few days of October.

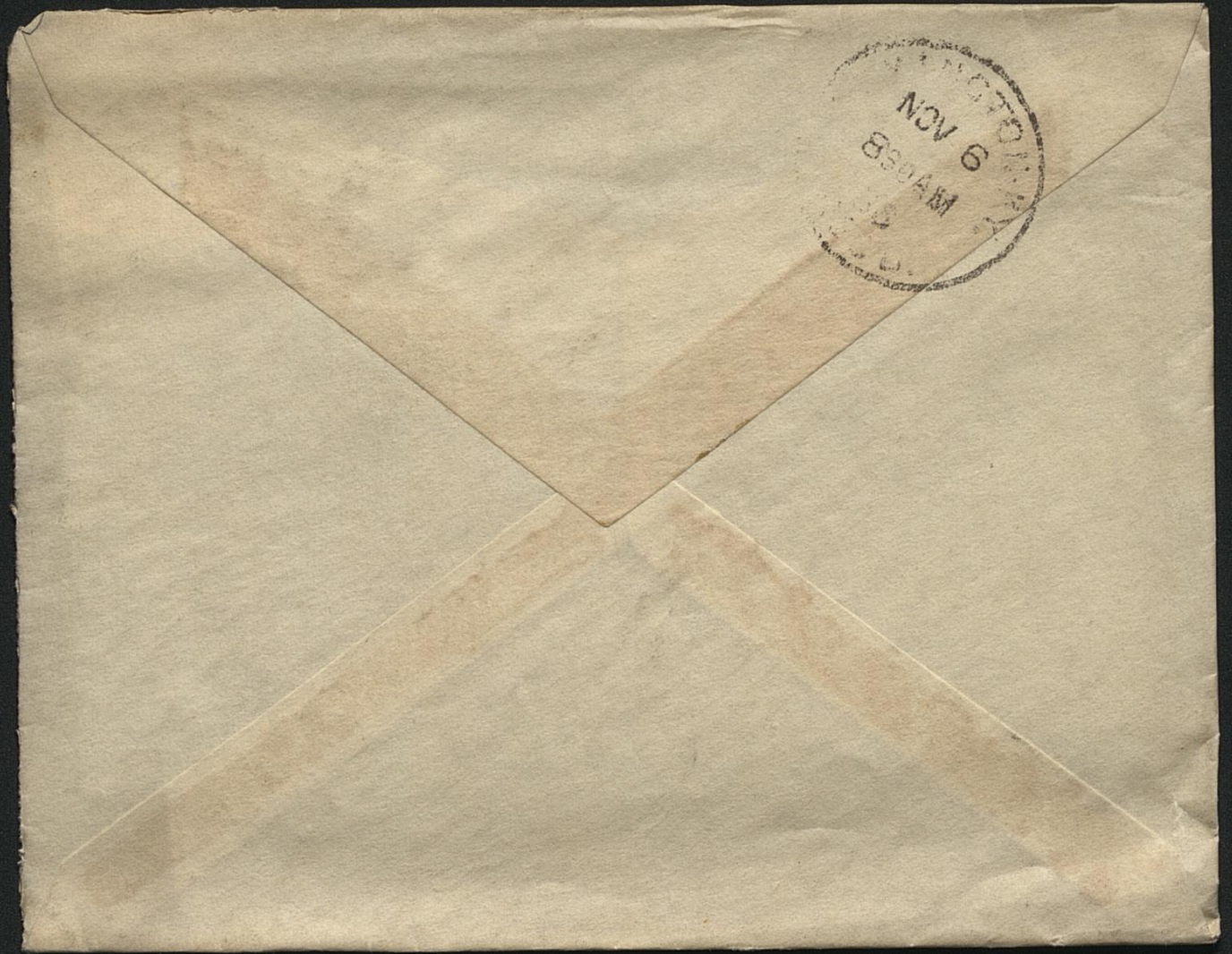
