LET'S GET MARRIED!

What a sad time for the GLBT community - our elected officials recently deciding that an amendment should be made to our constitution forbidding marriage (or Holy Unions) for same sex couples. What a sad time but what a GREAT time for us to "stand up" and witness anyway.

We need to keep working for the rights to "Gay" Marriage. We need to certainly prod our sisters and brothers to register to vote and to get out and vote this November. We have many people on our side but they need to be encouraged to at least speak out in the silence of the voting booth closet and help us get equal rights. We also need to help the public realize that the reason for our protests is not just equal rights but a public recognition that our love is just as sincere and just as sacred. This can best be done by publicly celebrating our love however and whenever we can.

It is not easy to publicly celebrate gay marriage. For me and my partner it meant searching for a sympathetic minister, finding a "hall" or church space that would be accepting, and placing our love-commitment into the public sphere of our families, friends and neighbors. Most celebrated with us. Some rejected us. That is the risk.

The joy that my partner and I felt on that day, and the wonderful support of those family members, friends and neighbors who really counted, far outweighed the rejection. We were fortunate that our marriage actually made it into the paper so many, many others could celebrate and/or be challenged by our public profession of love. Like it or not another gay couple got married - even though the state had nothing to do with it.

I strongly encourage all committed GLBT couples to make your love commitment known. Celebrate it as publicly as you can. Have a Union Ceremony or Marriage. Invite everyone you can. Get the media there if possible. Send your marriage picture to the news paper. Let the world see that love between GLBT persons is holy and wonderful even if the state won't accept it.

LGBT Smoking Cessation Opportunities

A recent issue of "The Advocate" magazine contained a couple of articles about health and smoking. In one article, writer Jessica DuLong stated, "For years smoking cessation took a backseat to other gay and lesbian health issues such as HIV prevention. But in recent months, organizations nationwide have begun crafting attention-grabbing antismoking ad campaigns to counter the lure of tobacco addiction."

"It's an uphill battle," DuLong continues. "Up to 50% of lesbians, gay men, and bisexuals continue to smoke, compared with 28% of the general population, according to the American Journal of Preventive Medicine. Other studies show that gay and bisexual men are two times more likely than straight men to smoke. Lesbians are more likely to be heavy smokers than straight women."

In a companion piece, DuLong further states, "Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death among women, and lesbians may face the toughest fight of anyone to kick the habit, according to the latest public health research. Here's why: women are more likely than men to smoke as a means of regulating mood, and sexual-minority women face more stress in their lives," says Michele Eliason, Ph.D., RN, an affiliate of the Lesbian Health Research Center and a professor at the Univ. of lowa.

This information is given in the hope of drawing the attention of Lexington's GLBT community to local smoking cessation The Lexington-Fayette opportunities. County Health Department offers a continuing series of Cooper/Clayton cessation classes throughout the year. Clayton is a nicotine replacement system that helps the smoker not only give up cigarettes, but also break the addiction to nicotine that keeps us coming back for more. It is a gradual process that takes place over thirteen weeks with a one hour group meeting per week that is supportive for the participant. Classes are free and participants pay for their own nicotine replacement product, which costs less than the average smoker pays for cigarettes.
