## Sniper may have shot DiGiuro

Police were investigating yesterday the possibility that former UK football player, Trent DiGiuro, was the victim of a sniper's bullet.

Investigators searched the area surrounding 570 Woodland Ave. for clues to the shooting death of the junior offensive guard from Goshen.

DiGiuro, who would have turned 21 yesterday, was shot once in the head early Sunday morning on the porch of the home that he and two other UK football players shared.

Kentucky Kernel photographer, Darin Gray said he heard one officer shout, "We found a bullet by the window."

Although Lexington-Fayette Urban County Police Detective Donald Evans would comment on the report, UK geography senior Jerri Williams said she heard the same statement as she watched the officers explore two properties across the street and adjacent to the site of the murder, 454 and 456 Columbia Ave.

Evans confirmed, however, that police were investigating the trajectory of the fatal bullet yesterday to determine whether the responsible party was indeed a sniper.

"At this point," he said, "we are trying to come up with every possible angle."

Also, Evans indicated that evidence "is not leaning toward" the possibility that the bullet was fired at point blank range.

Two indentions were found in the grass at 456 Columbia Ave., which could have been left by a rifle bi-pod, but Evans said he believed most rifles are not heavy enough to make such marks.

Police also removed part of the drain pipe to inspect smudges and

dirt marks at 456 Columbia Ave., Swang Oo, a resident said.

She said police told her a sniper could have been leaning on the pipe while firing.

### The investigation

DiGiuro was pronounced dead at 3:12 a.m. Sunday morning. According to police and coroner's reports the cause of death was a gunshot wound to the head.

Eric Anderson, of 578 Woodland Avenue said he heard noises coming from DiGiuro's house. "Before I went to bed, their were people sitting on the porch," he said. "They were having a party, but nothing out of hand, just a few guys having a

good time."

Detective Larry Etherington said there were approximately six people at the party when police arrived, but neither he nor Evans would comment on the existence of eyewitnesses.

As of press time, police have no suspects and no leads, but Evans and Etherington said they are not ruling anything out.

Evans said preliminary laboratory tests "should be back anytime."

Aside from these tests, police

are hoping to locate a "dark blue Nissan type truck, 1986 to 1990 model with an extended cab, a green neon license plate, and a neon green cargo net" in place of the tailgate, Evans said.

On the night of the murder this car was seen around the house with four white males inside it, he said.

"I cannot stress enough that this is not a suspect vehicle," Evans said. "We just want to talk to them."

Police are also looking into

persons involved in a September 25, 1992 bar fight which resulted in the arrest and conviction of DiGiuro for criminal mischief.

## Mayor responds to crime fears

The blue UK flag still hangs over the front porch on 570 Woodland Ave. where Trent DiGiuro was killed early Sunday morning.

The back-up offensive guard for the UK football team was attending an early 21st birthday party, which would have been yesterday, when someone shot him in the head.

The blood, which seeped through the seat of his leather rocking chair where he sat to the wooden boards beneath, has been mopped and painted over to remove a stain.

But city and campus officials cannot remove the dark impression left upon near-campus residents as DiGiuro, 20, became the 14th homicide victim of 1994 and the sixth this summer in Fayette County.

In a neighborhood where many residents spend their evenings sitting on their porches and watching cars, joggers and strollers pass by, a senseless killing such as DiGiuro's spread the question: How can that happen in my neighborhood?

"We sit outside every night," said Ann Roll, who lives on nearby Columbia Avenue. "It could happen to anybody."

"It's just a shame that something like that in a quiet neighborhood can happen," she said.

In the neighboring UK housing-owned Cooperstown Apartments, which provides housing for graduate and married students and their families, resi-

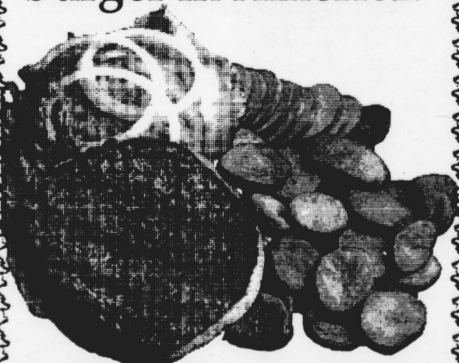

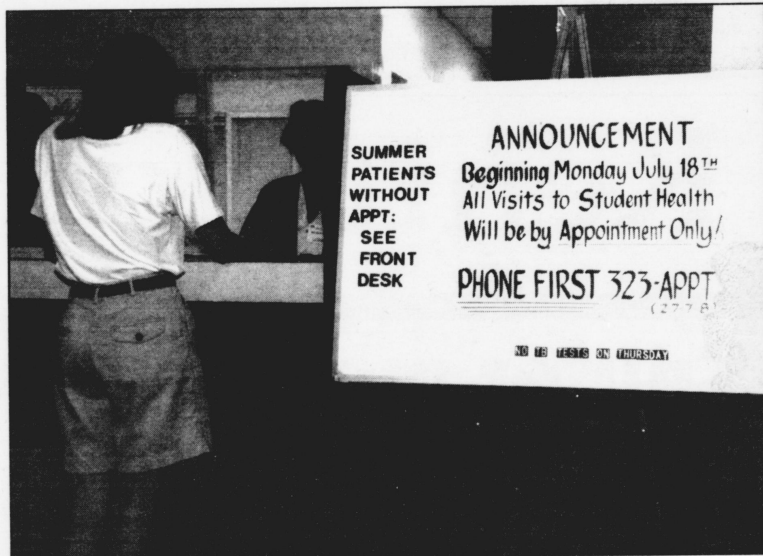

# Appointments started

## Walk-in policy abandoned

Before you go to the University Health Service again: STOP. Call and make an appointment first.

Monday was the first day of the newly implemented appointment system. UK, which operated on a walk-in system prior to the changes, will now require students to phone first.

Dolores Stanley, medical records clerk for the health service, was there for the first day of the new system.

"We were all very pleased," Stanley said. "The students got through on time."

The appointment system should minimize long waits for treatment because patients are now scheduled at fifteen minute intervals.

Students should call to make their appointments 2 or 3 days in advance. The new number is 323-APPT. This number connects a caller with an appointment clerk.

Urgent care patients are also encouraged to phone first.

"I have no problem with calling in before I go," said Verdie Craig, a UK allied health junior.

"I think it will make the system more efficient, but emergencies should still be seen quickly."

If students are unsure whether their symptoms require medical attention, a patient information nurse can answer questions.

323-INFO is the number to call to find out who to see, where to go, and how quickly you should receive attention. The phone information nurse cannot offer a diagnosis, but will direct students to seek the appropriate care.

"Our goal is to become more customer service oriented," said Jan Hurley, a health service administrator. "We have been working to achieve continuous quality improvement."

In implementing the "phone first" policy, UK hopes students will take advantage of making appointments from the privacy of their own homes.

"The phone first system is much more confidential," said Clinic Coordinator Lynn Crothers.

Dr. Spencer Turner, UHS Director, said the new plan is an

appropriate change.

"The appointment system allows us to make the best use of our resources," Turner said. "We would like you to view us as your family doctor."

UHS has four nurse practitioners and eight doctors treating students. The Mental Health Service appointments will not be affected by the new system.

Along with the new appointment system, renovations are also changing the University Health Service.

Non-recurring money from the student health fee finances the construction.

Phase one of the construction moves the administrative offices into the back wing of the health center.

A reception area will welcome the students to the service. New automatic doors for handicapped access are also planned.

Refurbished waiting rooms include more group seating, new study tables and new carpet to create a pleasant environment.

The renovations should be completed before the fall semester students arrive at the end of August. The staff hopes to address problems in the system before then and a suggestion box is available for student comments.

# Clapp resigns post; two will fill V.P. job

The duties carried out by UK Vice President for Administration Donald Clapp — who will resign his position at the university to chair the governor's Kentucky Health Policy Board — are to be assumed by two UK officials appointed by UK President Charles Wethington.

Wethington had little time to replace Clapp, and the office had to be divided between George DeBin, who is currently the special assistant to UK's vice president for information systems, and Robert Lawson, a law professor.

In addition to his current position at UK, DeBin also serves in the state Finance and Administration Cabinet as the project director of the Kentucky Education Technology System.

He said his past experience in corporate senior management positions formed how he deals with administrative affairs.

"I view everyone outside my organization as a customer," he said.

DeBin's new position as special assistant to the president for fiscal affairs will give him responsibility for the office of controller and treasurer, human resources, affirmative action and risk management, environmental health and safety, procurement and con-

struction and the university architect.

"I'm very happy to apply my knowledge and experience in the University while learning what the requirements are of our customers in the university, and supporting their requirements," said DeBin.

While DeBin takes on the fiscal responsibilities previously held by Clapp, Robert Lawson will act as the central administration's main coordinating officer. His term is limited to one year.

Wethington said he has not decided what will happen after that term is up.

Lawson has been designated to exercise the responsibilities of the president in Wethington's absence.

Lawson served as the Dean of Law from 1971-1973 and 1982-1988 and also has had experience in several special assignments involving the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center and UK athletics investigations. In addition, he

served as faculty representative to the NCAA for ten years.

"I'm delighted that I've got individuals like Lawson and DeBin who are able to take these responsibilities in such a short notice," said Wethington. "I'm convinced they will perform very well."

While Wethington looks forward to working with Lawson and DeBin, he views Clapp's resignation as somewhat of a loss.

"We are sorry to see Don leave the University since he is a long-time, valued administrator who has served this institution exceedingly well in several capacities."

Gov. Brereton Jones appointed Clapp and three others to define Kentucky health reform policies. The board will regulate everything from hospital expansion to the sale of insurance policies.

"Health care is a tremendous issue," said Clapp. "I'm drawn to the challenge of having an opportunity to be part of a really major program that sets up a new approach to dealing with health care in Kentucky."

Clapp hasn't set his new course without some retrospection, however.

"I have great attachment to the University," he said.

"This is the kind of tough decision you make with very mixed feelings."

# Angry WRFL fan jailed

*"Demon seed" letter leads to suit*

Ronnie Barrow wants his WRFL, and he has gone to extreme lengths to get it.

Barrow, of 108 London Ave., Stanford, Ky., plead guilty April 29 to three felony counts of mailing a threatening communication. He was scheduled for sentencing July 8, but the federal court committed him for further psychiatric evaluations.

Apparently, Barrow was angered when a Christian radio show, broadcast from the home of Don Drake, interrupted the reception of campus alternative radio station WRFL, Drake said.

Drake began broadcasting from his home in November 1992, and according to telephone records, it

was then that Barrow began making threatening and obscene calls in protest.

During these calls, which continued through April of 1993, Barrow ordered Drake to discontinue his broadcasts, switch frequencies, and he also talked obscenely to Drake's wife.

Drake stressed the severity of the case, saying Barrow also sent threatening letters to Ingrid Guzman, the host of Crosstalk, a syndicated Milwaukee talk show aired by Drake, as well as to two women in Danville who wrote anti-pornography letters to the editor of the local newspaper.

Brenda Wesley said she knew "something was not right" when she opened a letter and found four pages that had been torn from a pornographic magazine.

"I couldn't even finish the written letter," she said, "It said he was going to make my face like a 'toilet bowl of blood,' and that he wanted to 'plant me with his demon seed.' It made my husband sick to his stomach."

Wesley said she and her husband took the contents of the envelope to the Danville police, but they lost it.

She did, however, have a copy of the letter, and when a friend told her about Guzman's Crosstalk mention of receiving a similar letter, Wesley agreed to speak with the FBI.

Wesley said she hopes he receives more than the five year maximum sentence.

"If he gets out, and is out walking the streets, whose to say he's not going to carry out those threats," she said. "Does somebody have to be killed in order for justice to be done?"

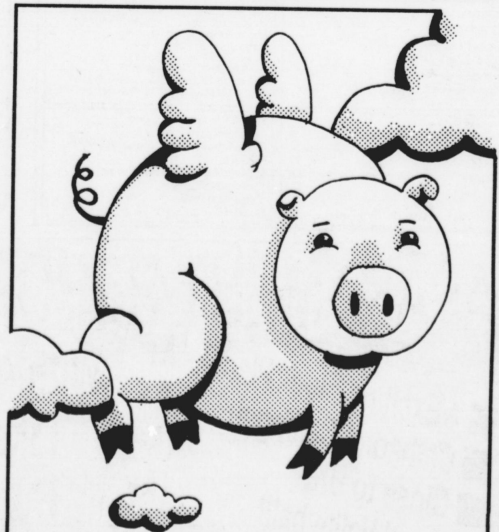

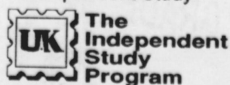

# UK settles hospital suit

## Two hospital doctors file charges of sex harassment

An out-of-court settlement on Thursday marked the end to a gender and racial discrimination lawsuit against the UK Albert B. Chandler Medical Center that has lasted nearly two years.

Two female physicians, Irma Williams and Magdalena Jaszczak, filed the lawsuit. Both women claimed to be victims of sex discrimination at the hospital, according to a Herald Leader

article last week.

In addition, Jaszczak, a native of Warsaw, Poland, said she faced discrimination because of her ethnicity.

The women originally sued the medical center separately in lawsuits filed about three weeks apart. The cases were later merged into one complaint.

Although the suits failed to name specific doctors and administrators, the University and the hospital were named as defendants in both.

The terms of the settlement remain undisclosed. Doug Bruce, director of support services, said one aspect of the settlement prohibited further discussion of any kind regarding the specifics of the lawsuit by either party.

Both Jaszczak and Williams were enrolled in an anesthesiology

residency program when the suits were filed.

The women began working at the hospital in July 1991 in the anesthesiology program. Three months later, Jaszczak was put on probation. She was later demoted, despite the fact that her evaluations were equal to or better than some of her male colleagues, as noted in the lawsuits.

Jaszczak also said that hospital employees made jokes about her Polish heritage. The suit stated that despite hospital officials' knowledge of the discriminatory practices, no effort was made to halt them or take any disciplinary action.

Williams said that she was also subjected to a hostile environment at the medical center, and was later demoted without just cause or reason.

# Russian scholars seek answers to ethnic mix

Before Perestroika, Russian first-graders read this quote in their textbooks: "15 republics are like 15 sisters."

New generations of Russian students, however, will no longer hear this message, said two Russian scholars visiting UK last week.

"More than 10,000 people were killed because of ethnic conflicts," said Leokadia Drobizheva, a chair of the ethno-sociological department of the Moscow Institute of Ethnology and Anthropology.

"Hundreds of thousands of people were forced to leave places where they lived for their entire lives and seek refuge in Russia or other areas because of the same reason," she said.

Drobizheva and her colleague Airat Aklaev spent last week working with the UK political science department to find answers to the ethnic problems plaguing the liberated republics.

Stuart Kaufman, an assistant professor in the department, has been studying the ethnic problems in the former Soviet Union for the last two years.

He said the main goals of the Moscow scholars were to discuss the results of their research, to write a joint academic article on the subject, and to outline the prospects of future cooperation with UK.

"Our Russian colleagues obtained a lot of valuable information on ethnic conflicts," Kaufman said. "Most of it was not published in English. Working

with us will help Moscow scientists become better known in the West.

"It also will give them an opportunity to apply some Western theories on ethnic conflicts which need to be considered by Eastern scholars."

The guests from Moscow made a presentation in the Patterson School of Diplomacy and International Commerce.

"We were surprised by the interest that the University of Kentucky students expressed in what is going on in the former Soviet Union," said Drobizheva.

"We were glad to share the results of our research with them."

When asked about the future for the new republics grappling with ethnic tension, Drobizheva replied that the situation should improve.

"Although there is no way to resolve the conflicts completely in the near future, there is an obvious tendency for these conflicts to become weaker," she said.

"For example, the situation in Pridnestrov'e and Southern Osetia, two 'hot spots' in the territory on the former Soviet Union, has been improved recently," Drobizheva continued. "The troops which were brought from Russia actually stopped the war. When people calm down, it will be possible to start negotiations."

Drobizheva and her colleagues at the Moscow Institute of Ethnology and Anthropology attempt to resolve the ethnic problems in the former Soviet

Union. Drobizheva belongs to a group of advisors who counsel Russian President Boris Yeltsin.

"We share our knowledge with the people who have a power to make decisions," she said.

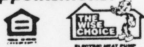

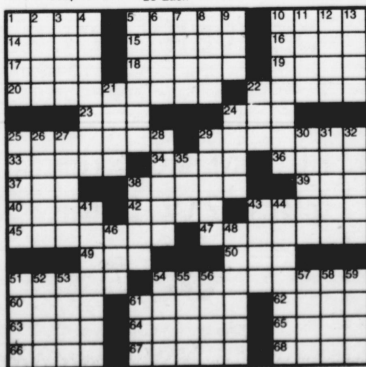

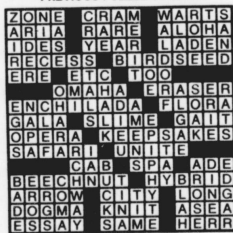

Nannie Holton learned how to quilt when she was 12. She grew up on a Kentucky farm; she was one of ten children in the family. Every girl in the house was expected to master the craft of quilting.

Since then 80 years have passed, but Horton, 92, still fills her evenings with quilting to keep herself busy and happy.

"Every night I turn on the TV and start to work," she said. "I enjoy it very much."

Last week, Holton's work was presented in an art exhibit sponsored by the UK Sanders-Brown Center for aging.

"The participants of the exhibit are of ages from 65 to 94," said

Jim Concotelli, the exhibit coordinator and a research assistant at the UK Sanders-Brown Center for Aging.

"Their works," he said, "prove that there is no age limit for being creative."

Marie Hochstrasser, a 68-year old weaver; blacksmith Charles Horrar, 70; painter Amos Lawrence, 84; woodcarver Howard Stark, 84; and other participants of the show demonstrated their skills to an audience, answered questions, and talked about themselves.

"I retired from my job couple of years ago," said Hochstrasser, "but I will never retire from weaving."

"It brings a lot of excitement to my life. I think older people must

keep their minds on something more interesting than their health. In fact, their health is flourishing if they are busy and excited with something beyond themselves."

The exhibit is part of the 11th Annual Summer Series on Aging Conference, which was held at the downtown Lexington Hyatt-Regency Hotel.

"The topics covered by our annual conference change every year. This year we put a lot of emphasis on the arts," said Linda Kuder, assistant director for the Center.

"We were going to convince both old people and their caregivers that aging may be a productive and creative part of person's life."

# New tragedy shakes UK football, Curry

Now is the time of year that Bill Curry's football mind usually shifts into high gear.

It is mid-July, after all, a time when Curry's focus should be on offensive sets and defensive schemes.

But for the second time in 15 months, Curry and his UK football squad are faced with a team tragedy.

Instead of looking forward to the upcoming season, Curry must come to terms with, and help his players through, the shooting death of one of their teammates, junior offensive guard Trent DiGiuro.

Although mystery still clouds the investigation into DiGiuro's murder, Curry's feelings about the former walk-on player seem clear.

"(DiGiuro) had made the dean's list at a very tough University academically, and at the same time had built himself to where he had a good chance to be a starting player," Curry said on Monday. "Very few people could have pulled that off."

On the heels of Ted Presley's April 23, 1993 death, which was also gun related, Curry faces the difficult task of preparing himself to move on to football.

In addition, more than 100 football players are entrusted into his care. Curry must aid them in dealing with losing two teammates in just over a year.

And the job gets tougher, Curry said, when dealing with the breed of student athletes that comprise a football team.

"We are trained to be hard-nosed, macho, self-sufficient tough guys," Curry said. "Tough guys aren't supposed to cry or require counseling or anything of the sort."

"But in fact we're all human beings. I hope that the players will really benefit from the counseling that is available to all of our students here at the University."

Curry's players have been shaken. In time their minds also will focus on football, leaving the dark memories of the Trent DiGiuro tragedy behind them. But they won't forget.

"It's just another stepping stone that we have to get over," said senior wide receiver Randy Wyatt. "Right now we're kind of down, but we have to just do things the way Trent would want us to and keep moving on."

dents were caught off-guard by the violence.

"We were surprised because nothing like this ever happens around here," Raol Neni, a UK computer science graduate student, said.

But locally this year murders are happening relatively often. If the current homicide pace continues, Fayette County may record as many as 28 murders for 1994, which is more than 1992 and 1993 combined (27).

However, Lexington Mayor Pam Miller said trends mean little in relation to murder counts.

"I don't know how we can make a pattern of it," she said. "We may not have any more (homicides) this year."

Also, she said when Lexington is compared with other cities across the country, its murder tally is low.

Miller said the only way city officials can counter more murders is by legislation, such as restricting handgun ownership in the area.

Already, city officials asked permission of the concluded 1994 Kentucky General Assembly to pass stricter gun control ordinances for Fayette County.

Miller said legislators denied the request.

# NCAA should drop academic standards

When Proposition 48 took effect in the mid-1980s, cries from coaches, athletes and educators echoed throughout the hallways of high schools and colleges across the country.

These regulations, which were passed by the NCAA in an effort to improve the academic standing of athletes at the high school and college levels, were tagged by many as unfair. Opponents advocated that they showed blatant discrimination toward black athletes.

The NCAA didn't listen. Now, with countless athletes suffering from Prop 48's wrath and with minority groups being affected most by such standards, the NCAA continues its tyrannical rule.

Under the existing NCAA guidelines, athletes must achieve a minimum grade point average of 2.0 in 11 core courses, as well as score 700 or higher on the SAT or 17 or above on the ACT, in order to qualify for an athletic scholarship.

Further measures have been taken to strengthen these standards. In light of the detrimental role Prop 48 has played, they will surely worsen the circumstances.

These new standards establish a sliding scale of academic demands. Athletes with a GPA of 2.5 or higher must achieve a minimum score of 700 on the SAT or 17 on the ACT. Those with

GPA's of 2.0 must score 900 on the SAT or 21 on the ACT.

Now, the NCAA has raised the number of core classes to 13. Like Prop 48, this new legislation has sparked a raging battle among numerous groups.

Led by Temple basketball coach John Chaney and Southern Cal basketball coach George Ravelling, the Black Coaches Association contends that such legislation is eliminating athletic opportunities for countless black students.

And the belief isn't without solid backing.

An NCAA-funded 1992 study showed that black athletes are sidelined by Prop 48 regulations much more frequently than their white counterparts. In 1990-91, for instance, 68 percent of ineligible athletes were black.

While that mark is slowly declining, it is still obvious that these guidelines are racially biased and the toughening of academic standards in 1995 will only add to the problem at hand.

Other NCAA studies have equally alarming findings.

One recent study concluded that the use of standardized tests

as an effective measure for determining success at the collegiate level was "questionable at best."

Add to that the fact that four out of five non-qualifiers lose the opportunity to participate in big-time collegiate sports because of these test requirements, and the NCAA's stand on academic reform becomes even shakier.

Consider that the SAT exam has been proven to be both socio-economically and racially biased and the conclusion is simple.

The NCAA is shutting out black athletes.

An organization that has prided itself on providing opportunities for great numbers of young people is now the cause of the loss of opportunities for a great number as well.

If the NCAA truly wants to help student-athletes, they should listen to proposals made by the BCA to eliminate all academic standards.

It's the only fair way to address this sort of situation, since equal education is still not a reality and racial biases abound.

If the NCAA would concentrate on promoting massive education reforms at the high school level, and help stamp out discriminatory practices, all athletes would be better off and the academics would improve as well.

Among the best is the ABCD Camp in Teaneck, N.J. Masquerading as a legitimate reporter, hobnobbing with real reporters and coaches, I infiltrated ABCD and came up with this list of players in whom UK might be interested.

• Robert Traylor (6-foot-9-inch forward, Detroit) - He's big (over 270 pounds), but he has quickness and grace. Nicknamed "Tractor" Traylor, he looks like an NFL lineman but he moves like Jerry Rice. Traylor, who features a soft jumper out to the 15-foot range, is ranked among the top five play-

ers in the country by most recruiting services. UK is working hard to gain his interest.

• Mark Blount (7-foot center, Yonkers, N.Y.) - Blount has great physical potential, but in terms of polished skills he seems to have a long way to go. And he looks to be missing that extra something in terms of heart that most athletes need at the next level.

• Shafeef Abdul-Rahim (6-foot-9-inch forward, Marietta, Ga.) - Though he's 6-9, Abdul-Rahim isn't packing much baggage, tipping the scales at a slight 200 pounds. But he makes up for his build with heart, battling hard for offensive position and rebounds.

He has ample quickness and athletic ability, allowing him to go around — or over — big men he can't power through. UK and Georgia Tech are the front-runners for his collegiate choice.

UK's recruiting efforts aren't limited to the ABCD Camp, of course. Rick Pitino has his eyes on a number of players who weren't in New Jersey last week. Among them:

• Ron Mercer (6-foot-7-inch forward, Madison, Tenn.) - Rated in the top three players by all recruiting services, Mercer looks like a good one. He's one of the best in the country at breaking down a defender. UK is in the running, but nobody's ignoring Mercer, who is also interested in Tennessee, Vanderbilt, Arkansas and North Carolina.

• Luther Clay (6-foot-9-inch forward, Pittsfield, Maine) - An explosive force off the floor, Clay is comfortable with his back to the basket or facing up behind the three-point stripe. He is a fifth-year senior attending prep school.

Clay, who is originally from Ohio, seems to have Cincinnati atop his list of favorite schools.

"It is important to me to keep this place alive," said Steps, adding that the peace center is important because there "people are accepted for being who they are."

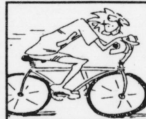
To show this acceptance, Steps provided art supplies to customers and their creations became part of the atmosphere at

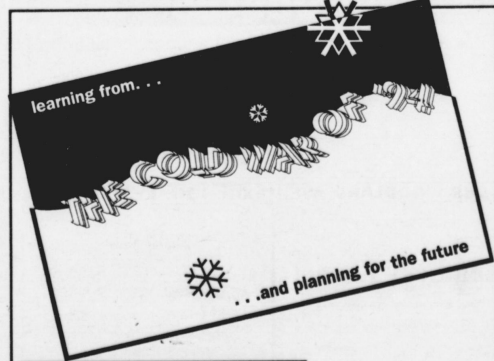

Some students with busy work and/or class schedules were forced to miss class or forego medical care.

Although students still must fend for themselves when too ill to attend class, the administration, led by University Health Services Director Dr. Spencer Turner, is trying to lessen the load for students with the introduction of an appointment system, implemented Monday.

Additionally, the system will allow physicians' advance knowledge of their patients conditions, making the doctor's better prepared to treat them.

We are thrilled to offer praise (for a change) to the University administration for this new program, and we are optimistic about the potential for increased efficiency within the realm of campus medical care.

Kudos to Turner and the gang at the UK medical center for putting the recent \$4.75 per student health fee increase toward improving the system for the UK community.

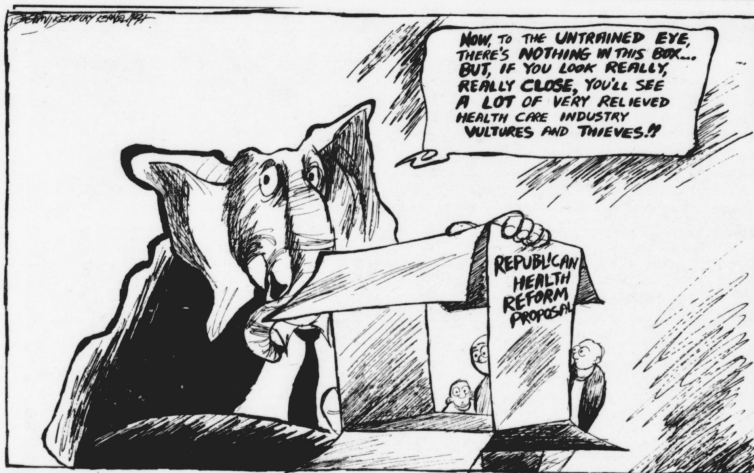

Limbaugh's critics — a collectively loud and long-sustained voice in the media and political elite — accuse him of twisting facts to purport his philosophy and of lifting his "victims'" words out of context to change their meaning.

Yet, where are these voices of fairness and accuracy every time the loyal cogs of the left throw smoke in the face of truth-seeking Americans? A TV ad promoting health care, for example, ran a rapid-fire series of clips depicting republican senators saying "there is no health care crisis" closing with the blanket statement: "The Republicans. They just don't get it."

The other problem with the commercial is that all of the clips were lifted out of context: one senator had actually said (Limbaugh graciously ran the unedited clip on his television

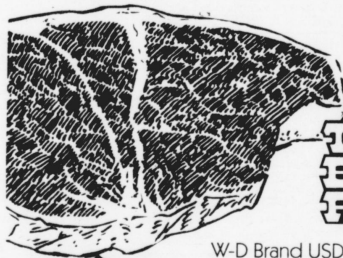

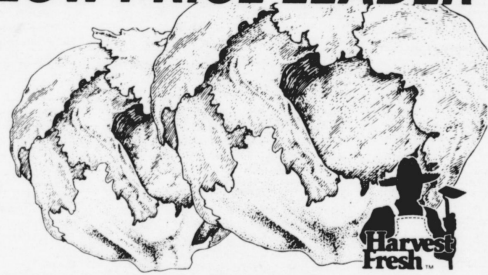
