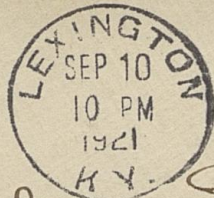
Dearest Father

with all very love -

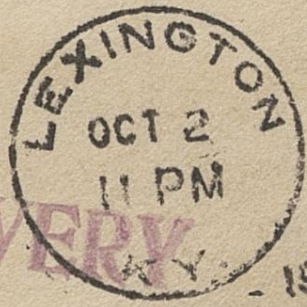

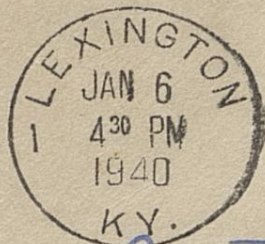

Dearest Hart-

I feel very much more encouraged about Daddy today. He is able to talk more naturally - and ate a light breakfast this morning, and read the Sunday papers afterward. I have not seen him up to this morning for more than to peep in on him - for it was best that way. He really was too excited at seeing me & expected me to get him up and out of the bed. His mind wandered and he was very restless.

Wube Brown and John Harvey have been very attentive

and the nurses capable, ^{and} giving him the best of care.

As you know he is so emotional, and this morning while the nurse had her lunch I remained with him - and it was all I could do to keep him from becoming on the verge of tears. When you write to him make it as impersonal as possible and allude to his injury as little as possible - I know I don't have to tell you this - just merely a reminder.

Duke told me this morning the x-ray they took Friday was good, and showed the bone in the right position. I am so thankful Daddy called him in - for I have so much confidence in him.

I don't know how long he will have to be in the hospital

but as soon as he can be moved
we will take him back to the Britling
where Charley Anderson so gener-
ously offered his rooms (1st floor)
and I will get a practical nurse
to care for him. Charley will
sleep in Daddy's room. It is cer-
tainly a wonderful solution, for
I was worried about the con-
valescent period - with no room
here to keep him, & the fact that
the children might worry him -

I don't think Daddy
has any kidney trouble, I asked
for a urinalysis, haven't heard
from it yet, but so far every-
thing seems in good shape.
You will hear from me
right along as to his con-

dition; and with Bill's advice
I will try to plan what is best
for him and make it as economi-
cal as possible, so don't worry.

Dearest Hart.
