21 years and counting against Gators

Through the first seven games of the football season, the UK football leam had achieved numerous firsts, snapped several daunting losing streaks and convinced many doubters that it could contend for a Southeast-em Conference championship. But on Saturday night, one of the longest losing streaks — and perhaps the most lopsided — slipped right through the Cats' defense.

defense. Behind 334 yards of total offense from Florida quarter-back Tim Tebow, the No. 14 Florida Gators continued their two-plus decades of dominance over UK, downing the Cats 45-37 in front of 71,024 fans, the largest crowd in Commonwealth



Stadium history. team," head coach Rich Brooks said. "But we didn't do enough good things tonight against that in the critical situations to get

the victory."

The Florida win extended the Gators' (5-2, 3-2 Southeast-em Conference) winning streak to 21 games and severely hurt the Cats' (6-2, 2-2 SEC) chances of winning the SEC or making a Bowl Championship Series bowl. The Cats fell to No. 14 in the Associated Press poll, dropping from the top 10 for the second time this season, and fell from the No. 7 to No. 14 ranking in the BCS standings.

"We're still tied in the loss column with the two-loss teams for the lead in the SEC East, Brooks said." The disappointing high is, if we could have been able to win tonight, we would have been alloen with one loss."

Speech to focus on link between health, education

The days of faking a fever to stay home from school may be over, but the role that real sicknesses and the quality of medical treatment plays in academics continues into col-lege.

academics continues into col-lege.

This relationship will be the subject of a speech today by Jeanita Richardson, an associate professor in the Professional Ed-ucation Unit from Virginia State

University.

"Even for college kids, you can't learn if you're not healthy," said Sonja Feist-Price, the director of the UK's African-American Studies and Research Program. "It really ties in with socio-economic issues that im-

pact learning."

Richardson will present her speech, titled "Our Children Can't Wait A Case for School-Health Partnership," today at 4 p.m. at the Martin Luther King Jr. Cultural Center.
"I'm hoping that we have a large audience so that we can understand and learn how health care and education/learning intersect," Feist-Price said.

Richardson's speech is the first in UK's annual Carter G. Woodson lecture series, which targets critical health and social factors among African-Americans.

The series, presented by the African-American Studies and Research Program, typi-cally comprises four lectures, but this year there will be

five.

Boyce Watkins, a civilrights activist, is coming to
campus Oct. 29 as the fifth
speaker to discuss race relations in his speech, "Race
Still Matters in the 21st Cen-

tury."

Bringing in Watkins seemed appropriate, Feist-Price said, considering what has happened recently in race relations, in-

recently in race relations, in-cluding a controversial cartoon in the Kernel and a racial slut-that was written on a black stu-dent's dormitory door. Watkins could contribute to the conversation, she said, "not only as it relates to what's hap-pening at UK but on a broader national level; not just alk about it, but identify ways we can be change agents."

Democrats dominating GOP in election fundraising

MELVILLE, N.Y. — An energized liberal base and conservatives distillusionment with Republican policies have reversed the GOP's usual grid prompers designed the properties of the properties of

cans. Democratic contenders hold an even wider 2-1 lead in terms of cash on hand.

Compare that with 1995, when Kansas Republican Bob Dole nearly matched Bill Clinton in campaign contributions.

— Dole raised \$54.8 million — even though Clinton was a sitting president.

Citizenship, said a lack of en-thusiasm for Republican candi-dates appears to be why more than a third of top donors who buoyed the election of President Bush have not backed any can-didate

didate.

He said Republican giving may be down because no Republican candidate has thus far pushed clearly ahead of the crowded GOP field, and because pushed clearly ahead of the crowded GOP field, and because some potential Republican frontuniners have been saddled with personal challenges, including former New York mayor Rudy Giuliani's past marital difficulties, and concerns among Christian conservatives over Romney's Mormon faith.

Leading Democratic recipients are Clinton, 580.9 million; Cobama, 580.2 million; Gormer North Carolina Sen. John Edwards, \$30.3 million; and Ill Richards Son. 518.7 million, according to a tally by the Center for Responsive Politics.

Republican leaders include Romney, \$62.8 million; Giuliani, \$47.2 million; Ciuliani, \$47.2 million; Arizona Sen. John McCain, \$52.1 million; and actor Fred Thompson with \$12.8 million.






from a season ago, when the Cool Cats beat the Owls 8-2.



Many college fans believed that ESPN's "College Game-Day" would never come to Lex-ington, for football at least. Those prognosticators never en-visioned the scene that sur-rounded the big orange Game-Day bus parked between W.T. Young Library and Rose Street Saturday.

Sturday. With the UK-Florida game selected as the backdrop for the nation's largest college football pregame show, ESPN analysts Lee Corso and Kirk Herbstreit, along with host Chris Fowler, arrived in Lexington to broad-cast live in front of 11,000 fans on the lawn outside W.T. Young Library and to millions of viewers watching on their televisions.

It was the first time the show had ever come to Lexington for a football game.

In the show's 21st season on the air, "College GameDay" has blossomed from a strictly in-studio pregame show, as it was in its 1987 beginnings, to its durrent version broadcasting live from college campuses and stadiums across the nation. 

More women should hold office at the state level

As with its high rates of obesity and diabetes, Kentucky is near the bottom of another national list: the number of elected female officials. Kentucky ranks 49th in the country in the number of women serving in the state legislature, according to a report released Oct. 9 by Secretary of State Trey, Grayson, as reported in an Oct. 10 Kernel article.

The state has made positive strides, as noted in the report. For example, almost a third of the court system is made up of women, and, the overall number of elected women has increased since the 2005 report.

But even with the increase, Kentucky slid from 48th place in female results of the country of the country

Les Fugate, deputy assistant secretary of state, said the low numbers do not come from an unwillingness to elect women, but from a lack of candi-

"It's not that Kentuckians aren't electing women; it's that women aren't running," Fugate said. "We're not do-ing enough to nurture young women to become elected officials."

State Rep. Kathy Stein, D-Lexing, suggested that current legislators State Rep. Kathy Stein, D-Lexing-ton, suggested that current legislators should reach out to young women and encourage their participation in poli-tics and public policy. These are the kind of proactive and personal steps that should be taken by current lead-ers to shift the makeup of Kentucky politics.

Unfortunately, funding for AE is limited and obtained through non-recurring, non-centralized sources. Student Government recognizes the value of services available in The Study and annually votes to contribute as much as their budget permits to help underwrite the peer-tutoring program. Without sustained, reliable funding, it is unlikely that multiple locations can be established beyond the current one on the third floor of the Commons Complex.

We are currently discussing the possibility of "Remote Access" tutoring, which would enable students to participate in sessions online from their dorn rooms or W.T. Young Library. Obviously, this could dramatically increase the number of students receiving help in subjects that challenge their ability to pass classes and consequently remain enrolled at UK.

The Sept. 24 editorial suggests that administrators should be concerned about retention rates rather than admissions numbers, but UK Provost Kumble Subbaswamy indicated in the story that this is already the case. Perhaps administrators concerns should now turn to bolstering the existing programs that directly support student retention. As summarized in the 2007 report by the Academic Enhancement External Review Committee, "Given appropriate support and resources, (AE) can be a centerpiece of Undergrandate Education programming that contributes to the goals of the Top 20 Business Plan."

While the average student may not care about the administration's business goals, they do care if university services are easy to find and student-friendly. Since its inception in 2004, AE has developed its programs with these goals in mind. Located in a spacious area directly above Commons Market. The Study's atmosphere is focused yet easual. Since the tutors are also undergraduates, communication is non-intimidating and effective. Far from handing over "the right answer," tutors model learning skills for a given subject.

Tutoring is offered on a walk-in basis, Mpnday through Thursday from 3 to 10 p.m. and Sunday from 6 to 10 p.m. and and chemistry tutors are always available, but a complete weekly Schedule can be found at The Study's Web site (www.uky.edu/UG/Study). 


