In the last few weeks the people of Poland have regained that elusive political freedom which evaporated over 40 years ago with the end of World War II.

with a grave economic and political situation turned to the once outlawed Solidarity party to help lead

The seed of freedom was first
planted over nine years ago in 1980
with the signing of the accord
which formed Solidarity, the first
independent trade union in a communist country, in Gdansk.
Although Solidarity was banned
in 1981 by the Polish Communist
Party, founder Lech Walesa and
others continued to press for workers rights and political freedoms.
Walesa's non-violent efforts earned
him the Nobel Peace Prize in 1983.

But what has helped the winds of
democracy reach Poland, has been

but other communist countries as well.

Poland followed Gorbachev's lead and offered limited elections in May. The party stacked the deck to guarantee they would keep power even if they lost every seat. And that nearly happened.

The people voiced their frustration with the government by handing the communist party aning defeat on every level.

After some arguing it was agreed that Solidarily's wictory could be short lived. One of the reasons Poland's ruling party went slienly into the night was the staggeringly pathetic condition of the present constant of the present of the production of the present of

*It could pave the way for similar transfers of power in other communist countries.

I don't have any stories about great families to tell the next generation, mostly because there are not many of them left. But until I breathe my last breath, I will make sure that the children of the future know about A. Bartlett Giamatti.

Last week when Giamatti was pronounced dead of a heart attack, the nation joined the baseball world in mourning the death of a

world in mourning the death of a modern Renaissance man. Giamatti had been commissioner of Major League Baseball for only about 5½ months, but the impact he made on strengthening the fab-ric of the game will last 1,000 times longer than his reign. One of Giamatti's more signifi-cant contributions to the game was



"The Green Fields of the Mind," a piece he wrote for the fall 1977 Yale Alumni Review.

In the work, Giamatti describes his unflagging devotion to the Boston Red Sox. While many fans found it convenient to hide their affection for the Red Sox during Boston's more lean years, Giamatti's loyalty shone bright as he remained the ever-optimistic Red Sox supporter.

Giamatti first was introduced to the public during his days as National League president when he suspended Pete Rose for shoving an umpire. While some criticized Giamatti for protecting the umpires and being too stiff on Rose, he very well knew that if order on the field is to be preserved, the men in thou must be given supreme authority.

As commissioner, much of his

As commissioner, much of his

term was filled with the nonsense surrounding the Pete Rose contro-versy. When it was revealed that Rose had bet on baseball, Giamatti acted swiftly and fairly in getting to the bottom of matters and then dispensed of it in appropriate fash-ion.

The way Giamatti handled the Rose affair provided insight into the deep concern he had for the integrity of the game and protecting its reputation at all costs. Banning Rose from baseball energized the game, and for that action alone Giamatti deserves thanks.

Giamati once remarked that baseball is a special sport because unlike football and baseball where you always are trying to gain ground on your opponent, baseball is a sport about returning to the place from where you started, known as "home." In that

sense, Giamatti said baseball is its own epic poem.
Giamatti's greatest contribution to the game was that he always remained one of its greatest fans. Giamatti always kept in mind that baseball exists for the fans. And the issues he made his concern were ones that affected those in the stands the most.

Exterminating from the ballpark such annoyances as the designated hitter, AstroTurf, rambunctious organists who don't know when to stop playing and obnoxious bigscreen scoreboards were all important things Giamatti might have accomplished during his tenure as commissioner.

Undoubtedly, baseball's next commissioner will have to tolerate the unfair comparisons the media will make between him and Gia-matti. But as long as he values the game's integrity as much as his predecessor did, he will do a fine job.





Claiborne's priorities go beyond winning

UK coach knew early what others know now: do it right

When Jerry Claiborne returned to his alma mater nine years ago he had to do more than just retrieve a football program from the ruins.
Claiborne, a soft-spoken native of Hopkinsville who traveled across the country but never forgot his Kentucky roots, had to restore the program's integrity – and still appease the hunger of fans who wanted a winner.
A 1950 UK graduate, Claiborne came back to his home state in December of 1981 to erase the stain left by the Fran Curci era.
Curci's team was doing as bad off the field as they were on the field, Players were skipping classes by the bunches, getting in trouble with the police and showing no respect for the UK football program. And although Claiborne hasn't exactly made UK a Top 20 team or household name outside the state, he has achieved success off the field uparallel to any other team. He does not tolerate players who have problems with the police. He does not tolerate players who have problems with the police. He does not tolerate players who do not respect his program.
Any player that has problems

Any player that has problems with those rules usually is asked to vacate his position on the roster. It's that simple.

"I think Coach Claiborne has done a fine job with the football program," UK president David Roselle said recently. "He came into a rough situation and made it work."

No doubt Claiborne has restored the program's integrity beyond any previous mark or expectation.
"I came here because I was a graduate of Kentucky and wanted to try to have a program here that everybody in the state could be proud of," Claiborne said.

UK can now boldly compare it-self to notable schools like the

University and the University of University and the University of Virginia.

UK won the 1989 College Football Association's Academic Achievement Award for having the highest percentage of graduates of its 1983 freshman class. Claiborne as 90 percent of that class graduates of the 1986 and the state of the 1986 award with a 92 percent graduation rate of the 1982 class. With the pressure to win in college athletics, Claiborne has kept his priorities straight. Running the program the right way has always

"We have not had a winning season since 1984, so I think it's very important hat we have a winning season this year," Claiborne said. "Our program really needs a winning season."

He has been close many times. In fact, Claiborne became only the second coach in UK history to have six consecutive seasons with at least five wins in each. The other was Paul "Bear" Bryant.

"We would like to have a winning record every year instead of

just five wins," Claiborne said.
As a player, Claiborne earned three leuers (1946, 48 and 49) in football while playing for Bryant.
The Cats posted a 29-12-2 record during Claiborne's playing days.
"If you are around a person like Paul as many years as I was and don't learn something, then you're not very smart," the UK coach said.

After Claiborne graduated from UK, he went to Augusta Military Academy in Fort Defiance, Va., where he was the head coach of the football and baskethall teams.

He spent 1950-51 at Augusta Military Academy where he won the football state championship.

'I think I had good training. I had been associated with Coach Bryant and his staff and just put to work what I was taught," Claiborne said. "And I worked very hard at it."

Not many coaches can boast of state championships in two sports, especially when the coach only played one in high school. But when he was at Augusta he did just that.

"Coaching is coaching and you start with fundamentals," he said.
"I bought Coach (Adolph) Rupp's book and studied and used drills and things that I got from the book. I just tried to stress fundamentals of the game, but I had some pretty good group players."

After only two years of high school coaching, Bryant made room for Claiborne on his staff at UK. Claiborne was a coach on Bryant's last two staffs at UK, in 1952-53.

When Bryant left UK for Texas A&M University, Claiborne followed and served as defensive coordinator for the Aggies from 1954-56. After a stint as defensive coordinator in 1957 at the University of Missouri, Claiborne joined Bryant's staff again, but this time see HEAD COACH, Page 13

neck injury, the position was left wide open.

Special teams units not for everyone

At times during the presea-son, UK coach Jerry Claiborne and his staff felt like talent scouts looking for the right in-dividuals for the special team units, the one part of last year's team that stuck out like a sore thumb.

Depth in the defensive back-field is a welcomed change of pace for UK coach Jerry Claibome.

"For certain passing situations, you need six or seven guys that can play defensive secondary," Claibome said.




The big news with the defension and inside line-backers was the season-ending knee injury to junior Randy Holleran. The injury came at the beginning of two-a-day workouts this fall.

Throughout the summer, every SEC team made a comment or two that they were the team to shine. In the end, however, some will hang their heads high, while others will bury their heads in the sand.

The one thing league schools get most excited about is the automatic berth to the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, that the SEC Champion receives. Receiving the berth means you survived the rigorous schedule of the country's toughest conference.



Then Claiborne's big opportunity finally came – a head coaching position at Virginia Polytechnic. He stayed in Blacksburg, Va., from 1961 to 1970.

Even though he learned many things from Bryant, Claiborne did not try to imitate the legendary cosch.

During his tenure at Virginia Tech, Claiborne took a dormant program and brought respectability to it - a 61-39 record in 10 sea-

Claiborne took two Virginia Tech teams to the bowl games – the 1966 and '68 Liberty Bowls. After a 1-year stint as an assistant coach at the University of Colorado in 1971, Claiborne took over

orado in 1971, Claiborne took over another dormant program – the University of Maryland. Maryland had a record of 60-100-1 in the 16 years before Claiborne's arrival. The Terrapin football pro-gram also saw five head coaches and no bowl appearances over the 16-year period.

gram also saw five head coaches and no bowl appearances over the 16-year period.

After a 5-5-1 inaugural season in 1971, Claiborne began taking his Maryland teams to bowls on a regular basis. His teams went to bowls from 1973 to 1978. The Terrapins went to the Peach, Liberty, Gator, Cotton, Hall of Fame, Sun and Tangerine bowls during Claiborne's tenure.

Then in December 1981, Claiborne and his family moved back to Kentucky, hopefully to retire.

"No doubt. I would like to end wy coaching career at Kentucky," he said. "I have been very happy here. I only wish we could win a few more games. And I think we will."


