Minority interaction necessary for diversity efforts

UK makes an intense effort to recruit minority employees and students — but once they arrive, they often find themselves in an uncomfortable atmosphere, said Stephen Voss, a political science professor.

Voss, who has done research in areas of race and politics, said discrimination occurs at UK despite well-intentioned faculty and staff.

"We get (minority faculty and staff) here and don't know how to work with them," Voss said. "When the chips are down, many people don't treat people of other races the same way they treat

people of their own."

UK faces a collective challenge as it moves forward with its diversity efforts, according to a report released last week by the Council on Post-secondary Education.

The report said the university's diversity message isn't consistent across its colleges and departments. Focus group discussions showed that some departments fail to promote the diversity strategies outlined in the Top-20 business plan and the Post-secondary Education Public Agenda.

"As a part of our Top 20 and strategic planning processes, we are re-examining how we translate our commitment to diversity into reality," President Lee Todd told the Kernel in an e-mail.

This includes recruitment strategies, improvements in academic and social aspects of the university, and structural and organizational changes that include a new Vice President for Institutional Diversity.

But, a large part of the problem with diversity on campus lies with faculty interaction with students and other faculty members, said Mahjabeen Rafiuddin, director for student diversity engagement.

"We don't have culturally competent faculty," Rafiuddin told the Kernel in a Feb. 21 article.

When professors single out black students asking for their viewpoint because they are a minority, discrimination occurs. Or when UK says, "we

have to get blacks to make blacks more comfortable," it is actually reinforcing discriminatory ideas, Voss said.

Todd said many black students have told him that they look to other black faculty and staff as mentors, guides and friends.

"I think that's only natural to some extent, and I think it's a responsibility that most of our faculty and staff of color embrace with enthusiasm," Todd said. "But it's a responsibility that all of us, regardless of our color or gender or orientation, should embrace as well."

Discomfort and ignorance primarily plague UK's campus, not hostility, Voss said.

Project works to free wrongly convicted

In 1989, Herman May Jr. was convicted of rape and sodomy and sentenced to 20 years in prison. Thirteen years later, he was proven innocent and freed with the help of the Kentucky Innocence Project.

"He's an amazing human being who has been through hell," said KIP manager Marguerite Thomas.

Representatives from KIP, including Thomas, spoke about their work last night in Memorial Hall as part of the UK Student Activity Board's Conscious Campus 101 lecture series.

"The Innocence Project: Guilty Until Proven Innocent" focused on the project's commitment to using new evidence to free inmates serving prison sentences for crimes they did not commit.

After DNA testing and legal help from KIP, May became the second of the three men that have been freed by the project.

"Every single day of those 13 years, he told people he was innocent," Thomas said. "Every single day of those 13 years, he begged people to listen to him."

KIP began in 2001 after a \$10,000 grant from the Kentucky Bar Association allowed the project to join with its first partners, the UK College of Law and the UK College of Social Work.

KIP sponsors a yearlong internship for students, including students in the UK College of Law. Students participating in the program are involved in the many aspects of one convicted criminal's case, Thomas said.

"Our students have to get down and dirty," Thomas said.

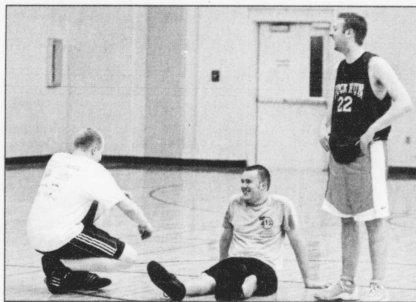

DanceBlue raises funds for cancer tonight

DanceBlue participants have nearly doubled in its second year, and organizers are hoping that momentum will carry them through tonight's 24-hour marathon. They're also hoping to see a proportionate increase in the money the event raises.

"We are hoping to raise more money than last year, but we don't set a specific goal for ourselves," said Alex McIlvaine, an agricultural biotechnology junior and dance marathon programming chair.

Last year, the dance marathon raised \$123,000.

"Raising money is not all this event is about," McIlvaine said. "We are hoping to have fun and to give the kids a magical night to remember."

This event, which begins at 6 tonight, raises money for the Golden Matrix Fund, which supports the UK Pediatric Oncology Clinic.

DanceBlue is modeled after a similar 30-year-old event at Penn State University.

Despite its short history, UK's dance

marathon is spreading awareness among the student body quickly. This year's dance marathon will have 317 volunteer dancers, a significant increase from last year's 180.

The dance marathon is divided into hours, each hour with a different theme.

"We have a variety of fun themes for each hour," said Rob Oakley, a political science and integrated strategic communications double major and rules, regulations and operations chairman of DanceBlue. "There is a salsa hour, an 80s hour, a country music hour. There will not be much repetition at all."

The funds raised from the event provide families with emotional support and financial aid, said Susanna Denomme, director of development for the College of Medicine.

"When a family has a child with cancer, it affects every member of the family," Denomme said. "We have social workers and psychiatrists helping the families cope with their struggle."

The funds raised by DanceBlue are matched by the state, all of which goes to cancer research, Denomme said.

The fact that DanceBlue brings different student groups together makes it special, McIl-

vaine said.

"It's not just Greeks; it's not just athletics. It brings the whole campus together," McIlvaine said.

Denomme is thankful for student volunteers' efforts in helping the children and their families.

"If you find out about DanceBlue, you'll find out that our student body is the most generous, loyal, and compassionate," Denomme said. "You can find a small group of caring students on any college campus, but to see thousands of students committing themselves to this cause is wonderful."

Student volunteers invite the UK student body and Lexington community to support the event and the dancers by attending the dance marathon.

People are especially encouraged to come for the last three hours of the dance marathon, Oakley said. The amount of money raised will be announced during the final hour.

"When the kids come to the marathon, they have smiles on their faces," McIlvaine said.

"That's when we realize that this is a great cause, and that it's bigger than we are."

Many aspects of Anna Nicole Smith's life - and death - are still unresolved, but one thing is certain: The blonde bombshell loved pink. And if her boyfriend Howard K. Stern has his way, when she is laid to rest, she will be wearing a dress by Pol' Atreu in her favorite shade. "Howard talked to Pol' about the dress and what it should look like," Smith's close friend Denise James tells Us, adding, "She will look like an angel."

of Smith, 39 (a toxicology report is expected in early March; there have been no signs of foul play). Unsettled too is Smith's disputed claim on the estimated \$500 million estate of her late husband, J. Howard Marshall, who died in 1995 at 90, a claim to which Dannielynn is sole heir. "Think years and years of litigation and tons of money," says Nancy Grace, Court TV and Headline News anchor. "Good luck, Dannielynn!"

like it would be a quieter life for Dannielynn, without all of the chaos."

Father Figures

Most hotly contested is Dannielynn's paternity. TMZ.com reported a settlement between Stern and Birkhead was in the works, and a source close to Arthur tells Us the two started talks after Stern's lawyer swiped a cup used by Birkhead - presumably to test his DNA. Speculation of a deal grew after Birkhead flew to the Bahamas and, the Web site reported, finally met the baby. Meanwhile, on February 26, a Bahamian judge left custody of the child to Stern until a hearing in mid-March and, says Arthur's lawyer, he has so far refused to let her visit the baby.

Quiet Life

While the adults in her life fight, Dannielynn lives a sheltered life in the Bahamas, where she was born, cared for by a team of nannies hired by Stern in a Nassau mansion guarded by men and attack dogs. Touches of Smith surround the infant, especially her expansive pink wardrobe ("She never wore the same clothes twice," Steines says of the baby). Even the position of Dannielynn's crib - by a window - was Smith's idea. "She thought it would be nice for her to see the daylight," says James.

Bahamian law may give Stern the edge regardless of DNA results, because he lived with Smith and cares for Dannielynn. He is also named the father on her Bahamian birth certificate. "There is a very strong legal presumption that what is stated in that document is accurate," Bahamian lawyer Thomas A. E. Evans told CNN.

But the baby might now lose the only home she's known. Despite a February 26 assurance that Stern and Dannielynn will not be evicted, G. Ben Thompson, a Smith ex she says gave her the house, is putting it on the market for \$10 million. Either way, if Stern retains custody of the baby, he is expected to continue living in the Bahamas, where he and Smith were renovating a second property. "He wants to be near Anna," says his sister Bonnie, adding, "He feels

Regardless of whom Dannielynn's father turns out to be, Stern's sister tells Us: Dannielynn, who was born just three days before her half brother's death, was not meant to be an only child. "Anna was trying to get pregnant again." Bonnie tells Us. "That's why this is so devastating."

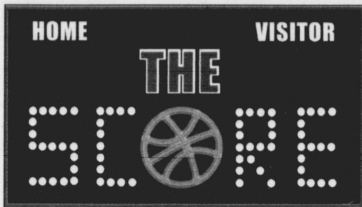

The view from the dugout

Former player takes on his new role as a coach

As his team was celebrating an historic season at UK, infielder Brian Hastings knew he wouldn't be graduating with his fellow seniors.

And while Hastings was determined to stay in school and finish his sociology degree, he knew he couldn't be on the field anymore.

So he decided that being in the dugout would have to be enough.

Hastings went to assistant coach Brad Bohannon with the idea of being an undergraduate assistant coach.

Once head coach John Cohen caught wind of Hastings' idea, he went straight to the former infielder.

"It was kind of mutual," Cohen said. "He had mentioned it before and I welcomed it because I know the kind of character he has, the kind of work ethic he has."

As a result, Hastings joined the coaching staff — a move he said has changed his out-

look on the game. "I look back on it now and I wish I would have thought more when I was playing — kind of slow down the process and focus more on the game mentally," Hastings said.

As a player, Hastings made valuable contributions during his two-year tenure with the Cats after transferring from Hutchinson Community College in Kansas.

He led UK in batting with a .390 average through the first 17 games in 2005, but his season was cut short by a hand injury. In 2006, the Kansas City native batted .276 and drove in 14 RBIs while helping the Cats to their first regular-season Southeastern Conference championship.

Though Hastings didn't put up extraordinary numbers at the plate, he exhibited leadership and poise — traits that Cohen said helped him successfully transition into coaching.

"He's helped us offensively and defensively," Cohen said. "He serves as kind of liaison between our players and the coaching staff and

he's been phenomenal around the office." Hastings' official duties include assisting with the day-to-day tasks in the baseball office, coordinating camps and player practice schedules, and interaction with the team on a daily basis.

Even though Hastings is only a year or two older than some of the players, his respect has never been challenged by any of the players, Cohen said.

"He has the desire to help our kids, to help the players get better," Cohen said. "I think he does a great job of communicating with them and communicating with the coaching staff. Even as a player, he had total respect from the players and I don't think that's changed at all."

"That doesn't mean the job can't be tough at times, coaching guys that he still calls his friends. "It's definitely a little bit different," Hastings said. "I kind of have to draw a fine line between a coach and a player. Instead of being buddies with the guys, which I still am most of the time, I have to draw that line in order to get their respect from them as a coach."

The most surprising part of the job, Hastings said, has been his lack of desire to get back on the field again. While he experiences the occasional yearning to play catch or pick up a bat, the desire has been fairly modest because he's already on the field so much, Hastings said.

Despite the major time commitment, Hastings says he's interested in a long-term coaching career after he graduates in May, and he said he would love to stick with the UK staff if there's an opening for him.

"That's something I'd really like to get into," Hastings said. "I think it's a great deal and I've always been interested in going into a coaching profession. It's definitely been beneficial to me to be on a staff with Coach Cohen and Coach (Gary) Henderson."

Whether he chooses a career in coaching or not, Cohen is confident Hastings will find success in any field.

"I think he's still trying to determine if he wants to do this long-term," Cohen said. "But if he decides to, I think he can be a heck of a coach."

Tubby's defense should include more than his rival

Dennis Felton thinks enough is enough. That's why, after he thought about holding his tongue, he thought better of it. He had just asked the University of Georgia coach if he felt the controversy surrounding Tubby

Smith's job status was fair to UK's coach. He paused, and then he stood up for a man who he said he respects and admires. "One thing I do know is that this league is not what it used to be," Felton said. "More schools are investing significant funds into their basketball programs. Because of that, it's the best league in the country."

The former coach at Western

Kentucky, now in his fourth year at Georgia, is right. This is not Adolph Rupp's Southeastern Conference, and — brace yourselves — this is not Adolph Rupp's Kentucky. In the past ten years — let alone the past 50 — things have changed in this league. Look at the conference standings. Balance and parity reign. It's almost impossible to win on the road.

Think about this: The Nation wants to file Tubby Smith like a Lenten fish for losing on the road at Tennessee and Vanderbilt. But what did the team coached by Billy Donovan do at Tennessee and Vanderbilt? Florida lost to both teams by double digits. And the Gators are a consensus pick to make a run to the Final Four. That should tell us something about the SEC. Maybe Vanderbilt and Tennessee are pretty good.

One thing we seem to have forgotten is that other schools in this league want to win too. For a long period of time, that wasn't really the case. At many schools, basketball was a cold-weather di-

version between football season and spring football season.

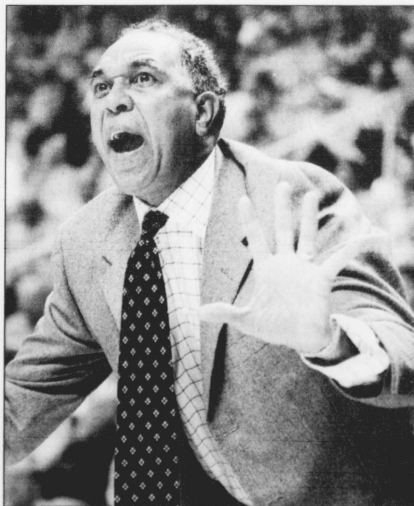
Just as UK neglected its football program — and its women's basketball and baseball and soccer and golf and tennis and softball and volleyball programs — while pouring resources into basketball, the rest of the league primarily focused on football. And just as UK has in recent years made a serious attempt to win in football — and those other sports — the rest of the league has worked to get better in basketball.

That's allowed. "This league is as tough as it can be," Felton said. "There are a lot of good teams and no bad ones."

Louisiana State — the last place team in the West — played in the Final Four last year. Alabama — a preseason national title hopeful — will not finish with a winning record in league play.

Big Blue Nation has, in the past week, acted like a Big

Blue Baby, throwing a temper tantrum like a spoiled rich kid. And its leader, athletic director Mitch Barnhart, simply stoked the flames when he said on Monday that UK hadn't played up to its potential. What potential have they missed? The Cats are 20-9, ranked in the top 10 in the ratings percentage index and are a lock for the NCAA Tournament. And all of this has happened in what could be described as a transitional year.

At some point, consistency has to be enough. Running a solid program, playing by the rules and gracefully handling the most stressful job in college basketball has to be enough. At some point, someone has to send a wake up call to an unrealistic fan base. At some point, someone has to say enough is enough.

Barnhart has never had more power than he does right now, with his patience with Rich Brooks paying dividends, and with more UK programs competing at a high level than ever before. Now is the time for the athletic director to stand up and tell boosters, fans and media to back off. Barnhart had a chance to do that on Monday, and he missed it. But after the ringer Smith and his program have been put through this week, strong leadership from the top is essential.

Enough is enough.
And it's time for Barnhart to say it.

Cats play on in SEC tourney, will face Georgia next

Jennifer Humphrey finished two assists shy of a triple-double as UK defeated Arkansas 72-57 in the first round of the Southeastern Conference Tournament at the Gwinnett Center in Duluth, Ga.

Humphrey had 21 points, 19 rebounds and 8 assists, all game-highs for the Cats. The junior forward began her flirtation with the triple-double after a stellar first half. At intermission, Humphrey had already recorded a double-double — 12 points and 10 rebounds. And she did most of it without fellow post player Sarah Elliott by her side.

Elliott banged her knee early and sat out most of the first half because of pain. She returned late in the half, but scored only two points before the halftime.

When Elliott returned, Humphrey began tallying assists by feeding her postmate. Elliott scored 15 points in the second half, many of those points set up by Humphrey's eight assists.

Elliott has scored in double figures in seven consecutive games.
Senior guard Jenny Pfeiffer also reached double figures for UK. Coming off the bench, Pfeiffer scored 11 points on 4-of-8 shooting and had four steals.

UK shot 41.9 percent from the field and out rebounded Arkansas 44-36. UK turned the ball over 15 times while forcing

16 Razorback turnovers. The Cats are 12-2 this season when committing fewer turnovers than their opponent.

The Cats led by as many as 11 in the first half, but Arkansas closed out the final two minutes on a 4-0 run to close the deficit to 35-28 at the break.

UK got little production from its two leading scorers in the first half. Hampered by the first-half knee injury, Elliott, who is averaging a team-high 13.8 points per game, scored just two points in limited action. Junior guard Samantha Mahoney, averaging 12.7 points per game, went scoreless in the first half.

But the two got things going after the break. Elliott and Mahoney combined to outscore Arkansas 13-2 in the opening minutes of the second half and build a 20-point lead early in the second half.

Arkansas tried to mount a comeback late in the game, but UK sank free throws down the stretch to sink the Razorback's chances.

The Cats (18-12, 7-8 SEC) advance to the second round of the SEC tournament and will play No. 2 seed Georgia tomorrow at 3:30 p.m.

The Cats battled back from an 11-point deficit in the second half to take the Bulldogs into overtime at Rupp Arena in their previous meeting this season. But Georgia outscored UK 16-6 in the extra session to win 82-72.

"If there is hostility on campus, it grows out of just not knowing," Voss said. "It's the difference between what's in our hearts and what's in our minds."

Phillip Kraemer, associate provost for undergraduate education and acting head of multicultural and academic affairs, said he thinks UK has what he would generally call "a faculty that appreciates diversity."

Kraemer pointed to steadily increasing black enrollment rates as a tribute to UK's focus on creating an inclusive atmosphere.

Black enrollment faced a slight decline from 2004-2005, dropping from 1,042 to 951. But enrollment increased in 2006 to a projected 1,052. "If it really was a racist campus we couldn't have turned that around in one year," Kraemer said.

Kraemer also attributed rising black enrollment to a re-vamped recruiting program.

Minority student recruitment was previously the responsibility of the Office for Multicultural and Academic Affairs. The university Admission Office is now a part of the process as well.

But while UK has made substantial improvements in recruiting blacks and other minorities to the university, there are still gaps in how those students achieve once they arrive.

Although it's steadily improving, the black graduation rate over six years for 2005-2006 was 49.3 percent compared to a 66 percent graduation rate for whites.

"When students come on campus they struggle to find a place where they belong," Rafiuddin said. "We need to put as much energy into retaining students once they get here as we do in recruiting them."

But to make a generalization that the predominantly white administration and faculty have trouble relating to minority employees and students is "too sweeping and unsubstantiated," Todd said.

A campus attempting to create a more inclusive environment must be aware that institutional bias is largely unconscious, said Barry Chersky, a consultant with Brinkman and Chersky Consulting, which provides training and consultation on issues related to sexual harassment, workplace discrimination and harassment.

The question becomes, "how do you make a cultural shift at the university?" Chersky said.

"If you are living the values of being a more inclusive institution, it will show by who has the power," Chersky said.

Todd said UK is not only willing to change the

makeup of its upper administration, but it has already demonstrated its commitment to diversity.

Todd's cabinet of six consists of one person of color and one woman. The search committee for the new vice-president for research is co-chaired by two women, and the search committee for the vice president for institutional diversity is co-chaired by an African American and a woman.

"I think my actions speak loud and clear about UK's commitment to inclusiveness," Todd said.

Voss and Kraemer agreed that the best way for the campus to become more comfortable with transitions toward diversity is with interaction with people of different backgrounds. Kraemer said he is working with his colleagues to host workshops and other interactive means of helping faculty and staff learn the best ways to work with people of different backgrounds.

"A lot of the best lessons about diversity are not taught in the classroom," Kraemer said. "Diversity has to circulate like blood. It isn't simply about telling people to do the right thing."

Kraemer said he is impressed with how seriously the university embraces diversity.

"If we discover that people are feeling uncomfortable we have to open that up to discussion and really attack the problem," Kraemer said.

In order to see success in diversifying the campus, however, it takes effort from the administration down to the students, Kraemer said.

"For a think tank you want a lot of diverse ideas," Kraemer said. "We owe society an appropriate response to issues of diversity."

However, participation in KIP isn't limited to law school students. Thomas said UK students who want to help out should call the project's offices and ask to volunteer.

The help of Innocence Project volunteers, interns and staff nationwide has freed 184 inmates sentenced to serve 2,204 years in prison, according to a newsletter published last year by the Innocence Project.

However, KIP investigator Diana Queen said working to free innocent people is only part of the solution. Helping those exonerated adjust to life after prison, Queen said, is a vital part of

the process. "There is no money, there is no 'we're so sorry that that happened to you,'" Queen said.

"The answer is simply that it is just not how it is," Queen said.

Without a program to support them after being freed from prison, May and Benjamin Kiper, another man the KIP helped free, struggled to adjust to life after incarceration, Queen said.

"Within six months of both of their release, they were back in trouble with the law," Queen said.

Still, Queen said that despite spending 13 years in prison, May has helped pick up the pieces. "Herman May has rebuilt his life," Queen said. "He has taken lemons, absolutely, and made lemonade."

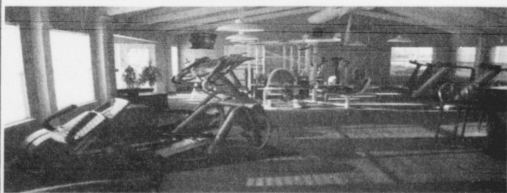

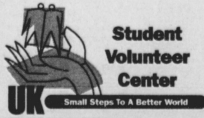

UK should implement Pike County arts program across state

UK's Pikeville County Extension for the Arts is a first-of-its-kind program that brings humanities to a rural area in Kentucky. The pilot program was well deserving of the 2006 Governor's Award in the Arts it received.

With agriculture extension offices in every county in the state, UK has always done a superb job of benefiting the commonwealth by implementing university technology in communities in a practical way.

In 2004, UK had the vision and initiative to realize that while agriculture and business assistance is vital, it could offer even more to these communities.

Dean of Fine Arts Robert Shay teamed up with the College of Agriculture to deliver the arts to Pike County.

Pike Arts opened its doors and now hosts musicians, quilters, painters, writers and various programs in Pikeville.

"There are no boundaries on art," Richards told the Kernel.

It's true. While Appalachia has a wealth of culture, it is important to

The center has also spawned a weekly newspaper, "Whazup?" The paper has a circulation of 11,000 and reaches readers in Pike, Letcher and Floyd Counties, as well as a West Virginia county. In fact, the extension program is expanding to Greenup County this month, continuing the momentum of this necessary outlet.

The university has been an integral part of this precedent-setting initiative and hopefully it will take steps to make this sort of effort in other regions in the state.

While UK and the rest of the state pushes the importance of math, science and technology, it's nice to see an effort made to include humanities. While these other disciplines are necessary to push the commonwealth forward, it's also important that its citizens enjoy cultural events and an enriched quality of life that the arts can provide.

DanceBlue could be a beneficial annual affair

This weekend UK will hold its second-ever DanceBlue dance marathon. The marathon, a year-long fundraiser for children with cancer, was an overwhelming success last year when it raised \$123,323. This year, after the success and enthusiasm from students, the organizers hope to increase that total and make DanceBlue a UK tradition.

"This year we are planning to extend upon what was successful last year," said Amberlee Kempf, coordinator of DanceBlue, in Tuesday's issue of the Kernel. "The most dynamic thing about it is the amount of students that are involved."

Last year DanceBlue had 180 students attend. This year, 317 students applied to participate in the Dance Marathon.

The sudden explosion of excitement for the fundraising event is huge for UK. If DanceBlue continues to grow with the enthusiasm and energy which it has from its original conception to now, it could easily become a staple at UK.

To be able to have packed Memorial Coliseum on this week-

end's event could easily double the money raised as opposed to last year, something that would show just how vibrant the marathon is and can continue to be in years to come. UK is No. 1 for first year pediatric oncology (cancer) fundraising in the U.S. and DanceBlue is only increasing those numbers, furthering making its mark.

The DanceBlue Marathon is modeled after Penn State's Thon, a fundraiser with a similar mission as DanceBlue that raised \$5.2 million this year. DanceBlue followed in the footsteps of Thon. UK organizers feel like DanceBlue can rival Thon's success, noting that it took Penn State ten years to reach the \$100,000 mark, something DanceBlue achieved on its first try.

"It is a very big event with different perspectives, commitments and involvement. Therefore, actually being there is a priceless gift. It is my most treasured memory at UK," Kempf said.

This event is important to UK and should continue to be supported as a UK tradition.

dous resource for students here at UK. It offers an assortment of advocacy programs, educational programs regarding violence against women, consultation services for those seeking to find more information about violence against women, and several safety services such as the C.A.T.S. Phones.

SAFECATS escort service, CATS Bus and Shuttle Service and S.T.A.R.R., a self-defense program for women (from Women's Place Web site).

Violence against women is an issue that often remains underestimated and under-represented; and it is our obligation to support any resources available to combat this horror. When campaigning last year, I promised to commit more Student Government resources to campus safety, especially for women. I am proud to say that this school year, Student Government has made Women's Place a priority and we have

given an unprecedented amount of funding to Women's Place.

However, little can be accomplished without the student body's commitment as well. This is an issue that knows no racial, age, or gender boundaries. This is something that we can all join together on: students, faculty, and staff, alike, have to support one another in this cause. That is why we are requesting your presence on Wednesday, March 28, for "Take Back the Night," a march for (women's) safety. It begins at 6 p.m. at Memorial Coliseum; please show your support and determination to achieve a campus at which we can feel 100 percent safety 100 percent of the time.

In the meantime, there is plenty to do on campus. Women's Place is always enthusiastic and appreciative of volunteers for the different programs it offers, as well as in the office. There are many opportunities for internships as well. If you visit the Web site at www.uky.edu/StudentAffairs/WomensPlace/, you will find a list of volunteer and internship opportunities available. You can also drop by the Women's Place office in 106 Frazier Hall.

Also, if you live in Ingles, Keeneland, Kirwan Tower, Boyd, Patterson, and Donovan Halls, you have a program available to you called Safety Net, a safety program for students. It is still in its early stages; each of the halls listed are part of the pilot program. Please take use of this program, and offer your feedback to its creators and managers.

If, for some reason, any of these services are unavailable to you, please remember these safety tips:

■ Do not walk through campus at night. There are plenty of resources available to help you get home without having to walk in the dark (SAFECATS, CATS Bus, etc.).

■ If you must walk through campus at night, NEVER walk alone. It is always best to walk with at least one or two other people so that if something were to happen, you have people that can help you, or call for help quicker.

■ Carry a can of pepper spray with you for defense.

■ Carry a cell phone so that you can easily call someone if there is a problem or you need a ride.

■ Always walk in well-lit areas. An attack is less likely to happen if it is in an area that is easily visible to a passerby.

■ Know the locations of all the C.A.T.S. Phones and the campus police offices.

■ Finally, make sure that you let someone know what your schedule is for any given day, so that there is someone that knows to look for you after a certain time.

It is great that so many have offered their commitment to enhancing women's safety, but now we must act on that commitment. Violence against women is not something that just affects other people, nor does it affect just women. It affects everyone; and we must all join in the effort together to end it. As Gandhi said, we must be the change we wish to see in the world.

If you're like me then you are probably wondering, "Why is there a chain around that girl?" In this odd, yet provoking picture, we find the answer to that question and discover many more mysteries.

While trying to stabilize himself after a sudden divorce, Lazarus (Jackson) discovers a beaten young woman on the road near his secluded Southern home. After discovering the woman, Rae, Lazarus is in for a surprise because Rae not only has a barrel full of psychological and physical demons, she is a raging nymphomaniac. Lazarus works through the Bible to help cure Rae of her sinful life.

Just hearing the story doesn't do it justice; you must see it to fully grasp its excellence. This film is full of erotic subliminal messages, Biblical innuendoes and clever double entendres that begin with the title and flow through the entire film.

Do not go into this film expecting every message to be blatantly packaged. You really have to work to squeeze out all the important themes of this picture — from the unsuspecting old black man who aids the sexually driven white girl, to the Biblical motives surrounding the characters, to the actual chain itself.

This film boils down to a simple theme: With will-power, a reason and some help from above, you can fix any problem no matter how horrific your situation may seem.

This film has some odd director's decisions, but with excellent editing and a soundtrack like "Oh Brother Where Art Thou," it is satisfying. Jackson is nearly perfect as usual, and shockingly, Justin Timberlake is astounding as the anxiety ridden boyfriend, Ronnie. At times, I had to remind myself it was Timberlake on the screen.

This film is rated R for harsh language, sexual content and nudity. It runs 115 minutes. I rec-
