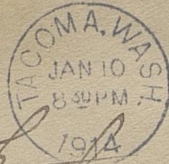

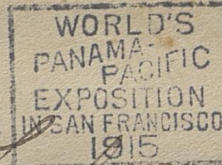
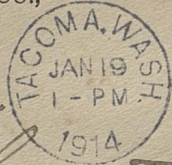

Inquirer—The Nobel prize fund, amounting to about \$9,000,000, was provided for by the will of Alfred B. Nobel, a Swedish scientist, who died in 1896. Four prizes each year, each of \$40,000 in cash, are available, to be awarded by the directors of the fund to persons who have made signal contributions to chemistry, medicine, literature and peace.

Elihu Root Receives Nobel Prize.

The award of the Nobel peace prize for 1912 to Elihu Root, announced from Christiania, Norway, is gratifying to the United States. This is the second time the peace prize has been awarded to a citizen of the United States since the beginning of the awards in 1901. The first American to receive this recognition was Theodore Roosevelt, to whom the award was made in 1906. The prize is \$40,000. It comes from the interest on a fortune left by Alfred B. Nobel, Swedish scientist, who invented dynamite.

The peace prize is awarded by a committee of five persons chosen by the Norwegian storting. That is the reason news of the award comes from Norway, rather than from Sweden. Distribution of the prizes takes place each year on December 10, the anniversary of Mr. Nobel's death. No award of a peace prize was announced in 1912, but this year awards are made for both 1912 and 1913. Senator Root receives the 1912 award and Senator Henri La-Fontaine of Belgium, formerly president of the International Peace bureau of Berne, Switzerland, wins the 1913 prize.

Senator Root's valuable activities in the pacification of the Philippines and in Cuba, and his handling of the American-Japanese disputes are mentioned as reasons for the award.

Senator Root is a great lawyer, a great citizen and a great statesman. No man of intelligence can read or hear his addresses without being impressed with his power of mind and strength of character. Not as magnetic as others of our leading public men, he surpasses most of them in sheer force of intellect. He would make an excellent President of the United States, though he might have difficulties in attaining the honor because he appeals to the mind rather than to popular impulse.

There are five kinds of Nobel prizes—physics, chemistry, medicine, literature and peace. In 1907 Professor Albert A. Michelson of the University of Chicago was awarded the prize in physics. In 1912 Dr. Alexis Carrel of the Rockefeller institute, New York city, received the prize in medicine. Dr. Carrel is listed as a Frenchman.

The fortune from which the prizes come amounts to about \$9,000,000. Alfred B. Nobel bequeathed it for awards to those who had contributed most each year to "the good of humanity." The prizes are paid out of interest on the \$9,000,000 fund. Following are the prizes and purposes as set forth by Nobel:

"One to the person who in the domain of physics has made the most important discovery or invention; one to the person who has made the most important chemical discovery or invention; one to the person who has made the most important discovery in the domain of medicine or physiology; one to the person who in literature has provided the most excellent work of an idealistic tendency, and one to the person who has worked most or best for the fraternization of nations and the abolition or reduction of standing armies and the calling and propagating of peace congresses."

It is under the last division that the awards were made to Theodore Roosevelt and Elihu Root. The United States seems to stand higher in statesmanship than in scientific discovery, if we may draw a conclusion from the various awards of Nobel prizes.

Popular Newspaper Man is Made Business Manager of New Publication

Joseph A. Humphreys, Jr., former city editor of The Lexington Herald, has been chosen business manager of The Kentuckian, which is being moved to this city from Jackson, Ky., and will have charge of the local offices of the publication, which were selected yesterday in the McClelland Building.

Mr. Humphreys has, until recently, been closely identified with the local newspaper field, having served in various capacities on The Herald and the Louisville Courier-Journal.

Permanent quarters in the McClelland Building will be opened Tuesday, and the next issue of the paper, which appears on that day, will be the product of Lexington presses.

Ryland C. Musick, of Jackson, editor of The Kentuckian, was registered yesterday at the Leland Hotel, and when seen last night said that the circulation, which has grown to 3,000 within the last three months.

"The last three issues," said Mr. Musick, "were printed in Cincinnati and edited in Jackson, but in the future the publication will be a Lexington product in nearly all respects. Later on we may have our own printing plant here."

"One particularly noticeable feature of the growth of The Kentuckian and its reception, is that more subscriptions have been received from the North and other points outside the state than from our home people, which is an indication that the world is looking upon the great development in Eastern Kentucky with much more interest than do we, and I believe it is hard for Kentuckians to realize the magnitude of the commercial, social and educational awakening in the eastern part of the state."

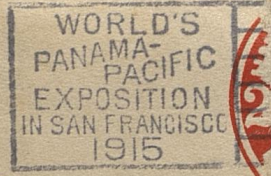
