Weight-lifting accident led to man's death

An electrical engineering graduate student died
Wednesday night from injuries apparently caused
by the weight-lifting equipment he was using in
the Seaton Center, but there are conflicting
reports on how the accident happened.
The Lexington-Fayette County Coroner's
office reported yesterday that Kok Eng Lim, 23,
died "due to soft tissue hemorrhage within the
neck consistent with an injury caused by weightlifting equipment."
Lim, a Malaysian native, collapsed while exercising at the Seaton Center Wednesday night. He
was pronounced dead at 7-20 pm., about an hour
after arriving at the UK Chandler Medical Center.

on interviews with witnesses, Lim apparently
dropped the bar of the

his neck.

Lee said he is still in disbelief over Lim's death.

"He was so healthy and so young," Lee said.

McComas said the police department is still investigating the death and will issue a report through the coroner's office within the next few days.

Lee said funeral arrangements have not been made because Lim's family does not know when they can make the trip from Malaysia.

Students want access to more computer labs

Those who are tired of standing in line to transfer Chemistry homework are getting a chance to wice their opinion.

A sign up sheet, inside the Chemistry-Physics computer lab, saks for better access to computers, and to the software found only in that lab.

The sheet also asks for an increase in the number of computers in, or near, the chemistry-physics computer lab, and the placements of software found only in that lab into other university computer labs.

Biology freshman Marsha Kammerer said he agrees with the proposal.

"I think since everyone lives all around campus, I think that (the programs) should be available in every computer lab, Kammerer said.

Since the implementation of electronic homework for Chemistry 10% and 10%, there have been a steady increase of users in the lab.

"One thing I have noticed since last spring is that there are

chemistry classes using computer programs, "said student lab consultant Mark Rasche. Jack Stewart, public services coordinator of Margaret I. King Library microlabs said adding computers, furniture and software to the Chemistry-Physics lab is expensive. After the purchase of the equipment, lab managers would have to connect it to the campus network coxting between \$5,000-\$10,000.

"The microlabs budget is especially tight this year. With the adding of two microlabs in Boyd and Dickey Hall it's hard to purchase the equipment." Programs like Table Curve, which is used by many chemistry students, is only available in the Chemistry-Physics lab. Stewart said in order to run these programs elsewhere on campus, they would have to buy licenses for each of the programs and the licenses are also expensive.

"We have to pick and choose where these programs are going to be placed," Stewart said. "It's not that we're insensitive to the issue. It's simply a resource issue."





New freedom to farm bill bad for consumers, farmers

hen the United States' farm program began, it planned to provide an inexpensive and abundant food supply for the

to provide an inexpensive and abundant food supply for the nation.

Designed to help consumers, the program works with the nation's farmers to raise the necessary amounts of each crop. It sets bases on grain crops. For example, X number of corn bushels or wheat must be produced to provide for human and animal consumption. It ensures that farmer, plant enough acres of each crop to produce the needed yield. It aids conservation efforts by placing at-risk acres in set-aside programs.

Besides providing for the consumer, the farm bill helps some farmers remain in business to provide that food supply. Subsidies provided to farmers don't earn money for them in most cases, but



will be low and the price will rise to, say, \$12 per bushel. Everyone is going to plant soybeans due to the high price. With no farm program, farmers will not have to maintain their base for corn (or any other crop) and so these acres can be used to grow soybeans. The corn supply will not be met. Who is going to bother to plant corn earning \$3 when they could earn \$12 per bushel with soybeans?

The lack of other crops could.

The lack of other crops could create shortages of many consumer products and animal feeds, not to mention the dissater it will cause in our enormous grain export market.

American consumers currently spend 11 percent of their disposable income on food, the lowest of any nation in the world.

This is because the current farm program holds food supplies

In reality, this is not a farm bill we're talking about, but rather a consumer food bill using farmers as its tools to guarantee a given production.

One final fact: more than a half of the money in the farm bill goes into programs like food stamps and school lunch programs while much less is directed toward subsidies, aiding consumers as much as farmers.

sidies, aiding consumers as much as farmers.

With discussion on the future of government programs in farming comes the argument of which system of farming is best for ensuring our nation's food supply: a farming farm or corporate farms.

The family farm is more than just an ideal American tradition. It is a classic example of private enterprise and ownership of a small business.

Family farms have the advan-

nall business. Family farms have the advan-

tage of the owner who is also the laborer.

tage of the owner who is also the laborer.

Family land and livestock owners care more about the quality of the products they raise, the practices they use and the condition of the environment than the hired labor and absentee owners of corporate agriculture. Family farms have a greater personal stake in their operation, hired workers for a corporate farm do not have that connection.

In a study done in 1993 by UK for the Kentucky Pork Producers Association, it was found that a herd of 12,000 sows (the female animals that produce young) brought more than \$90 million into the economy. If these sows were owned in Kentucky by a corporate farm such as Murphy Farms or Carroll Foods, Inc., they would all be raised in one location, creating an intense concen-

tration of waste and odor.
But what about the \$90 million they are bringing to the state's economy?

they are bringing to the state's economy?

Much would go out of state to the farms' corporate headquarters in North Carolina.

However, if 100 family farms each owned 120 sows and raised heir offspring, the waste and odor would not be concentrated, nor would they create a problem. And the \$90 million would all be kept in the state and fed into local economies. Economic advantage to the family farm.

Family farms are just as efficient and stable in production as corporate agriculture, if not more so, because they are effectively managed businesses with great adaptability to changing situations.


