Fate of many bills unknown in final week of Assembly

FRANKFORT — The final full week of the 1982 General Assembly, although heetic, did not resemble the frenetic pace of the past, according to legislative leaders.

Even so, the state's 138 lawmakers found themselves grappling with questions concerning a taxes, unemployment, banking, drunk driving and a number of other issues.

As the week ended, it remained unclear what form Gov. John Y. Brown's proposals to increase liquor and truck taxes would take before receiving the legislature.

In the Senate, yet another change was approved in the liquor-tax measure, the result being the removal of a provision to repeat the fair-trade law and the restructuring of the tax rate.

Space shuttle scheduled to land today

Space information available through NASA's UK office

NASA'S UK Technology Applica-tions Program makes knowledge about the space program available to state and local businessmen and leaders, Program Director William Strong said. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration established the campus office in February 1977 to develop strategies aimed at increas-

ing the use of science and technology in the public sector
"We're not involved with basic research; we're involved with taking the results of hard science and technology to give information to the leaders of our state." Strong said.

The office responds to requests for information from public or private sectors and attempts to apply the knowledge gained from the space program towards the request, he said.

NASA has amassed a wide variety of technology and knowledge from the space program — including up-to-date techniques on management, computer programming and research, he said.

The NASA/UK TAP office received and responded to 879 requests for information last fiscal year – ranging from advice on the proper operation of an aluminum recycling program in Maysville to information on the latest technology on computers and management for state government.

NASA/UK TAP office perceived and developmental planners in designing better community service projects and developmental planners in designing better community service projects and meaning the said. "We're trying to be the service arm of NASA," Strong said. "We go out and deal with the people on a one-to-one basis, providing information to help solve their problems."

The NASA/UK TAP office service arm of NASA, "Strong said information service they provided during the last fiscal year saved about \$400,000 in research expenditures by public and private organizations, Strong said.

And about \$35 percent of the office's clients reported a savings in research time, which totaled about 9,000 hours.

Dinkle and Bradford best choice for SA

Inis year's Student Association presidential/vice presidential campaigns have been relatively calm, compared to past years, but in contrast, the individual qualities and platforms of each candidate are unusually clear-

cut.
Chief planks of each platform are continued lobbying for student financial aid, concentration on improving communications with the student body and increasing concern for the quality of academic programs and teacher evaluation systems.

evaluation systems.

Other issues include: improving campus lighting and safety, opposition to mining of Robinson Forest and increased flexibility in dormitory visitation hours.

The candidates themselves are, for the most

part, a well-qualified group, and their pro-posals reflect real concern and thorough

Jim Dinkle, running for the presidency, has served this year as a Communications senator, chaired the Political Affairs committee and vice chaired the Senate Review com-- two of the Senate's most important

mittee — two of the Senate's most important committees. His running mate, David Brad-ford, has served as a senator-at-large. Will Dupree, running with Bill Taylor for the presidency and vice presidency respectively, has been a member of the SA administration

his running mate, Doug Kennedy, are the most unusual candidates in the race. Although neither have been formal members of SA in the past (Kennedy is a member of the Student Center Board), they have mounted a serious and surprisingly successful campaign centered on making SA more responsive to the average student. Despite their inexperience, their candidacies are as legitimate as those of their op

ponents.

In terms of experience, Will Dupree is obviously the best-qualified candidate. He has held responsible positions in the SA administration for the past two years and has made valuable connections with Kentucky's powers-that-be as director of the lobbying effect.

His stands on the issues, while vague in places, are realistic and based on his past experience. As the candidate endorsed by the present administration of Britt Brockman and Bobby Clark, he would continue to build on their initiatives, particularly in the area of behaving and consumer protection (i.e. the lobbying and consumer protection (i.e. the General Telephone rate hike suit). His ideas and programs would thus draw directly on those that have already been tried and proven. But when it comes to past service, both Dupre

presidency and vice presidency respectively. Dupree and Taylor fall flat on their faces, has been a member of the SA administration for two years. This year, he has served as both comptroller and chief lobbyist. Taylor has been the subject of numerous *Kernel* stories—he proved unable to keep track of the served as a B&E senator this year and is president of AGR fraternity.

Presidential candidate Keith McKinney and some and expenditures despite numerous request from the senate for such an accounting, and when he finally

prepared a mid-year financial report, he made several serious mistakes in addition and subtraction that later had to be publicly corrected, much to his chagrin, to avoid the allot-ment of non-existent funds.

The end result of this fumbling has been the removal of money from the Student Organization Financial Assistance fund to ensure SA's continued operation and the de facto replacement of Dupree as comptroller with an administrative assistant majoring in accounting (a change of titles was avoided, apparently for notifical reasons).

ministrative assistant majoring in accounting (a change of titles was avoided, apparently for political reasons).

Taylor's competence is equally questionable. His attendance at committee meetings has been poor and his contribution nil. His qualifications as a vice presidential candidate are a mystery.

McKinney and Kennedy, while lacking experience, have demonstrated a wealth of sincerity. Unlike many of the students on this campus, they believe the ineffectuality of SA in the past is not so much an indictment of the organization itself as the people who run it, and they propose to attack the heart of the problem by doing everything in their power to increase the range and scope of student involvement in the SA while decentralizing the power structure, allowing the real representatives of the cathadate. structure, allowing the real representatives of the students — the senators — a greater share

the students — the senators — a greater share of responsibility.

The Kernel has been equally concerned with this problem, and would eagerly endorse McKinney and Kennedy but for a few important considerations. For one, their inex-

perience, while allowing fresh and innovative approaches to the problems facing SA, will probably prove a liablity in the long run. The leadership of SA requires a certain degree of familiarity with the organization that can only be developed by coming up through the ranks. Learning the ropes at the top is, potentially, very hazardous

Learning the ropes at the top is, potentially, very hazardous.

Also, the conservative stands taken by the two on several issues, particularly dorn visitation and teacher evaluations, is not altogether with our thinking. Both are badly in need of reform, and McKinney and Kennedy's status-quo positions on these issues would be regressive.

Thus, the Kernel endorses the Dinkle/Bradford ticket without reservation. Dinkle has repeatedly proven his integrity and concern for the students and has proven particlarly effective as chairman of the Political Affairs committee, bringing one of the best lineups of speakers to this campus in recent memory. His competence and dedication are unquestionable

tionable.

The same goes for Bradford, whose research into the dorm visitation issue was professional, impeccable and well-presented. An open, outgoing, intelligent individual, he would be a tremendous asset as vice president.

Also, Dinkle and Bradfords' positions on the issues are forward-looking and original. Together, they promise to bring an openness and aggressiveness to SA that has been seriously lacking in the past.

LYNCHBURG, Va. — The former national field director for the Moral Majority is suing its founder for \$46 million, claiming the Rev. Jerry Falwell breached an agreement for an elaborate fund-rasing and political organizing campaign. Charles Cade filed the suit Friday in U.S. District Court. He said the fund-rasing plan, aimed at Christian fundamentalists in four Southern states, could have raised up to \$45 million annually in West Virginia alone. Cade and a business partner, John Beachem, contend in the suit that they obtained verbal agreements in March and April 1981 for the plan from Falwell and Moral Majority officials in West Virginia, Arkansas, Mississippi and South Carolina. The two said Falwell deputy Ronald Godwin later ordered that they not be paid for the project.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — A 6-year-old girl charged with striking a 7-year-old girl in the nose with a stick will not be tried as an adult as plann-

with a stick will not be tried as an adult as plann-ed, a state prosecutor said yesterday. State Attorney Eugene Whitworth said the case of Nancy Jo Burch will have to be taken up in juvenile court or dropped. The child is accused of hitting Shirley Lynn Nickolls in an after-school tiff last Nov. 4.

On Friday, Circuit Court Judge R.A. Green sent the case to Superior Court. Whitworth was then forced to file aggravated assault charges in Superior Court or drop the matter. Whitworth said he would decide soon what to do about the case of Ronnie Decker, a 13-year-old who is accused of pinning Shirjey Lynn's arms behind her back while Nancy Jo allegedly struck her.

WASHINGTON — The Senate Budget Commit-tee begins work tomorrow on a 1983 spending plan that, unlike last year, is almost certain to displease President Reagan.
At least five of the 22 members of the Senate committee are vying for support of their alter-native budget plans to reduce a 1983 deficit now projected at \$86. billion to \$121 billion. Each plan contains at least one of the following elements that Reagan has rejected often in public — much higher taxes, less spending for defense and a cut in cost-of-living increases in Social Security.

WASHINGTON — Thousands of demonstrators gathered in a park across the street from the White House Saturday to protest U.S. activities in El Salvador on the eve of elections in the war-torn Central American country. Similar activities were staged in a few other cities in the United States and abroad, the largest being in Seattle, where a crowd estimated by police at 4,000 marched through downtown.

Capping a ceremony attended by about 2,000 people, 125 Vietnam veterans and dignitaries dug into the wet earth near the Lincoln

Memorial.
The \$7 million project, built with private donations on two acres in Constitution Gardens, will be dedicated next Nov. 11, Veterans Day.
Inscribed on the memorial will be the names of the \$7,414 American men and women who died in the war.

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Despite the significance tied to yesterday's national election, the course of El Salvador's next government could well rest on tough negotiations for a coalition rather than directly on the voting. Neither of the two major parties is considered likely to get the 31 seats needed for control of the 60 seats in the Constituent Assembly being elected. That means they may scramble for support from the four smaller rightist parties to control the assembly and choose a new government.

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

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
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
