It is unbelievable that we did not realize our trouble was in the out-moded symbol which stands for our United States—Uncle Sam. For years we have been struggling blindly along, says Mr. Low, represented by a lanky, chin-whiskered Yankee from down East, whom we have long ago

It is readily seen, as our English friend point out, that the people of our country have become citified and sophisticated, and that although the picture of Uncle Sam was appropriate when Thomas Nast, the great American cartoonist, first drew the gentleman, he is now out-moded.


