

The third teacher in Kentucky, I infer from Collins' History, vol. II, p. 183, was John McKinney, at Lexington, in 1780. He it was who had the celebrated adventure with a wild-cat, in 1783, in his log-cabin school-room — described in such graphic language in the "Sketches of Western Adventure," written in 1833 by ~~that~~ John A. McClung, afterwards a very prince among Presbyterian ministers, and ~~publ~~ first published by a Presbyterian elder, the late Judge Lewis Collins, of Maysville.

I could give you some interesting details about these and others of the teachers in Kentucky before 1800; but I see this article is already full long, and is hardly of the most suitable character for a religious weekly.
