

## Remember The War Fund?

"When March comes around next year, we hope the editor of The Kernel will not have to look over the record for 1942 and write, as we must today, 'the students of the University of Kentucky have failed.'"
So concluded the editor of The Kernel in a front-page editorial a year ago entitled "With The Greatest Opportunity in 25 Years, UK Students Have Failed."
In another editorial, the failure to make any important contribution to the nation's war effort was blamed on the absence of any organization to coordinate the various small campus drives and campaigns.

A proposal was made in the article for a Student War Fund into which contributions of various groups on the campus would go. The money in the fund was to be placed in defense bonds and held for the duration. After the war, the money from the sale of the bonds was to be used as an assistance fund for students wishing to return to the University for study.

This was not only to mean a contribution to the war effort by the placing of a large fund of money in defense bonds, but was to mean a great deal to the University and its prospective students after the war.

The War Fund was not to put on a drive for domations from reluctant students. Instead of organizations giving affairs for some vague cause, they were to give them for the War Fund.

A committee was to be organized by the Student Georganization to direct the fund.

A committee was to be organized by the Studegt Government association to direct the fund. It was to be composed of representatives from the SGA legislature, ODK, Mortar Board, YMCA, YMCA, SuKy, Gwens, Lances, Keys, Lamp and Cross, and the Student Union Board. The editorial received a warm reception. It was widely read and commented upon. It was generally thought a splendid idea by which the University students could make a definite, concerned contribution to the war effort. A bill embodying the features of the plan was presented to the SGA at its next meeting. The legislature was powerless to act in the absence
