#### STATE Patton gives Clinton tobacco input

FRANKFORT— Gov. Paul Patton was optimistic yesterday after a meeting with White House officials over alternatives to the Food and Drug Administration's regulation of nicotine as an addictive drug.

Patton and Billy Ray Smith, state agriculture commissioner, met with President Clinton's dried counsel, Jack Quinn. Representatives from the offices of U.S. Sen. Wendell Ford, D.-Ky. and U.S. Rep. Scotty Baesler, D-6th District, were also present.

Patton and the others feel Congress, not the FDA, should decide how best to keep children from smoking. Ford and Baesler have proposed legislation to deal with the issuer have proposed legislation would be discussed in future meetings.

Clinton signed a measure last month giving the FDA authority to take action to restrict underage access to tobacco. The main attack is at tobacco advertising, but many fear it is a prelude to an outright ban on smoking.

Patton has threatened to sue the federal government to block the regulations.

#### NATION Coverage for abortions banned

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted yesterday to maintain a ban on health insurance coverage of abortions for federal employees.

On a 33–45 vote, it retained a provision denying abortion coverage except in cases of rape or incest or when the life of the woman is endangered.

The ban, in effect during the Reagan and Bush administrations, was dropped during the first two years of the Clinton administration but was reinstated when Republicans took control of Congress last year.

Defenders of the clause said pro-abortion rights lawnakers had no right to require tapayers to subsidize the abortions of federal employees. The abortion ban was part of a bill appropriating \$23.5 billion in fiscal 1997 to operate the IRS, the Treasury Department, the White House, the Federal Elections Commission, Office of Personnel Management, General Services Administration and other agencies.

# **'Consistency' the word for UK enrollment statistics**

When you're Kentucky's flagship university, enrollment stability means everything. Pew changes in enrollment numbers have occurred, according to numbers released by UK yesterday. The total student population on the Lexington campus and the Chandler Medical Center has experienced a "less than one percent decreace," from 24,378 to 24,200 undergraduate and graduate students.



# Cats look for starting running back

Last year, it was what carried the UK offense throughout most

the UK offense throughout most of the season.

This season, it has been none-existent in two games.

"It" is the running game, and with the open date the Cats have this Saturday, the coaching staff has some time to work out the kinks which have resulted in only 136 yards gained thus far.

In 1995, UK amassed 2,156 yards rushing — 1,600 by Moc Williams. In the two contests played in 1996, Ray McLaurin is

the leading rusher with 118 yards on 35 carries.

"Last year, our running game started off the same (way)," UK running back coach Mike Drake said. "So after two games, it was almost non-existent. I keep that mind, because our guys really need to believe that we can run the ball."

ST. LOUIS — Hot summer months usually mean brisk beer sales for liquor store owner Roosevelt Martin, but not this year.

"Price increases," Martin explained. "It's cut down my business 30 to 40 percent because we sell more beer in the summer than anything."

Beer prices have inched up about 3 percent in 1996 after holding relatively steady for the last three years. The price hike amounts to about 15 cents more for a six-pack.

And another increase may be on tap.

Industry watchers say a 2 percent hike is possible this fall as companies try to boost profits in an era of mostly stagnant sales.


"This year, so far, the industry pricing is up, the biggest price increase since 1991," said Ben Steinman of Beer Marketer's Insights.

In January, industry giant Anheuser-Busch was the first to jack up prices, and competitors Miller Brewing Co. and Coors Brewing Co. followed the trend.

The companies make up about 75 percent of the total U.S. market.

Anheuser-Busch plans another increase later this year, driven by higher raw material costs, said company President Patrick T.

Even Kentuckians will judge an Appalachain person as uneducated, dirty and illiterate. But there is now a stong voice in the literary circle who is working hard to deconstruct this myth.

voice in the literary circle who is working hard to deconstruct this myth.

Frank Strunk, a native of McCreary County and former Kentucky Kernel Editor, has made it his life's work to dispel those images through his stories.

He began his journey as an aspiring writer with the help of the GI Bill which allowed him a formal writing education at the University of Kentucky.

After working at the Lexington Herald Leader and as editor of the Rural Kentuckian magazine, he moved to Washington D.C. where he began his own public relations business.

Finally, the dream to be a fictional novelist could no longer be ignored. He felt that he had "to try this before he died."

Strunk has successfully accomplished this agal with

Strunk has successfully accomplished this goal with

three published crime novels to this credit. The nationally reknown publishing company, Random House, contracts him for one suspense story a year. His first two books, Jordan's Wager and Jordon's Showdown, are set in a fictional coal mining town of eastern Kentucky during the Great Depression. In contrast, Strunk's latest novel, Throwback (1996), is set in modern Appalachia, but still has the rich colors of appalachian culture defity painted. When asked in a telephone interview why he chose to write about his former homeland, Strunk replied, "No matter how much education, ability or intelligence you may have, if you come from the mountains, you are stereotyped. No matter where you go, people tend to think of you as a Hillbilly."

Using rural Kentucky as his novels' setting is Strunk's way of combating the cultural discrimmination he and many other Kentuckians have encountered. Strunk now lives on the Gulf Coast of Florida. He returns to Kentucky frequently to "renew his accent."

# An artist in time

"My work has to do with time — that's what it's all about .... Beautiful fractured time — that's it — Is there a possibility for human change?"

Beatrice Mandelman

A virtual timeline appears as you walk through the Beatrice Mandelman exhibit at the Uni-versity Art Museum. Guest curator for the show, UK alumni Cynthia Clark, traced Mandelman's career from her early realistic prints in from her early realistic prints in the 1930's to her latest abstract-

ed works.
Traditional training early in
Mandelman's career led her
toward a more realistic
approach in representation of

approach in representation of subject matter and an affinity for European Art and American Social Realism.

Her influences weren't to remain in that mold.

She began engaging in lively group discussions with some contemporaries—Willem de Kooning and Jackson Pollick, whose views on art were far from traditional.

These famous artists, who became known as Abstract Expressionists, influenced Mandelman's style but not her career.

career.

Mandelman's name is usually associated with printmaking due to her work in the Fine Arts Project (FAP) of the Works Progress Administration (WPA) created by Prosevolt.

ject (FAP) of the Works Progress Administration (WPA) created by Roosevelt.

She was instrumental in the revival of color lithography as an artistic medium and in the use of serigraphy (or silk-screening) as a previously un-used artistic medium.

Printing in color was a welcome change that led to a deeper exploration of the medium.

Mandelman used 37 colors in her serigraph, "Street," which depicts a quiet, middle class neighborhood.

In fact, many of her early works are depictions of simple life that seem to show more interest in composition and linear relationships than in sending a deeper, socialist message like many of her co-workers.

These compositional concerns come to the forefront in her later works which do away with representational subject

matter.

A move from New York City to Taos, N.M. with her artist husband, Louis Ribac, in the '40s may have prompted her to explore new ideas in other media.

In the '50s, she explored the use of American Indian pictographs.

In the 30s, sne expired the use of American Indian pictographs.

In the '60s, she realized her socialist concerns through the use of collages sending civil rights messages.

And in the '70s, she would combine various elements of past works to create bright, wildly shaped paintings.

A timeline is visible.

The exhibit chronicles realism to abstraction, thus illustrating the progression of 20th century art, and the life of an often overlooked artist who greatly influenced American art.
