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Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Wednesday, October 29, 2003.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 1:00 pm (Lexington time) on Wednesday, October 29, 2003 in the Board Room on the 18th Floor of Patterson Office Tower.

Mr. Steven S. Reed, Chair, said that it would be quite appropriate to have a moment of silence out of respect for President Emeritus Otis A. Singletary and former Governor Edward T. Breathitt, who recently died.

A. Meeting Opened

Mr. Steven S. Reed, Chair, called the meeting to order at 1:12 p.m., and Ms. Elaine Wilson gave the invocation.

B. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: James F. Hardymon, Davy Jones, Michael Kennedy, Pamela R. May, Robert P. Meriwether, Billy Joe Miles, Phillip Patton, Elissa Plattner, Steven S. Reed (Chair), Frank Shoop, Marian Moore Sims, Alice Stevens Sparks, Myra Leigh Tobin, Rachel Watts, JoEtta Y. Wickliffe, Billy B. Wilcoxson, Russ Williams, Elaine A. Wilson, and Barbara S. Young. Absent from the meeting was Marianne Smith Edge. The University administration was represented by President Lee T. Todd, Jr., Provost Michael Nietzel, Executive Vice President for Finance and Administration Dick Siemer, Executive Vice President for Research Wendy Baldwin, Executive Vice President of Health Affairs Michael Karpf and General Counsel Paul C. Van Booven.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chair declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 1:16 p.m.

C. Consent Agenda

Mr. Reed asked for a motion of approval for the Minutes and PR 2 on the consent agenda. On motion made by Ms. Wilson, seconded by Ms. Sims and carried without dissent, the following items on the consent agenda were approved:

D. President's Report to the Board of Trustees (PR 1)

President Todd called attention to PR 1. He stated that there are always great things throughout PR 1 and called attention to the following items in the report:

<u>Campaign Success Leads to \$1 Billion Goal</u> – President Todd recognized Vice President Terry Mobley and his staff for helping complete the \$600M fundraising effort, achieving a total of \$618M. He also commended Provost Nietzel and all the deans in the Medical

Center for the amount of work that they put into the campaign. This was the first time that the University had gone to a major capital campaign, and it was executed in a time when the national market place was tough. To exceed that goal was very important to the University.

President Todd reported that an announcement was made at the recent Fellows Dinner to increase the goal to \$1 billion dollars and to extend the campaign for another four years. He said that work would begin immediately to take advantage of a very gracious donor base that the University has found and others that it will find.

<u>UK Launches System to Gather Information for Resource Planning</u> – President Todd announced that this project has been kicked off for the enterprise resource planning for the University. It is a new computing capability to help integrate student and financial records. This system has been discussed for a few years, and Dr. Phyllis Nash has been asked to take the leadership of this project. This will not be an easy task because people will be asked to change the University's business processes. It will take some negotiation and good technology work, and there will be a significant staff associated with the project. This is a very important project and something the University desperately needs.

President Todd introduced Dr. Doug Boyd, the new Chief of Staff, and said he is glad to have Dr. Boyd fill Dr. Nash's position for this important role.

Student Population, Now over 35,000, Most Academically Talented in History — President Todd emphasized the quality of the freshman class, noting 318 Kentucky Governor's Scholars and Governor's School for the Arts students, 110 Legacy students (a total of 289 in the two years of this program), 145 valedictorians, 45 National Merit Scholars, and two National Achievement Scholars. Last year, the University ranked 15th in the nation with National Merit Finalists.

President Todd reported that there is a 33% increase in African-American freshmen. He said that this increase is a testament to the good work of Don Witt, Director of Undergraduate Admission and University Registrar, and his staff.

<u>UK Begins Second-cycle Work on NCAA Self-study and Athletics Certification</u> — President Todd reported that the University has begun the second-cycle of its National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Self-study. He noted that this is a separate self-study from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) review that was completed for the University last year. He said that there would be discussions with the NCAA about making this particular Self-study coincide with the SACS Self-study because it would save the staff of the University a lot of time.

President Todd reported that there are a substantial number of committees involved in the Self-study, and Vice President Connie Ray will chair this effort for the University. People outside of athletics will be involved and asked to look at athletics. He said that he was pleased to report that Barbara Young will be the Trustee representative for this Self-study.

<u>City Initiates First Employer-assisted Housing Program</u> – President Todd reported the administration's interest in making money available to help subsidize mortgages for faculty and staff who would locate in the college-town area. The University will provide up to \$15,000 for faculty and staff, and they can lock in mortgage rates with a Fannie Mae loan.

Fannie Mae, Samaritan Hospital, and Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government representatives attended the recent press conference. The Samaritan Hospital and the City have similar programs.

President Todd reminded the Board of UK retiree, Dick Barbella, who won the lottery and contributed \$1M to an endowment that allowed the President of the University to use at his discretion. The University will be using the proceeds from this endowment to help provide these mortgages.

President Todd Presents First Annual Awards for Diversity – President Todd reported that the First Annual Awards for Diversity was a recommendation from the Commission on Diversity. The reception to announce the awards was very well received and nearly 300 people attended the event at the Boone Center. Outstanding winners were Joseph Lambert, Chief Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court, and Joseph Kelly, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of Columbia Gas of Kentucky. Both gentlemen have done some great things. Don Witt, UK Director of Undergraduate Admission and University Registrar, and Lauretta Byars, UK Associate Provost for Multicultural and Academic Affairs, were also among the recipients as well as others listed in PR 1.

Gatton College Partners with Greek University to Offer MBA in Athens – President Todd reported that the Gatton College is partnering with a Greek University to offer a MBA in Athens. He said that he would probably be able to announce that UK is partnering with a university in China very soon. This partnership is something that Dean Devanathan Sudharshan has promoted. SACS commented that this type of program change is one of the best-prepared significant changes that they have seen offered. President Todd congratulated Provost Nietzel on moving quickly with the program. UK has to get more international programs, and this is a great step in that direction.

President Todd said that concluded his report. He noted that PR 2 was on the consent agenda and said that a decision had been made to table PR 3 until a later date.

E. <u>Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Theatre Practice (AACR 1)</u>

Alice Sparks, Chair of the Academic Affairs Committee, reported that the Committee met that morning, and there were three items to recommend to the Board. The first item is the establishment of a Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Theatre Practice. The Dean, the Department Head and Provost were at the meeting and explained the recommendation in great detail. They talked about what the degree would mean to the University and said that UK would be the first

university in the state to offer it. She recommended approval of AACR 1. Ms. Sims seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See AACR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

F. <u>Change of Organizational Structure of the Center on Drug and Alcohol Research</u> (AACR 2)

Ms. Sparks reported that AACR 2 is the Change of Organizational Structure of the Center on Drug and Alcohol Research. She said that the Center would transfer to the College of Medicine, and the recommendation has gone through the usual procedures. She moved approval of AACR 2. Ms. Wilson seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See AACR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

G. Change in Name of an Educational Unit (AACR 3)

Ms. Sparks reported that AACR 3 is the Change in Name of an Educational Unit, the Department of Ophthalmology to the Department of Ophthalmology and Visual Sciences. This recommendation has gone through the usual procedures and has met with approval. She moved approval of AACR 3. Ms. Wickliffe seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See AACR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

Ms. Sparks informed the Board that the Committee discussed some upcoming challenges and had some reports on matters that it will be dealing with on a future agenda. One item will be the report from the Lexington Community College. Another item will be for the Committee to look at the retention and graduation rates and hopefully, see a big increase in those rates.

Mr. Reed thanked Ms. Sparks for her report and called on Mr. Hardymon for the Finance Committee report.

H. Acceptance of Interim Financial Report for the University of Kentucky for Three Months Ended September 30, 2003 (FCR 1)

Mr. Hardymon, Chair of the Finance Committee, reported that the Committee met that morning and had a quorum. There were 15 items on the Committee's agenda, and the Board has received material on these items. He noted that the items do require Board action.

He said that FCR 1 is the Interim Financial Report for the three months ending September 30, 2003, and this report is being recommended for the Board's approval. He mentioned some of the details in the report. The realized income is now 31% of the \$1.4 billion budget, and the expenditure is 25%. He referred to the balances on page one of the report and said that the key items the Board needs to look at are the cash and cash equivalents that is up 23% over last year. That is driven by an increase in endowment funds mainly and certainly does show that the structure is moving in a positive direction. He said that the University is on good, sound footing.

Mr. Hardymon reported that the revenues are up 3%, and at this time of year, revenues do get ahead of expenses because of the tuition. He said that the expenditures have decreased

\$7.7M versus last year. The main reason for that decrease is the renovations and capital equipment have slowed down. He pointed out that the debt service expenditures are down because of some refunding in June.

Mr. Hardymon reiterated that this compares very favorably with last year. The 31% in realized income is exactly where the University was at the end of three months last year. At the end of September 2003, the University's expenditure was 25%, and it was 27% at this time last year. The capital expenditures and some of the debt service items have held to 25%. It is a very sound financial report, and the Committee recommends approval. On motion made by Mr. Hardymon, seconded by Ms. Sparks and carried without dissent, FCR 1 was approved. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Disposition of Property – Bequest to College of Agriculture (FCR 2)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 2 is a recommendation to authorize the legal instruments to sell a partial of land. This is a piece of property containing approximately 330 acres near Somerset, Kentucky. The property was a bequest to the College of Agriculture by the Simpson family. It is known as the Ava Christine Simpson property. The University has had the appropriate appraisals made, and the property appraises around \$370,000. The University will sell this property, and it will be moving pretty quickly. From the sale of the property, the University will be required to establish the James W. and Ava Christine Simpson Endowment Fund for the benefit of the Department of Forestry. He said that the Committee recommends approval of FCR 2. Ms. Wilson seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes).

J. Kentucky Medical Services Foundation Gift of Property (FCR 3)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 3 is asking the Board to accept a gift of real property. It is property located at South Limestone Street in Lexington. It is a gift from the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation. The property has been appraised at \$1.425 million. It is a one-story office building consisting of 15,658 square feet on a 0.7 acre lot. The property will be used as an education center for UK medical students. The University will maintain and operate the facility. The Committee recommends acceptance of the gift. Ms. Tobin seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Approval of the Terms of an Agreement with the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation (KMSF) Regarding Real Property at 138 Leader Avenue (FCR 4)

Mr. Hardymon said that the important part of FCR 4 is for the Board to approve the terms and an agreement. The agreement is with the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation, and it regards some property at 138 Leader Avenue. He provided some background information on the property. He explained that the University needed the property where the former KMSF building was located for the Biomedical/Biological Sciences Research Building that is now under construction. The University made an agreement with KMSF that they would move to a piece of property owned by the University and leased at a nominal rate to KMSF. The appraised value is \$3.2M. If the property consisting of 30,000 square feet were ever needed by the

University, the University would be required to pay KMSF for the construction costs. Mr. Hardymon added that the University participated in the construction oversight, and although it does not expect to have the property back, it would be used more if the University did get it back. He said that the Committee recommends approval of the terms of this agreement. Ms. Sparks seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Authorization to Sell Property in Sharonville, Ohio (FCR 5)

Mr. Hardymon said that the last item dealing with property is FCR 5. This is a piece of property in Sharonville, Ohio that is deemed surplus as far as the University is concerned. The Board is asked to authorize the Executive Vice President for Finance and Administration to sell the property. Mr. Hardymon noted that the University had the property appraised, and it appraised around \$225,000. There is a building on the property; however, it is not a useable building for a future owner. He explained that the University had the property up for bid once but did not receive the appraised amount. The University turned that bid down and did get the \$225,000 appraised value. The net proceeds from the sale of this property will go to the Tracy Farmer Center for the Environment. Mr. and Mrs. Farmer previously donated the property to the University. The Committee recommends approval to sell the property. Mr. Kennedy seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Gifts and Pledges (FCR 6 through 12)

Mr. Hardymon said that with Chairman Reed's permission he would go through FCR 6 through 12 and have one approval for the items.

FCR 6 is entitled the Estate of Darlene F. Duncan. The Board is being asked to accept a distribution of \$537,783 from the estate of Darlene Duncan to create and endow the Joseph G. Duncan Endowed Scholarship Fund in the College of Agriculture. Mr. and Mrs. Duncan were long-time friends of the College of Agriculture, and Mr. Duncan was an employee of the Agricultural Communications Department of the College. They recognized the importance of support for undergraduate students in the College and wanted to leave a legacy reflecting their desire. Mrs. Duncan died in 2002, and Mr. Duncan died in 1997. They lived in Lexington.

FCR 7 is entitled Fluent, Inc., Gift-in-kind. This is a gift-in-kind of software. The appraised value is \$1,160,000 from this New Hampshire firm to the Department of Mechanical Engineering in the College of Engineering. This software will assist Dr. Huang, a Department of Mechanical Engineering Professor and Director of Graduate Studies, with his research in fluid dynamics. The software will allow Dr. Huang to more quickly look at prototypes and simulate the performance of the proposed designs, allowing them to improve the design quality while reducing cost and increasing the speed. This is a very nice gift and looks like it can be put to good use.

FCR 8 is asking the Board to accept a gift-in-kind of research and manufacturing equipment valued at \$243,560 from Toyota of Georgetown, Kentucky to the Center for Manufacturing in the College of Engineering. This gift will allow the Center for Manufacturing

to use the company's patented optical image enhancement technique for surface inspection of sheet metal, glass, plastics, and tooling. This continues a longstanding and mutually beneficial partnership with Toyota and the College of Engineering.

FCR 9 is entitled Charles D. and Jeanette D. Bennett Gift and Pledge. This is a gift of \$20,000 and a pledge of \$230,000. The pledge is to be paid in 2004. The gift and pledge are from Charles D. and Jeanette D. Bennett of Hardinsburg, Kentucky, to establish the Provost Discretionary Fund to enhance program excellence. Mr. Bennett, a 1946 graduate of the College of Agriculture, is a banker and a businessman. He and his wife are generous supporters of the University and hold UK Fellows recognition. This \$250,000 reflects their great appreciation for the University and their desire to support its advancement. The funds can be used at the Provost's discretion.

FCR 10 is entitled Gifts and Pledges to the Robert G. Lawson and William H. Fortune Professorships Endowment. This is for gifts of \$42,180 and pledges of \$43,500, a total of \$85,680 to create and establish the Robert G. Lawson and William H. Fortune Professorships Endowment in the College of Law. This endowment is being established to honor two long-time College of Law professors. Mr. Lawson has been a member of the faculty since 1966 and has served twice as dean. Mr. Fortune has been a faculty member since 1969 and served as associate dean during 1989-91 and is currently serving as associate dean. Both are UK College of Law graduates, and the professorships will be awarded to support the research and teaching endeavors of members of the College of Law faculty. The gifts and pledges are eligible for matching funds.

FCR 11 is a gift of \$760,449 from the Edith D. Gardner Charitable Foundation of Lexington. It is for the Edith D. Gardner Professorship/Chair in Cancer Research and the Madeline F. James Professorship/Chair in Cancer Research in the Markey Cancer Center. From the \$760,449 gift, \$635,449 will go toward the Edith Gardner Professorship/Chair. That will take the fund over \$1M; therefore, the word "Professorship" will be dropped. The remaining \$125,000 will go to the Madeline James Professorship/Chair. Again, that takes this fund over \$1M, and the word "Professorship" will be dropped. The two funds will be renamed.

The Gardner Foundation was created through the will of Edith D. Gardner of Lexington who died in 1989. She attended UK, and her husband, who died in 1982, was a 1924 graduate of the College of Agriculture. They have designated the Markey Cancer Center as the beneficiaries of the Foundation's contributions.

FCR 12 is entitled the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation Gift. It is a gift of \$50,000 from the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation for the Belinda Mason Carden and Paul Mason Professorship in HIV/AIDS Research. This Professorship was established in September, 2000. Unfortunately, Belinda Carden died in 1991 after contracting HIV through a blood transfusion. These gifts totaling \$51,960 were matched in September, 2000 by the Research Challenge Trust Fund (RCTF). This gift supplements the endowment and is eligible for matching RCTF funds.

Mr. Hardymon said that the Committee recommends the acceptance of FCR 6 through 12. Ms. Watts seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 6 through 12 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Approval of 2002-03 Endowment Match Program Annual Report (FCR 13)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 13 is recommending the Board's acceptance of the 2002-03 Endowment Matching Program Annual Report. According to regulations in House Bill 1 established in 1997, the Kentucky Postsecondary Education Improvement Act encourages the research activities at the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville. The University is to give an annual report on the endowment. Mr. Hardymon noted that some additional documents, including hundreds of pages on a disk, were provided to the Board. The summary, however, is rather complete. It stands for \$217M in actual value. This is state, cash, state funds, the matching funds and cash received. He noted that there are only \$32M outstanding pledges. This money has provided 126 Chairs/Professorships and 155 Fellowships. He pointed out that 240 staff members have been added because of these new programs. The Committee recommends the acceptance of the annual report. Ms. Wilson seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 13 at the end of the Minutes.)

O. Design of a Basketball Practice Facility – Memorial Coliseum (FCR 14)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 14 and 15 are for facility expenditures, and both of the projects will be funded from private sources. FCR 14 is the design of an expansion adjacent to Memorial Coliseum. There will be 92,300 square feet added and another 7,700 square feet of renovation to Memorial Coliseum. This facility will include two basketball courts for practice, equal facilities for men and women, and the second and third floor of the facility will be used for offices. This new facility will make available 17,000 square feet of space that the Athletics Department has around campus.

Mr. Hardymon explained that this project is being presented to the Board in two ways. With this recommendation, the Board is only asked to approve the cost to contract for the design phase of a practice facility and administration facility. That amount is \$2.5M. At this time, it is estimated that the total cost will be around \$25.5M. He noted that this does include a portion of upgrading Memorial Coliseum as well as the new facility. He reported that the University did quite a bit of benchmarking with other schools, and the costs appear to be in line with the estimate. He said that the Committee recommends approval of FCR 14.

Mr. Reed asked for any questions from the Board.

Ms. May asked if the location to the facility was consistent with the overall Campus Development Plan that had been brought to the Board earlier.

President Todd said that it is consistent, and it will be behind Memorial Coliseum.

Mr. Hardymon said that he had spent a couple of hours with the administration reviewing the Plan that morning, and it was a very well done plan. He concurred that the new facility was on the Plan.

Dr. Jones asked for clarification that this is not going to detract from the academic mission or resources available to the academic mission of the University.

President Todd said that private funds would be raised for this project. He said that he is very pleased with Mitch Barnhart and the Athletics Department's willingness to help with the University's academic mission by contributing \$1M for ten years to scholarships. He pointed out that another area of cooperation is the exposure to academics at athletic events. This is getting some of the University's advertisers that support sports to also support the academic events. The cost of this facility will not, in his mind, take away from academics.

President Todd reported that the University just announced a \$400M expansion of the program, and this is only a small part of that expansion. He said at one point he asked Mr. Mobley to calculate how much of the \$600M Capital Campaign money went toward athletics, and it was 7%. The University is still finding plenty of investors who are investing in the academic program.

Ms. Young said that she thinks that it is important to point out that the operational expenses of the new facility will be absorbed by Athletics.

President Todd said that was a very good point, and the operating costs as well will be borne by the Athletics Department. One piece of information that came up at the Athletic Board meeting is that 25% of the Athletics Department's budget is spent on UK's campus, presently with staff workers and with other things that they pay for on campus.

Mr. Williams said that it is probably too early to estimate the operating costs for this new facility.

President Todd indicated that it is too early for him to estimate that, and he did not know if Mr. Rob Mullens had that information. This facility will provide much needed improvement for women's basketball, volleyball, gymnastics, and men's basketball.

Mr. Reed noted that it is his understanding that the men's basketball team and other athletic programs have had to practice outside Memorial Coliseum because of scheduling problems. The University has an increasing number of sports that it is emphasizing and to good measure and good reason. It is also a matter of logistics and a matter of need as far as having practice facilities available not only for men's basketball but freeing up needed space for other programs as those programs are enhanced as well.

Mr. Reed reiterated what President Todd said. The University is along its way toward its march in untreaded waters for a billion dollars, having exceeded the \$600M mark. When you look at the \$25M facility, the context of a billion dollar capital campaign is very important, especially when you consider the benefits to the other programs and the other sports.

He stated that the University has the number one basketball program in the country. It is important for people to understand that the University must raise its academic programs so that it can have the same tradition, ranking and prestige as the number one basketball program. There

is a thin line. We must make sure we do nothing in our efforts to raise the academic program to somehow do anything that hurts the tradition of basketball. The basketball program reflects more than just who wins a game. It reflects a lot about who we are as Kentuckians, a lot about the fight in us, and a lot about the zeal never to give up and to always achieve and accomplish in the win. It is important for everyone to know that value that we embody in the UK basketball program is very important to us.

Mr. Reed mentioned the \$1M per year for ten years that athletics is contributing to academics. He said that he had to consider the \$25M proposal balanced by a billion dollar capital campaign on one end and \$10M from athletics on the other end.

Mr. Wilcoxson pointed out that there are schools that subsidize athletics from their general funds. He said that he did not think that there were state or academic dollars going towards subsidizing the University's Athletics Department. The figure is 25% or more coming into the University from athletic dollars. It is substantial. There are about 16 schools now that are doing this, and out of that, there are three of them already in the Southeastern Conference. The University needs to be competitive if it is still going to be number one.

Ms. Sims asked if this facility would help house some of the offices for coaches who presently have very diminished places in Memorial Coliseum. These coaches need to have lovely places to bring recruits and nice offices to just work in. These are professional men and women that serve the University. It appears that this facility will help other faculty and coaches at the University.

Mr. Shoop said that he is glad the Board is talking about a practice facility for the team. It is needed while the University is keeping its commitment to Rupp Arena. That commitment is in place for a number of years. This project is a practice facility and not a full-blown stadium.

Mr. Reed said that there was a motion for approval of FCR 14 and called for a second. Ms. Sparks seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 14 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Multi-Purpose Facility Addition to the Nutter Field House (FCR 15)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 15 is a project that will also be funded from private sources. It is a multi-purpose facility addition to the Nutter Field House. The Board is being asked to authorize both the design and the construction of this addition. It is a \$4M project. The facility will have a meeting area, an area for large dinners with seating capacity of 250 people for all programs of the University to use, a full kitchen, and an athletic training table. It is intended to service game day catering needs and host recruiting, athletic department, and other University departmental group functions. He reiterated that the project would be funded from private sources and said that the Committee recommends the administration be authorized to contract for the design and construction of this facility. Ms. Wickliffe seconded the motion, and it carried without dissent. (See FCR 15 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Other Business

Ms. Sims reported that Ms. Watts took a group of people to California to accept a very lovely award for national leadership. She asked Ms. Watts to tell the Board about the award.

Ms. Watts said that the Executive Council for Panhellenic at UK, consisting of ten people, went to Palm Springs to receive the National Leadership Award. The National Panhellenic Council, the governing body for group associations, community service and involvement in academics, presented the award.

Mr. Reed said that it is encouraging to know the importance of service of the University, and to know that the students of the University are engaging in additional service and winning national awards. The students continue to make the Board very proud.

Ms. Watts said that often times you hear of the Greek organizations, and it is nice to know that Dean West and a lot of other people are really working to focus toward other things.

Dr. Jones said that he would like to put more praise on Ms. Watts. He reported that she and other students are doing the University well in its interaction with the downtown City Council.

Ms. Sparks said that Ms. Watts gets praise from some of the Council members.

Ms. Watts reported that Mayor Teresa Isaac meets with her once a month. She said that she also has met with several of the Council members, and they have been very cooperative.

Mr. Reed congratulated Ms. Watts and encouraged her to continue to represent the University well.

R. Report on Athletic Association Board of Directors Meeting

Ms. Sparks reported on the October 17th Athletic Board meeting. She said that the majority of the meeting was an annual report from Mr. Barnhart. She informed the Trustees that they would be getting a copy of Mr. Barnhart's report. She called attention to a few points in the report in case the members do not get to read it immediately.

Academic Accomplishments

UK had 168 student-athletes elected to the SEC academic honor roll. Ten student-athletes were selected into the Omicron Delta Kappa National Leadership Honor Society. Two student-athletes were named 2002-03 Verizon Academic All-Americans, and the cross-country student-athlete Thomas Morgan was a McWorter Scholar-Athlete Award recipient.

Community Service

There were 250 student-athletes who assisted 15,000 people in the community through Community Outreach. They were involved in over 22 community organizations such as, Ronald McDonald House, UK Children's Hospital, Boys and Girls Club, Hope Center, YMCA, the American Cancer Society, and Special Olympics. They assisted 37 United Way campaigns in Kentucky by donating various autographed items for auction. Student-athletes in the community visited 33 Fayette County schools. They have mentored for 16 area "at-risk" high school students and participated in "Cats Cultivating Character" at Russell Cave Elementary.

New Events

There are several new events that have originated in the past year: the annual CATSPY's Awards Dinner, the Big Blue Caravan that goes all over the state (scheduled to be in Northern Kentucky instead of Ohio next year), the 1978 National Championship Reunion Dinner, the 100 Years of Kentucky Basketball Dinner, and the newsletter, "The Blueprint."

Ms. Sparks encouraged the Board to take the time to read about all the great things that are going on in the Athletics Department.

Office of the President October 28, 2003

1. Campaign Success Leads to \$1 Billion Goal

The University of Kentucky marked the end of its most ambitious fund-raising campaign in history on October 24, with news it raised over \$618 million over five years, surpassing its original goal of \$600 million. UK President Lee T. Todd Jr., campaign National Chair James W. Stuckert of Louisville and UK Vice President of Development Terry Mobley made the announcement during a development luncheon at the Hyatt Regency in Lexington. University officials, obviously pleased with the success of The Campaign, also announced plans to raise an additional \$400 million over the next four years, bringing the goal to a total of \$1 billion.

2. UK Launches System to Gather Information for Resource Planning

For several months UK has gathered data and identified resources in preparation of moving the university into a new generation of "Enterprise Resource Planning" (ERP). Most of UK's operational administrative systems and processes are antiquated for a university of this size and scope. Phyllis Nash will lead a team that will launch and implement new core administrative information systems. The ERP project, called "IRIS" for Integrated Resource Information Systems, refers to a modern suite of integrated applications that provide real-time data to end users to support administrative processes, enhance decision making, and to meet the information demands of UK. Complete implementation and integration will take two to four years. Extensive training opportunities prior to the shifting of current procedures will help in the operational transition. A Web page dedicated to the IRIS project will keep the campus aware of the team's progress and provide answers to process questions as changes are made.

3. Student Population, Now Over 35,000, Most Academically Talented in History

UK reported a record enrollment of 35,052 students for the fall semester 2003, an increase of 870 students over the previous year. Graduate School enrollment is also at a new all-time high, up 2 percent from 2002. Lexington Community College continues its steady growth with a total of 8,639 students,

a 4.2 percent increase. These numbers include a significant growth in the number of African-American freshmen at UK, an increase of more than 30 percent. This year's freshman class of 3,693 students is the most academically talented group of first-year undergraduates in UK's history, including 318 Kentucky Governor's Scholars and Governor's School for the Arts students, 110 Legacy students, 145 high school class valedictorians, 45 National Merit Scholars, and two National Achievement Scholars. The middle 50 percent range of incoming freshmen's ACT scores shows a composite of 22-27 – well above the national average of 17-24, equal to or better than a number of UK benchmark universities, and nearing UK's goal of 23-28 set by the university's 2003-06 Strategic Plan. In other examples of growth, total African-American enrollment and the combination of international and non-resident student enrollment for all classes each increased by 6 percent.

4. Officials Break Ground for Four New Student Residence Halls

UK officials broke ground last month for four new student residence halls that will house 684 students, marking the first new student housing facilities to be built since 1979. Financed through university housing and dining bonds, the new residence halls will be built at an estimated cost of \$46 million. The new halls are the university's response to an increased demand for on-campus housing and will help the university continue to attract and retain high-caliber students. With a total of 213,000 square feet, the new residence halls should be completed and ready for occupancy by fall 2005.

5. UK Begins Second-cycle Work on NCAA Self-study and Athletics Certification

UK is beginning work on its second-cycle NCAA Self-study and Certification of the Athletics Department. President Todd has appointed Connie Ray, vice president for Institutional Research, Planning and Effectiveness, to chair the university's NCAA Steering Committee. Four subcommittees will report on specific areas designated for review by the NCAA operating principles: governance and commitment to rules compliance; academic integrity; fiscal integrity; and equity, welfare and sportsmanship. An NCAA representative will officially kick off the self-study with an orientation visit to campus in January 2004. An NCAA evaluation team will visit in March 2005. The certification program is meant to ensure NCAA's commitment to integrity in intercollegiate athletics by broad-based involvement of key campus groups in the self-study effort, by assuring compliance with the NCAA operating principles, and by imposing sanctions on institutions that do not correct shortcomings or address problems identified during the self-study and peer evaluation process. UK Board of Trustees member, Barbara Young, has agreed to serve as a member of the Steering Committee.

6. City Initiates First Employer-assisted Housing Program

Lexington Mayor Teresa Ann Isaac, UK President Todd, and Samaritan Hospital CEO Frank Beirne recently joined representatives from the Lexington Downtown Development Authority and Fannie Mae to announce Lexington's first Employer-assisted Housing (EAH) Initiative. The initiative, called "Live Where You Work," is an effort to increase homeownership opportunities among Lexington's workforce through access to financial assistance of up to \$15,000 for eligible employees, housing information, education provided by counseling agencies, and innovative financing options. The initiative promotes urban revitalization by targeting homes in downtown Lexington and the UK area. The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, UK and Samaritan Hospital are the first employers in the city to offer this benefit plan to employees. President Todd said Live Where You Work will greatly aid UK in its efforts to attract and retain superior faculty and staff, as well as serve as a catalyst for revitalizing neighborhoods contiguous to the UK campus.

7. UK Broadens Use of Temporary Disability Leave and Funeral Leave for Employees

In another step to improve work-life conditions for employees, the university has enhanced and broadened the use of temporary disability leave (TDL) and funeral leave for employees. The policy changes expand the definition of family to permit employees to use up to 30 working days of TDL over a 12-month period for illnesses of family members. It also eliminates the "66-day rule" that required employees to have a balance of 66 days of accrued TDL before being granted time off to care for an ill family member. Leave for the death of a parent, sibling, spouse, child, or other relatives for whom an employee is directly responsible was increased from three to five working days.

8. President Todd Presents First Annual Awards for Diversity

Nearly 300 people attended the inaugural President's Awards for Diversity at a late September reception at the Boone Center. Thirty-two people were nominated and seven people received the awards and \$500 dollars each. The winners in the various categories were: Doris Wilkinson, sociology professor, and Lauretta Byars, associate provost for multicultural and academic affairs, in the faculty/administrator category; Delicia Haynes, a student in the College of Medicine, in the student category; Donald Witt II, director of Undergraduate Admission and University Registrar, in the staff category; Lexington Community College in the UK unit/program category; and Joseph Lambert, chief justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court, and Joseph Kelly, executive vice president and chief operating officer of Columbia Gas of Kentucky, in the Kentucky agency/organization/individual category.

9. College of Social Work Shares in \$2 Million Grant for Bioterrorism Research

Ginny Sprang and Jim Clark of the UK College of Social Work received a two-year, \$2,653,816 grant from the Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration to study the effects of bioterrorism. This is a joint project between UK, the University of Louisville, and the Kentucky Department of Mental Health. The UK and U of L researchers will focus on health-related issues. The UK College of Social Work, which will receive \$315,000, is handling the mental health aspect of the grant, developing models of how bioterrorism and/or the threat of bioterrorism impacts individuals, especially vulnerable populations like children. Other UK faculty and colleges involved include Patty Sharko, Agriculture, agroterrorism preparedness and response; Craig Martin, Pharmacy, bioterrorism preparedness for community based pharmacists; and Jim Norton and Rob Sprang, Medicine and Kentucky Telecare, information dissemination.

10. UK Alzheimer's Researchers Indicate Protein May Stem Diseases' Advance

A team of scientists, including a group from the UK College of Medicine's Department of Anatomy and Neurobiology, have uncovered the possible role of a protein in offering protection from Alzheimer's disease. The protein, Pin1, acts on other proteins in the brain and reduces the other proteins' tendency to form tangles and knots in the brain. The finding reveals a possible treatment for the disease and could have implications for other neurodegenerative conditions like Parkinson's and Huntington diseases. The UK team was led by Guoying Bing, professor of anatomy and neurobiology. The findings were published recently in Nature.

11. Gatton College Partners With Greek University to Offer MBA in Athens

The UK Gatton College of Business and Economics will offer its 36 credit-hour Master of Business Administration program in Athens, Greece, beginning next spring. The program will be hosted by UK's partner institution, the Technological Educational Institute of Piraeus (TEI-Piraeus) and combines TEI-Piraeus' physical facilities, technical support, and reputation within Athens and Greece generally with the Gatton College's well-known faculty and MBA curriculum to create a first-rate graduate level experience for properly credentialed Greek nationals and other European students seeking an American-style education at a reasonable price. No more than 70 students will be admitted into the first year of the program with subsequent years' maximum enrollments to be negotiated between the Gatton College and TEI-Piraeus on an annual basis. The program is a key element in the college's continuing efforts to expand its international presence and is consistent with UK's aspirations to achieve top-20 status.

12. UK Holds Inaugural National Conference on Violence Against Women

UK hosted an innovative research conference on violence against women in late September, the inaugural national event for the UK Center for Research on Violence Against Women. The conference, "Toward a National Research Agenda on Violence Against Women," was specifically designed for researchers in the field. Topics included measuring and defining violence against women, offender typologies, effects of violence, and special issues facing women. Meanwhile, the center is offering petit grants to investigators across the university to fund research projects related to all aspects of violence against women. Selected projects will explore legal and clinical complexities of domestic violence, rape, stalking and related crimes, while enhancing the welfare and safety of those impacted by these crimes.

13. Colleges of Design and Agriculture Combine Resources

An agreement signed recently by David Mohney, dean of the UK College of Design, and Scott Smith, dean of the UK College of Agriculture, will strengthen a partnership to better serve Kentuckians. The agreement creates a formal partnership between the two colleges to work on topics in housing, home environment, and historic preservation. The School of Interior Design and the UK Cooperative Extension Service's Family and Consumer Sciences unit will jointly implement the agreement.

14. UK a Leader in Laser Vision Correction

The UK Department of Ophthalmology is one of the first in the region to acquire a new technology to provide patients with state-of-the-art care. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently approved a personalized eye laser treatment system, the Zyoptix™, manufactured by Bausch & Lomb, in the correction of near-sightedness and astigmatism. Multi-center, nationwide clinical trials conducted to determine the safety and effectiveness of the new technology generated impressive outcomes. In post-treatment surveys 99.7 percent of patients said that their quality of vision was improved after treatment and 98.5 percent of patients were satisfied or extremely satisfied with the results.

15. UK Awarded \$1.3 Million to Restore Savanna-woodland Ecosystem

The Kentucky Heritage Land Conservation Fund Board awarded UK \$1.3 million for the purchase and initial management of 410 acres of Silver Lake Farm in southern Harrison County. The UK Tracy Farmer Center for the Environment and the Kentucky Chapter of the Nature Conservancy are collaborating with the Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission and a private landowner to facilitate the work to be conducted on the property. The work will include restoring the unique Bluegrass savanna-woodland ecosystem, experimenting

with effects of fire and grazing on the system, and developing a native plant nursery for pharmacological, agricultural, and ecological applications.

16. National Weather Services Certifies UK as a StormReady Campus

With the assistance of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, UK collaborated with the National Weather Service, Kentucky Emergency Management, and the Federal Emergency Management Administration, to achieve certification as a StormReady Campus. According to the NWS, UK is one of only a few college campuses in the nation to achieve StormReady status. StormReady is a certification program managed by NWS to help communities around the country become better prepared to respond to severe storms through planning, education, and awareness. To be named StormReady UK identified severe weather safe areas in every building on campus, installed special weather radios in the most populated buildings and in residence halls, displayed Severe Weather Shelter signs in designated buildings, trained UK employees to be StormSpotters, and created a Web site showing Severe Weather Shelter locations for every floor in every building on campus.

17. Kentucky Clinic South Opens New Pediatric Cardiology Clinic

The UK Department of Pediatrics has opened a new pediatric cardiology clinic at Kentucky Clinic South, offering better access to care for residents of south Lexington and surrounding communities. Thomas Di Sessa, pediatric cardiology division chief, said the clinic provides full-service cardiac diagnostic capabilities including cardiac imaging, 24-hour EKG recordings, chest X-ray, and a complete laboratory service. The clinic will provide outpatient diagnostic and treatment services for children with suspected or diagnosed congenital or acquired heart disease and heart defects. Kentucky Clinic South is located at 2400 Greatstone Point, Lexington.

18. UK First Lady Patsy Todd Unveils New Society for Guignol Theatre

UK First Lady Patsy Todd recently inaugurated a new Guignol Society designed to raise awareness of UK's Department of Theatre and the Guignol Theatre. Mrs. Todd, Theatre Department Chair Barbara Lewis, and other ceremony participants unfurled a system of blue and white flags that will be flown in front of the College of Fine Arts Building on Rose Street to signify that plays are being performed in either the Guignol Theatre or the Briggs Theatre. Theater performances at UK date back to at least 1910. The Guignol Theatre was organized with community support in 1927 and was named for the Grand Guignol in Paris, France.

19. UK Chandler Medical Center Offers Drive-through Flu Shots

UK Chandler Medical Center offered drive-through flu shots in mid-October. Hundreds of vaccines were administered as cars lined up on an access road that runs parallel to Alumni Drive from Nicholasville Road to Shawnee Town Road. Cash, checks, and Medicare were accepted as payment for the shots, which cost \$16.

20. Three Are Inducted Into College of Law Alumni Hall of Fame

The UK College of Law inducted three new members into its Alumni Hall of Fame in early September: Charles E. English, a 19-year member of the ABA's House of Delegates; Wilburt D. Ham, professor emeritus at the college, where he taught from 1949 to 1986; and Joe C. Savage, who earned his law degree at UK in 1964 and from Harvard Law School in 1965.

21. Gill Heart Institute Hosts Research Day

In support of regional research in cardiovascular disease and physiology, the UK Linda and Jack Gill Heart Institute recently hosted the sixth annual Cardiovascular Research Day. The keynote speaker was the recipient of the 2003 winner of the Outstanding Contribution to Cardiovascular Research Award, Marlene Rabinovitch, of the Stanford University School of Medicine. Cardiovascular research is vitally important in Kentucky and surrounding states. People living in the nine states in the Mississippi and Ohio river valleys have a higher risk of dying from coronary artery disease than people in the rest of the United States.

22. LCC Survey Indicates Fletcher Leads in Kentucky Governor's Race

Central Kentuckians favor Congressman Ernie Fletcher's bid to become Kentucky's next governor, a survey conducted by political science students at Lexington Community College shows. The survey, released in early October, also found the region's residents oppose installing slot machines at racetracks and a sales tax on services. Now in its 16th year, the semiannual poll has a record of successfully predicting winners in political races.

23. UK Holds Sixth Annual Conference on Women's Health in Kentucky

The UK Office of the Provost and the UK Women's Health Center, along with other agencies, sponsored the sixth annual Conference on Women's Health in Kentucky in late September, bringing together researchers, academicians, clinicians and policymakers. The conference helps identify current health care perspectives, promote women's health, and analyze new health care information. Representatives of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, health care providers, social services providers, health care administrators and others discussed the latest trends, issues and research findings on such topics as diabetes, domestic violence, obesity, cardiovascular health and HIV prevention.

24. Fifty-four Dentistry Students Are Honored at White Coat Ceremony

The 54 members of the UK College of Dentistry's Class of 2007 officially began their dental education careers at the college's White Coat Ceremony in late September. Thirty-nine of the students are from Kentucky. Dental faculty welcomed the students to the dental profession as colleagues and challenged the students to make a commitment to gaining the knowledge and compassion necessary to become outstanding dentists.

25. College of Education Seeks Nominations for `Teachers Who Made a Difference'

The UK College of Education is seeking nominations for its sixth annual "Teachers Who Made a Difference" program, whose inductees will be announced at a special morning reception and recognition ceremony Saturday, November 8. The program is designed to recognize teachers who influenced and inspired their students. About 500 Kentuckians have been honored during the program's life, including 63 teachers, principals, college professors, and school counselors in 2002.

26. Chandler, Pence Answer Questions at Gubernatorial Candidates Convocation

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Ben Chandler and Republican candidate for lieutenant governor Steve Pence responded to questions from students, faculty, and private citizens at a special candidates' convocation in early October at the UK Student Center's Worsham Theatre. Pence represented Republican gubernatorial candidate Ernie Fletcher. The UK Staff Senate, the University Senate, and UK Student Government jointly sponsored the event.

27. Kentucky Geological Survey Partners With Other States on Climate Change

The Kentucky Geological Survey has joined a multi-agency, multi-state research project to investigate the feasibility of removing man-made carbon dioxide from the atmosphere to mitigate climate change. The Midwest Regional Carbon Sequestration Partnership is receiving \$2.4 million in funding for the two-year project.

28. Kentucky Nanomaterials Workshop Advocates University-industry Partnerships

The Kentucky Nanomaterials Workshop, held in Louisville in September, attracted 130 participants and speakers to discuss the development of materials nanotechnology for Kentucky. Among the speakers were UK President Todd and University of Louisville President James Ramsey. Both university

leaders emphasized the importance of university-industry partnerships to further strengthen nanotechnology activities in the Commonwealth.

29. Kentucky Kernel Is Competing as a Finalist for Colleges' Pacemaker Award

The Kentucky Kernel, UK's independent daily student newspaper, has been selected as a finalist for a Pacemaker, the nation's top student newspaper award. This marks the second straight year that the Kernel has been named a finalist for the award, given by the Associated Collegiate Press. The nomination places the Kernel among the nation's top 12 daily college newspapers. The winners will be announced in early November at the organization's national conference in Dallas, Texas.

30. UK Mourns Passing of Former President Otis Singletary

More than 350 friends, former students and faculty members, along with many Kentucky dignitaries, gathered at the Singletary Center for the Arts in late September to mourn the death of former UK President Otis A. Singletary, who died September 20 at the age of 81. Singletary served as UK's eighth president from 1969 to 1986 and guided the university during a period of marked growth. Offering eulogies were former UK history professor Charles Roland and Terry Birdwhistell, director of UK's oral history program. Both the Singletary Center for the Arts and the university's most coveted scholarships are named for the former president.

31. Former Governor Edward T. Breathitt Devoted Life to UK

Former Kentucky Governor Edward T. "Ned" Breathitt Jr. died October 14. He was 78. A Hopkinsville native, he served as Kentucky's governor from 1963 to 1967, during which time he also served as chair of the UK Board of Trustees. He served separate appointive terms on the board from 1981 to 1982 and again from 1992 to 2000, chairing the board again from 1992 to 1999. Breathitt earned his bachelor's degree in business administration in 1948 and his law degree in 1950, both at UK. He was inducted into the UK Gatton College Alumni Hall of Fame in 1994 and the UK College of Law Alumni Hall of Fame in 1997. He also was named to the UK Alumni Association's Hall of Distinguished Alumni in 1965.

32. Senator Dole Speaks at Sanders-Brown Fund-raiser

Former Senator and presidential candidate Robert J. Dole spoke at the annual UK Sanders-Brown Center on Aging Foundation dinner. The fund-raising event was co-sponsored by Fifth Third Bank and Ball Homes. Since its establishment in 1979, the UK Sanders-Brown Center on Aging has become internationally recognized for its pioneering academic, research and service programs in

Alzheimer's disease and other medical conditions that impact the aging population.

33. Seminar Helps Health Professionals and Students Deal with Ethnic Changes

Area health care professionals and students enrolled in health care programs gained new insights on the state's changing patient population at "Cultural Competence – Reflections on Race, Ethnicity and Culture: Considerations for Health Professionals" in late September. The seminar was designed to help the professionals deal effectively with the growing diversity of Kentucky communities. It emphasized incorporating cultural sensitivity into health-related curriculums to help providers increase understanding of how language, culture, and religion impact healing and health in all people. The UK Area Health Education and Training Centers organized the event.

34. UK Launches 2003 Annual United Way Fund-raising Campaign

UK kicked off its annual United Way fund-raising campaign at a luncheon for nearly 500 volunteers at the UK Student Center Grand Ballroom. This year's campaign goal is \$420,000. President Todd told the group he is proud of UK's generosity, which has made the university the third leading organizational giver to United Way of the Bluegrass, behind Toyota and Lexmark. Other speakers included Kathy Plomin, United Way of the Bluegrass CEO; Alan Stein, president of the Lexington Legends and chair of this year's United Way of the Bluegrass campaign; and Marc Mathews, senior associate controller and chair of the UK United Way campaign.

35. UK and First Link Hold Third Annual Volunteer Fair

More than 80 community and campus service and arts/cultural organizations took part in the third annual UK Volunteer Fair in late September. UK and First Link of the Bluegrass held the event, where First Link honored the university for receiving the Harry S. Truman Foundation Honor Institution Award for exemplary participation in the Truman Scholarship program. During its 20-year participation in the program, UK has had 11 students named Truman Scholars.

36. UK Opera Presents Mozart's Marriage of Figaro at Lexington Opera House

The UK Department of Opera Theatre presented Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's Marriage of Figaro at the Lexington Opera House in early October. The opera, presented in its original Italian, was performed with English subtitles shown on a screen. Stage director Sally Stunkel and orchestra director Julian Shew steered the production of what is considered the perfect comic opera.

37. Anthropology Doctoral Student Leads Group on Georgia Excavation

UK anthropology doctoral student Victor Thompson led a group of UK and Transylvania University undergraduate students on a six-week mission this summer to explore the mystery of "shell rings" on Sapelo Island, Ga. The work, performed under the authority of the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, studied the way early Native Americans of the 10-mile-long island enjoyed a steady diet of seafood and deposited shells from the ocean creatures in huge, circular layers around their residential sites. Anthropology associate professor Richard Jefferies provided faculty supervision of the project.

38. UK Police Launch Traffic and Pedestrian Safety Campaign

In response to recent pedestrian accidents on and near campus, UK Police have launched a traffic and pedestrian safety campaign. Police officers are maintaining stricter traffic law enforcement as well as providing traffic and pedestrian safety education. They are distributing educational material when they issue citations and are talking to people they witness crossing the streets in areas other than crosswalks. UK Police also are stressing traffic and pedestrian safety as part of their regular programming for students living in residence halls.

39. UK Units Join to Sponsor Conference on Natural Products Innovation

The UK College of Agriculture's Kentucky Tobacco Research and Development Center and National Products Alliance will sponsor the first conference on natural products innovation on November 5. Scientists, entrepreneurs, and business leaders will gather to discuss new technologies that take advantage of diverse products derived from plants and other natural sources. The conference will highlight start-up companies and foster valuable partnerships between UK and a variety of Kentucky enterprises.

40. Revolutionary Construction Material Aids Repair of Kentucky Bridge

Researchers at the UK College of Engineering are assisting Kentucky Transportation Cabinet engineers repair a bridge on Ky. 32 connecting Louisa, Ky., and Fort Gay, W.Va. Researchers applied a new construction and repair material called carbon fiber reinforced polymer strips. The material, which is as thin as wallpaper but 10 times stronger than steel, is easy to apply and will permit the bridge to remain open during the repair. It also precludes replacement of the bridge's superstructure. The UK College of Engineering is among the nation's leaders in exploring the uses of this revolutionary construction material.

AMEND THE STATUTE WHICH MANDATES WHEN THE BOARD SHALL MEET AND HOW THE BOARD SHALL MAINTAIN THE RECORD OF THE BOARD MEETINGS

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees approve a legislative initiative to amend KRS 164.170 during the 2004 legislative session. The legislative amendment would authorize the Board of Trustees to meet at least quarterly each year rather than meeting on the specified times as currently provided in the statute. The amendment would also permit the Board to maintain an audio recording, rather than a stenographic transcript, of each meeting of the Board of Trustees.

<u>Background</u>: Currently KRS 164.170 mandates four specific times when the Board of Trustees shall meet: 1) on the Tuesday preceding the regular annual commencement, 2) on the third Tuesday in September, 3) on the Second Tuesday in December, and, 4) on the first Tuesday in April of each year. The statute also mandates that the Board shall maintain a stenographic transcript of each meeting.

The proposed legislation eliminates the specific times the Board shall meet. The amended language mandates that the Board shall meet quarterly each year. This proposal mirrors the language currently in place for the Boards of Regents at the Regional Universities and for the Kentucky Community and Technical College System.

The proposed legislation also permits the University to maintain an audio recording of the Board meetings. This amendment would eliminate the duty of the University to transcribe each Board meeting. All records relating to the Board of Trustees meetings are preserved, including the agenda; therefore, a stenographic transcript should not be necessary. The audio tape will be maintained with all the official Board records and would be available for review by any interested individual.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY DEGREE IN THEATRE PRACTICE

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees approve the establishment of a Doctor of Philosophy in Theatre Practice degree program in the College of Fine Arts.

Background: The Ph.D. in Theatre Practice is designed to prepare students to pursue either academic or professional careers through a combination of practical/applied and theoretical studies. Upon completion of this program, students will be capable of serving as professional dramaturges, educators, and/or scholars in theatre history, criticism, or performance studies. The proposed program is consistent with the mission of the Department of Theatre to provide the highest quality instruction in the theory and practice of Theatre Art. The Department promotes the scholarly investigation of the theatre and its historical/theoretical components and provides cultural and artistic opportunities for the University, the community, and the Commonwealth. The proposed degree program promotes the mission of the University of Kentucky especially as it relates to graduate education goals: to provide advanced knowledge and skills as well as to provide the advancement of research.

During the past 20 years, significant changes in the demands of both professional theatre companies and post secondary education institutions have occurred. In professional theatre, one development has been to train the dramaturge--the literary consultant to the production. This person advises directors, designers, and actors regarding cultural, literary, political, and technical aspects of a particular play. Research and communication skills are critical to this position, as is knowledge of the arts that combine to create theatre--directing, acting, and designing. While this position has existed in European theatres for centuries, it has evolved slowly in the United States but finally has become a recognized and necessary one for professional theatre companies. A number of universities--mainly those with Research Extensive status such as the University of Illinois, University of Maryland, and University of Michigan have begun offering advanced degrees in dramaturgy. Additionally, colleges and universities throughout the country are offering courses in dramaturgy and related areas. Faculty trained in this field are now being hired in increasing numbers. As a result, a Ph.D. degree program designed to combine scholarly activities with applied work in theatre is required. Student requests for this type of education are also increasing.

This program has the approval of the Graduate Council and Senate Council, and has completed the forty-five day review by the Council on Postsecondary Education. The Provost of the University supports this recommendation.

The remaining \$125,000 will be added to the Madeline F. James Professorship/Chair in Cancer Research created by the Board in May, 2001. The name of the fund is being changed to honor the second donor to the fund, Mrs. Gardner, and to delete the word "Professorship" because the fund now exceeds \$1 million, the amount required for a chair designation.

The Gardner Foundation was created through the will of Edith D. Gardner, a Lexington resident who died in 1989. Mrs. Gardner attended UK and her husband, who died in 1982, was a 1924 graduate of the College of Agriculture. Executive Summary

he Research Challenge Trust Fund (RCTF) was established in 1997 with the passage of House Bill 1, the Kentucky Postsecondary Education Improvement Act, to encourage research activities at the University of Kentucky (UK) and the University of Louisville. Since that time, the Commonwealth of Kentucky has appropriated over \$200 million to the University, which is matched with private funds, for endowed faculty positions and programs.

RCTF assists UK in recruiting distinguished faculty who can successfully compete for research dollars and who are excellent teachers. These professors are developing, applying and sharing new research in the sciences and humanities that will change the lives of Kentuckians and impact people across our nation and the world.

Many of the outstanding professors' efforts focus on critical areas of concern to the Commonwealth, such as treating and preventing diabetes, reducing underage smoking, enhancing the learning capabilities of children with disabilities, eliminating plant and animal diseases, and improving treatments for those with Parkinson's disease and Alzheimer's disease. Several examples of the outstanding research of the RCTF faculty follow.

Advancing Kentucky Through Research



Ag and the Environment

Chris Schardl, a plant pathologist, is teaming up with other UK scientists in the areas of bioinformatics, structural biology and functional genomics to eliminate plant and animal diseases. He is working to enhance the nutritional value of food and develop new uses for agricultural plants and animals.

Children with Disabilities

Ted Hasselbring develops and designs instructional technology that is used to



improve the functional capabilities of children with disabilities. His work has led to the founding, at UK, of the first Assistive Technology Institute in the nation.

Vocal Music and Performance

World-renowned soprano Gail Robinson, who coached young singers for 20 years at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City, is now fostering the talent of UK students. UK's first endowed chair in voice, Robinson is helping to bring new musical acclaim to Kentucky. "UK is nationally recognized as not only a legitimate training ground for vocalists, but is also held in high regard as far as the quality of students leaving the program," she says.





This report covers the activities and expenditures supported at the University of Kentucky under the Endowment Match Program. During fiscal year 2002-03, the University submitted five requests for matching funds, totaling \$5,112,144, to the Council on Postsecondary Education. As of June 30, 2003, the Council had processed all of those requests as well as three from the previous fiscal year and disbursed \$7,245,720 to UK (Table 6). As of June 30, 2003, state matching funds have helped create or expand over 400 endowments valued at \$217,119,999 (Table 7).

Endowment Activity

Private donations and state matching funds supported the addition of 21 endowed activities at the University of Kentucky in 2002-03. This includes the addition of two endowed chairs, nine endowed professorships, four fellowships, and six mission support projects. A schedule of activities initiated during 2002-03 and the total activities initiated since the inception of the program as of June 30, 2003, are presented in Table 1.

Demographic Information

As of June 30, 2003, UK has appointed a total of 126 endowed chairs and professorships under the auspices of the Endowment Match Program. Of those appointments, 103 were male, and 23 were female. Of the 249 staff associated with the endowments, 132 (53 percent) are male and 117 (47 percent) are female. Demographic information on the appointed faculty and associated staff is provided in Tables 2 and 3.

Sources of Funds

During fiscal year 2002-03, the University of Kentucky received \$7,245,720 in gifts and pledges from private sources (Table 6) that were matched with state funds. About 77 percent of that amount, \$5,560,634, was received in cash with the remainder received in the form of pledges.

Areas of Concentration

The 2000-02 Endowment Match Program Guidelines stipulate that at least 60 percent of program funds at the research institutions must be used to support the academic disciplines of engineering, technology, computer science, health sciences, life sciences, mathematics or physical sciences. The University of Kentucky has directed 60.2% of the 2000-02 funds to support positions, programs, or projects in the Council on Postsecondary Education's priority areas (Table 5).

Earnings and Expenditures

As of June 30, 2003, the total market value of the 402 endowed activities established under the Endowment Match Program was \$217,119,999 (Table 7). As of June 30, 2003, the University of Kentucky had received a total of \$135,472,929 in state funds and \$103,782,048 in matching gift funds. The University had outstanding pledges of \$31,690,881 related to these endowments as of June 30, 2003. Over \$8.2 million was expended from the endowments for program activities during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2003.

DESIGN OF A BASKETBALL PRACTICE FACILITY MEMORIAL COLISEUM

MULTI-PURPOSE FACILITY ADDITION TO THE <u>NUTTER FIELD HOUSE</u>
