couple of occasions. When asked what he learned about the business aspect of music from the experience of working with other well-known bands, Joe replied that he doesn't make music for the money.

"I don't care about the business, I'm here for the rock," Joe says the band is proud of the new record in that they took a long time in making it. The finished product of *DirtyBird* has a hard edge, impressive and powerful instrumental accompaniment, and a catchy, new feel to it that is sure to "make shit happen in yourself."

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Bloodshot sets up shop at Lynagh's

Nashville record label brings bands to area

Nashville built up country music and then ran it out of town when commercial superstars replaced the low lonesome sounds of Hank Sr. and Patsy.

Fortunately, many musicians fled Nashville with their sound intact — like Willie Nelson, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Waylon Jennings and Townes Van Zandt. Most of these men are in Texas now.

Yet, when these men pass on to that big place in the Texas sky, will Hank and Patsy's formula become extinct?

Thanks to an outfit of musicians in Chicago, the older, starker sounds of country music are flourishing under the Bloodshot Record Label.

The label began three years ago to fill a niche in the country music scene and has offered refuge to up and coming country based bands who look to Hank and Patsy as country music martyrs.

To mark the line between Nashville and Chicago, Bloodshot coined the phrase "insurgent country" to distinguish the country bloodlines.

Other names for this revived genre include "Americana" and "rogue ranch music."

One of Bloodshot's founders, Eric Babcock, was quoted as saying, "We're putting the steel-toed work boot to the rhinestone-embroidered ass of commercial country crap." He knows his mission.

This country resurrection is occurring in cities around the country.

When Bloodshot pieced together *Hell-Bent*, their second compilation album, bands from Detroit to Dallas joined in the making.

Dallas based band, the Old 97's who are on the *Hell-Bent* recording, explained that "insurgent" country wasn't a term when they began.

"We had no idea that such a genre existed. We started about the same time it did," explained Rhet Miller, lead singer of the Old 97's.

Bloodshot does not look for a pure country heritage in their bands, but for an attitude — honesty.

Thus, Bloodshot bands don't nurture a

twang, but a country soul set to music. The Old 97's have updated its country style by meshing rock beats with country style lyrics.

Proudly, its sound was recognized by country legend Waylon Jennings recently. "We were playing at the Gavin Radio Conventions in Atlanta and, Waylon Jennings was sitting on the front row."

Later that evening when Jennings performed he mentioned that he saw a band that rocked — the Old 97's." Miller explained.

"Our bass player's family is from a small Texas town and with that complement, his family forgave him for becoming a musician."

A country revival can be traced to big-labeled bands Wilco and Son Volt, who have tuned their guitars to echo the country sound.

Spurred on by the popularity of these bands, a World Wide Web site has opened for the sole discussion of this revamped country genre (NoDepress@aol.com).

To hear first hand a hard-country resurgence, three Bloodshot bands, The Grevis Angles, Moonshine Willy and the Old 97's will be performing at Lynagh's Saturday night.

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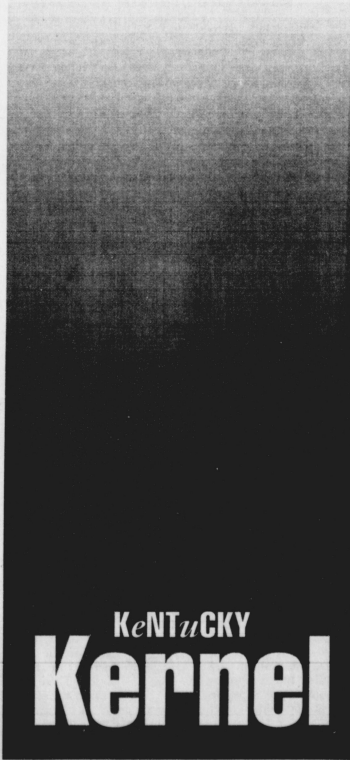
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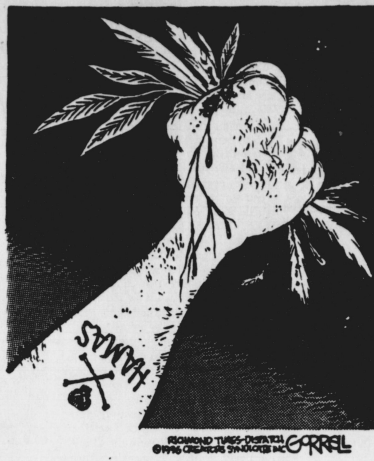
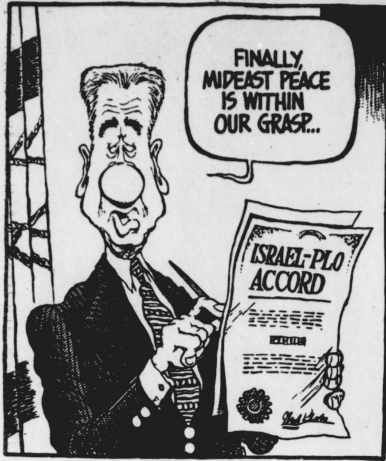

Some claim that the Kernel, specifically the editorial page, has long been dominated by oppressive forces that limit the debate to favor one side. Strangely, others claim the editorial page has not been regulated enough, pointing to repeated columns and letters about racism at UK.

control over their own reactions. The editorial page can't brainwash anyone. No opinion is as dangerous or subversive as the very attempt to silence it. The student newspaper, it should be noted, does not have the power to silence anyone. It only has the power to choose what opinions have the privilege — not the right — of mass dissemination within its own limited range. It is the responsibility of those who dare to take on the challenge of effective mass communication to compete hard for the limited space available. There is no one set policy for every publication that dictates the most fair way to regulate that competition. But the best evidence, top journalists agree, of a healthy and diverse opinion page is the level of public participation, monitored best by the sheer volume of letters to the editor received. So keep writing to us. Come down here and apply for a position, if you're so inclined. But be prepared for a tough line of work. The fact that a black columnist and a white editorial editor are getting so many people riled up just means they're doing their jobs. They ought to give each other a pat on the back.

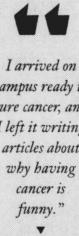
You never know what field you might end up in

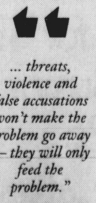

Campus talk focuses on date rape awareness

A crime that has existed since the birth of mankind, but has grown into a controversial and widely-discussed issue in the last decade, will be addressed today.

Forced sexual intercourse that results after a date because the rapist believes he or she has a right to, is called date rape. Since many disagree on the definition of rape, and when sexual intercourse becomes a crime, it has grown in popularity as a research topic.

Every year the education department and counseling psychology and the Southeast Psychological Association (SEPA)

collaborate and bring a speaker with extensive background on a subject to speak at UK.

SEPA sends the department a list of about eight or 10 people and a description of the issue they would address. The graduate students decide who they would like to invite. Since many of the students are either researching rape now, or at least have an interest in it, they decided that a speaker with a background in women's issues would be pertinent.

This year Arnold Kahn, professor of psychology at James Madison University, was selected to give a speech called "I Never Called it Rape: Understanding the Unacknowledged Rape Victim."

Kahn, who has a long list of publications exploring issues of women and gender, will discuss the problem of women who had an experience with all of the signs of rape, but have not yet recognized or admitted it.

Judith Worell, professor and chairwoman of the Department of Education and Counseling Psychology at UK and in charge of organizing this event, said she expects Kahn to focus on date rape, since that is the type that is so often misunder-

stood.

Often, women will be asked: "Did this happen, did that happen?" and answer yes, but then answer "No," when they're asked if it was rape, Worell said.

Kahn will highlight the importance of knowing when rape is sexual intercourse. Since some people hold that sex is "a given" after a date, the line often becomes unclear.

Today's event will be held in 122 Taylor Education Building; a

speech from 10-11:30 a.m. and a discussion about his research issues from 2-4 p.m. The discussion will be open for people to ask questions that came up during the speech and for Kahn to address concerns about his research topics.

"We would really like people to come to both events," Worell said. She also wants to emphasize that it is important for men and women feel concern about this issue.

"What's really nice is that this is a man talking to people," she said. "(Kahn is) trying to show that this is everyone's problem — everyone should be involved."
