Nicaraguan forces got \$10.5 million in aid from U.S.

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration provided \$10.4 million in economic support to non-Marxist, "democratic forces" in Nicaragua last year, the State Department confirmed yesterday.

last year, the state Department con-firmed yesters provided openly and not as part of a covert operation, although it was done without public fanfare. It went to such private sector groups as business associations, labor unions, producers' cooperatives, voluntary organizations and community self-help groups.

The State Department confirmed the operations and said another \$7.4 million is earmarked for the private sector this year.

million is earmaneed to sector this year. Word of the private-sector aid came against a flurry of news reports that the administration had initiated a covert CIA operation to destabilize the Nicaraguan government, using a

cover U.A operation to destabilize the Nicaraguan government, using a \$19 million fund.

The New York Times reported yesterday that covert financial aid was being provided to individuals and private organizations in Nicaragua for the purpose of bolstering moderate elements there.

While the State Department declined to comment on the newspaper report, the information on private-sector aid showed that at least some of the kind of assistance the newspaper said was being provided covertly was actually passing through open channels, although without publicity.

"Since the coming to power of the Sandinistas in July 1979, our policy has been to support the democratic forces which exist in Nicaragua," the department said in response to a question about the aid effort.

The administration cut off official

The administration cut of official conomic aid to the Nicaraguan government on April 1 after concluding that the Sandinistas were providing arms to rebels in El Salvador. However, aid to the private sector continued without apparent let-up. "We have not deviated in our support of political and economic pluralism in Nicaragua, but this assistance has been open, we have consulted with the U.S. Congress, and this assistance has had the knowlegers of the government of Nicaragua," the department said.

The game proved absolutely nothing. Neither team had reached a peak, and the two teams are playing quite different ball now than they were then.


CBS would have had people think they were seeing an early battle for the 1982 NCAA finals.

LOS ANGELES — Comedian and actor John Belushi, who died of an overdose of injected heroin and cocaine, had been using the drugs for years, three associates reportedly say. But his widow says the actor "wasn't a junkie."

Both drugs were discovered in the Sunset Strip bungalow where Belushi was found dead, Los

Angeles County Coroner Thomas Noguchi said Wednesday.

Three unidentified show business colleagues who said they knew Belushi well were quoted by the Los Angeles Times yesterday saying he had been injecting himself with heroin for the past two years.

One producer said Belushi's wife, Judith Jacklin, was instrumental in keeping him avay from heroin, and "If she had been with him, he'd still be alive today."

In an interview with the Chicago Sun-Times, Jacklin said Belushi "had Troubles, but he wasn't a junkie," and didn't like needles.

"People who knew him always said he wouldn't shoot up," she said. "Something weird happened. People who knew him him knew he wasn't a junkie. I don't know what happened." Meanwhile, a doctor who had treated Belushi said the portly comic had been warned that an allergy he suffered would increase the chance of respiratory failure if he used cocaine.

The Tricent II submarine-based missile is under development and is not expected to be available until the late 1900s or early 1990s. It is to be the first sea-based missile capable of destroying so-called "hard targets" such as missiles in concrete silos.

The missiles will replace the Polaris missiles, which have a range of about 2.500 miles, now being used by the British in their four missile-carrying submarines. Each British Resolution-class submarine carries 16 Polaris missiles.

In a report to be published today in Science magazine, Dr. Calvin C. Willhite says the cyanide poison that is a natural part of Lactrile caused numerous skeletal malformations in the offspring of hamsters.

"This is the first time birth defects have been found with Lactrile," Willhite said in a telephone interview.





FRANKFORT — The House Appropriations and Revenue Committee gave its approval yesterday to measures that would increase the state's wholesale liquor tax and raise fees Kentuckians must pay for a number of services.

The liquor-tax bill was an amended version of one proposed by Gov. John Y. Brown Jr., who suggested a 10 percent levy to replace the state's existing taxes on wholesale and retail liquor sales.
