LIZZIE SHELTON

GREAT GRANDDAUGHTER OF NOTED PIONEER NEGRO DIES—WAS ELIGIBLE TO D. A. R. BECAUSE OF ANCESTOR'S SERVICES IN REVOLUTION.

In the death of Lizzie Shelton, 65, esteemed colored woman, Sunday, Lexington loses one of its most interesting citizens.

Lizzie for 25 years had worked for the family of Harrison G. Foster, now living at "Ingleside," going with the Fosters to Minneapolis, St. Paul and Washington.

She formerly was employed by Mrs. Carolyn Preston Thornton, mother of Mrs. John W. Scott and Mrs. George R. Hunt.

Lizzie Shelton's great-grandfather, "Capt. Jack" Hart, bodyguard of Nathaniel Hart, pioneer at Boonesboro and other frontier posts, by a special act of Legislature, soon after Kentucky became a State 1792, was given the right to bear arms because of his services in Indian warfare. This Legislative act was necessary as slaves were not allowed by law to carry firearms in those days. A silver plate was affixed to his gun to show the honor accorded him.

Lizzie is said to have been the only colored woman in the United States eligible for membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution, although she never became a member. She attained eligibility because of the services in the war of her great-grandfather, "Captain Jack." A painting of "Captain Jack" hung for years on the walls of Hartland, Woodford county, former home of the Hart family.

Lizzie's mother, Henrietta Shelton, is still living, and resides at the county infirmary. Her grandmother, "Aunt Beckie" Shelton was a practical nurse, practising before the days of the trained nurse, and officiated at scores of births in Lexington and Fayette county.

Lieut. Voorhies is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Voorhies, of this city, and is a Second Lieutenant in the Cavalry, Fourth Regiment, of the United States Army. At present he is located at Fort Walla Walla, Washington. Lieut. Voorhies graduated from West Point in June, 1891, having received his appointment from Congressman Breckinridge.

Miss Burrell is not unknown in Lexington, having visited Miss Madge McDowell during the Christmas holidays of 1890, together with several other young ladies who were Miss McDowell's schoolmates at the time at Farmington. Among the Christmas festivities of that season was a fancy dress german given at the Phoenix Hotel by the young ladies and Miss Burrell, as "Priscilla," was one of the prettiest girls in the ball room and decidedly one of the belles of the evening.

The date of the wedding has not yet been fixed.
