

Dunsmuir February 11th 1849

Dear Father
I am a great deal ^{better} this morning when you left home mother and I were in bed I was very sick all day yesterday Mother rose about 10 o'clock and sat up untill ten, she still has a pain in the side of her head.
You will suffer a great deal from the cold, but I hope it ^{will} be for the time being, it is colder here this morning than it has been this winter, Cousin James started in this morning but turned back, we will have to stay in bed to keep warm.
Don't forget to send the sack of coffee.
I don't believe I have any more to tell you but that it is very tedious and we would like to be with you, Mother says she will be ready to go to Philadelphia against you return ^{for not taking us} where will some expense.
I must tell you good bye, and wish you a pleasant and short trip. Mother sends her love, and Henry and Mary Eliza a kiss Your affectionate & obedient son
