A a meeting of the Executive Committee, held in President Barker's office, August 25, 1915, there were present Messrs. Edelen, Terrell, Trown, Johnson, Nichols, Brock and Stoll. he minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. he reports of President Tarker, ean inderson and Dean Lafferty were reported, read and ordered to be recorded. They are as follows:-

TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE STATE UNIVERSITY LEXINGTON KY.

Gentlemen:

Several of the projects drawn up by Professor Mutchler for the purpose of carrying forward the Agricultural work
under the Smith-Lever bill and the contract between State University and the United States Secretary of Agriculture, have
been disapproved by Dr. Kastle, Dean of the College of Agric
culture, and the work to be done under these projects, is at
a stand still. he Federal authorities are insisting that
we forward to them some written proposal for the work in
question, and as I have not been able to harmonize the difference between Dr. Kastle and Dr. Mutchler, and thereby satisfy the Federal authorities, have concluded to bring the
matter before the Executive Committee and place it in your
hands for final settlement. I have invited both Dr. Kastle
and Dr. Mutchler to meet you today, and you will hear the
respective contentions as to the morits in the matter, and
decide, as in your wisdom seems best.

I also bring before you a list of the names of the new instructors and holders of fellowships who have been appointed under the authority of the budget as you!

In the selection of these instructors as _____ of fellowships, I have been guided entirely by the wisdom of the dean of the department in which they are to teach, and have no doubt that he has done the very best that could be done under the circumstances and I therefore, beg that you ratify the appointment of these several people.

Dean Anderson of the College of Mechanical and Electrical Engineering, desired an increase in the sclary of Professor Duncan, an instructor in his department, and also an increase in that of Professor Cassidy. I desire to have rofessor Anderson heard by the Committee, so that you can fully obtain the merits of his claim. If there is any way possible that Professor nderson's claim can be granted, hope it will be done, as I believe they are entirely meritorious, and his department will be seriously hampered if something is not done to relieve it.

Since your last session, I have been taking my vacation by visiting the various farmers' chautauguas that have been held throughout the State, and have made speeches at several of them. I have six or eight speeches to make before the season closes. I mention this to show you the basis of the statement that Kentucky is making greater advances along the lines of scientific agricultural education, than ever before

in its history, and in 'y opinion, the deep interest taken by the people in agricultural work, will be shown, this fall, by the increase in the roster of the University. It seems to me that every thing points to a great increase in the mamber of students in the whole University.

President Senry S.Barker State University of Aentucky Dear Siz:

In accordance with the order of the Executive Committee. I herewith submit to you the monthly report from the College of Mechanical and Electrical Angineering, for their consideration.

The last month has been devoted to putting the building and equipment in shape for the fall term. A room 9X12 feet, has been built between the walls of the addinistration part of the bailding, the engine room and the wood shop, to be used as an of ice for wood shop instructor. We believe that the character of work done in our wood shop can be materially improved by having a place to systematically handle the assignment of work in some formal way.

The building has been painted and thorou, hly cleaned and all of the apparatus and machinory has been repaired and over-hauled, so that every thing is in readiness for the opening of the fall term.

Two sets of letters have been sent to the editors of the newspapers of the state, to the alumni, the high school graduated; a letter has been written to every high school principal and county superintendent. We have written a letter to all of our underclassmen, calling attention to the necessity of making up any conditions that they might have recorded against them; the value of spending the summer in some engineering work, and advisability of reporting on time at the beginning of the fall term. He have written to every underclassmen who had any condition, stating specifically the delinquincy and urging that this condition be removed before the beginning of the fall term. He have sent two bulletins to high school graduates, underclassmen, hentucky editors, alumni, county superintendents, county judges and attorneys, high school principals and a number of prominent business men in Lexington.

Te have received more direct requests for infommation concerning the College of Mechanical and Electrical Cangineering

than ever before, and from present prospects, our enrollment will be larger than in any previous year. Be have undertaken, through Mr. John Dicker, the repairs of buildings on the grounds. Mr. Dicker has employed a number of students and excellent service has been rendered.

I respectfully request that you consider the following recommendation:

First - that \$400.00 be transferred from the 1915-16 budget item "Laboratory Equipment and Supply" to increase the salary was not increased, and in justice to Mr. Duncan, his salary should be placed on the same basis as the other assistant professors in the department. Second: that \$400.00 be added to the budget appropriation of the department for the purpose of increasing the salary of Perpy Cassidy from 1200.00 to \$1600.00. I regard Mr. Cassidy as one of the most brilliant men that we have ever had in the organization and in order to retain his services, it will be necessary to give him this year, a salary of \$1600.00.

I would respectfully request the privilege of appearing before the Board and discussing the subject of Mr. Cassidy's increase in salary.

To the Executive Committee of State University, dentlemen:

I herewith submit my monthly report and state that I have made arrangements for the employment of Mr. R.M. Hutch-craft Jr. of Paris, fentucky, to take the place in our law faculty which is authorized in our budget for this year.

In making out our course of work for the coming year we have added two new subjects to our course and also have provided that all students entering under the age of twenty-one years shall do at least 15 units of college literary work before the completion of the law course. This, in effect increases our course to full four years for students of that class. It is generally conceded now that that amount of literary work at least should be done by every man who expects to practice law. We have adopted the use of illustrative case books in most of our work except three classes in the senior year, where we are using case books exclusively. This plan of instruction is now the most popular in the law schools of the American Association.

I have made inventory of all the property of the law department, listing each item and its value and filed same with the business agent, that the same might be recorded as required by the Board of Trustees.

I believe that the coming year will be exceedingly

prosperous, and that our work should be the best of any year in our history.

The employment of Mr. R.B. Hutchcraft, Jr. as an instructor in the school of law is now approved. Upon motion made seconded and unanimously carried upon a yea and nay vote, the sum of \$400.00 is appropriated out of the general funds of the University as an addition to the salary of Mr. Cassidy. an instructor in the College of Machanical and Electrical Engineering, and \$300.00 added to the salary of Mr. Duncan and \$100.00 to the salary of Mr. Mollau, each of whom is an instructor in the same Gollege. The last two sums are to be taken out of the appropriation to the Mechanical and lectrical Engineering College in the budget for the present year.

At this point andiscussion arose concerning the Home Demonstration and Girls' Club work in the extention work of Common Economics of the Agricultural Extention work. ean astle of the Agricultural College, was heard by the Committee, and also Dr. Mutchler, Gead of the Agricultural Extention work. After both was passed upon a yea and havy vote:

BE IT RESOLVED that it is the sense of the Beard that the project in Home Demonstration and Girls' work and the project known as Extention work in Home Economics, be consolidated in one project, under the leader, and that the Superintendent of the Agricultural Extention be Requested to redreft the projects in accordance with this resolution, and by him, submitted to the Dean of the ollege of Agriculture for his approval.

Be it further resolved that the title of $^{\mathbb{T},\,^{\mathfrak{A}}}.$ Bryant be assistant Superintendent of Agricultural Extention.

The resolution was adopted. Upon motion made and seconded, the Committee then adjourned.
