


Founded -- In 1878 as the Kentucky Agricultural and Mechanical College. From 1865 until 1878 it was part of Kentucky University, a church and State supported institution. Kentucky University grew out of Transylvania University, which now exists as Transylvania College.

Enrollment -- Approximately 3,700 students with about twice as many men as women students.

He also was captain of the Illini wrestling team, a member of the track team, specializing in the weights, and was captain of his freshman football team. He was a team-mate of the great "Red" Grange at Illinois. Shively is married and is the father of a daughter, Susanne, and a son, Douglas. He received his Master of Arts Degree at the University of Kentucky. He came to Kentucky in 1927 as line coach under Harry Gamage, holding that position until 1933, when, during an athletic shake-up, Gamage left and Shively went on the faculty in the Department of Physical Education.
