## Gatewood talks the tough issues

The underdog: 6th district candidate Gatewood Galbraith gives it one more go around in politics

He wants the government to stay out of your billfold, your bedroom, your bathroom, your bloodstream and your back pocket.

"It's called alliteration, and it's using the B's," said Gatewood Galbraith, Reform Party candidate for the 6th district congressional race.

But in even more simple terms, the 53-year-old criminal defense attorney just wants government to back off. Galbraith is a firm believer that government is too big and too intrusive, and his platform proposes plans to get government out of Americans' lives.

Galbraith's proposal for ridding the American people of "giant corporate leeches" is prevalent in his platform for health care, which is arguably the hottest issue in this campaign. While his opponents, Democrat Scotty Baesler and Republican Ernie Fletcher, favor a patient's bill of rights, Galbraith sticks to his argument that government is not responsible for controlling health care.

"The real issue is, do we want to go to a socialist Canadian health care system?" Galbraith asked. "I think it is ridiculous to have a patient's bill of rights. Since when were patients' rights limited to a list?"

Even though Galbraith supports the idea of "little government," there are issues where he feels government should step up and do the job. One of those issues is education.

When running for governor of Kentucky in 1995, Galbraith proposed that government provide every high school graduate a \$5,000 virtual stipend for books

and tuition. This money could only be spent if the student goes to classes.

Now, instead of the stipend, Galbraith said he would like to try to remove the cost of tuition at public institutions totally if he is elected to Congress.

Galbraith said he also feels that government has a legitimate role in controlling hard drugs. But government-funded prisons aren't the answer. Galbraith is a huge supporter of the medicalization of drugs, including marijuana, and the privatization of prisons.

His strong opinions on legalizing marijuana are no secret to Kentuckians. Galbraith supports the use of marijuana for medical and industrial purposes; as well as hemp for industrial purposes. By using hemp as a cash crop, Galbraith argues that the country's environmental problems would be minimal.

"We wouldn't be using fossil petroleum," he said. "Hemp more readily stores the sun's energy."

Although many people in Kentucky might recognize his name, his face and his pro-marijuana views, Galbraith has continued to keep his "underdog" title in each candidacy.

He collected 8 percent of the vote in the 1999 gubernatorial election — but he also collected 31 percent of the vote for governor in the 19 counties of the 6th congressional district, which he says can help him win the congressional title.

Galbraith also insists that students can help him win this race.

"It is extremely important that college students get involved in this race," Galbraith said. "I need their energy."

## Cleaning up the pollution in politics



Scrubbin': Activist duo drives to Lexington, spreads Nader's ideas through bars of soap

Amy Marschak and Lori Theis hop out of their white van, clad in coveralls and balancing mops in their hands.

They unload yellow mop buckets and organic soap from the van's rear.

Not to clean anything, but to prove a point.

They drove from Washington, D.C. to UK yesterday on a special cleaning mission: to rid the nation of the corporate influence they say is tainting the presidential campaign.

The tour is part of the campaign for the Green Party and anti-corporation candidate Ralph Nader.

Nader, a consumer advocate, does not accept money from corporations, political action committee funds or soft money. Al Gore and George W. Bush both accept these. This tour is to show America the difference between Nader and the other candidates on this issue, Marschak said.

"It is to highlight the selling of democracy," she said. "And that there is a choice in this election."

Two other vans are on the tour. Marschak and Theis will travel to Louisville, Paducah, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa and other Midwestern states. Lexington was their first stop.

"We feel like the corporations have our nation in a stranglehold," Theis said. "This was the state organizer in

Oklahoma for the Green Party last year. She said she became interested in the Green Party upon realizing it was the only party that opposed the death penalty as a matter of conscience.

Many believe that voting for the Nader is throwing away a vote. Marschak and Theis think it is just the opposite.

"It is the only vote not wasted," Theis said. "Just voting is a total message to Washington."

Each Nader vote helps build the 5 percent needed to get federal funding for the Green Party in the next election, she argued.

"When people are afraid of third parties, they need to go back and realize that most reform was born from third parties," Theis said.

Theis borrows a quote from Nader to explain the corporate influence in the campaign: "The only difference between these two candidates is the velocity at which they drop to their knees when big business comes calling."

Marschak, whose coveralls pockets were loaded with tiny bars of organic soap for the "clean-up," became a Nader supporter while in the voting booth last election. Feeling let down by Clinton and not wanting to vote for Dole, Marschak noticed Nader's name on the ballot.

"If I didn't vote for who I believed in, what is the use of democracy?" she said.

## Clinton warns USS Cole attackers

NORFOLK, Va. — Declaring there is “no safe harbor” for terrorists, President Clinton warned the attackers of the USS Cole warship in Yemen, saying the United States “will find you and justice will prevail.” At a patriotic and somber ceremony honoring the 17 sailors killed aboard the ship, some family members of the sailors who died cried as Clinton spoke. Meanwhile, the bodies of two more American sailors were recovered today from the crippled destroyer in Yemen, and the search continued for four others believed still aboard.

## Counsel blasts Clinton testimony

WASHINGTON — First lady Hillary Rodham Clinton gave “factually inaccurate” testimony about her role in the White House travel office firings but did not warrant prosecution, Independent Counsel Robert Ray has concluded. Ray wrote in his final report released yesterday, just three weeks before election day, that the evidence established beyond a reasonable doubt that, contrary to her testimony, Mrs. Clinton played a role in the 1993 firings of seven White House travel office workers.

## Bush campaigns in Wisconsin

ST. LOUIS — Republican presidential candidate George W. Bush urged supporters at an air-pod rally in Eau Claire, Wis., to spread the word about the differences between himself and Democratic rival Al Gore emphasized in the debate. With the contestants in a White House race rated dead even headed into the final dash to the Nov. 7 election, Bush said, “Nobody should take anything for granted.” Bush mocked Gore’s assertion that as president, he wouldn’t increase the size of the federal government. “Now there’s a man who’s prone to exaggeration,” Bush said.

## Social Security checks to jump

WASHINGTON — The 45.2 million Americans getting Social Security checks will see them grow by 3.5 percent next year, the biggest cost-of-living increase in almost a decade. That’s because inflation has picked up speed, almost entirely a reflection of surging energy prices. The benefit increase for retirees will average \$29 a month. The increases, which will begin showing up in benefit payments for January, were announced by Social Security based on inflation figures released yesterday by the Labor Department.



**RACIN:** For all intents and purposes ending a tumultuous nine-year career, Rage Against the Machine lead singer Zack De La Rocha has announced his departure from the incendiary rock band. In a statement released on Wednesday, De La Rocha blamed an ongoing breakdown in communication among the band’s members.



**ONE HEADLIGHT:** When Jakob Dylan sat down to write the songs on “Breach,” the band’s new CD, he realized that a lot of people would be listening. He tried writing what he thought people would want to hear — and I was miserable,” he said. “It’s completely dishonest.”

## Chad cheers into into oil industry

KOME, Chad — Chad joined the ranks of the oil producers yesterday with the launch of a multibillion-dollar project led by the Exxon Mobil Corp. President Idriss Deby inaugurated work on the \$3.5 billion, 663-mile pipeline that will transport oil from southwestern Chad to Cameroon’s Atlantic port of Kribi. The wells are expected to come on line in three to four years, and Chad stands to earn between \$2.5 billion and \$8.5 billion over the 25 years the oil reserves are expected to last.

## MP3.com agrees to licensing deal

SAN DIEGO — The National Music Publishers’ Association Inc. and MP3.com Inc. yesterday reached a preliminary settlement that will make more than 1 million musical compositions available on the popular My.MP3.com. The three-year agreement calls for MP3.com to pay up to \$30 million to the association’s licensing unit, Harry Fox Agency Inc. The publishing association had sued MP3.com over the use of its members’ songs through My.MP3.com, an Internet service allowing users to listen to music from CDs they already own or which they purchase from MP3.com’s retail partners.

## Scientists revive ancient bacteria

BERKELEY, Calif. — Bacteria that lived before the dinosaurs and survived Earth’s biggest mass extinction have been reawakened after a 250-million-year sleep in a salt crystal, scientists say. The bacteria’s age easily beats longevity records set by other organisms revived from apparently suspended animation. If the discovery by Pennsylvania and Texas researchers holds true, the bacteria could open a window onto a prehistoric world that was both dying and being reborn.

## Dow down 151 after falling 433

NEW YORK — Stocks dropped sharply in volatile trading yesterday, pulling the Dow Jones industrials down more than 400 points before bargain hunters moved in and helped the market recover much of its losses. Just before 2 p.m. EDT yesterday, the Dow was down 151.31 at 9,938.40.

## New York braces for subway series

NEW YORK — One night after the New York Mets and their backers celebrated crosstown, New York Yankees fans cheered, chanted and caajoled the defending World Champions into the first Subway Series since 1956. “It’s like magic!” exclaimed Lisa Duffee as the Yankees exploded for six seventh-inning runs last night to jar the Seattle Mariners 9-7 and join the Mets in the World Series. The series opens Saturday night at Yankee Stadium.

# Early detection can save lives

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month and college women need awareness.

Breast cancer is a disease that affects women all over the world. More and more cases are being diagnosed every year and the patients are becoming increasingly younger.

"We (UK Comprehensive Breast Care Center) are seeing younger breast cancer patients than ever before," said Linda Murray, clinical nurse coordinator at the center.

According to the American Cancer Society, breast cancer is the leading cause of death among women ages 40-55. The ACS estimates that in the next year there will be about 182,000 new cases of invasive breast cancer in the U.S. and 40,800 deaths will be caused by the disease.

In 1998, the Kentucky Cancer Registry reported 3,079 diagnosed cases of breast cancer, making it the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Kentucky that year.

Breast cancer is more often found in women, but the disease also affects men. For every man diagnosed with breast cancer, 100 women are diagnosed with the same.

As far as women's concerns go, breast cancer is second to skin cancer in diagnosed cancers and is second only to lung cancer in deaths for women.

"Breast cancer mainly affects white women over 40 years of age, but things are changing and there is no set stereotype for patients of breast cancer anymore," Murray said.

Murray said women must know their genetic backgrounds so they are aware of their risks.

"It is important that women know their history and risks factors for being diag-

nosed with breast cancer," Murray said.

The American Cancer Society said a woman has a 1 out of 8 chance of being diagnosed with the disease.

Major risks factors of breast cancer are gender, genetics, family history and a personal history of breast cancer. Murray said having a first generation relative, mother, grandmother or aunt with the disease greatly increases the risk.

Symptoms of breast cancer include a lump in the breast, dimpling or puckering of the skin or a change in the texture of the skin. Murray said that any changes in a woman's breast should be considered important and she should consult a medical professional.

"It is not known what causes breast cancer, but a woman can do things to help prevent and reduce risk factors of the disease," said Murray.

Murray said women should exercise and have a low fat diet because the fat stored turns into estrogen over time and the estrogen helps feed breast cancer to continue its growth.

The ACS said that 5 to 10 percent of breast cancer cases are linked to genetics. New drugs are being developed and tested to help prevent the formation of cancer cells for women who have a family history of the disease.

Murray said that women should perform breast exams on themselves every month at the same time of the month for early detection. She also said that physical exams are important and should be done every year.

Lift one arm over your head. Check the breast with the other hand.



Lie down with one arm over your head. Check the breast with the other hand.



Lift one arm over your head. Lift the breast with the other hand. Check the entire breast with circular, up and down, and side to side lateral movements.



Check nipples for discharge.

# Month-long transit strike ends

Stranded: Sixty-eight percent of Los Angeles residents inconvenienced by strike

LOS ANGELES — Negotiators reached a settlement Tuesday in the month-long transit strike that stranded nearly a half-million bus and subway riders and hit Los Angeles' working poor particularly hard.

The deal, presented Tuesday night to the union rank-and-file for a vote on ratification, could have buses rolling Wednesday and subways back in service Thursday.

The union's general chairman, James Williams, said the terms of the tentative contract were not immediately released.

The walkout sent 450,000 daily riders scrambling to get to work, school, doctors' appointments and grocery stores.

People drove, bicycled, got rides from friends or took advantage of illegal rides offered by entrepreneurs.

tion to attend English classes at an adult school.

"They've made us suffer for a month. A lot of people I know have lost their jobs," she said in Spanish.

The 4,300 bus drivers and rail operators represented by the United Transportation Union walked out Sept. 16 against the Metropolitan Transportation Authority.

Tuesday's breakthrough came after a marathon, all-night bargaining session assisted by the Rev. Jesse Jackson.

The terms of the tentative contract were not immediately released.

The MTA offered some bus service on "lifeline" routes, but most of its 2,275 buses and all 59 miles of light rail and subway were idled.

The strike worsened the traffic on the area's freeways, but otherwise few signs showed that there was a strike going on, leaving the poor and minorities affected the most.

While only about 7 percent of commuters in Los Angeles County use public transit, those who do often have few alternatives. Sixty-eight percent have household incomes under \$15,000 per year, and nearly three-quarters of bus riders are black or Hispanic, according to the MTA.

"We regret the hardship and inconvenience that it has caused to transit in Los Angeles County, but I can assure you our bargaining with UTU was necessary to protect the long-term financial interest of the MTA and continue to maintain and expand service to our customers," said Supervisor Yvonne Brathwaite Burke.

## UK men fall hard to Hoosiers, 2-0

The UK men's soccer team couldn't quite put it together last night to knock off the top-ranked Indiana Hoosiers.

With the 2-0 win over the Cats (7-6), the Hoosiers (12-3) stretched their winning streak to nine games. The win also kept the team a perfect 5-0 on the road.

The Cats, especially the defense, had a tough job coming into the match, but head coach Ian Collins felt that his defense did their part. Although, he wasn't as happy with the rest of the team.

"I thought our defenders played great," he said, "but you've got to ask where the rest

of our midfield was, where our strike force was and where our goalkeeper was."

The Cats came out and played a physical game from the beginning. The physical play held the Hoosiers' big three in check for most of the game.

"We beat them up physically," UK defender Marc Theriault said. "The physical nature was there, because we imposed it."

The Cats picked up 20 fouls, six yellow cards and one red card.

For most of the first half, no one was in control of the game. It wasn't until the 31st minute before the game saw its first goal.

Hoosier Pat Noonan sent a

shot on goal from 15 yards that UK goalie Brian O'Leary was able to tip over the goal.

But on the ensuing corner kick, O'Leary couldn't bust through the crowd to stop Tyler Hawley from heading it into the goal.

Three minutes later, the Hoosiers had another chance, but O'Leary's diving stretch was enough to tip Hoosier Michael Bock's floating shot.


In the second half, the Cats

found themselves trying to play catch-up against a Hoosier team that was happy to pack it in on their side.

The Hoosiers' second goal came on a breakaway in the 63rd minute. Noonan found himself with the ball, and no defenders around. Defender Marc Theriault tried to get back, but was too late to stop Noonan's shot that went past O'Leary.

Coach Collins said he wants to see his team put this one behind him, and focus on Friday's important conference game against Bowling Green.

"We didn't play our game, and we'd better show up on Friday and play," he said. "Otherwise, if we don't we'll get beat again."

## Cats headed south to battle the 'Bama teams

The UK women's volleyball team takes to the road this weekend in an effort to kick-start their SEC tournament bid. After dropping both games last weekend, they are 2-5 in SEC play and 4-14 overall — placing them in the basement of the SEC Eastern division.

They will face Auburn University on Friday and Alabama on Sunday.

"We definitely want two wins, we have to win, everyone knows that and we're going to go in looking for that to happen," said senior middle blocker Megan Weiskircher.

They face Auburn first (11-9, 1-6 SEC). The Lady Tigers are led by a pair of seniors with outside hitter Brooke McCarley racking

up 4.15 kills and 1.09 digs this season to lead the offense. Middle blocker Jaunelle Hamilton also helps out on the offensive end with 3.51 kills a game as well as contributing 2.36 digs and 1.21 blocks a game to lead the defense.

On Sunday the Cats then make the short trip to face SEC West-leading Alabama (16-5, 5-2 SEC).

Alabama is led offensively by Michelle Green, a senior outside hitter, with 4.48 kills and 2.47 digs a game. Sophomore middle blocker Shelly Adamcik, who averages 2.81 kills, 1.56 digs and 1.15 blocks a game, supports her.

This weekend will mark the first time the Cats' new offense takes on the road, which sees three middle blockers and two outside hitters employed in the front line rather than two

middles.

"We needed a change, and had to figure out how to put different people in new slots," said coach Jona Braden.

The new offense had good results last weekend as a number of career-highs were set in the Cats' narrow loss to Georgia.

Three Cats posted double-doubles with sophomore outside hitter Kristen Batt recording new career highs with 27 kills and 26 digs. Weiskircher added 18 kills to go with her 15 digs, her sixth double-double of the season and junior setter Whitney Sample had a season-high 66 assists to go with her 11 digs.

"More responsibility is placed on me, Weiskircher said. "I now have to hit in three position and I play every position on court now."

Against Georgia, the digging was also picked up with three other Cats getting into double figures. Freshman outside hitter Brooke Dodson, set a new career high with 12. Defensive specialists Aleisha Craven, a sophomore, and freshman Candace Cogan both had 15 a piece.

"I want us to finish any kind of opportunity, have a good first swing and we need to keep growing," Braden said for the weekend.







# The tools of a wasted youth

**But mom, I don't want to go outside:  
The entertainment of a new generation**

Who would have thought that two shifty vertical lines and a bouncing bland square would have instigated a multi-billion dollar entertainment industry? Electronic Pong boxes, the first being Magnavox's Odyssey 100 in 1972, captured the imagination and pocketbook of American consumers. The Fairchild Channel F system, released in 1976, incorporated a cartridge system to store different games. It failed to turn a profit, but inspired future game systems.

It actually took several years for the famous Atari 2600 to become profitable. Released in 1977, the 2600 became significantly successful during the arcade video game boom in 1980, according to video game history web site [www.videogames.org](http://www.videogames.org).



Atari wasn't the only system thriving in the video game boom. During the late '70s and early '80s, several companies entered the home video game market, including Mattel's IntelleVision and the Connecticut Leather Company's ColecoVision. In fact, according to [www.videogames.org](http://www.videogames.org), a Fortune magazine article published March 7, 1983, reported that Coleco's 1982 sales were \$510 million.

Then something happened in 1984. Americans became disinterested in buying \$100-\$200 video game systems when they could buy \$300 home computers that could do more than play video games. And the new lineup of games were, well, just plain bad — Kool Aid Man, Chase the Chuck Wagon and Porky's all had corporate themes and bad gameplay.

Atari almost went out of business, and the rest of the companies dropped video games. Despite the poor market, Japanese-based Nintendo released the Nintendo Entertainment System in 1985. The NES experienced a slow start, but quality games like Super Mario Bros., Castlevania, Contra, Double Dribble and Metroid soon drew the American public back to the video game system.

Better graphics and sound with a wide range of good games fueled the home video game market through each evolution — Sega Genesis in 1989, Super Nintendo Entertainment System in 1991, Sony Playstation in 1995, Nintendo 64 in 1996 and Sega Dreamcast in 1999. While Nintendo dominated the market until the advent of the Playstation, almost every major system saw profits in the highly competitive market.


With the pending release of the Playstation 2 driving American interest, the home console video game market will not dry up anytime soon.







# New game systems go the next level

**All I want for Christmas is a Playstation 2: The young and young at heart have new systems coming**



The Sony Playstation has been one of the top of the line game systems for years. That's about to change with a flood of more advanced game systems coming soon.

This Christmas "must have" present will not be another annoying electronic singing monster.

Taking American consumers' attention this winter is Sony's newest home video gaming console, the Playstation 2. Sporting functionality with superior graphic and sound capabilities, demand is extremely high for the system.

Unfortunately for Sony, supply will not be able to meet such demand. According to video-gaming news web site [ps2.ign.com](http://ps2.ign.com), Sony announced Sept. 27 that they were unable to supply 1 million Playstation 2's to American retailers as promised. Instead, only 500,000 will be available on the PS2's Oct. 26 release date, and 100,000 per week after.

With a \$299.99 price tag and a shortage of systems, will the Playstation 2 be worth getting this holiday season? Assistant Manager Jason Schott at the Crossroad Plaza FuncoLand video game store believes that the functionality of the PS2 cannot be passed up. The PS2 will play new PS2 games, along

with original Playstation games, DVD movies and music CDs. "You're getting four systems in one," he said.

Assistant Manager Tyshaun Miles at the Fayette Mall Babbage's video game store disagrees. At this present time, "90 percent of [the Playstation 2's] games look bland," he said.

A video game system will not do well without new games to keep the customer playing it. After all, "the games make the system, period," Miles said.

Stores that took pre-orders for the PS2 will be behind filling them due to the system shortage, and will most likely not have any for sale.

Stores that did not take pre-orders — such as Wal-Mart, Best Buy and K-Mart — will have limited quantities of the PS2 upon release.

Shipping schedules for post-release Playstation 2 systems are still being determined by most retail outlets. One should contact stores after release — and plan to keep contacting stores — to determine when the next shipment of systems are due to arrive.

The Playstation 2 isn't the only quality system in demand.

Currently on the market at suggested retail of \$149.99, the Sega Dreamcast console has comparable graphics to the PS2 and a solid assortment of games.

The Dreamcast is also the first console to support online game play, with sports game NFL 2K1 and first-person shooter Quake 3 Arena.

Next year two new video game systems are to be released: Nintendo's Game Cube and Microsoft's X-box. Nintendo's newest system will have more powerful hardware than the Playstation 2 and promises to have "the best games," Miles said. The Game Cube is slated for a tentative October 2001 release with a rumored \$150-\$200 price tag.

Microsoft's X-box has hardware specifications beyond every other system. It will also offer the best of all other systems, including DVD movie playback. However, Schott said "[Microsoft's] first shot at a console, so you never know." The X-box has a general release date of fall 2001 and estimated to be priced at \$300.



The Atari 2600 looks a lot different from today's hi-tech game systems. Instead of aerodynamic controllers with a dozen buttons, the 2600 had a "Joystick" (basically called this because the paddle consisted of a stick and one button).



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

# Posey's future looks bright

The Denver Nuggets played the Milwaukee Bucks Tuesday night in a pre-season game at Rupp Arena.

The Nuggets lost 95-83. Add the score together and that's about how many people showed up for the game.

Those who did attend got a chance to see some major talent.

One of those talents is second year swingman and Xavier graduate James Posey. In his first two years at Xavier, the Cleveland native was one of the top six men in the country. Prior to his senior season, Posey was named a pre-season All-American even though he'd only started a handful of games.

Posey didn't disappoint. He was named to the Atlantic 10 first team along with being awarded A-10 defensive player of the year. The Denver Nuggets choose him in the first round with the 18th pick of the draft.

"James has been terrific," said Nuggets coach and former UK standout Dan Issel. "We were very fortunate that we were able to draft him with the 18th pick last year. When we did our draft board prior to last year's draft, we had James rated as the ninth best player in the draft."

As a rookie, Posey played in all but one of the Nuggets 82 games and started 77, splitting time between small forward (his Xavier position) and shooting guard. At the end of the season he was named to the Schick All-Rookie Team.

When Posey's on the court this season, he'll be surrounded by more than just a few new faces. Gone from last year are Popeye Jones, Chris Herren, well-traveled sixth man Chris Gatling and

longtime Nugget Bryant Stith.

In are former Heat shooting guard Voshon Lenard, Tracey Murray from Washington, as well as former Nugget standouts Robert Pack and former Hoosier Calbert Cheaney from Boston.

Whether or not the Nuggets slip into the playoffs could depend on how well these new faces gel with the team's building blocks of Nick Van Exel, Raef LaFrentz and Olympic gold medalist Antonio McDyess.

"Coaches, they make moves that are going to benefit the team. I think now we're deeper at positions. We just have to gel right now, that's what's going on in the exhibition season," Posey said.

For Posey the transition from college to the NBA has been challenging. "What I try and do is ask a lot of questions of the coaches and my teammates. They helped my transition a lot," Posey said.

The grind of the 82 game NBA season also is a big adjustment.

"Yeah, it's hard," said the 23-year-old Posey. "The back to backs, the travel, you know, being away from your home, your bed, sleeping in a hotel. Things like that. It takes its toll. You just try not to think about being tired and try and give 100 percent each time out on the court."

Issel said he thinks Posey will continue to improve throughout the season.

"He's worked real hard this summer. I've heard a few people compare him to Scottie Pippen and certainly he isn't at that point yet, but he's got a game similar to Pippen's in that he's a tenacious defensive player and he can score when he needs to score. If he keeps working hard, he's gonna have a great NBA career."

He's good


