Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, March 20, 1964.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the Board of Directors Room of the Alumni House on the campus of the University at 1:00 p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on Friday, March 20, 1964, with the following members present: Dr. Ralph Angelucci, chairman, Judge James A. Sutherland, secretary, Mr. Robert Hillenmeyer, Dr. H. B. Murray, and Mr. Smith Broadbent. President John Oswald, Mr. Robert Kerley, Dr. Robert D. Haun, representing the administrative staff of the University, and members of the press were also present.

# A. Meeting Opened

Dr. Angelucci, having determined that a quorum was present, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

#### B. Minutes Approved

On motion by Mr. Hillenmeyer, seconded by Mr. Broadbent, and duly carried, the Minutes of the February 21 meeting of the Executive Committee, and of the Special Meeting on February 27, 1964, were approved as published.

#### C. President's Report to the Trustees

The chairman called upon Dr. Oswald for his Report to the Trustees, copies of which were made available. Dr. Oswald commented on each item contained in the report and the Trustees accepted the report with an expression of appreciation for the many and varied activities being carried on by members of the faculty and staff of the University.

#### D. Presentation of "Blue Report"

Dr. Oswald indicated that copies of the "Blue Report" had already been mailed to members of the Executive Committee so that they might be familiar with the important but routine matters contained therein. He recommended that unless the members wished to raise specific questions, which he would be glad to answer, that the report be accepted as a whole and made a part of the official record of the meeting.

Mr. Hillenmeyer moved that the report be accepted and made a part of the Minutes of the meeting. His motion was seconded by Mr. Broadbent and carried.

Submitted herewith is the interim financial report of the University of Kentucky for the fiscal period which began July 1, 1963 and ended February 29, 1964. This report consists of a balance sheet for the five balanced fund groups and supporting information concerning operation of the University.

The statement of General Fund income for the eight month period reflects that 88.0% of anticipated income was realized. For the same period the General Fund expenditures and encumbrances amounted to 66.4% of the estimated expenditures for the fiscal year 1963-64.

It is intended that this report will serve as a comprehensive and permanent record of the financial operations of the University for the information and reference of all interested persons.

#### CONTRACTS AND/OR AGREEMENTS

#### 1. Easement at West Kentucky Experiment Substation

Recommendation: that approval be given for an easement to Norval L. Oliver, Princeton, Kentucky, granting him the right to lay and maintain a one-inch water line pipe 1147 feet in length and extending from the east end of the pipe line supplying water to the University's Western Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Substation to the east boundary line of the tract of land on which the Substation's office building is located, and that the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to execute the necessary document.

Background: Norval L. Oliver of Princeton, Kentucky, plans to construct a residence on property adjoining the University's Substation and has asked for the right to lay a one-inch water pipe line from the water line supplying the Substation to the east boundary line of the Substation property. At the time the line is connected to the water supply line, the University is to be paid a fee of \$125 by the City of Princeton in accordance with our contract with the City of Princeton, dated March 16, 1962.

Dean William A. Seay, Dr. Charles E. Barnhart, and the University's legal counsel have examined the easement and have indicated their concurrence in the granting of the easement.

# 2. Lease of Grazing Land in Young County, Texas

Recommendation: that approval be given to the leasing of 316 acres of land in Young County, Texas, to Jim Bob Daws for grazing purposes for a period of two years, beginning April 1, 1964, at an annual rental of \$790, payable annually in advance, and that the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to execute the necessary document.

Background: The University acquired this land, which is near Graham, Texas, in 1951 from the estate of Annie Dillard and the grazing lease has been held by Mr. Daws since that time. Bids were received from three stockmen in the area to lease this land and Mr. Daws' bid was the highest.

# 3. Textbook Adoption Lists

Recommendation: that approval be given to the textbook list from Adoption Group IV for use in the University School in the period 1964-1968 and that the proper officials of the University be authorized to execute the proper documents.

Background: Pursuant to KRS 156.444, the governing board of the school shall officially select the textbooks not later than April 1 of the adoption year, and three copies of the adoptions shall be filed with the State Department of Education no later than April 15. The books listed have been examined and are recommended for adoption by the University School faculty.

#### DEED FOR LAND FOR HOPKINSVILLE COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Recommendation: that the deed from W. D. Talbert, Trustee, for the Hopkins-ville Community College Committee, dated February 19, 1964, conveying 66.63 acres of land to the Commonwealth of Kentucky, for the use and benefit of the University of Kentucky, be accepted.

Background: The deed conveying this property, together with a recent plat of the tract of land and the surrounding area and a title opinion of the property dated February 26, 1964, by Mr. R. Pollard White, Attorney at Law, Hopkinsville, has been received from Mr. W.D. Talbert, Trustee and Chairman of the Hopkinsville Community College Committee. University attorneys have examined the deed, plat and title opinion, and report that they find these documents well prepared and in order. The title opinion states that the deed conveys "a good and sure marketable fee simple title" to the property. The deed has been recorded in the office of the County Court Clerk of Christian County, Kentucky.

The property was acquired from funds received through donations by people in Hopkinsville and the surrounding area.

#### CONSULTATIVE SERVICES

Recommendation: that the President's report of consultative services approved be accepted as presented.

Background: Approval has been given for the person listed below to perform the consultative service indicated with the usual understanding that such services will in no way interfere with the performance of regularly scheduled University duties:

Dr. Abraham Wikler, Professor of Psychiatry, to serve as a member of the Psychopharmacology Study Section of the National Institutes of Health, for a term beginning July 1, 1964 and ending June 30, 1968.

#### DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS PROPERTY

Recommendation: that the property items listed below be declared surplus to the needs of the University and that disposal be made in accordance with the recommendations following each group list.

Background: These property items have been declared surplus to the needs of the various University departments using them. The possibility of their use by other University departments has been explored, and it is the recommendation of the Supervisor of Inventory and Insurance that they be considered surplus to the whole University. Mr. George R. Kavanaugh, Associate Business Manager, has reviewed this recommendation and concurs in it.

# FEES AND TUITION CHARGES FOR INSTITUTES SUPPORTED BY GRANT FUNDS

Recommendation: that the University of Kentucky waive fees and tuition charges (except special fees included in direct costs) for students enrolling in Institutes or courses supported wholly by Federal or foundation grants made to the University and wherein overhead or indirect costs of the University are reasonably covered by customary or prevailing rates of reimbursement. The reimbursement for overhead or indirect costs from grants of the foregoing type shall accrue to a general University income account.

Background: The directors of National Defense Education Act and National Science Foundation Institutes have had difficulty with University fees and tuition regulations when writing proposals and applications for grants as well as in the final accounting procedures for these grants. These difficulties result from the grantor's regulations which do not allow for any payment of funds which will be used in the amortization of bonded indebtedness. These regulations make it necessary for these tuition costs to be recovered from other sources within the University when assessed for participants in these Institutes. The result is the recording of internal budget transfers without financial benefit to the University. Adoption of the recommendation would facilitate the submission of proposals, the director's activities, and the business office financial reporting. No financial loss to the University would be involved.

#### E. Supplementary Recommendations

President Oswald next presented supplementary recommendations as outlined below, explaining that these had been received too late for inclusion in the "Blue Report" but were similar items:

### SUPPLEMENTARY RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

#### PATENT ASSIGNMENT TO KRF

Background: On January 27, 1964, our patent attorney filed an application for a patent on an invention of Dr. Warren Smith. It concerns a Tobacco Spearing Apparatus. Dr. Smith has assigned his patent rights to the University of Kentucky. It has been customary procedure on patents for the Board of Trustees to assign the patent rights to the Kentucky Research Foundation.

#### F. Dr. Kenneth Harper Named Dean of Men

Dr. Oswald indicated that he was now ready to present a recommendation for the appointment of a dean of men, reminding the members that Dean Leslie L. Martin had requested permission to relinquish his administrative duties and return to teaching and research effective July 1, 1964 and that the Board had approved his request. It was his recommendation that Dr. Kenneth Harper be named dean of men effective July 1, 1964. He reminded the members that Dr. Harper had served as acting dean of men during the academic year 1962-63 and was currently serving as associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and director of the International Student Center. In his recommendation of Dr.

Harper's appointment as dean of men, Dr. Oswald expressed the feeling that he should continue to serve as director of the International Student Center and that this Center should be administratively connected with the office of the dean of men.

On motion by Judge Sutherland, seconded by Dr. Murray, and carried unanimously, Kenneth Harper was named Dean of Men, effective July 1, 1964, and approval was given to his continuing to serve as Director of the International Student Center.

These two bodies have given their approval and recommend Mr. Conkwright, Dr. Straus, President Spragens, and Mr. Watkins for honorary degrees at the commencement exercises on May 18, 1964.

#### P. J. CONKWRIGHT

P. J. Conkwright is a native of Winchester, Kentucky, and was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1928 with a major in English. He received his master's degree from the University of Oklahoma where he spent some years as a book designer in the University of Oklahoma Press. In 1939 he was called to Princeton University as typographer and designer for the books of that distinguished University Press. Since then Mr. Conkwright has won more awards for book design from the American Institute of Graphic Arts than any other American designer. No fewer than 41 of his books have been chosen among the "Fifty Books of the Year".

Mr. Conkwright's standing as a scholar is recognized by Princeton University where he holds the rank of Associate Professor and Lecturer in Graphic Arts. In 1955 he received the Gold Medal of the American Institute of Graphic Arts. He spent the year 1956-57 on a Guggenheim Fellowship, visiting the more

important presses of England, France, Holland and Germany. In 1959 he was elected to membership in the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Mr. Conkwright has agreed to make the Margaret I. King Library an official repository for his designs. He has further consented to act as artist-designer for all Centennial publications of the University of Kentucky.

The University Faculty nominates Mr. Conkwright for the degree of Doctor of Letters.

#### THOMAS ARTHUR SPRAGENS

Thomas Arthur Spragens was born in Lebanon, Kentucky, in 1917. He attended the University of Kentucky where he received an A.B. degree with a major in economics in 1938. The following year he spent as a research assistant in the Kentucky Department of Revenue and in 1939-40 he studied in the Graduate School of Syracuse University as a Maxwell Fellow in Public Administration. From 1940 to 1945 he served in turn in the United States Bureau of the Budget and as an assistant in the wartime Foreign Economic Administration. In 1946 he became Assistant to the President of Stanford University. In 1951 he became the first Secretary-Treasurer of the Fund for the Advancement of Education, a subsidiary of the Ford Foundation. In 1953 he was elected President of Stephens College in Columbia, Missouri.

Since November 1957, Mr. Spragens has been President of Centre College in Danville, Kentucky. Here he has succeeded in revitalizing the total program of the College, he has shown a keen appreciation of scholastic values, and has worked conscientiously and effectively toward the attaining and retaining of a faculty of the highest quality available. "Under his leadership," writes a member of his Board of Trustees, "the educational program at Centre has greatly improved in depth, scope, and balance. His role in the present development program at Centre has been outstanding."

The University Faculty nominates President Spragens for the degree of Doctor of Laws.

#### ERWIN WALTER STRAUS

Erwin Walter Straus was born in Frankfurt, Germany, in October, 1891, and received his M.D. degree from the University of Berlin in 1919. Through his practice, teaching, and writing Dr. Straus early established himself as a scholar of the first order. In 1925 he published his book on suggestibility, Wesen und Vorgang der Suggestion. This was followed in 1930 by Geschehnis und Erlebnis and five years later by his most famous work, Vom Sinn der Sinne. This last is in its second German edition, has been translated into French, and has recently appeared in English as The Primary World of the Senses. Dr. Straus has written more than 60 scholarly papers and monographs.

In 1938 Dr. Straus fled the Nazi terror in Germany and came to this country as an alien refugee at Black Mountain College in North Carolina. He became an American citizen in 1944 at which time he moved to a research fellowship at Johns Hopkins University. In 1946 he came to Lexington, Kentucky, as Director of Research and Education at the Veterans Administration Hospital. Here he started the tradition for cooperative research between the Hospital and the University of Kentucky. Through the years he has been associated with the University as a consultant and as a voluntary member of the faculty of the College of Medicine.

In 1958 Dr. Straus was nominated for the Kraepelin Chair of Psychiatry at the University of Munich but disqualified himself because of his desire to spend the remainder of his life in Lexington, Kentucky. He did spend the academic year 1961-62 as visiting professor at the University of Wurzburg and that university conferred an honorary doctoral degree on him.

The University Faculty nominates Dr. Straus for the degree of Doctor of Laws.

#### JAMES STEPHEN WATKINS

James Stephen Watkins was born in London, Kentucky, in November 1892. He attended Sue Bennett College in that city and studied in the College of Engineering at the University of Kentucky until he entered military service during World War I. In 1930 he took leave from his professional work to complete requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering at the University of Kentucky and in 1938 he was awarded the degree of Civil Engineer. Meanwhile, Mr. Watkins had risen through the ranks of the Kentucky Highway Department to the position of Chief Engineer in 1927. From 1943 to 1948 he was Commissioner of Highways. Since 1933 Mr. Watkins has been senior partner of a firm of consulting engineers which bears his name. He is generally considered to be one of the most eminent members of his profession in this section of the nation.

Mr. Watkins has exhibited remarkable interest in higher education in general and with the University of Kentucky in particular. Since 1955 he has been Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the College of the Bible. From 1954 to 1961 he was a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. He is presently a member of the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Research Foundation, is a past president of the Alumni Association, and was the first president of the Kentucky Medical Foundation.

In 1959 Mr. Watkins established an educational foundation which bears his name. This foundation has endowed scholarships at Berea College, Transylvania College, Sue Bennett College, and the College of the Bible. Just recently it has established a \$2,400 fellowship for a graduate student in engineering at the University of Kentucky.

The University Faculty nominates Mr. Watkins for the degree of Doctor of Laws.

The members of the Executive Committee expressed their wholehearted concurrence with the recommendations presented by the University Faculty and, on motion by Mr. Broadbent, seconded by Judge Sutherland, and carried unanimously, President Oswald was authorized to notify Mr. P.J. Conkwright, President Thomas A. Spragens, Dr. Erwin Walter Straus, and Mr. J. S. Watkins that the University wished to recognize the outstanding contribution which each has made to the University and the Commonwealth of Kentucky by awarding an honorary degree at the commencement exercises on May 18, 1964.

#### H. Agreement with Spindletop Research, Inc.

Dr. Oswald then called attention to a joint policy statement regarding the cooperative utilization of facilities and equipment of the University of Kentucky and Spindletop Research, Inc., indicating that this was the first step of many cooperative arrangements which would be worked out with Spindletop Research. The policy statement as given below sets forth the terms of agreement and Dr. Oswald recommended its approval by the Executive Committee.

# JOINT POLICY STATEMENT REGARDING THE COOPERATIVE UTILIZATION OF FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY AND SPINDLETOP RESEARCH

It is the established policy of both the University and Spindletop Research to encourage cooperation in the utilization of both professional talents and physical facilities wherever and whenever possible to the extent that this may be accomplished without interfering with the primary objectives of either organization.

The spirit of cooperation between Spindletop Research and the University is indicated by the resolution of Spindletop's Board of Directors, February 1963, to contribute funds to the University of Kentucky for the purchase of research equipment. The Board of Trustees of the University, at its meeting of 15 February 1963, recognized his resolution with an expression of gratitude and understanding of the desirability of encouraging the principle of cooperation between the two institutions.

Although these feelings have been generally understood by all parties, a more specific guide to the implementation of this program is felt to be required.

First, and as stated above, it is to be understood that the accomplishment of the primary objectives of either organization must dominate any cooperative effort or use of facilities which is entered into. This admonition should not, however, be interpreted in its narrowest sense, but with due regard for the intangible longer range benefits which may accrue from the mutual strengthening of the scientific stature of both institutions, the area, the Commonwealth.

Second, where the utilization of major facilities, such as those of the Computer Center, the Chemistry Department, or the Physics Department where continuing and significant expense is required for operation and maintenance, is necessary, there shall be provided equitable reimbursement. Such arrangements should be negotiated and administered between the Kentucky Research Foundation for the University and the Vice President for Operations of Spindletop Research.

Third, there shall be no commitments made in these matters by the members of the staff of either organization without the knowledge and approval of the chairman of the departments involved or their designees.

Fourth, in cases where the utilization of minor facilities or equipment is proposed and where there is no significant involvement of personnel time or materials, such accommodations should be provided without remuneration.

This statement of policy and practices has been distributed to the appropriate personnel of both organizations, effective on this date and to continue until amended or withdrawn.

On motion duly made, seconded, and carried the Executive Committee approved the policy statement regarding the cooperative utilization of facilities and equipment of the University of Kentucky and Spindletop Research. Inasmuch as Dr. Oswald is a member of the Board of Directors of Spindletop Research, it was recommended that the agreement be signed by Dr. Angelucci as chairman of the Executive Committee.

### I. Meeting Adjourned

Dr. Angelucci welcomed Mr. Robert F. Kerley to his first meeting of the Board since being named as Vice President--Business Affairs and Treasurer and expressed the hope that he would be at the meetings for many years in the future.

Dr. Oswald and the members of the Executive Committee were asked to remain after adjournment for a brief executive session. There being no further business, the motion was made to adjourn at 1:30 p.m.
