NCAA rule may force changes at Wildcat Lodge

UK Athletic Association officials re waiting for guidelines before Joe B. Hall Wildcat Lodge, which may violate an NCAA rule passed last week prohibiting exclusive athletic

violate an NCAA rule passed last week prohibiting exclusive a thletic dormitories.

Until they receive the NCAA's interpretation of the guidelines, the officials said they don't know what, if any, changes are necessary to bring the privately funded \$500,000-plus lodge into compliance.

"That's like putting the cart before the horse," said assistant basketball coach Leonard Hamilton. "At this spoint you have to wait."

"There's just no reason to do anything yet," athletic Director Cliff Hagan said vesterday. "Really everybody is in the dark right now.

The NCAA legislation states that any equipment and services, such as room furnishings of extra quality and quantity not available to general students, are prohibited.

Resembling a ski lodge with its three fireplaces, sama bath, steam room, natural wood paneling and bedrooms with private baths, the plush basketball dorm may have to undergo some changes to comply with the new rule, which is effective Aug. I "There are housing facilities on this earnyus much nicer than what we have in our dorm," UK Basketball Coach Joe B. Hall said last week in The Louisville Times. "Well comply with whatever they say, there'll be no had feelings."

The Lodge has rooms for 16 players and four guest rooms. The basement holds a recreation room, containing a ping-pong table, pool table and pinball machine and a television room with a giant sofa, color television mod machine. These housing benefits might be considered illegal extras, according to statements last week by NCAA investigator Tom Yeager.

During the NCAA convention a delegate who asked not to be identified said the legislation was prompted "almost entirely by the new basketball dorm at Kentucky.
"There has always been some talk,

"There has always been some talk, some sentiment against athletic dorms, but the Kentucky baskeball paiace is the straw that broke the camel's back," he said.

John Toner, athletic director at the University of Connecticut and a member of the NCAA Council that submitted the proposal, said last week the purpose of the legislation is to limit what student athletes can have. "It is, meant to keep the Haves from having special recruiting advantages over the 'Have-nots'.

special recruiting advantages over un-Have-nots.

"We aren't saying a school cannot have a dormitory that's better than all the others." Toner said. "In reality, almost every institution has some student housing that's newer or nicer than others."

In response yesterday, Hagan asked, "How can you equalize everything?" He said the legislation applies to quantities and qualities of athletic dorm furnishings, and asked, "What decorator do you use?" to determine what quality of furnishings are allowed. "Is the NCAA going to hir an interior decorator?" he asked. Although each player has a private bedroom and bath, Hagan said he didn't think this was against the new rule because both on - and off-campus student housing comparisons should be considered. "There are many people who have one-bedroom apartments," he said.



Uncertainty on budget, construction poses problems for UK

With the state legislature considering tax and budget cuts in its special session, the financial plans of many state agencies and state-supported institutions are clouded with uncertainty.

At UK, where state support accounts for slightly more than half of the operating budget, a freeze on the state capital construction fund has stopped work on some projects and interfered with others.

(The fund, which is used to pay for construction approved by state government, has been criticized by state Auditor George Atkins and Lt. With the state legislature

government, has been criticized by state Auditor George Atkins and Lt. Gov. Thelma Stovall as being poorly managed. Because capital construc-tion is one of the areas when are likely, Gov. Julian Carroll's inistration stopped construction

spending to conserve funds.)
Projects that have already

contracted and are underway, such as the new Fine Arts Building and Law Building addition, are not affected, said Business Affairs Vice President Jack Blanton

But construction of a \$12.5 million primary/ambulatory care center —
which has been designed and planned
— has been delayed by the freeze, said

which has been designed and planned has been deleayed by the freeze, said Blanton.
Under the construction freeze, a project may not be moved to the next stage of development, but the present stage can be completed, said Clifton Marshall, UK director of design and construction.
The four stages of development are programming, design-development, preparation of contractual plans for bidding and actual construction of the project, Marshall said.
The following projects have been stalled in early stages of development, according to UK officials.

—A Medical Center Obsterries Unit renovation, which will cost \$400,000.

—An academic and technical building at Maysville Community College, \$1,300,000. —An addition to the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory, \$800,000.

— Elevators for physically handicapped persons, \$400,000.

— A learning resources center at Elizabethtown Community College, \$230,000.

They include renovation of the Medical Center emergency room, central campus landscaping and renovation of library space at Hopkinsville and Henderson community colleges.

During the budgeting process for the 1978-80 biennium, university administrators argued that salary increases were needed for many positions, or the schools would have problems keeping qualified personnel. With the possibility of cutbacks in the state budget, the University's own budget timetable has been delayed, said Ed Carter, director of the budget office.

Until University officials can be certain of how much money the state will appropriate, definite plans about salaries and other expenditures for the next fiscal year must be delayed. According to Carter, the schedule calls for a finished budget to be delivered to the University Board of Trustees at their May meeting. The special session will delay the budget-making work, but the time can be made up, he said.


Tobacco officials ignore facts in renewed attack on HEW

It's disappointing that the latest report on the dangers of smoking brought nothing more than the dangers of smoking orogan that not routine denunciations from the tobacco industry. After all the years and after all the studies that have shown smoking is harmful to health, you'd think cigarette manufacturers and their lobbyists would begin to vield.

But no. Anticipating the report before it was even issued, the Tobacco Institute charged the latest HEW study with being more "rehash than research" that "plowed old ground," and said that HEW chief Joe Califano, a former smoker, was carrying out a

personal crusade against smoking.

The new 6th District Congressman, Republican
Larry Hopkins, quickly ran his pro-tobacco
credentials up the flagpole. "It's clear that Scretary Califano has declared open warfare on the tobacco farmer and is therefore totally unfit for his office." Califano, said Hopkins, is "a do-gooder we can do without."



Criticism of the report's conclusions, when such honest criticism can be found, does little to disrupt the findings: tobacco is fiercely dangerous to people who smoke it, and the complicated array of carcinogenic products in tobacco smoke make it questionable whether a "safe" cigarette can ever be developed.

Other criticism seems spurious at best. Attacks on Joe Califano are irrelevant and prove nothing about smoking; government investigations on such dangers began more than a decade ago and their conclusions are not the result of one man's conviction.

Kentucky Sen, Wendell Ford and others have develop safer cigarettes, but who would deny consumers the right to information about the dangers of smoking? HEW is only doing its job,

reporting on the inherent dangers of a product that is used by millions of Americans. Efforts to improve cigarettes should continue, but publicity about the dangers of products already out on the market shouldn't be hushed up. Similarly, no one is infringing on the right to smoke. HEW is simply informing consumers about the potential dangers if they do smoke.

What's disturbing is the tobacco industry's

stubborn position that nothing has been proved stubborn position that nothing has been proved, that there isn't enough evidence to show smoking is dangerous. Advertising campaigns continue to bring great numbers of children and teenagers into the ranks of smokers, young people who either missed out on earlier strong warnings or don't appreciate new ones; and who will have a difficult time breaking the habit.

Obviously the industry is worried. It seems to believe that even a slight retrenchment in position would be a distrace—perhans even enough to

ocitive that even a signt retrenement in position would be a disgrace — perhaps even enough to cause a cutback in the tobacco price-support program that helps farmers.

Of course, it's not likely the program will be criticized too much as long as Carl Perkins, D-Ky...

chairs the House Appropriations committee, which passes judgment on the HEW budget. Reportedly, Califano no longer presses the point about the connection between lung cancer and tobacco

But there is a connection, and Kentucky - where tobacco is grown in 118 out of 120 counties— should not be proud of it. The livelihood of tobacco farmers shouldn't be suddenly eliminated, but it's time to admit that smoking is hazardous, and start preparing for the day when it's popularity declines

New York's rich dealers are inconspicuous, elusive species in flourishing industry







7-hour hijacking of Lebanese airliner ends with release of crew, hostages

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Six Moslem hijackers released all the passengers and crew members of a Lebanese airliner early today, ending a seven-hour drama they had staged to

The leader told the news Conference that the 54-year-old imam had been kidnapped in October by the Libyan regime of Col. Moammar Khaddafy men who identified themselves

"in defiance of all international laws." He added. "It is a crime that will not go unpunished." The jettiner was refueled at the hijackers' demand when it returned here after Cyprus and Turkey refused to allow it to land. An airport spokesman said the hijackers had not indicated in their talks with government officials if they planned to leave again.

The plane was on a secluded runway and was cordoned off by police.

The hijackers freed the 66 passengers and nine crew members after their leader told a hastily organized airprot news conference that Libya was responsible for the missing Imam Mousa al-Sadr.

After the brief statement, the hijackers left the Boeing 707 and surrendered to Lebanese authorities.

The leader told the news softenence that the 54-year-old softenence that the 54-year-

as Lebanese nationals, told the negotiators they were convinced the imam was being held prisoner in Libya.

"We hold (Libyan strongmam Col.) Moammar Khadafy responsible for the imam's safety and we want him back alive at all costs," the unnamed leader of the hijackers reportedly said at one point they wanted to

The hijackers reportedly said at one point they wanted to take the plane to Libya to demand "the release of our beloved imam," the airport spokesman said.

Among the freed hostages was the wife of Lebanes was the wife of Lebanes parliament member Mahmoud Ammar Ammar was kept aboard by the hijackers.


The jet was hijacked yesterday afternoon 50 minutes after it had departed from Beirut for Amman, Jordan.

According to the officials, the gummen said they were members of an organization called Amal — hope. The group was founded by the al-Sadr during the 1975 civil are between Lebanon's Moslems and Christians.

The imam has been missing since he flew to Libya in October to attend the anniversary celebrations of Moammar Khadaty's 1969 coup against the pro-western monarchy.

The hijackers first told the airport control tower they were Palestinians planning to take the plane to Larnaca airport on Cyprus or to the Turkish capital of Ankara.





When I bumped into Stephens, When I bumped into Stephens, he just bardy raised his hand to shake mine. He bardy smiled, He didn't celebrat like some of the others.

But at that time, I thought it

was nothing to worry about. I thought he was maybe sick from a virus or something. It later turned out to be a serious situation, though.

Having seen him shooting baskets like a bang — bang since his freshman year in high school. I've always had a special interest in Stephens. He beat my high shool a few times with his superb southpaw shooting hand.

shooting hand.

He scored in the 50's three times and in the 40's 13 times during his prep days. He was fun to watch.

When Stephens signed with UK. Coach Joe B. Hall compared him with the former NBA great Jerry West (now the head coach of the Los Angels Lakers) and said, "Tim is a perpetual motion scrapper with the marksmanship of a Kentucky squirrel hunter."

But things didn't go quite right for Stephens. It wasn't his year.

But I can understand his decision to move. He had a big heart for desiring to play. He just wanted to go to a school where he can be a starter. You know it's more of an honor to be a substitute player at UK than is to be a starter for any other college or university in the state.


