Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, September 17, 1996.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 1:00 p.m. (Lexington time) on Tuesday, September 17, 1996 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower.

A. Meeting Opened

Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Chairperson, called the meeting to order at 1:07 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Dr. Elissa Plattner.

B. Oath of Office Administered

Governor Breathitt asked Richard Plymale, General Counsel, to administer the oath of office to the following members:

Mr. Alan Aja, who will serve as student trustee for the 1996-97 academic year.

Mr. John (Jack) R. Guthrie, appointed by Governor Paul E. Patton to replace Marian Moore Sims, for a term expiring June 30, 2002.

Professor Loys L. Mather, reelected faculty representative, for a term expiring June 30, 1999.

Mr. C. Frank Shoop, reappointed by Governor Paul E. Patton, for a term expiring June 30, 2002.

Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson, reappointed by Governor Paul E. Patton, for a term expiring June 30, 2002.

President Wethington congratulated the new members and welcomed them to the Board. He also congratulated Mr. Shoop and Mr. Wilcoxson on their reappointments.

Governor Breathitt welcomed the new members. He informed the new members that this is a united Board that supports the President and his administration. He expressed pleasure in having them on the Board.

C. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. Alan Aja, Mr. Ted Bates, Mrs. Kay Shropshire Bell, Governor Edward T. Breathitt (Chairperson), Mr. Paul W. Chellgren, Mr. Merwin Grayson, Mr. John "Jack" Guthrie, Mr. James F. Hardyman, Professor Loys L. Mather, Dr. Robert P. Meriwether, Mr. Billy Joe Miles, Professor Jim Miller, Dr. Elissa Plattner, Professor Deborah Powell, Mr. Steven S. Reed, Mr. C. Frank Shoop, and Mr. Billy B. Wilcoxson. Absent from the meeting were

Mr. Robert N. Clay, Mrs. Lois C. Weinberg, and Mr. Martin Welenken. The University administration was represented by President Charles T. Wethington, Jr.; Chancellors Ben W. Carr, James W. Holsinger, and Elisabeth Zinser; Vice Presidents Joseph T. Burch, Fitzgerald Bramwell, Edward A. Carter, George DeBin, and Eugene Williams; John J. Piecoro, Assistant to the President for Administrative Affairs; Dr. Juanita Fleming, Special Assistant for Academic Affairs; Mr. C. M. Newton, Director of Athletics, and Mr. Richard E. Plymale, General Counsel.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chairperson declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 1:12 p.m.

D. Approval of Minutes

Governor Breathitt said that the Minutes of the Board meeting on Tuesday, June 11, 1996 had been distributed and asked for any additions or corrections. Mr. Miles moved that the Minutes be approved as distributed. Mr. Guthrie seconded the motion, and it carried.

E. Nomination of Officers and Executive Committee

Under the Governing Regulations, officers of the Board and the Executive Committee are elected annually at the September meeting. Governor Breathitt called upon Mrs. Bell to preside and receive the report of the Nominating Committee. Mr. Wilcoxson, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee, placed the following slate of officers for 1996-97 in nomination:

On behalf of the Nominating Committee, Mr. Wilcoxson moved that these officers be approved for 1996-97. Mrs. Bell asked for nominations from the floor. Mr. Wilcoxson's motion, seconded by Mr. Shoop, carried unanimously.

Mr. Wilcoxson placed the following slate of Executive Committee members for 1996-97 in nomination:

On behalf of the Nominating Committee, Mr. Wilcoxson moved that these individuals be approved as the Executive Committee for 1996-97. Mrs. Bell asked for nominations from the floor. Mr. Wilcoxson's motion was seconded by Mr. Miles and passed. Governor Breathitt presided for the remainder of the meeting as Chairperson.

Governor Breathitt expressed his deepest appreciation to the Board for their confidence.

President Wethington congratulated Governor Breathitt on his re-election and his willingness to continue in the role of Chairperson of the Board. He also expressed pleasure in the re-election of the other officers and thanked them for their willingness to serve another year. President Wethington said that he was delighted with the Board. It is an excellent Board with excellent leadership. One of the reasons the University is making progress today is that the University has a very fine Board of Trustees that is much interested in the University and is willing to give their time, efforts, and commitments to making this a better university.

F. President's Report to the Board of Trustees (PR 1)

President Wethington called attention to the following items in PR 1:

1. Seventy-three National Merit Scholars, including 58 from Kentucky, and three National Achievement Scholars are included in the freshman class at the University of Kentucky this fall.
2. Maysville Community College distance learning class includes four campuses, Paducah, Owensboro, Henderson and Maysville. More than 100 students are enrolled in Maysville Community College's pulp and paper technology class which is made available throughout Kentucky in distance learning classrooms.
3. Chandler Medical Center announces a pilot oral physician program to begin in the summer of 1997. Graduates of the program will be awarded two doctoral degrees: a doctor of dental medicine (D.M.D.) and a doctor of medicine (M.D.).
4. Ashland Community College and Marshall University have developed a joint program, "Two-Plus-Two" agreement. Students may complete the two-year associate degree program in business technology at Ashland Community College and enroll at Marshall for the final two years of study required for a bachelor's degree in business administration.

5. Based on the findings of a team of students, faculty and staff members, several initiatives are under way at the University aimed at accelerated progress in the University's development as an "inclusive learning community."
6. Karl B. Raitz, a 20-year geography professor at the University, was named the 1996-97 Distinguished Professor in the College of Arts and Sciences, an honor bestowed since 1944 by vote of the college's faculty. Robert M. Ireland, history professor, was named the college's Distinguished Teacher.
7. The baccalaureate program of the College of Architecture has been reaccredited for five years by the National Architectural Accrediting Board.
8. The Good Samaritan Foundation will provide \$301,000 to the College of Nursing over the next year for internships involving both faculty and students in rural, urban and school settings. The Foundation has also provided more than \$91,000 to the College of Medicine for the upcoming year.

President Wethington asked the members to peruse the other items in the report at their leisure.

President Wethington reported that the U.S. News and World Report indicates that the University of Kentucky has been singled out as one of the best values in higher education. It is a ranking that does speak favorably to the kinds of quality that has been achieved and the price of education at this institution.

G. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointments, actions and/or other staff changes which require Board action; and that the report relative to appointments and/or changes already approved by the administration be accepted. Mr. Shoop moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mrs. Bell, carried. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Proposed Amendment to the Governing Regulations (PR 3A)

President Wethington reminded the Board that the proposed amendment to the Governing Regulation was received at the June 11, 1996 meeting for preliminary consideration. He recommended that the proposed amendment designating the Vice President of University Relations as the person in charge in the president's absence be approved. Mr. Bates moved approval. Mr. Chellgren seconded the motion, and it carried. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Naming of Building and Complex The Hilary J. Boone Tennis Center (PR 3B)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the name change of "The Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center" to "The Hilary J. Boone Tennis Center" for the present indoor tennis building and the new outdoor tennis stadium. On motion made by Mr. Wilcoxson and seconded by Dr. Meriwether, PR 3B was approved. (See PR 3B at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Candidates for Degrees - Community College System (PR 4A)

President Wethington recommended that the degrees specified in PR 4A be awarded to the persons named, upon certification that the requirements for those degrees have been satisfactorily completed. Professor Miller moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Chellgren, passed. (See PR 4A at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Candidates for Degrees - University System (PR 5A)

On the recommendation of President Wethington, Mr. Shoop moved that the list of candidates for degrees in the Lexington Campus and Medical Center sectors as recommended in PR 5A be approved. The motion was seconded by Mr. Reed and carried. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Change in Name of Degree Programs (PR 5B)

President Wethington recommended that the Board approve the change in the name of the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree programs in the College of Communications and Information Studies for Journalism/Advertising majors to the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science in Integrated Strategic Communication. Professor Mather moved approval. His motion, seconded by Mr. Reed, passed. (See PR 5B at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Appointments/Reappointments to University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation (PR 5C)

President Wethington recommended that approval be given to the appointments of James R. Bell, III, Ronald G. Geary, Timothy L. Haymaker, and Roy W. Mundy, II and the reappointments of William R. Hartman and Henry L. Jackson as members of the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation for four-year terms beginning immediately and extending through the Spring 2000 Board meeting. Mr. Grayson moved approval of PR 5C. Mr. Guthrie seconded the motion, and it carried. (See PR 5C at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Acceptance of Audit Report for the University of Kentucky for 1995-96 (FCR 1)

Mr. Hardymon, Chairperson of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee met and reviewed the items to present to the Board for action. FCR 1 is the audit report for the University for 1995-96. It is the consolidated financial statement audited by Deloitte & Touche LLP, Certified Public Accountants, and includes the statements of the University of Kentucky and all of the affiliated corporations. The most important document is the letter from Deloitte & Touche showing that the University has a clean audit of the consolidated statements. He reviewed some of the items in the report and said that this is a good, solid report. The Finance Committee reviewed the report and recommends approval. On motion made by Mr. Hardymon, seconded by Mr. Chellgren and carried, FCR 1 was approved. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.) Representatives from Deloitte & Touche were recognized and given a round of applause.

O. Disposal of Surplus Property (FCR 2)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 2 relates to Disposal of Surplus Property. He reviewed Attachment I and moved approval. Dr. Meriwether seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Report of Leases (FCR 3)

Mr. Hardymon stated that FCR 3 is the Report of Leases that the Board must accept. He reported that the rates were very competitive and said that the Finance Committee reviewed the leases. He moved approval of FCR 3. Mr. Chellgren seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Approval of Lease (FCR 4)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 4 is an addendum of a lease between the University of Kentucky (Home Care) and Kentucky Medical Services Foundation. He noted that the Board must approve this lease before it is executed. The total amount is up to \$48,800 which is above the \$30,000 per year approval level for administrative action. An \$8.00 per square foot rate has been negotiated for an additional 100 square feet of space. He moved approval of FCR 4. His motion, seconded by Mr. Shoop, passed. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Capital Construction Report (FCR 5)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Capital Construction Report for the three months ending June 30, 1996 be accepted. He noted that this report refers to only projects that had activity within this quarter, and there are 75

active projects in the report. He said that the Committee checked on the progress of the projects and were informed that the projects are on schedule. Mr. Reed seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

S. Purchase of Property (FCR 6)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board approve the purchase of real property located at 435 Pennsylvania Avenue at an appraised price of \$139,000. A map was displayed showing the location of the property in the acquisition area and master plan. His motion, seconded by Dr. Meriwether, passed. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

T. 1996-97 Budget Revisions (FCR 7)

Mr. Hardymon stated that FCR 7 is a quarterly report involving the budget revisions predicted for the remainder of the year. He remarked about the Sales and Services item in the General Fund category and the Expenditures at Hazard Community College in the Restricted Funds category. He moved approval of FCR 7. His motion, seconded by Mr. Chellgren, passed. (See FCR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

U. Patent Assignment (FCR 8)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 7 is an invention that provides a method for improving consolidation of powder resin. It essentially sorts out the particles according to diameter so as to form a particle mixture with optimal close packing of the three-dimensional spaces between the powder resin particles which cuts down the number of voids. He moved approval of FCR 8. Mr. Grayson seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

V. Patent Assignment (FCR 9)

Mr. Hardymon stated that FCR 9 involves an invention that relates to certain improvements in anti-idiotypic monoclonal antibody 1A7 and use for the treatment of melanoma and small cell carcinoma. He moved approval of FCR 9. His motion was seconded by Mr. Shoop and passed. (See FCR 9 at the end of the Minutes.)

W. Estate of Catharine Whitley Dulaney (FCR 10)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 10 recommends that the Board accept a distribution of \$1,000,000 from the Estate of Catharine W. Dulaney. He noted that \$200,000 had been received earlier, and this brings the amount to \$1,200,000. A final distribution in excess of \$450,000 is expected later this year.

He moved approval of FCR 10. Mrs. Bell seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 10 at the end of the Minutes.)

X. Crounse Corporation Pledge (FCR 11)

Mr. Hardymon said the FCR 11 is a recommendation that the Board accept a pledge of \$100,000 from Crounse Corporation of Paducah, Kentucky to the University of Kentucky for the Maysville Community College's Partners in Progress Campaign. Crounse Corporation is an inland river transporter of freight and has designated its gift to Maysville Community College's Business and Technology Center. The pledge will be paid in five annual payments of \$20,000 beginning in December, 1996. He moved approval of FCR 11. The motion, seconded by Mr. Reed, passed. (See FCR 11 at the end of the Minutes.)

Y. Jack W. Graham Gift (FCR 12)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept a gift of \$100,000 from Jack W. Graham of Lexington, Kentucky, to the University of Kentucky for construction of a new Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity house. In addition to his contribution of \$100,000, Mr. Graham is paying for the construction project's architectural services which will be in excess of \$100,000. He noted that Mr. Graham attended the University of Kentucky in the late 1930's and was an SAE pledge. Mr. Bates seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 12 at the end of the Minutes.)

Z. Lake Cumberland Foundation, Inc. Gift (FCR 13)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 13 recommends that the Board accept a gift of \$150,000 from Lake Cumberland Foundation, Inc. of Somerset, Kentucky to Somerset Community College for its Allied Health Endowment Fund and to endow a nursing scholarship. The Lake Cumberland Foundation was created in 1994 as a result of the sale of Lake Cumberland Home Health Agency, Inc. to Columbia Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital. The foundation was to dispose of its assets through gifts to charitable organizations. In June of this year the foundation gave \$465,000 to 27 organizations. The foundation's gift was made in the name of Lake Cumberland Home Health Agency. Mr. Hardymon moved approval of FCR 13. The motion, seconded by Mr. Guthrie, passed. (See FCR 13 at the end of the Minutes.)

AA. Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust Gift (FCR 14)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept a gift of \$1,000,000 from the Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust of Miami, Florida, to the University of Kentucky for the Maxwell H. Gluck Equine Research Center in the College of Agriculture. This gift will enhance existing endowments previously

established by gifts from the Markey Trust. A total of \$750,000 will be added to the Wright-Markey Trust Endowment for the support of graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, research specialists and junior faculty at the Gluck Center. The remaining \$250,000 will be applied to the Warren Wright, Sr.-Lucille Market Chair currently held by Professor Charles Issell. The Trust was established under the provisions of the will of former Calumet Farm owner Lucille Parker Markey, who died in 1982. She directed that the Trust's assets be used to support and encourage basic research. Mr. Bates seconded the motion, and it carried. (See FCR 14 at the end of the Minutes.)

BB. Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust Gift and Establishment of Chair in Oncology Research (FCR 15)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept a gift of \$1,000,000 from the Lucille P. Markey Charitable Trust of Miami, Florida, to the University of Kentucky to establish and endow the Lucille P. Markey Chair in Oncology Research in the Lucille P. Markey Cancer Center in the College of Medicine. The income from the endowment will be devoted to the support and research expenses of a distinguished biomedical scientist in oncology research. He said that it is important to note that this gift brings the total from the Markey Charitable Trust to \$14 million dollars, and this is likely to be the last gift. His motion, seconded by Mr. Chellgren, carried. (See FCR 15 at the end of the Minutes.)

CC. Ohio Casualty Insurance Company Gift and Pledge (FCR 16)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board accept a gift of \$250,000 and a pledge of \$750,000 from Ohio Casualty Insurance Company of Hamilton, Ohio, to the University of Kentucky Athletic Association for expansion of the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services. The president and chief executive officer of Ohio Casualty Insurance Company is Lauren N. Patch, a Lexington native and 1973 graduate of the University of Kentucky. He has been a long-time supporter of the athletics program. The pledge will be paid in three annual installments of \$250,000 beginning in 1997. He noted that more than 400 student athletes have used the Center each year. Mr. Grayson seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 16 at the end of the Minutes.)

DD. William R. Willard, M.D., Ph.D. Professor of Dental Education (FCR 17)

Mr. Hardymon moved that the Board authorize the creation of an endowed professorship in the College of Dentistry entitled the William R. Willard, M.D., Ph.D. Professorship of Dental Education. Dr. William R. Willard was the founding vice president of the University of Kentucky Albert B. Chandler Medical Center. He helped plan and develop the Medical Center which opened in 1960. He served as vice president from 1956-70. Dr. Willard died in 1991. As a result of his innovative vision of health professions

education, the College of Dentistry became a national leader in dental education. Income from \$100,000 of this academic enrichment fund will fund the professorship. The motion was seconded by Mr. Guthrie and carried. (See FCR 17 at the end of the Minutes.)

EE. Hilary J. Boone Commitment (FCR 18)

Mr. Hardymon reflected on PR 3B, Naming of Building and Complex The Hilary J. Boone Tennis Center. He moved that the Board accept a commitment of \$400,000 from Hilary J. Boone to the University of Kentucky Athletic Association for expansion of the tennis center. Mr. Boone was captain of the tennis team in 1940. He has been a long-time supporter of the tennis program having previously given gifts of \$250,000 to the University of Kentucky Athletic Association to build the indoor tennis center, named in honor of him. Mr. Wilcoxson seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 18 at the end of the Minutes.)

FF. Resolution of Official Intent of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to Finance Construction of a Housing and Dining Project from Proceeds of a Proposed Issue of University of Kentucky Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds (FCR 19)

Mr. Hardymon said that FCR 19 involves a resolution expressing the official intent of the funds that will come from the bonds. In this case the intent is to finance the construction of a new student resident building to accommodate approximately 50 students, renovation of Cooperstown Apartment Buildings C and D and Shawneetown Apartment Buildings C and D, installation of a sprinkler system for Donovan Hall, renovation of elevators in Kirwan Blanding Residence Halls, and installation of an HVAC system in Donovan Hall food services area. It will come to approximately \$6.75 million. The Board's function is to approve a resolution showing intent to spend the money as stipulated in FCR 19. He moved approval of FCR 19. His motion, seconded by Mr. Reed, carried. (See FCR 19 at the end of the Minutes.)

GG. Sale of the South Farm, Tract A (FCR 20)

Mr. Hardymon stated that Tract A of the South Farm comprised of approximately 42.96 acres at the corner of Nicholasville Road and Man-O-War Boulevard in Lexington, Kentucky is determined no longer suited for the teaching, research or service needs of the University, and is declared surplus; that the Administration is authorized to seek two separate appraisals of this real property, then offer it for sale, in whole, by sealed bids, reserving the right to reject all bids; that all terms and conditions of the sale be returned to the Board for final approval; and that proceeds from the sale be reserved for the College of Agriculture.

He reported that the South Farm was bought in 1956 with private gift monies, federal grant monies, and restricted trust and agency funds of the College of Agriculture for the sum of \$270,000. No state appropriation was made for this acquisition. The use of the proceeds for College of Agriculture projects is in accord with the "Twenty-First Century Plan" for the College of Agriculture. This proposed use of the proceeds from the sale of the farm for a plant science research facility assures that College of Agriculture funds which were used to purchase the South Farm and advance research will continue to be used in support of the College of Agriculture. He said substantial continuing interest in the South Farm by prospective buyers is cause for this action at this time and moved approval of FCR 20. Mr. Grayson seconded the motion, and it passed. (See FCR 20 at the end of the Minutes.)

HH. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the Board, the Chairperson adjourned the meeting at 2:02 p.m.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. UK Extramural Funding Tops \$100 Million for Third Year in a Row

UK has received \$114,086,391 in grants, contracts and gifts from outside the University in the 1995-1996 fiscal year, the third year in a row UK has received more than \$100 million in such extramural funding. This is good news for the University, particularly in light of recent federal government spending cuts for research.

2. 73 National Merit Scholars in Freshman Class

Seventy-three National Merit Scholars -- including 58 from Kentucky -- and three National Achievement Scholars are included in the freshman class at UK this fall. The number is expected to keep UK in the top 10 nationally among public universities in the number of National Merit Scholars. National Achievement Scholarships are awarded by the National Merit Scholars Corporation in recognition of outstanding achievement by minority students.

3. Maysville CC Distance Learning Class Includes Four Campuses

Community college students in Paducah, Owensboro, Henderson and Maysville are enrolled in Maysville Community College's pulp and paper technology class. More than 100 students are enrolled in the class which is made available throughout Kentucky in distance learning classrooms. Instructor Joe Cable is assistant production manager at Inland Container Corporation, Maysville.

4. Medical Center Announces Pilot Oral Physician Program

UK's Chandler Medical Center is accepting applicants for a new, reform-oriented, pilot oral physician program to begin in the summer of 1997. Graduates of the program will be awarded two doctoral degrees: a doctor of dental medicine (D.M.D.) and a doctor of medicine (M.D.). The program was conceived to provide tomorrow's oral health professionals with the best possible education to reflect the changing patient population, advances in biotechnology, and the evolution of the health care environment in dentistry and medicine.

5. ACC and Marshall University Develop Joint Program

Ashland Community College and Marshall University have developed a new "Two-Plus-Two" agreement. Students may complete the two-year associate degree program in business technology at ACC and enroll at Marshall for the final two years of study required for a bachelor's degree in business administration. The program is part of an ongoing commitment to the economic development of the Tri-State region.

6. ASTeCC Fills Its Suites With Six Businesses

Space for businesses in UK's Advanced Science and Technology Commercialization Center has been filled. Less than two years after opening the center, ASTeCC is home to six businesses that are developing new technologies and ventures. ASTeCC provides quarters to BioProducts International; Valvoline, Incorporated; PromoGen; DeNovo Incorporated; K&K BioScience Incorporated; and Equine Biodiagnostics.

7. 'Inclusive Learning Community' Initiatives Under Way at UK

Based on the findings of a team of students, faculty and staff members, several initiatives are under way at UK aimed at accelerated progress in the University's development as an "inclusive learning community." The team members visited colleges and universities over the summer to collect and document ideas about campus social justice programs. Among the changes completed and planned at UK include an addition of a second section on diversity for the popular UK 101 series of classes for new students. Calendars of UK events, particularly those related to issues of cultural diversity, also are being revised and improved.

8. Ceremonies Welcome African-American Students

Both UK's Chandler Medical Center and the Lexington Campus welcomed African-American students with ceremonies at the beginning of the semester. The first Chandler Medical Center "Opening of the Way" ceremony, held August 29 at the Boone Faculty Center, centered on the students' declaration of commitment to excellence in pursuing their academic goals, and a reciprocal statement by Medical Center faculty to excellence in teaching. Nashid Fakhrid-Deen, director of minority affairs for the Community College System, delivered the keynote address. The Lexington Campus' first African-American New Student Convocation was conducted September 4. Titled "Striving for Excellence Without Excuse: Welcome to the Class of 2000," the convocation featured an address by Kim Burse, former secretary of the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet and a member of the UK Gatton College of Business and Economics Hall of Fame.

9. College of Dentistry Renovation Complete

The College of Dentistry formally dedicated a summer-long renovation project on August 21. Improvements covering more than 18,000 square feet were made on three floors of the college. The third-floor clinic, used to treat patients and educate dentists, received 60 new treatment stations. The sixth-floor preclinical laboratory also was renovated, and improvements were made in the Orofacial Pain Center on the fifth floor. The \$1.7 million renovation was funded by the college's dental practice.

10. Henderson Nursing Program is Reaccredited

Henderson Community College's nursing program, including the Owensboro Community College extension, has been reaccredited by the National League for Nursing. Twenty-two faculty members from both campuses were involved in the process. In 1963, Henderson Community College became the first college in Kentucky to establish a two-year associate degree in nursing. The nursing program admits approximately 80 students each year.

11. Harrodsburg Baby Receives Cultured Epidermal Autograft at UK Hospital

A 4-month-old Harrodsburg baby became the first patient at UK Hospital to receive a cultured epidermal autograft for a non-burn injury. After a large mole known as a giant congenital pigmented nevus which covered the baby's trunk and upper leg was surgically excised, Levi Lewis received a graft of laboratory-engineered skin tissue grown in culture from his own epidermal cells. The three-hour procedure was performed August 26. In addition to cosmetic improvement, excision of the giant congenital pigmented nevus was recommended because of the risk of malignant degeneration or melanoma if left untreated.

12. Raitz Named Arts and Sciences Distinguished Professor

Karl B. Raitz, a 20-year UK geography professor, was named the 1996-97 Distinguished Professor in the College of Arts and Sciences, an honor bestowed since 1944 by vote of the college's faculty. Raitz will give the 1997 Distinguished Arts and Sciences Professor Lecture in the spring. Robert M. Ireland, history, was named the college's Distinguished Teacher. The announcements were made at the college's annual convocation on September 3.

13. College of Architecture Program Reaccredited

The baccalaureate program of the UK College of Architecture has been reaccredited for five years by the National Architectural Accrediting Board. Established in 1967, the College of Architecture has 317 students.

14. College Of Law Median Grade Point Average Rises

The median grade point average of students in the College of Law climbed to 3.39 this fall over the previous year's 3.28. The 1996 law class includes 42 percent female students, up from last year's 39 percent.

15. UK Program Helps Woodford Arts Teachers

In a pilot partnership program, the UK College of Fine Arts is offering new approaches to integrating the arts into basic education curricula to kindergarten-12 teachers in six Woodford County schools. Examples in the Partners for the Arts program demonstrate ways that art, music, theater, and dance can be used to teach Shaker history, and how the UK Steel Drum Band can be used in the study of world cultures.

16. Two Engineering Professors Win Major Career Grants

Two UK electrical engineering professors have won separate four-year grants from the National Science Foundation totaling \$420,000 for research projects at UK's College of Engineering. Stephen D. Gedney and Keith W. Whites each were awarded \$210,000 grants by the foundation under its Faculty Early Career Development Program. The work of both professors relates to computer technology.

17. UK Acquires One of Nation's Largest Music Collections

The College of Fine Arts and the UK Libraries have acquired one of the nation's largest, privately held collections of American music, the Wilcox Collection. The collection contains 400 cubic feet of material, including 1,000 tune books, 5,000 hymnals and other books, 450 volumes of sheet music and scores and 15,000 songs indexed with words, music and performance data. The collection is expected to be a centerpiece of the John Jacob Niles Center for American Music.

18. Good Samaritan Foundation Funds Internships

The Good Samaritan Foundation continues to provide financial support to the Colleges of Nursing and Medicine. The Foundation will provide \$301,000 to the College of Nursing over the next year for internships involving both faculty and students in rural, urban and school settings. The Foundation also has provided more than \$91,000 to the College of Medicine for the upcoming year. More than \$71,000 will go to the department of family practice to fund start-up costs for a family practice/family physician residency program in eastern Kentucky. A family externship program will receive \$20,000.

19. Ashland CC Administrator Appointed to State Commission

Kentucky Governor Paul Patton has appointed Helen Fish Williams, student service officer at Ashland Community College, to the Martin Luther King Jr. State Commission. The 32-member commission is responsible for arranging and coordinating statewide programs and celebrations for the annual Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday. Williams, a member of the Boyd County NAACP, is the only commission member from eastern Kentucky.

20. IHDI and Jefferson Community College Initiate New Specialty Program

UK's Interdisciplinary Human Development Institute, in partnership with Jefferson Community College and the JCC Human Services Program, has initiated the first associate degree specialty track program in mental retardation and developmental disabilities in Kentucky. The two-year specialty track will prepare professionals in such areas as job coach, community trainer, supported living specialist and teaching assistant.

21. College of Medicine Observes White Coat Day

The College of Medicine welcomed 95 new students with a White Coat ceremony on August 9. The tradition was established last year to encourage students to begin the process of professionalism at the start of their medical school experience. Forty-one percent of the Class of 2000 are women, the largest percentage in the history of the college, and 6 percent are minority students. Ninety-one percent are Kentucky residents, with 42 percent from rural counties in the state. Fifty-seven percent attended Kentucky colleges, including 21 percent who are UK alums.

22. Health Careers Featured at Roots and Heritage Festival

The UK Chandler Medical Center participated in the first African-American Health Network health fair at the annual Lexington Roots and Heritage Festival held in downtown Lexington on September 7. Students and faculty members interacted with youth and adults with an interest in health careers, and the UK Science Outreach Center van was open for tours.

23. Gatton College of Business and Economics Nets \$10,000 for Scholarships

The Carol Martin Gatton College of Business and Economics has received \$10,000 for scholarships from an Invitational Golf Tournament held in August. The tournament was sponsored by Moore Diversified Products Incorporated.

24. College of Allied Health Professions to Hold Annual Convocation

The College of Allied Health Professions will hold its annual convocation on September 24 in room 201 of the Health Sciences Learning Center. Guest speaker Judith Barr, director of the National Educational and Research Center for Outcome Assessment in Healthcare, will talk about "Incorporating Outcomes Assessment into Research and Clinical Education."

25. WUKY Wins National Radio Development Award

WUKY, UK's public radio station, has won first place in the 1996 Corporation for Public Broadcasting Local Radio Development Awards competition. The station took top honors in the "Special Events/Promotion" category for its on-air, print, poster, specialty advertising and press release material relating to the 1995 edition of its annual fund-raising event.

26. UK Art Museum Honored for Publication

The UK Art Museum received an honorable mention in international competition for its catalogue, "Russian Icons from the Humble Collection." The competition drew 2,358 entries from around the world including the United States, Australia, England, Hong Kong and Russia.

27. Somerset Contractor Donates House for Classes

Students enrolled in "Manufactured Housing Installation and Repair Training," a joint class at Somerset Community College and Kentucky Tech, will have a real structure to study. Lee Phillip, owner of Lee Homes, Inc., is providing the manufactured house.

28. Student Awards and Honors

Julie Gamble and Shelia Wood, students at Hopkinsville Community College, each received a \$1,000 scholarship from York Neel and Company, one of the largest regional accounting firms in Kentucky.

For the third time in four years, the UK Student Bar Association has been named the top student bar association in the Midwest by the Law Student Division of the American Bar Association's Young Lawyers Section.

29. Significant Activities of Faculty and Staff

John Anthony, chemistry, has won the \$25,000 Camille and Henry Dreyfus New Faculty Award.

Larry Chiswell, Lexington Community College, met with representatives from St. Patrick's College of Maynooth, Ireland, to explore avenues in which LCC might assist County Kildare officials in economic development.

Frank Derbyshire, Center for Applied Energy Research, has been selected as the 1997 recipient of the American Chemical Society's \$5,000 Henry H. Storch Award in Fuel Chemistry.

James Glenn, urology, received the St. Paul's Medal of the British Association of Urological Surgeons in Edinburgh. It is the highest honor the British Urology Society can bestow on a foreigner.

Mary Louise Hemmeter and John W. Schuster, education, have received an \$812,309 grant to highlight effective early intervention services for youngsters with disabilities.

James W. Holsinger Jr., Chandler Medical Center chancellor, has been appointed by the American Hospital Association Board of Trustees to a three-year term on the AHA's Committee of Commissioners to the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations.

Patrick Lake, president of Henderson Community College, was invited by the American Association of Community Colleges to participate in the fourth annual National Leadership Academy.

Frank Miller, obstetrics and gynecology, has been named president of the Association of Professors of Gynecology and Obstetrics for 1996-97.

NAMING OF BUILDING AND COMPLEX
THE HILARY J. BOONE TENNIS CENTER

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees approve the name change of "The Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center" to "The Hilary J. Boone Tennis Center" for the present indoor tennis building and the new outdoor tennis stadium.

Background: Mr. Hilary J. Boone was captain of the tennis team in 1940. He previously contributed \$250,000 to the University of Kentucky Athletic Association to build the indoor tennis center. To recognize that gift the Board of Trustees at the March 4, 1986 meeting approved naming the indoor tennis center in his honor. Mr. Boone has now committed \$400,000 to the University of Kentucky Athletic Association to build a new outdoor tennis stadium adjacent to the indoor tennis center. C. M. Newton, Director of Athletics, recommended that the entire tennis complex be named the Hilary J. Boone Tennis Center in Mr. Boone's honor.

In accordance with University policy, the Committee on Naming University Buildings has made its recommendation to the Director of Athletics who recommends to the President and Board of Trustees that the tennis center be named THE HILARY J. BOONE TENNIS CENTER.

CHANGE IN NAME OF DEGREE PROGRAMS

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees approve the change in the name of the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree programs in the College of Communications and Information Studies for Journalism/Advertising majors to the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science in Integrated Strategic Communication.

Background: For nearly a decade and a half, the structure of the current program has paralleled the functions of a traditional advertising agency. That traditional model no longer exists. Dramatic technological changes have reshaped the way firms communicate with prospective consumers. Corporations expect that the agencies they hire to manage their communication outreach will be able to effectively integrate all the allied tools of strategic communication (advertising, direct response, sales promotion, public relations, etc.). The program changes are necessary to prepare students to meet these expectations.

This proposal's overarching change is that an Integrated Strategic Communication program replaces the current advertising program. This restructuring meets the expectations of the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications, through which professional programs in the School of Journalism and Telecommunications are accredited. This change in the programs degree titles for Journalism/Advertising majors was approved by the Undergraduate Council and the University Senate.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Scope of Statements

The consolidated financial statements of the University of Kentucky (the University) include the operations of the University and its affiliated corporations (entities that are financially accountable as defined by Statement No. 14 of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board) as follows: The University of Kentucky Research Foundation; The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center; University of Kentucky Athletic Association, Inc.; Health Care Collection Service, Inc.; University of Kentucky Mining Engineering Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc.; University of Kentucky Humanities Foundation, Inc.; and Center on Aging Foundation, Inc.

All significant balances and transactions among the above entities have been eliminated.

Accrual Basis

The financial statements of the University have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Fund Accounting

The University maintains its accounts and reports its financial transactions in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Funds that have similar characteristics are combined for reporting purposes into fund groups.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees. The Board retains full control over allocated fund balances to use in achieving its institutional purposes.

Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

True endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized. Term endowment funds are similar to true endowment funds except that upon the passage of a stated period of time or the occurrence of a particular event, all or part of the principal may be expended as well. Quasi-endowment funds are established by the Board for the same general purposes as other endowment funds, and any portion may be expended. Substantially all income from endowment funds is restricted. Annuity and life income funds are funds received under deferred-giving agreements and provide that an income be paid to the donor, the donor's designee, or a combination thereof for the lifetime of the recipient(s) or for a fixed period of time.

Ordinary income derived from investments, notes receivable, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning the assets, except that income derived from investments of endowments and similar funds and the majority of current restricted funds is accounted for in the fund to which the income is designated.

All unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted fund.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to use estimates and assumptions. The accompanying financial statements include estimates for items such as bad debt allowances, accrued expenses and other liability accounts. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Current Funds

The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes is a summary of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant asset acquisitions the amounts are accounted for as: (1) expenditures, in the case of replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) a transfer of a nonmandatory nature for all other cases.

The Board allocates unrestricted current funds fund balances for specific purposes. These purposes include: (a) working capital needs of the University (including the hospital, the housing and dining system, and auxiliary enterprises); (b) certain unrestricted income from private sources; and (c) budget appropriations for future operating purposes.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments with a maturity of three months or less. These funds are deposited in local bank accounts, invested in U.S. Government/agency repurchase agreements (\$67,648,175), and deposited with the State Treasurer. All cash and cash equivalents on deposit with local banks and the State Treasurer are insured by federal depository insurance or secured by U.S. Government/agency securities held by the University or its agents in the University's name.

Investments

Investments are stated at cost or, in the case of gifts, at market value at the date of donation. The specific identification method is used for purposes of determining gains and losses on the sale of investments.

Pooled Endowment Funds

The University employs the total return concept of investment management for setting investment objectives and determining investment performance. This concept recognizes traditional yield (dividends and interest), plus or minus realized and unrealized gains or losses, in determining the total return earned during any particular period. The market value method of accounting for pooled endowment funds is employed to ensure proper distribution of market price changes, realized gain/loss on sales, accrued income earned, and distribution of investment earnings for expenditure by participating funds.

Spendable return from the endowment is determined using the total return philosophy. This philosophy recognizes a prudent amount of realized gains as spendable return in addition to traditional yield. Distribution of investment earnings for expenditure by participating funds is supported first by traditional yield earned and if necessary a transfer from endowment of any prior years' accumulated earnings (unexpended traditional yield) or net realized gain on sales. For the year ended June 30, 1996, \$1,348,773 was transferred from endowment realized gains on sales to current funds to support spending.

Inventories

Inventories are stated principally at the lower of average cost or market.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Land, land improvements, buildings, equipment and library books are stated at cost at date of acquisition or, in the case of gifts, at fair market value at date of gift except for the following: (1) the University has title to certain tracts of land which were either donated or purchased at a nominal price with no book value assigned to these properties; and (2) buildings acquired prior to June 30, 1958, were recorded at appraised value of \$33,000,000 at that date.

All investments of the University are registered in the name of the University of Kentucky or held in the University's name by its agents and trustees.

On December 20, 1995 the University invested \$1,500,000 in common stock in Health Associates of Kentucky, Inc. (HAK), a wholly owned for-profit corporation. HAK acquires and provides management services to medical practice/provider sites to broaden the Medical Center's network of physicians. HAK has a fiscal year end of December 31, and accordingly, its accounts as of December 31, 1995 are included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Subsequent to that date, the University invested an additional \$6,500,000. This additional amount is reported as an investment in the current funds of the consolidated balance sheet.

The University has a 52% interest in CHA Service Company (CHA), a Kentucky for-profit corporation, established to provide an integrated health care delivery system throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky. CHA has a fiscal year end of December 31, and accordingly, the University's investment in CHA is recorded as of December 31, 1995 using the equity method. A summary of the University's investment is as follows:

The University's equity in net losses of CHA for the six months ended June 30, 1996 was \$1,288,212 (unaudited). This additional loss is not reflected in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The net losses to date were primarily the result of organizational, marketing, and other costs associated with start up.

The estimated cost to complete construction under contract at June 30, 1996 is approximately \$55,020,969. Such construction is principally financed by Commonwealth of Kentucky appropriations and long-term bonds payable.

5. Risk Management

The University is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by (1) the State Fire and Tornado Insurance Fund (the Fund), (2) Sovereign Immunity and the State Board of Claims or, (3) in the case of risks not covered by the Fund and Sovereign Immunity, commercial insurance, participation in insurance risk retention groups or self insurance.

The Fund covers losses to property from fire, wind, earthquake, flood and other named perils between \$250 and \$300,000 per occurrence. Losses in excess of \$300,000 are insured by commercial carriers up to \$200 million per occurrence on an actual cash value basis. As a state agency, the University is vested with Sovereign Immunity and is subject to the provisions of the Board of Claims Act, under which the University's liability for certain negligence claims is limited to \$100,000 for any one person and \$250,000 for multiple claims resulting from a single act of negligence. Claims against educators' errors and omissions and wrongful acts are insured through a risk retention group. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage from 1995 to 1996. Settlements have not exceeded insurance coverage during the past three years.

The University and its agents are insured against medical malpractice by a combination of self-insurance and an excess liability fund established by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The malpractice liability at June 30, 1996 is based on the requirements of Governmental Accounting Standards Board No. 10, which requires that a liability for claims be recorded if it is probable that a liability has occurred and the amount of loss can be reasonably estimated. The liability includes an estimate for claims that have been incurred but not reported at June 30, 1996.

The University is self-insured for the long term disability income program and has established a 501(c)(9) trust for purposes of paying claims and establishing necessary reserves. The estimated long term disability payments for known claims at June 30, 1996 are reported at their present value assuming an investment yield of 7.5%.

The University also self-insures certain employee benefits, including worker's compensation, unemployment claims, and a long term disability supplemental reserve, to the extent not covered by insurance. The University has recorded an estimate for asserted claims at June 30, 1996.

All bonds are callable by the University at various rates ranging from 100% to 103% of face value after ten years from issuance.

Revenues from student housing and dining facilities, certain other auxiliary enterprises, hospital and student fees are pledged for the retirement of the bonds related to those activities. All bonds, with the exception of the Hospital Revenue Bonds, are collateralized by land and buildings.

Trust account assets and a total liability for defeased bonds of \$138,145,000 at June 30, 1996 are not included in the financial statements.

7. Capital Lease Obligations

The University has utilized capital leases to acquire the following: Woodford County farm, \$11,500,000; football stadium, \$11,699,545; life safety improvements to buildings, \$24,621,000; and various items of equipment, \$7,881,865.

8. Funds Held in Trust by Others

The University is the income beneficiary of various trusts which are held and controlled by independent trustees. For the year ended June 30, 1996, the University received income from these trusts amounting to \$1,058,668. The University has no equity interest in the principal of the trusts which, accordingly, is recorded at a nominal value of \$1 each. The 1996 income received from these trusts is recorded as endowment income in the current unrestricted fund (\$437,994) and in the current restricted fund (\$620,674).

9. Pension Plans

Regular full-time employees, including faculty, are participants in the University of Kentucky Retirement Plan, a defined contribution plan. The University of Kentucky Retirement Plan consists of five groups as follows:

Group I	Established July 1, 1964, for faculty and certain administrative officials.
Group II	Established July 1, 1971, for staff members in the clerical, technical and service categories.
Group III	Established July 1, 1972, for staff members in the managerial, professional and scientific categories.
Group IV	Established January 1, 1973, for staff members having U.S. Civil Service Retirement entitlement.
Group V	Established July 1, 1987, for staff members covered under the Federal Employees Retirement System that replaced Civil Service (those whose employment began during the period from January 1, 1984 to March 31, 1987). Staff members whose employment began after March 31, 1987 are under one of the above University of Kentucky Retirement Plans.

Participation in the University of Kentucky Retirement Plan in groups I, II, and III is mandatory for all faculty and staff members, age 30 and older, who have completed one year of service. Participation

is voluntary to age 30 (after completion of one year of service). Participation in groups IV and V is voluntary. The University contributes 10% to group I and 9.50% to groups II and III of eligible compensation. Employees contribute 5% to group I and 4.75% to groups I and III of eligible compensation.

The University has authorized three retirement plan carriers, effective July 1, 1988, as follows:

Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association/College
Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA/CREF)
Fidelity Institutional Services Company
Twentieth Century Investors, Inc.

Under the fully funded group retirement plan, the University and plan participants make contributions to provide fully vested retirement benefits to employees. The University's contributions and costs for 1996 were \$36,466,603 and the employees contributed \$17,575,587. The University's total payroll costs were \$545,155,228. The payroll for employees covered by the retirement plan was \$361,303,805.

In addition to retirement benefits provided from the group retirement plans, the University provides supplemental retirement income benefits to certain eligible employees in each of the retirement groups (see Note 10).

10. Minimum Annual Retirement Benefits and Supplemental Retirement Income

Employees in retirement groups I, II and III, referred to in Note 9, who were age 40 or older prior to the date of establishment of each group plan, and who were employed by the University prior to that date, qualify for the minimum annual retirement benefit provisions of the retirement plan. Benefits for these eligible employees are based upon a percentage, determined through years of service, of the participant's annual salary in the last year of employment prior to retirement. Retirement benefits as determined are funded by each individual retiree's accumulation in the group retirement plan, with the balance, if necessary, provided by the University as supplemental retirement income.

The Legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky has appropriated funds to the University for the payment of supplemental retirement income benefits since adoption of the group retirement plans, and is expected to continue this practice. However the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky prohibits the commitment of future revenues beyond the end of the current biennium. Accordingly, the University does not recognize the liability for supplemental retirement income benefits during the service life of covered employees, but recognizes its costs when funds are appropriated by the Legislature and payments are made. The University intends to continue paying supplemental retirement income benefits contingent upon the Legislature continuing to appropriate funds required to make these payments. Supplemental retirement benefit payments were \$4,700,620 for 1996.

The latest actuarial valuation was prepared as of June 30, 1996 by TIAA. The actuarial present value of vested and non-vested accumulated supplemental retirement income benefits as determined by this valuation, utilizing an assumed rate of return of 7%, was \$35,756,000.

11. Health Insurance Benefits for Retirees

The University provides health care benefits to retirees who have a minimum of fifteen years service. The University recognizes the cost of providing those benefits by expensing the insurance premiums in the year paid. These premiums were \$2,379,430 for the year ended June 30, 1996. At June 30, 1996, 1,305 retirees met the service requirement and were receiving benefits.

12. Contingencies

The University is defendant in several lawsuits. However, University officials are of the opinion, based on advice of in-house legal counsel, that the effect of the ultimate outcome of all litigation will not be material to the future operations or financial position of the University.

13. Pledges

Pledges totaling approximately \$32,664,600 including \$2,693,000 relating to the Commonwealth Library Campaign, are expected to be collected over the next ten years. Deferred gifts through insurance, known bequests and irrevocable trusts in which the University has a remainder interest are estimated to be approximately \$38,700,000.

The University records contributions as revenue when the cash is received.

14. Grants and Contracts Awarded

At June 30, 1996, grants and contracts of approximately \$80,000,000 had been awarded to the University and the University of Kentucky Research Foundation but not expended. These amounts will be recognized in future periods as revenues and expenditures as the funds are expended.

15. Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications to fiscal 1995 comparative amounts have been made to conform with the fiscal 1996 classifications.

The Center for Academic and Tutorial Services, known as CATS, is located in Memorial Coliseum. It was the first such center in the nation for student athletes and continues to be a model for other colleges and universities. More than 400 student athletes use the center each year.

RESOLUTION OF OFFICIAL INTENT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF
THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY TO FINANCE CONSTRUCTION OF A
HOUSING AND DINING PROJECT FROM PROCEEDS OF A PROPOSED
ISSUE OF UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY HOUSING AND DINING SYSTEM
REVENUE BONDS

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees approve the Resolution expressing its official intent to issue University of Kentucky Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds, and that the proceeds of such Bonds will be used, in whole or in part, to reimburse authorized expenditures for the proposed project prior to the issuance of such bonds.

The Resolution states that such Bonds will be issued to finance the (i) construction of a new student residence building to accommodate approximately 50 students, (ii) renovation of Cooperstown Apartment Buildings C and D and Shawneetown Apartment Buildings C and D, (iii) installation of a sprinkler system for Donovan Hall, (iv) renovation of elevators in Kirwan Blanding Residence Halls, and (v) installation of an HVAC system in Donovan Hall food services area.

Background: The University presently has outstanding Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds, Series B, C, D, E, F, G, I, J, K, L, M, N, O and P (the Series N Bonds having been issued to advance refund the Series J Bonds scheduled to mature on and after June 1, 1995, and the Series L bonds scheduled to mature on and after June 1, 1997), all secured by a pledge of the Revenues derived from the operation of the University's Housing and Dining System and by a statutory mortgage lien against all of the buildings of the System. The Bonds which the Board expresses its intent to issue will rank on a parity with the said outstanding Series of Bonds. Pursuant to the income tax regulations of the Internal Revenue Service, in order for expenditures made for a public project prior to the issuance of revenue bonds to be reimbursed to the issuer upon the issuance of such bonds, it is necessary that the issuer express its official intent to issue such bonds and reimburse such expenditures prior to the issuance of such bonds.

RESOLUTION OF OFFICIAL INTENT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF

REVENUE BONDS

WHEREAS, Treasury Regulations § 1.150-2 (the "Reimbursement Regulations"), issued pursuant to § 150 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, (the "Code") prescribes certain requirements by which proceeds of tax-exempt bonds, notes, certificates or other obligations included in the meaning of "bonds" under § 150 of the Code ("Obligations") used to reimbursement advances made for Capital Expenditures (as hereinafter defined) paid before the issuance of such Obligations may be deemed "spent" for purposes of §§ 103 and 141 to 150 of the Code therefore, not further subject to any other requirements or restrictions under those sections of the Code; and

WHEREAS, such Reimbursement Regulations require that the Borrower (as hereinafter defined) made a Declaration of Official Intent (as hereinafter defined) to reimburse any Capital Expenditure paid prior to the issuance of the Obligations intended to fund such Capital Expenditure and require that such Declaration of Official intent be made no later than sixty (60) days after payment of the Capital Expenditure and further require that the Allocation (as hereinafter defined) of the proceeds of such Obligations to reimburse such Capital Expenditures occur no later than eighteen (18) months after the later of the date the Capital Expenditure was paid on the date the property acquired with the Capital Expenditure was placed in service, except that any such Allocation must be made no later than three years after such Capital Expenditure was paid; and

WHEREAS, the University of Kentucky (the "Borrower") wishes to ensure compliance with the Reimbursement Regulations;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved as follows by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky as follows:

SECTION 1. Definitions. The following definitions apply to the terms used herein:

"Allocation" means written evidence that proceeds of Obligations issued subsequent to the payment of a Capital Expenditure are to effect the reimbursement of the Borrower for such payments.

"Borrower" means the University of Kentucky.

"Capital Expenditures" means any expense for an item that is properly depreciable or amortizable or is otherwise treated as a capital expenditure for purposes of the Code, as well as costs of issuing Reimbursement Bonds.

"Declaration of Official Intent" means a written declaration that the Borrower intends to fund a Capital Expenditure with an issue of Reimbursement Bonds and reasonably expects to be reimbursed from the proceeds of such an issue.

"Reimbursement" means the restoration to the Borrower of money temporarily advanced from other funds of the Borrower to pay for Capital Expenditures before the issuance of Obligations intended to fund such Capital Expenditures. "To reimburse" means to make such a restoration.

"Reimbursement Bonds" means Obligations that are issued to reimburse the Borrower for Capital Expenditures previously paid by or for the Borrower.

"Reimbursement Regulations" means Treasury Regulations § 1.150-2 and any amendments thereto or superseding regulation, whether in proposed, temporary or final form, as applicable, prescribing conditions under which the proceeds of Obligations when allocated or applied to a reimbursement will be treated as "spent" for purposes of §§ 103 and 141 to 150 of the Code.

SECTION 2. Declaration of Official Intent.

(a) The Borrower declares that it reasonably expects that the Capital Expenditures described in Section (b), which will be paid prior to the issuance of any Obligations intended to fund such Capital Expenditures, will be reimbursed with the proceeds of Obligations, representing a borrowing by the Borrower in the maximum principal amount for such reimbursements, funding of a debt service reserve and payment of costs of issuance of approximately \$6,750,000; and

(b) The Capital Expenditures to be reimbursed are to be used for the (i) construction of a new student residence building to accommodate approximately 50 students, (ii) renovation of Cooperstown Apartment Buildings C and D and Shawneetown Apartment Buildings C and D, (iii) installation of a sprinkler system for Donovan Hall, (iv) renovation of elevators in Kirwan Blanding Residence Halls, and (v) installation of an HVAC system in Donovan Hall food services area, all at the Borrower's main campus in Lexington, Kentucky.

SECTION 3. Reasonable Expectations. The Borrower does not expect any other funds (including the money advanced to make the Capital Expenditures that are to be reimbursed), to be reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside by the Borrower or any other entity affiliated with the Borrower, with respect to the Capital Expenditures described in 2(b).

SECTION 4. Effective Date. This Resolution shall be effective from and after its date of adoption.

SALE OF THE SOUTH FARM, TRACT A

Recommendation: that Tract A of the South Farm comprised of approximately 42.96 acres at the corner of Nicholasville Road and Man-O-War Boulevard in Lexington, Kentucky is determined no longer suited for the teaching, research or service needs of the University, and is declared surplus; that the Administration is authorized to seek two separate appraisals of this real property, then offer it for sale, in whole, by sealed bids, reserving the right to reject all bids; that all terms and conditions of the sale be returned to the Board for final approval; and that proceeds from the sale be reserved for the College of Agriculture.

Background: The Board of Trustees adopted in September 1985 guidelines for the disposition of real property held by the University. These guidelines authorize the Board to dispose of lands that are no longer suited to serve the mission of the University. The construction of Man-O-War Boulevard across the South Farm and urbanization of the surrounding area have made this property largely unsuitable for horticulture research.

The guidelines further require that proceeds from the sale of real property represent a net gain to the institution. Representatives of the Administration have met with the Secretary of Finance and Administration and have received his approval to proceed with this sale by the University.

The South Farm was bought in 1956 with private gift monies, federal grant monies, and restricted trust and agency funds of the College of Agriculture for the sum of \$270,000. No state appropriation was made for this acquisition. The use of the proceeds for College of Agriculture projects is in accord with the "Twenty-First Century Plan" for the College of Agriculture. This proposed use of the proceeds from the sale of the farm for a plant science research facility assures that College of Agriculture funds which were used to purchase the South Farm and advance research will continue to be used in support of the College of Agriculture. Substantial continuing interest in the South Farm by prospective buyers is cause for this action at this time.
