NASA official says shuttle replacement will cost \$2.8 billion

WASHINGTON — The space y's acting administrator said NOMINATION—The space agen-cy's acting administrator said yes-terday it would cost \$2.8 billion to replace the lost Challenger and that it would be "very appropriate" to redesign rocket boosters before any shuttle flies again. William R. Graham told a House committee that design modifications to be made in response to the Jan. 28 explosion of Challenger will cost \$350 million.

He also told the panel it would be possible to fly another shuttle in six months, but that the National Aeronautics and Space Administration does not anticipate launching another one for at least a year.

Even then, Graham said, NASA will take its time before tackling a flight backlog that increases with every passing month. There will be ween the first post-accident flight and the second, and at least two months between the second and hird flights, he said.



DinerCard presents students with proof of culinary smarts

Students can pick one meal five days a week, two meals seven days a week, three meals five days a week, ad infinitum, or so it seems. But beginning this summer, students can exercise another option.

The Food Services office will implement the UK DinerCard — a culinary checking account of sorts. The new meal plan functions on a declining balance concept. Students will deposit a base price at the beginning of the semester. Each time they make a purchase, the amount is deducted from their balance.

The new meal plan puts students in control of their appetite and finances. They can dictate how much want to eat and when.

Students will no longer feel pressured to "punch in" for potato chips, Twinkies and Ho-Hos to avoid wasting a


Malso, students will no longer be badgered and ha-rangued by well-meaning grill employees, who try to keep their customers from wasting any of their monetary allot-ment for meals by pushing at them everything from choco-late chip cookies to fruit and newspapers.

Granted, the new meal plan places more responsibility with the students, and the potential exists for some students to run out of food money before the semester ends.

But by the time students enter college, they should be able to handle their own finances and keep track of their own expenses. Implementation of the checking account system shows that the Food Services office has faith in the responsibility and maturity of the student population.

Although the declining balance meal plan follows examples set at other universities. UK has improved on the other programs. By using the new system as a supplement instead of an end to the already existing meal system, the Food Services office has given students as much of the best of two worlds as possible to achieve when considering campus food.

So when students want to be recognized as the intelligent consumers they are, they'll have a new card up their sleeves next semester. The UK DinerCard — don't leave home without it.

A government news release said Defense Minister Juan Ponce Enrile ordered the arrests of National Assemblymen Arturo Pacificador, an assistant majority leader, and Orlando Dulay. Both went underground when former President Ferdinand E. Marcos, who had ruled for 20 years, fled to Hawaii on Feb. 26 with his family and retinue.

In other developments, Aquino scheduled her first full Cabinet meeting for today.

Two killed, 81 injured during S. Africa courthouse shooting

Florida drinking laws

Police said they shot dead two
teen-agers and wounded 81 other
blacks yesterday in scattering a
crowd of about 2,000 outside a courthouse near South Africa's eastern

The shooting occurred in Kabok-weni, a black township near the Mo-zambique border, where thousands had gathered for the trial of eight blacks on riot charges, a police statement said.

The statement said that after the crowd refused to leave, police fired tear smoke and then birdshot, killing a 15-year-old boy and wounding 80 people. In two other cases, birdshot killed a 14-year-old boy and wounded a 17-year-old, it added.

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
