"No Place Like Home"

Memorial Coliseum has been the exclusive basketball home of the Kentucky Lady Kats since the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976. Throughout 24 seasons in Memorial, the Wildcats had many great moments while establishing a winning tradition recognized throughout the world.

The Lady Kats have proudly carried on that tradition, and Memorial Coliseum is still known as the home of a winning, high-class program. Since moving into the Coliseum for the 1975-76 season, the Lady Kats have compiled a 75-18 record at home. In the past three seasons, they have lost only three times on their floor. And midway through last season, they had extended a homecourt win streak to 31 games before falling to Memphis State, 70-69.

Plans for construction of Memorial Coliseum began in 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University and recommended a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health services, physical education and recreation." The 11,500-seat Coliseum was completed in 1950, and cost \$3,925,000 to build.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along the Avenue of Champions on the UK campus, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games and Athletic Department offices, but also serves as the site of other sporting events, as well as concerts and lectures.

TERRY HALL

After two outstanding seasons at Kentucky and possessing a career winning percentage of .657 in eight years as a collegiate coach, Terry Hall is now regarded as one of the top coaches in the women's collegiate ranks.

Hall guided the 1981-82 edition of the Lady Kats to their finest season ever, a 24-8 campaign that ended in the Midwest Regional championship, where Kentucky fell to No. 1-ranked and eventual National Champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor.

By the end of the season, the Lady Kats were playing so well that Hall proclaimed, "If we had been in any other region, we would have been in the Final Four."

That Kentucky performed so well is largely credited to Hall, who at the start of the season was faced with the task of rebuilding a team that lost two starters off the front line while adding only one player—a guard—to the roster. But somehow Kentucky improved. The Midwest Regional final was one step farther than the Lady Kats had advanced the previous year, in Hall's rookie season at Kentucky. That year UK finished with a 25-6 record after losing at Maryland in the AlAW's round of 16 finalists. Following that season, Hall was honored as the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference Coach of the Year.

Hall now has a 49-14 record at UK for a winning percentage of .777. Her career record is 142-74 over 8 years. The highlight of her career at Kentucky came toward the end of last season, when the Lady Kats defeated favored Tennessee 80-74 to capture the Southeastern Conference championship on their home floor.

Coach Terry Hall



Before coming to Kentucky, Hall coached for five seasons at Louisville, where her teams compiled a 79-54 record. In her final season at U of L, she guided the Lady Cardinals to their first Metro Conference title as they defeated a tough Memphis State team in the tournament finale. Hall also coached tennis and softball while at U of L.

Hall's initial coaching job was a one-year assignment at Eastern Kentucky University, where the Lady Colonels produced a 14-6 record and a KWIC title for the rookie coach. Her experience up to that point had been in the high school ranks, where she coached Louisville Butler to a 69-33 record and two Jefferson County titles in five seasons.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall attended Indiana State University, where she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball before graduating in 1966. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Also an outstanding softball player, Hall enjoys competing in a fast-pitch league in Louisville. She has been named to several softball all-star teams and is an exceptional pitcher.

Hall earned a degree in Health and P.E. from ISU in 1966, and received a Master's Degree in P.E. from Eastern Kentucky University in 1974.



An excellent student, Lynn earned Academic All-American honors at William and Mary while earning a 3.97 grade point average over four years. She was also a member of the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society. A native of St. Petersburg, FL, Lynn has spent several summers working basketball camps, including the B/C All-Stars Basketball Camp, the Manatee Junior College Basketball Camp, and the Lady Kat Basketball Camp. As a player at William and Mary, Lynn is ranked No. 1 on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,504 career points. She averaged 18.3 points over four seasons with a 56.2 field goal percentage.

Outlook

1982 LADY KATS RISING TO THE TOP

Over the past few years, the ultimate goal has always been the same for the Kentucky Lady Kats—reaching the Final Four. When the freshman group of Valerie Still, Patty Jo Hedges and Lea Wise arrived at Kentucky in 1979, the goal became infinitely more reachable. Now they are seniors, and that is exactly why Coach Terry Hall feels her team has its best shot yet.

'Experience," she says with a smile. "We've got three seniors who have matured as people and had a variety of experiences on the court. They've played international ball together, and they've been running our

plays together for three years.'

Still, Hedges and Wise have all started for three seasons at Kentucky. Also in the lineup this season will be freshman forward Leslie Nichols and second-year starter Lisa Collins. "Lisa is also very experienced," said Hall of the junior forward. "She's been through a lot of pressure situations and came through them quite well."

Some pollsters have placed Kentucky in the Top 10 because of Valerie Still alone. The 6-foot-1 center is generally regarded as one of the top three or four players in the nation. Some believe she is the best.

'Valerie has just improved and improved and improved since she's been here," says Hall of the two-time All-American. "She's stronger and more confident. I'd say she's definitely in the top three or four players.'

Still was sixth in scoring (24.8) and fifth in rebounding (14.8) last season. She has led Kentucky in scoring and rebounding for three consecutive seasons and was named the team's Most Valuable Player each time. Of course, Still is always quick to point out that she would not be quite as successful without the benefit of what may be the best backcourt in the nation. Coach Hall agrees with that assessment.

"I don't think there is a better ball-handling point guard than Patty Jo," she said. 'And Lea is probably one of the finest shooting guards in the nation. They are both quick and versatile, and I do believe they are one of the nation's finest backcourts. They haven't always been consistent, but as I said, they have matured and I expect more consistency from them.

Wise and Collins give Kentucky a double outside shooting threat. Wise hit 48.6 percent of her shots last season and averaged 11.6 points. Collins, at 5-10, plays small forward, but most of her shots come from the 20-25-foot range. She shot 51.4 percent and averaged 7.7 points last season.

Four returning starters are not the only reason Coach Hall believes this team will be the best Kentucky squad yet. "I think we improved the team with our recruiting," she said.

Leslie Nichols, 6-0, and Karen Mosley, 6-2, are the top recruits. "Last season our main worry was lack of height," Hall said. 'And we've definitely improved that. Karen is a super defensive rebounder and Leslie is a super offensive rebounder.

'Last year other teams' goals were to keep Val off the boards and jump over our small forwards. That won't be so easy to do this year.'

Nichols could emerge as one of the top freshmen in the country this season. She started every game in the team's six-game tour of Japan this summer and averaged 10.2 points and 7.7 rebounds.

Junior Jody Runge will also supply depth and experience to the front line. At 6-2, Runge averaged 3.8 points and 2.7 rebounds as a top reserve last season. Coming in at the guard spots will be junior Donna Martin (3.1 ppg, 1.5 rpg) and sophomore Diane Stephens (3.4 ppg, 1.5 rpg).


Coach Hall is satisfied with her team's depth. "Our philosophy really is to use eight players," she said. "And we've got eight, maybe nine, strong players."

It all adds up to an optimistic outlook, she says. "Good speed, good quickness, good rebounding, good depth and a good attitude to this point," she said. "We could be interesting."

Of course, there is need for some improvement. "We've got to improve on defense," she said. "We didn't play a good man-to-man last year. We didn't help out or contain our person like we should have."

Hall also believes her team will have trouble against an exceptionally tall team. "If we play someone who has a 6-7 center and 6-2 or 6-3 forwards, it will make it tough on us. We've improved our size, but we're still not as tall as a lot of teams. Most of our height comes off the bench."

Kentucky's schedule, rated eighth in toughness last year, may be a little more difficult this season, Hall says. "We've got Old Dominion again, Ohio State, Tennessee twice, Georgia twice and Memphis State and South Carolina again. Plus, we've added Rutgers, Auburn and Alabama. I'd say we'll have our hands full."

UK's Institute for Mining and Minerals Research is a national leader in energy-related research.



In the arts, close to 100,000 people attend the many art, music and theater productions at UK. UK's new Center for the Arts contains a 400-seat recital hall, a 1,500-seat concert hall and the 20,000 square-foot UK Art Museum.

Sue Feamster joined the Athletics Association in 1978 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the Director of Women's Athletics prior to her appointment as Assistant Director of Athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named Assistant Director of Campus Recreation in 1972 and Director of Women's Athletics in 1974. Feamster served as president of the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference in 1975-77. And, has been honored as one of the founders of the KWIC

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in

college, she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. Degree and graduated with honors. Feamster earned a M.S. Degree in Administration from Kentucky.

The NCAA named Feamster to three of its elite committees in 1981 when it began serving women's athletics. She serves on the Special Legislative Committee, Division I Steering Committee and TV Committee. Feamster will also begin to serve on the top committee for the NCAA in August, the NCAA Council. In addition to her duties with NCAA, she also serves as Secretary to the SEC Women's Athletic Directors' Council.

A former teacher and counselor at the Lincoln School for the exceptionally brilliant, Feamster is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Feamster of Frankfort.

FRANK HAM Assistant Director of Athletics

Frank Ham became assistant director of athletics soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as director of athletics.



"The Coach Terry Hall Show will be something fresh and innovative—not your standard coach's show," promises Channel 36 Sports Director Kenny Rice. Believed to be one of two weekly women's coach's shows in the nation, the Terry Hall Show will be seen on Sunday afternoons at 4 p.m., with the time slot subject to change after the first of the year.

Channel 36 Station Manager Bill Service saw the growing interest in Lady Kats basketball and decided the time was right to initiate the show. "We think the team has a good shot at making the Final Four," said Rice. "And we want to be right there with them."

Rice, a 1980 graduate of UK who hails from Eastern, Ky., joined the Channel 36 staff in October of 1980, and was named Sports Director in March of 1982. While serving as sports anchor on the weekend newscasts, Rice helped his station from third place to first in the local weekend ratings. "We had a really good weekend staff," he said.

The Terry Hall Show will not be just a studio production. "We plan to go on location alot, do profiles on players, and maybe

take a look at the women's NCAA, give people not real familiar with women's basketball a better idea of what's going on in the sport," said Rice. "And, of course, we'll look at upcoming opponents, show highlights and the like."

Rice, 26, is in his 11th year in the sportscasting business, having worked for eight years at WDOC radio station in Garrett, and for two years as Sports Director for a cable television station in that town. He also does correspondent work for ESPN, Cable News Network and ABC.

7 PATTY JO HEDGES

5-7, Senior Guard Louisville, KY



Possibly the most underrated player in the game, Patty Jo continually astounds fans and foes alike, but seldom attracts the national attention many believe she deserves. Last season she was named to the all-tournament squads of EVERY tournament the Lady Kats competed in, but failed to make the All-Southeastern Conference team. She was selected to the SEC All-tournament team, however, and was also named to the Detroit Classic, Lady Kat Invitational and Midwest Regional all-tourney squads. She holds both single game and tournament assists records in the Southeastern Conference, Detroit Classic and Lady Kat Invitational tournaments.

Although Patty Jo is recognized primarily as a great passer and ball handler, she managed to hit double figures 18 times last season while averaging 10.1 points. An outstanding leaper, she also was third on the team in rebounding with a 4.2 average. Additionally, she shattered her own season assists record of 181 by dealing out 209. She already owns the career Lady Kat assists mark with 531 over three seasons. Other UK records she holds are assists in a game (16), steals in a game (8), steals in a season (78) and steals in a career (199).

PJ failed to start for Kentucky in her first 13 games as a freshman. But since then, she has missed only one start. Following her freshman year, she was named All-Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference. She was also selected to the SEC All-Tournament team that year.

LEA WISE

5-7, Senior Guard Lexington, KY



An All-Southeastern Conference guard in 1982, Lea has been instrumental in guiding a fast-paced, fast-breaking Kentucky offense that is regarded as one of the best in the nation. In three seasons Lea has missed only four starting assignments at Kentucky and her calming influence and steady play has helped the Lady Kats to a 73-19 record during her time here.

Last season Lea was second on the team in scoring with an average of 11.6 points while shooting 48.6 percent from the field. She averaged 4.2 assists, and dealt out more than 100 (134) for the third consecutive year. The high point of Lea's junior season came in the NCAA playoffs in a game against Illinois. She hit 15 of 16 field goal attempts and scored a career-high 30 points as UK won 88-80 and advanced to the Midwest Regional. She scored in double figures 16 times and led the team in scoring three times and in rebounding once. She was also named to the Lady Kat Invitational all-tournament team.

Lea is also recognized as a top defensive player, and was named UK's Best Defender both last year and following her sophomore season. She was also honored with the 110 Percent Award last year.

As a freshman, Lea was named to the All-Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference team, an organization that the Lady Kats no longer belong to.

Her performance against Illinois put Lea in the UK record books for best field goal percentage in a single game (93.7). She also holds that honor among Lady Kat Invitational records, with a 13-for-17 (76.5) performance against Cincinnati last season.

A local player of immense popularity, Lea is a product of Lafayette High School, where she was selected to All-City, All-District, All-Region and All-State teams. She led the Lady Generals to the State Championship game her senior year, and was named All-State Tournament for her efforts.

7 VALERIE STILL

6-1, Senior Center/Forward Kansas City, MO

Regarded by some as the best player in the nation, Valerie continues to rewrite the UK record books while being showered with regional and national honors. Following last season, she was named to virtually every All-America first-team—Kodak, American Women's Sports Federation, Street and Smith—and was a finalist for the prestigious Wade Trophy, which honors the top female basketball player in the nation.

In the final NCAA statistical rankings, Valerie was listed in three categories. She was fifth in rebounding at 14.3, sixth in scoring at 24.8 and 13th in field goal percentage at 58.2. She led the nation in rebounding throughout the season and was still on top going into the NCAA playoffs.

The highlight of Valerie's junior season came during the Southeastern Conference tournament, which Kentucky won on its home floor. She was named Most Valuable Player while averaging 30 points and 11.3 rebounds in three games. She also was outstanding in the other three tournaments Kentucky competed in. She was Most Valuable Player of the Lady Kat Invitational, Best Offensive Player in the Detroit Classic, and was named to the Midwest Regional All-tournament team. Val was also named Most Valuable Player of the six-game series when the Lady Kats toured Japan last summer.

Remarkably, Valerie holds six career Lady Kat records after only three seasons. She also possesses three individual single game and four individual season records. But perhaps her most impressive claim at this basketball-rich school is Valerie's ranking as second on the all-time (men's or women's) UK scoring list. Her 2,063 career points are only 75 points shy of Dan Issel's top mark of 2,138.

She holds Lady Kat single game records for most points (41), most rebounds (27) and most field goals made (18). Her individual season records are for most points (794), most field goals made (329), most field goal attempts (565) and most rebounds (457). She also holds four tournament and three single game records for the Southeastern Conference tournament. She has made All-SEC team three straight years and was named to the first All-SEC league team last season.


Valerie's outstanding accomplishments have come despite the fact that she has been playing out of position for the past two seasons. After a superb freshman season at her natural forward spot, Valerie has started at center the past two seasons. With the recruitment of two freshmen centers, however, Coach Terry Hall is hopeful that Val can once again see playing time at forward.

Out of position or not, Valerie has managed to lead Kentucky in scoring and rebounding for three consecutive seasons. She has been named Most Valuable Player of the team for three seasons as a result.





LISA COLLINS

5-10, Junior Forward/Guard Corbin, KY



After playing guard throughout her high school career and splitting time between guard and forward her freshman year at UK, Lisa was in an unusual position when she was called upon to start at forward last season. But she responded well, and before her sophomore year was over, she had become one of Kentucky's most reliable players. After a slow start, Lisa finished third in assists (89), third in rebounding (4.2) and fifth in scoring (7.7). She shot 51.4 percent from the field, 88.4 from the free throw line, and turned the ball over only 50 times in over 800 minutes of action.

Lisa scored in double figures 13 times, and in 11 of the team's last 16 games. Her performance in the Southeastern Conference tournament—in which she scored 14, 14 and 12 points in three games—was a key to UK winning the title, according to Coach Hall. And she continued to play well in the team's tour of Japan last summer, as she averaged 9.6 points and 4.2 rebounds.

An excellent free throw shooter, Lisa broke her own record for consecutive free throws made when she hit 20 straight last season. She had hit 19 in a row as a freshman. She now has a career free throw percentage of 90.0. She has also hit well from the field, and owns a career field goal percentage mark of 52.2.

As a high school player, Lisa led her Laurel County (Ky.) team to three consecutive state championships. A three-time all-state player, she was named Kentucky's "Miss Basketball" and was chosen first-team Parade All-American after her senior season.

At the Lady Kats' Awards Banquet last spring, Lisa was recipient of the Coach's Award, which goes to the player possessing the outstanding qualities a coach looks for.

Playing in the awesome shadow of All-America center Valerie Still, Jody has a sometimes thankless job with the Lady Kats. But in reality, her role is one of the most important on the squad. Playing in all but one game last season, Jody was called upon frequently to rest Still against some of the top teams and top centers in the nation. And sometimes her performances were outstanding. One particularly important outing came against ninth-ranked Georgia last season. With Still in foul trouble, Jody came in and hit four-of-four shots as Kentucky survived a three-point victory.

A good shooter, Jody has hit 51.3 percent in two seasons as a Lady Kat. As a senior at Waukon (IA) High School, she averaged 38.8 points and once scored 81 points in a game. In Iowa, however, teams are divided into offense and defense. The lack of experience on defense was a handicap when she first arrived at Kentucky, but hard work has begun to pay off, and Jody was named Most Improved Player at the Lady Kats Awards Banquet last spring.


In the team's summer tour of Japan, Jody performed well and was usually the first substitute sent into the game for Kentucky. She will likely be used in a similar role this season.



Donna, who walked on to the Lady Kats squad midway through her freshman season, was awarded an athletic scholarship following her first full season at Kentucky last spring. Her performance in the Lady Kats' last eight games was one reason the team finished so strongly. A sometimes erratic player, her increase in playing time seemed to settle Donna down, which benefited both her and the team toward the season's end. With the transfer of guard Lori Edgington following last summer, Donna will likely be the first guard substitute into the game for Kentucky this season.

After graduating from Lexington's Tates Creek High School, Donna went to Valdosta State University to play basketball. When she decided to return home, she was eagerly welcomed onto the Kentucky squad, and averaged 2.1 points and 1.2 rebounds in nine games. Last season, she played in 17 games, including all of UK's playoff contests, and increased her averages to 3.1 points and 1.5 rebounds. Her top offensive effort was an 11-point output against Florida, when she canned three-of-four from the field and five-of-eight from the line.

An exceptionally quick player, and a good ball handler and leaper, Donna earned All-State honors at Tates Creek. She averaged 14 points and six rebounds and was named team captain her senior year.

The Lady Kats also enjoyed a four-day vacation stopover in

Hawaii on the return home.

UK Coach Terry Hall believes the trip will benefit the team in many ways when the season starts. "I think the most important thing is the team unity a trip like this provides," she said. "The girls had a very good time together and experienced a lot of exciting and interesting things together. It's made them all closer, which is very good for us.






