

## Retail Outlook Credited to Farm Gains

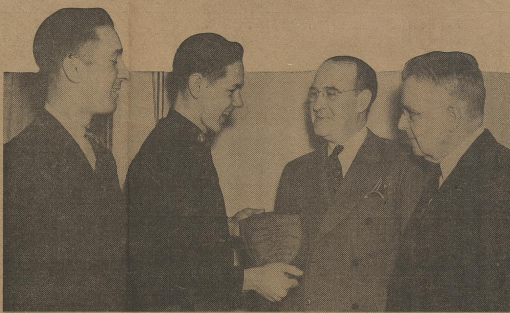
A 17 per cent improvement in agricultural prices compared to January 1, 1939, was cited Tuesday by M. W. Thompson, secretary of the retail division of the St. Paul Association, as "an important reason why the retail outlook is excellent."

Mr. Thompson was speaker at a luncheon meeting of the St. Paul Association of Office Men at noon Tuesday in the Athletic club.

The speaker also cited promotion plans in connection with the Women's Institute, provision of better amusement for the city, and a spirit of co-operation among various interests in the city.

Pointing to the successful operation of the Food Stamp plan here, Thompson expressed the hope that the city might be chosen as one of the localities for the possible issuance of Federal Cotton Stamps.

Funeral services will be held today at Lexington.

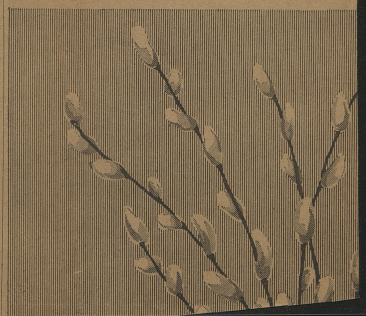
## Mrs. Apolline Petit Funeral Thursday

## LOCAL LEGION HEARS DUNCAN

Maj. Gen. George B. Duncan, U. S. A., retired, was the principal speaker at the regular meeting of the Lexington post, No. 3, American Legion, at the Lafayette hotel last night, and in addition to 65 members of the post, a number of other former service men were present for the meeting which was preceded by a buffet supper.

General Duncan spoke on the founding and purpose of the American Legion, and urged members of the Legion to give their assistance in increasing the enrollment. The general, on behalf of the post, presented to Major Hart G. Foster, former post commander, an American Legion post commander's ring in appreciation for his service while commander. Major Foster, who now is chairman of the state national defense committee, spoke on national defense requirements.

The Legion voted to conduct a Christmas party for the children of the city and county on Cheapside, Monday afternoon, December 23, at which time gifts will be presented to the children. A committee composed of Carter Coons, Vertner Slade and George Crutchfield was appointed to arrange the party.

The question of securing post clubrooms was discussed, and a committee composed of Ollie Hurst and Carter Coons was appointed to investigate the possibility of securing such clubrooms.

Captains of the membership drive teams were urged by Dr. Henry C. Barnes, post commander, to make a special effort during December, and announced that the prizes in the contest will be awarded at the next meeting. The next meeting of the post, Dr. Barnes announced, will be in the form of an American Legion rally and get-together, Wednesday night, January 8, for which all former service men are invited, whether or not they are members of the Legion. A supper in the form of an army and navy "feed" will be served.

Dr. Barnes appointed Eldon S. Dummit, Ed Wilder and Major Owen T. Meredith as a committee on Americanism.

A discussion of compensation was led by Dr. Barnes, in which it was emphasized that the final date for veterans to file applications is December 31, 1929. The average adjusted service certificate is worth \$1,000, and some of them more, and they may be procured either by veterans or, if the service man is dead, his beneficiaries. The local American Legion post is trying to reach every former service man in the county to inform them regarding the compensation.
