

Minority numbers 'improving'

Enrollment for the fall semester on the Lexington Campus is up slightly, according to early enrollment figures from the University System.

Between the Chandler Medical Center and the Lexington Campus, 24,100 students are enrolled for the fall 1997 semester, as

opposed to last year's fall enrollment of 24,061.

"We work very hard to recruit students," asid David Watts, vice chancellor for academic affairs.
"The goal of the administration is to keep enrollment steady, and to keep serving the students already enrolled," he said. Next year's enrollment should be comparable, Watts said.

The largest enrollment gain was in black freshmen who consist of 7.6 percent of the entire freshman class. Overall black enrollment increased 3 percent thanks to the large numbers in the freshmen class. Blacks represent 1,240 students on the Lexington Campus.

Lauretta Byars, vice chancellor

numbers are up because of "all the hard work that has been going on in all the colleges. The University is committed to providing an all inclusive learning community."

To keep these minority numbers up, television commercials are in the planning stages for the Louisville area that will cater primarily to minority students, Byars said. The Louisville has the largest numbers and ranks among the highest in percentage of black students at UK.

In the last 10 years, minority tenrollment at UK has tripled from 60 in the 1987 freshman class. The number of applications from minority students has also increased, Byars said. African-American students are

seeing UK as a "viable option," she said.

Despite these increases, accounting freshman D'Andre Anderson said UK still does not have as many black students as it should.

"My friends wouldn't come here because of the primarily Caucasian environment," said Anderson, who is black.

Biology junior Michelle Hall said taking minorities on recruitment trips may boost the number of minority students.

"You could walk across campus and not see any (other minorities)." Hall said.

Senate passes aid amendment

By a vote of 84-4, the U.S. Senate voted to approve an amendment to the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services and Education, and Release of Labor, Health and Human Company of the American State Student Incentive Grants (SSIG) for fiscal year 1998. It was sponsored by senators Jack Reed (D-R.L.) and Susan Collins (R.-Md.).

This is good news for college and graduate students.

"Considering that TAs and RAs at UK make 10 to 11 thousand a year and don't have health insurance, anything that the federal government is willing to do we're thankful for," said graduate students.

"The State Student Incentive Grant program assists states in providing grants to eligible students who attend institutions of higher learning and have substantial financial need," according to the Department of Education's web site.

Along with Pell Grants,

Perkins Loans, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, federal Work-Study and federal student loans, SSIG is one of the six largest federal aid programs, according to the National Associ-ation of Graduate and Profes-sional Students. Congress has allocated a total of \$8.6 billion for student loans this year.

Congress has allocated a total of \$8.6 billion for student loans this year.

Unlike other programs such as Pell Grants and Perkins Loans, SSIG does not go directly to students from the federal government, so many students have never heard of it. SSIG funds all go toward student financial aid.

"SSIG is critical to higher education, critical to the dreams of more than 700,000 students across the nation and 13,000 students just in my home state of Rhode Island," Reed said.

SSIG monies are distributed as matching funds to each state. That is, the department of Education distributes the funds to the states according to the ratio of students eligible to participate in state SSIG programs to the students eligible to participate in the Federal SSIG program. The federal SSIG program.

Douglas plays Nicolas Van Orton, a re-hashed version of Gordon Gecko from Wall Street who owns a \$600 million company and lives alone in his inherited mansion.

Unfortunately, Fincher takes a long time to get where he's going, leaving the viewer's patience to deteriorate while waiting for an explanation. When the end finally does come, it comes unexpected but not the least bit surprising.

Presented annually by USA Baseball, the Golden Spikes Award is given to the best collegiate player based upon athletic ability, sportsmanship, character and overall contribution to the sport on any level.

Downs, selected by the Chicago. Cubs in the third round of June's Major League Amateur Draft, recorded a 17-15 mark and a 3.44 earned-run average in his three-year career as a left-handed pitcher with the Wildeats.

Last season, the Louisville native became UK's all-time strikeout leader, punching out 25 batters during his career. The Pleasure Ridge Park High Schot product starred 40 of the 44 games he played in at UK, pitching 11 complete games.



the amount of money the state allocated, multiplied by that ratio. Kentucky participates in the program, as do all other 50 states. However, the funds are by no means guaranteed. The House version of the appropriations bill callatins no funds for SSIG. The House and Senate must work out

the differences in conference committee, which might include reduction or elimination of the SSIG allocation. Should President Clinton veto the allocations bill, SSIG might be cut.

"The SSIG program is effec-"The SSIG program is effective in encouraging states to allocate funds for need-based student aid programs. Elimination of SSIG will gauge a significant loss of funds for many needy students and will discourage states from providing this important type of student aid." said Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA).

Last year, the \$50 million in

federal SSIG funds produced \$784 million matching state funds, according to senator Collins.
The only Senators voting against the amendment werp John Ashcroft (R-Mo.), Pete Domenici (R-N.C.), and Don Nickles (R-N.C.), and Don Nickles (R-Okla.). Both senators from Kentucky, Wendell Ford and Mitch McConnell, voted for the amendment.

The allocation of \$35 million for SSIG is a cut from fiscal year 1997, but is \$3.6 million above the allocation for fiscal year 1996. As a matching fund, its funding levels fluctuate from year to year.

Most students wonder when someone else is going to solve this problem and nothing ever gets done, but today it can be different. Today students have a golden opportunity to vent about local towing companies. The chance will come when a committee of the Lexington—Fayette Urban County Council meets today to discuss a proposed ordinance that further regulates the unpopular towing businesses.

The catalyst for the proposed ordinance has been an increasing public outery over towing fees that can exceed \$100; a refusal by some companies to accept checks or credit cards, a failure to notify police in a timely manner that cards have been weed; and the practice of paying people to scout parking lots and call in illegally parked cars once people walk away.

You may either go for a degree as I do or choose classes for their interest with no pressure for papers or tests. It is a chance to still learn and grow, to keep one's mind active and to associate with bright young minds.

However, I ran into a questionable policy at Wallace Wilkinson's University Book-

store the other day when I went to buy a textbook. The used book I bought cost \$16.50. That seemed high for a beat up, marked up book but I needed it so I bought it. When I got home I looked at it more closely. The publisher's price was shown as \$7.98 and there was a partially torn tag that had marked the book down to \$4. Positive the \$16.50 was a mistake, I returned to the bookstore where a clerk looked up the price of a new book. It was \$22. He thought the \$16.50 I paid was reasonable.

I don't think paying \$16.50 for a beat up book published at \$7.98, marked down to \$4 and then marked back up to \$16.50 is reasonable. This is not a book listed on the rare book market.

Most of the students I have met are on pretty tight budgets and while merchants are certainly entitled to a fair mark-up, \$16.50 does stretch the point, particularly from a bookstore affiliated with the University.

The world flies by as we obsess over tabloid coverage

n an age of constant communication, the lack of understanding by Americans of world events is staggering. We are frightfully poor in the comes to the forces that affect our lives and those of other people. Though there are many causes for this myopic vision, one root is the tablouldzation of our major news sources.

addicting snack. What used to be called "fluff pieces" are more and more becoming the everyday flavor of American news.

The most wretched example of news tabloiding was the coverage of the death of Dirga, Princess of Wofe, Diana was a world public gure, and her charitable works wern many and beyond reproach. Her untimely passing deserved to home proposed the world deserved overage. But Diana's fatal cacident was virtually the only story covered by news organizations in America for three days. Every angle of her life and death was never an organizations in America for the county of t one root is the tabloidization of our major news sources.
What is tabloiding of news? It is different than creating news stories or misdirection on the part of the broadcaster. Tabloiding is the truncating of important news stories (or their elimination altogether) in favor of the exploitation of lesser but more titillating stories. For instance, reports of world happenings or congressional investigations are overslooked for celebrity insights or the newest

Every network spent hours question-ing tabloid editors, replaying her wedding and speculating on her relationship with Dodi Fayed, her companion. Each day, from Sunday through Tuesday, the newest scrap of information was paraded onto the screen, trumpeted as a vital breakthrough, and then beaten into the dirt by every other reporter. Every news source, from the "Today" show to National Public Radio, lamented the journalistic excess by the rouge photogra-phers, and a monotonous message of how this could hampet the "legitimate" media in their pursuit of viable news stories was chorused by all of the (self-described) legitimate sources.

legitimate sources.

The irony was that the exploitative coverage turned all the networks into huge tabloids for those three days. The legitimate news sources obviously gorged

at the tabloid trough. The shameless rush to canonize Diana and vilify her pursuers was handled with stage-management and wretchedly over dramatic reporting that the National Enquirer could only dream about. No yellow rag magazine could top-ple CNN, Fox News, or the networks from their perches atop seed journalism's slagheap.

The low point in network coverage came when ABC's "Primetime Live" finally aired — roughly 70 hours after the accident — every conceivably piece of the actual news in a story that had been run through the grist mill. So Sam Donaldson and company had to pretzel themselves into near-libel to find a new twist. They "point[ed] the finger" (their quote) of blame for the accident squarely at the French government for not building guard rails in the Seine River tunnels of Paris. With no official report yet on the actual events of the crash they still felt

confident to condemn the roads policy of France for Diana's death. No tabloid would have said something so farcical with a straight face.

Meanwhile, during the grotesque batchanal of coverage of Diana's death, what did you miss in the real world? For starters, bounty hunters broke into a family home in Phoenix (legally) and killed a young couple (llegally). 





ANEANE GAROFALO IS trying not to be a star. She hates photo shoots. She has no publicist. She doesn't sport designer clothing. And she refuses to accept that people recognize her on the street. Wearing an Iowa Hawkeyes T-shirt, black sweatpants, horn-rims, bead necklaces, silver cuff bracelets, and a smattering of discreet tattoos, the comedian-actress sips a hazelnut latte at a Manhattan coffee shop, shushing an interviewer and shielding her face when questions about her famous friends fill an unexpected hush. "It's embarrassing," she says. "I can't give over and admit to it, so I have to say I'm not famous. Whenever I see a person on TV saying Well, being so famous that I can't walk down the street...' I'm like, 'You're such an idiot. Even though [you] are really famous, keep it to yourself. Don't say it."

She may not be saying it about herself, but others certainly are. Garofalo's having a hard time maintaining either her denial or her anonymity as the credits pile up. Most recently, she's cropped up in her fifth season on HBO's Larry Sanders Show, for which she received her second Emmy nomi-

nation; August's Cop Land, alongside Robert De Niro and Sylvester Stallone; and an August HBO comedy special. In November, she'll star in The Matchmaker, a romantic comedy likely to attract the same audience that so loved her in last year's \$35 million-grossing The Truth About Cats and Dogs.

But The Truth didn't quite set her free: Despite her lead role in that film, Garofalo still considers herself a character actor whose star potential is bounded by her 5'1" frame and her refusal to sacrifice her personal life. "Your Demi Moores, your Tom Cruises, they don't mind giving over 100 percent of their time to the machine," she says. "When they find the time for themselves and their family, I have no idea. I'm not willing to do that, and I don't even have a family."

Garofalo's hero Albert Brooks believes that mind-set may well be her salvation. "Her best quality," he says, "is the feeling you get that she'd be just as satisfied working in front of 16 people in a garage in Seattle."

Indeed she would. Despite her high-profile cable special, Garofalo says she prefers to work in such small, "alternative" comedy joints as downtown Manhattan's Luna Lounge and L.A.'s Hot Cup of

Talk. In film and music, too, her taste runs to the quirky. Of the 16 movies in which she's appeared, 10 have been indies. Her love for alternative music propelled her into a cohost job on MTV's Indie Outing and a gig interviewing bands on the syndicated radio show Listen Up Seven Up.

Obviously, she makes no effort to court the middlebrow mainstream-in part, because it has sometimes left her bruised and frustrated. Witness Garofalo's illfated half season on Saturday Night Live in 1994-95. "It was a cult: vou were forbidden from speaking the truth," she says. "I blame myself for being intimidated. I should have left when I really wanted to, which was actually before the first show even aired."

Or consider the truth about Cats and Dogs: Garofalo, who dislikes romantic comedies, was drawn to screenwriter Audrey Wells' acerbic attitude toward physical beauty—but disappointed by Twentieth Century Fox's insistence on a happy ending. "I don't regret doing it; I regret that it wasn't a better movie," Garofalo says. "But when you're doing a

commercial film, you gotta have the people kiss at the end and have the dog drag you on roller skates."

"Right now, romantic comedy is her bread and butter," says *Match-maker* costar Denis Leary, who's known the 32-year-old New Jersey native since her days on the Boston comedy circuit a decade ago. "But for Janeane to put her foot down [and refuse to do more] is not a big step away from where she already is."

Until she takes that step, however, Garofalo isn't ruling out romantic comedies-though she now looks for other enticements to sweeten the deal. For The Matchmaker, in which she plays a Boston senator's harried aide sent to Ireland to dig up her boss' roots, the allure was the three-month location shoot. While filming with director Mark Joffe (Cosi), costar David O'Hara (Braveheart), and an Irish cast and crew in the fishing village of Roundstone (pop. 250), Garofalo relished her physical and psychological distance from Hollywood's body obsessions. "For the first time in my life," Garofalo recalls, "there would be people like, 'Oh, you're a tiny little thing; you've got to eat something.""


Meanwhile, at home, a real-life matchmaker might come in handy. Now between boyfriends, Garofalo's in the throes of an unrequited crush. "It fuels my comedy," she says. "What's funny about someone who likes you back?" Instead, Garofalo shares the bed in her Greenwich Village co-op with Mercer, a miniature Pomeranian, and Dew, a Lab mix.

Currently juggling a variety of TV, film, and stand-up appearances in New York, Garofalo dreams of leaving movies behind to do talk radio or host a TV interview show à la Tom Snyder: "No f---ing comedy, no bits, no skits, no band. Spend the whole half hour with one guest. In New York, so I could walk to work"—her first two fingers walk through the air—"go to my studio, tape my show, doodle-doodledoo"—the fingers turn and stroll the other way—"walk home. That'd be perfect for me."

The sequel features a mix of gleeful gore and up-to-the-minute high-tech F/X, including, boasts Waller, "the first computer-generated were-

wolf in film history" and a stunt sequence that features a miniature model of the peak of the Eiffel Tower. "The most difficult thing to do is to get a creature to have hair," says Waller, whose lycanthropes were born of greenscreen shots and heavy-duty wolverine prosthetics. "Each werewolf had 2 million hairs, and each one had to have its own inertia and momentum. In comparison," he adds dryly, "dinosaur skin is easy."

For art's sake, Waller's stars endured six-hour makeup sessions to achieve their transformations. "It was just a long drawnout process of people tickling the crap out of you with these little brushes," says Scott, who sports fake veins, glued to his neck, that bulge with the help of air pumps. "The smell [of the glue] alone drove me a little crazy."

Once in full wolf regalia, Delpy, whose lupine incarnation lets loose in Paris at each full moon—"to get some hearts, because that's what they eat"—found her requisite ranting and raving almost second nature. "I love to scare people in my private life," she says mischievously. "I can fake any kind of epilepsy crisis, because in school I would always

pretend I was really sick to avoid going to class."

Didn't the fetching Delpy and Scott have to set all vanity aside to play *Paris*' freaky fur balls? "Oh,

man, do you," confirms Scott, who recalls, "We were really ugly were-wolves," and particularly vouches for Delpy's grossness: "She is absolutely hideous." Not that Waller made that abundantly clear from the outset. "At the

beginning he told me that he would make my werewolf attractive and feminine—much more feline than a wolf," Delpy says with a laugh. "But in the end I was

very disappointed."

Still, all agree that the chance to follow up one of the cult classics of the '80s made any hardship worth it. Notes Scott: "A friend of mine said this could be the best sequel since Porky's II."







those homemade manifestos about everything from sexism
to navel lint—have circulated for
years among the fringe, the faddish,
and the cutting edge. Now big publishers, in pursuit of countercultural
cash, are handing 'zine editors book
deals in unprecedented numbers.

Most of the 20-plus projects to date are anthologies or pop-culture primers based on individual 'zines. Michael Weldon's B-movie mag Psychotronic Video, for example, morphed into 1996's The Psychotronic Video Guide (St. Martin's). Ditto for 'zine tomes on thrift shopping and Seinfeld. But pork brains?

That kind of bizarre product is fodder for Paul Lukas' consumerculture 'zine, *Beer Frame*. After an *Utne Reader* rave, Lukas landed *Spin* and FORTUNE gigs, an agent, and a Crown deal. "Unlike editors

who write about weird sex or fringe politics," Lukas says, "my material can work on an underground and a mass level."

The weird sex and fringe politics, meanwhile, can be found in Palloy John aditor Line

Rollerderby editor Lisa Carver's Dancing Queen (Holt), which extols Fabio and bestiality, or activist Jim Goad's The Redneck Manifesto (Simon & Schuster), aimed at readers of his politically combative 'zine ANSWER Me!

And though some anticorporate 'zinesters cry "sellout," no one—yet—has gotten rich. "I don't think we broke even,"

says Karen Green (left), coeditor (with Tristan Taormino, right) of erotic 'zine Pucker Up; their anthology, A Girl's Guide to Taking Over the World (St.

Martin's), garnered only a four-figure advance. Says Goad, "The only ones who scream 'sellout' are the ones who can afford not to sell out."






