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Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, September 19, 1989.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 1 p.m. Lexington time on Tuesday September 19, 1989 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the Lexington Campus.

#### A. Meeting Opened

Mr. Foster Ockerman, Sr., Chairman, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Judge Julia Tackett.

#### B. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. Foster Ockerman, Sr. (Chairman), Mr. Ted B. Bates, Professor Raymond F. Betts, Jr., Governor Albert B. Chandler, Professor Mary Sue Coleman, Mr. Tracy Farmer, Mr. Lawrence E. Forgy Jr., Mrs. Edythe Jones Hayes, Senator Walter D. Huddleston, Mr. Sean Lohman, Dr. Nicholas J. Pisacano, Professor Judith Rhoads, Mr. James L. Rose, Judge Robert F. Stephens, Mr. Jerome A. Stricker, Mr. William B. Sturgill, and Judge Julia K. Tackett. Absent from the meeting were Mr. William E. Burnett, Jr., Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson, and Judge Henry R. Wilhoit, Jr. The University administration was represented by President David P. Roselle; Chancellors Peter P. Bosomworth, Robert Hemenway and Charles T. Wethington; Vice Presidents Edward A. Carter, Wimberly C. Royster and Eugene R. Williams; and Mr. John C. Darsie, General Counsel.

Members of the news media were also in attendance. Mrs. Hayes reported a quorum present, and Mr. Ockerman declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 1:03 p.m.

#### C. Nomination of Officers and Executive Committee

Under the Governing Regulations, officers of the Board and the Executive Committee are elected annually at the September meeting. Mr. Ockerman, who had appointed a Nominating Committee comprised of Senator Huddleston (Chairman), Mr. Burnett, Professor Coleman, Mrs. Hayes, Mr. Rose, Mr. Wilcoxson, and Judge Wilhoit, called on Senator Huddleston to present the Committee's recommendations and asked Mr. Sturgill to preside in receiving the nominations and actions.

Senator Huddleston placed the following slate of officers for 1989-90 in nomination:

Foster Ockerman, Sr., Chairman William E. Burnett, Jr., Vice Chairman Edythe Jones Hayes, Secretary John C. Darsie, Assistant Secretary

There being no nominations from the floor, on motion by Senator Huddleston, seconded by Mr. Rose and passed, the slate was elected as proposed.

- 2 -Senator Huddleston placed the following slate of Executive Committee members for 1989-90 in nomination: Foster Ockerman, Sr. Chairman William E. Burnett, Jr. Tracy Farmer James L. Rose Lawrence E. Forgy, Jr. Mr. Sturgill asked for any discussion or nominations from the floor and there were none. On motion by Senator Huddleston, seconded by Jerome Stricker and passed, the slate was elected as proposed. Mr. Ockerman expressed appreciation to the members of the Board and assured them that he would work with the members of the Board, the administration, the Governor and the legislature to get something done for education. Mr. Ockerman stated that these are challenging times -- the period the University of Kentucky and higher education is about to enter and the many problems that face the State of Kentucky. He referred to the recent workshop sponsored by the Council on Higher Education and stated that it was indeed a worthwhile session. He noted that approximately half of the Board members were present for the workshop and stated that a number of politicians were in attendance: Former Governors Edward Breathitt and Louie Nunn, Mr. Larry Forgy, and Mr. Wendell Ford. All of the politicians had, he said, expressed the opinion that now is the time for those interested in higher education to get to work to not only sell the product but sell the need for improvement. Mr. Ockerman explained that this needs

Mr. Forgy stated that now is the time to put the needs of the State of Kentucky ahead of some of the possibilities of re-election of certain members of the legislature of Kentucky. After citing several remarks from former governors, he expressed that higher education must be kept in the same boat with the remainder of education. He noted that the politicians do not agree on the best method to present higher education's case. He indicated that at the conclusion of the workshop, it was understood that a formula would be devised along with a method for accomplishment and everyone would work together for that purpose. Mr. Forgy also expressed appreciation to the members of the Board that attended the workshop.

to be done in a practical manner by working for the people that are responsible for getting the budget adopted in its final form -- the

Governor and the members of the legislature.

Mr. Ockerman stated that the Budget Request would be considered later in the meeting and noted the considerable amount of time the members had spent not only in work sessions but also reading the document. He pointed out that the document is a request, and if the request is adopted, there is a lot of work that must follow. It is hoped that a program will be put forward later indicating how everyone can participate in the measure. The purpose will be to get the best benefit possible even though it may not be as much as the request.

- 3 -D. Minutes Approved Mr. Ockerman stated that the Minutes of the August 22, 1989 Board of Trustees meeting had been distributed and asked for corrections or additions. The Minutes were approved as distributed. President's Report to the Trustees (PR 1) Before beginning PR 1, President Roselle joined Mr. Ockerman in thanking the members of the Board that were able to attend the Council on Higher Education Workshop in Louisville. He expressed appreciation to the members and stated that it was a good meeting. He also expressed appreciation for the extra time the members had spent attending budget briefings. He noted that this is an extremely important year for everyone to understand the budget and to be able to say things that are supportive of the request. President Roselle then called attention to the following items in the special bulletin to the UK Board of Trustees published by the College of Fine Arts: October 12 - The Rosemary Clooney Homecoming Concert Event October 13 - UK Marching Band in a concert setting October 17 - UK College of Fine Arts Benefit Performance Doc Severinsen, Trumpet, headlines the performance President Roselle reported that one of the long-time members of the media, Dick Wilson, had suffered a heart attack. He asked the members to sign a get well card and wished Mr. Wilson a speedy recovery. Mr. Sturgill put President Roselle's comments in the form of a Resolution, and it was adopted by acclamation. President Roselle called particular attention to the following items in PR 1: Another record enrollment represents a nearly six percent overall increase. The 14 community colleges have a 3,000-plus growth while the Lexington Campus is seeing some stability in enrollment. The stability in enrollment, however, is by design. This year there is a slight increase in enrollment with a substantially smaller freshman class which signifies growth in the Graduate programs and retention of the young people who have cast their educational future with the University in Lexington. The University Hospital's Aeromedical Service celebrated its second anniversary, and it is a record of success for the first two years.

- 4 -The Community College System in cooperation with the Bluegrass State Skills Corporation has initiated a mobile business and industry program, the first of its kind in Kentucky. The program will offer on-site, hands-ons experience with highly technical equipment. The unit is a specially designed vehicle donated by the Ford Motor Company. Thomas R. Ford, director, Center for Developmental Change and professor of sociology, has become the third member of the sociology faculty to be awarded the title Distinguished Rural Sociologist by the Rural Sociological Society. The Community Fine Arts Center at Madisonville Community College was dedicated on September 6, with Governor Wallace Wilkinson as the principal speaker. The citizens of Madisonville, Kentucky contributed more than \$1.1 million to the success of the project.

President Roselle also called attention to the significant activities of the faculty and staff.

## F. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

President Roselle recommended that approval be given to the appointments, actions and/or staff changes that require Board action and that the report relative to appointments and changes already approved by the administration be accepted. Mr Stricker moved, and Professor Betts seconded, that PR 2 be approved. The motion carried unanimously. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

#### G. Amendments to the Governing Regulations (PR 3A)

President Roselle recommended that the proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky which were received by the Board at its August 22, 1989 meeting be approved. He provided an explanation of the proposed amendments and stated that the amendments were bookkeeping in nature. Mr. Bates so moved. His motion was seconded by Dr. Pisacano and carried. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

## H. Approval of an Agreement Between University of Kentucky and University of Kentucky Student Agencies, Inc. (PR 5A)

President Roselle recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and University of Kentucky Student Agencies, Inc. for the period of July 1, 1989 through June 30, 1990. The contract was negotiated pursuant to the Board of Trustees action of May 4, 1982, establishing a "Student Service Program." He noted that there were no changes from the contract approved last year. Mr. Sturgill moved approval. His motion was seconded by Mr. Lohman and passed. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

- 5 -Acceptance of Audit Reports for the University of Kentucky I. for 1988-89 (FCR 1) Mr. Forgy, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that FCR 1 is the audit for the fiscal year 1988-89, and stated that it has a clean opinion from Coopers & Lybrand. He moved its adoption. The motion, seconded by Senator Huddleston, carried without dissent. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.) J. Disposal of Personal Property (FCR 2) Mr. Forgy stated that FCR 2 addresses the disposal of personal property under the statutes. He reviewed some of the items in Exhibit I and moved its adoption. His motion was seconded by Dr. Pisacano and passed. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.) Capital Construction Report (FCR 3) After reminding the Board that the Capital Construction Report was in compliance with House Bill 622, Mr. Forgy moved it adoption. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Hayes and unanimously carried. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.) Strategic Plan and Biennial Request 1990-92 (FCR 4) Mr. Forgy deferred FCR 4 to President Roselle and reserved the right to make a motion at the conclusion of President Roselle's presentation. President Roselle called on Mr. Carter to make the budget presentation. Mr. Carter stated that the budget request is a critical request for the University and the Commonwealth. It contains two significant items: (1) The Strategic Plan The Strategic Plan for the University of Kentucky establishes the long-term direction for the institution. The Plan will be reviewed and updated in terms of any external and internal changes that may take place through time. The Plan provides a sense of direction for the institution including goals, objectives and strategies. The Plan will provide a filter through which the administration will allocate scarce resources and a means for assessing the accomplishments of the institution. (2) Biennial Budget Request The Biennial Budget Request is developed under the Strategic Plan and set forth to accomplish the goals outlined in the Plan. It is developed in the context of full formula funding of the Council on Higher Education formula and is done in accordance with other guidelines and time frame that are

dictated by the Council by statute. The approved request will go from the University to the Council on Higher Education, the Governor, and the legislature and will result in the passage of an appropriations bill by the legislature in late spring, 1990.

Mr. Carter provided a brief overview of the budget. He discussed the priorities for the Main Campus and the Community College System and reminded the members that the legislature had previously appropriated only a half year's debt service for bonds issued in the 1988-90 biennium. Therefore, the University does not have enough resources to pay the annual debt service — lacking \$400,000 on the Main Campus issue and \$800,000 in the Community College System issue. He stated that if the debt service is not appropriated by the legislature, it will have to come out of other sources of the institution.

Mr. Carter provided a breakdown of the budget request -- 5% salary increase to employees of the institution, 5% increase for supplies and services, 5% increase on the capital outlay, and a 15% increase for library materials. He then gave a breakdown of the cost of the various programs at the University and noted that much of the revenue anticipated in the next biennium is already committed for existing programs. He reviewed the competitive problems in salaries and benefits (retirement, health insurance, and life insurance), and stated that these were the big items that needed additional funding. After noting the continued increase in enrollment in the Community College System, he reviewed the capital construction needs for the community colleges and concluded his presentation.

President Roselle stated that he was proposing a significant change in the Biennial Budget Request for the Board's consideration and expressed hope that the change would have their approval.

President Roselle provided some background information by stating that the administration developed the budget in the context of the new Strategic Plan for the University and under the guidelines of the Council on Higher Education. He explained that during the past year the Council had revised their guidelines based on a statutory required review of the formula for funding higher education in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. He stated that the review process resulted in an affirmation of funding higher education in the Commonwealth by way of a formula which the the Council on Higher Education already has in place. The administration of the University endorses the continuation of the formula review process and is pleased with the conclusion.

He stated that there is a provision in the Council guidelines which enables universities to request funds either over or under the formula generated amount. He noted that the state's statute which prescribes the process for developing the budget for the public institutions in Kentucky, according to the Council on Higher Education guidelines, permits the Board to deviate from the formula. If there is good reason for such deviation, a budget request which does not strictly follow the Council guidelines can be made.

He pointed out that other state programs are at a critical juncture (prisons, human resources, transportation, etc.), and these programs will also require additional funding. He stated that now is the time for one of the single largest components of the education program of the state, the University of Kentucky, to be understanding of the totality of the economic needs of the Commonwealth. This is a time for all components of state government to work together. The University of Kentucky should look forward to being a partner with Governor Wilkinson and the legislature as they attempt to address the state's problems and help to advance all of the critical programs of the Commonwealth.

He explained that the proposed revision, to trim the biennial budget request back by \$10.2 million, will bring the University of Kentucky's request to the Council on Higher Education, the Governor, and the Kentucky General Assembly in line with what would have been produced by the formula prior to the Council's revision of it last year. In addition, President Roselle proposed that the University follow the same procedure until higher education in Kentucky reaches a funding level which would be closer to full funding of the 1982 formula. He explained that this can be done by deferring some of the programmatic priorities toward the bottom of the list; however, priorities dealing with faculty and staff would remain at the top of the list. The faculty and staff priorities will be retained in any revised budgetary request. He emphasized that the faculty and staff are the most important assets that the University has and the administration looks forward to bringing them up to competitive levels of salary and fringe benefits.

President Roselle pledged to the Board that he would work with the Council and other public universities in getting them to join the University in this demonstration of fiscal responsibility. A revised FCR 4 was distributed to the Board. President Roselle asked the Chairman and the members of the Finance Committee to support the revised request and recommend its adoption to the full Board.

 $\,$  Mr. Forgy moved the adoption of FCR 4 as revised. The motion was seconded by Senator Huddleston.

- 8 -Mr. Ockerman expressed appreciation to President Roselle, Mr. Carter, Ms. Joan McCauley and other members of the University staff for the considerable amount of time and effort put in the budget. He also thanked the members of the Board for the interest they exhibited in attending a number of budget/strategic plan work sessions. Senator Huddleston commended President Roselle for his action and stated that it is a real demonstration of leadership by the institution in an area that can be very difficult. The University will achieve greater success by being realistic even though it is not unrealistic to think of the total figure in terms of the University's needs and the needs for higher education throughout the state. He stated that it is a realistic approach and the Board should accept it. The University and higher education throughout the Commonwealth will fare much better because of it. Mr. Sturgill stated that he echoed Senator Huddleston's remarks. By acting affirmatively on President Roselle's recommendation, the proper kind of signals will be sent regarding the Board's concern about the availability of public fund dollars for higher education and certainly the Board's willingness to work with other institutions as well as the Council, the Governor and the legislature. Mr. Ockerman reminded the members that as a part of the motion they would also be adopting the Strategic Plan. He reiterated that it is a good document and the people who worked on it are to be congratulated. The document will serve as a guide and a measuring point for the Board. FCR 4 was voted on and passed unanimously. (See the Revised FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.) 1989-90 Budget Revisions (FCR 5) Mr. Forgy stated that FCR 5 consists of routine budget revisions that occur as the budget is implemented, and he moved it adoption. The motion was seconded by Dr. Pisacano and carried. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.) Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky Accepting the Successful Bid for the Purchase of \$9,200,000 Principal Amount of University of Kentucky Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series K, Dated September 1, 1989 (FCR 6) Mr. Forgy announced that bids had been received for the purchase of University of Kentucky Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series K, dated September 1, 1989, on this date of September 19, 1989, pursuant to a Notice of Sale of Bonds which had been published. Such bids had been referred to the Treasurer of the Board and the Fiscal Agent of the University for analysis. The Finance Committee had considered such bids and was recommending that the best bid be accepted as had been recommended by the Treasurer and the Fiscal Agent with reference to the issuance of such Bonds.

- 9 -The Treasurer and the Fiscal Agent presented to the Finance Committee, after the analysis, the best offer for the purchase of said Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series K, dated September 1, 1989, and thereupon Mr. Forgy moved that a Resolution, the form of which had been distributed to the members of the Board of Trustees prior to the meeting and was available at such meeting, be adopted, which Resolution was entitled: RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY ACCEPTING THE SUCCESSFUL BID FOR THE PURCHASE OF \$9,200,000 PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES K, DATED SEPTEMBER 1, 1989. The motion for adoption of said Resolution was seconded by Trustee Stephens. Upon a vote being taken on such motion the result was as follows: Yeas for the Motion Nays for the Motion Abstain Ted B. Bates Jerome A. Stricker Raymond F. Betts Albert B. Chandler Mary Sue Coleman Tracy Farmer Lawrence E. Forgy, Jr. Edythe Jones Hayes Walter D. Huddleston Sean Lohman Foster Ockerman, Sr. Nicholas J. Tackett Thereupon, the Chairman declared that such motion had carried and that such Resolution, a copy of which Resolution is attached to the Minutes of this meeting, was adopted. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.) Memorandum of Agreement Between the University of Kentucky and the Office for Investment and Debt Management (ICR 1) Mr. Stricker, Chairman of the Investment Committee, provided background information about ICR 1. He stated that Mr. Owen had been working with the Investment Committee for many months on how to improve the total return on short-term investments. ICR 1 presents the findings and results of the study. He explained that the Office of Investment and Debt Management (OIDM) of the Commonwealth of Kentucky will assist the University in a short-term investment program. It will provide market information and economic forecasts to

- 10 the University, assist in placing and executing short-term investments, and provide access to the state's securities lending program. All investment decisions, however, will be made by the University under the authority of the Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees and not by the OIDM. With the assistance of OIDM, the Investment Committee believes that the University can enhance the investment earnings from short-term investments. He noted that there is a modest fee involved which basically covers their expenses to provide the service, and stated that OIDM is already doing work for the University in the area of overnight repurchase agreements. He moved that ICR 1 be approved, and the motion was seconded by Mr. Bates. Mr. Ockerman confirmed that ICR 1 had the support of the Investments Committee, and the motion passed. Committee Appointments Mr. Ockerman announced that he would be making the committee appointments and everyone would be notified. Meeting Adjourned Q. #### AMENDMENTS TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the following amendments to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky, which were received by the Board of Trustees for preliminary consideration on August 22, 1989, be approved.

Amendment #1 -- Change the first paragraph of Part II.A.2 to read:

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky consists of sixteen competent citizens of Kentucky appointed by the Governor, three members of the faculty of the University (two from the University System and one from the Community College System) who shall have the right to vote on all matters except that of faculty compensation, and one member of the student body of the University of Kentucky. The [initial] terms of the appointed members shall be for four years and until their successors are appointed and qualif[y]ied. Four of the sixteen appointed members shall be appointed each year. [Whenever terms expire after July 14, 1980, the terms of the members appointed by the Governor to fill the vacancies shall be for six years. | Three of the appointed members shall be representative of agricultural interests, three shall be alumni of the University, and ten shall be other distinguished citizens of the [Commonwealth] state representative of the learned professions. The Governor shall so make the appointments as to divide the representation on the Board as equally as possible between the two leading political parties of Kentucky. Appointments to fill vacancies shall be made for any unexpired terms in the same manner as provided for the original appointments. (KRS 164.130 as amended by the General Assembly)

<u>Background</u>: The changes will make this section of the University of Kentucky Governing Regulations consistent with the current Kentucky Revised Statutes.

Amendment #2 -- Change the next-to-last paragraph of Part II.A.2 to read:

[The student member is the president of the student body of the University except that, if the president of the student body is not a full-time student who maintains permanent residency in the Commonwealth of

Kentucky, a special election must be held to select a full-time student who does maintain permanent residency in this Commonwealth as the student member. (KRS 164.130)]

The student member shall be the president of the student body of the University during the appropriate academic year. If the student member does not maintain the position as student body president or the status of a full-time student at any time during that academic year or does not maintain permanent residency in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, a special election shall be held to select a full-time student who does maintain permanent residency in this Commonwealth as the student member. The student member shall serve for a term of one year beginning with the first meeting of the fiscal year which contains that academic year. (KRS 164.130)

Background: Same as that for Amendment #1.

Amendment #3 -- Change the following two paragraphs in Part IV to read:

The ex officio voting members shall number 13 or 14. In academic years beginning with an even number (e.g., 1982-83, 1984-85), this group shall be composed of the following: Chancellor for the Medical Center, [Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School, | Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, Director of Libraries, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Community College System, and Deans of the Colleges of Allied Health Professions, Architecture, Communications, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Law, and Social Work. In academic years beginning with an odd number, the ex officio voting members shall be: Chancellor for the Lexington Campus, Chancellor for the Community College System and University Relations, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Medical Center, Dean of the Graduate School, President of the Student Government Association, and Deans of the Colleges of Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Business and Economics, Fine Arts, Home Economics, Library and Information Science, Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy.

The ex officio non-voting membership shall include the President, all other vice presidents, University Registrar, [Director of Undergraduate Admissions,] Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Lexington Campus and Director of Admissions, [Dean] Executive Director of University Extension, Dean of Students, Professor of Military Science, Professor of Aerospace Studies, Director of the University Studies Program, and, if they are not already elected members of the Senate, the University System faculty members of the Board of Trustees, Academic Ombudsman, Director of the Honors Program, and chairmen of the University Senate Committees, include University Senate Advisory Committees. All officials mentioned in the preceding paragraph who are not ex officio voting members in any year shall be considered ex officio non-voting members. Other ex officio non-voting members may be added by the University Senate Council for the purpose of supplying information and viewpoints on problems considered by the Senate. Ex officio non-voting members shall enjoy all privileges of the elected membership except the right to vote.

<u>Background</u>: These changes are needed to obtain consistency between the wording in the Governing Regulations and current administrative titles and responsibilities.

Amendment #4 -- Change the sixth paragraph of Part VII.A.1 to read:

A multidisciplinary research center or institute is an educational unit established for the administration of multidisciplinary programs which are primarily research in nature. Such an educational unit is administratively responsible to the [Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School] <u>Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies</u> unless the administrative responsibility specifically has been delegated otherwise. The chief administrative officer of a multidisciplinary research center or institute is a director.

Background: On June 21, 1988, the Board of Trustees approved a restructuring of research and graduate education administration effective July 1, 1988, by changing the title of the Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School to Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, creating a new position of Dean of the Graduate School, and changing the title of the two sector-based positions from Associate Dean for Research to Vice Chancellor for Research and Graduate Studies. This change brings the language of the Governing Regulations into consistency with current administrative practice.

Amendment #5 -- Change the first three paragraphs of Part VII.A.3 to read:

The Graduate Faculty shall consist of the [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School, associate and/or assistant dean of the Graduate School, members, and associate members.

Graduate Faculty members must possess the following qualifications:

A doctor's degree or its equivalent in scholarly reputation;

The rank of assistant professor (or equivalent) or higher;

Scholarly maturity and professional productivity as demonstrated by publications, editorial services, research surveys, creative work, patents, and research in progress at the time of appointment; and

Definite interest in graduate work and the willingness to participate in the graduate program.

Membership in the Graduate Faculty is conferred upon recommendations of the [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School and the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies/appropriate chancellor and approval of the President. The recommendations of the [Vice Chancellor-]Dean are made following review by the Graduate Council of the qualifications of the persons proposed for membership by the college deans, department chairmen, and directors of graduate study.

Associate and other classes of members in the Graduate Faculty or in other faculty bodies or councils of the Graduate School may be appointed by the [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School or elected, with appropriate duties and privileges as provided by the rules of the

Graduate School and approved by the University Senate.

Background: Same as that for Amendment #4.

Amendment #6 -- Change the sixth paragraph of Part VII.A.3 to read:

The Graduate Faculty may perform its functions directly, through the Graduate Council, or through standing or special committees which it may appoint or authorize for appointment. The Graduate Council shall have the authority and responsibilities delegated to it by the [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School, the Graduate Faculty, and the University Senate.

Background: Same as that for Amendment #4.

Amendment #7 -- Change the first paragraph of Part VII.A.7 to read:

The staff of a multidisciplinary research center or institute shall consist of: (1) a director who also shall be a faculty member of a department, school, or college; (2) faculty members on a joint appointment basis; (3) faculty members on a faculty associate basis (each such faculty associate appointed, on recommendations of both the director of the center or institute and the appropriate educational unit administrator, by the [Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School] Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies or other administrator who has administrative responsibility for the center or institute); and (4) non-faculty employees appointed for the duration of a specific project.

Background: Same as that for Amendment #4.

Amendment #8 -- Change the third paragraph of Part VII.A.7 to read:

A multidisciplinary research center or institute shall be administratively responsible to the [Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School] <u>Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies</u> unless specifically designated otherwise. A faculty advisory committee shall be appointed for each research center or institute by the officer to whom the unit is administratively responsible.

Background: Same as that for Amendment #4.

Amendment #9 -- Change Part VII.B.2 to read:

2. [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School

The [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School is chairman of the Graduate Faculty and the Graduate Council. Under the broad direction of the President, the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, the Chancellor for the Lexington Campus, and the Chancellor for the Medical Center, the [Vice Chancellor-]Dean provides general planning,

guidance, [and] review, and coordination for all of the University's endeavors in graduate education [instruction and research and bears responsibility for the total research activity of the University, including the University of Kentucky Research Foundation, and for the coordination of research and graduate education. The Vice Chancellor-Dean has direct responsibility for the interdisciplinary research institutes, except for those for which responsibility specifically has been delegated otherwise. | The [Vice Chancellor-|Dean appoints associate members of the Graduate Faculty and recommends to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies/appropriate chancellor on the appointment of regular members requiring the approval of the President. The [Vice Chancellor-]Dean recommends to the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies/appropriate chancellor on the following actions affecting faculty members who are or may be involved in research or graduate programs of the University: initial appointments of associate professors and professors; promotions of assistant professors and associate professors; and granting of tenure. The [Vice Chancellor-]Dean also recommends on budgets as these may affect [research and] graduate education [programs] and shall have the same authority and responsibilities as those of a dean of a college in the administration of educational units that might be transferred to or developed under the Office of the [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School.

The President, [and the Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School,] the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, and the Dean of the Graduate School shall be ex officio members of all committees of the Graduate School. The Chancellor for the Lexington Campus and the Chancellor for the Medical Center are ex officio members of all committees of the Graduate School which affect their respective sectors.

Background: Same as that for Amendment #4.

Amendment #10 -- Change the second paragraph of Part VII.B.6 to read:

The director of a multidisciplinary research center or institute is charged with the planning, implementation, coordination, and efficient management of the program and activities of the center or institute. The director shall have the same responsibilities as those of a department chairman relative to faculty with joint appointments and non-faculty personnel in the center or institute. The director shall provide recommendations and advice to appropriate educational unit administrators concerning space, financial, and other resources, as well as the identification and appointment of faculty associates in the center or institute. The director shall submit the core budget request for the center or institute and administer this budget after its approval. In addition, the director may have other responsibilities delegated by the [Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School] Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies or other administrator to whom the center or institute is administratively responsible.

Background: Same as that for Amendment #4.

Amendment #11 -- Change the fifth and sixth paragraphs of Part VIII.A.3 to read:

Search committees for chairmen of academic departments shall be appointed by the deans of the colleges after consultation with (1) the associate dean or director of the school within the college if the department is in such a school; (2) the faculty of the department; and (3) the [Vice Chancellor for Research and] Dean of the Graduate School if the department is involved in a graduate program.

Search committees for directors of interdisciplinary institutes shall be appointed, after consultation with the Graduate Council, by the [Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School] <u>Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies</u> or other specific officer to whom administrative responsibility has been delegated.

Background: Same as that for Amendment #4.

Amendment #12 -- Change chancellor or chancellors to chancellor/vice president or chancellors/vice presidents, respectively, in Parts VII.A.4, VII.A.5, VII.A.6, VII.B.3, VII.B.5, VIII.A.1, VIII.A.2, VIII.A.3, X.A, X.B.1, X.B.3, X.B.4, X.B.5.b, X.C.2, X.C.3, and X.C.5.

Background: Since the appointment of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies and the Vice President for Information Systems effective July 1, 1988, their authority and responsibilities in many areas have been the same as those of the chancellors. The proposed changes in the parts of the Governing Regulations designated above will provide clarification and also bring the language of the Governing Regulations into consistency with current administrative practice.

Amendment #13 -- Change the title of Chancellor for the Community College System to Chancellor for the Community College System and University Relations in Parts V, VII.A.8, VII.B.8, and VIII.A.3.

<u>Background</u>: On June 21, 1988, the Board of Trustees approved the change in title from Chancellor for the Community College System to Chancellor for the Community College System and University Relations. Changing the title for this position in the parts of the Governing Regulations designated above will update these parts of the Governing Regulations.

The Board of Trustees has previously approved contracts for the years 1983-84, 1984-85, 1985-86, 1986-87, 1987-88, and 1988-89. The attached agreement conforms to the provisions of the May 4, 1982, Board policy and is in substance the same contract as that approved for the 1988-89 year.

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# STUDENT SERVICES AGREEMENT

This is a Student Services Agreement (the "Agreement") between the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees (the "University") and University of Kentucky Student Agencies, Inc. ("UKSA") dated as of September 19, 1989.

### Recitals

- A. The University has observed the recent reduction in funds available from governmental sources for financial aid to students. Due to the need for alternative sources of financial support to enable students to finance their education, the University has adopted a policy statement that establishes a student services program which will provide both practical job experience and extra income for students at the University.
- B. UKSA, a non-profit corporation which is a taxextempt corporation as an educational organization under
  §501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended,
  desires to operate a student services program that will
  fulfill its educational objectives.
- C. The University recognizes UKSA as a "qualifying entity" as described in the policy statement adopted by the University establishing the student employment program.

D. The University and UKSA desire to enter into this Agreement, whereby UKSA will operate a student services program, in order to advance the goals set forth above. SECTION 1 Definitions As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall have the following meanings: (a) "Campus" shall mean the University campus in Lexington, Kentucky including any dormitories, classrooms or other instructional facilities, student center, offices and any other areas over which the University has authority. (b) "Coordinator" shall mean the full time staif member to be hired by UKSA who will act as the chief operating officer of UKSA. "Program" shall mean the student agencies program that was established by the University pursuant to a policy statement dated May 4, 1982. (d) "University Contracts" shall mean any contracts for goods or services between the University and any other entity other than UKSA. SECTION 2 Nature of Agreement The University hereby gives UKSA full authority and the exclusive right to operate the Program and UKSA agrees to - 2 -

operate the Program subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. SECTION 3 The Program 3.1 Scope. UKSA shall develop student employment opportunities for the Program that will aid students in financing their education. These jobs shall be designed to provide goods and services to the University community and to provide education related work experience for students. 3.2 Administration. UKSA shall assume all responsibility for the Program including the payment of wages to students and the payment of all expenses incurred in the operation of the Program. UKSA shall keep all books, records, and other documents which are necessary for the proper administration of the Program, and shall make necessary filings with federal, state, and local agencies. 3.3 Revenue. Any revenue from the operation of the Program which is in excess of wages and other operating expenses shall be used to increase the rate of wages paid to students and to explore and develop other employment opportunities. UKSA may invest available funds in short term securities from time to time at its discretion. - 3 -

SECTION 4 Covenants of UKSA 4.1 Non-Profit Status. UKSA shall be organized and operated as a non-profit corporation pursuant to Chapter 273 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes at all times during the term of this Agreement. 4.2 Personnel. All officers, members, and employees of UKSA shall be University students except for the Coordinator who may or may not be a University student. 4.3 Wages. Wages paid by UKSA to its employees will be equal to or greater than Kentucky's minimum wage as set by Chapter 337 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes. 4.4 Prior Approval of Campus Services and Solicitation. UKSA shall secure prior written approval by the University. Dean of Students for all services to be provided on Campus pursuant to the Program and for any solicitation on Campus. 4.5 Equal Opportunity. UKSA shall not discriminate against any student, or anyone with whom it does business, on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. 4.6 Availability of Records. UKSA shall make available all of its books, records, and accounts for inspection and audit by representatives of the University within forty-eight hours of receiving written notice by the University.

4.7 Annual Audit. UKSA shall have an annual audit to be conducted by a firm of Certified Public Accountants approved in writing by the University. An audit report and any compliance letters shall be submitted to the University on request. 4.8 Fund Raising Efforts. UKSA shall coordina e all of its fund raising efforts through Dr. Blanton for University Relations. 4.9 Organizational Documents. UKSA shall not amend or otherwise alter its Articles of Incorporation or adopt any bylaw or other operating practice that would alter the character of UKSA without the prior written consent of the University. 4.10 Merger. UKSA shall not merge with any other corporation or convey any substantial portion of its assets to any other person, corporation, partnership, or other entity. 4.11 University Contracts. UKSA shall not provide any goods or services or take any action that would conflict or interfere with any University Contracts. SECTION 5 Right to Bid on University Contracts The University shall allow UKSA to submit bids on contracts for the furnishing of goods and services to the University. 5 -

SECTION 6 Indemnification UKSA shall indemnify and hold the University harmless for the full amount of any loss, claim, damage, liability, or expense resulting to the University either directly or indirectly from (a) any breach of the covenants by UKSA set forth in this Agreement, and (b) any injury to any employee during the course of his or her employment with UKSA. SECTION 7 . . Dissolution of UKSA In the event of the dissolution of UKSA pursuant to Chapter 273 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, the assets of UKSA shall be applied and distributed as follows: (a) First, liabilities and obligations of UKSA shall be paid and discharged, or adequate provisions shall be made therefor, (b) Second, assets held by UKSA upon a condition which occurs by reason of the dissolution, shall be returned, transferred, or conveyed in accordance with such condition, (c) Third, the remaining assets of UKSA shall be transferred or conveyed to the University, or its successors, to be used for the financial aid of its students if the University, or its successor, qualifies as an instrumentality of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and an organization described in

- 6 -

Section 170(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended. If the University, or its successor, does not so qualify, the remaining assets shall be distributed to some other organization or organizations that are organized exclusively for educational purposes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended.

SECTION 8

Miscellaneous

- 8.1 Entire Agreement. This Agreement incorporates the policy statement by the University of May 4, 1982 that established a student agencies program. The Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior understandings with respect to the subject matter hereof. No change, modification, addition or termination of this Agreement shall be enforceable unless in writing and signed by the party against whom enforcement is sought.
- 8.2 Notices. All notices and other communications required by Section 8.1, shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if mailed by registered mail, return receipt requested, postage pre-paid, to the addresses set forth below or to such other address as to which a party has given the other parties written notice:

The headings used in this Agreement have been included solely for ease of reference and shall not be considered in the interpretation or construction of this-.Agreement. Waiver. No waiver of any of the provisions hereof 8.4 shall be effective unless in writing and signed by the party to be charged with such waiver. No waiver shall be deemed a continuing waiver in resepct of any breach or default, whether of a similar or different nature, unless expressly stated in writing. 8.5 Severability. If any provision of this Agreement or its application shall be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the validity, legality and enforceability of all other applications of that provision and of all other provisions and applications thereof shall not in any way be effected or impaired. - 8 -

- 8.6 Governing Law. The validity, construction and interpretation of this Agreement shall be governed in accordance with the law of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
- 8.7 Term. The term of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 1989 to June 30, 1990. This Agreement may be renewed on an annual basis upon the mutual agreement in writing of UKSA and the University.

#### UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

#### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Scope of Statements

The consolidated financial statements of the University of Kentucky include the operations of the University and its affiliated corporations as follows: The University of Kentucky Research Foundation; The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center; University of Kentucky Athletic Association; Health Care Collection Service, Inc.; University of Kentucky Mining Engineering Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Humanities Foundation, Inc.; and Center on Aging Foundation, Inc.

#### Accrual Basis

The financial statements of the University have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, except that costs of an unfunded pension plan liability are expensed when paid to retirees (see Note 7).

# Fund Accounting

The University maintains its accounts and reports its financial transactions in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified and funds that have similar characteristics are combined for reporting purposes into fund groups.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees. The Board retains full control over allocated fund balances to use in achieving its institutional purposes.

Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested permanently and only the income be utilized by the donee. Term endowment funds are similar to endowment funds except that upon the passage of a stated period of time or the occurrence of a particular event, all or part of the principal may be expended as well. Quasi-endowment funds are established by the governing board for the same general purposes as endowment funds, and any portion may be expended.

Ordinary income derived from investments, notes receivable, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning the assets, except that income derived from investments of endowments and similar funds and the majority of current restricted funds is accounted for in the fund to which the income is designated.

All unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted fund.

#### Current Funds

The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes is a summary of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant asset acquisitions, the amounts are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) transfers of a nonmandatory nature for all other cases.

The Board allocates unrestricted current fund balances for specific purposes. These purposes include (a) the working capital needs of the University (including the hospital, the housing and dining system, and other auxiliary enterprises); (b) certain unrestricted income from private sources and (c) budget appropriations for future operating purposes.

#### **Investments**

Investments are stated at cost or, in the case of gifts, at market value at the date of donation.

#### **Inventories**

Inventories are stated principally at the lower of average cost or market.

# Liability for Self-Insurance

The University self-insures certain employee benefits to the extent not covered by insurance carriers. Current fund expenditures include claims paid by the University and an estimated liability for asserted claims at the end of the year.

The University and its agents are insured against medical malpractice by a combination of self-insurance, and an excess liability fund established by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. As of June 30, 1989, the University has a malpractice liability reserve of \$10,286,261. To the extent judgements might exceed the reserve and excess liability insurance coverages, the Commonwealth of Kentucky has made provision for such excesses.

The University has established a 501(c)(9) trust with the Commerce National Bank, Lexington, as trustee, to administer a self-funded long-term disability income program. The University remits premiums to the Trustee for purposes of paying claims and establishing necessary reserves.

#### Land, Buildings, and Equipment-Depreciation

Land, land improvements, buildings and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or, in the case of gifts, at fair market value at date of gift except for the following: (1) The University has title to certain tracts of land which were either donated or purchased at a nominal price with no book value assigned to these properties; and (2) buildings acquired prior to June 30, 1958, were recorded at appraised value of \$33,000,000 at that date. In conformity with college and university accounting practices, no provision is made for depreciation of buildings and equipment.

# Other

Other significant accounting policies are set forth in the financial statements and notes thereto.

The fully funded bond issues totaling \$37,448,000 at June 30, 1989 are funded by investments which are on deposit with the bond trustees. Income on these investments will be allocated to pay current indebtedness.

Revenues from student housing and dining facilities, certain other auxiliary enterprises, hospital and student fees are pledged for the retirement of the bonds.

# 4. Capital Lease Obligations

Plant assets acquired by capitalized leases include the football stadium (\$10,992,000) and various items of equipment (\$33,802,647) which are included in the plant funds.

# 5. Funds Held in Trust by Others

The University is the income beneficiary of various trusts which are held and controlled by independent trustees. For the years ended June 30, 1989 and 1988, the University received from these trusts income amounting to \$872,339 and \$779,192, respectively. The University has no equity interest in the principal of the trusts which, accordingly, is recorded at a nominal value of \$1 each. The 1989 income received from these funds is recorded in the current unrestricted fund for \$340,819 and in the current restricted fund for \$531,520.

#### 6. Pension Plans

Regular full-time employees, including faculty, are participants in the University of Kentucky Retirement Plan. The University of Kentucky Retirement Plan consists of five groups as follows:

Group I Established July 1, 1964, for faculty and certain administrative officials.

Group II Established July 1, 1971, for staff members in the clerical, technical and service categories.

Group III Established July 1, 1972, for staff
members in the managerial, professional
and scientific categories.

Group IV Established January 1, 1973, for staff members having U.S. Civil Service

Retirement entitlement.

Group V Established July 1, 1987, for staff members covered under the Federal Employees Retirement System that replaced Civil Service (those whose employment began during the period from January 1, 1984 to March 31, 1987). Staff members whose employment began after March 31, 1987 are under one of the above University of Kentucky Retirement Plans.

Participation in the University of Kentucky Retirement Plan in groups I, II, and III is mandatory for all faculty and staff members age 30 and older who have completed one year of service. Participation is voluntary to age 30 (after completion of one year of service). Participation in groups IV and V is voluntary.

The University of Kentucky has authorized three retirement plan carriers, effective July 1, 1988, as follows:

Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association/College Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA/CREF) Fidelity Institutional Services Company Twentieth Century Investors, Inc.

Under these fully funded group retirement plans, the University and plan participants make annual contributions to provide fully vested retirement benefits to employees upon retirement. The University's share of costs for these plans was \$17,981,917 and \$17,074,224 for 1989 and 1988, respectively. The University makes retirement contributions to the U. S. Civil Service for certain Cooperative Extension Service Employees in the College of Agriculture. These contributions amounted to \$1,144,219 and \$1,245,401 for 1989 and 1988, respectively.

In addition to retirement benefits provided from the group retirement plans, the University provides supplemental retirement income benefits to certain eligible employees in each of the retirement groups (see Note 7).

## 7. Minimum Annual Retirement Benefits and Supplemental Retirement Income

Employees in retirement groups I, II and III who were age 40 or older prior to the date of establishment of each group plan, and who were employed by the University prior to that date, qualify for the minimum annual retirement benefit provisions of the retirement plan.

Benefits for these eligible employees are based upon a percentage, determined through years of service, of the participant's annual salary in the last year of employment prior to retirement. Retirement benefits as determined are funded by each individual retiree's accumulation in the group retirement plan, with the balance, if necessary, provided by the University as supplemental retirement income.

The costs of supplemental retirement income benefits are not accrued but are recognized when payments are made to retirees. Supplemental retirement benefit payments were approximately \$3,960,000 for 1989 and \$3,981,000 for 1988. The projected estimate of annual payments for supplemental retirement benefits for each of the next five fiscal years is as follows:

The Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky has appropriated funds to the University for the payment of supplemental retirement income benefits since adoption of the group retirement plans, and is expected to continue this practice; however, the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky prohibits the commitment of future revenues beyond the end of the current biennium.

Accordingly, the University does not recognize the liability for supplemental retirement income benefits during the service life of covered employees, but recognizes its costs when funds are appropriated by the Legislature and payments are made.

The University intends to continue paying supplemental retirement income benefits contingent upon the Legislature continuing to appropriate funds required to make these payments.

The latest actuarial valuation was prepared as of June 30, 1988 by TIAA. The actuarial present value of vested and non-vested accumulated supplemental retirement income benefits as determined by this valuation, utilizing an assumed rate of return of 8%, was \$37,068,000.

### 8. Health Insurance Benefits for Retirees

The University provides health care benefits to retirees who have minimum of fifteen years service. The University recognizes the cost of providing those benefits by expensing the insurance premiums in the year paid. These premiums were \$757,831 and \$574,973 for the years ended June 30, 1989 and 1988, respectively.

#### 9. Construction Commitments

Estimated cost to complete construction under contract at June 30, 1989 is approximately \$18,192,000. Such construction is principally financed by Commonwealth of Kentucky appropriations and long-term bonds payable.

#### 10. Contingencies

The University is defendant in several lawsuits; however, University officials are of the opinion, based on advice of in-house legal counsel, that the ultimate outcome of all litigation will not have a material effect on the future operations or financial position of the University beyond the amounts already provided.

#### 11. Pledges

Pledges from The University of Kentucky Fellows totaling approximately \$6,100,000, primarily for various restricted uses, are expected to be collected over the next ten years. Pledges totaling \$212,751 have been made for construction of the football sports complex and are payable over the next two years. Also, deferred gifts through insurance, known bequests and irrevocable trusts in which the University has a remainder interest are estimated to be at least \$18,000,000.

Pledges to the affiliated corporations are as follows: University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation, Inc., \$1,923,079 expected to be collected over the next three years; University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc., \$1,552,626 expected to be collected over the next six years.

It is not practical to estimate the net realizable value of such pledges and deferred gifts.

#### 12. Grants and Contracts Awarded

At June 30, 1989, grants and contracts awarded to the University and the University of Kentucky Research Foundation, but not expended, amounted to \$49,497,000, and are not shown in these financial statements.

#### 13. Reclassifications

Certain account classifications for fiscal 1988 have been reclassified to reflect comparability with account classifications adopted for fiscal 1989 with no effect on previously reported fund balances.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN and BIENNIAL REQUEST 1990-92

Recommendation: that the Strategic Plan for the University of Kentucky be approved as submitted. That the Biennial Request 1990-92 be approved for submission to the Council on Higher Education, the Governor and the General Assembly for a state appropriation of \$328.3 million in 1990-91 and \$386.4 million in 1991-92, a change from \$254.1 million in 1989-90. This represents a change from the state appropriation generated under the Council's revised formula of \$333.4 million for 1990-91 and \$396.6 million for 1991-92.

<u>Background</u>: The Strategic Plan is intended to clarify the mission and direction of the University and to serve as a unifying force for the University and its constituencies. In turn, the Biennial Request has been developed so as to accomplish the goals and objectives established within the Strategic Plan. The Biennial Request 1990-92 includes the operating request and the capital construction plan for the institution.

This revised request is submitted for the Board's consideration for several reasons.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky is at a critical crossroad in its education programs at all levels. Other state programs also are at a critical juncture — prisons, human resources, transportation, and so on.

Now is the time, therefore, for one of the single largest components of the education program of the state — the University of Kentucky — to be understanding of the totality of the economic needs of the Commonwealth.

This is a time for all components of state government to work together. The University of Kentucky looks forward to being a partner with Governor Wilkinson and Legislators in addressing the state's problems and helping to advance all of the critical programs of our Commonwealth.

This revision will bring the University of Kentucky's request to the Council on Higher Education, the Governor, and the Kentucky General Assembly more in line with what would have been produced by the formula prior to the Council's revision of the formula last year.

and all of the proceeds of the Bonds shall be used only as provided in said Resolution.

- 4. Acceptance of Bid is Subject to Approving Legal Opinion of Bond Counsel. That said bid is accepted subject to the condition that such acceptance subjects the University to no obligation to deliver the Bonds if for any reason the University is unable to obtain the final approving legal opinion of the firm of Rubin & Hays, Municipal Bond Attorneys, Louisville, Kentucky, as to said Bonds, or if such Bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxation by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, or if the receipt of interest on said Bonds shall be subject to income taxation by the Federal Government or by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, prior to or on the delivery date of said Bonds; and the purchasers shall not be required to take delivery of said Bonds without the final approving opinion of said attorneys accompanying said Bonds, or if said Bonds or the interest thereon should become subject to such ad valorem or income taxation prior to such delivery; provided such exemption from taxation shall be subject to compliance by the Board of Trustees with certain covenants necessary to establish that interest on the Bonds will continue to be exempt from Federal income taxation under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

This Official Statement, which includes the cover page and the Exhibits appended hereto, is being distributed by the University of Kentucky (the "University") to furnish pertinent information to all who may become owners of its Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series K (the "Series K Bonds") being offered hereby pursuant to the provisions of Sections 162.340 through 162.380 and 58.010 to 58.140, inclusive, of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and pursuant to the terms of a Basic Resolution (the "Resolution") adopted by the Board of Trustees of the University (the "Board") on September 20, 1960, and a Series K Resolution adopted by the Board on June 20, 1989.

The summaries and references to Sections of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, the Basic Resolution, and the Series K Resolution, as included in this Official Statement, do not purport to be comprehensive or definitive and are qualified in their entirety by reference to each such document.

### THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

University of Kentucky is a comprehensive, Land-Grant institution located in Lexington (Fayette County), Kentucky. Founded in 1865 under the provisions of the Morrill Land-Grant Act, the University began as part of Kentucky University. In 1878, the Agricultural and Mechanical College was separated from Kentucky University and reestablished on land given by Lexington and Fayette County. To provide a separate campus for the new institution, Lexington donated its 50-acre fairground and park, and along with Fayette County, contributed construction of the buildings. Thirty years later the name was changed to State University, Lexington, Kentucky, and in 1916 it became University of Kentucky.

University of Kentucky is organized into seventeen colleges and graduate schools plus extension programs, and operates a growing system of fourteen community colleges located throughout the state. These two-year colleges offer prebaccalaureate education in addition to technical and adult continuing education.

From an enrollment of 273 students in 1876, the University has grown to more than 55,000 students and approximately 10,000 faculty and staff. The campus today has more than 100 major buildings including not only modern teaching and research facilities, but also renovated history-laden structures dating back to the 1800s.

The University has produced two Nobel Laureates and seven governors of the state including the first female governor. Scientific advances in medicine, energy, equine and other fields of research have caused the University to be ranked among the top 100 research universities in the nation, the only one in Kentucky to be so recognized.

#### DESCRIPTION OF THE SERIES K BONDS

#### Authority

The Series K Bonds are being issued and sold pursuant to a Series K Resolution adopted by the Board on June 20, 1989, and pursuant to authority contained in Sections 162.340 through 162.380 and 58.010 through 58.140 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

#### Terms

The Series K Bonds are dated September 1, 1989, will bear interest payable May 1, 1990, and semiannually thereafter on each November 1 and May 1 at rates to be established by the University upon acceptance of a bid for said Bonds, and, subject to the redemption provisions set forth below, will mature on the dates and in the amounts set forth on the cover page hereof and in the Series K Resolution.

#### **Denominations and Payment**

The Series K Bonds shall be issued only as fully registered bonds in the denominations of \$5,000, or any integral multiple thereof. Principal shall be payable at the principal office of First Security National Bank and Trust Company, Lexington, Kentucky, (the "Paying Agent"), and interest shall be payable by check or draft mailed on or prior to the due date by the Paying Agent to the registered owners thereof of record as of the close of business on the 15th day of the month preceding each interest payment date (April 15 and October 15).

#### **Optional Redemption Provisions**

The Series K Bonds maturing May 1, 2000 and thereafter shall be subject to redemption at the option of the Board prior to maturity in whole or in part (less than all of a single maturity to be selected by lot) in inverse order of maturity, on any interest payment date on or after May 1, 1999, at the redemption prices, expressed in percentages of the principal amount with respect to each redeemed Series K Bond as set forth below, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption:

On or after May 1, 1999, through November 1, 1999 at 102% On or after May 1, 2000, through November 1, 2000 at  $101\frac{1}{2}\%$  On or after May 1, 2001, through November 1, 2001 at 101% On or after May 1, 2002, through November 1, 2002 at  $100\frac{1}{2}\%$  On or after May 1, 2003, at 100%

### DESCRIPTION OF THE SERIES K PROJECT

The proceeds of the Series K Bonds will be used for the Business and Economic Building Project.

This project will include two primary components: 1) Building Addition of approximately 50,000 square feet, and 2) Existing Building Renovation that requires a full spectrum of interior alterations which will provide for classrooms and faculty offices.

#### SECURITY FOR THE BONDS

The Series K Bonds, together with the Series A and B (which have been retired), Series C, Series D Refunding, Series E, Series F, and the uncalled portions of Series G, H, and I, Series J, Series G (Second Series), Series H (Second Series), Series I (Second Series) and additional parity bonds which may hereafter be issued and outstanding under the terms of the Resolution and subsequent Series Resolutions (the "Bonds" or "All Bonds"), will be payable from and will constitute a paramount charge upon the revenues (the "Revenues") to be derived by the University from the operation of its Consolidated Educational Buildings Project (the "Project") as defined in the Resolution. The fee imposed upon and collected from all students of the University of Kentucky at Lexington, Kentucky, as an incident to registration at the beginning of each semester of the regular academic year and each summer session, including fees imposed for part time students, night school and extension courses is designated as the source of Revenues of the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project. All collections of the student registration fee are to be set aside, as received, into the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project Revenue Fund (the "Revenue Fund") and are made subject to the lien and paramount charge for the security and source of payment of all outstanding Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds.

The Resolution requires the establishment (within four years following the issuance of a Series of Bonds) and maintenance of a reserve in the Bond Fund in an amount equal to the maximum aggregate principal, interest and bond fund charges in any future twelve month period. The Trustee reports that there is an amount on deposit in the Bond Fund Reserve equal to \$11,611,450, which amount equals the requirements of the Resolution for the Series C, D Refunding, E, F, G, H, I, J, Series G (Second Series), Series H (Second Series), and Series I (Second Series) Bonds. The Bond Fund Reserve is pledged equally to all of the Bonds. An additional deposit will be made into the Bond Fund Reserve from the proceeds of the Series K Bonds sufficient to bring the balance to the required amount.

As further security for the Series K Bonds, there is created and granted by Sections 162.350 and 162.200 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes a first statutory mortgage lien upon the Project on a parity with all Bonds outstanding.

### DISPOSITION OF SERIES K BOND PROCEEDS

There shall first be deposited into the Bond Fund (defined herein below) with the First Security National Bank and Trust Company, Lexington, Kentucky, (the "Trustee"), the amount received as accrued interest, if any, on the Series K Bonds from their date to the date of delivery, plus an amount sufficient to increase the Debt Service Reserve portion of the Bond Fund to the maximum annual debt service on All Bonds, provided, however, that this additional amount may not exceed 10% of the Series K Bonds.

The balance of the proceeds shall then be deposited with the Treasurer of the Commonwealth of Kentucky for immediate deposit into an account designated University of Kentucky Consolidated Educational Buildings Project — Bond Proceeds Series K Construction Account to be disbursed for the costs of issuance of the Series K Bonds and for the costs of the planned current construction.

#### CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE BASIC RESOLUTION

On September 20, 1960, the Board adopted the Resolution which created the Project and authorized the issuance of its Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds. The Project consists of all existing educational buildings and necessary appurtenances and all such buildings hereafter erected on property of the University in Fayette County, Kentucky, excluding housing facilities and facilities used exclusively for athletics, but including educational buildings of the Lexington Community College.

The following statements are intended to provide only brief summaries of selected pertinent provisions of the Resolution. For detailed and complete information, reference is hereby made to the Resolution, copies of which are on file with the University and with the Trustee. For purposes of this description, the Resolution and the Series C, D Refunding, E, F and G, H, I, J, G (Second Series, H (Second Series and I (Second Series) Resolutions, collectively, and the Bonds issued thereunder, collectively, shall be referred to as the "Resolutions" and the "Bonds" or "All Bonds", respectively.

#### **Application of Revenues**

There is created and established a special fund known as the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project Revenue Fund (the "Revenue Fund") in the custody of the Treasurer of the Board, separate and apart from other funds of the University. Such Revenue Fund shall be maintained so long as any of the Bonds are outstanding and unpaid as a trust fund in one or more banks which shall be members of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and shall be expended and used by the Treasurer only in the manner and order specified in these Resolutions. Upon the issuance and delivery of any Bonds pursuant to the Resolutions, all Revenues derived from the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project shall be deposited as collected in the Revenue Fund to be held and administered by the Treasurer of the Board and shall be paid out and applied for the uses and purposes set forth below.

- 1. Bond and Interest Sinking Fund: There is created and established a special account known as the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project Bond and Interest Sinking Fund (the "Bond Fund") which is maintained by and in the custody of the Trustee so long as any Bonds are outstanding and unpaid. The Bond Fund shall be used by the Trustee to pay interest on the Bonds as the same become due from time to time and to pay and retire the Bonds as they become due, or as otherwise provided in the Resolutions. From and after the issuance of any Bonds and thereafter commencing on May 1 of each year, the Treasurer shall transfer from the Revenue Fund, and deposit to the credit of the Bond Fund all the Revenues as and when the same are received and deposited into the Revenue Fund, until there has been so deposited and paid into the Bond Fund an amount equal to the total interest and principal becoming due on or prior to the succeeding May 1, on all Bonds then outstanding.
- 2. Reserve Fund: For the purpose of creating and maintaining a reserve in the Bond Fund equal to the maximum Aggregate Principal, Interest and Bond Fund Charges (defined herein below), the amount to be set aside into the Bond Fund shall be 125% of the amounts set forth above until such reserve is so accumulated and thereafter the same shall be resumed and continued whenever and so long as required to restore and maintain such reserve. Aggregate Principal, Interest and Bond Fund Charges is defined "as of any particular date of computation and with respect to a particular twelve month period, an amount of money equal to the aggregate of the amounts required by the provisions of the Resolution and all Series Resolutions, to be paid into the Bond Fund in such twelve month period for account of the interest on all outstanding Bonds becoming due during such twelve month period, and to accomplish the retirement of the principal of all outstanding Bonds at or prior to the maturity thereof.

The amounts by which the above payments exceed the Aggregate Principal, Interest and Bond Fund Charges in any particular twelve month period shall be held in the Bond Fund as a reserve. Moneys in the Bond Fund in excess of the Aggregate Principal, Interest and Bond Fund Charges and the prescribed reserve may be used to purchase or redeem Bonds in advance of maturity.

When all required payments into the Bond Fund have been made in any particular twelve month period ending May 1, any moneys remaining in the Revenue Fund may be used by the Board in its discretion to pay the operating costs of the Project to the extent that such costs are not otherwise provided, or may be used for the purchase or retirement of Bonds in advance of maturity, or for any other lawful purpose.

### **Application of Bond Proceeds**

Any amounts received upon delivery of a Series of Bonds in payment of accrued interest thereon shall be deposited by the Treasurer into the Bond Fund to be applied to the payment of interest next becoming due on said Series of Bonds.

Upon the delivery of a series of Bonds and after the deposit of accrued interest into the Bond Fund, there shall be established in the State Treasury of the Commonwealth of Kentucky an account designated as a University of Kentucky Consolidated Educational Buildings Project—Bond Proceeds Series Construction Account (the "Construction Account") and proceeds of said Series of Bonds (remaining after the payment of interim loans) shall be deposited into said Construction Account and disbursements shall be made solely for defraying the costs of erecting and completing buildings and appurtenances which will become parts of the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project and in accordance with inspection, audit and disbursement procedures provided by law. The aforesaid costs may include engineering, accounting, legal and fiscal expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of said series of Bonds.

Any balance remaining in the Construction Account after erection and completion of the authorized educational buildings and appurtenances and the payment of all costs in connection therewith shall be deposited in the Bond Fund: provided, that if proceedings are then pending or imminently contemplated for the construction or completion of one or more additional educational buildings which are or will be financed by the issuance of bonds under a Series Resolution, the balances may be taken into account in determining the amount of bonds to be authorized therefor, or may otherwise be applied to the proper costs thereof.

#### **Additional Bonds**

The Board covenants and agrees that it will not hereafter create or permit the creation of or issue any bonds which will have a priority over the charge on the Revenues or the payments to be made into the Bond Fund.

Additional bonds ranking on a parity with the Bonds outstanding may be issued only for the purpose of erecting and completing an educational building or buildings and necessary appurtenances which building or buildings shall become and constitute a part of the Project, provided:

- 1. that at the time of the issuance of the additional bonds there is no deficiency in the amounts required to be paid into the Bond Fund, and
- 2. that the average of the annual Revenues from the Project for the two fiscal years immediately preceding the issuance of the additional bonds, as indicated in a statement by the Treasurer of the Board to be filed with the Trustee, was equal to not less than 1.25 times the maximum Aggregate

Principal, Interest and Bond Fund Charges in any succeeding twelve month period ending May 1 on the Bonds then outstanding and the additional bonds proposed to be issued. For the purpose of computing average annual Revenues, the Treasurer shall make an adjustment in the amount of annual Revenues to reflect any increase or decrease in the Student Registration Fee being imposed at the time for the services of the Project.

The issuance of such additional bonds shall be pursuant to the terms of an appropriate Series Resolution by the Board in accordance with the provisions of the Resolution.

#### **Default and Remedies**

The Resolution defines events of default, which include failure to pay principal or any installment of interest when same become due; the Board being rendered incapable of fulfilling its obligations under the Resolution; any buildings representing a part of the Project being destroyed or damaged and not being repaired or replaced and insurance proceeds not being deposited in the Bond Fund; an order or decree being entered appointing a Receiver of all or part of the Project or Revenues therefrom; and failure after written notice by the Trustee (who is required to give such notice at the written request of the owners of 15% in aggregate amount of the outstanding Bonds) to perform any covenant in the Resolution or any Series Resolution, in each case within or for the specified period of grace, if any.

Upon the happening and continuance of any event of default, then and in every such case the Trustee may, and upon the written request of the owners of not less than twenty-five percent (25%) in principal amount of the Bonds then outstanding shall, by a notice in writing to the Board, declare the principal of all the Bonds then outstanding to be due and payable immediately, and upon such declaration the same shall become and be immediately due and payable, anything contained in the Bonds or in the Resolution or any Series Resolution to the contrary notwithstanding; provided, however, that if at any time after the principal of the Bonds shall have been so declared to be due and payable, and before the entry of final judgment or decree in any suit, action or proceeding instituted on account of such default, or before the completion of the enforcement of any other remedy under the Resolution, moneys shall have been accumulated in the Bond Fund sufficient to pay all arrears of interest, if any, upon all the Bonds then outstanding (except the interest accrued on such Bonds since the last interest payment date), and the charges, compensation, expenses, disbursements, advances and liabilities of the Trustee and all other amounts then payable by the Board under the Resolution shall have been paid or a sum sufficient to pay the same shall have been deposited with the Trustee, and every other default known to the Trustee in the observance or performance of any covenant, condition or agreement contained in the Bonds or in the Resolution or any Series Resolution (other than a default in the payment of the principal of such Bonds then due only because of a declaration under the Resolution) shall have been remedied to the satisfaction of the Trustee, then and in every such case the Trustee may, and upon the written request of the owners of not less than twenty-five percent (25%) in principal amount of the Bonds then outstanding shall, by written notice to the Board, rescind and annul such declaration and its consequences, but no such recission or annulment shall extend to or affect any subsequent default or impair any right consequent

Upon the happening and continuance of any event of default, then and in every such case the Trustee may proceed, and upon the written request of the owners of not less than fifteen percent (15%) in principal amount of the Bonds then outstanding under the Resolution shall proceed to protect and enforce its rights and the rights of the bondowners under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky or under the Resolution or any Series Resolution by such suits, actions or special proceedings in equity or at law, either for the specific performance of any covenant or agreement contained in the Resolution or in aid or execution of any power therein granted or for the enforcement of any proper legal or equitable remedy, as the Trustee, being advised by counsel, shall deem most effectual to protect and enforce such rights.

In the enforcement of any remedy under the Resolution, the Trustee shall be entitled to sue for, enforce payment of and receive any and all amounts then or during any default becoming, and at any time remaining, due from the Board for principal, interest or otherwise under any of the provisions of the Resolution or any Series Resolution or of the Bonds and unpaid together with any and all costs and expenses of collection and of all proceedings under the Resolution and under such Bonds, without prejudice to any other right or remedy of the Trustee or of the bondowners, and to recover and enforce judgment or decree against the Board, but solely as provided in the Resolution and in such Bonds, for any portion of such amounts remaining unpaid, with interest, costs and expenses, and to collect (solely from moneys in the Bond Fund and the Revenues of the Project pledged to the payment of the Bonds by the Resolution) in any manner provided by law, the moneys adjudged or decreed to be payable.

#### Other Covenants of the Board

The Board covenants with the owners of the Bonds, among other things, the following:

- 1. That it will establish, maintain and collect, as long as any Bonds are outstanding, such student registration fees for the services of the Project as may be necessary (a) to pay the interest on and principal of the Bonds as they respectively mature, to provide reserves therefor and (b) to pay the operating costs of the Project to the extent they are not otherwise provided. In order to assure full and continuous performance of the covenant with a margin for contingencies and temporary unanticipated reduction in Revenues the Board further covenants and agrees to establish, maintain and collect such student registration fees as will produce Revenues, in each twelve month period ending May 1, equal to at least 110% of the current Aggregate Principal, Interest and Bond Fund Charges;
- 2. That while any of the Bonds are outstanding, it will, except as hereinbefore set forth under "Application of Revenues", pay the current operating costs of the Project from available funds other than the Revenues derived from the Project;
- 3. That it will procure and maintain to the extent available, fire and extended coverage insurance on the Project in amounts sufficient to provide for not less than full recovery whenever the loss from causes covered by such insurance does not exceed 80% of the full insurable value of the Project;
- 4. That unless provision is otherwise made by law for disposition by the Commonwealth of Kentucky of claims made against the University for bodily injury and/or death which may arise from operations of the Board, it will, if such insurance is not already in force, procure and maintain public liability insurance with limits of not less than \$100,000/\$300,000 to protect the Board from claims for bodily injury and/or death which may arise from the operation of the Board, including any use or occupancy of its grounds, structures, and vehicles;
- 5. That it will keep accurate financial records and proper books relating to the Project; that such records and books shall be open to inspection by the bondowners and their agents and representatives; and that not later than 90 days after the close of each fiscal year it will furnish to the Trustee, and to any bondowner who shall request the same in writing, copies of audit reports prepared by an independent certified public accountant or a firm of such accountants, who shall be satisfactory to the Trustee, or by an appropriate State auditing official, reflecting in reasonable detail the financial condition and record of operation of the University, the Project, and the pledged Revenues during the preceding fiscal year;
- 6. That it will at all times maintain, preserve and keep the Project and every part thereof in good condition, repair and working order; and will from time to time make all needful and proper repairs, replacements, additions, betterments and improvements so that the operations and business of the Project shall at all times be conducted efficiently, properly and advantageously;

7. That whenever any portion of the Project shall have been worn out or destroyed or shall have become obsolete, inefficient or otherwise unfit for use, the Board will procure and install substitutes of at least equal utility and efficiency, so that the value of the Project will at all times be fully maintained; and

8. That it will faithfully observe, do and perform all of its agreements and obligations provided for by the Bonds and the Resolutions.

## CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS PROJECTS

Pursuant to the Resolution and subsequent supplemental Series Resolutions, the Board has issued its Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds to provide funds for construction of facilities as follows:

Series A Bonds issued in 1960 in the amount of \$8,000,000 for construction of a Chemistry-Physics Building and Library. These bonds were retired in 1986.

Series B Bonds issued in 1963 in the amount of \$7,500,000 for construction of an Education Building, a Nuclear Accelerator, a Law Building, Engineering Building, and a Commerce Building. These bonds were retired in 1988.

Series C Bonds issued in 1970 in the amount of \$4,290,000 and sold to the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to provide funds, in part, for the construction of a Classroom-Office Building.

Series D Bonds dated May 1, 1971, and issued in the amount of \$34,700,000 for the construction of various buildings and appurtenant facilities: Classroom-Office Building for the College of Arts and Sciences; Laboratory-Office Building for the Agriculture Science Program; Appurtenant Facilities construction including two parking and lighting; Laboratory, Office and Studio Facilities for various colleges; Memorial Hall Reconstruction; Library Service Building Reconstruction; Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building; Laboratory-Office Facilities for Medical and Biological Sciences programs; Patient Care Facility addition to the University Medical Center; and Addition to The University Library.

Series D Refunding Bonds, issued in 1973, replaced Series D at a savings.

Series E Bonds dated May 1, 1973, were issued in the amount of \$4,750,000 to pay the costs, in part, of constructing a Biological Sciences Building, a Family Practice Facilities Building, and a Patient Care Facility addition to the University Medical Center (Federal funds anticipated at the time of issuance of the Series D Bonds were not received; therefore, funds for completion of the Patient Care Facility were included in the Series E Bond issue).

Series F Bonds, dated May 1, 1976, were issued in the amount of \$7,500,000 to pay the costs, in part, of constructing a Fine Arts Building and various utility extensions and additions.

Series G Bonds, dated April 1, 1983, were issued in the amount of \$17,100,000 to retire revenue bond anticipation notes, the proceeds of which provided interim financing to pay the costs, in part, of the construction of a Primary/Ambulatory Care Facility and a patient parking structure.

Series H Bonds, dated March 1, 1983, were issued in the amount of \$8,500,000 for the construction of a building for the College of Pharmacy.

Series I Bonds, dated October 1, 1985, were issued in the amount of \$16,100,000 for the construction of a new Mining and Minerals Resources Building and to add three levels to the Medical Plaza parking structure.

The Series J Bonds, dated March 1, 1987, were issued in the amount of \$29,350,000,000 for the construction of a Robotics Facility, an Agricultural Engineering Building, and Agricultural Regulatory Services Building, a Lexington Community College Academic/Technical Building and a Fire Safety Project in the Patterson Office Tower.

The Series G (Second Series), Series H (Second Series), Series I (Second Series) Bonds, dated May 1, 1987, were issued in the amount of \$34,715,000, for the purpose of advance refunding the callable bonds of the Series G, H and I issues.

#### GENERAL OPERATIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY

The governing body of the University is the Board consisting of sixteen members, appointed by the Governor, three of whom are alumni of the University, the President of the Student Body, two members of the University teaching faculty, and one member of the Community Colleges teaching faculty. The Board is a public body corporate and has general supervision of the University's property and operations.

The President and chief administrative officer of the University is Dr. David P. Roselle. Edward A. Carter is Vice President for Administration for the University, Dr. Robert E. Hemenway is Chancellor for the University's Lexington Campus, Dr. Peter P. Bosomworth is Chancellor for the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, Dr. Charles Turner Wethington, Jr. is Chancellor for the Community College System and University Relations, Wimberly C. Royster is Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies, Eugene R. Williams is Vice President for Information Systems at the University, and Mr. Henry Clay Owen is Controller and Treasurer of the University of Kentucky. Their biographies follow:

## Dr. David P. Roselle, President of the University of Kentucky

Dr. David P. Roselle became the ninth president of the University of Kentucky on July 1, 1987.

Dr. Roselle came to the University from Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University in Blacksburg, Va., where he served for four years as provost, the No. 2 administrative position there.

A native of Pennsylvania, Dr. Roselle earned a Ph.D. in mathematics from Duke University. He was a mathematics professor and researcher at the University of Maryland and Louisiana State University before going to Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University, where he moved up through the administrative ranks.

He is a nationally-known mathematics scholar and editor of two books, and was on the editorial board of a third.

## Edward A. Carter, Vice President for Administration for The University

Mr. Carter has a degree in Accounting from the University of Kentucky. He was named vice president for administration at the University of Kentucky in September 1987. He has served in that position on an acting basis since January 1987. He has held a variety of positions at the University including associate vice president for planning and budget, budget director, assistant budget director, budget analyst, fiscal affairs officer for the University's Community College system, and manager of payroll.

He has also served as the deputy executive director for finance with the Kentucky Council on Higher Education and has had extensive involvement in higher education activities at the national level. He has served on the faculty of the College Business Management Institute at the University of Kentucky; served on the faculty for National Association of College and University Business Officers workshops; and served on the faculty for an Ohio Association of College and University Business Officers.

## Dr. Robert E. Hemenway, Chancellor for the University's Lexington Campus

Dr. Hemenway earned his B.A. degree from the University of Nebraska and earned his Ph.D. from Kent State University.

Dr. Hemenway came to the University of Kentucky in June 1989 from the University of Oklahoma where he was Dean of Arts and Sciences since 1986. Prior to that he was a Professor of English with the University of Kentucky from 1973-1986, an Associate Professor of American Studies at the University of Wyoming from 1969-73, and from 1966-68 an Assistant Professor of English at the University of Kentucky.

He has chaired and served on a multitude of board of directors, board of trustees, executive committees and task forces over the years as well as serving as a consultant. He has had numerous books and articles published and has editorial work to his credit.

#### Peter P. Bosomworth, Chancellor for the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center

Dr. Bosomworth received his B.S. degree from Kent State University and his M.D. from the University of Cincinnati and served his internship at the Cincinnati University Hospital. He received his M.M.S. at Ohio State University where he also served a residency in anesthesiology. Dr. Bosomworth came to the University of Kentucky in 1962 as Professor and Chairman of the Department of Anesthesiology. He served as Acting Hospital Administrator, Associate Dean for Clinical Affairs and Vice President for the Medical Center before becoming Chancellor in 1982. In this capacity, he is the Chief Administrative Officer with responsibility for five colleges, a 500 bed university hospital, research institutes in cancer and aging, and more than 4,000 employees and 2,000 health profession students. He is a member of many health related boards and councils, as well as professional associations. He recently served as Chairman of the Board of the Association of Academic Health Science Centers, an organization serving the health science centers of the United States and Canada. He is also active in a number of civic groups, and is the author of numerous publications.

Charles Turner Wethington, Jr., Chancellor for the Community College System and University Relations

Dr. Wethington has been Chancellor for the Community College System since 1982. He has been with the Community College System since 1971 first as Assistant Vice President and from 1981 to 1982 as Vice President. Prior to that he was Director, Maysville Community College from 1967 to 1971 and an Instructor in Educational Psychology at the University from 1964 to 1966. He earned his Ph.D. at the University of Kentucky in 1965, his M.A. at the University of Kentucky in 1962 and his A.B. from Eastern Kentucky University in 1956. He served in the United States Air Force Security Service as a Crypto-Linguist from 1957 to 1961. Dr. Wethington has served on Councils, Committees and Boards of numerous professional affiliations.

Wimberly C. Royster, Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies

Mr. Royster earned his B.A. degree from Murray State University in 1946 and his M.A. and Ph.D. in the area of Mathematics from the University of Kentucky in 1948 and 1952, respectively. He was Assistant Professor of Mathematics at Auburn University form 1952-56. At the University of Kentucky he has served as Assistant Professor (1956-58), Associate Professor (1958-62), and Professor (1962-). He was Chairman of the Department of Mathematics (1963-69), Director of the School of Mathematical Sciences (1967-69), Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences (1969-72), Dean of the Graduate School and Coordinator for Research (1972-82), and Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School (1982-88). His current title is Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies. He has also been Vice President of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation since 1973.

Dr. Royster has served graduate education and research through his participation and leadership role in several committees, boards, and associations.

Eugene R. Williams, Vice President for Information Systems at The University

Mr. Williams has been appointed Vice President for Information Systems at the University of Kentucky and is responsible for all Communications, Computing Center, Data Processing, Library, Instructional Resources, Postal, Printing, Duplicating and Photographic systems.

He came to the University of Kentucky in 1977 as Director of Internal Audit and was later promoted to Assistant Vice Chancellor for Business Services at the University of Kentucky Lexington Campus; a position in which he managed the Physical Plant, Design and Construction, Human Resource Services, and Employee Benefits and Risk Management divisions as well as Communications and Data Processing.

He is an accounting graduate of Eastern Kentucky University. He has done graduate work at Xavier University and Northwestern University.

His work in private industry included serving as senior financial analyst with Cincinnati Electronics Corporation and as an auditor for the Cincinnati office of Arthur Andersen and Company.

Henry Clay Owen, Controller and Treasurer

Mr. Owen received the B.S. degree in Commerce and the M.S. degree in Education from the University of Kentucky, and is licensed as a Certified Public Accountant. He joined the staff of Price-Waterhouse and Co., Certified Public Accountants, Nashville, Tennessee in 1961. In 1963, he became Chief Accountant in Equitable Securities Corporation, an investment banking firm. Mr. Owen joined the University of Kentucky business staff in 1964, became Manager of Sponsored Projects Accounting in 1965, and was appointed Assistant Controller in 1967. He has held the position of Controller since 1969, and was appointed Treasurer July 1, 1982.

#### Enrollment

The following schedule indicates the Fall Semester head count and full-time equivalent enrollment at the University campus in Lexington, Kentucky, for each of the academic years 1984-85 through 1988-89. The full-time enrollment calculation is made in accordance with the method used by the United States Office of Education. The University also operates a system of Community Colleges. #### TAX EXEMPTION

Based upon existing law, including existing statutes, court decisions, regulations, and published rulings, it is the opinion of Bond Counsel that interest on the Bonds is excludable from the gross income of the recipients for federal income tax purposes. It is Bond Counsel's further opinion that interest on the Series K Bonds is exempt from Commonwealth of Kentucky income taxes, and the Series K Bonds are exempt from all ad valorem taxes in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. See Special Tax Exemption Considerations.

#### SPECIAL TAX EXEMPTION CONSIDERATIONS

In order to assure purchasers of the Series K Bonds that interest thereon will continue to be exempt from all Federal and Kentucky income taxation (subject to certain exceptions set out below), the Board covenants to and with the owners of such Bonds that (1) the Board will take all actions necessary to comply with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), (2) the Board will take no actions which will violate any of the provisions of such Code, or would cause the Bonds to become "private activity bonds" within the meaning of the Code, (3) none of the proceeds of the Bonds will be used for any purpose which would cause the interest on the Bonds to become subject to Federal income taxation, and the Board will comply with any and all requirements as to rebate (and reports with reference thereto) to the United States of certain investment earnings on the proceeds of the Series K Bonds.

The Board certifies that these Bonds are not "private activity bonds" within the meaning of the Code, and the Board has been advised by Bond Counsel and therefore believes that interest on the Bonds is not included as an item of tax preference in calculating the alternative minimum tax for individuals. However, the Board has been advised that these Bonds are not "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for bank investments and that banks are not permitted to deduct the interest cost attributable to the purchase of these Bonds.

The exemption from income taxation by the United States of America of interest on the Bonds is subject to the following exceptions:

- 1. For purposes of the alternative minimum tax imposed on corporations (as defined for federal income tax purposes), interest on the Series K Bonds is taken into account in determining adjusted net book income (adjusted current earnings for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1989).
- 2. Section 265 of the Code denies a deduction for interest on indebtedness incurred or continued to purchase or carry the Series K Bonds, or, in the case of a financial institution, that portion of a holder's interest expense allocated to interest on the Series K Bonds.
- 3. With respect to insurance companies subject to the tax imposed by Section 831 of the Code, Section 832(b)(5)(B)(i) reduces the deduction for loss reserves by 15% of the sum of certain items, including interest on the Series K Bonds.
- 4. For taxable years beginning before January 1, 1992, interest on the Series K Bonds earned by some corporations could be subject to the environmental tax imposed by Section 59A of the Code.
- 5. Interest on the Series K Bonds earned by certain foreign corporations doing business in the United States of America could be subject to a branch profits tax imposed by Section 884 of the Code.
- 6. Passive investment income, including interest on the Series K Bonds, may be subject to federal income taxation under Section 1375 of the Code for Subchapter S corporations that have Subchapter C earnings and profits at the close of the taxable year if greater than 25% of the gross receipts of such Subchapter S corporation is passive investment income.
- 7. Section 86 of the Code requires recipients of certain Social Security and certain Railroad Retirement benefits to take into account, in determining the taxability of such benefits, receipts or accruals of interest on the Series K Bonds.

The Board reserves the right to amend the Resolution authorizing these Series K Bonds without obtaining the consent of the owners of the Bonds (i) to whatever extent shall, in the opinion of Bond Counsel be deemed necessary to assure that interest on the Series K Bonds shall be exempt from Federal income taxation, and (ii) to whatever extent shall be permissible (without jeopardizing such tax exemption or the security of the owners of the Series K Bonds) to eliminate or reduce any restrictions concerning the Project, the investment of the proceeds of the Series K Bonds, or the application of such proceeds or of the revenues of the Project. The purchasers of the Series K Bonds are deemed to have relied fully upon these covenants and undertakings on the part of the Board as part of the consideration for the purchase of the Series K Bonds. To the extent that the Board obtains an opinion of nationally recognized bond counsel to the effect that non-compliance with any of the covenants contained in this Resolution or referred to in this Resolution would not subject interest on the Series K Bonds to Federal income taxes or Kentucky income taxes, the Board shall not be required to comply with such covenants or requirements.

Bond Counsel will render the customary opinion as to exemption of principal of the Bonds from Kentucky ad valorem taxation and as to exemption of interest on the Bonds from Federal and Kentucky income taxation, based on the assumption by Bond Counsel that the Board complies with covenants made by the Board with respect to compliance with the provisions of the Code, subject to the exceptions set out above, and based on the assumption of compliance by the Board with requirements as to any required rebate (and reports with reference thereto) to the United States of America of certain investment earnings on the proceeds of the Series K Bonds. Bond Counsel are of the opinion that, based on the foregoing assumption of compliance, the Bonds are not "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code.

#### ABSENCE OF MATERIAL LITIGATION

There is no controversy or litigation of any nature now pending or threatened restraining or enjoining the issuance, sale, execution or delivery of the Series K Bonds, or in any way contesting or affecting the validity of the Series K Bonds or any proceedings of the University taken with respect to the issuance or sale thereof, or the pledge or application of any moneys or security provided for the payment of the Series K Bonds or the due existence or powers of the University.

#### APPROVAL OF LEGALITY

Legal matters incident to the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of the Series K Bonds are subject to the approval of Rubin & Hays, Louisville, Kentucky, Bond Counsel to the University. The approving legal opinion of Bond Counsel will be printed on the Series K Bonds and will contain a statement of tax exemption as represented herein. Bond Counsel has reviewed the information herein pertaining to the Series K Bonds under the headings "Description of the Series K Bonds", "Security for the Bonds", "Disposition of Series K Bond Proceeds", "Certain Provisions of the Basic Resolution", "Tax Exemption", and "Special Tax Exemption Considerations" and is of the opinion that such information is a fair summary of the principal provisions of the instruments and information therein described. Said firm has not otherwise participated in the preparation of the Official Statement or the Exhibits attached hereto and has not verified the accuracy or completeness of the information contained under any heading other than those stated above, nor of any financial information, enrollment numbers, projections, or computations relating thereto, and, therefore, can make no representation with respect to such information. The matters set forth under "Absence of Material Litigation" will be delivered by the University with the Series K Bonds.

#### FINANCIAL ADVISOR

The Series K Bonds will be sold by the solicitation and receipt of sealed, competitive bids. Seasongood & Mayer, Cincinnati, Ohio, Financial Advisor to the University, has requested, and received, permission and approval of the Board of Trustees of the University to bid, either alone or in conjunction with others, on the Series K Bonds. The Financial Advisor has expressed its intent to so bid.

#### APPROVAL OF ISSUANCE OF SERIES K BONDS

The issuance of the Series K Bonds by the University and the terms thereof are subject to the approval of the Kentucky State Property and Buildings Commission.

Pursuant to Chapter 42 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, issuance of the Series K Bonds will also be approved by the Kentucky Finance and Administration Cabinet, Office for Investment and Debt Management.

#### **RATINGS**

Moody's Investors Service and Standard & Poor's Corporation have given the Bonds the rating set forth on the cover page of this Official Statement. Such ratings reflect only the opinion of such organizations. There can be no assurance that such ratings will be maintained for any given period of time or that it will not be revised or withdrawn entirely. Any downward revision or withdrawal of such ratings may have a material adverse effect on the market price of the Bonds

All quotations from, and summaries and explanations of, the Kentucky Revised Statutes, the Basic Resolution, and the Series K Resolution contained herein do not purport to be complete, and reference is made to such laws and documents for full and complete statements of their provisions. The Exhibits attached hereto are a part of this Official Statement. Copies, in reasonable quantity, of the Series K Resolution may be obtained from Seasongood & Mayer, 300 Mercantile Library Building, 414 Walnut Street, Cincinnati, OH 45202-3910.

Any statements in this Official Statement involving matters of opinion, whether or not expressly so stated, are intended as such and not as representations of fact. This Official Statement is not to be construed as a contract or agreement between the University and the purchasers or owners of any of the Series K Bonds.

We have audited the accompanying consolidated balance sheet of the University of Kentucky (an agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky) and affiliated corporations as of June 30, 1989, and the related consolidated statements of changes in fund balances and current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes for the year then ended. We previously audited and reported on the consolidated financial statements of the University for the year ended June 30, 1988, for which condensed statements are presented for comparative purposes only. #### UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Scope of Statements

The consolidated financial statements of the University of Kentucky include the operations of the University and its affiliated corporations as follows: The University of Kentucky Research Foundation; The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center; University of Kentucky Athletic Association; Health Care Collection Service, Inc.; University of Kentucky Mining Engineering Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Humanities Foundation, Inc.; and Center on Aging Foundation, Inc.

#### Accrual Basis

The financial statements of the University have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, except that costs of an unfunded pension plan liability are expensed when paid to retirees (see Note 7).

#### Fund Accounting

The University maintains its accounts and reports its financial transactions in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified and funds that have similar characteristics are combined for reporting purposes into fund groups.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees. The Board retains full control over allocated fund balances to use in achieving its institutional purposes.

Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested permanently and only the income be utilized by the donee. Term endowment funds are similar to endowment funds except that upon the passage of a stated period of time or the occurrence of a particular event, all or part of the principal may be expended as well. Quasi-endowment funds are established by the governing board for the same general purposes as endowment funds, and any portion may be expended.

Ordinary income derived from investments, notes receivable, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning the assets, except that income derived from investments of endowments and similar funds and the majority of current restricted funds is accounted for in the fund to which the income is designated.

All unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted fund.

#### Current Funds

The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes is a summary of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant asset acquisitions, the amounts are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) transfers of a nonmandatory nature for all other cases.

The Board allocates unrestricted current fund balances for specific purposes. These purposes include (a) the working capital needs of the University (including the hospital, the housing and dining system, and other auxiliary enterprises); (b) certain unrestricted income from private sources and (c) budget appropriations for future operating purposes.

#### Investments

Investments are stated at cost or, in the case of gifts, at market value at the date of donation.

#### Inventories

Inventories are stated principally at the lower of average cost or market.

## Liability for Self-Insurance

The University self-insures certain employee benefits to the extent not covered by insurance carriers. Current fund expenditures include claims paid by the University and an estimated liability for asserted claims at the end of the year.

The University and its agents are insured against medical malpractice by a combination of self-insurance, and an excess liability fund established by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. As of June 30, 1989, the University has a malpractice liability reserve of \$10,286,261. To the extent judgements might exceed the reserve and excess liability insurance coverages, the Commonwealth of Kentucky has made provision for such excesses.

The University has established a 501(c)(9) trust with the Commerce National Bank, Lexington, as trustee, to administer a self-funded long-term disability income program. The University remits premiums to the Trustee for purposes of paying claims and establishing necessary reserves.

#### Land, Buildings, and Equipment-Depreciation

Land, land improvements, buildings and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or, in the case of gifts, at fair market value at date of gift except for the following: (1) The University has title to certain tracts of land which were either donated or purchased at a nominal price with no book value assigned to these properties; and (2) buildings acquired prior to June 30, 1958, were recorded at appraised value of \$33,000,000 at that date. In conformity with college and university accounting practices, no provision is made for depreciation of buildings and equipment.

#### <u>Other</u>

Other significant accounting policies are set forth in the financial statements and notes thereto.

The fully funded bond issues totaling \$37,448,000 at June 30, 1989 are funded by investments which are on deposit with the bond trustees. Income on these investments will be allocated to pay current indebtedness. ness.

Revenues from student housing and dining facilities, certain other auxiliary enterprises, hospital and student fees are pledged for the retirement of the bonds.

## 4. Capital Lease Obligations

Plant assets acquired by capitalized leases include the football stadium (\$10,992,000) and various items of equipment (\$33,802,647) which are included in the plant funds.

#### 5. Funds Held in Trust by Others

The University is the income beneficiary of various trusts which are held and controlled by independent trustees. For the years ended June 30, 1989 and 1988, the University received from these trusts income amounting to \$872,339 and \$779,192, respectively. The University has no equity interest in the principal of the trusts which, accordingly, is recorded at a nominal value of \$1 each. The 1989 income received from these funds is recorded in the current unrestricted fund for \$340,819 and in the current restricted fund for \$531,520.

#### 6. Pension Plans

Regular full-time employees, including faculty, are participants in the University of Kentucky Retirement Plan. The University of Kentucky Retirement Plan consists of five groups as follows:

. . .

Group I Established July 1, 1964, for faculty and certain administrative officials.

Group II Established July 1, 1971, for staff members in the clerical, technical and service categories.

Group III Established July 1, 1972, for staff
members in the managerial, professional
and scientific categories.

Group IV Established January 1, 1973, for staff members having U.S. Civil Service Retirement entitlement.

Group V

Established July 1, 1987, for staff members covered under the Federal Employees Retirement System that replaced Civil Service (those whose employment began during the period from January 1, 1984 to March 31, 1987). Staff members whose employment began after March 31, 1987 are under one of the above University of Kentucky Retirement Plans.

Participation in the University of Kentucky Retirement Plan in groups I, II, and III is mandatory for all faculty and staff members age 30 and older who have completed one year of service. Participation is voluntary to age 30 (after completion of one year of service). Participation in groups IV and V is voluntary.

The University of Kentucky has authorized three retirement plan carriers, effective July 1, 1988, as follows:

Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association/College Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA/CREF) Fidelity Institutional Services Company Twentieth Century Investors, Inc.

Under these fully funded group retirement plans, the University and plan participants make annual contributions to provide fully vested retirement benefits to employees upon retirement. The University's share of costs for these plans was \$17,981,917 and \$17,074,224 for 1989 and 1988, respectively. The University makes retirement contributions to the U. S. Civil Service for certain Cooperative Extension Service Employees in the College of Agriculture. These contributions amounted to \$1,144,219 and \$1,245,401 for 1989 and 1988, respectively.

In addition to retirement benefits provided from the group retirement plans, the University provides supplemental retirement income benefits to certain eligible employees in each of the retirement groups (see Note 7).

## 7. Minimum Annual Retirement Benefits and Supplemental Retirement Income

Employees in retirement groups I, II and III who were age 40 or older prior to the date of establishment of each group plan, and who were employed by the University prior to that date, qualify for the minimum annual retirement benefit provisions of the retirement plan.

Benefits for these eligible employees are based upon a percentage, determined through years of service, of the participant's annual salary in the last year of employment prior to retirement. Retirement benefits as determined are funded by each individual retiree's accumulation in the group retirement plan, with the balance, if necessary, provided by the University as supplemental retirement income.

The costs of supplemental retirement income benefits are not accrued but are recognized when payments are made to retirees. Supplemental retirement benefit payments were approximately \$3,960,000 for 1989 and \$3,981,000 for 1988. The projected estimate of annual payments for supplemental retirement benefits for each of the next five fiscal years is as follows:

The Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky has appropriated funds to the University for the payment of supplemental retirement income benefits since adoption of the group retirement plans, and is expected to continue this practice; however, the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky prohibits the commitment of future revenues beyond the end of the current biennium.

Accordingly; the University does not recognize the liability for supplemental retirement income benefits during the service life of covered employees, but recognizes its costs when funds are appropriated by the Legislature and payments are made.

The University intends to continue paying supplemental retirement income benefits contingent upon the Legislature continuing to appropriate funds required to make these payments.

The latest actuarial valuation was prepared as of June 30, 1988 by TIAA. The actuarial present value of vested and non-vested accumulated supplemental retirement income benefits as determined by this valuation, utilizing an assumed rate of return of 8%, was \$37,068,000.

## 8. Health Insurance Benefits for Retirees

The University provides health care benefits to retirees who have minimum of fifteen years service. The University recognizes the cost of providing those benefits by expensing the insurance premiums in the year paid. These premiums were \$757,831 and \$574,973 for the years ended June 30, 1989 and 1988, respectively.

### 9. Construction Commitments

Estimated cost to complete construction under contract at June 30, 1989 is approximately \$18,192,000. Such construction is principally financed by Commonwealth of Kentucky appropriations and long-term bonds payable.

#### 10. Contingencies

The University is defendant in several lawsuits; however, University officials are of the opinion, based on advice of in-house legal counsel, that the ultimate outcome of all litigation will not have a material effect on the future operations or financial position of the University beyond the amounts already provided.

#### 11. Pledges

Pledges from The University of Kentucky Fellows totaling approximately \$6,100,000, primarily for various restricted uses, are expected to be collected over the next ten years. Pledges totaling \$212,751 have been made for construction of the football sports complex and are payable over the next two years. Also, deferred gifts through insurance, known bequests and irrevocable trusts in which the University has a remainder interest are estimated to be at least \$18,000,000.

Pledges to the affiliated corporations are as follows: University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation, Inc., \$1,923,079 expected to be collected over the next three years; University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc., \$1,552,626 expected to be collected over the next six years.

It is not practical to estimate the net realizable value of such pledges and deferred gifts.

#### 12. Grants and Contracts Awarded

At June 30, 1989, grants and contracts awarded to the University and the University of Kentucky Research Foundation, but not expended, amounted to \$49,497,000, and are not shown in these financial statements.

#### 13. Reclassifications

Certain account classifications for fiscal 1988 have been reclassified to reflect comparability with account classifications adopted for fiscal 1989 with no effect on previously reported fund balances.

RANDALL JONES \$9,200,000 University of Kentucky Consolidated Re: Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series K, dated September 1, 1989 We have acted as bond counsel in connection with the issuance by the Board of Trustees of University of Kentucky, a public body corporate and educational institution and agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (the "Issuer") of \$9,200,000 of University of Kentucky Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series K, dated September 1, 1989 (the "Bonds") pursuant to Sections 162.340 to 162.380 and 58.010 through 58.140, inclusive, of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, as amended (the "Act") and a resolution of the sections 162.380 and 162.38 tion adopted by the Issuer on September 20, 1960 (the "Basic Resolution"), and a resolution adopted by the Issuer on June 20, 1989 (the "Series K Resolution"), for the purpose of financing the cost, not otherwise provided, of the Series K Project, as described in the Series K Resolution, as a part of the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project of the Issuer. We have examined the law and the transcript of proceedings pursuant to which the Bonds have been authorized and issued, and such other matters as we deem necessary to render this opinion. As to questions of fact material to our opinion, we have relied upon representations of the Issuer contained in the Basic Resolution, the Series K Resolution, and in the transcript of proceedings and other certifications of public officials furnished to us, without undertaking to verify the same by independent investigation. Based on our examination, we are of the opinion, as of the date hereof and under existing law, as follows: The Issuer is a duly created and validly existing public body corporate and educational institution and agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, with the power to adopt the Basic Resolution and the Series K Resolution, perform the agreements on its part contained therein and issue the Bonds. The Basic Resolution and the Series K Resolution have been duly adopted by the Issuer and constitute valid and binding obligations of the Issuer enforceable upon the Issuer. The Bonds have been duly authorized, executed and delivered by the Issuer and are valid and binding special obligations of the Issuer payable solely from the sources provided therefor in the Basic Resolution and the Series K Resolution. 4. The Bonds, and any additional parity bonds hereto-fore and hereafter issued and outstanding under the terms of the

Basic Resolution are and will be payable from and constitute a first charge and lien upon the defined Revenues (student registration fees from all students attending the University of Kentucky at Lexington, Kentucky) derived by the Issuer from the operation of its Consolidated Educational Buildings Project, which consists of all of the educational buildings and appurtenant facilities of the University of Kentucky in Fayette County, Kentucky, now in existence and hereafter acquired, excluding housing facilities and facilities used exclusively for athletics and excluding educational buildings which are leased rather than owned by the Issuer. As further security for the Bonds and any additional parity bonds heretofore and hereafter issued pursuant to the Basic Resolution, there is created and granted by Sections 162.350 and 162.200 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes a statutory mortgage lien upon the Consolidated Educational Buildings Project of the Issuer.

- 5. The interest on the Bonds (a) is excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes, and (b) is not an item of tax preference for purposes of the federal alternative minimum tax imposed on individuals and corporations; however, it should be noted that, for the purpose of computing the alternative minimum tax imposed on corporations (as defined for federal income tax purposes), such interest is taken into account in determining adjusted net book income (adjusted current earnings for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1989). The opinion set forth in clause (a) above is subject to the condition that the Issuer comply with all applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), that must be satisfied subsequent to the issuance of the Bonds in order that interest thereon be (or continue to be) excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Failure to comply with such requirements could cause the interest on the Bonds to be so included in gross income retroactive to the date of issuance of the Bonds. The Issuer has made a valid and binding covenant to comply with all such requirements. We express no opinion regarding other federal tax consequences arising with respect to the Bonds.
- 6. The interest on the Bonds is exempt from Kentucky income taxes and the Bonds are exempt from ad valorem taxation by the Commonwealth of Kentucky (except inheritance taxes) and all of its political subdivisions.
- 7. The Bonds are not "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code.

It is to be understood that the rights of the owners of the Bonds and the enforceability of the Bonds and the Basic Resolution and the Series K Resolution may be subject to bankruptcy, insolvency, reorganization, moratorium and other similar laws affecting creditors' rights heretofore or hereafter enacted to the extent constitutionally applicable, and that their enforcement may also be subject to the exercise of judicial discretion in appropriate cases.

Management of short-term investments will continue to be the full responsibility of the University.

#### MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is entered into October 1, 1989, by and between the University of Kentucky (hereinafter called University) and The Office for Investment and Debt Management of the Finance and Administration Cabinet, Commonwealth of Kentucky (hereinafter called OIDM).

In consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- The University appoints OIDM as an economic and investment advisor/manager for short-term investments.
  - a. OIDM will provide information, as requested by the University, relating to current market conditions and forecasts, available investment vehicles, and recommended asset allocations.
  - b. OIDM will execute investment transactions for the University as requested by the Controller and Treasurer of the University or his designated representative.
  - c. Securities purchased for the University by OIDM will be managed in efforts to take advantage of opportunities to add value to the University's portfolio.
  - d. OIDM at its discretion will allow the University to participate in the Commonwealth's Securities Lending Program.

# UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY POLICY STATEMENT FOR SHORT-TERM INVESTMENTS

#### I. Investment objective

With respect to short-term investment of available current funds, it is the objective of the University of Kentucky to maximize yield consistent with security, liquidity and the period of investment.

#### II. Investment guidelines

- A. Such funds be invested in fixed income securities.
- B. Investments be limited to:
  - 1. direct obligations of the U. S. Treasury
  - 2. other appropriate securities issued by federal agencies
  - 3. repurchase agreements of U. S. government obligations (described in (1) and (2) above)
  - 4. certificates of deposit collateralized by U. S. government obligations or general obligations of the University of Kentucky
- C. Investments generally limited to periods up to 24 months.
- D. The Investment Committee of the Board of Trustees be authorized to make investments under these policies. The Controller and Treasurer performs current funds investment activities under the supervision of the Investment Committee.
