

Mr. John Cox, a notice of whose death was given in the ~~Eagle~~ ^{paper} of the 10th inst. was a native of England. From the political principles he had adopted in early life he was warmly attached to the cause of American liberty, but did not remove to the United States until he had attained the age of more than sixty years. From the period of his emigration he ever evinced a lively interest in the welfare of his adopted country; and from the time of his naturalization till his death gave proof of that interest by a regular attendance at the elections, to record his vote as an independent and upright citizen. During one half of his protracted life he was afflicted with total deafness, and consequently deprived, in a great degree, of the enjoyment of social intercourse. This calamity he bore with fortitude and resignation and supplied his loss, as far as his leisure hours would permit, by the gratification to be derived from a select course of reading. In all the relations of life his conduct was marked by integrity, kindness, and a warm interest in the welfare and happiness of his family circle; and by his surviving relatives his memory will ever be cherished with the warmest affection and esteem.
