
Plimpton said his first involvement in a story was not by design.

2% chance of satellite's hitting U.S.

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon said yesterday there is a 2 percent chance that debris from a disabled nuclear-powered Soviet spy satellite will hit the United States after entering the atmosphere sometime between 1 a.m. EST Sunday and 3 p.m. EST Monday.

However, space experts said the Cosmos 1402, which has been tumbling toward earth at an ever-increasing rate, may plunge into the atmosphere late Sunday night. The Federal Emergency Management Agency said there likely would be no more than a "45- to 50-minute warning of where the officted area might be."

The Pentagon said there is a 70 percent chance the Cosmos debris will come down over water, 15 percent chance over the Soviet Union. 3 percent chance over Canada and 2 percent chance over the United States.



Local paramedic's workday involves variety, gore

It was 8:30 a.m. Lesingtion's Central Fire Station received a call about a possible hanging on Walmut Avenue. Alarms sounded, men ran to emergency units and sirens walled.

When the paramedics arrived on the scene, they found a 17-year-old male still hanging. He had been dead for about five hours.

The boy was no stranger to the paramedics because they had responded to two of his suicide attempts during the summer. On the first try, he had slashed his arm; in the second, he had taken pils.

Although both these incidents may have been futile cries for attention, enviring on the scene to taking him, according to the paramedics. Arriving on the scene to taking him, according to the paramedics are suprised to find that he was actually dead.

They returned to the first estation and made jokes among themselves, trying to forget what they had just seen. Then another call came in.

An old man had walked into Kerr Bros. Funeral Home, at 468 E. Main St., handed his keys and driver's license to the receptionist and told her be wanted to be cremated.

He went outside, put a gun to his head and pulled the trigger. He was þýing in a pool of blood when the paramedics arrived. His suicide attempt had the suicide attempt that day was especially memorable for firefighter Fred Worslam, one of the paramedics at the Central Fire Station who responded to buth calls.

When it comes to the matter of Robinson Forest, the Board of Trustees is beginning to resemble Godzilla a lot. Although the Board's proposal to mine coal in the forest was shot down in September by protesting students and faculty members, as well as the impracticality of deep mining there, the Board is investigating the possibility of turning at least part of the University owned to a local content of the Company o

Board is investigating the possibility of turning at least part of the University-owned to ching and research preserve in Eastern Kentucky into a timber farm.

The producers of the movie have managed to keep the leads for the sequel. Ann Philipp i, president of Students to Save Robinson Forest, is back, decrying what she sees as an unwillingness on the part of the University Senate to condemn the proposal. And the Student Government Association has passed a resolution against "timber-mining" in the forest, vowing to fight it with newspaper adand other appropriate means — that is more rallies and/or general student assemblies.

Degree of Soviet liability for crash of malfunctioning satellite uncertain

NEW YORK — Under international law, there is no dollar limit on the Soviet Union's legal liability for damages caused to people or property when its crippled spy satellite crashes

But attorness specializing in space law predict that if the nuclear-powered Cosmos 1402 satellite crashes on land — the odds are that it will not — the Soviets will try to use treaty loopholes to avoid paying the full damage bill, chief coursel for the National Aeronautical and Space Administration, said that's what happened in 1978 when a similar Soviet satellite crashed and spread radioactive debris over a 20,000-square-mile area of northwest Canadama and the control of the country of the count



It's funny how things can come together all at once. I find it less than coincidental that the NCAA's Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education made recent proposals to upgrade the entrance standards for athletes and the airing of the CBS's year-long investigative piece into big-time athletics.

CBS's year-long investigative piece into big-time athletics.

The coincidence, however, is more on the part of CBS, not on the NCAA, which passed the reforms at its annual convention in San Diego the weekend of Jan, 10-12. The folks at CBS got all the free publicity they needed prior to the airing of last night's "CBS Reports" news magazine segment on college basketball.

It has been the talk of Lexington and the entire state of Kentucky since finally being compiled, and much of the report focused on the UK basketball program.

The beginning of the show included a clip of the Digger Phelps proclamation from last year's College Basketball Coaches of America Convention. For those who weren't lucky enough to see it, that was when Phelps told all about players' being paid as much as \$10,000 per year to play at some schools, education be dammed.

Which brings us to the UK basketball program and what head coach Joe B. Hall had to say before the program arred last night. "It's so difficult at this time," he said, "for a news group to get the real picture of a college athlete in a half-hour program."




